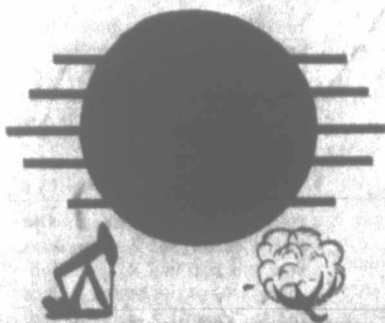

Library to close

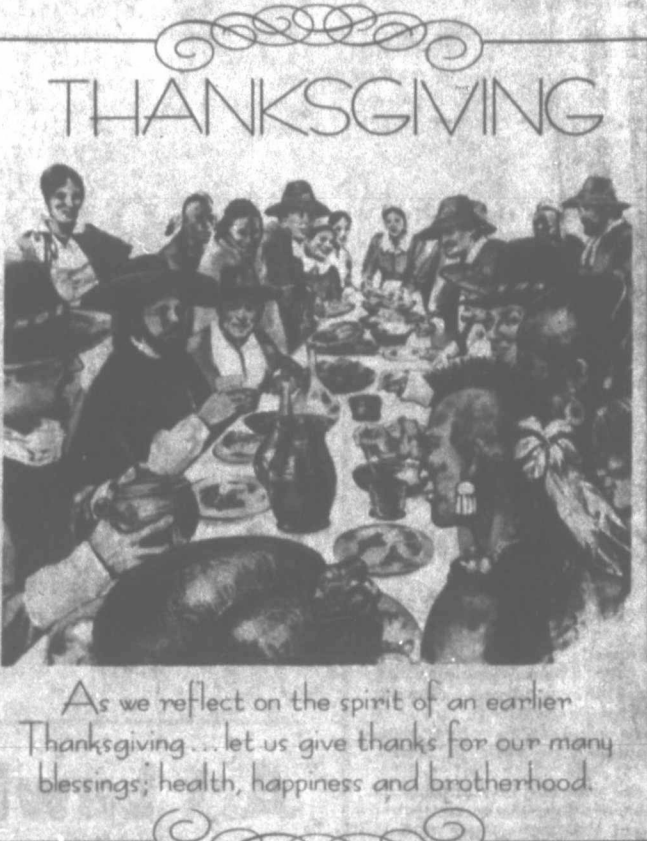
The Mitchell County Library will be closed Thursday and Friday in observance of Thanksgiving. The library will reopen Saturday, Nov. 29.

Audit report prompts changes at city hall

The annual audit of the city has prompted a number of changes in bookkeeping methods at city hall, said City Manager Brenda Tarter.

Mrs. Tarter said a letter sent to her by auditor Joe Morren on Oct. 3 prior to the city council's acceptance of the audit on Oct. 14 also resulted in the resignation of City Secretary Tina Raschke.

Mrs. Tarter said the city secretary is charged with making sure the city books are kept in order and that Mrs. Raschke submitted her resignation because the accounting system was found to be in less than perfect condition.

"All the recommendations made by Mr. Morren have been implemented and then some," said Mrs. Tarter. "The bank balances are totally up to date." Mrs. Raschke submitted her

resignation on Oct. 13, the day before the council meeting, and later tried to have the resignation rescinded, said Mrs. Tarter.

"She asked that I rescind her resignation, but under the circumstances, I refused," said Mrs. Tarter.

Mrs. Raschke had been city secretary since September, 1983.

Mrs. Tarter said she will soon start interviewing applicants for the \$14,000 a year job.

In his recommendations, Morren said that bank reconciliations were not being prepared monthly and that in order to do the city's audit, his staff had to reconcile August, 1985 through April, 1986 general fund accounts and July, 1985 through April, 1986 water fund accounts.

Morren said the general ledger was not in balance at the end of April, 1986 and that many

items in the general ledger were posted without having the offsetting debit or credit posted. He said there were errors in addition and that there were duplications and omissions.

Among Morren's recommendations were:

- reconcile all accounts at the end of each month;
- complete the trial balance each month and search for posting errors until they are found;

- amend the budgets periodically and file the amendment with the original budget;

- review the total cash balances at the end of each month and advise the city's depository of the amount in case additional securities have to be pledged, and;

- the tax rate adopted for debt

Country Christmas theme of parade

The Christmas season will be ushered in with style this year during the annual Christmas parade Saturday, Dec. 6 at 2 p.m.

"Country Christmas" is the theme of this year's parade, said Sharon Hoover, parade chairman.

In addition to the parade entries, Santa Claus will be riding aboard a fire truck and will visit area youngsters following the parade.

The parade will travel down Locust from Third to Second Street, west on Second to Oak, north on Oak to Sixth, East on Sixth to Hickory and South on Hickory to Fourth where it will disband. The staging area will be on Chestnut between Third

and Fourth streets.

Prizes will be awarded to both commercial and non-commercial entries. First and second place trophies will be awarded to the top two commercial entries and prizes of \$175 for first, \$100 for second and 150 for third will be awarded to non-commercial entries.

Businesses and organizations wishing to enter the parade float contest should contact the chamber of commerce. Deadline for entries is noon, Dec. 4.

"All persons wishing to participate in the parade, but not enter the contest, please contact the chamber," said Mrs. Hoover. "The more, the merrier."

Hospital sponsors cancer screening

Mitchell County Hospital will sponsor a mobile breast cancer detection unit Wednesday, Dec. 3 from 9 a.m.-6 p.m.

Hospital Administrator Ray Mason said the unit will be parked at the back of the hospital near the X-ray department.

"This is a community service on the behalf of the hospital," said Mason. "The hospital will receive nothing from it."

The unit is operated by the Regional Breast Care Center of the Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa.

Mason explained that women wishing to have the test conducted should call the hospital's administrative offices for an

appointment.

The test will cost \$50 and results will be sent to the family physician who will go over the results with the patient.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every 11 women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year, over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer which is the number 2 cancer killer of women.

By using modern state of the art X-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt.

service should be converted to a percent of the total tax rate and at the end of each month when the collector account is distributed, place the debit service tax into the sinking fund.

Morren also stressed the importance of complying with federal regulations concerning grievance policy or committee to handle complaints from the handicapped alleging discrimination.

Morren further suggested that the city should use pre-number receipt books for all sources and that invoices should be signed or initialed by someone in a responsible position.

Morren said the state comp-

troller has produced a book entitled "Standard Financial

Management System for Texas Cities" and suggested that the publication be reviewed for areas that might be improved in the city's accounting system.

My earliest memories of Thanksgiving are of eating fried chicken, not turkey.

It's 10:45 in the morning, and already the Green Bay Packers are on television against the Detroit Lions, in living black-and-white, and with no zoom lens shots.

The men are sitting in the living room, and the women are congregated in the kitchen, executing the meal. Grown men occasionally walk into the kitchen, hoping to steal a bite of the dressing. Invariably they are thrown out by the cooking technicians. Young boys are playing football in the front yard. I have no idea what the young girls are doing.

Because the spread is so elaborate, it usually takes until 2 or 3 in the afternoon to get it cooked. The men are weak-kneed by the time seating orders are issued.

My Dad is the preacher, so he always says the blessing. Being as hungry as the rest of us, he makes it brief.

I'm not sure when a child finally earns the right to move from the card table to the dining table with the rest of the adults. My wife says her cousin in California didn't make the big table until she was 18.

That's not a standard law, or anything. A young woman could earn the right by getting married, or having a baby. Boys probably need to letter on the high school football team.

Thanksgiving can be a depressing time, of course.

I hate those news features where somebody from the local station goes to the city jail and takes pictures of some poor slob in white overalls eating turkey and dressing. They may be the biggest jerks on earth, but they don't deserve that kind of humiliation.

For those out there who haven't figured out how to have Thanksgiving Day the proper way, here's a brief list to follow:

—Always get up in time to watch the Macy's Day parade. And be sure to do the watching in your pajamas and housecoats. Getting dressed is an insult to tradition.

—Women need to have started the feast by 5 a.m. Naturally, you will have already made preliminary preparations the evening before.

—Do not EVER have a Thanksgiving Day meal without giblet gravy.

—Do not EVER have a Thanksgiving Day meal without both mashed and sweet potatoes.

—Do not EVER make Thanksgiving Day dressing without sage, even if you're allergic to it.

—Do not EVER try to get away with making just one pie. We're talking pumpkin, custard, apple and chocolate, here, maybe pecan, too, so start early.

Put dish towels over them when you're through.

If things are fouled up in Washington, there's a good chance it's your fault. Talk to your daughter without lecturing, if that's possible.

Just be thankful you have the means to clean up your own messes. —Finally, don't try to eat again in the evening. Take your bicarbonates, apologize to your body, and swear never to eat to excess again.

At least until Christmas.

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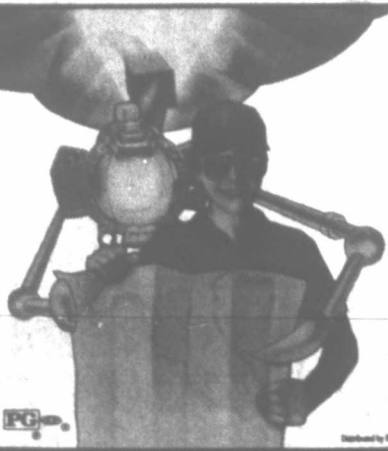

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WESTERN TEXAS COLLEGE MID-WINTER SESSION

REGISTRATION: Dec. 1-18. Late registration allowed only from 8 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. on Jan. 5, 1987.

Classes meet from 8:45-11:45 a.m. and 1-3:45 p.m. daily Jan. 5-14, 1987 except on Jan. 10 and 11. Final exams will be on Jan. 14.

Tuition and fees will be \$46 plus books and lab fees.

COMPUTER SCIENCE 130 (Introduction to Computer Science) - Britt Canada
Lab Fee: \$20. General introduction to computer terminology, computer applications and computer programming. A good course for students who have no prior computer experience.

ENGLISH 231 (American Literature) - Marilyn Lancaster
Examines the development of American thought over the past 350 year period. Includes such authors as John Winthrop, Jonathan Edwards, Benjamin Franklin, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Stephen Crane and William Faulkner. Course requirements include both short papers and essay tests.

ENGLISH 232 (Survey of English Literature) - Ed Barkowsky
A study of the works of representative major English writers from Beowulf through the twentieth century. Substantial reading and discussion of assigned materials will be required along with short analytical papers and tests.

GOVERNMENT 231 (American, State and Local Government) - John Forshee
One of two government courses required for graduation from state supported colleges and universities. Emphasizes the Texas Constitution and Texas state and local government. Special attention will be given to the fiscal problems facing Texas, solutions offered by executive officials and the legislature, and other major legislative issues.

GOVERNMENT 232 (American, State and Local Government) - Robert Adams
Fulfills half the Texas legislative requirements for government. The class will study the origin and development of the American governmental system and federal and interstate relations. Special emphasis will be given to the American constitution and governmental system.

HEALTH, PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND RECREATION 112 (Red Cross Life Saving) - Mike Harrison
Lab Fee: \$10. Provides the individual with the knowledge and skills designed to save his own life or the life of another in the event of an emergency. Upon successful completion, the student will receive an American Red Cross Life Saving Certification. Classroom and pool time will be required.

HISTORY 132 (United States History Since 1865) - Franklin Pruitt
A study of the United States from the end of the Civil War to the present. Included are the Reconstruction Era, the emergence of the U.S. as a world power, the World Wars and the problems of peace. This course, along with History 131, will fulfill the state and local history requirements for graduation.

SOCIOLOGY 231 (Introduction Sociology) - Gil Fleer
What is the role of the "Big Organization" in our everyday lives? How does it affect our behavior? These and related matters will be the focus of this course as it deals with the study of human interaction.

SPEECH 131 (Fundamentals of Speech) - Jim Rambo

Pecans - a part of holiday tradition

Texas holiday baking just wouldn't be the same without Texas pecans. Texans give pecans as gifts, serve them at parties and bake them in fruitcakes and other holiday cooking traditions.

The Texas pecan tradition goes back a long way. Indians who roamed Texas first ate the

fruit of these native trees and were helped through many a long hard winter by its supply of protein, minerals and oil. As settlers arrived, they too incorporated the rich tasting nuts into their diet. Since harvest took place during the autumn, pecans naturally became a part of the holiday traditions. This custom

has continued to present time.

Many people have great family stories and traditions about pecans. Whole families would sit and crack open pecans roasting them in the fireplace. They would usually go out before Thanksgiving to gather the pecans for their holiday cooking.

This season more than 60 million pounds of pecans are being harvested. The Texas harvest will have pecans from both native and improved trees. "Improved" does not necessarily mean better. It refers to the varieties that have been developed and cultivated in recent years for the commercial market.

Native pecans originated here. More than half of this year's crop is expected from native trees. They produce a nut that is high in oil which gives pecans their rich taste. They are usually smaller than the improved variety and they have harder shells.

When selecting whole pecans look for nuts that are free of mold, holes or cracks. They should not rattle when shaken. A rattle indicates that the nut meat has shriveled. Shelled nutmeats should be plump and uniform in size and color.

Because pecans are high in polyunsaturated fat, they should be stored carefully to prevent shrinkage and drying out. Refrigeration and freezing helps pecans retain flavor and freshness. Whole pecans will keep two years or more when frozen. For more information on Texas pecans or a free "Get Cracking" pecan cookbook write the Texas Department of Agriculture, 3652 N. TEXAS PECAN PIE

1½ cups brown sugar, firmly packed
¼ cup granulated sugar
¼ cup water
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
¼ teaspoon salt
2 eggs
¼ cup evaporated milk

1½ cups pecan halves
¼ teaspoon vanilla
1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell
Combine first five ingredients in small bowl and mix well. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add evaporated milk and mix well. Stir in pecan halves and vanilla. Mix well and turn into unbaked 9-inch pie shell. Cook in preheated 400 degrees F. oven for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees F. and cook an additional 35 to 40 minutes, or until filling is puffed in center and well browned. Let pie cool before cutting.

HONEY PECAN TREATS

½ cup butter
2 tablespoons honey
1 cup sifted flour
¼ teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup finely chopped pecans
Cream butter, stirring in honey gradually. Add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Chill 1 hour. Form into 1-inch balls. Place well apart on greased baking sheets and bake in a 300 degree F. oven about 35 to 40 minutes or until light brown. Makes 2 dozen.

MICROWAVE PECAN BRITTLE

1 cup sugar
½ cup white corn syrup
1 cup pecans
One-eighth teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon baking soda
In a 1½-quart casserole, stir together the sugar, syrup, pecans and salt, mixing well. Microwave at high for 6-9 minutes until light brown. Add butter, vanilla and stir well. Microwave at high for 1-2 minutes more. Pecans will be light brown and syrup will be very hot. Add baking soda and gently stir until light and foamy. Pour onto lightly-buttered cookie sheet. Let cool ½-1 hour. When cool break into small pieces.

MAPLE-PECAN MUFFINS
2 cups whole-wheat flour
1 cup coarsely chopped pecans
2 teaspoons baking powder
Two-thirds cup milk
Two-thirds cup maple syrup
¼ cup vegetable oil
2 eggs
Pecan halves for garnish
Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Line 12 muffin cups with paper liners. Combine flour, chopped pecans and baking powder in medium mixing bowl. In large bowl whisk milk, syrup, oil and eggs. Stir in dry mixture. Divide batter among muffin cups, filling each about two-thirds full. Top each with pecan half. Bake about 20 minutes, or until tops are brown and wooden pick inserted comes out clean. Serve warm. Makes 12 muffins.

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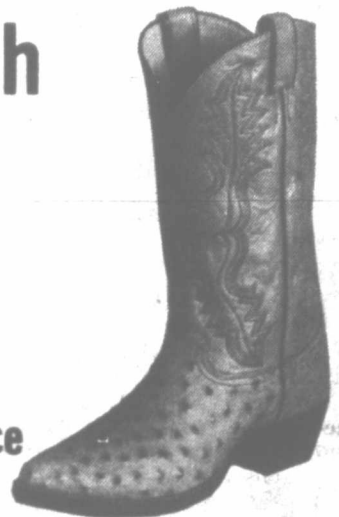

The Westbrook junior varsity boys began the night with a 40-28 win. Scoring were Wayne Carter with 10 and Cary Pierce 8.

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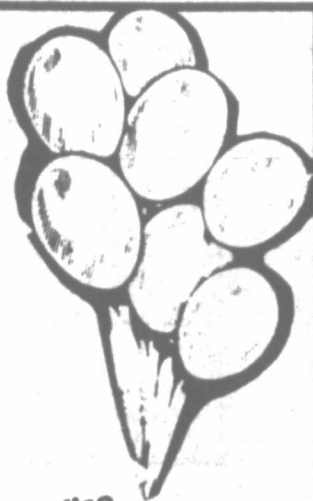
