School Denies Liability Graduation Trip

School sponsorship for the senior trip was withdrawn by action of the school board at Monday evening's regular session of the school board. Board members offered the suggestion that such a trip, made following graduation exercises, be senior parents sponsored.

Recommendation of the proposed trips would be that fund raising be sponsored by the senior parent organization and present funds be contributed to that organization. Full responsibility of the trip would belong to the senior parent organization.

The final three days of senior school attendance would be excused absences for purpose of the trip.

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Five Minutes With The Bible

DOES MAN HAVE ETERNAL SECURITY?

Many people today are pondering over such questions as, "Is man guaranteed eternal security", or, "Once a man is saved, is he always saved?", or, "Is it impossible for one to fall away from the Lord?", or, "Are the saints preserved by God?" The unanswerable reply to such questions as these is given in Revelation 3:1-5, in the Lord's letter to the church at Sardis. Here were a group of people who were Christians and who had obeyed the gospel. But the Lord says they had fallen away! He declares, "Thou art dead . . . Be watchful, and strengthen the things which remain, that are ready to die: for I have found none of thy works perfect before God. Remember therefore how thou has received and heard, and hold fast, and repent." If there was no possibility of these Christians ever falling away and being lost, such statements from our Lord would be meaningless and in vain! The fact is that these people did not have eternal security, and because they had transgressed God's law and were in need of repentance, they were not preserved by God!

Another scripture which shows clearly the possibility of falling away from the Lord is John 10:27-29, where Jesus said: "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me: And I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any

man pluck them out of my hand. My Father which gave them me, is greater than all; and no man is able to pluck them out of my Father's hand." Now analyze the Lord's words very carefully: the verbs are present tense; which, in the original language carry the force of continuous action. In other words, as long as the sheep are presently following, they will not be lost. Besides, Jesus also teaches, in Rev. 14:4: "These are they that follow the Lamb whithersoever He goeth." Yet another example of men who were Christians but who fell away are Hymenaeus and Alexander and Demas in I Tim. 1:19, 20, II Tim. 4:10, and Jude 21. These men were faithful Christians, but as Paul clearly teaches in these passages these men had fallen away and were delivered unto Satan because they had blasphemed and loved the cares of the world more than their Lord Jesus Christ! Next week we will consider some additional teaching on the possibility of falling away from the Lord.

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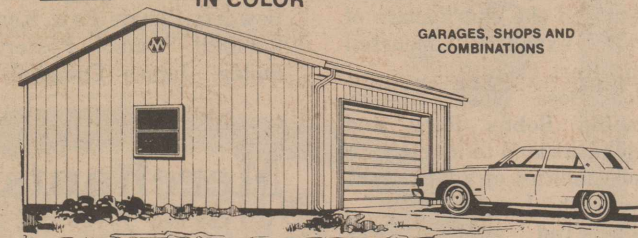

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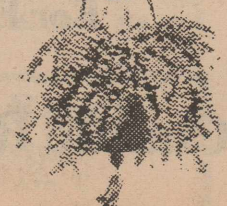

Cook of the Week

Cooking is an enjoyable part of being a homemaker for our Cook of the Week, Mrs. Lanny Wheeler. She also likes to bake and shares recipes for a luscious chocolate cake, melt-in-the-mouth brownies, delectable hot rolls and a tasty main dish meal.

Since moving to Hart early last month, Jackie has been busy settling in with her family in the parsonage of First United Methodist Church. In the midst of that busyness, Jackie has found time to make jelly for her family to enjoy in future months. Sealing it with paraffin, five-year-old Timmy was puzzled at seeing the finished product and inquired of his mom, "Is this a candle?"

PORK CHOPS & RICE CASSEROLE

6 servings
6 pork chops
1 onion sliced thin
1 can consomme
seasoned salt
1 green pepper, cut in rings
2 sliced tomatoes
1 c rice
3 c water

Cook rice in water. Trim fat from pork chops and sprinkle both sides with seasoned salt. Brown quickly in small amount

of fat in hot skillet. Remove from fat and place in bottom of rectangle cake pan. On each chop place a slice of onion, slice of tomato and pepper ring. Spoon hot rice around and over the meat and vegetable mounds. Tuck remaining bits of onion, tomatoes and pepper between chops for flavor. Bring can of consomme quickly to a boil in the skillet that you browned the chops in. Stir to mix thoroughly. Pour over meat and rice mixture. Cover with foil and bake one hour at 350°.

REFRIGERATOR ROLLS

1 c shortening
1 c sugar
1½ t salt
1 c boiling water
2 beaten eggs
2 pkgs yeast
1 c lukewarm water
6 c flour

Bake in greased pans at 375° 12-15 minutes.

Street Dance Plans Complete

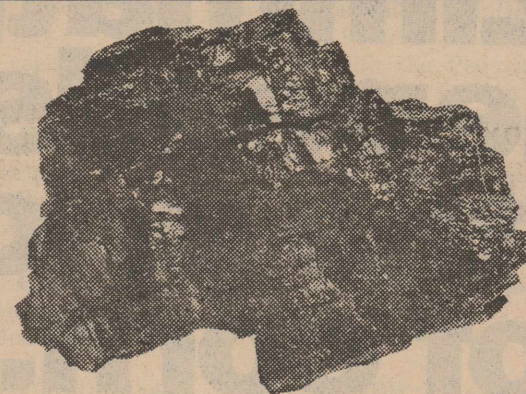

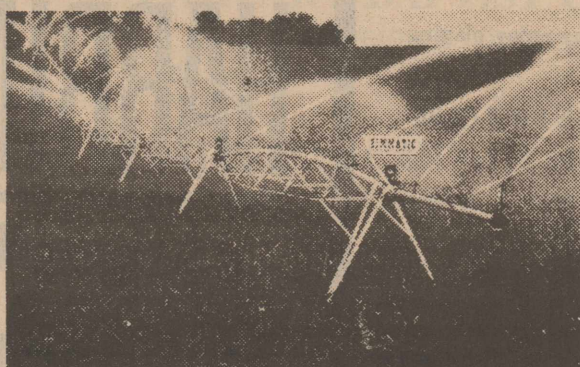

Irene's Ideas

Summer is going by in a hurry. Here it is July already and time for our garden check list.

1. Water at the first sign of water stress (wilting, off color foliage, etc.). Learn to recognize drought symptoms. It is normal for plants to wilt during the heat of the day even if adequately watered. Drought stress is usually indicated if they don't recover in the late evening.

2. Insects and diseases to watch for this month include: Elm leaf beetle, Sevin on 25-35 day interval; Leaf rollers, Dimethoate; Lace bugs, Diazinon or Malathion; Red spider mites, Kelthane; Caterpillars, asps, etc., Sevin; Grub worms, Diazinon, Dursban; Powdery mildew, Acti-dione PM, Benomyl, Karathane; Black spot on roses, Benomyl, Phaltan; Chinch bugs, Diazinon, Trithion, Ethion, Aspon. Follow label instructions for concentration and frequency.

3. Plant mums, zinnia, Marigold, Joseph's Coat and other plants for fall color any time this month.

4. If plants show symptoms of iron chlorosis, spray the foliage with copperas or iron chelate used according to the instructions on the package.

5. Check recently planted landscape materials regularly. Dry, hot weather can be deadly if the plant isn't adequately established.

6. Hanging baskets require extra care in July and August. Soaking basketing and root ball in a tub of water is an excellent way to water and fertilize. Do not use fertilizer solution if root ball is extremely dry. Irrigate first then fertilizer after the plants are well drained.

7. Remove spent flower stalks on cannas to encourage continuous flowering.

8. If fire blight has attacked your loquat, pyracantha, pear and cotoneaster and the leaves on some branches appear to be burned, prune out the diseased portion and treat pruning shears with a disinfectant after each cut to prevent further spread of the disease.

9. Pinch copper plants to make them bushy and compact.

10. Check mulch on landscape

beds, replenish or replace where needed.

11. Many spring flowering shrubs will be forming flower buds in late July and August. Drouth conditions can reduce both the quantity and the quality of spring flowers. This is especially true of Azaleas and Camelias. Don't allow plants to suffer from lack of water.

12. Gladiolus corms can be dug, cured and stored once the foliage has turned brown.

13. Clean up iris beds and thin out clumps if crowded. They can be transplanted any time from late July to October.

14. Roses still require a regular spray application for blackspot control.

15. Roses also require plenty of water and regular applications of fertilizer if you want a good display of fall color. If plants are becoming too tall, sacrifice some of the small summer flowers and cut the plants back about 1/3 to 1/2 to encourage new growth and fall flowers.

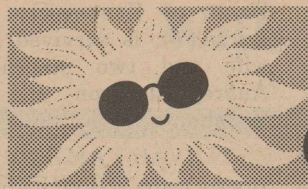

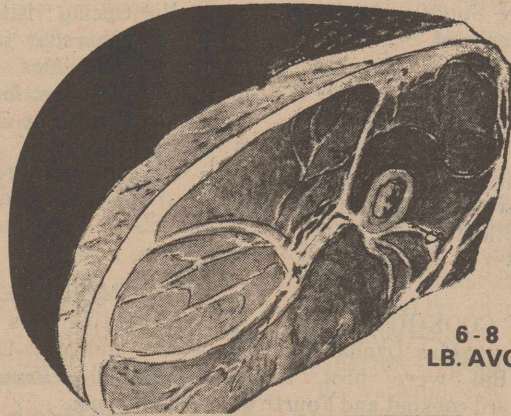

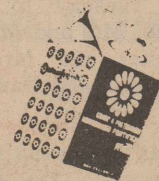
