COSTLY CHEMICAL NOW EASILY MADE

(By Associated Press)
COLUMBUS, O., May 2.—The United States department of agriculture's discovery of a means to make one of the calcium salts, reducing the cost of manufacture from around \$150 a pound, to 50 cents, was disclosed today at the American Chemical society convention here.

Calcium salts are among essential remedies in medicine and are used as ingredients of many industries. One of them, taken from gluconic acid, never has been available because of the great expense of making this acid. The department now has found how to produce the acid cheaply, and that there are surprising differences in some of the effects of its hitherto inaccessible salt, as compared with those in common use. The discoveries were made by Horace T. Herrick and Orville E. May of the color and farm waste section of the bureau of chemistry and soils.

MARCH RECORD MONTH IN OIL

PETROLEUM OUTPUT IS
AT NEW PEAK IN
THIS COUNTRY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 2.—Petroleum production in the United States for March amounted to 82,515,000 barrels.

The commerce department, in announcing the figure today, said this was the largest amount produced in any one month ever recorded, but that the increasing consumption of petroleum products, notably gasoline, resulted in slowing down the rate of increase in stocks on hand. Gasoline consumption was estimated to have reached a daily average of 919,000 barrels during March, or a figure 17 per cent above the March consumption rate last year.

The grand total of stocks of petroleum on hand was placed at 662,500,000 barrels at the end of March, against 634,063,000 barrels on hand the preceding month, and 612,928,000 on hand at the end of March, 1928. Gasoline stocks March 31 amounted to 42,203,000 barrels.

PRISON FUSS NEARS PEACE

WARRING FACTIONS IN CENTRALIZATION ROW AGREE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, May 2.—Although discouraged by overwhelming defeat of Governor Moody's civil service bill, administration leaders were encouraged today by an agreement between penitentiary concentration factions.

A compromise on the Young-Turner-Joy bill, amended to empower the prison board to centralize the system on any lands now owned by the state, was effected last night after a lengthy conference which followed two meetings with the governor.

The original bill called for concentration on either the Ramsey or Darrington farms or both. It was this measure which passed the house during the regular session. Representative Harry Graves of Georgetown proposed concentration on the Walker county property, and Representative Leonard Tillotson of Sealy proposed using the Ramsey farm as a unit of centralization.

Long Defends His Actions In Speech

NEW ORLEANS, May 2.—Governor Huey P. Long came to New Orleans for his second speaking campaign against his impeachment after first visiting the country districts.

He spoke last night at the Athenaeum with a state radio hookup and was introduced by Senator J. L. Anderson, of Grant Parish.

Governor Long discussed charges of impeachment placed against him, denounced the Standard Oil company which opposed his occupational tax proposal, attacked newspapers because "the truth ain't in them," and told those assembled: "They can't remove me by the vote of the people, but they are trying to undo the election."

WAXAHACHIE, May 2 (AP).—The body of Lola B. Rolter, comely stenographer, shot to death here yesterday by Dr. Harry Dowling of Temple, was taken to Tell, near Childress, today for burial. A number of relatives accompanied the body.

TOKYO, May 2.—The head of the oldest reigning house in the world extended such a welcome to the scion of the second oldest today as Japan has not known in a decade.

Emperor Hirohito met Prince Henry of England, Duke of Gloucester, at the railway station as he arrived from Yokohama on his mission to bestow the order of the garter on the Japanese ruler.

The emperor grasped the hand of the English prince and chatted with him for a moment after he had descended from the coach to the station platform. Then he watched smilingly as Crown Prince Chichibu left with him in a brilliant procession to the Kasumigaseki palace.

At the entrance, the Princess Chichibu, acting as the empire's hostess on behalf of the emperor who expects soon to become a mother for the third time, greeted the Royal Guest.

HOUSE WAITS TARIFF BILL

MARK TIME AS SENATE CONTINUES STUDY OF FARM RELIEF

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 2.—Still awaiting the tariff revision bill and unwilling to complicate the legislative situation by taking up other measures, the house again marked time today while the farm relief bill continued to claim the senate's attention.

The house will meet again tomorrow. Republicans of its ways and means committee, meanwhile

are rounding out their draft of the tariff bill, and leaders have promised it will be introduced tomorrow or Saturday.

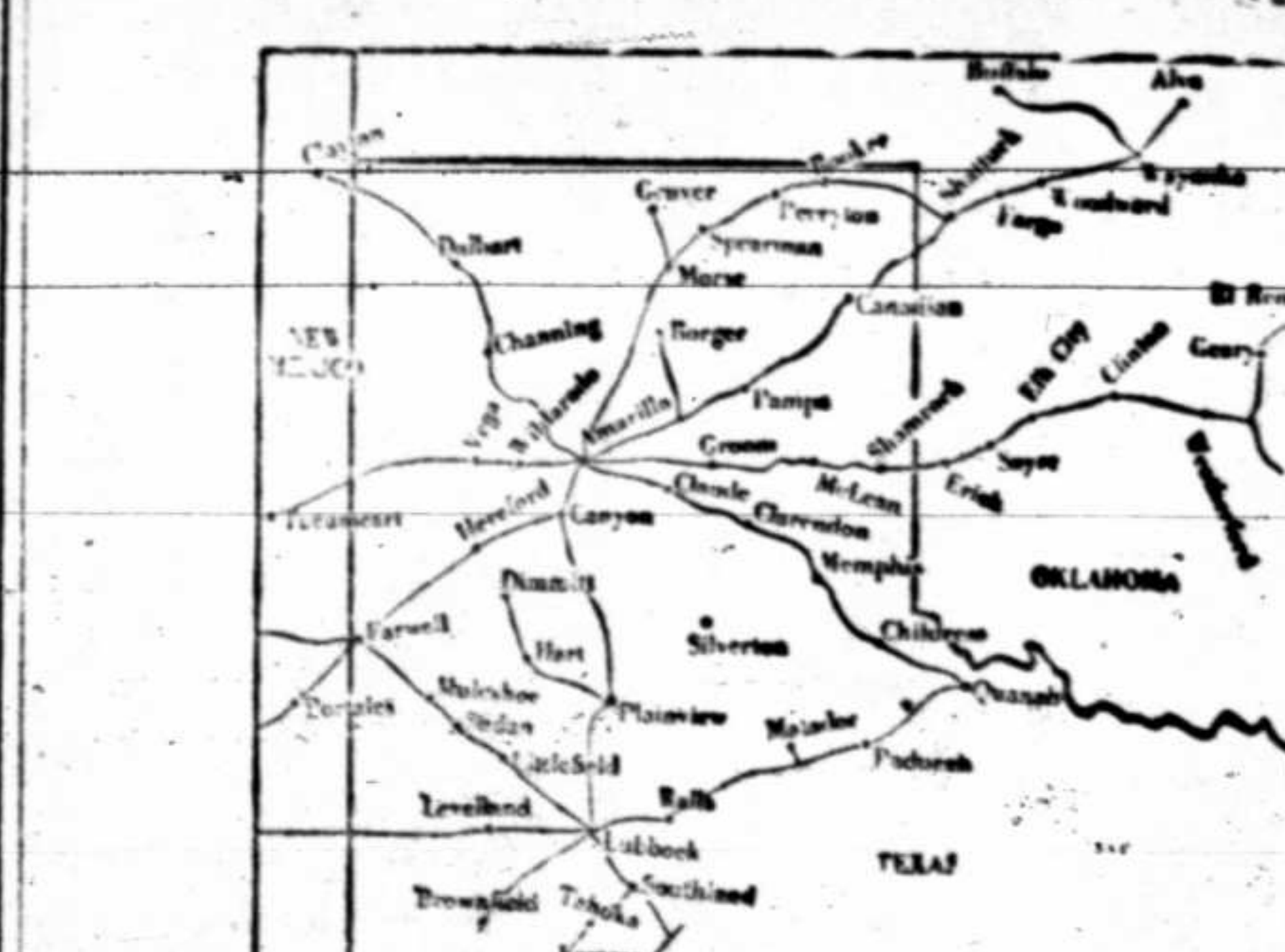

Youth is sure to be served in the selection of the Davis Cup team that will start play in the American zone. John Hennessey at 23 is the oldest of the prospects, and John Van Ryn, Wilmer Allison, Fritz Mearns and Gil Hall are in their middle twenties.

Tilden, whose reverses in Davis Cup play have not tamed his spirit, would like to join the team in Europe for the challenge round against the French, along with Frank Hunter, his friend, partner, and runner-up in the national ranking. But how well such a suggestion will be received by the young American players is a dubious question.

"As you fellows know, I was umpiring in the Pacific Coast League before coming to the American," said George. "Prior to that I had been a player in the coast league for a number of years. It was in that league as an umpire that I had the unique experience of being fined by the official working with me."

"My partner in crime was a chap by the name of Finney. He was working the plate. I was umpiring on the bases. It was a tough ball game. It seemed all the close ones were going against the home team, and as a result, Finney and myself were in constant trouble. The blow-

off came in the ninth inning when Finney called a visiting runner safe at the plate, with the run that eventually won the game.

"Within a few seconds it seemed as if every regular as well as all the bench warmers of the home team had surrounded Finney. He was the center of a swirling mob with strong language flying in every direction. Fines ranging from \$5 to \$25 were plastered on a half dozen players. I could hear Finney handling them out, but the kicking continued.

"Naturally, I was annoyed at the delay and moved from my position at first to the plate, believing that I might offer some assistance in dispersing the angry mob. As I reached the plate in a severe voice I remarked: 'Come on, Finney, get the game started. These fellows are making a joke out of you as well as the game.'

"It will just cost you ten bucks for so thinking, you're not helping things any with that line of chatter," replied Finney, who had his back to me and really didn't know who was doing the talking.

"The players got a real kick out of the mistake and the humor of the situation caused them to rescue the game.

"Finney remitted the fine in the dressing room at the close of the game," explained Hildebrand, "but I still claim the distinction of being the only umpire ever fined by a brother arbitrator."

Just Suppose

There is something interesting
somewhere in the news that the
British government has at last
abolished the tax on tea.

Not that that will make any dif-
ference to tea drinkers on this side
of the Atlantic. But the tax is
blood-brother to another tax on
tea, which caused a ship load of
tea to be tossed into the sea off
Boston harbor, upwards of a cen-
tury and a half ago, and surely we
can be pardoned for feeling a sort
of proprietary interest in it.

Perhaps this development is
proof, after all, that the early
colonists were a trifle hasty. Pitch-
ing the tea overboard caused bad
feeling and led to a war that drag-
ged on for some seven years, with
much bloodshed and expense. If
our revolutionary forebears had only
waited they would have gotten
rid of the tax by peaceful means.

However, they wouldn't wait. The
tax on tea by itself, wasn't espe-
cially heavy, but the things that it
stood for were, and so the tea
went into Boston harbor, becau-
se it burned on various headland-
ers and clerks took to drilling
in vacant lots and city squares, and
a new nation presently found itself
in existence.

When you stop to think about it,
the things that will move men to
action, and serve as rallying points
for disorganized grievances, resent-
ments and ideas are rather strange.
There have been plenty of scholarly
writers recently to point out
that the American colonists weren't
really so very badly treated by the
British in the days just preceding
1766. This book and that book will
tell you that the tax on tea, the
stamp act and other things were
not so very oppressive after all.

These things, however, did not
cause the revolution. They simply
served as symbols through which
the impetuous aspirations of the
colonists in the American wilderness
could find a voice.

That is the way things always
happen. Whenever some dramatic
event takes place in the midst of
high emotions and unbridled
passions, you can look out for an
explosion.

The storming of the Bastille, in
1789, was an important affair. The
old prison held seven or eight
prisoners. It had really outlived
its usefulness. Yet it served
20,000,000 Frenchmen for the great
struggle of the revolution and
worked a change in Europe that is
not over yet.

John Brown, likewise, was a half-
brained old fanatic, a murderer
and a crank who deserved the
hanging he got. Yet the Civil War
might well have ended differently
if his dramatic exploit and death
had not been before the eyes of the
people of the north.

So we're entitled to take an inter-
est in the final end of the tax on
British tea. If tea had never been
taxed, the history of the last 150
years might have been considerably
different.

Saves Lives

The value of rabies vaccine is
shown by a recent statement from
Dr. W. E. King, assistant director of
the biological department of the
Parke-Davis Research Laboratories,
who reveals that the lives of more
than 12,000 persons were saved by
this vaccine during the past year.

Statistics show that the vaccine
was administered to 80,000 people
during the year. Scientific experi-
ence has shown that 18 per cent of
the persons treated would have died
without the treatment. Hence the
figure of 12,000 as the number saved
from death.

his every word. They gave him
attention which has been un-
surpassed in that given visiting
speakers. They like other peo-
ple are interested in the un-
usual and Hayward Thompson is
nothing if not decidedly unusual.

Thompson is no fake. He's no
magician. He does not resort to
trickery. The Plainsman has read
his press notices—and he has liter-
ally bales of stories and pictures from
the foremost newspapers of Amer-
ica—and without exception they hail
him as a marvel of par-optic pow-
ers. The press notices show that in
many cities he has been a "repea-
ter." In other words, he has made

Thompson is real, he is unusual.
That ought to be enough to get

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Many
leaders of American business are
gathered here to discuss a wide
range of problems.

These men concede an existing
national prosperity, but so
numerous and perplexing are
the questions which they will
undertake to discuss that the
program reveals deep inter-
est, and in some cases anx-
iety, about the future of the
nation's economic structure.

The annual meeting of the
U. S. Chamber of Commerce will
devote special sections of discus-
sion to the marketing of agricul-
tural products, trade practices, man-
ufacturing problems, transportation,
water power, conservation of nat-
ural resource raw materials, mod-
ern city planning and financial
structure of mass merchandising
principles of tariff legislation, business
finance and the credit system, safety
of life and property, city traffic and
trade areas and employer-employee
relations.

Will Reveal Business View
The chamber will pass resolu-
tions on most of these subjects
which may or may not have some
important effect on the future but
which may be taken as expressing
the preponderant sentiment of
American business men and will
be handed on as such to the in-
numerable local chambers of com-
merce over the country.

The two main matters sched-
uled for action by the present ses-
sion of Congress are on the
chamber's agenda, the tariff and
co-operative marketing such as is
expected to be the principal factor
in the farm relief act.

Great emphasis will be placed
on consideration of mass produc-
tion and the problems which it has
created, especially in respect to
mass merchandising and employ-
ment.

Selling Costs Go Up
Mass production goes right on
putting men out of productive in-
dustry and forcing them into the
distribution system. The theory
is that new occupations in the dis-
tribution system have been suffi-
cient to absorb the surplus labor
from the factories.

At the same time distribution
costs have increased. Mass distri-
bution hasn't kept up with mass
production. It costs about as
much to sell a pair of shoes or a
suit of clothes as it does to make
them. Some business men look
forward to the day when nearly
everything will be bought through
vending machines. They think
that, in a small way, a definite
trend in that direction has already
begun.

know if they are injurious or

I have read the
ads, too, Mrs. J.
Who hasn't? How
many hundreds of
thousands of dol-
lars have the pro-
ducers of these
baths made for
themselves? And they read their
fortunes in the list of people who
are soon eating food, or else
worse. The only things you will
lose by taking them are a little per-
spiration and a good deal of money.
You are supposed to take a course
of 30 baths, at the rate of three
a week, at \$1 per bath. One dollar
is a pretty large sum to pay for a
few ounces of corn starch, borax,
baking soda, a little tartaric acid
and epsom salts, for that is what
scientific analysis by the laboratory
of the American Medical association
shows they consist of.

I cannot repeat too often that
there is nothing that can be taken
in a bath, or rubbed on the skin,
that will reduce your weight. If
there were, and it were harmless,
the real scientists would have dis-
covered it and you would know of
it immediately. And there would be
no secret formulas, for their sci-
entists give their discoveries to the
world. Suppose Banting, for in-
stance, had commercialized his dis-
covery of insulin—the price would
be prohibitive, and thousands of di-
abetic would die who now can live.

In 1907, when the people of the plains gathered for a railway celebration at Plainview, Colonel Slaughter declared that "the day is not far off when the great fertile plains of Texas will become the bread-basket of the Southwest." Occurrences since that day have borne out his prediction.

At the time of his death in 1919 Colonel Slaughter owned nearly 1,000,000 acres of land and his headquarters in Cochran county remain as one of the beauty spots of the cow country. The headquarters still stands on the 17,900 acres to be placed on the market this fall, a 12 room Spanish style house, flanked by a court in which reside the Oscar Sumner family at the present time. Mr. Sumner has been ranching there on the Slaughter land for the past several years.

Wind swept across the state in a broad band and almost everywhere the sand and dust which it carried with it were dense enough to constitute a serious traffic menace. A hangar was unroofed and an airplane damaged by a falling girder at Midland. Ballinger, Wichita Falls, Corsican, Austin, Waco, Houston and many other cities as widely scattered felt the force of the wind and suffered slight damage.

In Dallas the gale reached a velocity of 68 miles an hour and in the business district gravel from tarred roofs fell like hail in spots. Windows were broken in several stores and some damage was done to trees. A sheet from garage roof which blew into a nest of high tension wires held up street car traffic for some time in the business district.

Little could be learned of damage which the storm did in east Texas. Reports from near the Arkansas line said that at least two houses had been demolished. It was here that the negroes were injured. Many isolated communities in the path of the wind had not been heard from early today and there was a possibility that more serious damage had occurred.

STORMS PLAY ABOUT ARKANSAS BORDER

TEXARKANA, Ark., May 2 (AP)—A series of storms which jumped about the Texas-Arkansas line late yesterday and early today crippled communication and plunged several towns into darkness when power lines were broken.

High winds swept Atlanta, Texas, most of the night, hurling trees through telephone wires. A repair crew was at work today north of Texarkana of transmission lines of the Southwestern Gas and Electric company, which were broken at the

REVOLT FLOP TOLD PUBLIC

NEWS WAS WITHHELD FOR SEVERAL DAYS IN MEXICO CITY

(By Associated Press)

MEXICO CITY, May 2.—The Mexican public learned today for the first time of the final collapse of the revolutionary movement in Sonora and imminent complete pacification of Northern Mexico. Newspapers were suspended and no official bulletins issued yesterday. May-Day, but bulletins posted at Chapultepec today told of surrenders of rebel forces in the north, occupation of Nogales and Agua Prieta, and flight into the United States of the principal rebel leaders. The bulletins also carried announcement of a battle at Asogueros on the Sonora border, which lasted throughout Monday, April 29, and was probably the last encounter of the revolution. General "Max"'s vanguard, deploying head of the main army after passing through Pulpito Canyon, ran to a rebel ambush, arranged by the insurgent General Caraveo, Cucupic and Jacinto Prieto.

The rebels were able to battle through the day until General Almazan arrived at nightfall with reinforcements.

Individualism Held Oil Industry Bane

DALLAS, May 2 (AP)—The petroleum industry has suffered from an acute case of individualism, according to Mark Requa, San Francisco engineer and the sole honorary member of the American Petroleum Institute. He attended an informal meeting in Dallas, yesterday of a group of oil men.

"Everyone has done about as he pleased or has been financially able," Requa said. "There has been little regard for cooperation, and frenzied efforts have been made to produce and sell, regardless of requirements of the market."

Tsung-Chang Flees To Refuge In Japan

HAIRIEU, China, May 2 (AP)—The fallen war lord Chang Tsung-Chang, prevented from landing here by Japanese authorities, today completed arrangements to sail tomorrow for Moji, Japan, where he has been offered a refuge and where his Dairen, wives and concubines will join him as soon as he has found quarters for them.

Chang arrived at Dairen aboard the junk on which he had made his escape from Shantung province after his defeat by the Nationalist army under the surveillance of two Japanese warships.

COTTON EXPORTS DROP

NEW ORLEANS, May 2 (AP)—A decline of cotton exports from the United States during April under the same month of last year was noted by Secretary Hester of the New Orleans cotton exchange in his monthly statement, issued today.

Little hope is held for the recovery of Mrs. E. P. Earhart, 80-year-old South Plains pioneer, who has been critically ill for several days at her home, 1016 Avenue O. A large number of relatives have gathered at her bedside.

D. N. Leaverton, Lubbock city commissioner, left early today for Grapeland, where he will attend the funeral services for his brother, T. H. Leaverton, who died there last night.
