NEMATODES SERIOUS COTTON PEST

Nematodes damage cotton, more or less, in all areas of Texas. The small microscopic worms are more damaging in sandy or loam type soils where water is a limiting factor.

Nematode injury is often overlooked or mistakenly diagnosed as drought damage and poor soil. Damage may vary from slight to as much as 30 percent of the crop.

The root knot nematodes are the most damaging and most easily recognized. Damage by these nematodes result in knots or galls being formed on the roots. Young cotton seedlings can be attacked by the parasites causing them to die or be weakened.

In some areas nematodes damage the roots and provide a gateway for the fusarium wilt fungus to enter. The fusarium wilt disease once thought of as only an East Texas disease has been moving west in recent years. Specimens have been received at College Station from Wichita Falls, O'Brien and Muleshoe areas.

Other nematodes that cause damage are the dagger, stubby root and styllet nematodes. The root lesion, lance and true spiral nematodes are suspected as causing damage. Special soil and root samples can be checked in the Plant Disease Diagnostic Laboratory at College Station in order to determine kind and number of nematodes.

Nematodes are controlled by certain cultural practices or the use of certain chemicals prior to planting. Contact your extension agent for additional information and ask for a copy of MP-356, "Plant Nematodes - Their Identification and Control."

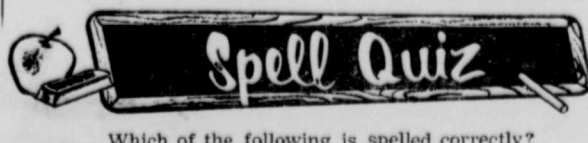

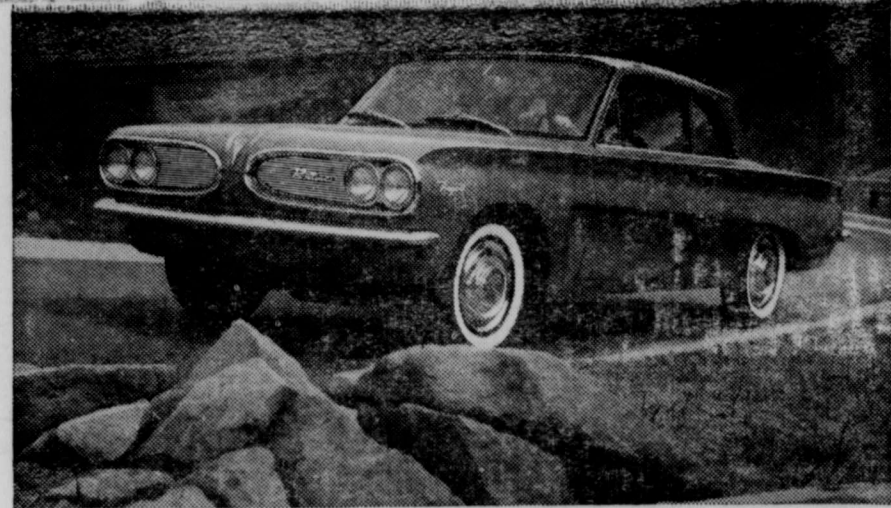

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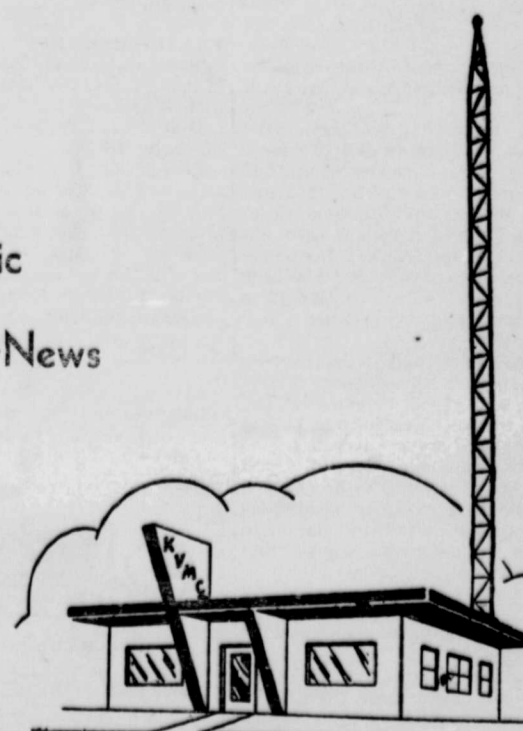

Texas fishing clubs are gaining in popularity in Texas. Seldom does a day pass without some new fishing club being formed in the Lone Star state. Being a "joiner" we're highly in favor of them. It's our contention that fellowship alone is worth the dues of any organization, not to mention the tips that one receives from fellow members.

Speaking of TIPS—the latest organization we have become affiliated with is known as TIPS. Spelled out it's Texas Invertebrate Piscatorial Sportsmen. Except for yours truly it is composed of real top-flight fishermen—every one of them.

Head man is Billy Ditch, Austin. Evinrude dealer. Billy earned quite a reputation, from the Gulf Coast to the Red River and from Caddo Lake to the Rio Grande, for his bass catching abilities.

Second in command is Jim Roddie, Austin insurance man. If you think he's not good then just consider the fact that he has caught three eight pound black bass with jig and reel during the past twelve months. That's something few fishermen do once in a lifetime. In fact just one eight pound catch in a lifetime would thrill this scribe.

But I'm getting off the track. What I want to do is tell you about this bass fishing club that they call TIPS—namely Texas Invertebrate Piscatorial Sportsmen.

Top man is not called president. He's referred to as Large Mouth.

Second in command is Small Mouth.

Other officers are a treasurer, better known as the Hook, and a secretary who is referred to as the line.

TIPS' sergeant-at-arms is designated as—The Sinker.

All other members are Vice Presidents!

So if you want to be vice president of something, organize a fishing club like TIPS. In the case of TIPS it's the lowest office you can hold.

Kinda clever club eh? But you haven't heard everything.

Five bucks gets you into the club. That's the application fee. But it takes even less to get you out. Members meet evenings, every other Wednesday. Miss three straight months of meetings, without an "excuse" and you're no longer a TIPSer.

And by the way that's one of the main purposes of the organization—passing on your fishing tips to fellow members.

Dues? There are none. And there won't be any until and unless the club needs more money.

What do they do besides meet and take shop or hear specialists discuss bass habits, and bass catching methods? They hold contests!

With no dues income, how do

they purchase prizes to award to the top fisherman and to the top fishing teams? They charge an entrance fee in each fishing contest. Such events are held every other month and on a different lake each time.

Entry fee is determined largely by the number who sign in. They just divide the cost of the plaques by the number of entrants. Works out fine! If a fellow signs up to fish and fails to show, he sacrifices his entry fee. If he doesn't sign up by a predetermined date he can't enter. It's that simple.

Like to know something about the constitution and by-laws of TIPS? Well, the PREAMBLE reads like this:

"We, the bass fishermen of Austin, Texas, in order to form a more perfect fishing club, establish fellowship, ensure conversation, provide a means of collaboration, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of bass fishing to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the Texas Invertebrate Piscatorial Sportsmen."

Sounds slightly familiar, doesn't it?

Membership in the club is limited. Each charter member is permitted to sponsor another member; then each new member sponsors another new member until the maximum of 40 is reached.

Every candidate must be approved by the membership committee, then endorsed by the organization as a whole, at an official meeting of the group. When the full quota of members is reached no new members may be added until a regular member drops out or is dropped for non-payment of dues.

As a bass fisherman you will be interested in the fact that each member of TIPS is supplied with a record book in which he lists his catch. The record page calls not only for the size of the bass—its length in their reports and each is exactly where it was caught, on what specific lake, at what depth, and on what lure. Also requested is information as to the time of day, weather conditions, wind conditions, and the temperature of the water.

At each meeting of the organization the fishermen turn in their reports and each is given a badge by the secretary to sew onto his fishing jacket or hat. This badge is merely a number which designates the size of the fish caught. It's a new method of "lettering in sports."

Anyway it's a different club, to say the least, and their meetings bring forth dozens of good ideas for fishermen during every season.

1960 WOOL INCENTIVE PAYMENT SET AT 47.6%
Shorn wool payments for the 1960 marketing year will amount to 47.6% of the dollar returns each producer received from the sale of shorn wool during the year, the Department of Agriculture has announced.

Orrion J. (Jack) Linam, Chairman of the Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, points out that this is the percentage necessary to bring average wool prices up to the previously announced incentive level of 62 cents per pound under the natural wool program. It means that the producer will receive an incentive payment of \$47.60 for every \$100 received from the sale of shorn wool during the wool marketing year ended March 31, 1961.

The payment rate on sales of lambs that have never been shorn to compensate for the wool on them will be 80 cents per hundredweight of live animal sold. This payment is based on the shorn wool payment and is designed to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing.

No payments will be made on mohair sold during the 1960 marketing year since the average

mohair price of 89.7 cents per pound received by producers was above the mohair support price of 70 cents per pound.

According to the Chairman, County ASCS offices will begin making payments soon after July 1. Applications for payment had to be filed by April 30 (May 1 this year because April 30 was on a Sunday.) The payments will be made on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed from April 1, 1960, through March 31, 1961.

The incentive level for shorn wool for the current 1961 marketing year has also been announced at 62 cents per pound, the same as for each of the preceding years of the program. Program regulations continue the same as for earlier years.

Payments were mailed to Mitchell County producers under this program on July 5th.
