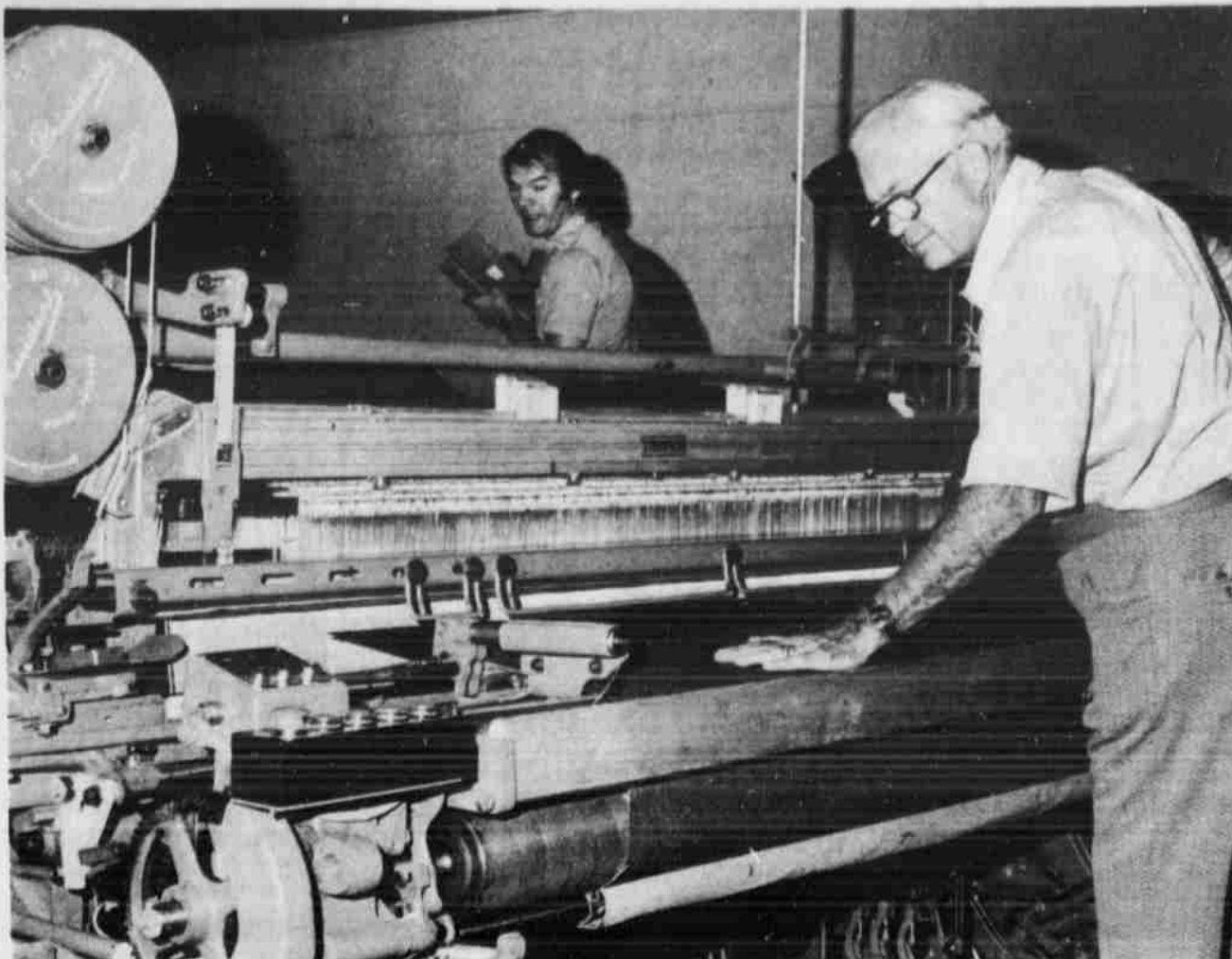




RS at the American Cotton Growers' Textile produced Littlefield's first yard of blue cotton Friday afternoon. The photo to the left shows

The budget for next year is based on an assessed value of \$46,000,000 with that figure based on approximately 25 percent of the true or market value of the property assessed. The proposed county tax levy is 85 cents on each \$100 of evaluation, the same tax levy now in effect.

The 1975 budget gives elected officials a 10 percent raise in salary and reflects a \$25 to \$50 a month raise for most court house employees.

Jury Gives Man 15 Years On Aggravated Robbery Charge

A jury found Alfred Johnson Jr. guilty of an aggravated robbery charge here Wednesday in district court and sentenced him to 15 years in the Texas Department of Correction.

Leroy Johnson was charged in the same incident with Johnson when the pair committed aggravated robbery against Melvin and Mary Campbell. Johnson waived trial by jury and entered a guilty plea before District Judge Pat Boone Jr. Monday. He was found guilty and given a term of 10 years.

A jury panel of nine women and three men heard the case Tuesday. Arguments to the jury were completed Wednesday morning and jurors announced the guilty verdict at 1:20 p.m. Jurors set the punishment and pronounced the 15-year sentence shortly after 3 p.m.

Kain Perry Patterson waived a jury trial on a forgery charge and entered a guilty plea before Judge Boone. He was found guilty and given four years, probated.

James Junior Adams waived a jury trial and entered a guilty plea to a charge of forgery. He was found guilty and given two years, probated.

Cowen Memorial Is Awarded To Miss Debbie Birkelbach

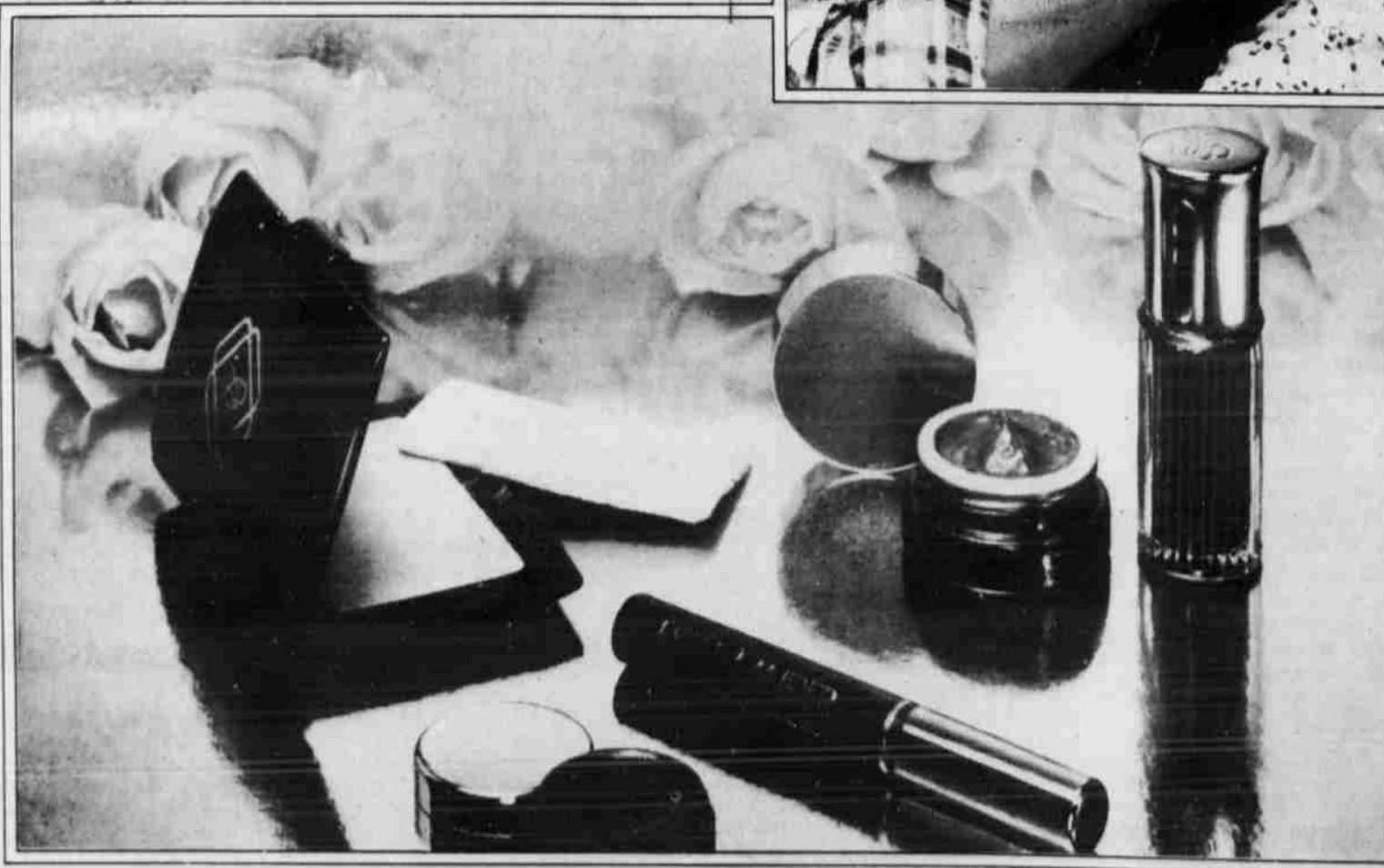

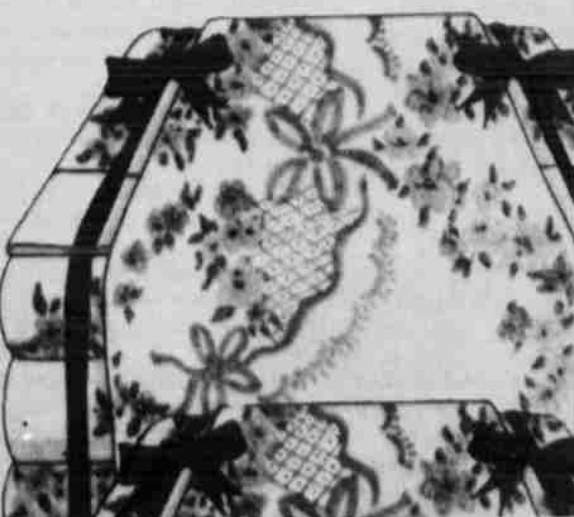

Mr. and Mrs. W. Don Bell and family, of Littlefield were recent guests at Rosedown Plantation and Gardens in St. Francisville, La. Rosedown is a restored plantation empire in the Pelicanas, the region made famous by the Artist-Naturalist John James Audubon, who painted more than 30 of his famous birdlife studies more than a century ago.

Their visit coincided with the peak bloom of roses, allamanda and ancient crape myrtle.

Rosedown was originally built in 1835 by a wealthy young planter for his bride at a time when cotton plantations along the Mississippi were creating the country's greatest fortunes.

As a well-to-do plantation owner, young Daniel Turnbull had the means and the taste to create a home of impeccable beauty. Martha Turnbull, who had an eye for both design and beauty, devoted nearly sixty years to developing Rosedown

Plantation Gardens. By the mid-1800's these magnificent 17th century French landscape style gardens were the showplace of the Mississippi.

Rosedown, after years of neglect in the wake of the Civil War, was rediscovered in 1956 by Mrs. Milton Underwood of Houston, Texas, and restored to its original grandeur. Today, this lavish plantation house and gardens are once again the showplace of the Mississippi. The grounds contain many rare shrubs and trees, some almost a century and a half old, among them being unusual types of camellias, the hip gardenia, and specimens of the true cypress and redwood families.

Rosedown House, with many of its auxiliary buildings still intact, is one of America's most authentic restorations and will stand forever as a lavish museum of the romantic Old South at the height of its glory.

year history. Plains Cooperative Association has implemented innovative cotton programs for its members in Texas and but nothing has excited patrons as has the TELCOT system. It is a major advance in cotton marketing and offers a number of advantages to our members and to those merchants who provide a market for their cotton," said Dan Davis, general manager. Davis is vice president, and headed the staff since the marketing season, and continually receive

When a producer's cotton has been sold, the cotton will be invoiced by PCCA in the same manner as in the past. The association will retain the deferred payment program for members who prefer it and the loan advance program option will be maintained and improved.

Merchants will pay a service charge of \$2.50 per bale for each bale purchased—\$1 of the charge will go to the local gins and \$1.50 will go to PCCA to cover costs of the service. The producer will pay the same costs as under PCCA's previous system with no additional charge.

Davis lists some of the advantages of TELCOT:

Gins, producers and merchants will have a constant flow of current market information each day on which to base marketing decisions.

The system will create a centralized electronic market for PCCA members' cotton.

There will be competitive bidding by merchants in a unique, rapid process using the "sealed bid" principle; and

The producer will make the decision on when to offer his cotton for sale.

Merchants will study cotton lists offered and will make their bids, within a short period of time, on that cotton offered which meets their requirements.

To make a bid, a merchant simply keys his "sealed" bid on his own private CRT unit.

Since each outside unit is on a separate circuit when linked to the PCCA computer, no merchant will know what his competitor has bid. In the event of a tie bid, the computer will award the cotton to the first bidder at the top price.

A key feature of the bidding system, Davis explains, is the participation of PCCA which will bid "in the blind" on the lists of cotton. The computer will award the cotton to the merchant or the association on the basis of price alone.

Dr. I.T. Shotwell Attends Meeting

Dr. I. T. Shotwell Jr. attended the 27th Annual Scientific Assembly of the American Academy of Family Physicians in Chicago. The medical meeting began Oct. 6 and continued through Oct. 9.

More than 3,500 family doctors participated in this once-a-year continuing education conclave.

Dr. Shotwell, who is a member of the Academy, heard 18 nationally-known speakers discuss up-to-the-minute health care topics. He also had an opportunity to attend clinical seminars on 38 different topics

Subjects covered in this four-day scientific session are of immediate interest to family doctors—both in their everyday practices and in their continual endeavors to keep abreast of the latest advances in medicine.

This year, topics include surgical procedures in the office, caring for a family's inherited disease, obesity, office gynecology, abdominal pain in children, managing the difficult diabetic, and medical ethics.

The Academy, headquartered in Kansas City, is the nation's second largest medical association. It was the pioneer among medical organizations in requiring its members to take continuing education. Its 37,000 members must complete 150

hours of mandatory continuing study every three years.

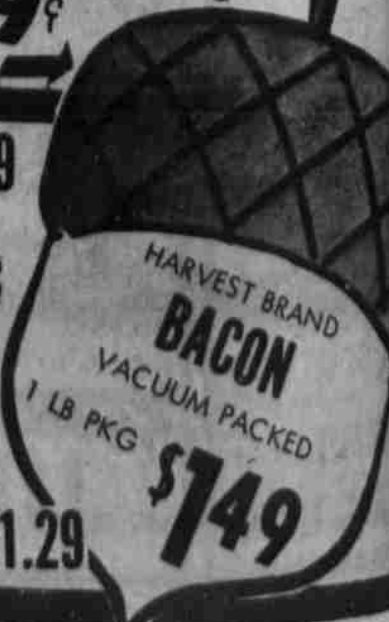

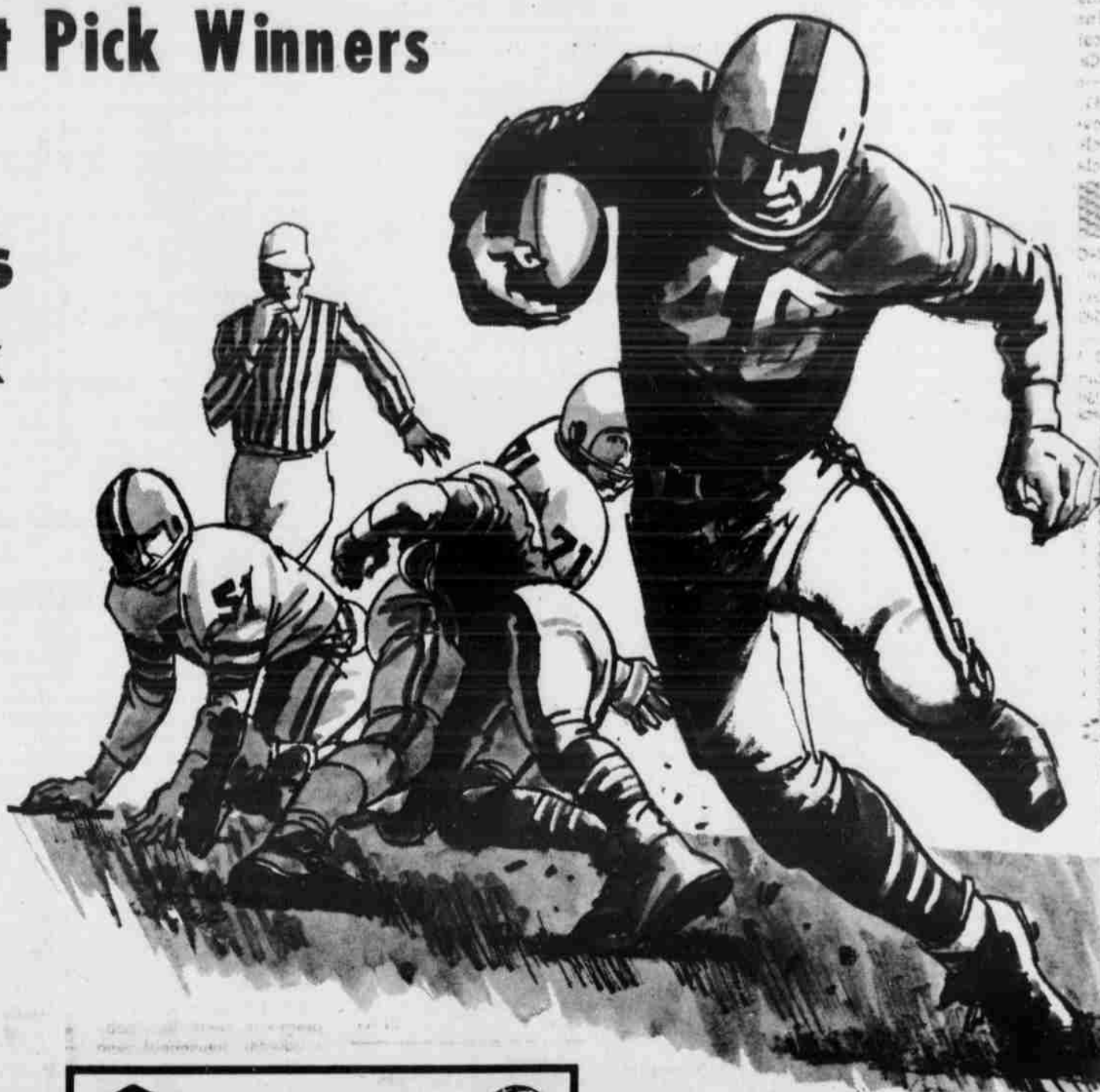

Football Contest

Turner Leads 'Cats To 5th Victory

Senior Bill Turner led the Littlefield Wildcats to their fifth victory of the season Friday night as he scored three touchdowns and kicked three extra points as the 'Cats defeated the Roosevelt Eagles in an exciting game, 27-25.

For the night, Turner rushed for 117 yards, caught passes for 63 yards for 180 yards total offense and punted 5 times for an impressive 43-yard-per-kick average.

Quarterback Ronald Parmer hit on four passes for 81 net yards and hit a crucial pass to Danny Martinez in the closing minutes to set up Turner's third touchdown.

The 'Cats started off the game as if to duplicate last year's 32-0 victory by the Eagles only in

reverse as they raced to 21 points in the first half and then rallied to come from behind to cop the victory.

FIRST QUARTER
The hometown Roosevelt Eagles took the opening kickoff and began operation on their own 23.

A penalty against the Eagles set the tempo for the first series as the Eagles were forced to punt after three plays netted only three yards.

Littlefield started their initial drive near midfield and on Littlefield's second play, quarterback Ronald Parmer hit Bill Turner on a pass to the Eagle 35.

Two plays later, Parmer again threw a strike to Turner to the 15-yard line. Runs by

Reginald Payton and Turner gained five yards and then a Parmer pass to Jay Lee was incomplete but Roosevelt was called for interference and the 'Cats were in scoring position at the one.

On the first play following the pass, Turner bulled over for the score and then kicked the extra point to set the 'Cats ahead 7-0 with 8:11 left in the first quarter.

Roosevelt moved the ball with authority on their second drive but were again forced to punt. With the punt, the 'Cats began their drive on their own 30.

Parmer passed to Rick Hopping for five yards on their first play and then Parmer kept the middle for four yards to set up a third and one situation. Hopping then picked

up the first on a two-yard gain and the 'Cats were moving again with 3:20 left in the first quarter.

And move they did as Turner broke through the Roosevelt secondary enroute to his second TD of the night and subsequent point after touchdown kick to put the 'Cats ahead, 14-0 in the closing minutes of the first quarter.

Following the 'Cat touchdown, Roosevelt moved into Littlefield territory but could go no further as the 'Cat defense stiffened. And Roosevelt again had to punt.

Littlefield ran one play and the first quarter ended.

SECOND QUARTER

A fine run by Payton moved the ball up to the 36 of the 'Cats. One play later Parmer again sharpened his passing attack as he hit Blake Wood to the 36 of Roosevelt.

Four plays later, Turner scooted around left end to the Eagle one-yard line and then Reginald Payton muscled over for the score. Turner kicked the extra point and it was 21-6.

The two teams exchanged punts before Roosevelt marched for their first touchdown with 1:21 left to make the score at halftime, 21-6 in favor of the 'Cats.

THIRD QUARTER

Littlefield took the opening kickoff following the halftime and on the first play, Payton took the handoff from Parmer and was hit hard and fumbled and the hometown Eagles were in good field position as they recovered the 'Cat fumble.

Three plays against the tough 'Cat defense found the Eagles still six yards short of the first-down mark and on fourth down, a pass try was incomplete and the Wildcats had the ball for the second time in the half.

Littlefield was unable to move also and the 'Cats were forced to punt. Roosevelt took over on their own 35.

The Eagles began their best drive of the night as they advanced downfield to eat up yardage and the clock. The Eagles drove down to the 'Cat seven-yard line and they were faced with a fourth and one situation.

The Eagles were successful against the 'Cat goal line defense and they had a first and goal to go situation. Three plays later the Eagles were no closer, but on the fourth down play, the Eagles went over for the touchdown to make the score 21-12.

The two point conversion attempt was no good and the

'Cats maintained their 9 point lead.

Following the Eagle touchdown, the 'Cats took over on their own 29. A running play and two passes gained less than what was needed and again Turner was forced to punt.

FOURTH QUARTER

The 'Cat defense toughened and it was Roosevelt's time to punt.

Following the boot, the 'Cats had the ball on their own 28. Two running plays gained nothing and then Parmer was hit hard as he was trying to pass and the ball was jarred loose and the Eagles recovered on the Wildcats' 12-yard line.

Three plays later the Eagles were in the 'Cat end zone for their third touchdown to make the score 21-18 with 8:32 left to play.

A pass was attempted for the two points but it was knocked down by Steve Cruz and the 'Cats maintained their lead.

Littlefield took the ensuing kickoff in good position on their own 35. A run by Hopping moved the ball to the 39 and then Turner broke through to the Eagle 45 but a clipping penalty nullified the run.

The 'Cats were unable to move following the penalty but Turner boomed a 69 yard punt and Roosevelt took over on their own 20.

The Eagles ran three plays and on the punt, Littlefield's Turner fumbled the ball at mid-

field and Roosevelt took over in good field position.

The Eagles promptly moved downfield and with 3:05 left in the game, the hometown had a first and goal situation at the Littlefield five-yard line.

The running plays netted only one yard against that tough 'Cat defense and with 1:33 left on the clock, Roosevelt again tried the 'Cat defense. A pass was complete in the end zone for the go-ahead touchdown for Roosevelt and the extra point was good and Roosevelt lead for the first time, 25-21.

Rudy Ayala returned the kickoff to the Roosevelt 48-yard line with 1:28 left.

On the first play, Parmer hit Danny Martinez with a pass that carried to the Roosevelt 2-yard line before Turner scored his third touchdown of the night to put the 'Cats ahead 27-25 with 45 seconds left to play.

On the first play following the kickoff though, Roosevelt moved via the pass route to the 'Cat 37-yard line. A keeper by the quarterback advanced the ball to the Littlefield 32 with 30 seconds left on the scoreboard.

Hopping then dropped the quarterback for a loss and under a heavy pass rush, Roosevelt threw the ball up for grabs and Littlefield's Jimmy Durham intercepted on the 26.

Parmer then ran one play with three seconds remaining and Littlefield claimed its fifth victory of the season, 27-25.

This week, the 'Cats travel to Dimmitt to open district play.
