

EVENTS OF EVERYWHERE.

Congressman Blinger Hermann has been indicted under charge of destroying public records.

The finest collection of tiger skins ever exhibited will form part of Blam's display at the Lewis and Clark Fair.

There were 120 births and fifty-one deaths in Lamar county during February, according to reports on file in the county clerk's office.

The National Letter Carrier's Association will hold a week's convention at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, beginning September 8.

Representative Kehoe of Kentucky introduced a concurrent resolution Thursday to annex the Republic of Panama to the United States.

Norwegian singing societies will have a special day at the Lewis and Clark Centennial for a reunion of members and contest for prizes.

The Southern Bank and Trust Company of Dallas has granted a permit to build a \$10,000 brick building adjoining the Wilson building on the west.

Fred Degamere, aged 25 years, was drowned in Black Bear Creek in the Omege Nation, by the ice breaking under his horse which he was riding.

A strong effort is to be made by Dallas to capture the next State meeting of the members of the Woodman of the World, who are to meet in annual session in Waco on March 14.

Jim Polson, aged 90 years, resident of the Choctaw nation, was down at Denison Wednesday. Polson came down from Caddo, I. T., on a train, the first time that he was ever on a train.

Charley Ballard, eight years old, fell in the railroad reservoir at Sherman Monday morning and was drowned. He was a son of A. T. Ballard and was visiting a friend at the time of his death.

There is much speculation at Oklahoma City over the purchase in this city of two blocks by the Frisco railroad involving an expenditure of \$40,000. It is believed the site will be used for the proposed union depot, to cost \$150,000.

A man named Grim, aged about 65 years, was struck by a Frisco local freight train at Randolph, I. T., and died four hours later from the effects of his injuries. He had in his pocket a ticket from Denison to Mill Creek.

Bedrick Brinkley, a negro, in jail at Waco on a forgery charge, died there. He has not been well for two or three weeks, but had two congestive chills recently and these appeared to sap his vitality.

Rural Mail Carrier Carter of Altus, Ok., hitched a wild broncho to a sukey for the purpose of breaking it, when the vehicle was overturned, catching the man's leg in a wheel. The leg was severed from the body and Carter died in great agony.

The Northern Pacific Railway Company announces that it will immediately begin the construction of eight six-story buildings, each of them occupying half a block, all to be erected upon the railroad's property holdings in the wholesale district of Seattle, and at an aggregate cost of \$3,000,000.

The Order of Railway Conductors will hold its biennial session in the Lewis and Clark Exposition on May 9. There were 110 births in Hunt County during the month of February and 35 deaths. There were 28 marriage licenses issued during the month.

The Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows, including the Grand Encampment of Patriarchs Militant, and the Rebekah assembly of the Indian Territory, convenes at Chickasha on April 10th, and will continue in session for five days.

Mrs. N. K. Wilson has entered suit in the Federal Court at Sherman against the Frisco for damages in the sum of \$40,000, alleging that the death of her husband, W. B. Wilson, was caused from injuries received while working for the defendant.

Immigration statistics show more than 130 per cent increase of new comers during the month of February over the corresponding period of last year. The arrivals of the month were \$3,460, as against 25,410 in February, 1904.

With the breaking of the ice gorge in the Mississippi River and the passage of the last big floe from the St. Louis harbor it was discovered that the new Government dyke, 900 feet long and costing \$200,000, had been demolished.

The strike of the coach builders employed in Paris is assuming serious proportions. An increase in salary is demanded by the men, about 25,000 of whom are out. Automobile makers are particularly affected.

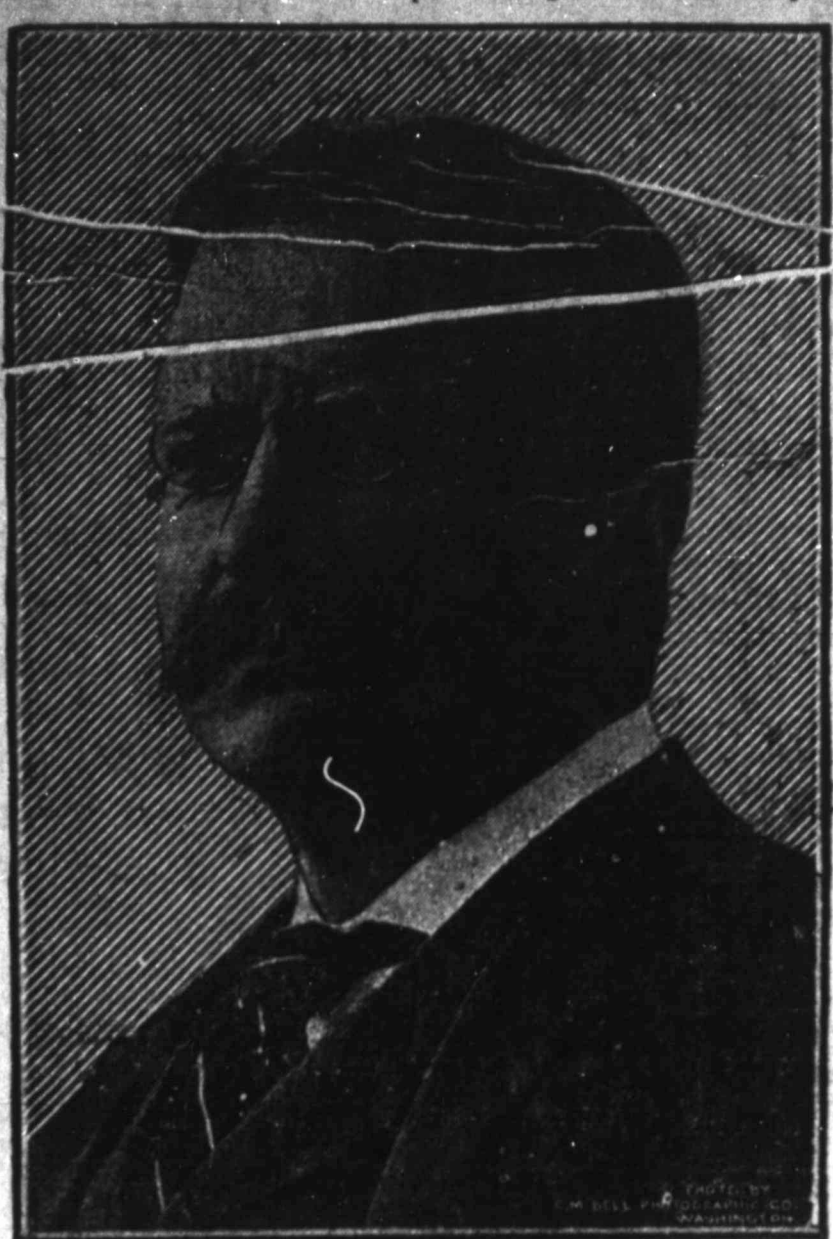
The Mexican National Sugar Refining Company, organized under the laws of New Jersey has procured papers at the City of Mexico. It is capitalized at \$1,000,000 gold, and proposes to erect a modern sugar refinery at Vera Cruz.

A vote of 21 to 19 the Brooklyn Presbytery has gone on record in favor of allowing the organization of the separate presbyteries for negroes within the bounds of presbyteries established for white persons.

President Roosevelt Takes Oath of Chief Executive

Washington, March 4.—At 12 o'clock Saturday standing bare-headed in a north wind which whipped almost from their fastenings the huge flags which hung from and adorned the main porte cochere, but with the sun shining brightly, Theodore Roosevelt took the oath of president of the United States in his own right. President by accident for nearly a full term, he now enters upon his new service under most auspicious circumstances.

On a platform elevated ten feet above the broad concrete plaza of the capitol, he stood to take the oath of office and to deliver his inaugural address. Back of him was a huge fan-shaped stand extending up to the very front of the capitol, with the massive dome surmounting it, forming a most impressive background.

GENERAL KUROPATKIN SORELY PRESSED.

March 6.—The great battle around Mukden which has now been going on desperately for a week, is yet in the balance. Its bloodiness will make it remarkable in the world's history, following are among the latest dispatches up to Monday morning:

Tokio, March 5, 2 p. m.—Field Marshal Oyama is continuing his great drives around both flanks of the Russian army. His front is now a huge bow, the base on the Shalke River, the right arm reaching a point east of Fusan and the left arm extending to a point west of Mukden. He is steadily tightening the great cord of men and steel.

Gen. Kuropatkin is striving desperately to check the advances, contesting the flank encroachments and hammering the Japanese center. The Japanese are making heavy gains of ground west of the railway and have captured great quantities of stores and other spoils. There already has been bloody fighting and heavy losses and this will be vastly increased when the masses of infantry meet.

Mukden, March 5, noon.—The rumble of battle is heard from the Russian lines.

Miner Saved a Train. Pittsburgh, Pa.: Train No. 5 on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, filled with passengers from Washington, was saved from destruction by Thomas Bala, a coal miner. Bala was on his way home when he discovered that a heavy landslide had covered the track. Rushing to a nearby switch he tore the lamp from it and flagged the train which stopped within thirty feet of the obstruction. The passengers raised a purse of \$100 for his savior.

New Santa Fe Shops. Cloburne: The contract for the erection of the Santa Fe shops, which were burned about a year ago, has been let. The plans show a most substantial structure, modern in design, 180x240 feet to inclose more room than the old buildings. The building is to be built of brick, with stone trimmings, and the foundation is to be of concrete. The building is to be topped with a heavy truss roof, of the saw-tooth variety.

Mayor is Arrested. South McAlester, I. T.: As a result of an altercation Saturday night, ex-Alderman E. C. Young was shot with a 32-caliber revolver and but for the fact that the bullet struck Young's watch chain, he would probably have been killed. As it was he got off with a severed watch chain, a bullet hole through his clothes, and a slight abrasion of the skin over the left abdomen. Mayor Keller was arrested, but gave bond.

Fete at Galveston. Galveston: Letters have been received here giving the idea that the cruiser Colorado will be ordered here in about two months to receive a silver service from the State of Colorado. It is hoped to be able to secure the cruiser Galveston here at the same time. The Galveston has just been placed in commission, and has not yet had a trial trip.

His children, John Mathis of Brenham, Lon Mathis of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Reid of Galveston and Mrs. Richardson of Shreveport were here during his illness. His wife survives him.

Territories' Farmers' Union. Shawnee, Ok.: The Territorial Convention of the Farmers' Union for Oklahoma and Indian Territories will convene here, March 21. Many delegates are being elected all over the two Territories. The meeting is looked forward to with interest by farmers and business men. It is expected that resolutions will be adopted looking to the reduction of cotton acreage and to building cotton and other produce in selling.

The Art of Drawn Work. Perillado, or drawn needlework, occupies the same place in Mexico as lace does in Brussels. The city of Matamoros is the center of its production, and large quantities of this beautiful work are exported to the United States. Women and girls are employed in the manufacture, and some of it is very expensive, for a year may be required to make a single piece. The linen or silk is placed in a frame, the threads are drawn out one way, and with a needle and the finest spool thread the design is worked. Perillado is taught in the public schools. Among the articles made are handkerchiefs, tablecloths, bedspreads and covers for chairs or lounges. The work is hard and difficult, and the earnings are an average less than a shilling a day.

Talk of Extension.
Colorado, Tex., Feb. 27.—It is
stated that within thirty days
