

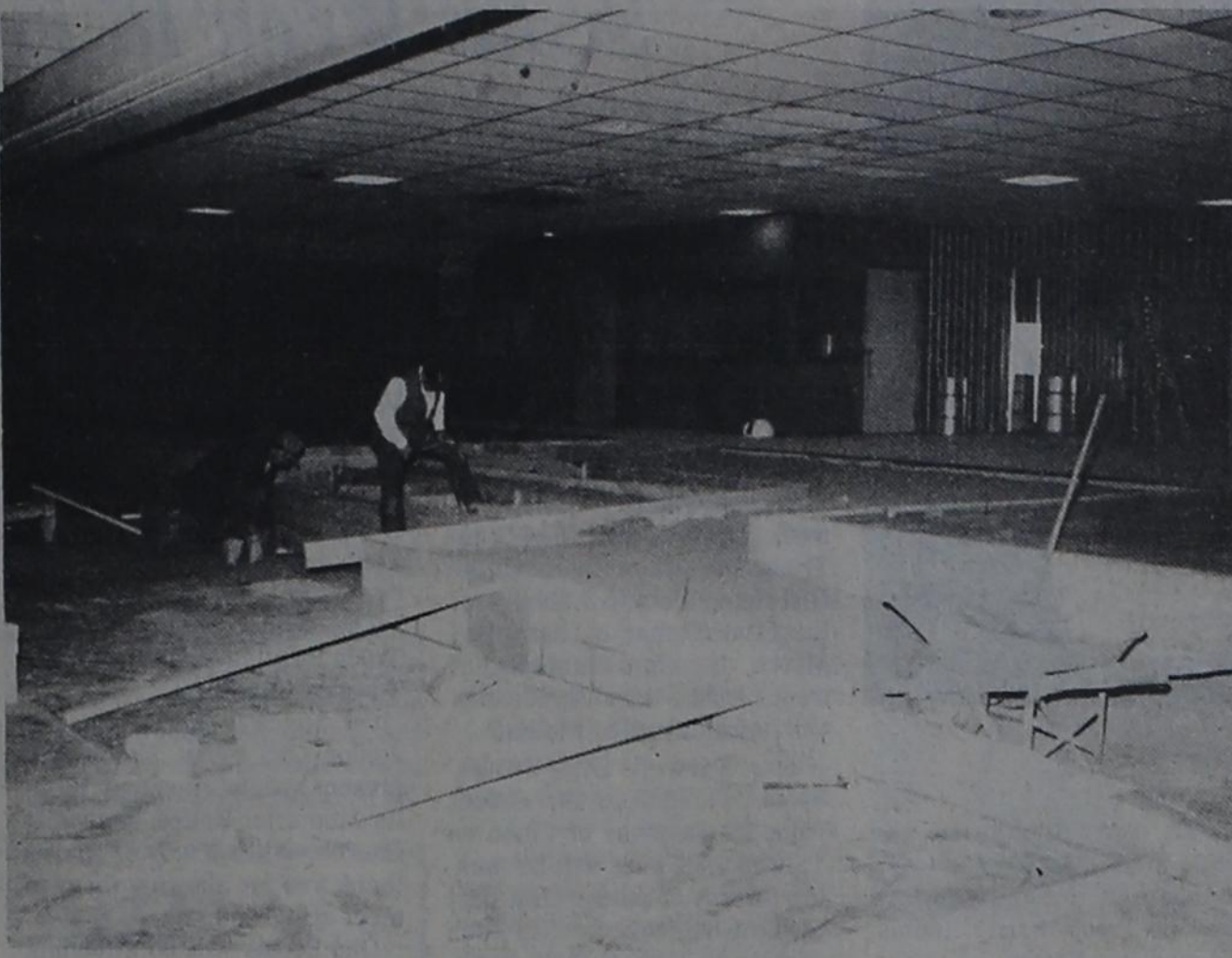

# Construction Begins On Community Center

After months of planning, hard work, and fund-raising, construction and renovation at the Farwell Community Center began Monday afternoon.

Architect for the Center project is Sam Pool of Santa Fe, and Treider Construction Company of Lazbuddie is performing the work. Pool, a Farwell native, is contributing his services for the project.

To date, the floor has been poured for the library and meeting room, and steps and ramps leading from the lobby into the main auditorium are being set. Next on the list of construction will be the erecting of the library and meeting room walls, and the renovation of the restrooms.

According to Raymond Treider, owner of Treider Construction, they have no idea how long the complete renovation will take. Right now, they just plan to keep going as long as the money lasts. They are starting with the basics, he said, and later on as the work increases, he will be taking on more workers to help with the more complicated and detailed work.

Joe Jones, committee chairman, says that the committee now has over \$42,000 to spend on the renovations, although that won't be nearly enough to carry out all of the plans.

No specific fund-raisers are scheduled for the immediate future, Jones said, but he felt sure that more would be held in

order to keep the project going. But for now, he said that they will continue with their plans until the initial funds run out, and then will proceed as more money comes in.

Jones commented that the committee is really excited about the new construction, but stressed that it will not interfere with current happenings in the Center. He does not know when the kitchen facilities would be ready for use, but said that the rest of the building is still available for use.

He feels that the Center will be something in which the community will take pride, and will be a great asset to the community as it can be used for many things such as socials,

meetings, family and class reunions, or children's parties.

Jones said that he doesn't know how far the initial money will go, and that the committee will greatly appreciate any additional donations to the project.

Treider said that he really appreciated the work and machine usage donated by persons in the community, and added that anyone who would like to donate their time or equipment in helping with the construction would be quite welcome to do so.

Thanks to a lot of hard work and generous persons, the Community Center is finally turning from a dream into a reality.

# 'Neighborhood Watch'

National Neighborhood Watch is a program sponsored by the National Sheriff's Association, and supported by local law enforcement agencies to reduce crime, and to make America's neighborhoods safer places to live and play.

The purpose of Neighborhood Watch is to make you aware of the steps you can take to make your home more secure against crime, to show how you and your neighbors can help each other protect your entire neighborhood, and to make your local law enforcement agency more effective in its fight against crime through your involvement and participation, explains Frances Kube, co-chairman of the West District in Farwell.

A Neighborhood Watch project is the logical first step for any community organizing against crime; it requires minimal effort and gets people talking to and caring about one another.

The Neighborhood Watch program was initiated in the City of Farwell in 1983 by the Farwell Development Corporation. Window stickers and metal highway signs were purchased from the

## Two Vehicle Accidents Investigated By THP Officer

Texas Highway Patrolman Craig Hunt investigated two vehicle accidents during the past week, one in Farwell and one on U.S. Highway 60 just outside of Farwell.

The first accident occurred on March 1 involving a pickup driven by Jimmy Franse of Farwell and a pickup driven by J.M. Milam, Jr. of Conway, Ark., which was pulling a horse trailer.

Franse was traveling west on U.S. 60 and reportedly was attempting to turn left onto Loop

292, and Milam allegedly was in the process of passing the Franse pickup. The Franse pickup collided with the horse trailer, according to the officer.

No injuries were reported, but both men received citations. Franse was cited for having no turning signal light, and Milam was cited for attempting to pass a vehicle within 100 feet of an intersection.

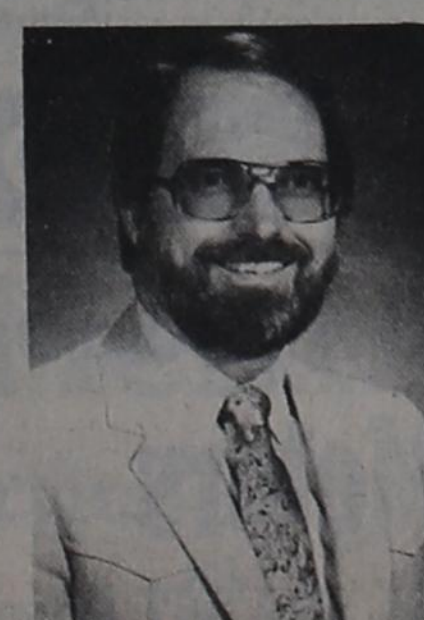
The second accident occurred March 4 at the intersection of Eighth Street and Avenue F in Farwell. According to Officer

Hunt, Geretta Hutchins of Farwell, driving a car headed east on Avenue F, and a car driven by Wesley May of Farwell, traveling north on Eighth Street, collided at the intersection. May was cited for failure to yield at a stop sign.

Geretta's brother Carl was a passenger in the Hutchins car. Both were transported to the Clovis hospital by the Farwell ambulance. Geretta was treated for minor injuries and Carl was checked for shock, but both were released.

## Ag Economist Enters Congressional Race

Lubbock-Gary D. Condra, 39, a Lubbock agricultural economist, announced today that he has filed for the Democratic nomination to the 19th Congressional District seat being vacated by Kent Hance.

Condra, who has over 10 years experience as an economist and educator, brings a life-long involvement in agriculture to the race. Condra believes that his training and experience are particularly well-suited to representing this district because agriculture is such an important sector of our economy.

He emphasized that "we must restore profit and stability to the U.S. agricultural economy; or West Texas agriculture, as we know it, will not survive." Condra also pointed out that "this is the real question which will face Congress when it addresses the 1985 Farm Bill."

Condra is also confident that his economic training and experience will enable him to more effectively represent the district in dealing with economic problems like oil and gas pricing and the budget deficit.

Condra recognizes the need to maintain a first-rate education-

al system for the youth of America. "Our young people are our most valuable resource," he said, "and we cannot maintain our greatness without a national commitment to their educational development." Condra also stressed that his experience and that of his wife, Betty, a former public school teacher, will insure that this district is well represented in the area of education.

Condra suggested that we should elect our Congressman just like we would hire any other employee. "First," he said, "look at the job description and requirements. Then look at the training and experience of the applicants."

Condra graduated from Ballinger High School and received a bachelor's degree in animal science from Texas Tech in 1969. After a tour of duty with the U.S. Army in Vietnam, he

## Deadline March 16 - -

# 1984 Farm Program Sign-Up Going Well In Parmer County

The deadline to sign up for the 1984 Farm Program is Friday, March 16, and according to Martin Chandler, executive director of the Parmer County ASCS office, the sign-up is going extremely well in this area.

"We have 948 farms signed up to date," he said, "and I feel that the program is going as well as it did last year."

Chandler also felt that the government program is receiving excellent response from producers in this area, as opposed to producers in other areas such as the Midwest who have more dryland farming.

One thing that Chandler felt attracted a large response this year was the raising of the target prices in the price support system, which he felt were raised to a "pretty nice" price.

More sign-ups are expected in the next week, Chandler said, as this area shows a lot of interest in the program, and gives a lot of participation to it.

Charles W. Mayfield, State

Executive Director of the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, states that he is optimistic that producers' participation in the 1984 farm programs will be great in Texas and throughout the Nation.

"The 1984 farm programs are a means for our producers to hold onto the price edge they gained through participation in the 1983 farm programs which included the Payment-In-Kind Program (PIK). The massive acreage reduction of 1983 cotton, feed grain, rice and wheat successfully reduced the commodity stocks that had a strangle-hold on farm profits," Mayfield said.

"Today, for the first time in years, prices overall on these commodities are good, and with continued restraint in planting, prices will hold and get better. Full income recovery is in the hands of the farmers now. They realize that speculation in growing for quick profit on an

emerging healthy market would bring about overproduction and financial disaster.

"Farmers are cognizant that our foreign markets have been drastically diminished by unfair trade practices built into agree-

ments among the European Common Market countries, and that subsidized farmers in Europe have won a fair size of markets we previously enjoyed. The purchasing power of other

# B. Kube, S. Chancy Win Councilmen Seats

In the Texico Municipal Election held Tuesday at the City Hall, Bryan Kube and Steve Chancy won the two councilmen positions that were up for election for four-year terms.

Howard H. Billingsley, who was unopposed, was re-elected as Municipal Judge for a four-year term.

In what was termed as a fair turnout of voters, 67 Texico

residents went to the polls to cast their ballots in the election, and there were four absentee votes.

Kube received 49 votes, Chancy received 48 votes, and Max Carter, who was also a candidate for the two councilmen posts, received 25 votes. Municipal Judge incumbent candidate Billingsley received 58 votes.

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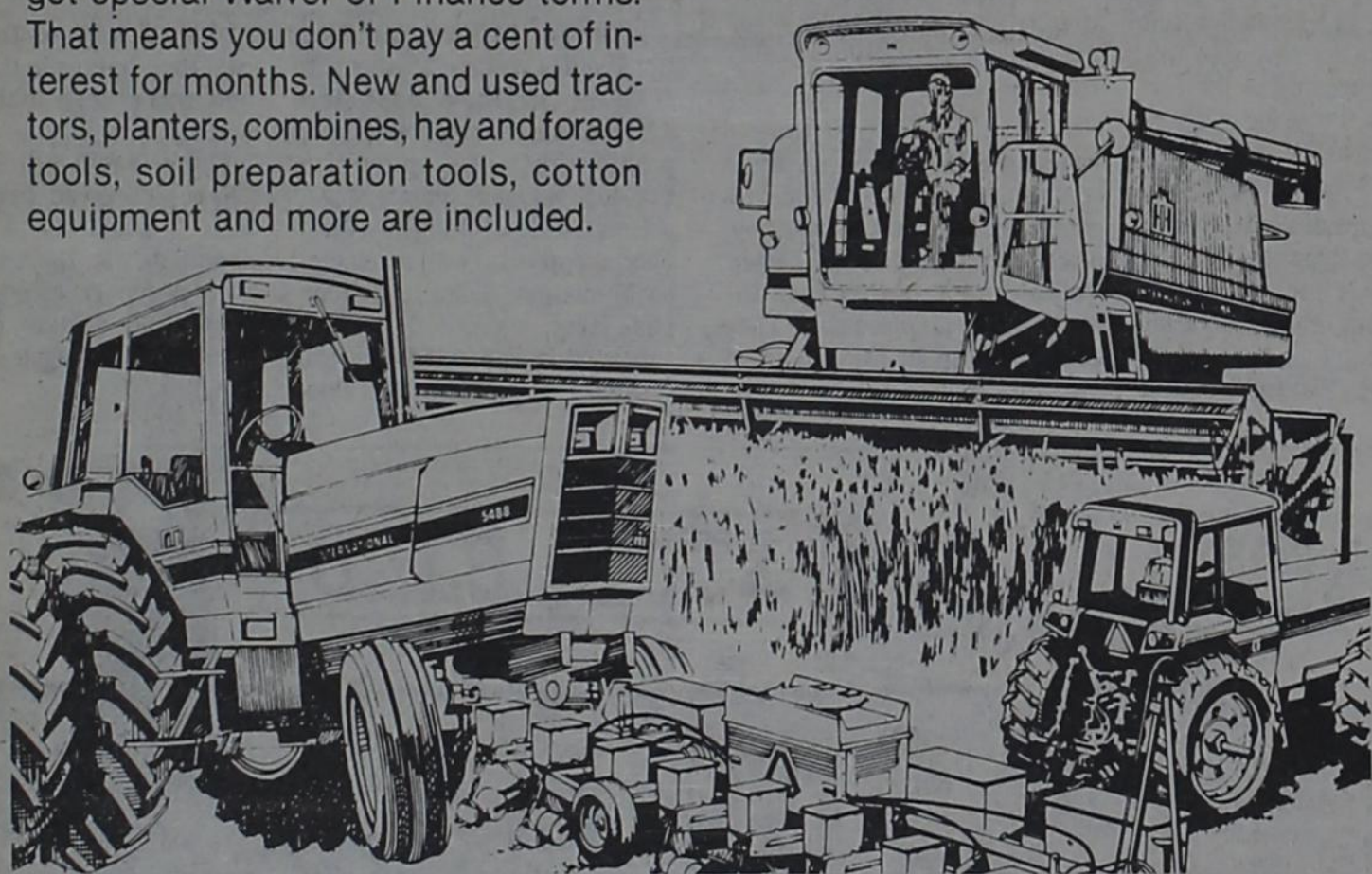
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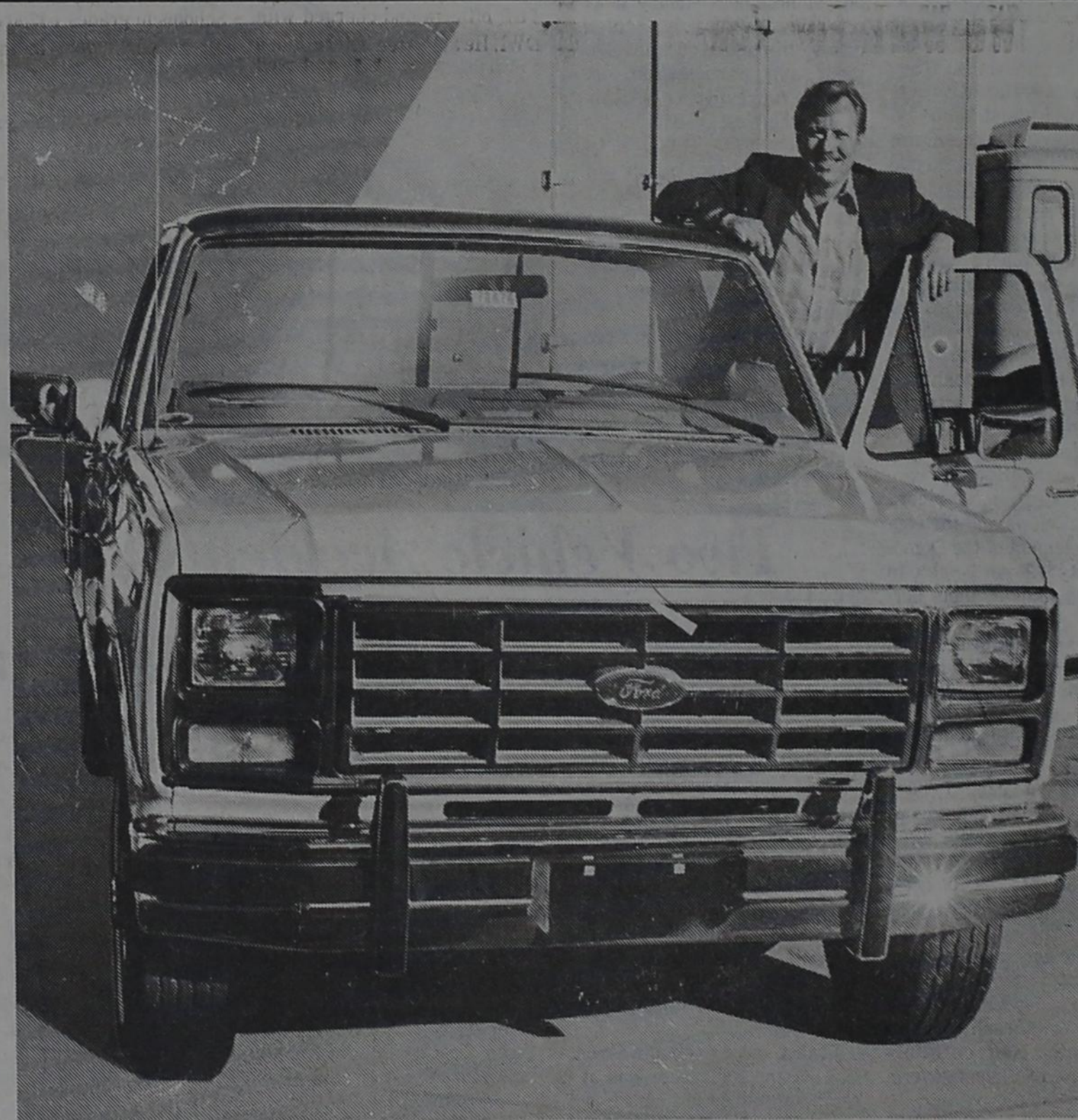

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## Farwell Chamber Discusses Banquet, Membership Drive

Farwell Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday noon at Luce's restaurant, and the main topics on the meeting agenda were the annual banquet and the group's membership drive.

The annual Chamber banquet in past years has been held in late February or March, but Chamber members felt that it should be delayed this year until the new Farwell Community Center can be used for this purpose.

At this time, it appears that the Center will be usable about the latter part of April or the first of May.

The Speaker Committee, headed by Jerry Monk, has been in contact with the office of T. Boone Pickens, head of Mesa

Petroleum in Amarillo, but an answer has not been received.

Monk has also been in contact with the Dallas Cowboys speaker bureau. The fee for a Cowboy player will run from \$400 to as much as \$6,000 for Danny White. Among those discussed in the \$2 to \$3 thousand range were Bill Bates, Ed Jones, Drew Pearson, and Randy White.

A selection is not possible at this time, as a definite date as to when the community center will be ready for a meeting of this size is not yet available.

Work on the community center is underway and a close estimate as to when it will be usable should be determined within the next several weeks, and then a speaker could be announced.

ESA Sorority will again be asked to decorate for the banquet.

Chamber Secretary I.W. Quickel reported that it was time for the yearly membership drive to begin. Dues were discussed, and a committee of Don Williams and Jim Milsap was appointed to work out a membership fee schedule.

Quickel also reported that last year, only 23 local individuals and businesses paid their dues. A list of all businesses will be prepared and present members will contact those who are not presently members, to solicit their support in the 1984-85 year.

President Tom Nichols pointed out that the Farwell Chamber will be an active participant in the new Triad Development Commission comprised of representatives of Clovis, Portales, and Texico-Farwell. Purpose of this commission is to broaden the appeal for small business and manufacturing plants to locate in the area.

## County 4-H'ers Place Well At Houston Stock Show

Thirty 4-H'ers from Parmer County and their animals were in Houston last week to compete in the 1984 Houston Stock Show and Rodeo.

Of the 30 youth who made the trip, 17 placed well with their animals in their classes.

Twenty-five 4-H'ers entered hogs in the Swine competition, and 15 of those placed well, with 14 of them making the sale. 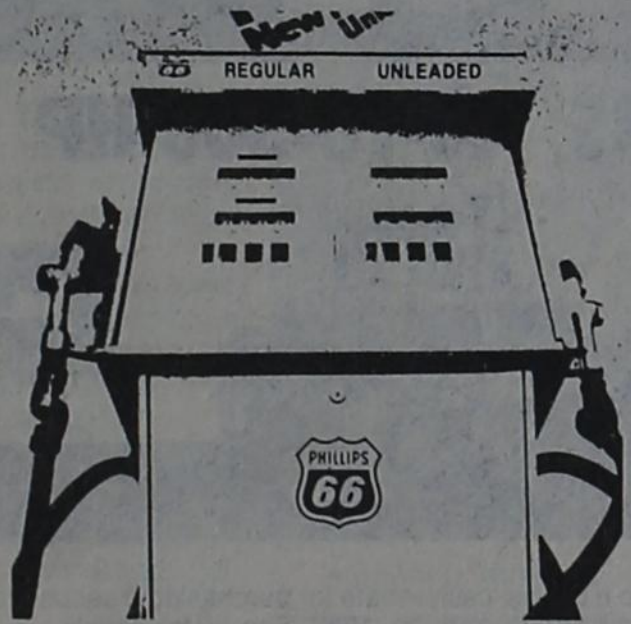
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# Wolverines Take Unexpected Route To State Playoffs

The Texico Wolverines are on their way to the state playoffs, via a little different route than expected. During the Region B Tournament at Texico last weekend, Wolverine fans were treated to two unbelievably close games involving their team.

Friday night the Wolverines squeaked by Grady 41-39 in double overtime, sending Texico into the regional finals, and on to the state playoffs.

Saturday night the Wolverines met Tatum to vie for the regional crown, and while the game was equally exciting as Friday night's, it was not nearly the crowd pleaser, because Texico lost 53-52 in the final seconds of the game.

Friday night, in a packed gymnasium, the Wolverines faced the Broncos, filled with determination. Should they defeat Grady, they would have a place in the state playoffs, for the second time ever.

The low scoring game was evenly matched throughout, each team taking the lead at different times. But near the end of the fourth quarter, Grady, with a three-point advantage, fouled Wolverine Brad Steward in the act of shooting. The two points counted, and then Brad sank the crucial free throw that tied the score 39-39 and sent them into overtime.

During the next three minutes, neither team scored, and the game went into double overtime, where Wolverine Terry Tubbs scored the winning basket for Texico.

Leading scorer for the Wolverines was Kevin West with 14 points, followed by Brad Steward and Terry Tubbs with 11 each. Doug Thornton and Regan Williams each added 2.

Brad Steward was top rebounder with 12.

The Wolverines hit for only 28 percent of their field goal attempts, and hit 50 percent of

their free throws. Grady out-rebounded Texico, 35 to 31.

About the Wolverines' close win, Coach Scott Parker said, "We didn't shoot well at all. We didn't rebound well either. Grady got in a lot of second shots. Overall, though, we really did play pretty good ball. At the end of the game, the kids were really hustling and playing hard. That's what really counts."

Saturday night, again in front of a packed gymnasium, the Wolverines faced the Tatum Coyotes, for the fifth time this year, to play for the regional crown. The game was push and shove throughout the entire four quarters right down to the wire, when Tatum scored two points in the final few seconds of the game, to win it 53-52.

The lead seasawed back and forth right up until the end. With 11 seconds left on the clock, and the Wolverines trailing 51-50, Terry Tubbs sank a basket, to give the Green and White the lead, and seemingly the championship. But Tatum was not ready to be counted out, and quickly took the ball down court, and sank another basket to take the lead 53-52.

With two seconds to go, the Wolverines called time out. Kevin West threw the ball the length of the court to Brad Steward who went up for two, but the shot didn't go in. As the buzzer sounded, teammate Terry Tubbs valiantly tried to tip it in, but to no avail. Tatum had won the regional championship, 53-52.

Leading scorer for the Wolverines was Terry Tubbs with 19 points, followed by Brad Steward with 15, Kevin West 10, Joe Steward 6, and Regan Williams 2.

Leading rebounder was Terry Tubbs with 12.

The Wolverines made only 34 percent of their field goal attempts, but hit 60 percent of

their free throws, and they out-rebounded Tatum, 35-31.

"This was a super game for the crowd," said Coach Parker. "We weren't really disappointed, however, because it worked out that we're playing where we wanted to. We really had to play hard, and I think that it will carry over into the state tournament. We played an overall good game, and again, we just missed too many shots."

"We would like to thank everyone who supported us from all over the area. Especially, we thank Mrs. Duns-worth, Mrs. Aragon, Debra Autrey and the cheerleaders for all the signs they made."

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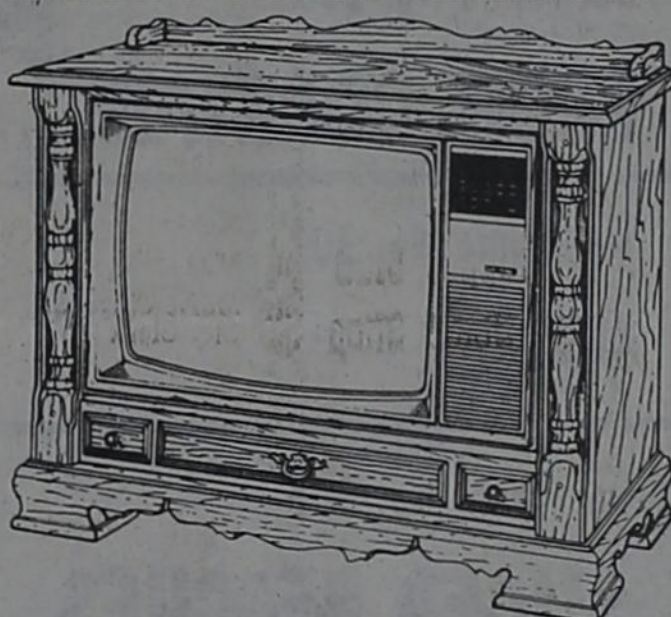
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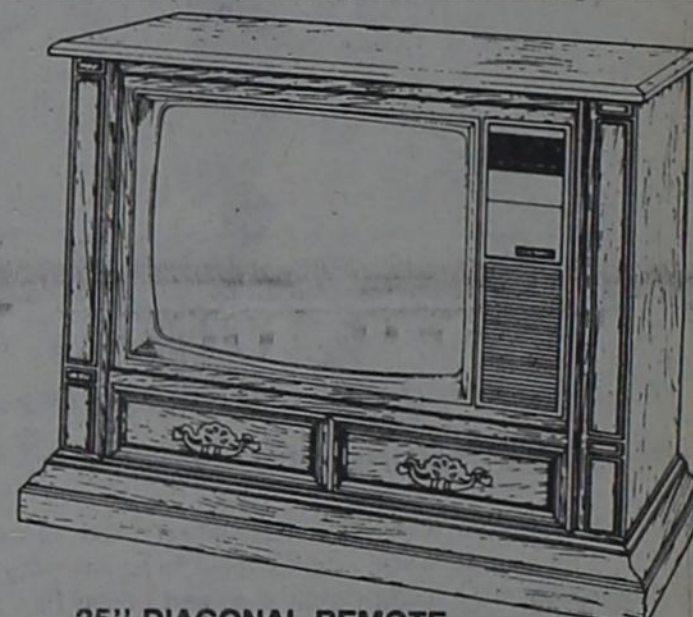
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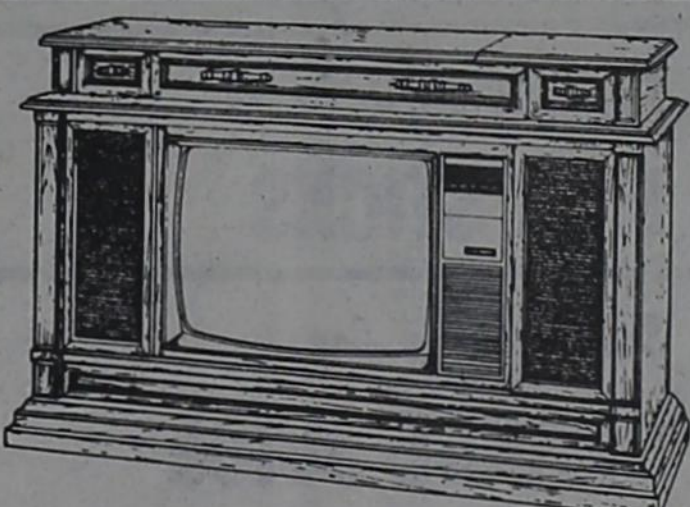
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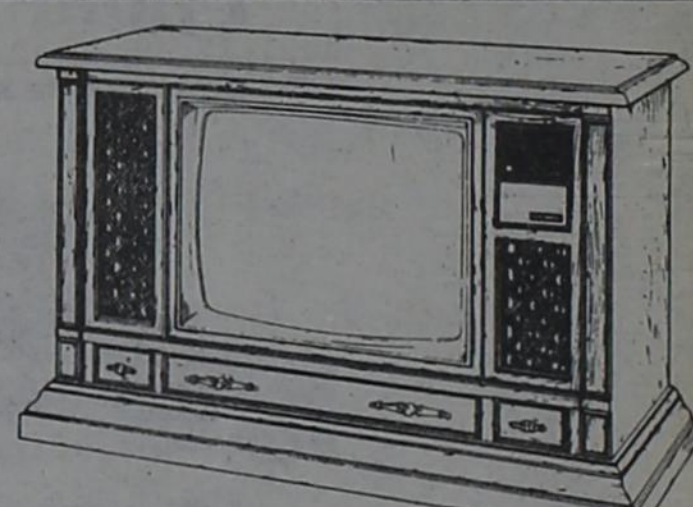
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## Farwell Steers And Steerettes Ready For Track Season
