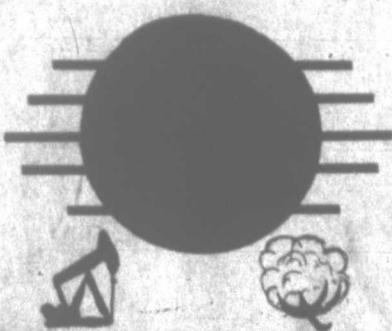

Job assistance set for oil workers

"The Rapid Response Committee of the Governor's Economic Development Division granted our request for funds to launch a Job Search Program designed to provide assistance to unemployed oil industry workers in Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry and Fisher counties," said Chamber Manager Penny Solomon.

The program is designed to provide unemployed, economically disadvantaged individuals who were terminated from a job in the oil industry or related field since January 1, 1986, with skills assessment; short-term remedial instruction; job, personal and financial counseling; and job placement assistance in a four county area of West Central Texas. It will operate six job search classes, two each in Sweetwater, Snyder and Colorado City by December 31.

The proposal was submitted to the Governor's Committee by the West Central Texas Private Industry Council and the West Central Texas Council of Governments. Members of the Local Task Force attended the meeting in Austin Tuesday, August 19. Committee members are W. Judd Jones, Director of Personnel at Texas Instruments in

Abilene; Robert Prock, Manager of Regional Training Center of Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service; Ms. Dru Longmire, President of Longmire's Total Office Systems, Inc. of Abilene; Ms. Jerre Howard, Office Manager of the Texas Employment Commission, Sweetwater; Ray Eaton, owner of Easton's Cafe, DeLeon; The Honorable Rod Waller, Mayor of Snyder; Tom K. Smith, West Central Texas Council of Governments in Abilene and Miss Solomon.

"Our request was for \$45,000 to fund the program initially," said Miss Solomon. "We are realistic enough to project that the most we can perhaps expect to place in jobs in these four counties is 60 people. The Governor's Committee was so impressed with our current efforts on the local level, concern, and well thought out plans that they not only granted us the funds but asked us to enlarge on the plan to meet our present economic crisis and return at a later date with another proposal for additional funds."

The task force will begin immediately to implement the Job Search Program and develop an enlarged plan.

Teachers to begin inservice

It's back-to-school time for Colorado Independent School District teachers. Monday they report to the first day of inservice prior to classes beginning Tuesday, Sept. 2.

The Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a coffee for the teachers beginning at 8:30 a.m. Monday in the Colorado Middle School cafeteria.

The coffee will be followed by opening of school ceremonies. Supt. Charlie Usselton will address the group at 10:45 a.m.

Following lunch, Terry Jaggers with the Department of Human Resources will present a program about child abuse and neglect and Al Cogburn will speak on "dyslexia, the dilemma."

Inservice days also are scheduled for teachers Tuesday through Friday as they prepare for the coming school year.

Loraine and Westbrook teachers will also begin inservice this week with students to begin classes Tuesday, Sept. 2.

Teacher loses career ladder appeal here

A Kelley Elementary School first grade teacher lost her bid to be named to the career ladder during a hearing before the Colorado Independent School District board of trustees Thursday.

Linda Stewart, who had been named to career ladder for the 1984-85 school year, was not named to career ladder in 1985-86 and had appealed the board's decision.

During Thursday night's hearing, Alma Marshall, representing the Texas State Teachers Association, and Mrs. Stewart challenged the board's decision not to place her on the list of 37 teachers who each received \$1,500 in funds provided by the state through House Bill 72.

Mrs. Stewart maintained that since she was named to the career ladder the first year and since her evaluation improved the second year, she should have been named to the career ladder the second year as well.

"I'm asking you to make amends and return me to Step 2 of the career ladder," Mrs. Stewart told the board.

Supt. Charlie Usselton agreed that Mrs. Stewart "did have a good evaluation," but said that the state required a change in the method used to compute the evaluations the second year. The first year, four methods of evaluation - unsatisfactory, below average, satisfactory and exceeding expectations - were used and that the second year a fifth category - clearly outstanding - was added by the state.

Usselton said that the school district received enough funds from the state to award 37 teachers the \$1,500 career ladder stipend and that those teachers with the top 37 scores based on the five evaluation categories were selected. Usselton said that some teachers who did not qualify for the career ladder the first year because of either a lack of additional college hours or inservice work subsequently made up those deficiencies to become eligible for the career ladder the second year. Some of those teachers

had higher scores overall, he said, thus causing some of the original career ladder teachers, including Mrs. Stewart, to be bumped off the list.

Fifty two teachers applied for career ladder the second year, and "all 52 would probably qualify" said Usselton. "We didn't have the money for all 52 and the law gives us authority to limit the number of teachers to the amount of money paid by the state."

In addressing the board, Mrs. Marshall said that "the appeal of the petitioner here today is based on the premise that the actions of the district were arbitrary and capricious. The petitioner bases her claim on the fact that in the school term of 1984-85, she was placed on the career ladder by the district. The district certified that she met both state and local criteria and that her score as tabulated by the district also entitled her to career ladder Level 2."

"However, in the 1985-86 school term, the petitioner was removed from the career ladder," said Mrs. Marshall. "The reason given was, 'In reviewing your application for the career ladder placement, and after tabulating the weighted indicators, your total score does not qualify you to be placed on the current career ladder at level 2.'"

"What had changed in 1985-86?" asked Mrs. Marshall. "Certainly Mrs. Stewart's evaluation had not, for it was done the year before. The only thing that changed Mrs. Stewart's status was an arbitrary decision by the district to change the method of computation. Why was the change made? Mrs. Stewart doesn't know."

Following the presentations of Mrs. Marshall, Mrs. Stewart and Usselton, board president Billy Bridgford said that "this district cannot afford to put everybody on the career ladder who deserves it. We'll do what state law says and fund what we can."

Floyd Lee Ritchey made the motion to uphold the board's original decision and not place

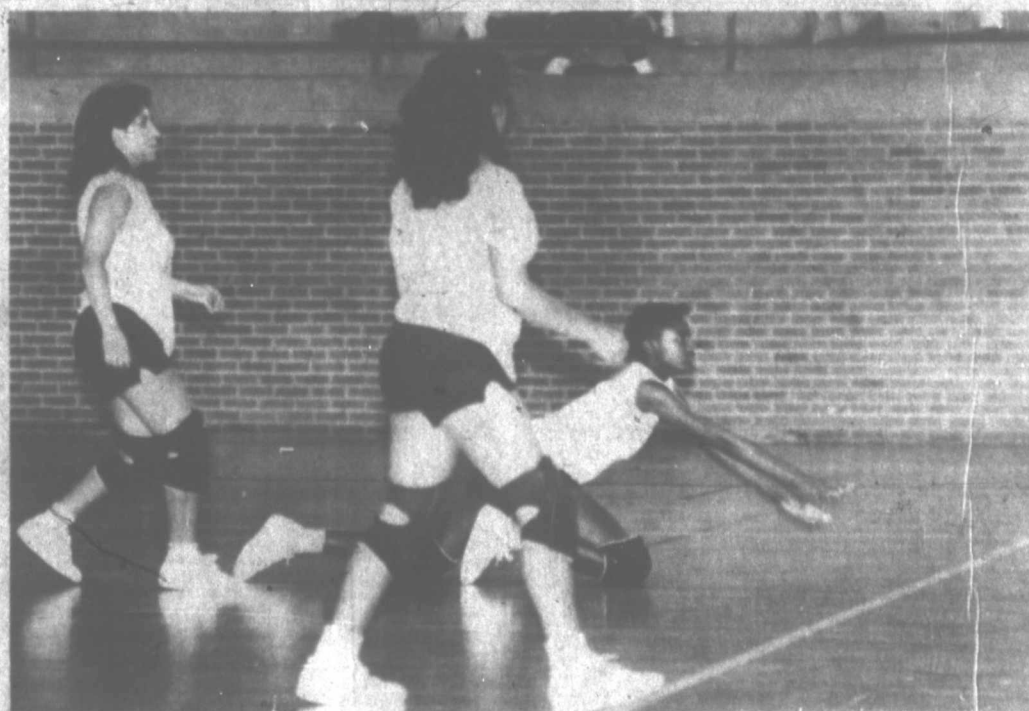
Council applications are sought

Man charged following burglary

A 22-year-old Colorado City man was arrested Friday and charged with burglary of a habitation following a break-in earlier that day.

Sgt. Pat Taylor of the Colorado City Police Department said a residence in the 1700 block of Colorado Street was burglarized at 2:30 a.m. Friday and a jam box and ornamental scales were taken.

The burglar gained entry through an unlocked door, said Taylor.

Witnesses spotted a suspect leave the scene, and the police arrested Andy Austin later in the day. He was taken to Mitchell County Jail to await arraignment.

School zones pose safety problems

Last year in Texas there were 1,228 accidents involving school buses, with seven fatalities and

323 non-fatal injuries. Schools are about to open again, and drivers are once more being

cautioned to be unusually attentive in and around school zones and school buses.

Mrs. Stewart on the career ladder. The motion was seconded by J. C. Britton and approved unanimously by Ritchey, Britton, Dwayne Harris and Eddie Gregory. Board members Brenda Aguilon and Kathy Bassham were not present.

In making his motion, Ritchey said that "we're not saying we don't have a bunch of good teachers. We just had to draw the line."

Britton said that "we sympathize with all 15 who didn't make the career ladder. It was nothing personal - we tried to base it as fairly as possible."

Mrs. Stewart's next step in the appeal process will be to appeal to Texas Education Agency if she so desires.

In other business, the board gave permission to advertise for bids for resurfacing the track field at Wolf Stadium with a bid date of Aug. 25, 7 a.m. at Villa Restaurant.

The board also approved the employment of Monya Shari

Sanders as a third grade teacher at Hutchinson and Kim Feaster Stewart as seventh grade math teacher at Colorado Middle School. The board also agreed to a

request from Molly Bruce to be reassigned from the middle school to Hutchinson where she will be a resource teacher.

Francis Langdon, who publishes the "Tonkawa (Okla.) News," tells me the old Methodist parsonage is empty now. The fella who bought it from the church in 1965 has died and the place is up for sale.

Living in this house in the mid-fifties was like having my own amusement park. Good things seemed to happen when you lived at 790 East Grand Avenue - especially if you were a kid.

It had large empty rooms. It had an attic big enough to play a game of catch. It had a basement with spiders and ghosts and anything else my sister and I could conjure up with our imaginations.

There were air vents you could see through from the second story to the first. My grandmother and I once got down on all fours and looked through one of them to watch my Dad perform a marriage ceremony we'd been banned from minutes earlier.

There was a flat roof outside my bedroom and just above the back porch. I used to spend the night out there in the summer. When the sun came up I could shimmy down a drain pipe and run across the street to Tate's Grocery and nourish my body with Hostess cup cakes and Dr. Peppers.

The large, semi-circular front porch was made of wood and I guess you could say the footing was a little unsteady.

I can still see my dad tripping over one of the steps and rolling to an undignified rest on the sidewalk - all 240 pounds of him.

"Dog blast it," said the reverend, just managing to avoid profanity.

It was in this house my dad taught me about Bud when it meant a football coach instead of a brew.

It was here I first listened to OU football games on the radio. As long as I lived in that house, Oklahoma never lost one. The day the Irish from Indiana drove the fatal stake through the hearts of every OU fan in the land, I was looking on tearfully from another parsonage.

In this old house, though, my grade school totally dominated what my friends and I saw as the more affluent grade school from the other side of the tracks. The Washington Redskins (my team) beat Lincoln (the rich kids). In every sport all three years I lived in that house.

There was one close call with Lincoln, though. Only the house saved us.

The last sport between the two schools my sixth-grade year was the track meet. Going into the 880-relay we were clinging to a narrow lead.

The coach told us it all came down to this race. If we won it, we could "graduate" knowing we had never lost to the miserable Lincoln Bears. But, if we lost, it would be our shame to bear for life.

I just happened to be the anchorman for our relay team. I just happened to be the guy who got the baton with a slight lead over the Lincoln anchorman. And I just happened to be the guy who got passed and beaten to the tape.

Go ahead, tell me about your Charlie Brown humiliations.

Our coach had lied shamelessly in an effort to motivate us for that race, though. Turns out we had just enough points to win the track meet in spite of my failure.

Had I lived in an ordinary parsonage that race would have cost us the city championship. I've never doubted that.

I stopped through Tonkawa a few years ago and met the man who had purchased the house from the Methodists. He led me on a familiar tour.

He seemed to appreciate the old house the way I did, too. I told him a few stories about it and he invited me to come back again. I promised I would and I'm sorry I didn't make it back sooner.

I'm sure he had stored up a few of his own stories of good fortune at 790 East Grand Avenue.

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Women need extra vitamins and minerals

To meet the many demands placed on them at home and in the workplace, you'd think that most women would want to be in the best possible state of health. But evidently, this is not the case.

Research studies indicate that today's woman is not getting sufficient amounts of certain vitamins and minerals, including calcium, iron, vitamin B-6 and folacin.

Although women are smaller than men, those of child-bearing age need about twice as much iron. Iron is a mineral required to form hemoglobin, the oxygen-carrying part of the blood. Without enough iron, iron-deficiency anemia results. Symptoms of iron-deficiency anemia include fatigue, paleness, dizziness, weakness, sensitivity to cold and reduced work capacity.

Foods rich in iron include meats, dry beans, green leafy vegetables and enriched breads and cereals. Iron is absorbed better from meals when a source of ascorbic acid is also included, such as tomatoes or citrus fruit. Some women who don't eat enough iron-rich foods may need an iron supplement.

Many women take in only half of the recommended 800 milligrams of calcium each day. This is of special concern, since many experts believe that the 800 milligram recommendation is actually too low.

Too little calcium over a long period of time is one of the main factors linked to the painful, crippling condition called osteoporosis. Calcium is lost from bones, so they become very fragile and break with the slightest movement. The condition most often shows up in elderly women.

Osteoporosis may be prevented by a calcium-rich diet and regular exercise. Milk and milk products are the best sources of calcium. Two and three-fourths cups of milk provide enough calcium to meet the current recommendation for 800 milligrams per day.

Non-dairy sources of calcium include collard and mustard greens and salmon and sardines with edible bones.

Many women may be lacking in some vitamins in their diets which affect their health and well-being. Folacin, a vitamin needed to build red blood cells, has been shown to be low in some women's diets. This vitamin is found especially in liver, yeast, and deep green leafy vegetables.

Another vitamin often in short supply is vitamin B-6. It is needed to form enzymes that help body use proteins for building and repair. Vitamin B-6 is found in meat, liver, wheat germ, whole grain cereals, soybeans, peanuts and corn.

The best source of all these nutrients is food-not vitamin pills or supplements. Eating a variety of foods from the basic food groups daily can help every woman insure that she is not missing any of these necessary nutrients.

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AARP Chapter met Monday

The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) Chapter No. 1461 met Monday, Aug. 18 in the C. C. Thompson Room for its regular meeting, luncheon and program.

Eddie Barclay, president, called the meeting to order. The invocation was given by Lewis Elliott after which a luncheon was served from tables decorated in a patriotic motif.

Faye Spivey introduced Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Elliott and Margaret Oyler who talked on "How Times Have Changed" and "I Remember When".

Mrs. Elliott told of having lived in Mitchell County 80 years and told of the many changes that have been made during that time. She related how she be-

came interested in her church and club work. She told of interesting incidents about her courtship with Mr. Elliott and how the mode of transportation and dress have changed during the years.

The group was told that Mr. Elliott's great-grandfather was born in 1795 and served in the War of 1812. He moved to Texas in 1838, two years after Texas became a Republic. The Elliotts moved to Colorado City in January, 1920 and he was head of a business for 63 years. He saw his first automobile in 1906 and it had a bar guide instead of a steering wheel. In 1906 Colorado had what was called a "Log rolling" which attracted people from everywhere. The family visited the east salt works in 1907 when it was at its height of operation. Mr. Elliott has also been active in his church and civic activities.

Mrs. Oyler talked on the standpoint water department. The town of Colorado incorporated in 1882 and the only water supply

came from Seven Wells. In 1884 water works bonds were issued to erect a standpipe southeast of Colorado and to lay water mains which later supplied the city with water. A 90-foot steel standpipe was erected in 1884 on a foundation laid by D. C. Bryce, a Colorado independent contractor. The water works consisted of a standpipe, a steam driven engine driven by coal, pumps and water wells which by 1885 were all operable. The standpipe, now 102 years old, is still being used to store water for possible emergencies.

Mrs. Oyler also told about her early school days. Her kindergarten class was taught in a room located in the old courthouse. She is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. F. McCorkle. He was hired to work in the water department in 1920 and continued until his death. Mrs. Oyler had on display a painting by the early day artist L. F. Harrod of the standpipe.

During the business meeting, the pledge to the flag was given

and "America" was sung with Ruby Claxton at the piano. A drawing was held and 10 Susan B. Anthony dollars were given as a gift from Fuller Foods. Elnora Barber presented the secretary's report and Juanita Coker the treasurer's report.

County Oil News

Four 2,000-ft. developmental wells are planned by Mrs. W. M. Keck Jr., of Lafayette, La., at drillsites in the Sharon Ridge Field, Mitchell County.

The wells have been designated as the Nos. 11, 12 and 13 Coleman Ranch and the No. 8 Coleman Ranch "A". Drillsites are three miles northeast of Cuthbert. The first three wells will be drilled in a 100-acre lease in the H&C Survey, while the "A" well will be drilled in a 130-acre lease, same survey.

The same operator has revealed plans to drill the No. 7 Edmondson, a 1,850-ft. developmental well in the Sharon Ridge

Field. The operation will be spudded in a 120-acre lease in the Kirkland & Fields Survey. Drillsite is five miles north-east of Cuthbert.

Crews Oil has abandoned an undrilled location in the East Iatan-Howard Field, Mitchell County. The well was to have been known as the No. 1 T.X.L., and was to have been drilled seven miles southwest of Westbrook.

Commercial shows have been reported at the No. 1 Womack, a wildcat well in Mitchell County. Fina Oil & Chemical is the operator.

Perforations have been made in the Upper Clear Fork Formation at 2,671 to 2,972 feet into the wellbore. The operation has been bottomed at 8,200 feet.

Drillsite is two miles west of Cuthbert in the J. D. Pruitt Survey. The well was spudded February 18 of this year.

Drilling operations have been concluded at three developmental wells in the East Iatan-Howard Field, Mitchell County. D. L. Ray Inc. is the operator. The wells are designated as the Nos. 17, 19, and 21-Mitchell "B" Fee. No details concerning production potential have been released.

The Nos. 19 and 21 wells were spudded early in July of this year, while the No. 17 well was spudded May 12. Total drilling depth for the No. 17 well was 3,411 feet, while the Nos. 19 and 21 wells have been bottomed at 3,400 and 3,415 feet, respectively.

Drillsites are seven miles west of Westbrook.

An undrilled location has been abandoned in the Bull Creek Field, Mitchell County, by Cyco Energy.

The well in question had been designated as the No. 1 Dunn-A. B. Norrid. Drillsite was to have been seven miles northwest of Cuthbert, and the well had been projected to 8,000-ft. total depth.

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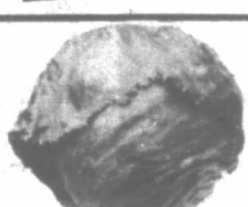


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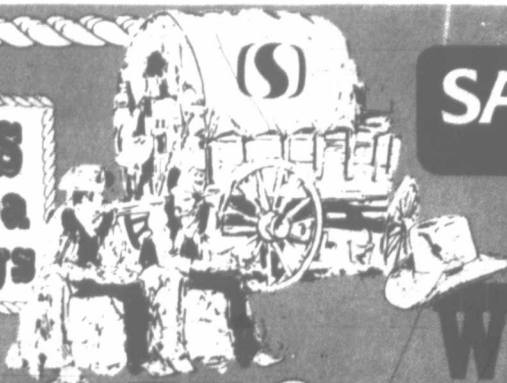
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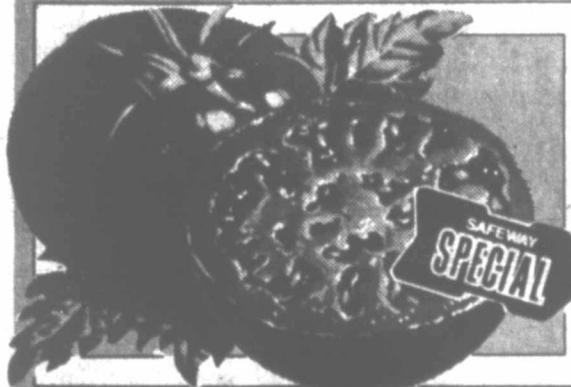
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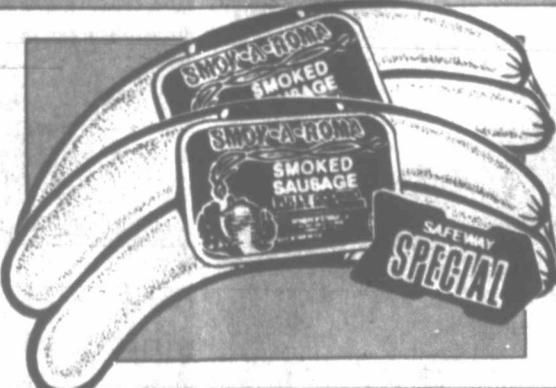

For the seniors on the 1986 Pack, a depletion of ranks is nothing new.

The class that began its football career with a seventh grade district championship is now down to eight and three of them are among those that have been on the sideline with injuries.

One senior not injured is Ralph Gonzales, who will be vying for a running back spot with

three others and will also play defensive cornerback.

"I think the defense is going to do it for us this year because we know what to do," said Gonzales.

For Gonzales this will be his second year on the varsity though his first was spent mostly as a backup to a main carrier the Wolves utilized. Gonzales is one of two seniors that will run the ball this year along with two sophomores.

"I guess we are good because we are stronger. I think we'll make the playoffs because that's what everybody wants."

"I think they'll (offensive line) make some holes for us," said Gonzales, who will certainly be among the fastest Wolves if not the biggest.

Marty Cleckler thinks that a good spring off-season will pay off for the Pack.

"During the off-season there was a lot of spirit and a lot of talking about winning," said Cleckler.

Cleckler "played offense" on last year's varsity and gained experience along with a few other prospects. He hopes to play some free safety on defense.

"I think we can win district. Ballinger will be tough but I think we can beat 'em."

Cleckler describes the Wolves as bigger but adds "we need to play together more." Cleckler will be a wide receiver.

An area the Wolves figure to be particularly strong at is in the

field position category.

Reggie Gardner will again handle the punting duties after averaging over forty yards a punt as a junior. Those kind of stats earned Gardner All-District and All-West Texas honors last year.

This year he hopes to play more tight end and possibly strong safety.

Gardner sprained his ankle Wednesday and will not see action "probably till next Wednesday."

"I should get to go against Snyder."

Gardner said the Wolves are "in a great position. We're more experienced and we're executing good. If we keep up the good attitude I think we'll be at the top. In the seventh we won and we plan to do it again."

"We have more confidence. Our main goal is to make the playoffs. From there we'll take it week by week. My personal goal is to be the best person I can be on and off the field."

Another returning senior that received All-District recognition last year was Danny Salazar.

Salazar, an honorable mention defensive lineman, has been missing workouts with what he says is a concussion. He was injured Tuesday and should be back Wednesday. He expects to

be a defensive end and possibly a center or tackle for the offense.

"I want this to be my best year," said Salazar. "I think we're better than last year. I'm looking for a good year."

Whenever the word potential is mentioned one has to ponder on Paul Arellano.

The senior defensive tackle and tight end easily has the most body suited for the sport of football. At around 6'4" and 255 pounds he might not even start ahead of some of the not so big Wolves that have already established themselves.

It will be Arellano's first year on the varsity after not having played his sophomore and junior years.

He says he is not one hundred percent because of a bout with bronchitis but he'll be "ready to go Monday."

"If I can help I'm somebody that will be there. If everybody stays healthy we ought to do pretty good."

This "Meet the Wolves" section will be a regular feature during the coming season. The annual Pigskin Preview will be Thursday at Wolf Stadium beginning at 7 p.m. to be followed by an ice cream supper sponsored by the Booster Club.

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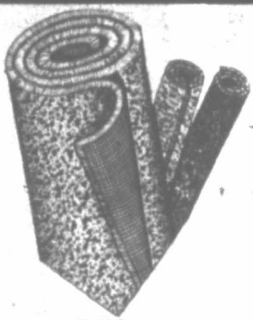

House supports trade policy

WASHINGTON—Efforts to preserve U.S. cotton farmers' domestic market will continue even though the House of Representatives failed to override the President's veto of the textile trade bill, a cotton industry official said.

National Cotton Council President Lloyd Cline pointed out that the override attempt fell short of the required two-thirds majority by only eight votes.

"This tells us there is strong support in the House for a more equitable trade policy," the Lamesa, Tex., cotton producer said. "When 65 percent of the House members vote with you on an issue, that's a pretty good base to build on—that's for sure."

Cline said the Council will continue to work to bring textile and apparel imports under control.

"Our fight to assure that American cotton farmers, textile industries, and apparel makers are not run out of American markets by an uncontrollable flood of imports is far from over."

In addition to seeking administrative and possibly legislative relief, the Council president said efforts to promote American-

manufactured textile and apparel products made of American-grown cotton will be continued and intensified.
