## Bum Check Cuts Short Couple's Honeymoon

A check-writing honeymoon of a Central Texas couple has been interrupted after three weeks because of alert Colorado City store employees.

The 27-year-old husband and his bride, 22 face forgery charges in connection with a \$25 check given here at C. R. Anthony store.

They were taken into custody in Hamilton for Sheriff Lewis Claxton's office, who traced the pair with information provided by store clerks.

With their apprehension, officers traced a police record linked to the husband that includes arrests for investigation of burglary, forgery, unlawful use of coin vending machine, theft by bailee and worthless check writing.

Chief Deputy Forrest Smith and Deputy Bill McGuire returned the pair here from Hamilton.

The check-writing honeymooners aroused suspicion of clerks in Anthony's and Landau's last week after the man had obtained 2 blank Sterling City bank checks. He had claimed he had tire trouble and did not have any of his checks with him.

Moments later, the woman cashed a \$25 check at Anthony's, obtaining about \$10 in merchandise and the remainder in money after commenting that her husband "doesn't trust me with money and filled out the check for me."

Her husband was in the store at the time, but did not ac-

company his bride, and told clerks he was waiting for a woman from Coahoma.

When the woman left, Anthony employees Mrs. Odell Lamb and Mrs. John Howard, followed her to Landau's.

They reported their suspicion to employees there while the woman reported her previous story and attempted to pass another \$25 check on a Coahoma bank. And, again the husband--although still acting as if he did not know his bride--was also in the store.

When their check was turned down, the pair left Landau's separately and the 2 Anthony clerks noted the license number of the car the man entered in front of Lan-

dau's. They watched as the car drove away and picked up the woman at corner of Elm and East Third, across from City National Bank.

From there, their reports to sheriff officers led to identity of the car, borrowed by the couple. Warrants for their arrest were prepared here after photos from Stephenville police files were identified by the store employees.

Officers report that the couple are wanted in Stephenville for 3 check cases there, 2 more in Eastland and 3 more in Wichita Falls.

The 27-year-old man's last job was as a pianist, officers said.

City Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee.

Raschke is the son of Mrs. A. A. Raschke of Westbrook and the late Mr. Raschke of Westbrook. His wife is the former Linda Ritchey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mack Ritchey, who live northeast of Colorado City.

Mrs. Raschke teaches second grade in Westbrook and the couple's two children attend school there -- Mark, third grade, and Robbie Ann, first grade.

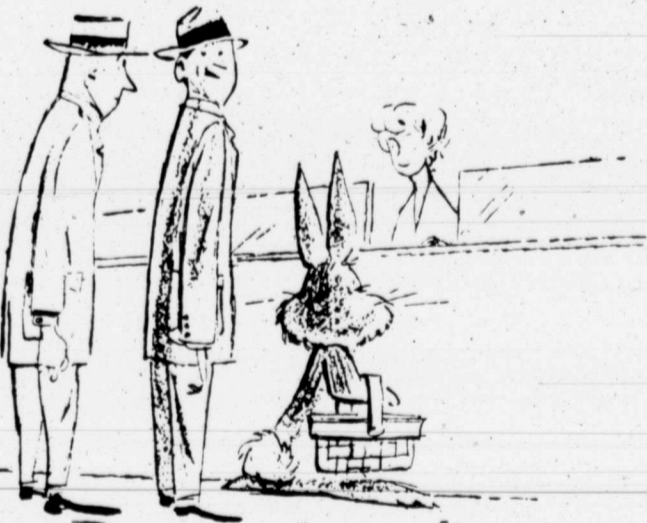

**CONVERSATION CORNER**

EASTER is perhaps the most sacred of all the religious holidays observed by Christians throughout the world.

Of course Easter, like Christmas, has its little frivolous side because it is very hard to be human and solemnly virtuous all the time. So we have for the children baby chickens and ducklings, colored eggs in fancy baskets, and new clothes for the Easter services.

Strict interpreters of the Christian faith sometimes call the Easter bunny and the Easter bonnet hold-overs from pagan practices. Love to think of them rather, as signs and symbols of new life.

Easter, with its reborn flowers and its songs of special promise, is supposed to be a glad, glad day.

ONLY the hardest, most hopeless heart can refuse to be glad for Easter. Some churches, we all know, hold that every Sunday should celebrate the Resurrection.

But you can not ignore Easter Sunday. You can not deny its reverent significance if you believe in God's love.

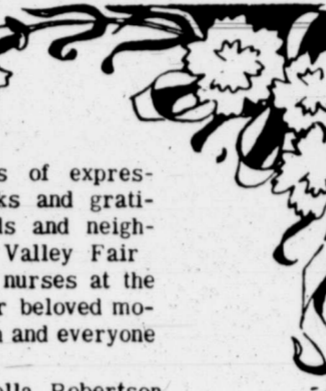
