

## Oran Lewellen Realizes Threat Of Communism

In a recent issue of The Dallas Morning News, under the heading of 'East Texas Notebook,' by Fred Pass, East Texas Bureau of The News, Oran Lewellen was featured for his outstanding work during the past two years in bringing to the attention of the people of Tyler, Texas, just what the Communist threat means to the people of Texas and America.

Oran is a native of Santa Anna, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Barney Lewellen.

Because of the nature of his outstanding work and the fact that we as a small town newspaper also realize the threat of the Communist to our nation, we are herewith publishing the article as Mr. Pass wrote it. We hope you will also give some serious thought to the Communist threat as you read what Santa Anna's Mr. Lewellen has and is doing.

The following is quoted just as it appeared in The Dallas News:

Tyler, Texas — There comes a time in the life of most every person when he encounters something that changes his life. Such a time came one spring day two years ago to Oran Lewellen of Tyler.

Lewellen, who is an agricultural specialist, had grown up in Santa Anna, Coleman County. There he had learned in school to respect and be proud of his country and its principles.

Later, in the Army, he heard some men around him talk a bit strangely. Their remarks made him think they didn't feel as keenly for America as he did.

He was sent to Japan, then to Shanghai in 1948. Here he saw places where churches had been blasted away, and Moslems in spiritual regalia were worshipping at the remains — clinging desperately to what they once had.

Lewellen returned to civilian life, to college, to a job, and all the time he had these things in the back of his mind.

Two years ago he was in Lufkin and attended a Lions Club luncheon. Here he heard Dr. Fred Schwarz, head of the Christian Anti-Communism Crusade, speak on the "Communist Conspiracy."

"It was during his talk that I began to understand all of what hadn't been right in what I had seen and heard earlier," he said.

Since then, on his own time and at his own expense, he has studied more about the subject. He studied reports of J. Edgar Hoover and others. He began acquiring an awareness of the Communist threat.

"I began to realize that if something isn't done now, my 7-year-old daughter will live in communistic slavery in Tyler before she is 21," he said.

Lewellen has worked to bring the message to others. He bought Dr. Schwarz and other speakers to Tyler where they spoke to teachers, students, service clubs and church congregations. He helped to sponsor a lecture, here Tyler citizens listened to discussions of the Communist threat.

Lewellen himself has made many talks on the American way of life. He loaned his library to the English class of one school so the students could study it before writing essays on "What I Can Do to Preserve American Freedom."

Lewellen has found that a person must study long, hard and

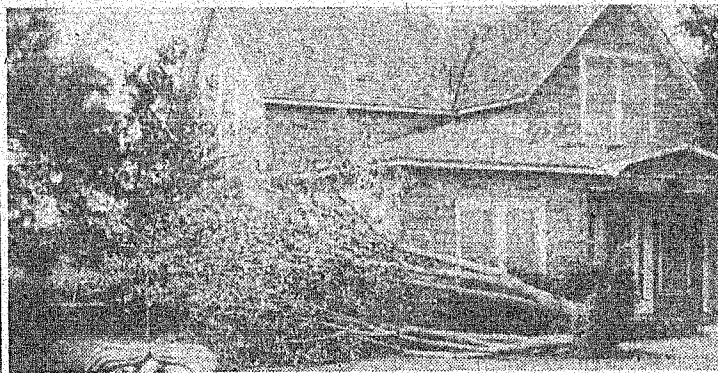

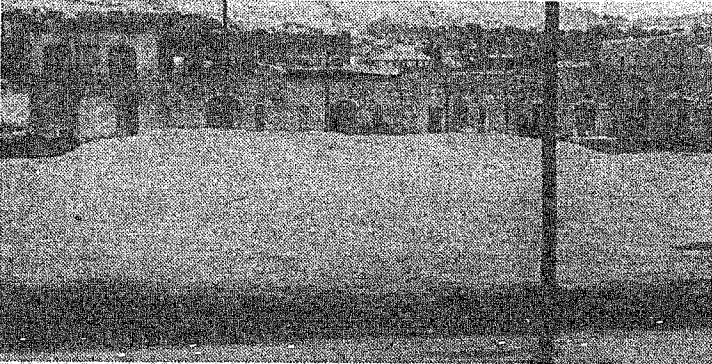

## \$45,000 PILE OF OATS



Pictured above is a pile of about 75,000 bushels of oats purchased this season by the Santa Anna Co-op Elevator and piled on the vacant lot just north of the elevator. The oats are valued at about 60 cents per bushel, and apparently did not suffer any amount of damage from the high winds and rain during the weekend.

The local elevators have been operating at capacity during the past two weeks, with large loads of oats and wheat coming in a steady stream. Good prices are being paid for the grain.

The quality of both the wheat and oats is very good this year. The dry weather during the period from the middle of February to the last part of May caused lots of the grain to make a much lower yield per acre than it would have if the rain had come at the right time, but the quality of the grain is as good or better than is usually produced in this area.

Oats are producing up to about 45 bushels to the acre in some areas, and as low as 8 to 10 bushels in other areas. Wheat is producing up to 30 and 40 bushels in some areas also. A strange thing is, some of the wheat is getting ready to harvest before the oats in the same area.

## Rain, Hail And Wind Does Extensive Damage

Severe weather throughout this section of the state did a lot of damage to crops and buildings over the weekend. The actual rain measurement at the Coleman Gas Company office for the rainfall Saturday and Sunday nights amounted to 3.20 inches. Reports from areas surrounding Santa Anna indicate that as much as two inches fell in all areas and up to four inches or more fell in some areas.

Here in town a number of trees were blown over, some Saturday night and others Sunday night. Flowers and other vegetation suffered considerable damage. Lots of tree limbs were broken off and fruit trees were badly damaged.

In the rural areas farmers suffered the loss of lots of cotton, wheat, oats, corn and other row crops. It seems the most severe hail damage was in an area beginning about four miles south of town and covering an area about five miles wide and 15 miles long. Some of the farmers were fortunate enough to have all or parts of their small grain harvested and combines were working right up to the time of the storm in an effort to save as much as possible.

So far as we have been able to learn, just about all the cotton that had been planted was lost in all areas around Santa Anna. Most of the cotton damage to the south and east resulted from the Saturday night weather. Then the Sunday night weather got the crops of cotton and other row crops to the north, east and west. It would be impossible to estimate the amount of the damage.

To the south of Santa Anna, beginning at about the John Perry home and going west past the Rockwood Highway and east past the county line, then south to about Trickham, the area was hard hit by large hail about 8:00 p. m. Saturday. J. D. Kline, Miss Virgie Brown, Emzy Brown, Ed Schrader, Carroll Kingsberry, Tom Kingsberry, Virgil Newman, John Perry, Earl and Cecil Ellis, Casey Herring and many others suffered severe damage to their farm crops and some of them suffered severe damage to their homes and other buildings.

Most of the crop damage in the other directions were caused by high wind and hard rain. So far as we can learn, not much hail fell in areas except in the Cleveland Community and in that area.

The rains were beneficial to a large number of farmers also. The Rockwood area apparently did not get any hail, but did have some high wind. However, apparently there was not too much damage there. The area from Rockwood across to Whon got good rains and apparently did not suffer too much damage.

Many pastures and the row crops that were large enough to withstand such weather, will be benefitted a lot by the good moisture.

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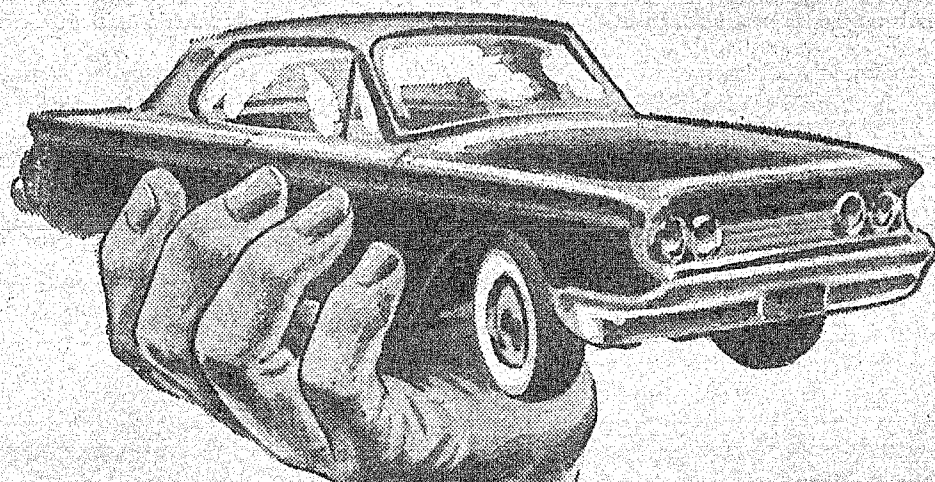
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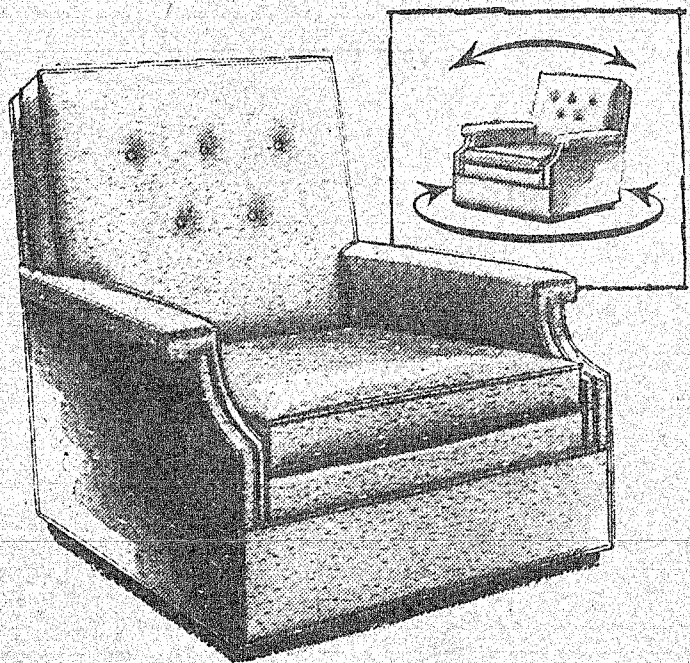

Austin — From now until July 10 will be a period of testing how representative democracy works in Texas.

Legislature is to re-convene July 10 to make a fresh stab at writing a tax bill to raise some \$350,000,000 for the next two years. Gov. Price Daniel has urged Texans to give the Legislature and him their views on how the matter should be handled.

Governor Daniel is strongly opposed to the adoption of any sales tax plan designed to raise the major portion of this needed revenue. He used his influ-

ence in the regular session to block a move in this direction.

"But," said the governor, "if this is really what the majority of the people want, I don't see how I can go on fighting it."

He believes, however, that a very limited sales tax, which he terms "selective excise taxes," on only more expensive items, with the balance to be raised from gas pipeline taxes and increased interstate corporation franchise taxes, would be more fair and acceptable to most Texans.

Only bill which came close to passing the Legislature was one in which the main money-raising feature was a retail sales tax on items costing 25 cents and more, with food, medicine and farm necessities exempted. It also levied increased gas and corporation franchise taxes. Speaker James Turman cast the crucial vote that prevented the bill's being sent to the governor.

Actually, the difference between the governor and those voting for the sales tax "package" is mostly one of degree. Governor Daniel grants the need for some sales (or excise) taxes, but feels that they should be stringently limited. A majority of the Legislature cast votes indicating they felt Texas has reached the point where only a broad-based "growth" tax, such as the sales tax, can raise enough money to meet the state's increasing needs.

Now it is the people's turn to say what they think. If enough speak up, the legislature will have little difficulty in deciding what to do when it reconvenes July 10.

At that late hour, getting broad agreement in the Legislature will be more important than passing a bill that suits the governor. Bills passed by only a simple majority cannot become effective until 90 days after the session ends, but bills passed by a two-thirds majority of both houses can take effect immediately. That late in the summer, the legislature will need to get a two-thirds vote for immediate effect so there will be money and authorization to keep the state going after the new fiscal year begins September 1.

And a two-thirds majority is

also sufficient to override a governor's veto.

## OIL ON TROUBLED WATERS

A number of lawmakers had their "backs up" before the governor made his statewide "report to the people" after the regular session closed. But the governor's message smoothed some feathers.

Many lawmakers expected Daniel to roast the Legislature for its failure to take care of money matters during the 140-day session. They had their hot replies all ready for press release.

Instead, Governor Daniel admiringly praised the lawmakers as one of the hardest working legislatures he had ever seen. He even singled out for kind words some leaders who had opposed his program.

It was those infernal lobbyists who were to blame, said the governor. He described hordes of lobbyists, choking the hallways and bothering members while they were in session.

Now it's the lobbyists who are riled.

Governor Daniel has announced that he will name a new citizen's committee to study the state's fiscal problems and make recommendations before the special session begins.

## GRAND GESTURE

Before adjourning, the Senate gave approval to a \$2,600,000,000 general appropriations bill for the two years beginning September 1.

But without passage of a money-raising bill to back it up, appropriations had no meaning.

Senate adopted the appropriations conference committee report — a plan that called for spending \$385,500,000 from general revenue, compared to the present \$320,000,000 general revenue appropriation. Welfare programs, the state hospital system, junior colleges and the state senior college and university system would be among the main beneficiaries.

Senate also passed an equally ineffective \$810 a year raise for school teachers before adjourning.

All was for naught, however, when the tax bill failed to pass.

## 14 AMENDMENTS PROPOSED

Texas voters can get ready for a bumper crop of 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be on the November ballot in 1962.

Some of the amendments are of major importance; some are only local in effect and application. Among them are proposals to:

1. Increase maximum possible yearly payments to the permanently disabled from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000.

2. Allow the state water development board to purchase water storage space in reservoirs con-

structed by other units of government, such as the federal government.

3. Permit the Veterans Land Board to sell forfeited land to non-veteran buyers to liquidate land the state is "stuck with."

4. Authorize the Legislature to provide for "trial de novo" (trial anew) in appeals from decisions of state agencies.

5. Allow the Legislature to name successors to officials knocked out by a major catastrophe such as enemy attack.

6. Raise the present \$47,000,000 a year ceiling on public welfare payments to \$52,000,000.

7. Allow the Legislature to set up hospital districts without a special constitutional amendment for each one.

8. Allow the Legislature to delegate to local government control of traffic, parking and sanitation on public beaches.

## NEW POWER FOR PROBERS

Future witnesses before legislative investigating committees can be compelled to tell the truth or face perjury penalties under a measure that passed both houses.

Last year the perjury conviction of former Insurance Commissioner J. Byron Saunders was voided by the courts on grounds the anti-perjury statute did not cover statements to legislative committees.

This bill spells out the right of legislative committees to make investigations and make it a penal offense (two to ten years) to lie deliberately to such a committee.

## RATLIFF IS PRO TEM

Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford was elected by his senate colleagues to serve as president pro tempore of the Senate for the interval between the regular session's end and the special session's beginning.

President of the Senate presides in the absence of the lieutenant governor and is second in line of succession to the governor. He usually serves as "governor for a day" when both the governor and the lieutenant governor are out of the state.

Ratliff, a radio station owner, has been in the Legislature since 1951, in the Senate since 1955.

## SHORT SNORTS

Texas Aeronautics Commission, which past Legislatures have threatened to abolish, fared much better this year. Bills were passed broadening the Commission's scope of activity and allocating to it a portion of the unclaimed tax refunds on

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has called a meeting June 22 of those interested in working out small loan company regulation. Efforts to pass such a bill this past session bogged down completely.

State Treasurer Jesse James reported the deficit in the state's general revenue fund increased during the past month to \$69,641,536. A shortage of \$63,000,000 is generally expected for the end of the fiscal year August 31.

State Supreme Court sheared off some of the privileges of lawyer-legislators to get court cases in which they are involved postponed until after legislative business is complete. It said the law doesn't cover such preliminary activity as taking depositions before the actual trial.

State penitentiary would be practically emptied, one lawyer predicted, if a plea presently before the Court of Criminal Appeals is granted. Defendant contends his conviction was illegal because the trial judge had not paid his dues in the State Bar of Texas. State's attorneys answer that the law requiring lawyers to be paid up in the bar as a requisite for participating in court matters had not been passed at the time the trial judge was in arrears.

## The American Way

### YOU CAN STOP COMMUNISM

By John T. Flynn

(Editor's Note: John T. Flynn is a noted author, lecturer and radio commentator.)

Will Americans ever learn what communist subversion inside the United States really means — and how to fight it? It is possible, of course, that the people generally are 'way ahead of their leaders in this respect. Last month, for instance, at one of his press conferences President Kennedy had something to say on this subject. He took to task those citizens who are troubled about the manner in which communists and communist objectives so seriously infiltrate our institutions and our thinking. He said these people ought to pay more attention to subversion in Laos and Vietnam, and to Moscow's exploitation of poor nations.

The first is that the communist threat stops at the three-mile limit; that communism is something to be concerned about only in the faraway places of the world. Perhaps this is why it seems much more important to Washington officialdom to resist it a bit more vigorously — now and then — 10,000 miles away rather than 90 miles from our shores.

The second fallacious idea is that communism inside the United States is no menace unless a wild-eyed, bushy-haired revolutionist brandishes a bomb and threatens to blow up a government building. But that is not how real subversives work.

First of all, the dedicated subversives — and their knowing or unknowing dupes — are just as suave, clean-cut, well-dressed and well-educated as any ordinary citizen. And they don't go around yelling "Down with the U. S. Government; up with the Dictatorship of the Proletariat." They work ceaselessly to implant their ideas and aims in the minds of otherwise perfectly good Americans, who then carry forward communist objectives without ever realizing what they are doing or what has been put over on them. That's the reason for communist-front organizations — organizations formed for seemingly worthy purposes, with highly respected names on them, but used by hidden communists or communist-sympathizers to put over one or more Red objectives. It is the reason for concentration on channels of opinion-forming such as radio, TV, press, on the schools, on strategic spots in government.

The big question, of course, is: Is there anything you, the individual American, can do about all this?

Yes, there certainly is, but you must be careful always to act sanely and wisely — not to go off half-cocked — to be thoroughly informed about what you do, because you are up against a clever, resourceful and merciless enemy. Fortunately, there is now available a simple, brief, inexpensive but comprehensive guide for the average individual American who knows he must do something to save America from its internal enemies. This is a little pamphlet called **YOU CAN STOP COMMUNISM**. It is written by an authority on the subject — Anthony T. Bouscaren, professor of Political Science at LeMoyn College.

THE REPUBLICAN VICTORY in Texas has provided a field day for the Monday morning quarterbacks, the crystal gazers and the commentators — both amateur and professional.

Democratic leaders, while blushing a bit, try to discount the partisan significance. They remind that the light vote did it for Tower — the drop from 2.2 million who voted in November to 900 thousand in May. And some say Bill Blakley was a bit too conservative to suit the liberals — liberals who are forever yakking about party loyalty.

AFL-CIO, for example, announced before the election: "There has been no state COPE recommendation in the Senate race — and there will be none."

ON THE OTHER SIDE, seasoned observers here (whose views are shared by many Blakley supporters) view the Tower victory as an upsurge of conservatism, a Texas reaction to the New Frontier's budget-busting spending and welfare program.

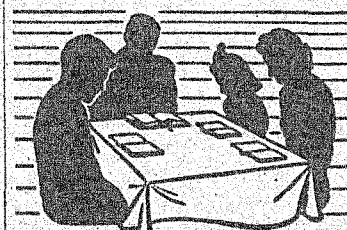
Even though Senator Blakley did not embrace these and other proposals that are believed to be generally unpopular in Texas, yet it was convenient for him to play the role of the scape goat.

It has now been disclosed that Peck has a long record as a Communist associate. He was active with the Committee for Non-Violent Action, which has demonstrated against construction of our Polaris submarines. Peck was given three years in New York in 1942 for violating the Selective Service Act. He is a member of the Committee for Non-Violent Action Against Nuclear Weapons, etc.

## Wild Animals Not for Pets Say Wardens

Austin — Warnings that individuals who catch young wildlife for pets or harm protected birds will be prosecuted, have been issued by the law enforcement division of the Game and Fish Commission.

"We get complaints every day that persons have been picking up young of the wild, particularly fawns," says J. B. Phillips, assistant director. "This is strictly against the law and wardens have been instructed to make arrests and file cases."

Every day complaints come in that fawns have been picked up, some of them when the mother deer is close by. He pointed out that the wild animal usually takes care of itself much better if left alone. Permits are required for raising wildlife in captivity and the permit must be held before the animal is captured.

At the same time, complaints also are being filed against persons catching protected birds or destroying nests. Among them were several filed in Austin against persons who invaded a swallow rookery on the Highland Lakes with air rifles and sling shots.

Baby birds are used to bait trot lines. If the bird is a protected species complaints are filed and the guilty person usually is given a stiff fine.

Numerous arrests have resulted from pictures appearing in newspapers of persons displaying a baby animal. This is strong evidence which stands up in court when cases are filed.

## Commissioner White Expects 10,000 Will Hear Freeman's Speech in Rosebud

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John White said in Dallas recently that he expects 10,000 people to be in Rosebud June 17 to hear the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman, deliver a major policy address.

White called a meeting of all interested farm organizations to discuss plans for Freeman's visit.

"We need a large turnout to hear the Secretary," said White. Freeman will explain many points of the farm program and clear up some of the misunderstandings and questions. Many farmers in the Southwest have been given inadequate information about the Farm Bill and the Kennedy Administration's New Frontier in Agriculture.

All of the representatives from the farm organizations said they realized the importance of the Rosebud meeting and they would urge all their members to attend.

## Dairy Industry Contributes Much to America's Health

The dairy industry is big; it's essential, modern, diversified and has stability, said A. M. Meekma, extension dairy specialist, today as Texas and the nation begins the silver anniversary of June Dairy Month.

Dairying, he added, is the greatest single source of farm income in America. One out of every five dollars in cash receipts from farm products comes from dairying. The dairy industry utilizes milk production from 17 million cows on more than a million of the nation's farms. The milk is processed in approximately 35,000 dairy plants and the equivalent of 60 billion quarts, in the form of fluid milk and its products, is distributed annually to the nation's consumers. Sales of milk and dairy cattle for beef purposes in 1959, Meekma said, amounted to more than \$6 1/2 billion and represented 19.9 percent of all cash farm receipts for that year.

The dairy industry is essential because milk is nature's most nearly perfect food and the nation's favorite. Nutritionally, milk and milk products provide from 20 to 25 percent of the essential food nutrients for only 15-18 percent of the food budget, he said.

Dairy plants are marvels of engineering efficiency. Processing is done under the most exacting sanitary conditions in order to give consumers food of the highest quality, he said. Besides gleaming stainless steel plant equipment, the dairy industry is a regular customer for hundreds of millions of dollars worth of all types of processing equipment, containers, flavor-

ings, chemicals, trucks, conveyors, electric motors, office equipment, machinery and supplies plus hundreds of other products. Consumers, Meekma said, should take advantage of opportunities offered during Dairy Month to learn more about the nation's great dairy industry. He suggests a visit to a local dairy farm and a processing plant for that look behind the scenes at an industry which contributes so much to our well-being.

## "Slow Down and Live" Safety Campaign Underway

Your number one safety rule, Slow Down and Live, keynotes the current highway safety campaign being conducted by the Texas Safety Association in cooperation with local organizations and state and local officials. This is an effort to reduce the expected toll of traffic accidents during the peak summer driving months.

"More people are on the go by automobile during the summer than at any other time of the year," said J. O. Musick, Texas Safety Association General Manager and Coordinator for the Slow Down and Live program. "We want to do everything possible to bring all of them home safely from their trips."

As a part of its campaign to remind motorists of the fundamentals of safe driving, the

Texas Safety Association has distributed thousands of "Trip Cost Record" leaflets as a handy means of keeping account of automobile expenses on vacation trips. On the back of the leaflet are listed five safety reminders:

1. Keep your car in top mechanical condition. Steering gear, brakes and lights are especially important. Watch your tire pressure. Improperly inflated tires plus summer-hot roads can equal blowout disaster.
2. Keep your eye on the cars behind and in front of you. Anticipating what the other fellow may do is an essential of safe driving. Keep your distance — a car's length for every ten miles of speed.
3. Stay alert at all times. On long, monotonous drives, stop every two hours for a coffee break (iced coffee is just as effective as hot for sharpening your reflexes). Get out of the car, walk around, relax for a few minutes.
4. Share the wheel if you can. Don't fight fatigue. Pull over to the side of the road and take a rest. You'll lose a few minutes — but perhaps save your life!
5. Know and obey all traffic regulations, especially speed laws. Speed too fast for conditions is the most common cause of fatal highway accidents. SLOW DOWN AND LIVE!

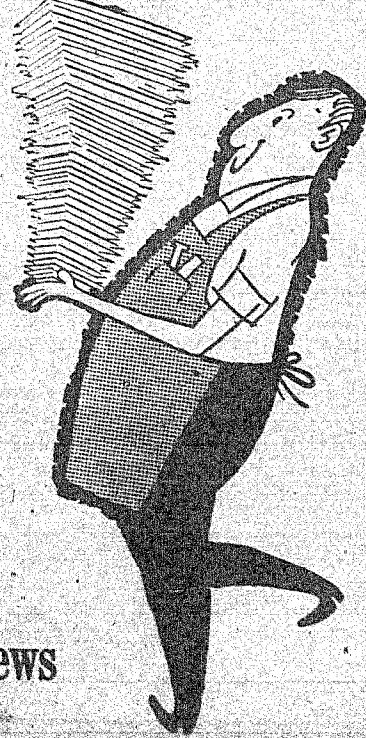
"Speed, however, is the greatest cause of highway accidents," Musick said, "so the main thing to remember when driving is Slow Down and Live."

# Straight Talk

Great Beyond  
Dear General:

How's everything down there? I've been thinking about you quite a bit lately. You got a bum rap, General, based on today's standards. Generals today get busted for teaching Americanism.

General, you were ahead of your time. Today you would be

a junior league traitor. You merely tried to sell this country out to our friends and kinfolks, to our mother country, which merely wanted to keep mothering us. Your successors are selling us out to Mother Russia, and they're not even our own folks.

The other night, General, I was in a debate on TV with, among others, the head of one of our largest theological seminaries. You may not have been able to get this TV program down there, because it wasn't on Network TV and are forced to look at it continuously, even at Ed Sullivan. After hearing this preacher-teacher advocate a non-profit, One-World brotherhood, I asked him how he differed from a Socialist. He replied that he didn't differ — he believed in Socialism. I stated that Socialism was Communism without the firing squad — the halfway house to Communism. This man who is "educating" thousands of Protestant ministers argued that Communism is the halfway house to Socialism; that we should disarm completely; that surrender is preferable to war; that the Communists have a lot to commend them; that they are progressing nicely; that we should meet them half-

way in an international Socialist Brotherhood. He said he was in Russia seven years ago and noted great improvements. I was in Russia two years ago and noted the inscription I want for my tombstone: "I'd rather be here than in Russia." If I owned Russia and Hell, I'd rent out Russia and live in Hell. Please express my apologies for borrowing that thought to General Sherman when you see him.

There are not many Communists in America. We may not have any more than they had in Cuba, Latvia, Hungary, Poland and other countries when they were enslaved. What we really need to do is to trade some of our government, church and business leaders who follow the Communist line for some real Communists. Known Communists are nothing like as dangerous as are non-Communist dupes in influential places. Of course, what counts is not how many Communists there are in government, but where they are.

Our aim is to pacify the world. The Russian aim is to own it. We will either wake up soon or we will die in our sleep. We could even be vanquished by nuclear bombs. But we're more apt to be taken over by telephone. The troops who take us over won't even be in uniform at first — unless they're United Nations troops.

Some Americans think that if we help Russia and all other backward nations lift themselves up to our level, she'll abandon her 40-year effort to destroy us.

Others whom I could name except for lack of time and money to fight a lawsuit, would sell bombs to Khrushchev and Mao if they could make a profit on them. The "empty bellies cause Communism" theme is a fraud. As Robert Welch says, "There are more Communists with Harvard accents than there are in overalls."

"It is impossible to know the truth and not be held responsible." Yet Adlai Stephenson, according to newspaper reports, recently said that raising the standard of backward countries by sending them American dollars is more important to the U. S. than even our own defense.

The enemy is waging war upon us. Unless we plan surrender, we are war. Unless we plan treason, we plan victory. The Communist policy has never changed since 1917: To bring about through any means possible the universal Revolution to establish the universal State. Many non-Communist Americans are promoting the same.

"Containment" failed, as it was bound to. Coexistence will fail also, because it is an immoral, impossible, gutless fraud. As Russian General Zhukov said, coexistence is as senseless as fried snowballs. Yet we've been served fried snowballs daily by our leaders for 20 years.

Possibly for the remarkable insight and foresight which made him proclaim in a 1950 speech that the Chinese Revolution was "not Russian in essence" and "did not aim at dictatorship." Dean Rusk was rewarded with the job of Secretary of State. Rusk declared that Mao Tse Tung was China's George Washington. He compared favorably the Chinese Revolution with the American revolt against the British.

High-placed officials in our State Department, and Foreign Service bureaucrats, have defeated our friends like the great Yugoslav Mikhailovich and brought enemies like Tito in to murder him; helped destroy Batista, one of our few Caribbean friends, so that longtime Communist Fidel Castro could establish a New Communist Frontier 90 miles off our shores. Robert Welch and other patriots warned that Castro had been a Communist all his adult life and was taking orders from the Kremlin, but leftwing press, radio and TV commentators called Castro the "George Washington of Cuba."

The list of "accidents" is long. Those accidents were planned that way, General. Many of our leaders who planned it that way are still in office. As you well know, General, men, not conditions, determine our fate. Accidents don't happen. They are caused. Stupidity is not consistent. Accidents are not treason, and treason is not an accident.

The dictionary defines treason as "adhering to the enemy, giving aid and comfort to the enemy." But we are revolutionizing our dictionary, Bible, Constitution, morals, schools, and meaning of treason. Soon traitor may mean "one who criticizes a government official who gives aid and comfort to the enemy." Treason is a horrid word, like spit. And Castro spits on us because of treason within our own ranks. If freedom dies "state-side," it dies worldwide, probably for centuries. I'd rather be hung for a traitor opposing tyranny than be the hero of a dictatorship. That being the case, I may see you soon.

## Dairy Cows Like Good Food

Dairy cows don't like scorched food any more than people do. At least the cows at the Tyler Experiment Station don't, reports Shannon Carpenter, area dairy husbandman.

This was discovered when station personnel started using a new purchase of cottonseed meal. They noticed a slight scorched odor, but they didn't think too much about it. When the first batch of feed mixed

with this meal was fed to the herd, however, about half of the cows refused to eat and they all indicated that the feed was different from what they had been eating. After six months there were still four cows that would not eat all of their food, Carpenter continues.

Personnel at the station traced the origin of the cottonseed meal, and Carpenter says he believes the scorched or burned odor was caused by excess cooking needed to make the meal from wet seed.

Carpenter points out that commercial dairymen should watch for feed made from burned or scorched cottonseed meal, because the use of such feeds will cut down milk production. The production loss is due to the lower intake of total digestible nutrients.

This was illustrated by a test run on the four cows that refused to eat all of their feed after six months. When they were fed a mix containing cottonseed meal that did not have the scorched odor, they began to eat much better and their milk production increased from an average of 21.05 pounds per day to 24.85 pounds. This increase was shown in just seven days.

"Remember," Carpenter concludes, "if you expect your dairy cows to produce, feed them good feed."

## Biologists Plan Publication of White Bass Study

Austin — Publication of white bass (sandies) information following a four-year study on Lake Texoma, now is being prepared by the Inland Fisheries Division of the Game and Fish Commission. This study was begun in 1954 by Ed Bonn, Lake Texoma biologist. It now is being coordinated by Ken Jurgens, assistant director.

Many interesting phases in the life of this prolific species will be covered in the published report, which will be used by biologist.

The study was made on the basis of 3,254 tagged fish in the lake. Of that number, 348 later were taken by fishermen and the tags returned.

Studies on these indicated distance traveled by the fish, their growth, etc. The maximum distance traveled by the tagged fish was 200 miles.

Lake Texoma long has been one of the white bass hotspots of the nation. The creel limit in Texas is 25 per day. On the Oklahoma side there is no limit.

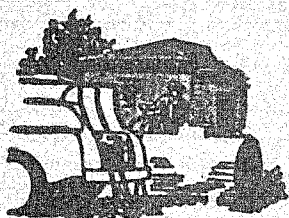
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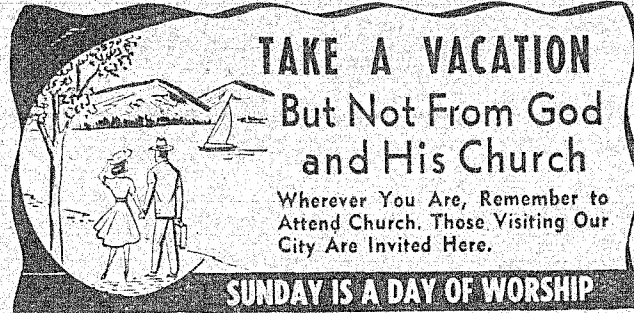

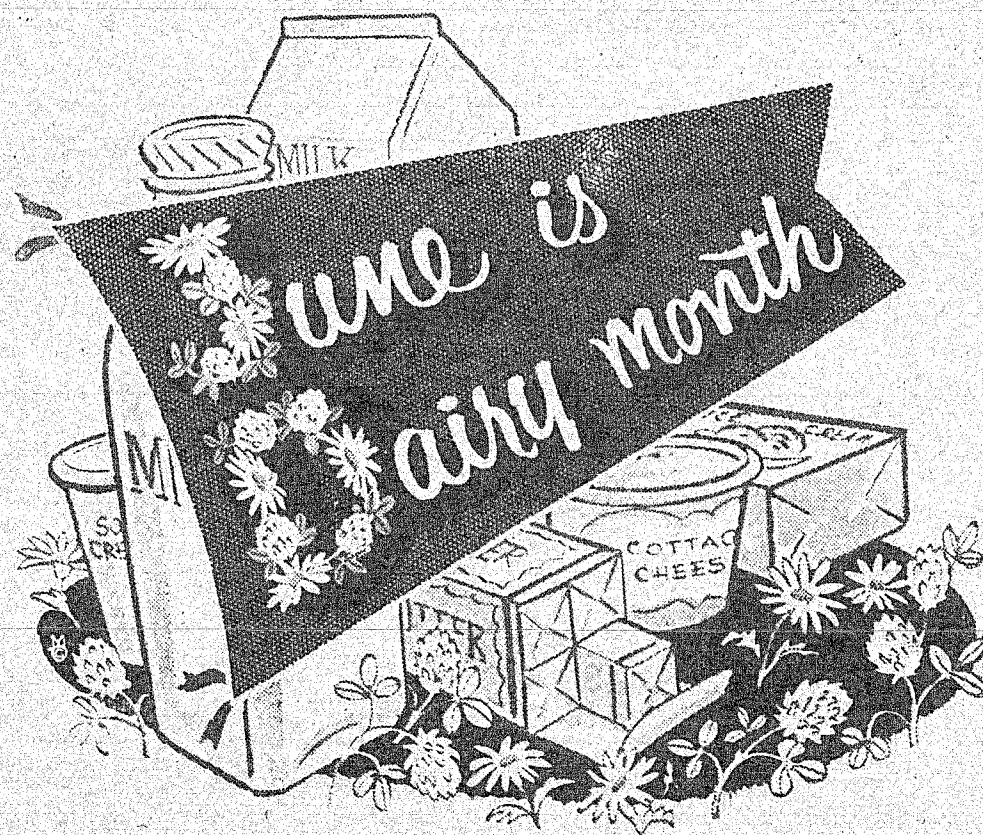

## Watershed Loan for Reservoir at Brady Approved

A \$1,485,000 watershed loan to the city of Brady, Texas, to help finance construction of a reservoir for flood control and water supply storage has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced recently.

Brady, population approximately 5,350, is presently supplied with water from a series of wells that are not reliable for the community's future needs.

Construction of the reservoir requires a 108-foot-high dam. The drain area covers 268 square miles. The reservoir will have a 90,000 acre-foot capacity and will be built near Brady on Brady Creek.

Total cost of the reservoir will be \$2,424,000. The Federal Government, through USDA's Soil Conservation Service, will share the costs of engineering and construction to the extent of \$950,000. The balance will be provided by local sponsors of the project.

The Farmers Home Administration loan is to be repaid within 40 years. The interest rate is 2.632 percent. The interest rate on all such loans is determined by the average rate payable by the Treasury on its marketable public obligations outstanding at the beginning of the fiscal year in which the loan is made.

The watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Program provides that local organizations and the Federal Government will share the costs of small watershed development. Organizations needing credit to pay their shares of the costs may apply to the Farmers Home Administration for loan assistance.

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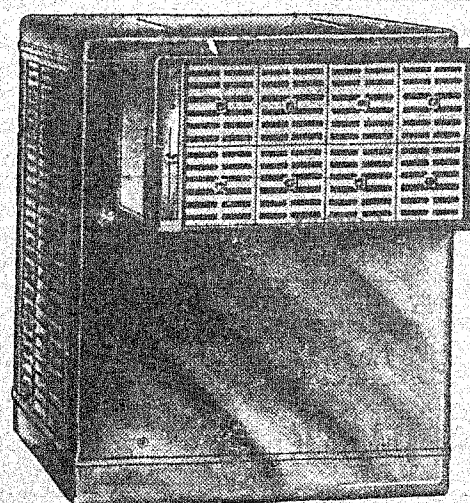

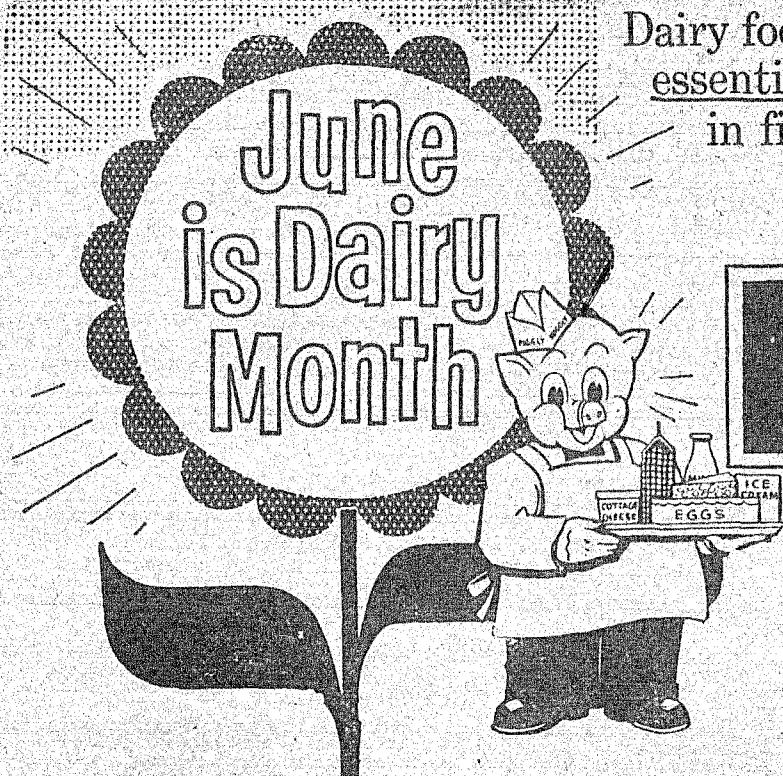

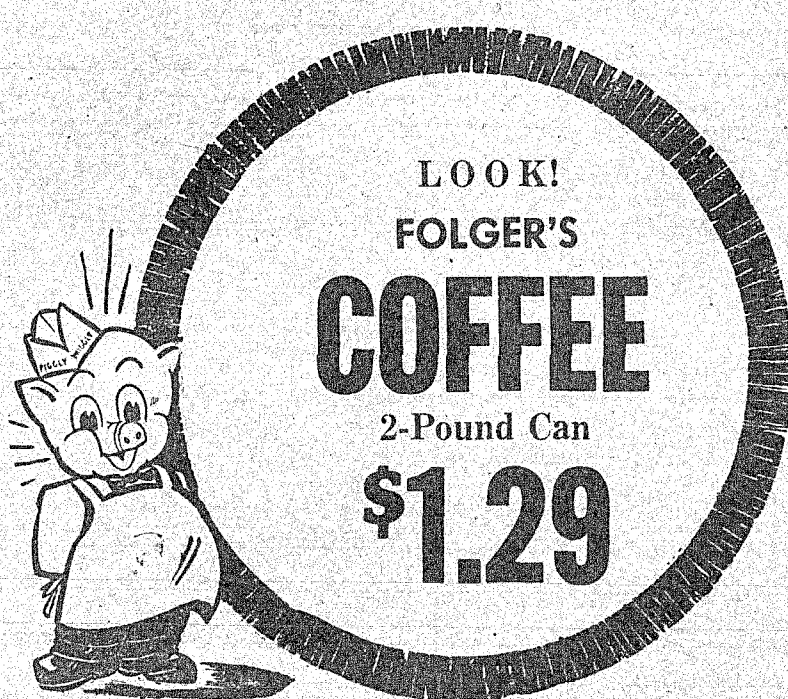
