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Even Men of Destiny Muddle Through

One of the hardest things for our ordinary citizens to understand is that the great people of the world—the statesmen and strategists who have our destiny in their hands—are all blood relations of Mr. Micawber.

Mr. Micawber, as you will doubtless recall, was forever hopefully waiting for something to turn up.

We like to think of the Stanley Baldwins, the Adolf Hitlers, and all the rest as strong, far-seeing men who know exactly what they and their countries are going to be doing three years from now. But once in a while someone gets unusually frank and we find that world politics is largely just a matter of muddling through—and, like Mr. Micawber, hoping that something will turn up.

Half a dozen of America's most famous foreign correspondents were brought together in New York recently by the magazine, Editor and Publisher, for a round-table discussion. Among them was Frazier Hunt, who not long ago toured Europe for this newspaper and NEA Service; and Mr. Hunt was asked what, in his opinion, might be the prospects for peace.

"I imagine I talked to a thousand people over in Europe," remarked Mr. Hunt, "and no one could give me a sane and sure answer as to how the Italian situation will be solved, in regard to the Mediterranean and the Red Sea, and Italy's obvious threat to the road to India and to possible control of the headwaters of the Nile."

No such answer was forthcoming because no definite decision has yet been made. In other words, nobody knows.

The Italian question, as Mr. Hunt pointed out, is like the question of the supposedly approaching conflict between Russia and Germany. The responsible people—in England, and elsewhere—simply have not made up their minds.

"I don't believe England has made that decision yet," added Mr. Hunt, in regard to the Russo-German rivalry. "I think she will probably stall along, meeting each individual issue as it comes up."

Now all this is illumination worth having; a reminder that the statesmen of the world are very much like our humble selves, after all, in that they are adrift in a current whose force and direction are unpredictable.

They cannot make definite long-range plans; they cannot tell just where they are going. Muddling through and hoping that something will turn up are about all that is left for them.

And that, after all, is not as discouraging as it might be. When the future is as uncertain as it is today, a program needs to be flexible. Driving at full speed in the dark is not the best way to meet such a situation.

Mr. Micawber's way may not have much to recommend it, but there is this about it: it does save people from the prospect of a wrong decision at a time when a wrong decision might be unimaginably costly.

America did a good job when the doughboys went overseas to protect its allied loans. At last reports, they were as hale as ever.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—It might seem funny if Congress and the administration had to turn the business of saving the farmers over to Interior Secretary Harold Ickes, but the idea isn't as absurd as some people might suppose it to be.

The attempt to graft the AAA onto the soil conservation act is a special interest to Ickes and his pals, because Ickes conceived the conservation plan, sold it by making the public "soil erosion conscious," built the Soil Erosion Service, wrote the act, lobbied it through congressional committees—and then the whole show was snatched away from him just before the final vote on the act.

The old NIRA, in its public works section, provided for erosion control. FWA was trying hard to get some money spent. Feeding cash into rural areas proved especially difficult.

Ickes was especially concerned with erosion, because it had damaged Indian lands under his care, so he decided to allot \$5,000,000 to proving erosion could be controlled. As chief of the project, he appointed H. H. Bennett, who for 25 years had been shouting—unheeded—the dangers of erosion.

MOST bureaus in the Department of Agriculture fought for control of the five million. Unable to decide rival claims of the Forest Service, Extension Service, the Bureau of Agricultural Engineering, Chemistry and Soils, and others, Undersecretary Tugwell finally concurred with Ickes' idea that the new service be kept in the Interior Department.

Plans were laid. William A. F.

Stephenson was named chief of operations in January, 1934, and by June the SES was spending \$800,000 a month and was busy with 4000 employees on 40 projects of erosion control.

Ickes boosted the allotment to \$20,000,000. The force was doubled by fall.

Ickes and his subordinates preached erosion control, reams of propaganda were sent out, the country began to get the idea, and soon nearly every farm county was holding for a demonstration project.

Timing his plan with the first big dust storm, Ickes decided the service should be permanent and had legislation drafted. His men preached the idea to Congress and his bill was reported favorably.

THEN some persons in the Agriculture department got to work. One day while Ickes was in Florida, Roosevelt authorized Tugwell to introduce a resolution to transfer funds and personnel to Agriculture, at a meeting of the special public works board.

The board, of which Ickes was chairman, voted the transfer unanimously and Roosevelt signed an order to that effect. Ickes read about it in the newspapers.

The bill setting up the Soil Conservation Service, was amended by substituting "Agriculture" for "Interior" at the last minute.

The Ickes group thinks the service hasn't amounted to anything since. But the fact that the act is being administered under Secretary Wallace saved the administration from having to appeal to Ickes for an act under which to operate a farm program.

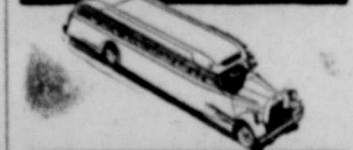
EXEMPTIONS ALLOWED COUPLES MARRIED DURING TAXABLE YEAR

Taxpayers should note that under the Revenue Act of 1934 the credit for dependents as well as the personal exemption is required to be prorated where a change of status occurs during the taxable year and that these credits are allowable not only for the purpose of computing the normal tax, but also the surtax. A fractional part of a month is to be disregarded unless it amounts to more than half a month, in which case it is considered a month.

For example, a single man and a single woman who were married on July 20, 1935, and were living

together on the last day of the taxable year, may file a joint return. If they file their return or returns on the basis of the calendar year, they would be entitled to a personal exemption of \$2,208.34, which is seven-twelfths of \$1,000 for the husband while single, plus seven-twelfths of \$1,000 for the wife

Ranchers in the Bracada, wild brushy country between the Nueces and the Rio Grande, have found a use for these vicious saber-toothed wild hogs that roam the area.

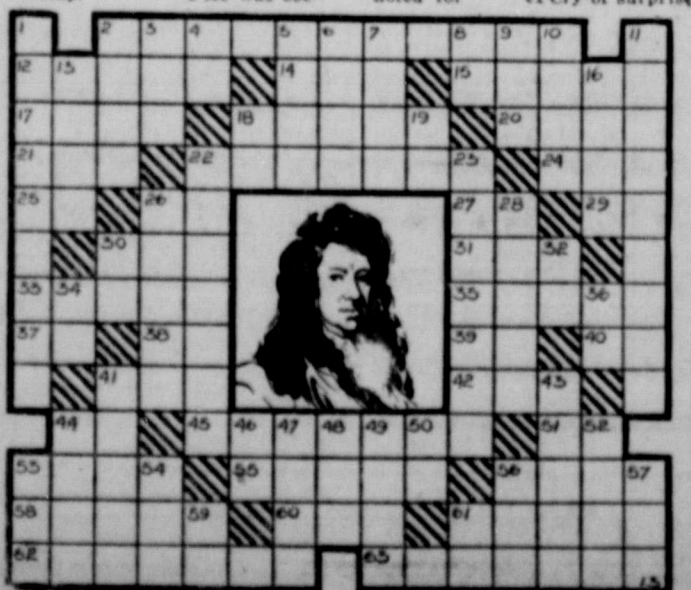
"They make the best watchdogs in the world," says M. B. Burks, who recently brought several carloads of hogs into the Fort Worth market.

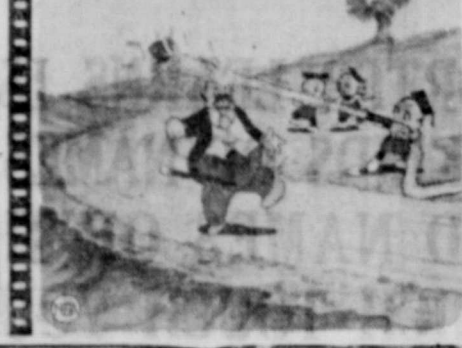

The two got much valuable information from the county agent and both are enthusiastic boosters for a program of improving the standards of Eastland county livestock. Both were surprised at figures shown them which showed the low percentage of pure bred cattle in the county.

The Chamber of Commerce is to sponsor a program of feeding calves, and anyone interested has been urged to contact the Chamber of Commerce for further details.

In talking over the project the county agent said that everyone was wanting to know a way to make quick money.

"Often," he said, "a boy will take a pure bred calf, feed it for a few months at little cost, and then sell it for as high as \$2,000 to \$2,500. Of course all do not bring these prices, but sometimes one does when a cattle breeder becomes interested. Then if no such prices can be obtained a good profit can be made and it is not nearly as much of a gamble as most business ventures."

A boys' calf club is to be organized in Ranger soon to interest the boys of this section in feeding calves and getting them ready for the livestock markets, and any boy interested will be given full details at the Chamber of Commerce office.
