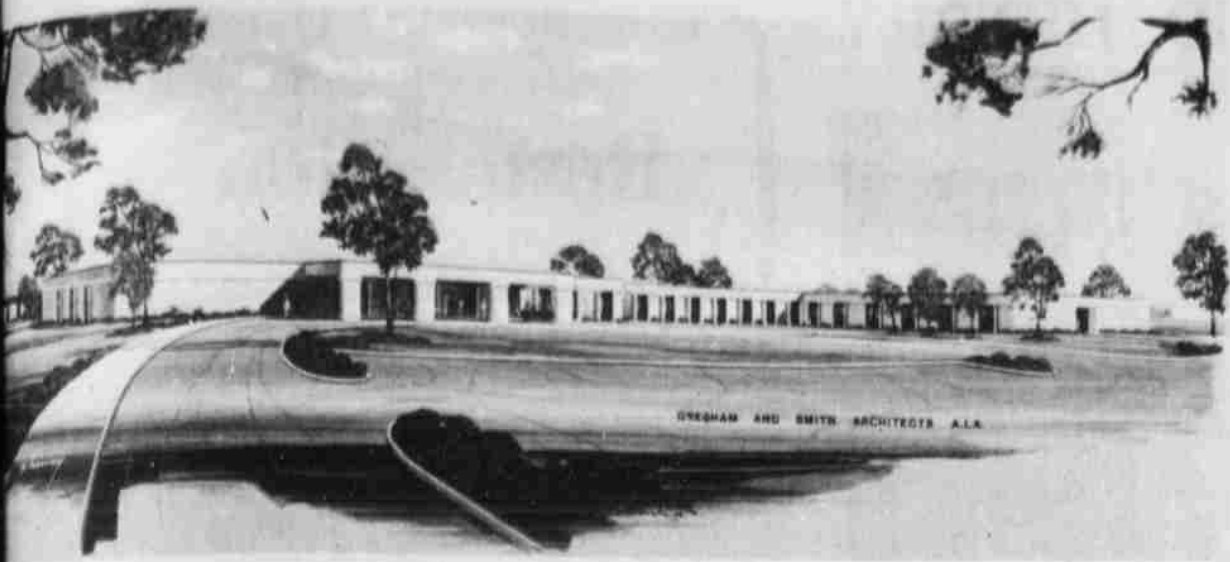




PROPOSED NEW HOSPITAL FOR LITTLEFIELD

New hospital contract signed

The Lamb County Hospital Authority signed a contract with Hospital Management Corporation Tuesday night to develop a 65-75 bed hospital.

The new facility is scheduled to open approximately July 1, 1978. No site has been selected, but one of the top choices would be at the corner of the Loop and south Sunset, near the maroon and white water tower.

The new facility will be financed by revenue bonds and no taxes will be involved. The Hospital Authority has no power to levy taxes for the building or operation of the new hospital.

The total cost of the project is \$3,920,000. The building itself has a \$2,350,000 price tag and equipment totals \$850,000.

The new hospital will be one-level brick structure with an expansion capability to 150. An intensive care unit and cardiac care unit will be vital parts of the facility. The building will encom-

pass 47,000 square feet, or just over one acre.

Both Littlefield Hospital and Medical Arts Hospital will close when the new medical center opens. Littlefield Hospital was originally built in 1936 and Medical Arts in 1942, and both have been privately owned by doctors. Clinics at both hospitals will remain open just as they are now.

The revenue bond is expected to carry a BBB rating and the interest rate will be approximately nine per cent. Without a professional hospital management company managing the Littlefield facility, a bond issue would probably not be rated and would be extremely difficult to sell.

Hospital Management is a subsidiary of Hospital Affiliates International, which owns or manages 23 hospitals in Texas and has just completed hospitals similar to the one to be constructed here in Sweetwater and Tom Ball. Under the contract, HAI will receive \$130,000 annually for managing the hospital. However, they will be paid only if the hospital has a profitable operation.

J. E. Chisholm, chairman of the hospital board said, "We have talked to at least 10 different companies over the past three years, and this is the only one who has presented a program we can

live with. We feel confident in this company. They have an outstanding track record.

"We are pleased to have secured the services of Hospital Management. We feel that they will bring the best possible health care delivery system to the citizens of Littlefield and the surrounding area."

Hospital management will assist the Hospital Authority in the development design, and construction of the new hospital, as well as aid in obtaining financing, staffing and equipment and will manage the hospital for five years.

The company will assist doctor recruitment. Littlefield has been faced with an impending medical crisis— of the 11 local doctors, only two are under 50 years of age.

Swine Flu innoculations continue this weekend

Swine Flu immunizations got underway in Lamb County Sunday, and the remainder are to be given Friday, Saturday and Sunday of this weekend.

More than 300 turned out for the clinic at Olton, and no reports have been received from the Sudan clinic.

The Amherst Clinic will begin at 9 a.m. Friday at the South Plains Hospital, with Dr. J. W. Chatwell in charge of the inoculations. That program continues from 9 to noon and from 1 to 6 p.m.

In Littlefield, Dr. H. M. Hinkley Jr. will be in charge of the clinic Saturday, Dec. 11, from 12 noon to 5 p.m. in the Lamb County Ag and Community Center on South Hall Avenue.

Springlake-Earth's clinic will be directed by Dr. Jack Hillman of Plainview from 12 noon to 4 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 12, in the Springlake-Earth School cafeteria.

Sponsor of the clinics in Lamb County is the South Plains Health Providers.

To date more than a million Texans have now been immunized against swine flu, according to officials of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

It is now expected that the statewide flu immunization drive will continue at least until sometime in January.

When the national immunization program got underway, about the first of October, a series of reported deaths among people who had been vaccinated aroused considerable alarm. Medical authorities have agreed that none of the deaths could be attributed to the flu vaccine.

According to Dr. Raymond T. Moore, deputy director of the Texas Department of Health Resources, "Very careful medical examinations were made in follow-up of a number of reported deaths— about 35. In every single case, death was attributed to an underlying illness, in almost all cases an illness that had been well-known for some time. The

vaccine was implicated in no case."

Furthermore, Dr. Moore said, "There have been no serious reactions to the vaccine reported in Texas. After extensive testing of the new vaccine last spring, medical experts predicted that about two percent of the people receiving the flu shots would experience a mild fever, headache, and general malaise for a day or two." Texas Health officials say that the reports they have received suggest that an even lower percentage of people receiving the vaccine have had such a reaction. About one-third of those vaccinated report that their arm is sore where the vaccine is injected; the soreness lasts anywhere from one to three days.

Until about mid-November, public response to the flu program was mediocre not only in Texas but across the country. Health officials felt that one reason for the poor response might be the complete lack of swine flu cases since the

Lamb County sheriff's officers and Texas Highway troopers arrested eight over the weekend. A Lubbock woman was picked up by a bonding company for theft on an affirmation from the court of criminal appeals. She was transferred to Huntsville Tuesday morning to serve a sentence of two to four years.

Christmas mailing deadlines are here

Deadline are here for early Christmas mailing, according to Littlefield Postmaster George Thompson.

The deadline for mailing domestic parcels was Friday, Dec. 3, and Christmas cards and letters should be mailed no later than Dec. 10— especially if they have to go any great distance.

Seven persons were arrested Sunday. A Springlake man was charged with drunk and disturbance and fined \$27.50. Two Littlefield men, a Sudan man and a Lubbock man were all charged with driving while intoxicated. The Sudan man made a \$1,000 bond. Punishment for the other three was all set at fines of \$100 plus 30 days in jail, probated six months.

A Littlefield man was charged with possession of marijuana and being drunk. He was fined \$100 and given 10 days in jail, probated six months.

An Amherst man was charged \$27.50 on a drunk charges.

Three burglaries and a theft were reported to county officers. Jerry Stelter of Lubbock reported the theft of a five horse power air compressor and fittings, a space

heater, and plumbing pipes from a farm northwest of Spade. The missing items are valued at \$600.

At Amherst, two businesses were broken into Monday. The Radio and TV Service at Amherst reported an air conditioner was torn off, but nothing was taken. Amherst Variety reported that building was entered through the air conditioner, but nothing was reported missing.

Ray Copeland, two miles south of Olton, reported a burglary with \$1,300 worth of guns and belongings gone. Items reported stolen included a record player, a 12 gauge automatic, a 12 gauge over and under, an old Browning double barrel, a Barreta 12 gauge, a Remington 20 gauge single barrel, a Remington .22 pump rifle, a gold self winding watch and a radio.

Kevin Bell earns special award

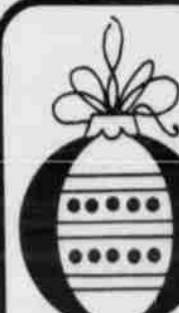

initial outbreak at Fort Dix, N.J. last February.

Public health officials have repeatedly emphasized that the public should not wait until an epidemic starts before getting their shots. As Gee explained, "It takes probably a couple of weeks or so to get full protection after an immunization, and the transmission of the flu virus is very rapid. You could be sick long before you were able to profit from the shot, once an epidemic is on hand."

Health officials also have insisted that the flu shots are safe for nearly everyone, including pregnant women, the elderly, and people with various chronic illnesses.

In fact, a special vaccine providing protection against both swine flu and the familiar Asian-type flu has been distributed specifically for the elderly and the chronically ill.

In general, only people who are allergic to eggs have been discouraged from getting the flu shot (because the vaccine is produced by growing the virus in eggs).

In specific cases, public health authorities say that older people and persons with chronic illnesses should rely on their individual physicians' advice as to whether they should be immunized.

Texas health officials point out that the immunization program has been endorsed by the American and Texas medical associa-

tions and that many private physicians have participated actively, not only providing the flu shots to their own patients but also in conducting local clinics.

A reader passed this information on to us about eye injuries caused by exploding car batteries. The next cold morning the car won't start you might be ahead to remember the following highlights of the article.

Last year 8,000 people received eye injuries from batteries. The most common injuries were chemical burns of the surfaces and corneal window of the eye, either from exploding batteries, acid spilled or splashed, or crusts from terminal posts chipped off and sent flying into the eye.

The acid can get into the eye in different ways, but two-third of the reviewed were caused by explosions. Motorists should never light a match in order to look into the car battery when it doesn't work, because it could explode.

A spark or flame can ignite gas escaping from the battery and result in a bomb-type explosion.

Remember to be careful when carrying, cleaning and using jumper cables on your car.

START A NEW holiday tradition. Instead of serving pumpkin pie with holiday meals, try Pumpkin Orange Cheesecake. The creamy pumpkin filling topped with sour cream and orange marmalade makes a mouthwatering dessert. It's the perfect way to end a holiday meal.

PUMPKIN-ORANGE
CHEESECAKE

1-1/2 cups gingersnap crumbs
1/2 cup finely chopped pecans
3 Tbsp. sugar
6 Tbsp. melted butter
1 carton [16 oz.] creamed cottage cheese [small curd]
4 eggs
3 pkgs. [8 oz. each] cream cheese, softened
1 cup sugar
2 Tbsp. flour
1 tsp. grated orange rind
1-1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. salt
1 can [1 lb.] pumpkin
1 pint dairy sour cream
1/4 cup orange marmalade
1 orange

Mix gingersnap crumbs, pecans and 3 Tbsp. sugar; stir in butter; Press mixture evenly on bottom and 1 1/2 inches up side of 10-inch springform pan.

Bake at 300 degrees 10 minutes; cool. Mix cottage cheese and eggs in blender on high speed until smooth.

Beat cream cheese, 1 cup sugar, flour, grated orange rind, 1 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice, salt and cottage cheese mixture in large mixing bowl until smooth. Fold in pumpkin. Pour mixture into baked gingersnap crust. Bake at 300 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

Turn oven off; with oven door ajar, let cake cool in oven one hour. Remove from oven. Mix sour cream and orange marmalade; spread over cheesecake.

Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes; cool slightly and refrigerate.

To serve, remove sides of springform pan. Thinly slice orange into rings; remove pulp. Decorate cake with rind cut into semicircles. Yield: 1 10-inch cheesecake (approximately 12 servings).

DECORATE the Christmas tree with attractive, edible ornaments.

Heat 6 cups Quaker Puffed Rice in preheated moderate oven (350° F.) 10 minutes; pour into greased bowl. Melt together 4 cups miniature marshmallows and 1/4 cup butter or margarine in a heavy saucepan over low heat; stir in 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon red food coloring.

Pour over cereals, stirring until evenly coated. With greased hands, shape to form 10 to 12 balls. Cool, then wrap each ball in plastic wrap and tie with ribbon; hang on Christmas tree.

On a cold snowy day make

"snowball" treats using above recipe. Omit red food coloring. While puffed rice mixture is still warm, roll in coconut.

If shaped balls get too cool for coconut to adhere, just reheat them a few moments in a moderate (350° F.) oven.

Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350° F.) 15 minutes.

While warm, sprinkle additional confectioners sugar generously over cookies. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.

Restoration

THE CONCEPT of "restoration" is very important. In fact, it is essential to the maintenance of most effective living. It is much better and far more helpful than the feeling of weariness and discouragement which the realities of life can cause.

We do have a choice about how we accept the challenge of life.

Of course, there will be times when we think we want to maintain the status quo; but this cannot be. The meaning, and satisfaction, and rewards in living are found in our acceptance of "restoration" as a working principle.

WE MAY TRY to establish a life-pattern, a family, an educational program, a community, a business institution, a state, or a nation with a view of our work being finished; but this was not meant to be.

We must plan for continuing upkeep through the process of "restoration". This includes the ideas of re-establishment; putting back into existence or use; repairing; renewing; reconstructing; or up-dating.

The life process itself, for each one of us, is one of "restoration" until eventually we expire.

WE MUST NEVER GROW weary with the obvious arrangement which requires some sort of "restoration" again, and again, and again. It is so much better than having to accept a hopeless and helpless condition of decline and deterioration about which we can do nothing.

Of course, in order to be most effective, it is necessary that we fully understand and accept this basic law of meaningfulness.

The law will work successfully unless we postpone its application past the time of indicated need.

IT IS NECESSARY that we ourselves fully aware of the need and the possibilities of "restoration".

This awareness will help come much of the discouragement and defeatism which are devitalizing. Nearly everything the living experience may be weakened, depreciated or lost; but there is a very effective way to cope with this reality.

Most all things, to some degree can be restored; re-established; repaired; or renewed. Some can be "restored" to the highest possible level of usefulness.

RATHER THAN WORRY complain, we must be busy "restoration". We can restore which has admittedly made strong and prosperous.

The concepts of hard work, thrift, good management and responsibility can be "restored". The value system built around sound morals can be "restored".

In fact, a lost life can be "restored". We can "restore" declining moral standards, and time-tested principles of law order. If we want to do so, we All is not lost, yet.

CITIES CAN BE "restored". Land, wasted by misuse, can be "restored". Oftentimes, declining health can be "restored"; broken homes can often be "restored".

Certainly, there are limitations but the possibilities of "restoration" are very real, and much of our strength and hope must support in this knowledge.

TOPPING:

FOR CRUST, combine oats, butter and sugar. Firmly press onto bottom and sides, approximately 2 1/2 inches high, of ungreased 9-inch spring form pan. Bake in preheated oven (350° F.) about 10 minutes. Cool.

FOR FILLING, combine cream cheese, sugar and lemon juice, mixing at medium speed on electric mixer until well blended. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Blend in sour cream. Pour into crust. Cut away upper portion of the sides of the crust until even with filling, letting excess crust fall into the filling. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350° F.) 50 minutes.

FOR TOPPING, combine sour cream, sugar and vanilla; mix well. Spread over cheesecake. Continue baking about 10 minutes. Loosen cake from rim of pan; cool before removing rim. Chill several hours before serving. Makes 9-inch cheesecake.
