City Increases Police Pay

The City Council made a decision to increase the salaries of Abernathy policemen at a meeting held Monday night.

Salaries will be increased for police officers from the present salary of \$900 a month to \$1,100 monthly. The police chief pay has been upped from \$1,100 to \$1,250 a month. The raises came after Jim Hicks confronted the council with four alternative pay raise plans.

Several other topics of business were discussed at the meeting.

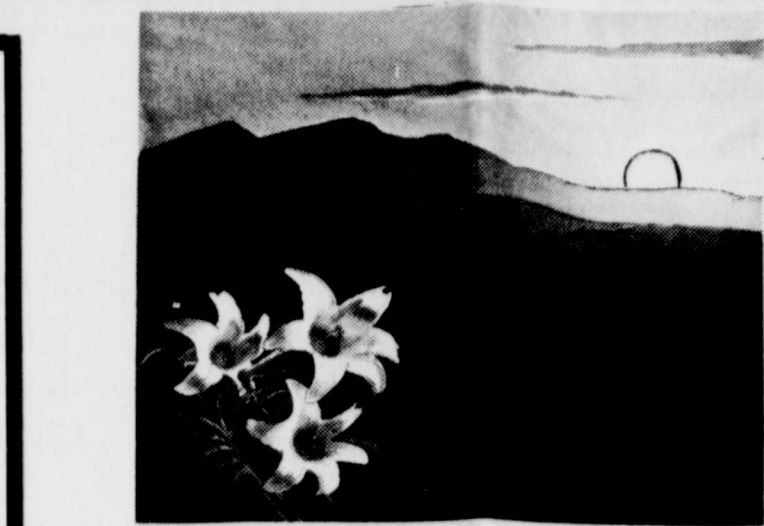
The City Council officially approved the city April 4 election ballots. Then the Oath-Of-Office was conducted for Mayor Pete Thompson and Aldermen Hoppy Toler and A.C. Harris. They were sworn into office by Otelia Clement. Harold Thompson expressed his appreciation and enjoyment to the council on working with them the past term.

City Wrecking Service

J.C. Harrell confronted the council to discuss city wrecking service. When a vehicle is towed from the site of an accident, or abandoned cars are towed, police officers are allowed to contact anyone that has a wrecker. Harrell proposed that the council trade out calls to each wrecking service every month. Therefore, all businesses that provide towing services would be recognized when the need for one occurred.

The standard tow fee is \$17.50 within the city limits and for any jobs that take an hour or longer the fee is \$25 an hour. In Lubbock, different businesses that provide tow services are called each week. The one towing the vehicles that week must be available 24 hours a day for that week.

It was decided by the council that all businesses in Abernathy that provide tow services would be contacted and those who provide this service will be

switched out each month to provide towing services for Abernathy.

Sewage Problem

Clayton Yeager, the city engineer, informed city officials that there is a need to improve the current sewer system or to build another one. It was discussed at Monday's meeting on what

action should be taken. Currently, federal funds are available for city sewer improvements of up to 80% of the cost.

It was decided that this issue would be discussed in a special meeting Tuesday 21, at 5p.m.

Hoppy Toler was then elected Mayor-Pro-Tem. This position enables Hoppy

to take over the duties of the mayor if he is not able to resume city duties because of sickness, death or some other reason.

Mosquito Spraying Fee Increased

Rates were increased for summer mosquito applications to be sprayed in Abernathy. They were upped from \$1 to \$1.25 that will be added to each water meter bill each month for the next six months.

Every time the city is sprayed, an area of 1200 acres is covered in and around Abernathy. Last year the price averaged out to cost 69 cents per acre. This summer it will cost 71 cents per acre for each application.

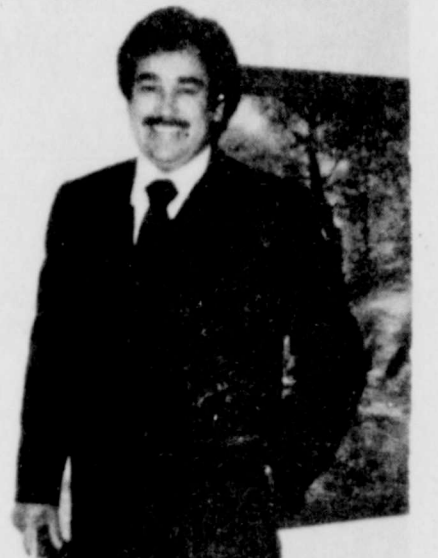
Southwest Aerial Service will be spraying the mosquitos this summer as they have in the past. They will spray with a twin engine airplane. Spraying will occur when mosquitos get noticeably thick. Spraying will not take place on windy or extremely hot days because the Technical Malathion chemical sprayed would get diluted and would not be effective enough to do the job.

Each application will cost the city \$852 and it is hoped that enough spraying fees will be collected to spray the city 9 times this summer.

Stray dogs were then discussed. \$5 is given to all citizens for every stray dog they bring in. Seven strays were brought in Monday. This is possibly the most strays ever brought in on one day. Usually one dog is brought in each day.

Strays are kept by the city for a period of three days after they are brought in. If no one claims them after three days, they are put to sleep and buried.

Citizens of Abernathy are allowed to sit in on the regular meetings held by the city council. People wishing to confront the city council with any matters of local concern are urged to do so. You will be heard and your complaint or topic will be discussed.

The 42 players who participated in the tournament received some 20 prizes. Some of the prize winners wished not to mention how they won their prize.

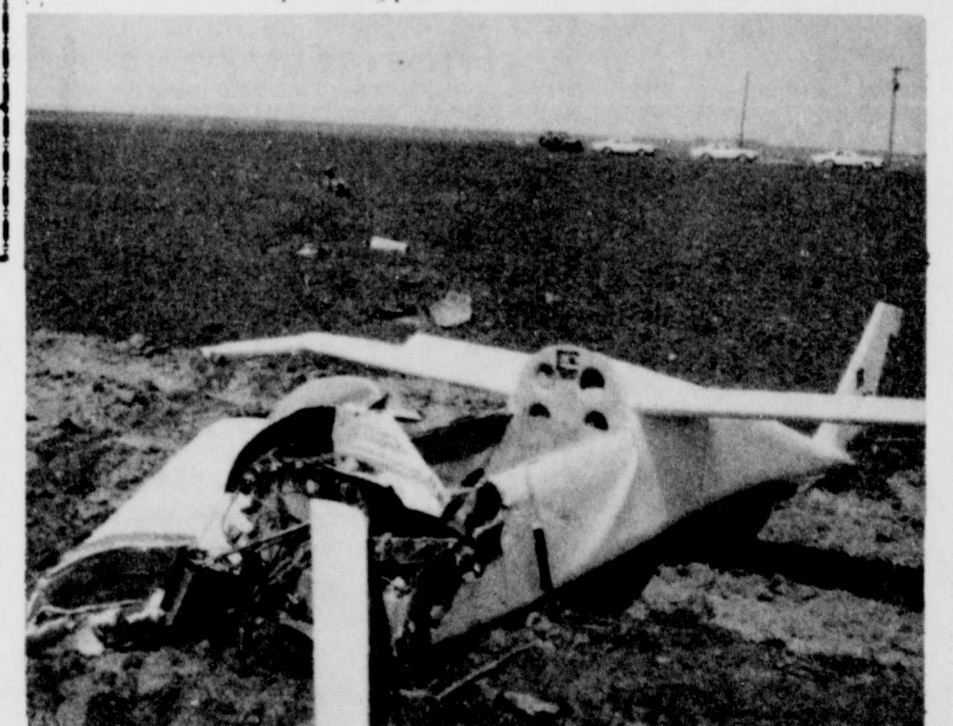
The various prizes that were not given to anyone were auctioned off to the highest bidder.

Leland Phillips Provides 30th Year Of Service to Coop

Leland Phillips has set a record for the number of years as manager of a cooperative organization in Abernathy. It could possibly be a record in the State of Texas.

Phillips has served Abernathy Farmers Co-op Gins for 30 years. He began his duties as manager in March 1951, the year that he and his wife, Annie, and their son, Jerry, moved to Abernathy from Vernon.

Leland, whose first name is Grover, was born in Parker County, Texas. He finished high school at Odell. He and Annie Thomas were married November 19, 1932, in Altus, Okla. He farmed at Odell and worked in a cotton gin before coming to Abernathy.

Phillips and his wife are members of the Abernathy First Baptist Church. Both have served as Sunday School teachers, and he is a deacon in the church. He is a member of Abernathy Lodge No. 1142 A.F.&A.M., and he served as Worshipful Master of the Odell Lodge when there was a Masonic lodge in that community.

Mrs. Phillips served as City Hostess in Abernathy for eight years before resigning that post in 1978. She also has served as president of the Women's Missionary Union. Mrs. Phillips was active in YWA work when they resided in Vernon.

Jerry Phillips, Leland's son, attended schools in Odell and Vernon before coming to Abernathy, where he was graduated from AHS in 1959. Jerry attended Texas A&M University, Way-

land Baptist College, and Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene where he received his BA degree. His wife is the former Lynn Middleton of Shallowater. Lynn is a sister of Mrs. Wade Attebury of Abernathy. Their mother is Mrs. Charlotte Middleton of Shallowater. Jerry and Lynn reside in Big Spring, where he is comptroller for the Garrett Estate, oil, ranching, farming and investments.

Since Leland became manager, Abernathy Farmers Co-op Gins have turned a profit every year except two, when cotton crops were short. During the 30 years as manager, Leland has served with a large number of directors. Ralph Davis, currently a director and vice president, was on the board when Leland came here. Ralph has served a lot of terms; not all were consecutive. This also applies to the current president, Harvey Lutrick. Billie Harrison has served in his present office of secretary for 28 of the 29 years he has been a gin director. Also, J.F. Buske, A.L. Stone, Jr., Guy Bartlett, and Coy Phillips have served as directors a number of years.

Phillips and the directors over the years have kept the Abernathy Farmers Co-op Gins modernized to provide cotton producers the best of service. There was one gin plant when Phillips came here. Now there are two to offer faster processing. Also, the firm has added complete equipment to handle cotton modules, from picking them up in the fields to feeding the

cotton to the gin plants.

Leland Phillips has served in all offices in Abernathy Lions Club, and currently is secretary-treasurer. He has served as president and as the director of the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce. Leland is one of the many men who work in Abernathy's FFA-4-H Clubs Livestock Show each year. He has served as election judge in school trustee elections for several years.

Leland is a member of the Texas Cooperative Ginners Association, and has served as president of that organization two times. Currently, he is serving this state-wide group as secretary. He is serving as District 15 director of the Texas Cotton Ginners Association.

Leland is serving as Director of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives of Austin, and on these Regional Cooperatives: Plains Co-op Oil Mill, Farmers Co-op Compress and Growers Seed, all of Lubbock, and the Plainview Co-op Compress.

His office walls show a number of awards and plaques, including one making him an Honorary Chapter Member of the Future Farmers of America, one for Texas Co-op Ginners of the Year for 1963, and a Distinguished Service Award from the Texas Federation of Cooperatives for 1978.

Leland earned an Award for Outstanding Citizen in 1975-76, from the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce for the numerous services he provided to the community as a citizen and a leader.

The couple plans to be married July 3 in the First Baptist Church.

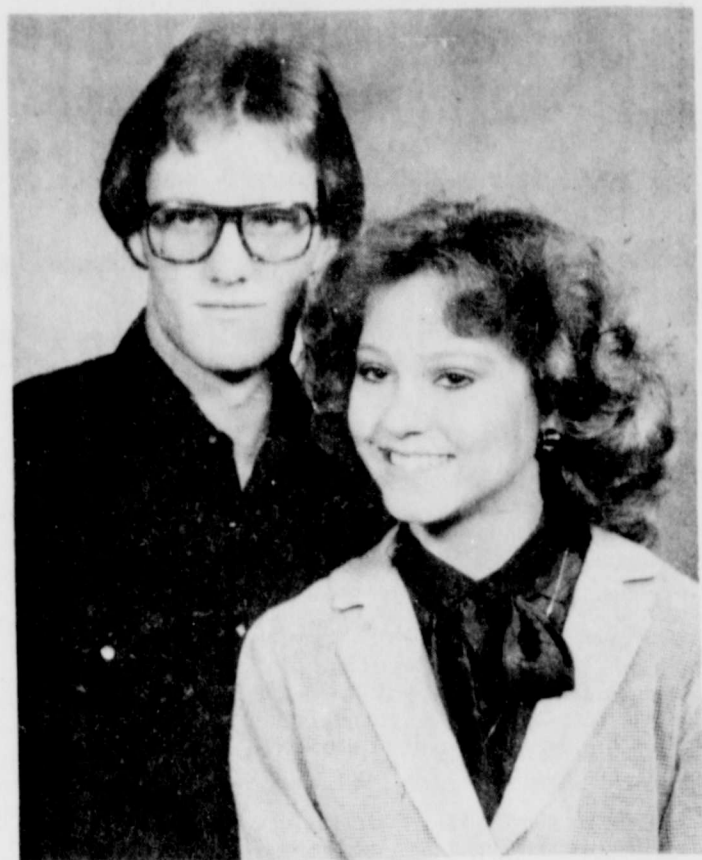
Miss Presley attends Abernathy High School. Mr. Oswalt has graduated from Abernathy High School and is now farming.

HOLY THURSDAY solemnly inaugurates "the tridium during which the Lord died, was buried and rose again." To these days Jesus referred when he prophesied: "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up" (Jn. 2:14). answers to your questions from the Texas Department of Health

There are dental problems associated with a child's teeth, which develop before birth and continue until the teenage years. The following column from the Texas Department of Health answers some frequently asked questions about children and good dental health.

QUESTION: Should a baby be put to bed with a bottle containing milk, juices, sodas or formulas?

ANSWER: A child should never be put to bed with a bottle containing anything but water. Other substances contain sugar and form liquid pools around the new teeth. An acid formation then attacks the teeth. This is called nursing bottle mouth.

Parents should clean the baby's mouth with a clean

QUESTION: What about thumb sucking?

ANSWER: Sucking is a natural reflex that may make a child feel secure and happy. Up to the ages of three or four there is usually no need to worry about the thumb sucker. After the age of four, however, the habit may change the position of the incoming permanent teeth and the shape of the jaws.

Thumb sucking should gradually disappear after the age of two. If this doesn't happen, see your family dentist. Be careful not to scold or punish the child since this may cause increased worry and an increased need for sucking.

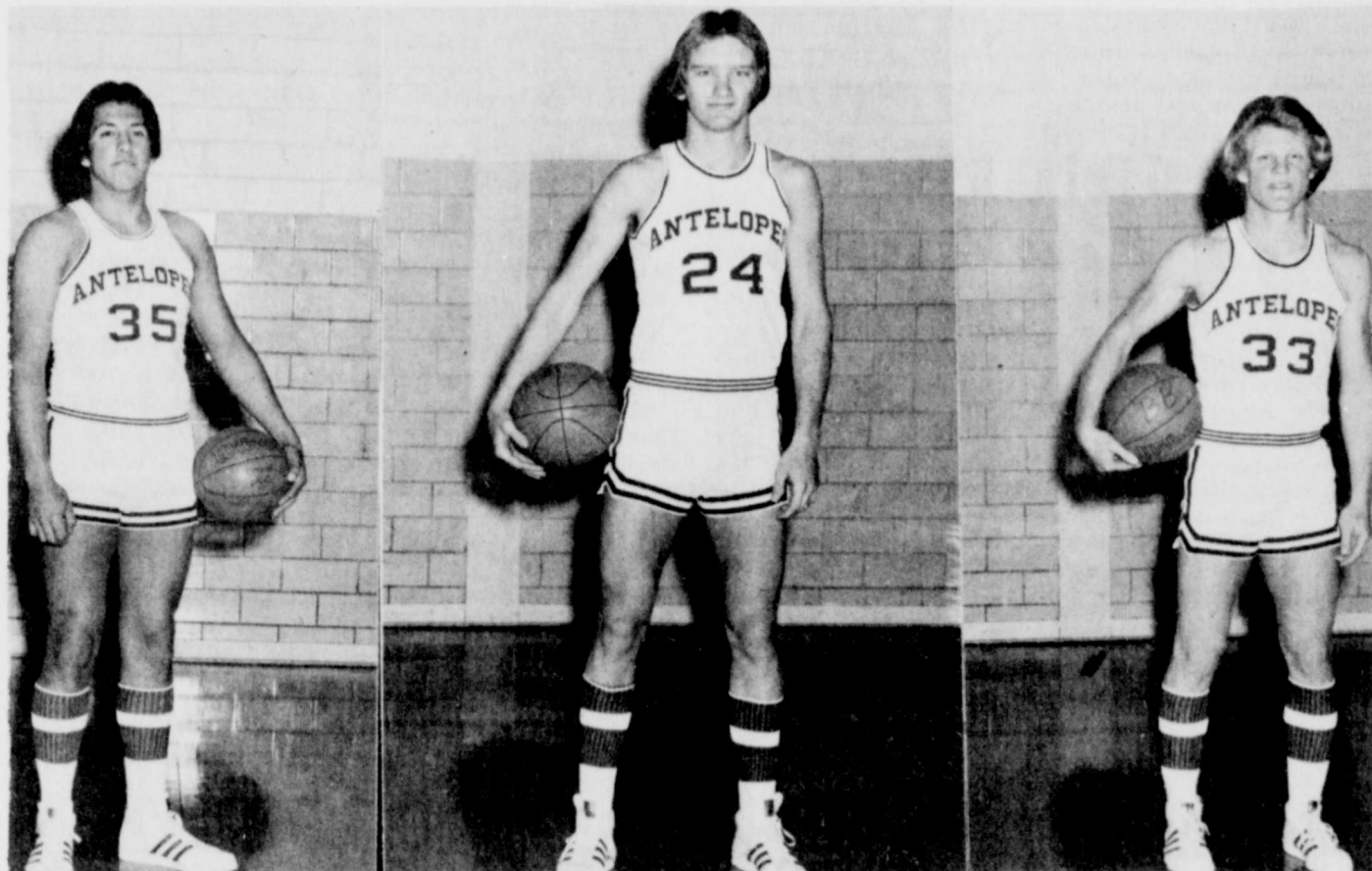

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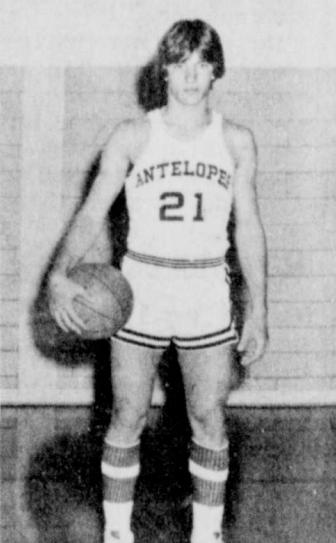

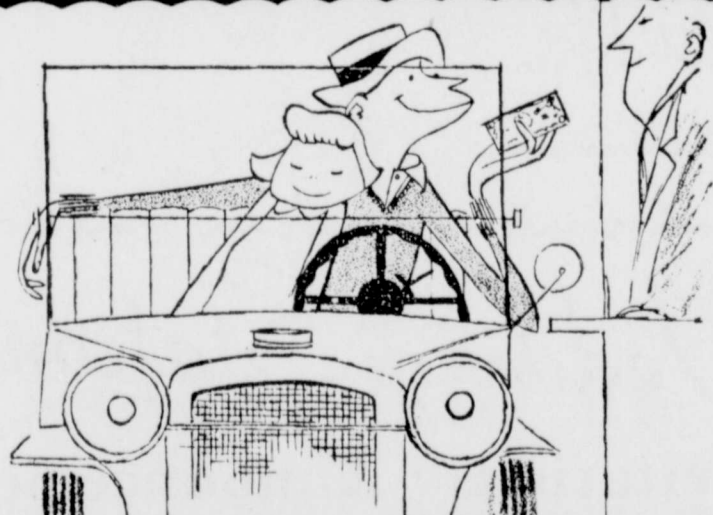
Dr. Ed Fulton at Tarleton State University has designed an anaerobic digestion plant that converts animal wastes to methane or bio-gas and Fertilizer. Such a plant would cost about \$281,000 and would be feasible for poultry operations with 40,000 or more laying hens. Methane from the plant would be a direct energy source for heating and cooling and could also be used to generate electricity.

being sponsored to give all interested high school students the opportunity to share their talents with their classmates and friends.

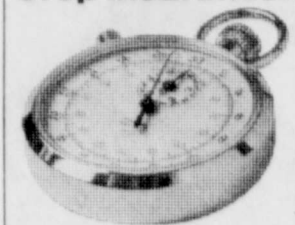
There will be three different categories in which a student or students may participate: the individual category, the group category and the organization category. The acts will have a ten minute limit.

Taxpayers Can Extend Deadlines

Taxpayers who need extra time to file their federal tax return may receive an automatic two-month extension, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The application for an extension beyond the April 15, 1981 deadline is filed on Form 4868, "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return". The IRS stresses that this is an extension of time to file, not an extension of time for payment of taxes due. The taxpayer must compute the tax expected to be owed for 1980 and send that amount with the Form 4868 to avoid interest and late payment penalties.

Only those taxpayers planning to use the 1040 long form are eligible for the automatic extension, the IRS says.

U.S. Citizens outside the U.S. or Puerto Rico on the date of their tax deadline can

receive an automatic two-month extension of the filing deadline without filing Form 4868. Taxpayers who qualify for this type of extension must attach a statement to their tax return when they file, explaining that they were outside the U.S. or Puerto Rico on the filing deadline. Interest will be charged on any unpaid tax from the due date to the date the tax is paid.

Taxpayers who expect to file Form 2555, "Deduction from, or Exclusion of, Income Earned Abroad", can obtain an extension of time until 30 days after the end of their qualifying period. Form 2350, "Application For Extension of Time to File U.S. Income Tax Return", should be used. If moving expenses are involved, extra time can be obtained by following the special instructions on Form 2350.

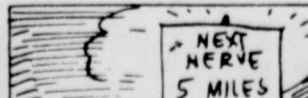

COTTON TODAY
A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, has prepared for the study of its Board of Directors and other concerned producers, a point-by-point comparison of the two cotton proposals under active consideration in Washington. One is a bill reported recently from the House Cotton Subcommittee, the other a proposal put forth for the Administration by Agriculture Secretary John Block.

Here, as now understood by PCG, are the positions of each on major issues.

TERM: Both proposals call for four-year legislation, 1981 through 1985.

LOAN: The Administration wants to continue the loan-setting formula currently in use, based on U.S. and world market prices, with a statutory minimum of 52.5 cents per pound. USDA

estimates its plan would produce a loan of about 57 cents per pound, base quality, in 1982.

The Subcommittee bill also would use the current loan formula, but calls for a small change in the figures used from Northern Europe quotes. The statutory minimum under the Subcommittee bill would be 55 cents per pound.

Both programs would offer initial 10-month loans and give producers to option to extend loans for another eight months except under certain spot market price conditions.

Noteworthy at this point,

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1981 fiscal year and a \$500 million increase in 1982, but is not recommending the establishment of an export credit revolving fund.

The bill reported by the Subcommittee would direct the Secretary to establish in Commodity Credit Corporation a revolving fund for financing export credits of cotton.

RESERVE PROGRAM: Neither of the two proposals recommend a reserve program for cotton.

EXPORT EMBARGO PROTECTION: The Administration offers no plan for shielding producers against the price depressing effects of future export embargoes.

The Subcommittee bill, should an embargo be imposed on cotton shipments to any country which imported as much as three percent of total U.S. foreign

sales during the previous two years, would compensate producers under one of two different calculations reflecting pre-embargo spot prices and the price received by producers during the embargo. A loan rate increase would be required if the payment limitation should prevent the Secretary from fully compensating all producers in cash payments.

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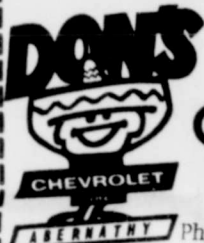

COTTON TODAY

The price of low micronaire cotton from the Texas High Plains is being severely discounted because it isn't ideally suited to textile applications for which it was never intended.

That is the opinion of Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock. "It's almost like penalizing a country and western star because he doesn't have the voice to sing like Mario Lanza," Johnson says.

The unfair treatment results from the illogical method used by USDA to determine each year's micronaire discounts in the Commodity Credit Corporation loan schedule.

USDA bases its loan discount calculations on the previous year's loan schedule differentials and the current (August through December, 1980) average spot market differences as quoted in the nine designated U.S. spot markets.

The problem, Johnson explains, is that all nine markets are given equal weight, although discounts quoted in seven of the nine markets - all except Lubbock and Dallas, where most low micronaire cotton is traded - are applicable to long staple, high grade cotton that will go into combed yarns for the fabrics of dress shirts, sheets, blouses and other constructions in which the nepping and dyeing problems associated with low micronaire cottons are intolerable.

"On the other hand the Dallas and Lubbock micronaire discounts apply to shorter staple cotton that is used almost entirely in carded yarns for the coarser fabrics," Johnson continues, "where occasional neps and/or imperfect dyeability are of far less consequence."

That's why the Greenville, Augusta, Montgomery, Memphis, Greenwood, Phoenix and Fresno micronaire discounts, individually and collectively are consistently higher than quotes from Lubbock and Dallas.

The five month August-December average micronaire discount on 2.6 and below cotton quoted from Lubbock and Dallas comes to 1000 points. Quotes from the other seven markets averaged 2188 points.

Together the nine markets averaged 1924 points. If USDA uses that nine-market average to calculate the 1981 loan discounts on 2.6 and below cotton, as is their current intention, it will mean a jump of from 200 to 600 points, depending on which of the three options listed in the Federal Register is used.

Option one would give the 1980 loan schedule discount (720 points) five times as much weight as the five-month market average and

would result in a 1981 discount of 920 points. Option two would be figured on a three-to-one ratio, resulting in a 1981 loan discount of 1020 points. The third option, a one-to-one ratio, would leapfrog the 1981 loan schedule discount to 1320 points.

The 2.6 and below loan discount went from 555 points in 1978 to 605 points in 1979 and to 720 points in 1980. Johnson points out, and other low micronaire categories have followed the same pattern.

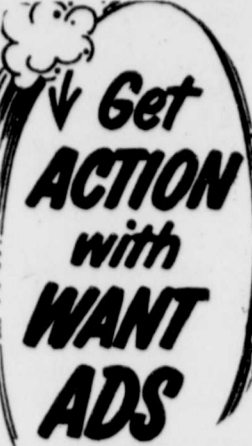
