Sparks Beats Fox; Runoff For Cole, Hale

Mrs. Wanda E. Sparks won re-election for Aransas County Commissioner, Precinct 2, by defeating Richard J. "Dick" Fox 335 to 315 in the Democratic primary election Saturday.

In the race for County Commissioner in Precinct 4, Leslie (Googles) Cole received 100 votes; Charlie Hale, 86; R. E. House, 75; Rob A. Johnson, 55; and Alfred (Speck) Coker, 32. Cole and Hale will battle it out in the runoff primary June 6.

The vote turnout was disappointingly small. Only 1,700 ballots were counted, despite the fact that there are 3,923 registered voters in the county.

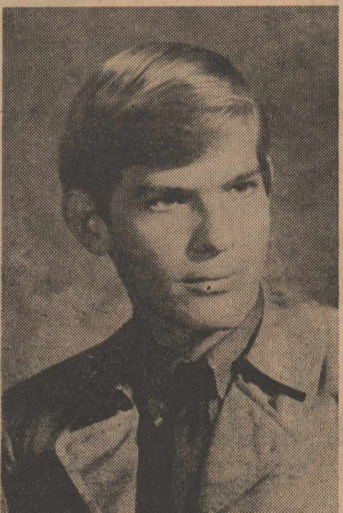

C of C Needs Help To Renovate Bldg.

The Chamber of Commerce Building will be the hospitality center for the Aransas County-Rockport Centennial Celebration, June 13-21, and the office definitely needs to be renovated to make it attractive and comfortable for the many visitors.

It will be renovated, but the Chamber needs—and will greatly appreciate—some financial assistance from members of the C of C and from residents of the community who would like to help.

At a meeting of the Chamber Board of Directors Tuesday noon in the Bayview Room at Key Allegro Hotel, Mrs. Juanita Wagley, president, pointed out that the building needs roof repair, acoustical ceiling, texture-painted walls, indoor-outdoor carpeting, outside paint job, and some type of window shades.

It was estimated that it will cost at least \$1,500 to do this, and local folks are invited to share in this project by mailing a check to the Chamber of Commerce or stopping by with a contribution. Names of all contributors will be published in the Pilot, without the amounts, unless the donors ask to remain anonymous.

Attending will be many division heads and committee chairmen of the Centennial Commission along with a number of executive committee members to welcome the queen candidates.

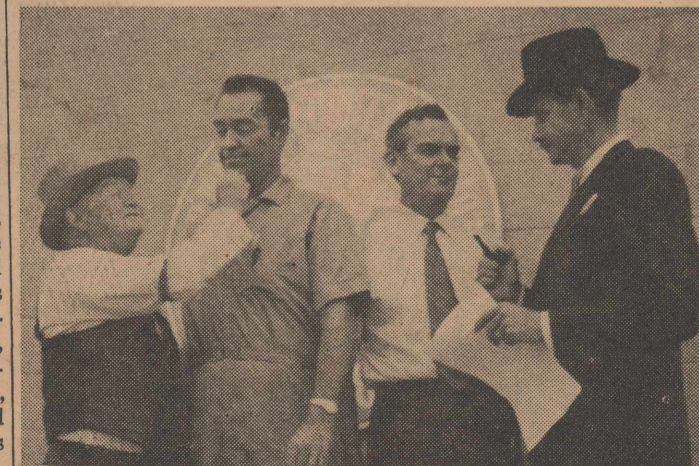

Sea Grant Program Discussed

The federally financed sea grant program designed to encourage greater use and enjoyment of the nation's marine resources was discussed by Jack Jones of the Texas Agricultural Extension service at the luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club Wednesday at Corky's Restaurant.

Texas A. and M. University is one of the six universities granted federal sea grant funds in the past two years. Texas A. and M. received \$495,000 in 1969 and \$792,000 this year.

University divisions participating in the federal grant include the Maritime Academy at Galveston, and Schools of Oceanography, Engineering and Veterinary Medicine at College Station.

Jones said the sea grant designation for universities might be compared with the early land grant title under which agricultural colleges have been operating.

Jones was introduced by Port Little, who is a member of the Coastal Land Resources committee which is partially involved in the sea grant program.

Flood Insurance Application Complete

A letter was read at a meeting of Aransas County Commissioners Court advising that the county's application for coverage under the National Flood Insurance Program for the county is considered complete.

The agency will initiate arrangements to obtain a map identifying the area of special flood hazard. No estimated date was given as to when flood insurance coverage will be available.

The Court unanimously decided that County Clerk W. E. Beasley's office shall be designated as the local repositories for the flood insurance and flood hazard maps.

Other matters acted upon by the Court included:

—A plat showing lots 61, 62 and 63 of Coleman-Fulton Pasture Company, consisting of 30 acres and divided into 6 five-acre tracts and dedicating road right-of-way to the public, was presented for approval. The Court decided not to accept the plat because "same does not meet the platting or subdivision requirements of Aransas County."

—Judge John D. Wendell informed the Commissioners that Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District had been paid \$25,500, the county's share to purchase fire plugs in areas to be served by the new water system, outside the city limits.

—Southwestern Bell Telephone Company submitted an application to lay cable down, along and across certain county roads. The application was approved.

—It was decided to repair an old wind gauge for the County Airport instead of buying a new one.

Pageant Cast Auction Set For Wednesday

A "cast auction" for the Centennial historical pageant will be held at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, May 13 in the Rockport-Fulton High School auditorium, according to announcement by Mrs. J. W. "Tony" Harden, cast committee chairman.

Mrs. Harden already has written two letters to organizations of all types in this area, urging that representatives attend the cast auction and volunteer their assistance in selecting the cast for the historical pageant which will be the highlight of the Centennial Celebration.

Mrs. Harden is hoping that five representatives of every organization—civic, fraternal, church, patriotic, service, school, etc.—will be present.

In essence, Mrs. Harden hopes that each organization will select a segment of scene of the pageant and agree to supply the actors for this portion of the spectacle.

Leonard F. Eymann, a professional director associated with the Rogers Company of Fostoria, Ohio, Centennial advisors, will be on hand to explain details about the planning, rehearsals and presentation of the pageant, "Bustles to Bikinis."

The pageant, featuring a cast of 300 local people, will depict the story of Rockport and its surrounding area from the time of the Indians to the present, an epic of courageous men and women who carved their homes from forests wilderness and built the City of Rockport and the County of Aransas. The "actors" will wear costumes furnished by the Rogers Company.

There will be no lines or speaking parts; these will be handled by a group of experienced speakers working from a script.

Motel Association Plans a Brochure

Carl Duckworth, president of the Rockport-Fulton Motel Association, said members agreed at a meeting Tuesday night at the City Hall to publish a brochure with each member motel having a full page of photographs and descriptive copy.

He said the brochures will be mailed in response to all inquiries received by both the Rockport Chamber of Commerce and the Corpus Christi Area Tourist Bureau.

Duckworth said fixed expenses are being investigated in an effort to lower operational expenses of individual motels. "Already, much has been done in this direction, with costs being reduced to motel members," he said.

Duckworth also said there was discussion regarding the motels sponsoring "some activity to promote more funds and more members and to work with the Chamber in creating good will."

The motels plan to advertise in various newspapers around the country, Duckworth said, "to interest businessmen in considering the Rockport area for recreational ventures."

He asks local residents to submit suggestions that will help improve this area and mail the suggestions to Carl Duckworth, P. O. Box 691, Rockport.

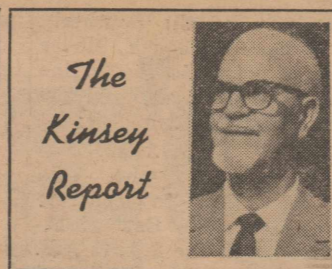

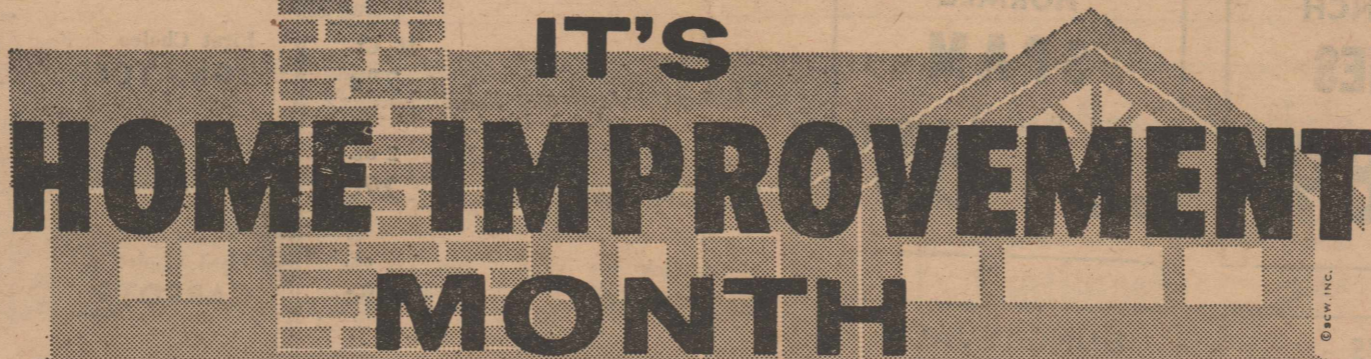

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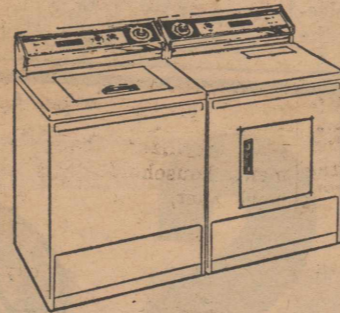

Science Students Attend Nuclear Conference

Five high school science students, Richard Anderson, Roque Garcia, Charles Kleypas, Jonathan Teague and Robert Little and Mr. Earl Heinson, teacher from Rockport are expected to attend an all-day nuclear science conference at Texas A&I University in Kingsville May 8, Central Power and Light Company Manager W. W. Janacek has announced.

The conference is designed to bring the science-minded students up to date on the latest developments in the peaceful uses of atomic energy, and provide information on career opportunities in the nuclear field.

Three of the state's leading nuclear scientists will be discussion leaders for the unique scientific conference. The speakers will be Dr. J. David Gavanda and Dr. Alan Gibson, professors in the physics department at the University of Texas, and H. R. Drew, executive vice president of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

In addition to the presentations by the visiting scientists, the program will also include a film showing the progress of nuclear research laboratories throughout the country and a panel discussion of careers and college curricula.

Tours of the science, physics, chemistry, biology and engineering buildings are scheduled as part of the one day meeting at A&I.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation is composed of CPL and nine other investor-owned electric companies. The foundation is engaged in a long-range research program aimed at controlling the nuclear fusion reaction for the generation of electric power. Much of the foundation's research work is conducted at the University of Texas in Austin, which is becoming recognized as one of the world's leading research centers in this field.

The program at A&I is limited to outstanding students interested in science, engineering and mathematics. Selection of students to attend the

conference will be made by the participating high schools.

High school students from Freer, Falfurrias, Premont, Kingsville, Riviera, Taft, San Diego, Benavides, Rockport, Ingleside, Orange Grove, Bishop, Agua Dulce and Banquete have accepted invitations to attend the conference.

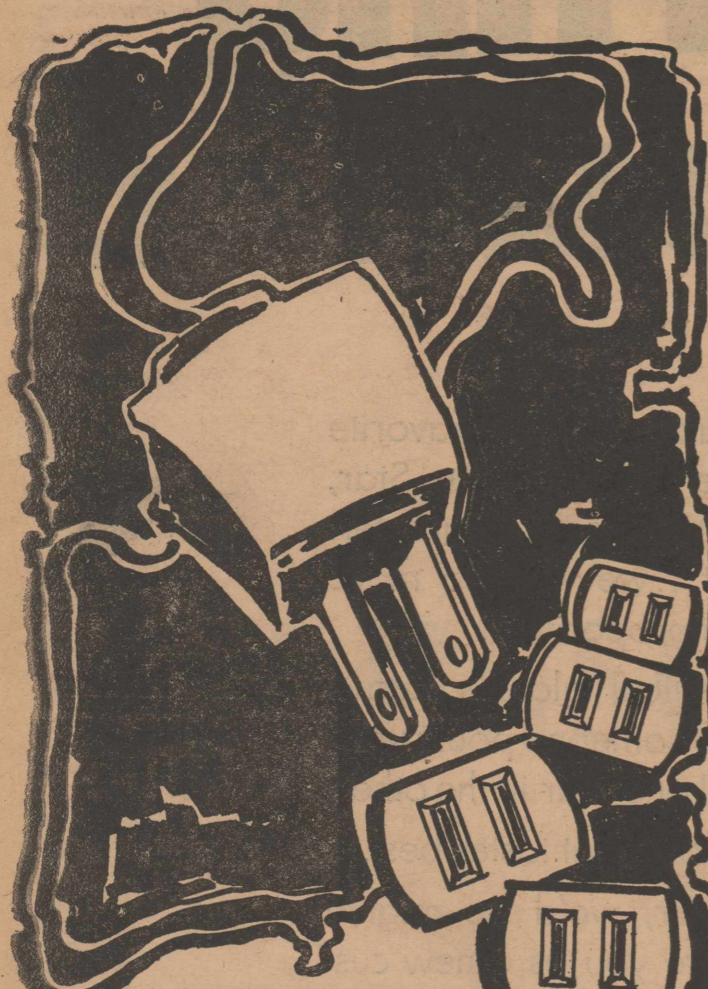

Average Resident Makes 701 Phone Calls Per Year

Rockport resident are helping make the United States the gabbiest nation in the world.

According to C. Bud Richards, manager for Southwestern Bell, the average number of calls made by Rockport telephone users outnumbers the combined average calls of their counterparts in Ireland, France, Argentina and Switzerland. Richards said the average Rockport resident makes 701 calls a year.

Richards said one reason for all the talking in Rockport is the number of telephones in the town. Based on 1968 statistics, he said, Rockport has more telephones than the entire country of Liberia. Rockport had more than 4,000 telephones in 1968 as compared with the 3,600 telephones of Liberia. Richards stated that Texas with 4,840,195 telephones had more phones than the country of Sweden with 4,110,579 telephones.

These figures are based on statistics presented in the American Telephone and Telegraph booklet, "The World's Telephones." They are the most recent statistic available since it takes about a year to collect all the information from all countries of the world.

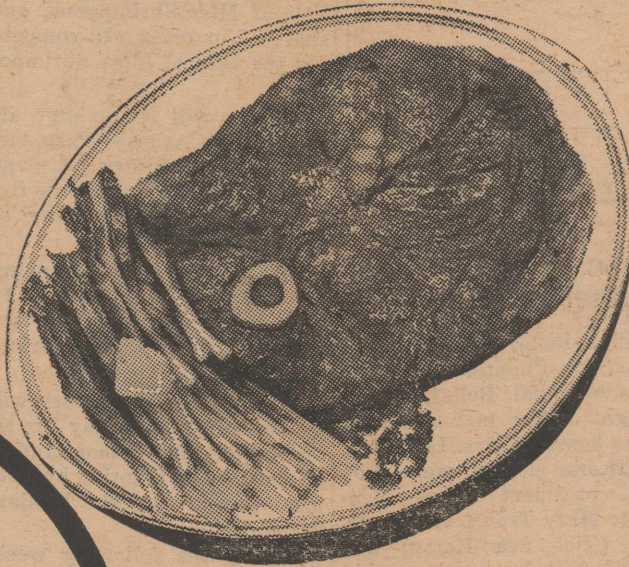

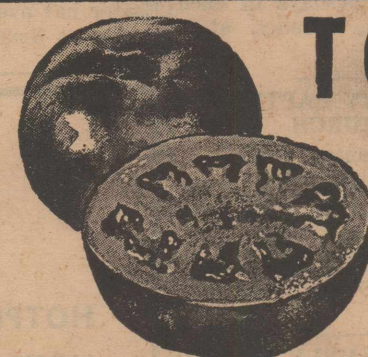
