

School Operation Costs Over Half Million Annually

One of Collingsworth county's biggest businesses is the education of its youth. More than one-half million dollars went in to this work during the 1956-57 year, it was revealed by the financial statements of the four schools, Wellington, Dodson, Quail and Samnorwood.

The total figure is \$533,571.67. In addition to this, a quarter million dollars in school bonds was issued by the Wellington Independent School District to build the new gymnasium and cafeteria. These detailed financial statements published last week and this week but before the people of the county exactly what the school money is being spent for and where it comes from.

In order that the people of the Wellington Independent School District might know better the operation of their system, the budget for the current year also was published in The Wellington Leader last week.

RECEIPTS

Operation of the Wellington schools for last year required \$278,155; Samnorwood, \$106,697.55; Quail, \$106,057.99; and Dodson, \$42,753.02. All four showed small balances at the end of the year.

Only Wellington lists the receipt of federal funds, \$5,405.74 federal school lunch funds. The other schools operate lunch rooms out of state funds.

The four schools get \$342,036 from state funds, including the per capita apportionment, foundation fund salary and operation, foundation fund transportation, vocational education and others. County funds are \$6,185.

The school districts themselves provide the balance, almost all of it from taxes paid by property owners. This totals \$146,222.

Balances account for the remainder of the money entering in the school budgets.

EXPENSES

The biggest outlay of money goes to teaching the children of the county, a total of \$302,126, while administration costs another \$34,209, or a total of \$336,335.

"Other services" including health service, salaries of bus drivers, transportation supplies and maintenance, etc., amounted to \$67,446. Operation and maintenance of school plants, and other fixed charges such as insurance cost the schools \$70,203.

Improvement of buildings and purchase of new furniture and equipment cost \$23,619. Debt service totaled \$32,064.

City State Bank Holds Open House for Friends Saturday

Open house at the newly remodeled City State Bank will be held Saturday, October 19, from 2 to 5 p. m., officers of the bank announced as they extended an invitation to all customers and friends, and to the general public to attend and see the building.

The complete remodeling has given City State Bank one of the most modern homes for a bank of this size in the Panhandle, and one that is equal in all respects to those serving the suburban areas of cities of the southwest.

Greeting visitors and showing them through the building Saturday will be the officers and employees and their wives.

General contractor and designer for the building was Dudley McMillin.

The major change in the exterior of the bank was the opening of the large triple window at the front, matched by the door in the same design. The existing black marble and white stone facade was retained, although slight alterations were made in the appearance.

Highlighting the interior changes was the use of pink Hydro field-stone to form the low walls separating the executive offices from the lobby, to partition the coffee bar area, and to form the planter wall between that area and the office.

Walnut paneling and wainscoting is used in the offices and working departments of the bank. A mural carrying out the "rancho grande" theme extends across the back of the office occupied by Zook Thomas and Joe Terry. The ceiling of the building was lowered and finished with acoustical tile, and a completely newly designed fluorescent lighting system installed.

An unusual feature is the coffee bar for customers of the bank. Hot coffee awaits anyone wishing to come by. Comfortable divans and a modern coffee table and cabinet furnish the room.

Another feature unusual in this area is the high fidelity piped-in music system, bringing soft music into the lobby and working departments throughout the day.

The interior, exclusive of paneling, was redecorated in mist green, and a combination refrigerated air conditioning and heating system was installed.

9. Specimen flowers may be shown in Coke bottles, except heavy blossomed ones, as dahlias or zinnias, may be shown in pint milk bottles. Containers are to be furnished by the exhibitor.

10. Foliage should be left on stems above the water line.

11. An accessory includes such items as backgrounds, fabrics, figurines, books, lids of containers or additional plant material. If figure is joined to container, it is still considered an accessory.

12. Base or fabric on which container stands is considered part of the arrangement.

13. The Garden Club is not responsible for exhibits.

14. Ribbons will be given for First, Second and Third place, and Award for the most blue ribbons.

15. Men's Division will follow schedule, but be judged separately.

16. Junior Division will be judged separately.

17. A composition is a flower arrangement with one or more accessories.

Identification of Woman Sought

Although she could give officers no verbal information about herself, when given a pen and paper and told to write her name, she wrote it was Lope Patricia, and that her husband was Senor Emilio Garza.

No Spanish American family is living within several miles of Barjenbruch farm, and no Spanish American woman has been reported as missing, Rainey said.

Wellington's Rockets closed out their non-conference play Friday night, October 11, with a 27-13 win over the McLean Tigers.

Playing on their own Powell Field, the Rockets completely dominated the game both offensively and defensively, racking up 17 first downs to the Tigers 9, and 214 yards gained rushing to 161 for their opponents. The Rockets took to the air 10 times and completed 7 for 203 yards, while the Tigers attempted 10 and completed only 4 for 78 yards gained.

The Tigers, trying desperately for a score, finally found the right combination, and came back with a drive that carried them from their own 39 yard line down to the Rocket 11. There FB David Crockett cut left and over for the TD. HB David Woods kicked the extra point. At half time the score stood 14 to 7 for Wellington.

He had been in the ministry about four years and at the Canadian church three years.

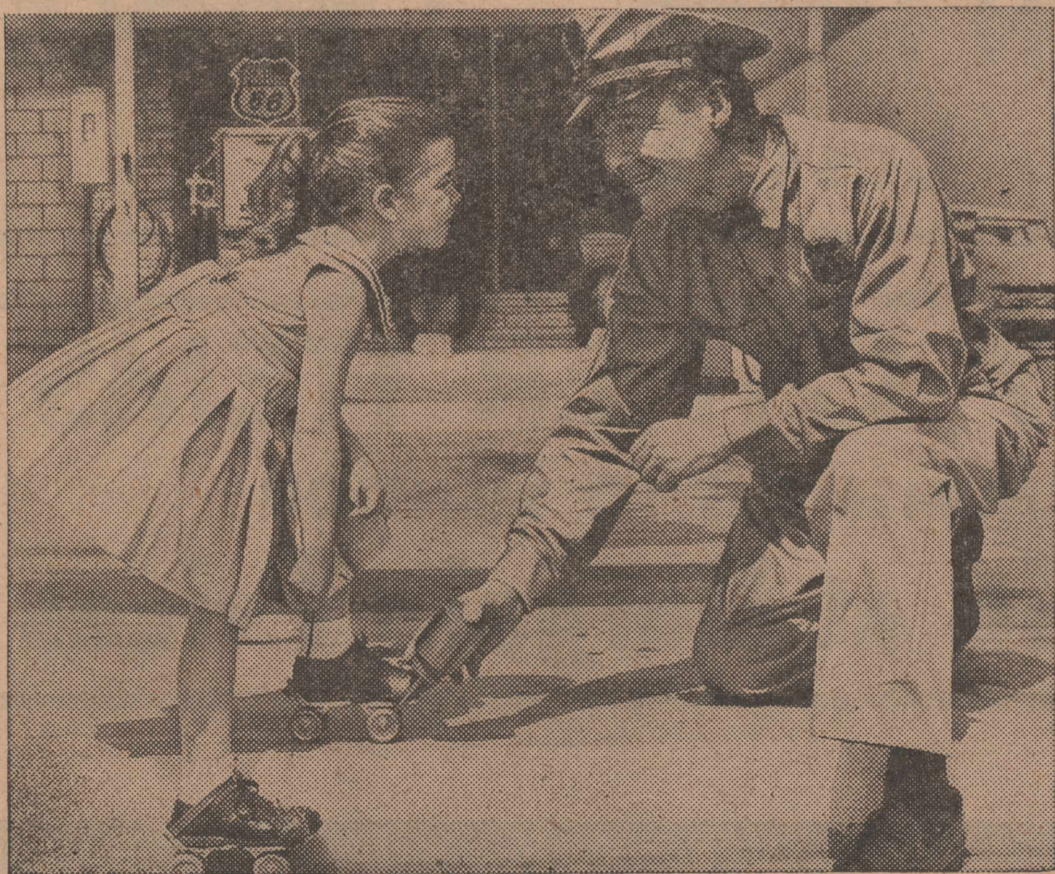

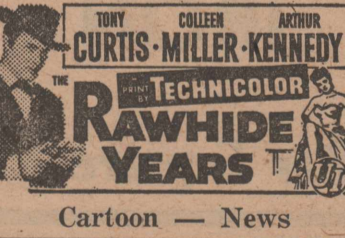

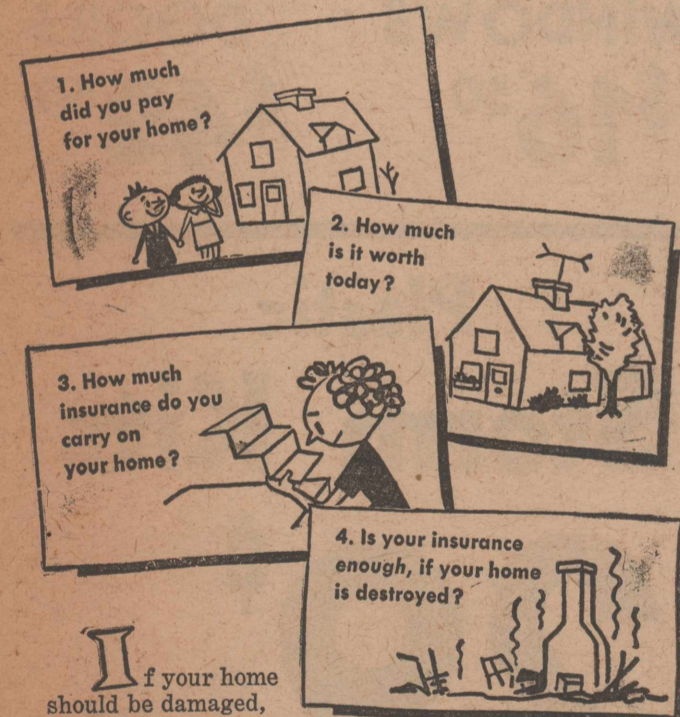
