## Ben Barnes Slates Visits

Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes, candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor of Texas, Monday announced plans to tour nine South Plains cities by helicopter Wednesday, April 19.

Barnes told campaign workers and supporters earlier this week that his campaign for governor "is gaining momentum daily."

The Lieutenant Governor's entourage is expected to land in two helicopters near the downtown area of each city.

Bob Lilly, All-Pro defensive tackle for the World Champion Dallas Cowboys, will be traveling with Lt. Gov. Barnes.

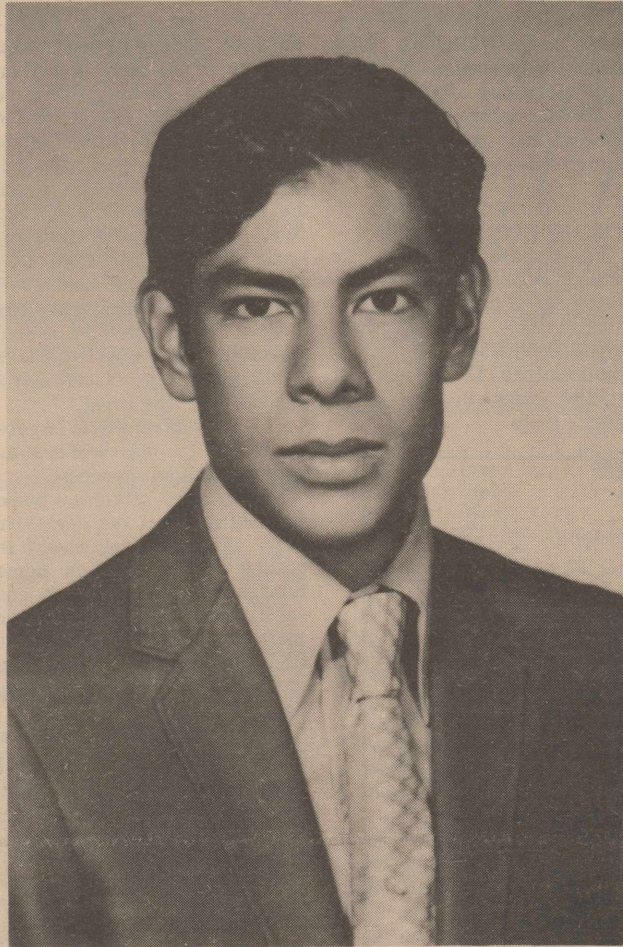

## School Transfer Regulations Told

Parents who wish to transfer children from their home school to a nearby district for the 1972-73 academic year must submit their requests to the receiving school district by June 1, 1972, according to an announcement from the Texas Education Agency.

Once approved by the receiving school board of trustees, the request must then be cleared by the Texas Ed-

ucation Agency. This state approval is a requirement of the order issued by the U. S. District Court in Tyler.

The order, related to the desegregation of schools in Texas, states in part that the Texas Education Agency "shall not permit, make arrangements for or give support of any kind to student transfers, between school districts, when the cumulative effect in either the

sending or receiving school or school districts will be to reduce or impede desegregation, or to reinforce, renew, or encourage the continuation of acts and practices resulting in discriminatory treatment of students on the grounds of race, color, or national origin."

Only hardship cases will be considered for transfer approval after June 1, according to Leon R. Graham, Texas Education Agency assistant commissioner for administration. Any late application must state specifically the exact nature of the hardship and why the application was not filed with the receiving school by the June 1 deadline.

"We expect to approve few late transfer requests and those must definitely be hardship cases," Graham added.

band uniform fund. The two-hour program will feature mysteries that have baffled half a generation.

## Ray Joe Riley Appointed Campaign Co-Chairman

Ray Joe Riley of Hart and Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, have been appointed co-chairmen for Texas in the Beltwide campaign to obtain "Better Yields of Quality Cotton for Profit and Market Growth."

They will be part of an intensive effort in the 14 major cotton-producing states aimed at increasing cotton yields and preserving the inherent quality of the fiber. Profitable production will be emphasized.

Need for the program is pointed up by a shortage in the supply of cotton. Contributing to the shortage have been unfavorable weather in all but one season since 1965 and a steady decline in yields. As a result, the carryover for the 1971-72 season, ending July 31, is projected at 3.25 million bales. This is less than a four-month supply.

Participating in the campaign will be the U. S. Department of Agriculture, state Extension services and exper-

iment stations, and the cotton industry. The National Cotton Council is coordinating cotton industry activity.

## Cindy Wins, Sets Record

Cindy Dyer was the winner of the 80-yd hurdles in the Shallowater track meet last weekend. Her 11.1 time set a new meet record.

Miss Dyer also placed third in the 100-yard dash with a time of 11.8.

Jimmy Brown was second in the 100-yard dash and second in the 220.

Competing in the junior high events, Terry Hill finished on top in the high jump and discus and was third in the 100-yd low hurdles.

Barry George was the first place winner in pole vault and the 50-yd dash.

## Report Shows Increase In Accidents & Deaths

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the final tabulation of 1971 motor vehicle traffic accidents shows that 3,594 persons died last year on Texas streets and highways. An additional 121,082 were injured and the total economic loss was \$1.045 billion.

"The death figure of 3,594 represents a 1% increase over the 1970 toll of 3,560. Actually, with all factors considered, the rise in deaths could have been greater," Speir said.

"For example, vehicle miles driven increased from 68 billion in 1970 to over 70.7 billion for 1971. This represents a rise in total driving of 4%. From another standpoint, the number of licensed Texas drivers rose by nearly 324,000 during the past 12 months to a total near 7 million.

"Despite these sizeable increases in both miles driven and numbers of drivers, actual deaths increased only slightly. This means that our death rate per 100 million miles of travel--the nationally accepted in-

dicator of traffic safety effectiveness--decreased 3% from 5.2 in 1970 to 5.1 in 1971. As recently as 1966, our death rate in Texas was 6.2 so progress is being made," the DPS director added.

Of the 3,594 deaths, 2,184 occurred on rural roadways and 1,410 in urban areas. There were 2,993 fatal accidents and total accidents reported for 1971 was 394,166.

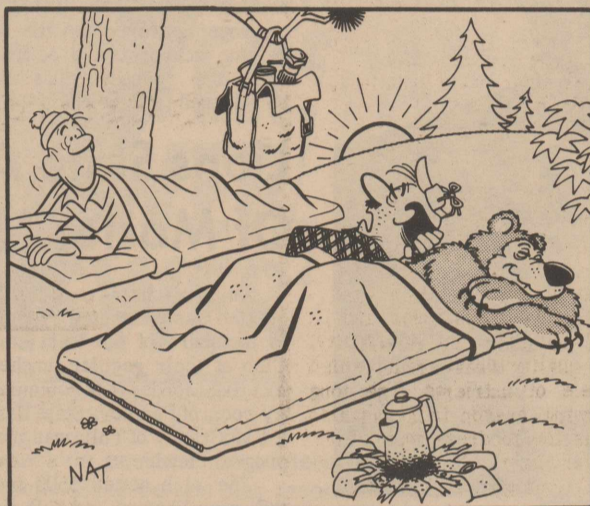
Speir said driving too fast for conditions and driving while intoxicated continued as the primary law violations contributing to fatal mishaps. Other major violations included driving on the wrong side of the roadway and failure to yield the right-of-way.

Eaton and Miss Rozanne Schnorr, specialists in clothing from Texas A&M University, will help present the program. We save so much on sewing for ourselves and we can save even more by sewing for our husbands and boys. Be

sure to attend this meeting April 25.

We are always wanting to know what foods can freeze well and one that I often have calls about is cheese. A leading company has done a six month research project on freezing cheese and cheese products and has found that "for the best results, cheese should be frozen while its relatively fresh in an unopened package or properly wrapped, then thawed in the refrigerator overnight before using". The cheese should be used soon after thawing and the freezer temperature should be (0' F to -4' F and refrigerator temperature 38'F to 42'F). For best quality don't freeze cheeses longer than six weeks to two months. Cheese products that do not freeze successfully are sour cream dips and neufchatel.

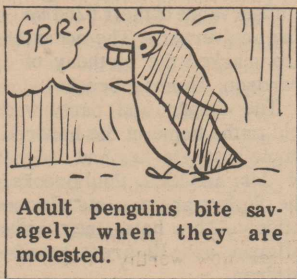

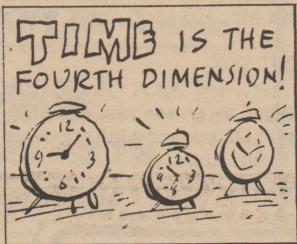

## Weights And Measures Book Available To Texans

How much is a cord of wood? How many feet in a nautical mile? How high is a hand? How long is a horseshoe court? How big is an acre?

The answers to these and other sometimes perplexing questions about weights and measures can be found in a booklet recently published by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

It's titled, "Everything You Have Always Wanted To Know About Weights and Measures But You Didn't Know Who To Ask."

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White notes that the degree to which weights and measures affect the life of each person is a matter to which the average individual is not likely to give serious consideration. "Yet, weights and measures are vital to our way of living. It is the responsibility of the Texas Department of Agriculture to see to it that every citizen gets honest weight and measure in the things he buys," White said.

The booklet contains detailed information on just how much a pinch or dash is (it's 1/16 of a teaspoon), or one gill (it's one-half cup or four ounces liquid), and so on.

Also included are measurements for linear, nautical, square or area, cubic or volume. Also covered are liquid, dry, metric weights, angles and arcs, paper, decimal equivalents of common fractions, weight of water, winds, Roman numerals, and standard measurements for baseball, football, tennis, basket-

ball, horseshoe court, men's volley ball, girls' volley ball, and single handball court.

A cord of wood is four feet high, four feet wide, and eight feet long. There are 6,028 feet in a nautical mile; a hand is four inches high; a horseshoe court is 40 feet between pegs; an acre is 43,560 square feet. You can get a copy of the booklet by writing to: John C. 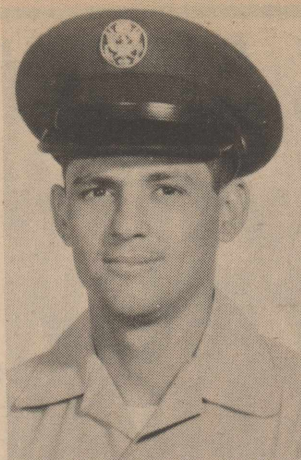

The story is told of a man who tended a very important lighthouse along a rugged coast. Every few weeks he received a new supply of oil sufficient to keep the light going for another month. As the beacon was near the shore, he often had guests pay him a call.

One night, a woman of the village pleaded with him for oil to keep her children warm. Later a father asked for fuel for his lamp that his son might study his lessons. Still another begged for a bit of lubrication for a squeaky wheel. All the requests seemed rather reasonable, so the man gave a bottle here, and a jar there, of his precious oil.

Toward the end of the month he noticed to his dismay that the supply tank was nearly empty. Soon the light of the beacon went out! That night three ships went down and more than a hundred lives were lost.

Repentant and apologetic, the lighthouse keeper made excuses to the authorities, but their reply was to the point. "You were given one task above all others--to keep that light burning! Other demands --no matter how worthy--were secondary. The terrible tragedy that occurred is therefore your fault!"

God has entrusted to us the time, talent and strength necessary to handle our life's important chores. The things of God we must seek "first."

If, however, we divert our energies to lesser courses--even though they be somewhat worthy in themselves--we will find the "oil" dissipated, and our energy sapped when we are faced with the more important task of our spiritual "lighthouse" responsibilities.

Are you so busy with civic endeavors, the cares of business and the activities connected with recreation, that the things of God go begging? Don't waste your "oil" on relative non-essentials. Use your resources to shine for Christ in a fast-darkening world.
