Tax Exemption For Those Over 65 Here

Mitchell County Commissioners Tuesday granted a \$3,000 tax exemption to owners 65 and over on their homesteads in the county.

The move by commissioners made Mitchell County one of the first taxing bodies in the state and the first rural county to grant the exemption which was allowed by a constitutional amendment approved by voters in the Nov. 7 general election.

The amendment passed locally by a vote of 1,619 for and 650 against.

Granting the exemption will cost the county an estimated \$20,000 or more but exactly how much will not be known until those eligible start filing for the exemption.

County Judge Bill Carter has asked that those eligible not to file for the exemption until this spring. The exemption will be mailed out in the fall.

The tax roll for 1973 has already been set and it is not possible to grant the exemption for 1973, Carter has explained.

The exemption will take most if not all homesteads of persons over 65 off the tax rolls as few if any are valued at more than \$10,000.

The attorney general has ruled that the exemption is to be given not on the market value

of the homestead, but on the assessed value.

For example in Mitchell Co. a \$10,000 homestead is taxed as 25 per cent of its value or \$2,500. The \$3,000 will take that property completely off the tax rolls.

It is not known just how many property owners over 65 there are in the county. An estimate places the number at about 500 since there are 952 persons on social security rolls which includes couples and non-property owners.

The exemption covers only one piece of property per taxpayer and then only if that piece of property is homesteaded.

Other taxing bodies in the county, the cities and school districts, have discussed the exemption but they probably will not be able to give the exemption because of bonded indebtedness.

The amendment stipulates, "Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have a duty to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate, as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."

Hotel Restaurant To Open Sunday

The boards have been taken off Colorado City's Baker Hotel and facilities at the hotel are now being remodeled.

The hotel restaurant will be reopened Sunday for a noon buffet and other facilities are expected to be opened at the hotel as rapidly as possible, new owners of the facility said this week.

The hotel was sold by Republic National Life Insurance Co., in December to Mrs. Jewel McMillen of Grand Prairie, M.D., Williamson of Grand Prairie; Dr. William Hicks of Garland, and Clyde Green of Ft. Worth.

Williamson and Green arrived in Colorado City Friday and began work on the hotel in order to get its facilities into use as

soon as possible.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Perkins who operated the restaurant when it was open last summer, will again operate the restaurant, Williamson said.

"We'll move as rapidly as feasible in restoring the hotel facilities," Williamson said this week.

One of the first facilities that will be reopened will be the club which will be titled the "Mustang Room." Efforts are now being made to get 50 charter members of the club.

The club will feature three types of steaks after the restaurant is closed at night, he pointed out.

The terrace room will be utilized as a recreational facilities for teenagers, Williamson pointed out, noting that he believes giving teenagers something to do will keep them out of trouble.

The terrace room for the teenagers will have organized, supervised activities, Williamson said, with hot dogs and hamburgers being sold in the terrace room after hours for the teenagers.

Williamson also plans to restore the hotel's swimming pool for use by tenants in the hotel-apartments and the pool will be open to members of the Mustang Club as well as special groups.

He said the name "Baker Hotel" will be retained.

The rooms and apartments in the upper stories of the hotel will be fixed up and rented as soon as possible, he noted, with some floors being reserved for retirement age people and at

least one floor for anyone who wants an apartment.

He noted that anyone who wants an apartment should contact him in order to take a look at the facilities so that accommodations can be designed to their liking.

He said there will be two and three-bedroom apartments in the hotel as well as rooms reserved for those passing through, as required by law.

It is also hoped that the office on the ground floor can be fixed up and rented.

County Gives Pay Raises

Mitchell County employees were given a pay raise retroactive to Jan. 1 by commissioners Tuesday and vacation and sick leave time was extended.

The 5 1/2 per cent raise given to all employees makes the second year in a row county employees have gotten that amount of a raise and the third year in a row that raises were given.

The 5 1/2 per cent increase in pay was included in the 1973 budget which was approved by commissioners last fall but the pay raises could not be voted on until the year actually got underway.

The pay raise will increase the county judge's and auditors salaries from \$8,292 to \$8,708

a year; the commissioners from \$7,116 to \$7,532; the sheriff from \$7,980 to \$8,396; treasurer from \$6,156 to \$6,572; assessor-collector from \$8,292 to \$8,708; district clerk from \$6,000 to \$6,416; county clerk and county attorney from \$7,980 to \$8,396.

Commissioners also voted to give sheriff's deputies a pay raise over and above the 5 1/2 per cent, to a flat \$545 a month.

All county employees were granted two weeks vacation. Most employees were receiving two weeks vacation except for road crews. Sick leave was increased from 10 to 12 days.

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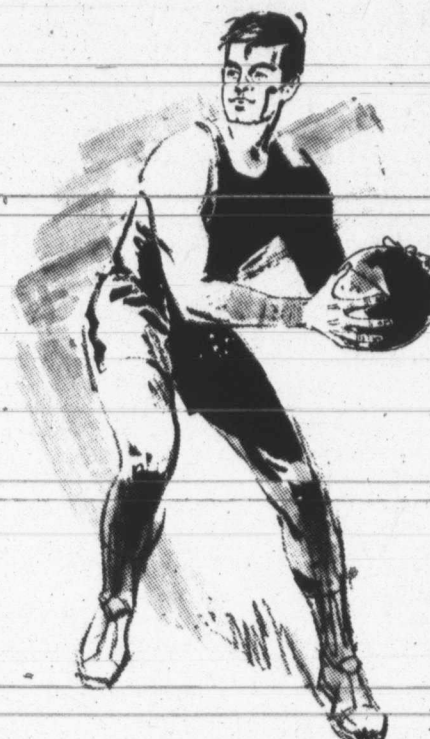

The show consists of paintings in medias of water colors, oils, acrylics, collage and others and all are for sale.

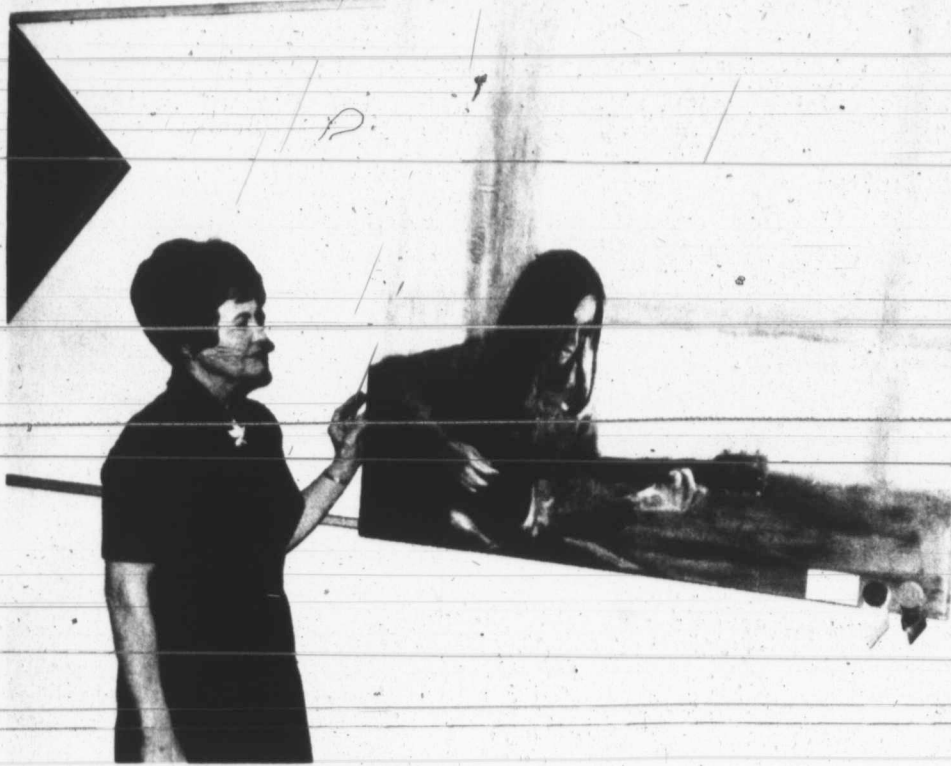
First place \$100 winner of the

Elmer Pickens, local saddle maker and longtime collector of Indian artifacts, will be the speaker at the monthly meeting of the Mitchell County Survey Committee.

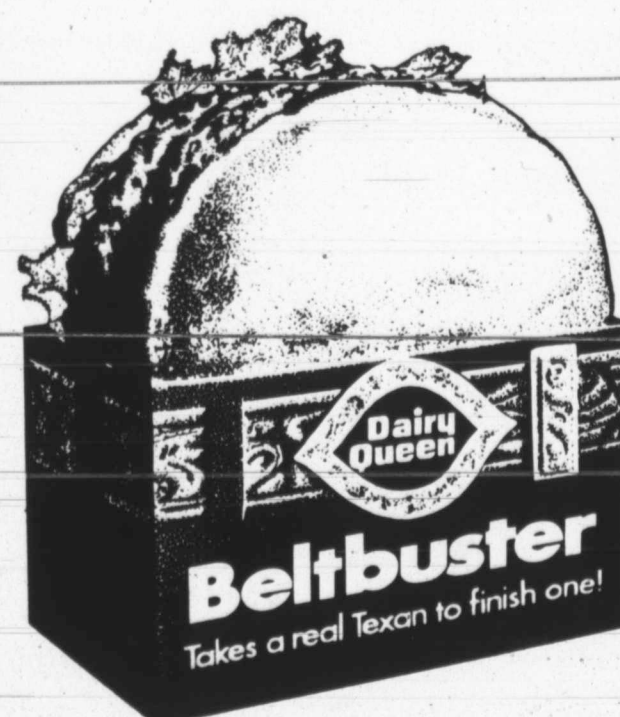
Pickens will demonstrate the method used by Indians to make arrowheads and will display both modern arrowheads and authentic Indian made points found in the Mitchell County area.

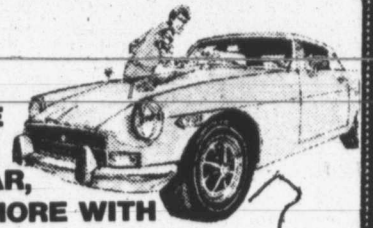

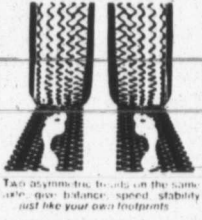
