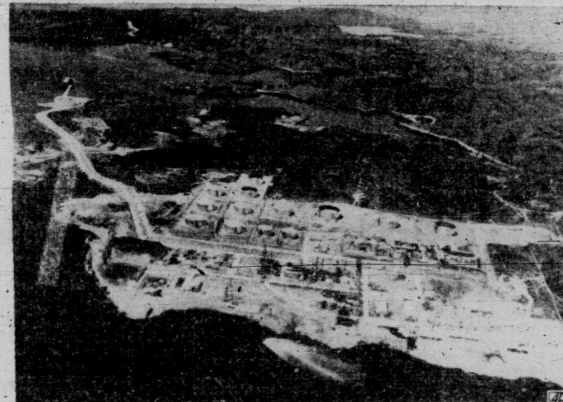

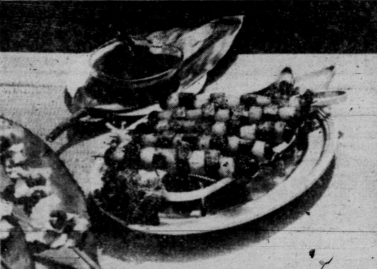

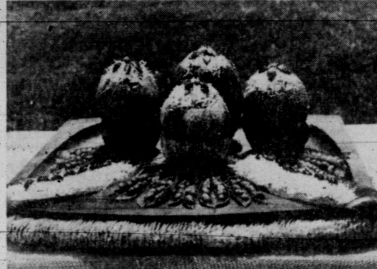

### Make Your Lawn A Spare Room This Summer For Living, Entertaining

The "Luau" of the 50th State (Hawaii) is rapidly superseding the "barbecue" of the 12th (North Carolina) as hostesses throughout the country discover the entertainment opportunities provided by this traditional Hawaiian feast.

Despite the simplicity of the preparation and a minimum expenditure for "props," the Luau offers a gala atmosphere and a gourmet menu with little effort on the part of the hostess. The only cooperation required from the man-of-the-house is to see that the lawn is mowed—unless, of course, he fancies himself as an amateur chef and wants to preside over the charcoal broiler. A well-kept lawn and ability to follow the simple directions for a Luau party, and a brief shopping tour at the local Five-and-Dime permits any hostess to be an Elsa Maxwell in her own backyard.

In the event you have never heard of a Luau, and can't even pronounce it (loo-oo) there's no need to make the long journey to Hawaii for details. Although the trip has been made with less expense.

As practiced in the "Islands" the Luau would be pleasant as well as profitable to the host and hostess, but the American form of the ceremony eliminates the income-producing angle. Although the term itself means gala feast or ceremonial, the origin of the word is lost in obscurity for in the present language Luau is a leg of the taro plant. At the ancient Hawaiian Luau usually marking a marriage birthday or similar occasion, the guest offered a prayer of gratitude then placed money, food or clothing in a basket that was presented to the hostess. The contents of the basket were, at the end of the Luau, turned over to the host of the house for practical use.

When the modern Luau is held to honor an anniversary the basket might still be used to hold the gifts brought by the guests. During the course of the meal, guests were encouraged to make an offering in the form of a song or dance or performance on a musical instrument. As books were unknown to the Hawaiians, and history was passed from father to son, consequently the local history and details of the local life, and as a form of entertainment. Tables also were eliminated in

the original Luau, and guests, ate from woven mats and large tropical leaves. The Luau came to an end when everyone had eaten to eat and drink and was tired enough to go home.

Prior to 1700, the Luau was primarily a religious observance, and the Islanders traveled from distant islands by long canoe to take part. Eventually, as the Islanders ceased local battles and became more united, the Luau became more frequent, and it took only a mild exorcism to have one.

Meat to the Hawaiians usually meant pork or fowl, and despite the lack of variety in basic ingredients they managed to develop many dishes that were truly delightful, employing the fruits of the islands to add piquancy, along with the exotic herbs of the East. Not all kitchens can hold these herbs, but all are available to those who want to enjoy the American version of the Luau. Here are a few of the recipes that charm all palates.

**MONOLILI LAMB**  
 1/2 lbs. Clean lamb  
 4 tsp. oil  
 6 tsp. soy sauce  
 1/2 tsp. freshly ground black pepper  
 1 large onion grated finely  
 2 tsp. lemon juice  
 Cube lamb and marinate in mixture for one hour, turning occasionally and rubbing the marinade into the meat. Skewer the meat on metal skewers or bamboo sticks and broil over charcoal.

**LOBSTER LUAU**  
 1 one lb. lobsters  
 1 tsp. soy sauce  
 1 tsp. sherry  
 1 small onion finely chopped  
 1 tsp. water  
 Sauté lobsters lengthwise, clean and broil, serve of the above sauce over each lobster. Place in shallow pan for five minutes, then reduce oven to 350 degrees. Lobsters are tender. Sprinkle each lobster with chopped cashew nuts and serve. Some prefer to place lobster under broiler rather than broil.

**CHICKEN MOLOKAI**  
 2 coconut shell halves  
 1 cup Chinese beans or green peas  
 1 cup chopped parsley  
 1/2 cup chopped onion  
 1/2 cup chopped chives  
 1/2 cup chicken or onion and ginger soup  
 Prepare gravy

 Crusty Rolls  
 Fresh Cherry Pie  
 Beverage

**HEARTY OF THE ASPARAGUS SOUP**

INGREDIENTS: 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed cream of vegetable soup, 1 jar (1 1/2 ounces) all purpose flour, 1 tablespoon onion soup mix (from an envelope).

METHOD: Turn condensed cream of vegetable soup (undiluted) into a medium-sized saucepan. Add liquid from asparagus to soup can fill can with water, slowly stir or whisk into vegetable soup. Heat slowly, stirring occasionally. When almost hot add asparagus stalks (cut into 1-inch lengths). Save asparagus tips for salad. Stir in onion soup mix just as it comes from envelope, making sure you add a good portion of the small pieces of dry onion as well as some of the fine solids. Continue heating until very hot; the onion should stay crisp. Makes 4 servings.

**Milk Cookery**

This is the season of peak milk production. It is a good time to try new recipes that use large quantities of this nutritious food. When you cook with milk you'll be rewarded if you use the automatic hot butter heat control on your range. Dial the temperature to 190 degrees and you'll prevent boil-overs and scorching. ## Charitable Organizations Go Overboard On Propaganda

It is with real sorrow, but no particular surprise, that I read that the Attorney General of Minnesota is looking into the financial affairs of the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Foundation.

More than half the money contributed by mail to this fund since 1952 has been used not to treat the victims of polio, to whom Sister Kenny devoted her life, but to pay for preparing and mailing a variety of letters and appeals to you, me and the folks next door.

Of the \$15,500,000, a whopping sum, sent to the fund by mail since 1952, the Attorney General says that some \$11,000,000, likewise a whopping sum, was spent in preparing and mailing the letters appealing to the public for funds.

But who, on the receiving end of this and many another charity, both local and national, has not been appalled by the number of letters, elaborate brochures and gimmicky appeals, received from each one within any given 12-month period?

Granted that Americans are soft touchers who give billions annually to charity, nonetheless some—viewing the mailed appeals and propaganda—must wonder occasionally how much of any given contribution actually gets to the needy in whose name the charity functions.

Since World War II, the proliferation of appeals has been astronomical. On more than one occasion I have written sharp letters to groups from whom I have received some kind of appeal as often as every fortnight. One doesn't have to have an abacus or an adding machine to figure out that 1) such heavy mailings consume a large portion of any gift, such a group and 2) that profes-

sional staff has staked out a vested interest in that particular philanthropy.

It grieves me that Sister Kenny's name has been used to milk the American public. That is a shabby memorial to a woman who deserves much better and who, in her lifetime, helped so many men, women and children stricken with polio.

Sister Kenny and her treatment of polio may have been controversial. But no one could have gone through the Sister Kenny Institute in Minneapolis, as I did, when she was in command and come away doubting either the woman or her method.

Minnesota gave Sister Kenny a haven and a hospital. Minneapolis saw the results of her method and seeing it believing, its citizens believed in this stubborn, blind woman who was, it seemed to me, one of the loneliest persons I have ever met.

Vaccines may eventually banish polio completely. But in her time Sister Kenny made a valuable contribution to the treatment of its victims. And malfeasance in connection with her name is a crime in more ways than one.

The moral of the Kenny Fund fiasco is that generous Americans should police their own giving. They should take the time to find out where their money goes, instead of dashing off checks willy-nilly.

During the past two years, the Seeing Eye, an old and honorable philanthropy dedicated to training guide dogs for the blind (as well as training the blind in the use and companionship of such dogs), has stunned the grab-scholarship charity solicitation.

In January, 1959, the Seeing Eye directors wrote the charity's faithful supporters that for the time

being it had sufficient funds, thanks to careful administration and bequests, to support its work. It has sought no new funds since.

That unprecedented action is much a stunning tour de force in the ever-demanding charity field that at least one subscriber framed the communication.

But in the meantime, phoney-balance charities thrive because the givers, never investigate beyond the letterhead.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The first half of 1960 is over. It was busy. But what does it add up to?

In foreign affairs it is too soon to say whether these past six months added up to an American disaster or just an unpleasant interval.

At home living costs reached an all-time high but there were no sensations as the presidential contest picked up speed.

As the new year began there was renewed hope that — internationally — things might get better.

The United States, Britain, France and Russia were bustling and bustling, getting ready for the summit conference May 16 in Paris.

Before February ended France had joined the atomic club of the other Big Three by having its first atomic explosion.

There was a new twist abroad, one which may set the pattern for more serious events in the future.

Rioting students in Korea forced out high-handed President Syngman Rhee; an anti-Turkey rioting students forced out the dictatorship of President Adnan Menderes.

Then the egg broke.

The American U2 spy plane was brought down over Russia with an unprecedented roar from Premier Nikita Khrushchev who insulted and belittled President Eisenhower, wrecked the summit conference and canceled Eisenhower's trip to Moscow.

It is too soon to know whether relations have been terribly damaged or just badly bruised.

The aimless melancholy that afflicts so many civilized people undoubtedly is a result of their prolonged sedentary posture. When man sits still, his mind turns inward and magnifies his troubles. When man is on his feet and moving, his mind must turn outward of the machine of a life that so often protects him from the perils that menace the pedestrian.

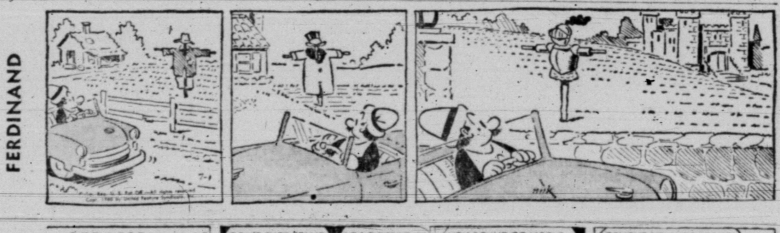
Some people have found they can minimize their worries by getting into their cars and going for a long drive. Doing something—doing anything—makes them feel better. But if, instead of getting behind a wheel, they went for a long walk, they would feel better faster.

The sitting man is a sitting duck for self-pity. But it is more difficult to feel sorry for one's self when one is afoot. The piled-up resentments and hoarded wrongs melt magically with each passing breeze, and one feels himself less and less a passive victim of a ruinous world he never made.

You cannot think your troubles away, but you can walk them down to a size you can handle.

There are those who say the only place worth walking in is a green place, and there is no doubt that all of us get homesick at times for a forest feeling and the sensation of a firm foothold on the yielding earth.

But there are also those who feel that when you've seen one squirrel you've seen them all. To these there is no better place to walk in than a great city.
