Individual Tax Returns Possible By February 2

Individuals must pay the balance due on their 1958 estimated income tax by today (Jan. 15), or in lieu thereof, file an individual income tax return (form 1040) on or before Monday, Feb. 2 and pay the full amount of the tax due for 1958, according to the Internal Revenue Service of the Treasury Dept. in the 1959 edition of Publication No. 334.

Mrs. Ruby Springer, income tax consultant, indicated that taxpayers have until Feb. 2 "to make their 1958 income tax return and pay all taxes due, including the 4th quarter of the estimated tax for 1958."

March of Dimes Drive Is "Ready to Roll"

Keep Those Dimes Rolling In...

Ranger's Community Chest drive has bogged down. (You might use the word "failed" if it didn't imply "dead", because the drive is still open.

Now the citizens of Ranger are preparing to launch into another drive—the March of Dimes. And they seem ready to give it their whole-hearted cooperation and every effort. The Community Chest drive started off with a similar burst of enthusiasm and gradually the interest and energy dwindled down to practically zero.

Both causes are very worthy. This year the research program financed by the March of Dimes covers the problems of polio, arthritis, birth defects, and basic research in various diseases and disorders of the central nervous system.

As new leads are discovered they will be pursued with vigor. The underlying aim of the new program is the improvement of man's health. The speed with which the program develops depends in large part on results of the 1959 March of Dimes.

Several local organizations are already making plans to participate in the drive, and many more are expected to "follow suit" and raise funds for the project.

Ranger is going into the project with lots of enthusiasm, and that's as it should be. But, once before, a drive was started (a long time ago) and it has not been completed — unless you want to call it "quits" and declare it "dead".

Keep going forward with both drives (as there is "room" for both at the same time) and don't let interest lag. If sincere and genuine interest can be maintained in both—dimes will pave the way to success.

Local Organizations Are Participating

Ranger's March of Dimes program is ready to roll into action as preliminary plans are completed. Several local organizations are also formulating plans to participate in the project.

J. W. Daskevich, Jr., was named general chairman of the local drive by Mrs. J. A. Bates, county chairman. Daskevich announced committee heads Wednesday.

Mrs. James Townzen will be in charge of the Mother's March which is held every year in connection with the program. Mrs. A. J. Ratliff was named chairman of the church organizations. Ronald Waters is publicity director. Fred Bennett and Allen Rushing are in charge of counter collections.

Containers have been distributed throughout Ranger. They indicate that the 1959 March of Dimes program has been expanded to include research for virus, arthritis and birth defects, besides polio.

Members of the 1947 Club will make plans for the annual Mother's March next Tuesday at 4 p.m. in the home of Mrs. Ray Lilley. Workers and captains of the drive will be assigned to territories at that time.

A bake sale to be held by members of the Sub-Deb Club next Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Worth Food Mart will mark the first project of the drive.

Second event, planned at this stage, is the benefit basketball game set between the Ranger Volunteer Firemen and the Ranger Independents, with all proceeds going towards the March of Dimes. The benefit game will be held Saturday, Jan. 24, at 7:30 p.m. in the Recreation Building.

Firemen will practice this Saturday night at 7 and other work-outs may be held. A. C. Reid is captain of the team.

Other benefit basketball games are pending.

Ranger's Lions Club will hold its annual Pancake Supper Saturday, Jan. 31, in Ranger College Cafeteria with all profits going towards the March of Dimes. Charles Milliken, president, announced that tickets would soon go on sale at 75 cents each, and everyone can eat all the pancakes and sausage they want.

Chairmen of civic organizations and clubs, along with other chairmen, will be announced at a later date.

Farming Still Fun For Wilson After 34 Years

Thirty-four years on the same farm hasn't taken any of the fun of farming away from Henry E. Wilson, owner of this week's mystery farm.

Wilson's farm, located eight miles southeast of Eastland, has 160 acres. It is his vocation and his hobby as well. With 84 acres in cultivation, Wilson raises just about every crop you can name. He has a peanut allotment of 29.9 acres and has a seven acre cotton allotment.

Like most Eastland County farmers, Wilson made the best peanut crop this year that he has made since 1950. Unlike many farmers, however, the long-time farmer managed to "make expenses" during the drought years.

In addition to peanuts and cotton, Wilson also plants corn, maize and vegetables.

In 1958 he placed his seven acre cotton allotment in the Soil Bank plan, but says he doesn't plan to this year. Wilson said he didn't like the idea of having to put his land in the Soil Bank for five years.

"I think I can get more out of my land by grazing than I can out of the Soil Bank, anyway," he declared.

Wilson has owned the farm since 1925. He purchased the place from the Wright heirs. He says he has known the farm since 1908 and thinks it was settled in about 1902. His wife's father, the late A. D. Reese, built the first house on the place.

Anything can happen and probably will when those Ranger Rangers run into the Ranger Independents tomorrow night at 7 in the Recreation Building.

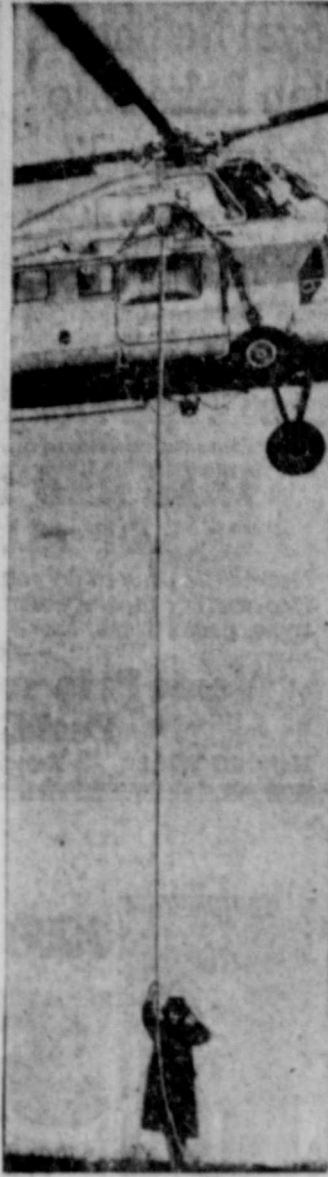
Plenty of fast and furious action can be expected to develop when the two rivals take the floor, and Ranger fans can come expecting to see one of the best basketball games of the season.

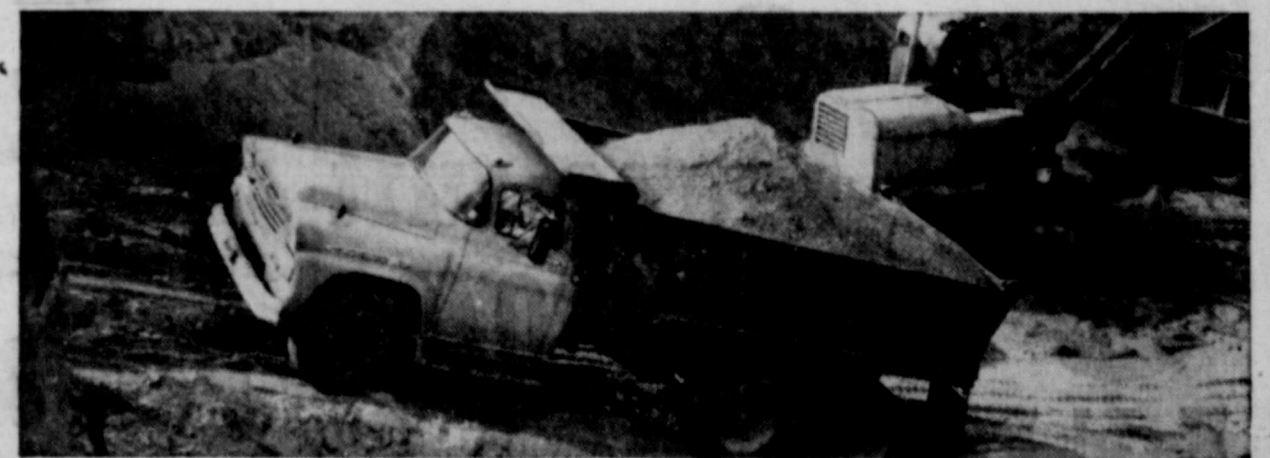

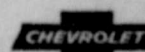
