Gasoline Shortage

Four Stations Closed; Others Low

Shoe leather may be in short supply in Colorado City soon as people begin to overcome the gasoline shortage and start walking to their places of business, whether they choose to walk or not is another question as several stations have had to close down their pumps this week, unable to get gasoline to sell.

Thomas Brothers Texaco was the first station to run short of gasoline, pumping out all of the regular last Saturday and emptying high octane tanks Monday.

Don's Phillips 66, Downtown Texaco, and Kenneth Childers Chevron station were also out of gasoline, with the Chevron station

to receive some by the 25th but the others to wait until after the first of next month to get more gasoline for their customers.

Other stations were very low on their supply of gasoline, some operators estimating that they would have to close before the first of the month, Paris Yarbrough, Col-Tex service stations.

Some stations have curtailed their operating hours in order to last out the month with the low supply of gasoline they have left and others have been limiting the amounts that they sell to one customer, some limiting purchases to 10 gallons per customer.

Gene's Exxon and Pace Phillips 66 say that they have been trying to limit their customers to 10 gallons in order to have enough gasoline to last out the month. Jack Kahler Standard station says that he had to close a few days last week but received another shipment of gasoline and can stay open a few more days until it runs out.

On the other hand, some of the stations in the area say that they have had plenty of gasoline and have been experiencing no difficulty in getting gasoline from their suppliers.

A perplexing situation is made even more difficult to understand by a letter received by one

station operator from his gasoline consignee, stating that the month's allocation of gasoline had been sold and if any additional gallons were sold from tanks which are full of gasoline, an additional charge of 6 cents per gallon would be made to the service station operator. The operator explained that this would increase the cost of the gasoline to 52.9 cents per gallon and, since other stations were still able to get gasoline, he couldn't see any of his customers paying that amount for their gasoline.

Colorado City residents are beginning to walk to work and to attend to their businesses downtown, trying to meet the crisis of the fuel shortage.

He and his wife Ila Bell have two children, Sidney Flanagan of Colorado City, who has a son, four year old Corey and Larry Compton, also of the Landers community.

Industrial Team, Inc. Meeting Set

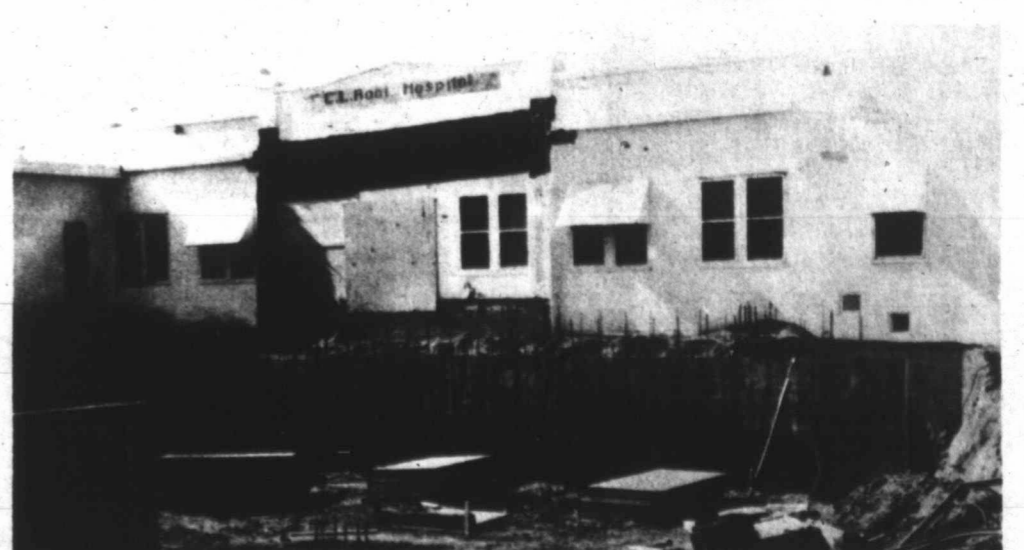

The firm's facilities, which are housed in a mobile unit, are to be located next to Root Memorial Hospital.
Mr. Deats H. Beard, clinical audiologist with the firm, stated that the mobile unit contains all the most modern equipment to provide complete hearing testing and rehabilitation services. Mr. Beard added that with the facilities being mobile, anyone outside a large city will be able to receive the same benefits without having to travel 70 to 100 miles. Mr. Jack Hall, the firm's hearing aid specialist, stated that the services being offered include hearing testing, hearing aid evaluations, hearing aid sales and service, and speech reading. Mr. Hall further stated that the unit is equipped to provide services to anyone regardless of age. Also, for individuals who qualify, services provided can be covered under their medicare program. "As a facility devoted exclusively to better hearing," Mr. Hall added, "we work closely with the community physicians. When an individual consults with us, there is no effort spared to attempt to help them hear again."

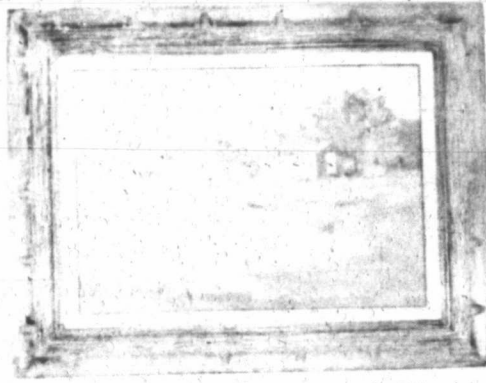

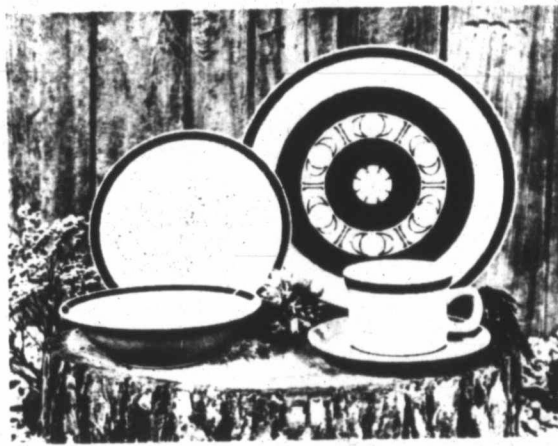

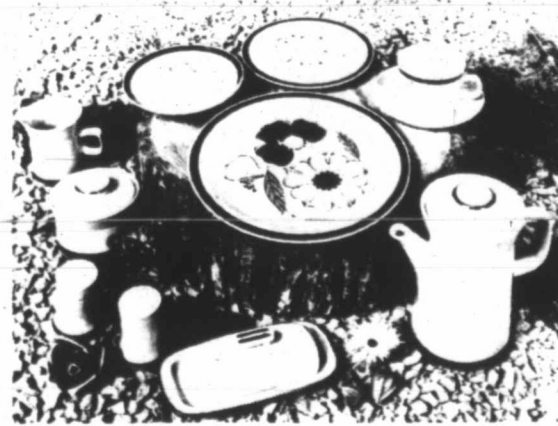

Brucellosis Regulations Are New

The new brucellosis regulations (Proclamation of the Texas Animal Health Commission #AHC-1) were adopted unanimously by the Texas Animal Health Commission at an official Commission meeting in Laredo on Oct. 15, 1973.

These new regulations will bring the Texas Brucellosis Program into compliance with the National Uniform Methods and Rules which are considered minimum standards.

In brief this regulation requires that all breeding cattle two years of age and over that change ownership are required to be brucellosis tested. Breeding cattle may be tested on the farm or ranch or at an auction market.

Slaughter type breeding cattle may be sold through livestock markets without test until sampled on the kill floor.

The brucellosis test will be good for movement purposes for a thirty day period provided animal is ear tagged and accompanied by test certificate.

These regulations will be in full force and effect after Jan. 15, 1974.

Court Cases In County Enumerated



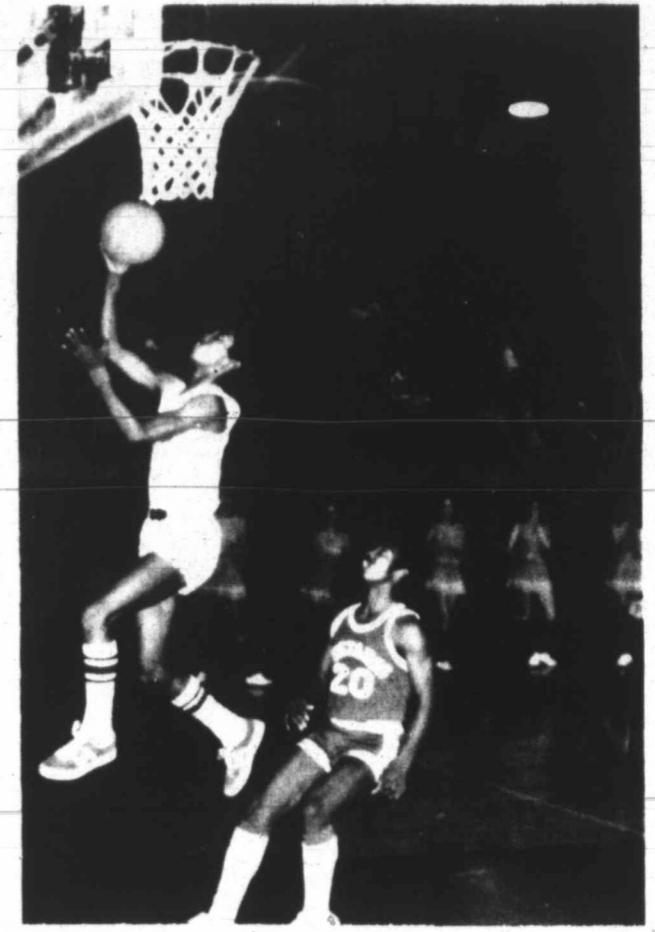

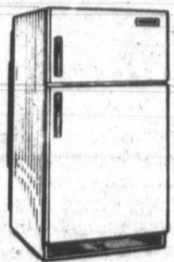
Tips to help you get more efficiency from your home heating system.
Insulation is important and can pay for itself by lowering your heating (and cooling) costs. You can save as much as 20% or more on energy consumption if your home is insulated to meet FHA standards. Engineers usually recommend a minimum of six inches of insulation for the ceiling, four inches for the outside walls and, if construction is pier-and-beam, two inches under the floor. Keep the filters clean. Dirty filters restrict air flow and cause the equipment to work harder and use more electricity.
A lower thermostat setting will result in less energy use. The setting of 65°-68° has been recommended for energy conservation. If you are going to be away, turn your thermostat down to a lower setting or turn it off unless freezing weather could damage plumbing and appliances.
Weatherstrip doors and windows to help seal in the heat you're paying for. Keep the damper tightly closed when the fireplace is not in use to prevent air leakage.


