Ward Re-elected School Board Chairman

The first item on the agenda of the Board of Trustees meeting on Tuesday, April 13 was to administer the oath of office to newly elected members Kenneth Jeffery, Dru Pirtle and Eddy Brown. In the reorganization of the Board for the next year, John Ward was re-elected as Board president, Jerry Russell was elected Board vice-president and Kenneth Jeffery was re-elected as Board secretary.

April being the month when auxiliary personnel are considered for employment, all personnel that had been recommended by the administration were approved by the Board. The school district employs approximately 40 employees who work in these various auxiliary positions: secretaries, aides, cafeteria workers, bus drivers and maintenance and janitorial work.

Approval was also given to paying professional personnel (degree persons) \$1200 above the Minimum State Salary Schedule and

secretary-aides \$350 above the schedule for the 1982-83 school year.

Board approval was given to the establishing of the Tracie Jones Memorial Scholarship Fund by the Jerry Jones family in memory of their daughter, Tracie. Guidelines were also approved for the selection of students for this annual scholarship.

Tillman Hale, Rivercrest principal, met with the Board to give a brief report on scheduling procedures used for registering high school students and the various conflicts and problems encountered in working out individual schedules. Also, he gave a progress report and what information had been gathered on the possible use of computers in the school program for the next school year.

Milford Groves, Athletic Director, also met with the Board to discuss and make recommendations on needed work on the football field and to comment on other matters

related to the athletic program and facilities. Further information is to be obtained on these recommendations before action is taken.

Concerning a question related to a student and-or students not being permitted to enroll in the Meat Processing Program, it was the decision of the Board that the administrative guidelines that have been in use for the past few years continue to be used in selecting students for this program when more students express an interest than can be accommodated in the program. However, there was a consensus of feeling that provisions be made whereby there will be no doubt on the part of students and parents about these guidelines when students are making out their Four-Year Plan for high school.

In other action, approval was given to contributing \$100 toward the expenses of a Rivercrest student who has

received the honor of being elected as Secretary of Area VI FFA to attend the National FFA Convention in Atlanta, Georgia this summer.

In other and final action, approval was given to the purchase of some varsity basketball uniforms and the various financial reports were approved. Votes were cast for various vacancies on the Board of Directors of Region VIII Education Service Center and 7:30 p.m. was set for the Board to meet during Daylight Savings Time. A majority of the Board expressed an interest in attending the Regional School Board Workshop on April 20 on the East Texas State University Campus.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, May 11, 1982 at 7:30 p.m. with the public cordially invited to attend.

school until 11:30 a.m. Lunch will be served in the Talco cafeteria.

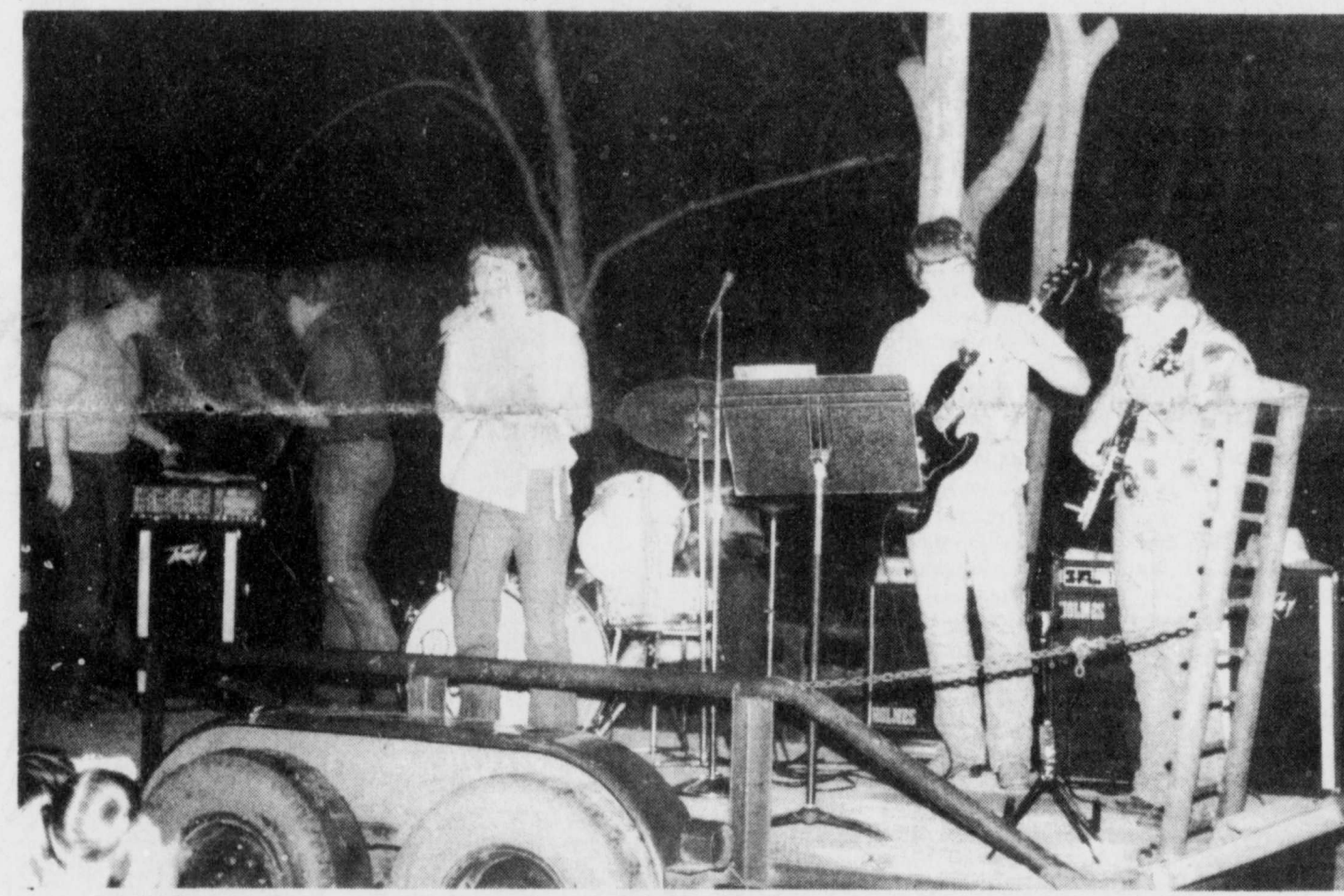
Children must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1982 to be registered for the Kindergarten and six years of age on or before September 1, 1982 to be registered for the first grade. It will not be necessary to register children presently attending Kindergarten for the first grade.

Parents are reminded that it will be necessary to furnish a birth certificate at the

time of registration. Also, children must meet the requirements of the Texas Education Agency and the State Health Department on immunizations before they can be admitted to school. These requirements are: Polio, Diphtheria-Tetanus,

Measles, Rubella and Mumps. Please bring immunization records for your child or children.

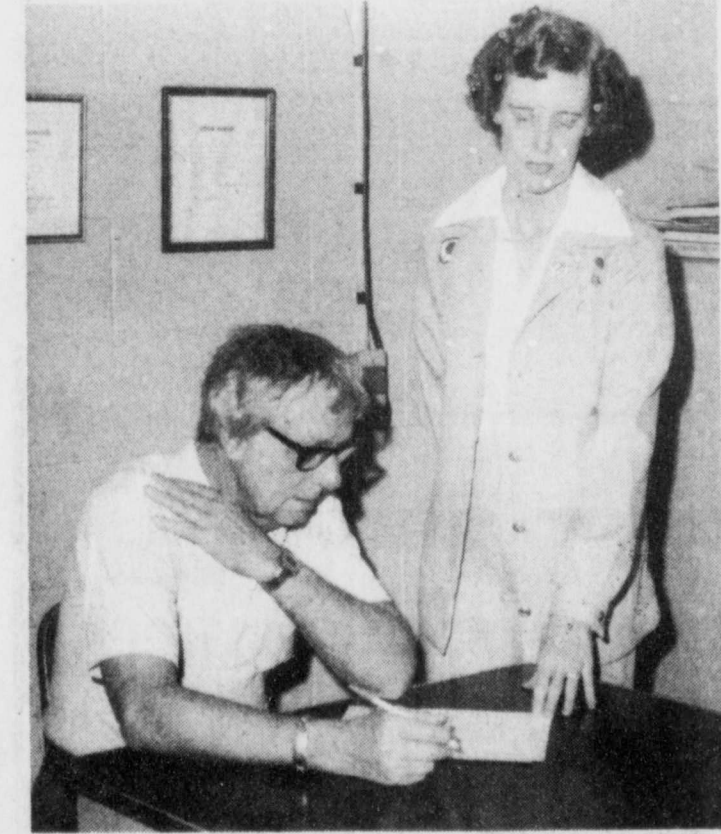

April 22 Is Leaders Day

The Honorable John W. Hood has proclaimed April 22, 1982 as Girl Scout Leader's Day throughout the City of Bogata.

Convictions And Guilty Pleas Heard

During the week beginning Monday, April 12, 1982, a Red River County jury found Darryl Dunlap guilty of the January 17, 1980 armed robbery of the Quickie Drive-In convenience store on East Main Street in Clarksville. The jury assessed punishment for Dunlap at eleven years in prison.

Albert Lee Davis, Jr. was found guilty by a District Court jury of Driving While Intoxicated. Ardie Roberts pled guilty to the November 7, 1981 theft of a calf from Ernest Butler

of Manchester, and Judge Pesek sentenced him to two years in prison and no fine.

Newspapers Win Awards

The Bogata and Blossom papers won awards at the North and East Texas Press Association, held at the Best Western Inn of Paris Saturday, April 17.

Managing Editor Nanalee Nichols and Bogata Sports Editor Britt Morgan attended the convention awards banquet to accept their awards.

Morgan won first place for local newsphotos in weekly newspapers with a circulation under 2,500.

Judging was done by the University of Texas Journalism Class, and in their critique they said "Everything works for this

photograph--All action is clear and visible without reader having to untangle assorted arms and legs or hunt for a ball the caption writer assures us must be there somewhere. Enough blur to suggest motion without destroying our ability to sort out one of the team names. This must be the fantasy of everyone who has played or wants to play football...running full tilt away from your opponent over the fallen bodies of teammates and foes as well."

Nichols won fourth place for best local column in Blossom and Bogata. The

judges commented "like this writer's short, sweet, switch-hitting columns. No wasted words to pad out the length. Her feelings and reactions come through with a minimum of the "I" that plagues a lot of columns. Would welcome some help with the heading...her work deserves better than a fuzzily printed, devalued buffalo stuck on top."

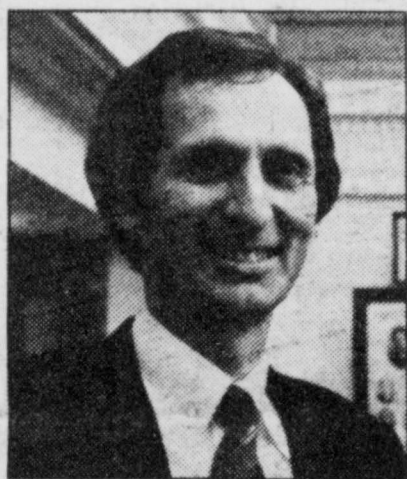

Hares Return From European Trip

Martha and Junior Hare of Route 1, Sulphur Bluff, returned last week from a 12-day European Southern Farm Tour that took them on a bus trip of over 2,000 miles after they arrived in Frankfurt, Germany. The trip continued on through Switzerland, France, Belgium, Holland, and back to Frankfurt for their departure.

In Heidelberg, where they stayed two nights, they saw the castle which is located high above the city and other points of interest. The Hares, along with 37 other Texas residents, toured the John Deere plant in Mannheim. They saw the assembly from beginning to end. That same afternoon they visited a German farm family and toured the dairy, where the family kept Simmental cattle in a barn with slatted floors. They milk the cows and also raise them for beef. The Texas visitors were invited into their home for a tour and refreshments, consisting of hot rum tea. White lace curtains were evident in this home as well as throughout the entire trip.

The next day their travels took them through the Black Forest of Germany and on to Interlaken, Switzerland, for two nights. The group made a side trip to Lucerne where they visited wood-carving shops and ate a Swiss fondue lunch with local entertainment and yodeling. That afternoon, the group took a cable car to the top of Mt. Pilatus (7,000 ft.) where the view was breathtaking.

As they continued their trip, the Hares and the group visited the farm of one of the foremost Simmental breeders in Switzerland. The farm has cows for milk and beef, and also exports cattle. The group was invited into this home also for a visit and refreshments.

After spending the night in Dijon, France, the tour group continued to Paris, where they enjoyed a memorable sightseeing tour of the city that included the Arch of Triumph, the Louvre, the Left Bank, Cathedral of Notre Dame, the Eiffel Tower, Place de la Concorde, the Champs Elysees, and the Luxembourg Gardens. After a din-

ner show that night they enjoyed a drive with a visit to Montmartre. The next day the group visited the Palace of Versailles, where the treaty that ended World War I was signed in 1919. The group also spent several hours at the International Livestock and Machinery Show and the International Food and Wine Exposition.

The group continued their trip with a lunch stop in Brussels, Belgium, and then to Amsterdam, Netherlands for two nights. Here they attended the world's largest flower auction (32 acres under one roof). There are over six million cut flowers sold and flown out each morning. Afterwards, the group visited a dairy and saw the process of cheese making.

The group also visited the new land that has been reclaimed from the Zuider Zee River. These areas have been made possible by dams and much hard work, and are from three to 15 feet below sea level. The group visited another dairy combined with a grain farm in the same area. They saw a

demonstration on dike building and observed windmills in action. After a ride on the canal through the city of Amsterdam, the group visited the world's largest diamond factory.

After leaving Holland, the group continued to Cologne, Germany, where they toured the Cathedral with its massive twin spires. It is the world's largest Gothic edifice. The group boarded a Rhine Steamer for a trip on part of the river. They saw vineyards and many castles perched on steep hillsides. They also went by the infamous Lorelei Rock, where sailors were supposedly led to their doom. On the return trip to Frankfurt, the group passed through Weisbaden, where the Iranian hostages spent time recuperating on their way home.

The Hares reported the agriculture was varied and sometimes unique. They reported a most enjoyable trip, but they are very glad to get back to Hopkins and Franklin Counties.

Salmon Stuffed Tomatoes

- 1 can (15½ oz.) salmon, drained, boned, skinned and flaked.
- ½ cup sliced green onion
- ½ cup chopped celery
- ¼ cup sliced pitted ripe olives
- 6 large tomatoes
- Salt and pepper
- ½ cup dairy sour cream
- Salad greens
- Thinly sliced cucumbers

Combine salmon, green onion, celery and olives; chill. Cut top off of each tomato; scoop out center to form cup; chill. Just before serving, sprinkle inside of tomato with salt and pepper. Fold sour cream into salmon mixture; salt and pepper to taste. Spoon into tomato cups. Serve tomatoes on salad greens surrounded by sliced cucumber. Serves 6

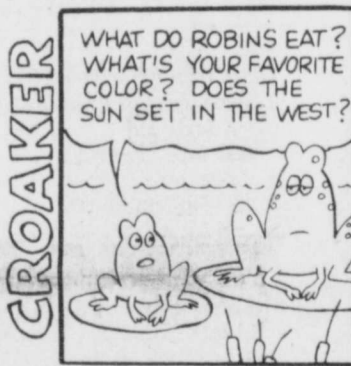
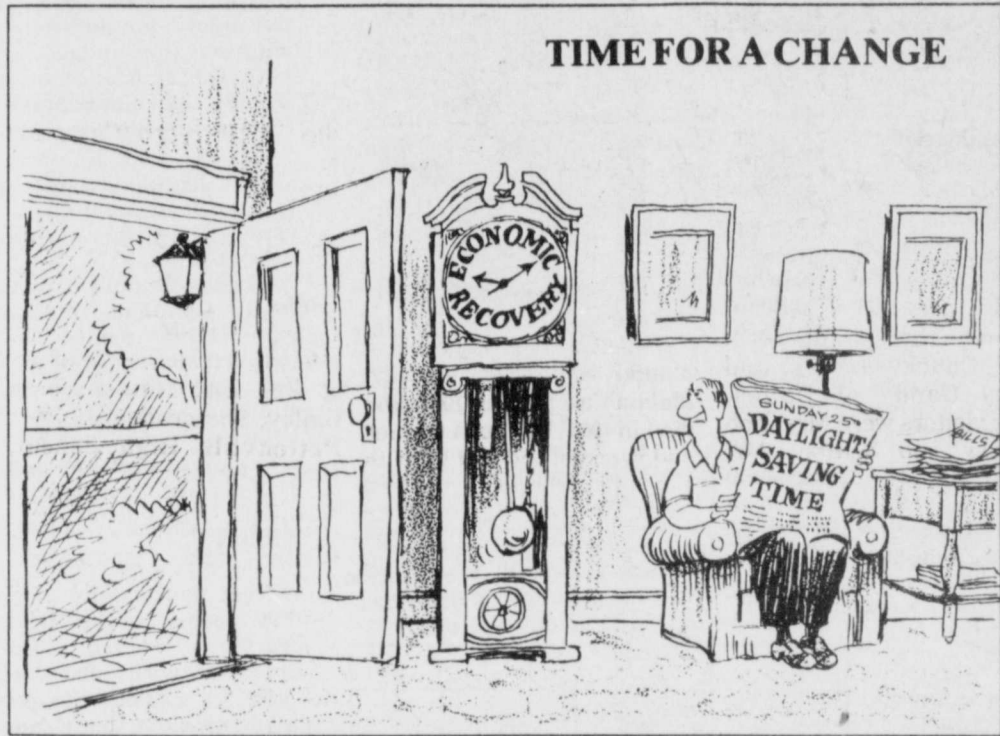

2 cups chicken broth
1/4 cup orange marmalade
2 tablespoons catsup
2 tablespoons lemon juice
6 cups hot cooked rice
Pat chicken dry. Season with salt and pepper. Dip

chicken pieces into butter, coating well on all sides. Place in baking pan, skin side up. Bake, uncovered, at 400 degrees for 30 minutes. Cook onions and bacon over low heat until onions are tender. Blend in flour and curry powder. Stir in broth and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Blend in marmalade, catsup, and lemon juice. Spoon sauce over chicken and continue baking 20 minutes longer, or until chicken is tender and richly glazed. Serve over beds of fluffy rice. Makes 8 servings.

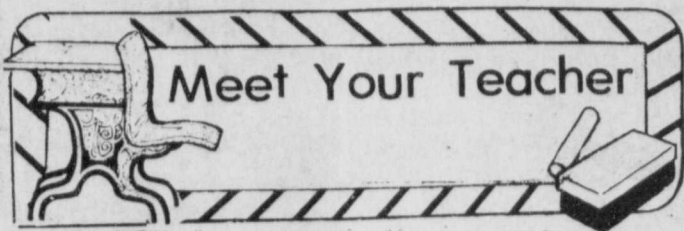

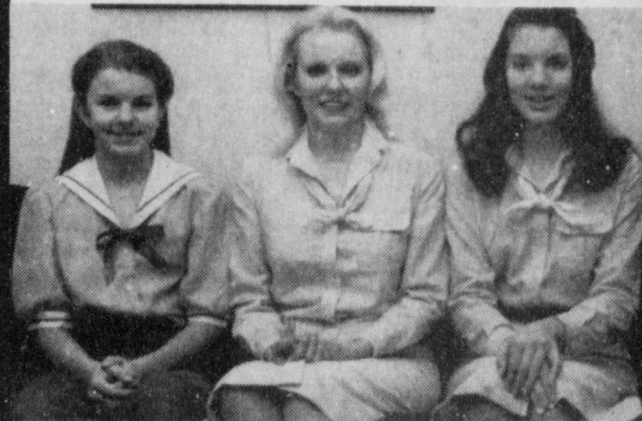

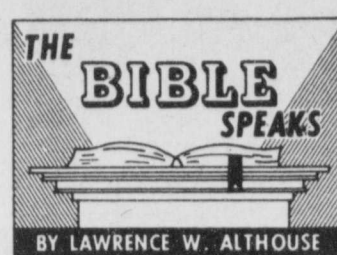

The place which you have just entered is sacred. This small cave some two thousand years ago gave shelter to the beloved disciple of Jesus Christ, St. John the Evangelist, who around the year 95 A.D. was exiled to Patmos by the Roman Emperor Domitian on account of the word of God and the testimony of Jesus Christ.

Thus reads a small brochure given me in May, 1980 in the Holy Cave of the Apocalypse on the island of Patmos in the Aegean Sea. Tradition tells us that a small recess in the rock of the cave was the place where St. John laid his head when resting. A level rock is believed to be the desk upon which his companion, Prochoros, wrote as the Apostle dictated. And that which St. John dictated and Prochoros wrote was the Revelation of John.

This was a message which God had for the churches, and, as John puts it, "he made it known by sending his angel to his servant John." So the message is from God, but what of the strange manner in which this message is presented?

Buy Your Steaks Now

If you plan on treating yourself to a steak in the next few months, now may be the time to buy it.

Steaks cost less than they will two months from now. The long range forecast is that beef and pork will increase in price.

A good buy in steaks is when the market manager reduces the price for quick sale. Most stores do this after the meat has been in the case for two days.

These steaks are dark in color due to oxidation, but they are still good to use in a day or two or to rewrap and freeze.

Other good beef buys are ground beef, chuck and sirloin tip roast. In the pork section, ham is one of the best buys, as well as Boston butt and picnics.

The best overall meat buy is liver. Beef liver, which costs more than pork liver, is running about 30 cents per serving.

High prices are still the rule for fresh fruits and vegetables. And, as in previous weeks, the best buys are in the frozen and canned food sections.

This is the time of year to fertilize bermudagrass pastures and meadows, says Dr. Sim Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Fertilization according to a soil test will give the best results. Unless phosphorus and potassium were applied last fall, a complete fertilizer is needed this spring. Cattle should be removed from crimson clover

pastures, Reeves says, if the clover is to make adequate seed for natural reseeding. Because of the growth habits of crimson clover seed heads, cattle will eat most of the heads if left on the pastures. Producers can leave cattle on Yuchi clover pastures until about the end of May when Yuchi begins to flower. A longer grazing season is one of the advantages of Yuchi clover in East Texas. Reeves says that

producers should complete sprigging bermudagrasses by the end of April for best results. As summer approaches, rainfall normally decreases, thereby reducing the chances of survival for the sprigs. A pre-emergence should be used to control weeds.

Texas Cities Receive \$31.8 Million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$31.8 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for April.

"Total payments we have sent to these cities so far this year are running more than 19 percent ahead of last year, which means sales of taxable merchandise in these cities are running that much more than 1981," Bullock said.

Houston received the biggest check, \$7 million, up 27.9 percent from the April 1981 check.

Locally, Blossom received \$574.46 for this period, a 13.68 percent increase over the \$614.59 received for the same period last year. Bogata has received \$5,207.71 to date

thus far in 1982, a 0.89 percent decrease from 1981.

Deport has received 1,575.83 this far in 1982, a 2.86 percent decrease over the \$1,622.21 received for the same period in 1981. Talco received \$3,483.72 for payment this period, with payments totaling \$10,773.15 to date, a 51.37 percent increase over last year's payment of \$7,116.95.

The city sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

Agricultural Land Registered As Foreign Owned In RR County

Seven parcels of agricultural land in Red River County amounting to 14,355.3 acres have been registered as foreign owned by the U.S. Department of Agriculture since a Federal law was passed in 1976.

This total is 3.3 percent of the agricultural land in the county, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

Foreign ownership in the state has increased only slightly from .5 percent in the first compilation in 1980 to .6 percent in 1981. The total land registered in Texas is 792,408.2 acres with an estimated value of \$884,859,162, Brown said.

A new Texas Department of Agriculture publication compiling the USDA reports as of December 1, 1981 is available by writing the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Ninety-five percent of the owners indicated that they do not plan to change the agricultural use of the land. "So far, this amount of lost acreage has not been a threat to our volume of

production.

"Land is a vital natural resource, and we should take steps to protect it if the acreage purchases by foreigners begin to mushroom," Brown said.

"The worst threat now is in the conversion of prime farm land around large metropolitan areas to industrial or residential development," Brown said.

"That is a serious problem, whoever the owner may be. Solutions are also very controversial because Texans have traditionally been against any type of land-use legislation.

"The best answer is to make agricultural

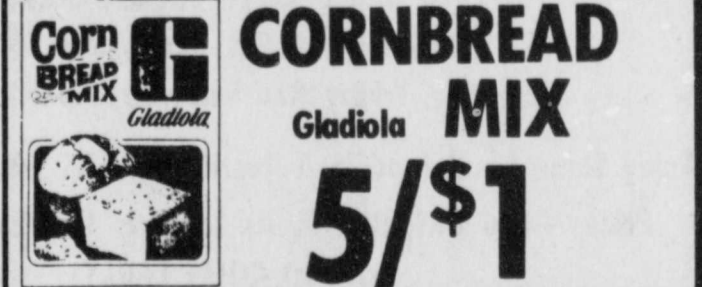

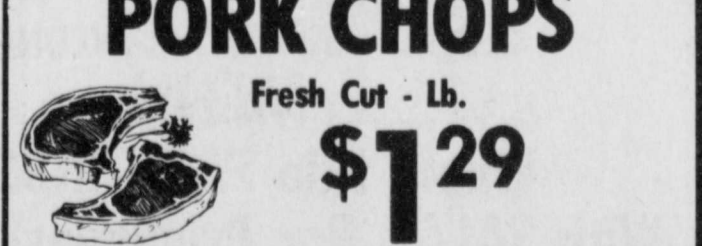
