Turbid Weather Brings Heavy Rains In Area

Five days of heavy rains and turbulent weather has dumped unneeded moisture on this area. Accompanying the hard downpours have been electrical thunderstorms, but no hail has fallen in Deport vicinity.

The government rain gauge at Deport showed 4.06 inches recorded up until Wednesday morning at 7 o'clock, according to A. C. Nixon. Breakdown figures listed 1.04 inches Friday night; 1.05 inches Saturday; .88 of an inch Sunday; .20 on Monday and .29 at 7 o'clock Wednesday morning. Intermittent rain throughout the day Wednesday had not been measured at press time.

Texas Power and Light Company's Rivercrest plant reported 5.77 inches of rainfall from Thursday of last week until 1 p. m. Tuesday.

An added 2.93 inches of rainfall on Tuesday, Wednesday and up until 8 a. m. Thursday brought Rivercrest's total up to 8.70 inches for the past week.

Reading of Deport's rain gauge Thursday morning at 7 o'clock showed 2.39 inches of rain fell during the 24 hour period from 7 o'clock Wednesday morning.

The rains further delayed planting of cotton. Farmers remembered that last spring the cotton crop was delayed a month or six weeks by rain and wet weather. Majority of the crop is usually planted the last week in April and first of May.

Streams and creeks have overflowed into lowlands by the runoff, as the earth was already soggy from several days of wet weather.

Heavy hail fell at Talco for a brief time about 9 o'clock Tuesday morning, doing some damage to window and automobile glass, flowers and gardens. Some of it was as large as golf balls, while other chunks not thoroughly frozen were in the form of shaved ice and spattered when hitting the ground.

It came from a very black cloud and was followed by heavy rainfall.

These contracts — involving 385,544 farms — call for payments totaling \$598,548,000.

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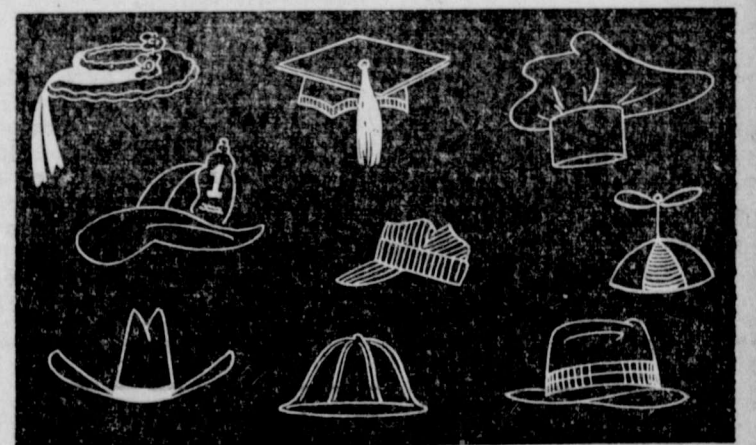
