Embry Brothers Are In Service

Three sons of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Embry are in the service and another is a veteran of service in the Pacific. They are Pfc. Vester, Pvt. Lige, Sgt. Lewis and Dick.

Pvt. Lige, who entered the service in August, 1940, attended school at County Line and Abernathy. He was first stationed at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, in the Quartermaster Corps. He then joined the Paratroopers and was sent to Camp Wolters, then to Ft. Benning, Ga., and Fort Bragg, N. C. He went overseas in August, 1942, and was stationed in England until June 6, D-Day when he went to France with the first wave of Paratroopers. After two months in Normandy, he returned to England. Pvt. Lige participated in the Holland invasion and is now with the famed 101st Airborne Division that answered "Nuts" to the Germans when they were asked to surrender.

Pfc. Vester entered the service in January, 1941. He has been stationed at Fort Sill, Okla., Camp Hood, and is now at Camp Huilen. He is a prisoner of war guard. He and Mrs. Bobbie Aylesworth were married June 9, 1944, at Bay City. Mrs. Embry, a former teacher here, is now teaching in the school at Bay City, near Camp Huilen. Vester attended school at County Line and Lubbock.

Sgt. Lewis, who attended school at County Line and Idalou, entered the service in December, 1941, and was stationed at Sheppard Field and Ft. Logan, Colo., until he went overseas in December, 1943. He was stationed in England and he and Lige visited each other several times before the invasion of France. In August, 1944, Lewis was sent to France and is still there, serving in the quartermaster corps. He and Lige met in France, December 14, a few days before the 101st Airborne group was trapped by the Germans.

Dick, a former student at County Line and Abernathy schools, entered service in September, 1938. He served in the Marine Corps in the state of Washington before going to the Philippines, where he stayed until November, 1941.

Mahlon Goebel, ARM 2c, whose address is: Box 11, STAFF, NAS, Miami, Fla., recently was awarded the Air Medal, with this citation: "For distinguishing himself by meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight as radioman in a carrier based torpedo plane assigned to attack an enemy airfield in the vicinity of Bonin Islands on 18 June, 1944. In spite of intense, heavy and accurate enemy anti-aircraft fire, which struck and damaged his plane, he materially assisted in effecting a successful attack by strafing and damaging several enemy planes on the airfield. His coolness, skill and courage were at all times in keeping with the highest traditions of the naval service."

Pvt. Mutt Harrell Is Missing in Germany



Mrs. Wanda Harrell of Texline received word Jan. 6 that her husband, Pvt. Bernice M. (Mutt) Harrell, was missing in Germany, since December 18. Pvt. Harrell, who leased his store at Monroe to R. R. Jennings when he entered service, Feb. 10, 1944, was in the grocery business at Monroe for four years.

Pvt. Harrell received training at Fort McClellan, Ala., before going to the AGF Replacement Depot at Fort George G. Meade, Md. He left the states last August, and was at Brest, France, until it fell. He went through France and Belgium into Germany.

Pvt. Harrell holds the Combat Infantryman badge. He is a native of Texline, and was graduated from the high school there in 1930. He has a sister, Mrs. A. E. Weigert of Cedaredge, Colo. His parents are dead.

Camp Shanks, N. Y., Jan. 8, 1945
My Dear Bob: I received my Plainview News today and see your father has passed on. Although he was of advanced age, I know the blow is a hard one. Please accept my sincere condolences and convey the same to John Adam, Ed and Miss Carrie.

I am a long, long way from home, but not so far as some of the younger ones whom the War Department says are able to go into combat. I miss my friends, and particularly will I miss your father when I return. He was a man of conviction and courage. Such as he made possible for us of the younger generation to enjoy the benefits of our great Plains of Texas. May we who are left take courage from his example and live our lives with the same faith and certainty of purpose.

You children should be proud of your heritage, and I know you are. Tomorrow is my Father's 79th birthday, and I would love to be able to spend it with him. The task which was yours is still ahead of me, and may it be deayed as long as possible.

I again extend my sympathies to all of you, and wish for all that peace which comes from our abiding faith in Our Lord Jesus Christ. May His love comfort you.

I am well and trust all of you are the same. I wish this war would end so all of us might once more follow the occupations of peace. Sincerely yours, Meade F. Griffin.

Antelope Cagers Beat Hale Center Owls And Cotton Center

Our record-breaking Antelope team proved victorious again with a smashing triumph over the Hale Center Owls in a cage match played here last Friday night. In the first quarter, Coach Simmons started H. Lutrick, Lambert, Rhodes, Brown & Strickland. They put the score to 13-3 that quarter. At the beginning of the 2nd quarter, McMaster, Harrison, Settle and Riley went into action and held the Owls to 5, running their own score to 18. At the half, Kelley went in making the complete B-string on the floor. At the end of the 3rd quarter the score stood at 24-10. In the last quarter the starting five went back into play setting the final score at 35-17.

Charles Lambert paced Abernathy with 11 points while Lewis made 8 points for the Owls.

Lewis Lutrick, a usual starter, was unable to play due to a side injury received in practice Thursday. This puts the Antelope count up to fourteen victories out of 15 games, suffering defeat only from the hangar section of LAAP.

The girls broke their hard luck seige with a striking success over the Hale Center girls. The first quarter score was 6-2 with Abernathy leading. By the half the girls had bosted the numbers to 13-3. In the third quarter the Antelopes rang up 6 making the score 19-5. During the last quarter our girls made 6 more, finishing the game at 25-5. Edna Payne Ledford accounted for 13 of Abernathy's points while Jefferson made all of the Owl's points.

Other girls playing were Laura Ann Lutrick, Sue Grant, Dorothy and Troyce Rhodes, Betty Barton, Dixie Neils, Alice Hix and Jeanelle Halford.

The Junior Antelopes shared victory with the senior boys and girls with a victory over the Owls in a curtain raiser. From a halftime Abernathy 9-4 lead, both teams doubted their scores for the final counts of 18-8. Smith led our juniors with 8 points while Harper and Pendergrass tied with 4 points each.



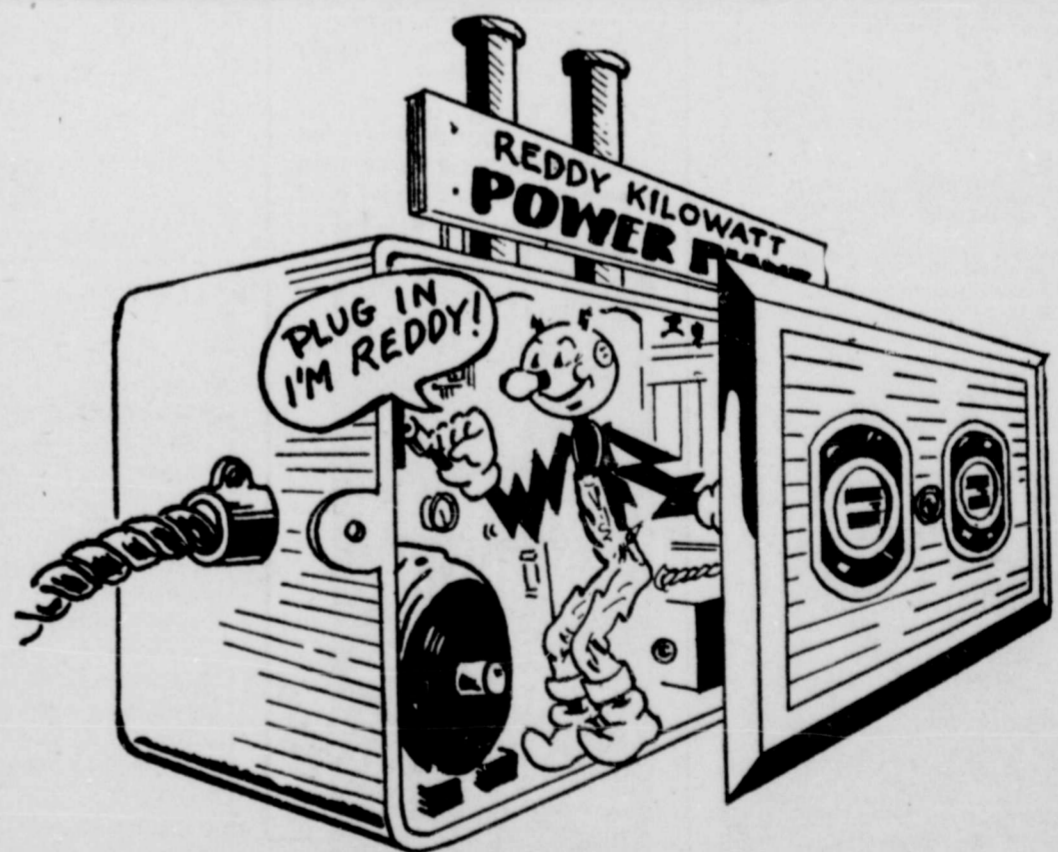
