JOIN THE SUMMER SESSION CROWD!!!

For eight weeks, beginning June 4 and ending July 28, The Crane Public Schools will hold its first annual summer school session. All courses, except laboratory sciences, will be offered to pupils who desire to attend.

This summer session affords an opportunity for every boy and girl to make better preparation for continuing their education. Pupils who lack credits sufficient to make their classification intact, pupils who need extra credits for graduation, pupils who have been unable to secure desired courses because of the conflict in hours during the regular school session, and pupils who need to take courses a second time, will find by attending the summer session, they can clear up these difficulties and thus be better adjusted to their school studies and better prepared to enter into school work at the beginning of the next regular session.

Gunnison Recaptures Quill and Scroll Trophy; Crane Second

Gunnison, Colorado, High School, with whom Crane tied in the October-November period, retailed by the February-March period to recapture the Quill and Scroll National Traveling Trophy for the business status of high school newspapers. Gunnison's rating was 631 per cent over the same period for 1933, Crane with 259 per cent placed second.

He says in part: "Since Crane and Gunnison both now have won the trophy twice, it has been decided to award the trophy to the three time winner, whether consecutive, or not; hence I will look for you or Miss Williams (sponsor of Gunnison) to win permanent possession of the handsome trophy in June."

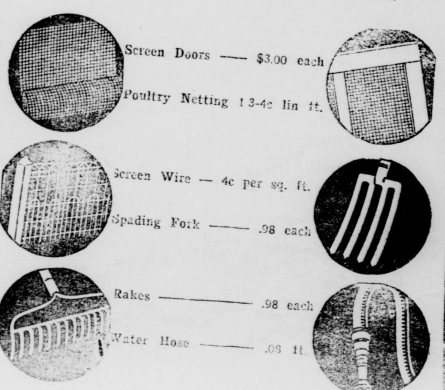
