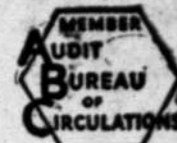

County Is Still Shy Of E Quota; Citizens Are Urged To Buy Bonds Before July 7

Still shy of the \$445,000 E bond quota, Dawson County citizens have two more days to buy bonds before the drive closes to help the area complete its Seventh War Loan quota. All E bonds which are credited to this county by the Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas by July 9 will be counted on the Seventh War Loan Drive, and DuBose states that persons subscribing for bonds here by July 7 can help fill the quota.

The chairman of the drive reports that bond buying has increased since moisture was received in this area, and expresses the hope that the county will be able to complete the E bond quota in the few days which remain in the drive.

He states that some new names have been added to the roster of the One Grand Club, including H. Carl Hogue, O. H. Morris, Jack McLaughlin, P. W. DuBose, George W. Cornett, Mrs. Glenn Jones, and E. E. Barron. These are persons who have bought \$1,000 or more bonds during the current drive. Several of the latest bond sales are not in yet.

Chairman DuBose reports that a number of the citizens have been especially hard during the thirty Seventh War Loan Drive, expresses his deep appreciation to each of those helping with the campaign.

He states that honorable mention for outstanding work during the drive goes to J. A. Johnson, Fred Rainey and J. C. O'Brien who brought the Welch Community over the top in the drive. Others given honorable mention include Mrs. E. E. Barron of Liberty, R. S. Jackson of McCarty, L. I. Dean of Mullens, Ben Dopsos and Dutch McLendon of Hancock, G. C. Clift and Bill Drennan of Woody, Jesse Merrick of O. K., Cecil Gillispie of Harmony, Willie Stovall of Mt. Olive, E. G. Murphy of Ackery, Mrs. R. M. Middleton of Grandview, Otto Rietmeyer of Sparenberg, W. B. Marshall of Union, Mrs. Kenneth Edmond, J. P. White, and J. R. Earnest of the Lamesa district.

Farmers Can Get Milk, Cotton and Beef Payments

Payments to milk producers, beef cattle producers, and to farmers insured for cotton crop loss, are ready to be made by the Agricultural Adjustment Agency, according to an announcement received this week from C. E. Tarter, administrative officer at the local AAA office.

He states that the AAA office is ready to accept applications for milk production payments for the months of April, May and June. The rate to be paid for the month of April is 17 cents for butter fat and 70 cents per cwt. for whole milk. For the months of May and June 10 cents will be paid for butter fat and 35 cents per cwt. for whole milk.

Tarter reports that beef production application blanks have arrived and that any producer in the county who sold beef to slaughter-weight for cattle weighing 800 pounds or less should apply for these payments. Producers are to present sales receipts showing name of buyer, date of sale, price received, and weight of animal.

He further reports that farmers who have cotton insurance coverage should turn in their acreage report to the local AAA office. Administrative officer Tarter states that it will be necessary to have these reports before a loss can be reported.

Five Local Men Get Discharges From The Service

Five local men have received honorable discharges from the military service, each having spent periods at overseas stations, and each being released through the army's demobilization plan.

Truman H. Wall of Route D in this county received his discharge June 24, at the Separation Center at Fort Sam Houston.

He served as a technical sergeant with the 1848th Service Unit, and spent 1 year and 10 months overseas. Wall participated in the Algeria French Morocco battles, and the Tunisian, Sicilian, Naples-Foggia, and Rome-Arno campaigns, and is holder of the American Defense Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal, EAME Campaign Medal with 5 Bronze Stars, and the Purple Heart. Entering service September 20, 1940 in Lubbock, Wall left for overseas duty October 28, 1942 and returned to the States September 1, 1944. In civilian life he was a truck driver.

Another Dawson County boy receiving his discharge was Joe D. Lambright of Route D, who served as a private in the 342 Ordnance Depot Company. He was given his honorable discharge at the Separation Center at Fort Sam Houston June 24, 1945.

Professor of the Good Conduct Medal, and EAME Campaign Medal with 3 Bronze Stars. Lambright participated in the Normandy, Northern France, and Rhineland battles.

He was overseas for 1 year and eight months, having left for Europe on October 7, 1943, and returning to the States June 17, 1945.

A veteran of the Pacific Theatre of War, Numan W. Weeks of Route 1 in this county, was granted a discharge May 21, 1945 at the Separation Center at Fort Bliss through the army's demobilization plan.

Weeks, who was a master sergeant with the 1020th Army Air Force Base Unit was stationed overseas for 2 years and 7 months, having left for New Zealand September 1, 1942 and arriving back in the States April 21, 1945. While on foreign duty, he participated in the Northern Solomons Campaign.

He wears the Good Conduct Medal and Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with 1 Bronze Star.

In civilian life he was a truck driver.

Credited with enough points to be dismissed from service is Mack R. Cooper, who served as a private first class with a reconnaissance division. Cooper entered service January 27 in Lubbock and on July 21, 1942 he left for duty overseas.

While overseas he participated in the New Guinea and Bismarck-Archipelago campaigns, for which he wears the American Defense Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with 3 Bronze Stars, and the Good Conduct Medal.

After spending 2 years and 3 months overseas, he returned to the States November 1, 1944.

His home is at 911 South Fifth Street in this city, and he was a farm hand prior to entering the service.

Possessor of the Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with 4 Bronze Stars, and the Good Conduct Medal, Howard V. Barton has been dismissed from the military service, having received his honorable discharge at the Separation Center at Fort Bliss June 9, 1945.

Barton served with the 339 Fighter Squadron and the 347th Fighter Group while overseas, and had the rating of first sergeant. An airplane and engine mechanic, he participated in the New Guinea, Bismarck-Archipelago, Guadalcanal, and Northern Solomons campaigns, and wears the Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with 4 Bronze Stars and the Good Conduct Medal.

In service since January 27, 1941, he went overseas December 31, 1942 and did not return until March 8, 1945.

Mr. and Mrs. Lee Barron of Hot Springs, Arkansas spent several days here this week visiting with his mother, Mrs. H. H. Barron.

Miss Patsey Rountree, Raymond Renner and Raymond Bryson Hatch spent the 4th in Stamford where they attended the Redco.



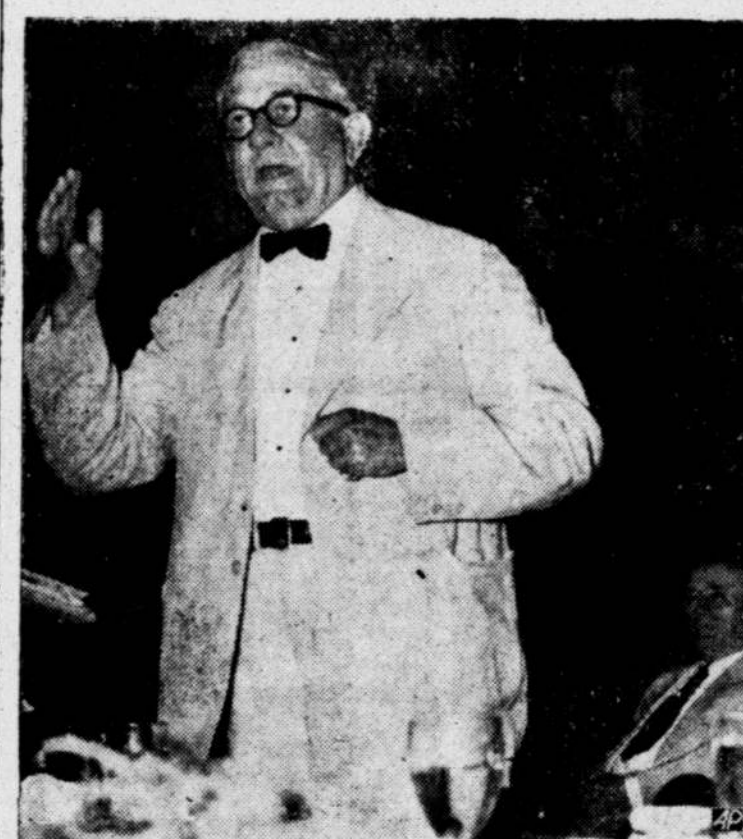

Navy Announces Plan For Mailing Papers Overseas

Again your attention is called to the fact that in subscribing for the Dawson County Courier for servicemen who are attached to the Navy, Marine, and Coast Guard personnel overseas, you will need a written statement from the party requesting the paper.

Facing gigantic mail problems, the Navy has put into effect regulations restricting the mailing of newspapers and magazines to Navy, Marine, and Coast Guard personnel overseas. Starting July 1, post offices began accepting only publications that are requested in writing by the addressee.

Figures from the Fleet Post Office, San Francisco, California, reveal that total mail has risen from 49,719,897 pieces in May, 1944 to 100,129,789 pieces in May, 1945. Postal officers expect this quantity to rise still further.

Parents, wives, and friends of overseas Navy, Marine and Coast Guard personnel are asked to remember the regulation and to bring in written requests when subscribing for the paper.

Scholastics To Be Transferred Before August 1

P. K. Humes, county superintendent, reports that the month of July is scholastic transfer time. He states that this month has been legally designated as the period for transfer of pupils from one school district to another within the same county, as well for the transfer of pupils from one district in this county to an adjoining district of another county.

He states, "Any child lawfully enrolled in any district may transfer to another upon written application of the parent or guardian or person having lawful control of such child. The application is to be made to the county superintendent."

He further reports, "Any district, however, which is dissatisfied with transfers made, may appeal to the county school board, which shall have the power to cancel said transfer or to allow same."

"All parents having children who must attend another school because their grade is not taught in the home district should make transfers no later than August 1. Many parents have disregarded transfer regulations in past years. Under the present law, transfers will enable both sending and receiving districts to receive the state payments much earlier than they would if they disregarded transferring high school pupils."

F-O Robertson Former German Prisoner Is Here

F-O George (Pink) Robertson, prisoner in the German Reich from September 23, 1944 until his liberation on May 1, 1945, is now visiting in this city with his brother, Scott Robertson and family.

Serving with a Troop Carrier Command, Flight Officer Robertson arrived overseas in August of 1944. He flew his missions from a base in England. He participated in the invasion of Holland, and his glider was shot down by flak over Arnhem, Holland. It was seven days before he was taken prisoner by the Germans, during which time he and his group engaged in combat.

Liberated on May 1, F-O Robertson left Germany and arrived in France May 15. He was then returned to the States, arriving in Boston June 21.

He wears the ETO Ribbon, Purple Heart, and Air Medal.

He will be in this city until Friday, when he will go to Lorraine to visit his mother, Mrs. Ruby Robertson. Upon the completion of his furlough during the latter part of August, F-O Robertson reports to Miami, Florida.

Final Rites For M. M. Goodrich Were Held On June 29th

M. M. Goodrich, a resident of this county for the past 1 1-2 years, passed away Thursday, June 28. Funeral services were held Friday in San Antonio.

Mr. Goodrich was born January 26, 1866 in Mississippi. A widower since 1937, he had retired from business. At the time of his death he was 89 years of age.

He is survived by four sons including L. B. Goodrich of this city; Louis M. Goodrich of Shavano, Colorado; and Leo Goodrich of Amarillo.

General Rain Brightens The Crop Prospects Of County

Rains received over a three day period beginning Sunday, July 1, and extending through Tuesday, July 3, ranged from 1-2 inch to 2-65 inches of moisture, the largest amount of precipitation the county has received this year.

All areas of the county received moisture enough to materially improve conditions.

The Lamesa area received 2-65 inches from the downfall, according to Mrs. R. Speck, which fell intermittently over the three day period and ranged from light mists to soaking rains.

According to C. E. Tarter, administrative officer at the AAA office, the Welch district received only about 1-2 inch of moisture, as did the strip from Arvana to Hindman Switch.

Another district where precipitation amounted to approximately 1-2 inch was in Key.

Other areas of the county were reported to have received from 1-2 inch to 2-65 inches according to Tarter, to whom a number of the farmers of this area reported. The largest amount of moisture was recorded in the Lamesa area and in the Higginbotham Community.

The administrative officer stated that everyone he had contacted since the rain seemed to believe they had enough moisture to plant feed and blackeyed peas.

He states that quite a bit of feed has already been planted, but that the larger percentage of the crops in the county are yet to be planted. He reports that 250,000 acres of feed were planted in the county last year and that he expects more than 300,000 acres to be planted this year.

"Though very few blackeyed peas have been planted to date, we are hoping to have around 50,000 acres planted. Dawson County farmers have already bought 212 sacks of peas, which amount to 21,000 pounds. The planting season for peas is just now opening, and a number will have a crop if they can secure the seed."

He continues, "Between 15,000 and 20,000 acres of cotton are up in Dawson County, and the moisture received this week will greatly benefit the crops. This will probably be the only cotton made here, but it is believed that the crops which are up will be good if weather conditions are favorable henceforth. In the year just past approximately 125,000 acres of cotton were planted."

Tarter states, "The fact that the rains were general over most of Texas will aid this area too. This will eliminate the dry winds, which are harmful to crops, and the damp atmosphere will be beneficial."

Car Of Waste Paper Is Goal Of Local Council

Mrs. J. H. Adkins, chairman of the home demonstration council committee on waste paper, has announced that the council will start collection on a car of paper in the near future.

She asks all housewives over the county to start saving all your paper now.

A plan for storing this needed item until a car load has been collected will be announced soon. In the meantime you are asked to keep your waste paper for the home demonstration council, and they will send it to war.

Waste paper is badly needed, and many are plainly worried over a severe let down in paper collections with the collapse in Germany. All types of paper are needed so don't destroy yours but collect all the newspapers, magazines and books, wastebasket paper, and corrugated boxes you can and be ready to help in the waste paper campaign, when the collections start in this county.

Captain M. Key Returns After Being Overseas

After spending twenty months overseas, Captain Marion Key arrived here this week to spend his thirty day furlough visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. V. O. Key. He will be assigned to duty in the Pacific, after the completion of his furlough.

Captain Key served with the Intelligence Division of the Air Corps while overseas and was stationed in London, England; Paris, France; and Hamburg, Germany, while on foreign duty.

He entered the military service 3 years ago and received his training at Lubbock Army Air Field, and at a station in Miami Beach, Florida.

Captain Key is a Lamesa High School graduate and a graduate of the law school at Texas University. Prior to entering the service, he practiced law in Lubbock.

School Payment Arrives For Area

An announcement received this week from the county superintendent's office reveals that the county has received a transportation payment for the various schools here.

The fund amounted to \$18,376.00 and according to County Superintendent Humes, an additional \$1,500 will probably be received in the county as an adjustment payment.

He states that the county school board will meet today, Thursday, July 5, and will make the apportionments for the different schools. According to Humes the fund will be divided among these schools: Mullens, Key, Liberty, Klondike, Munger, Ackery, Dawson, Woody, Union, Sparenberg, and O. K.

'Odd Lot' Shoes To Be Sold Ration Free July 9 Through 28

Consumers will be given an opportunity to buy men's and women's "odd lot" shoes ration-free and at markdown prices when a small percentage of shoes in these categories is released to the public during the three-week period July 9 through July 28, OPA Rationing Executive William G. Williams has announced.

"Odd lot" shoes must be sold to consumers at prices at least 25 percent below the prices at which they were offered for sale on June 1, 1945.

The Office of Civilian Requirements and OPA are requesting dealers to limit sales of "odd lot" shoes to no more than a pair to each customer, to allow more people to share in the limited stocks.

Rationing Of 1942 Autos Lifted July 2

Used 1942 automobiles were removed from rationing on July 2, 1945, according to District OPA Rationing Executive William G. Williams.

Principal reason for the rationing of used 1942 cars—that they were generally the best automobiles available aside from new 1942 cars and so should be restricted to essential users—no longer holds true, making rationing unnecessary, Williams said.

Automobile dealers and car rental agencies must continue to maintain records previously required for all 1942 cars, but all rationing restrictions on the transfer, acquisition, registration, alteration and use of 1942 cars are being removed.

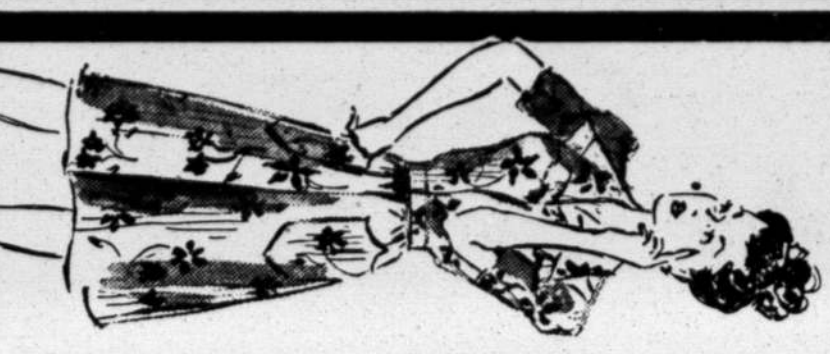

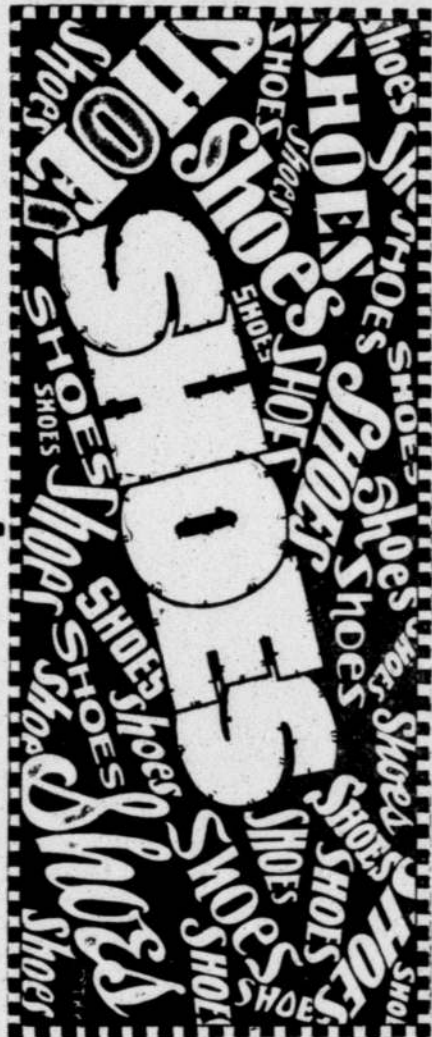

Latest News From COUNTY AGENT

T. A. BARFIELD
County Agricultural Agent

Keeping shrubs healthy is a year-round job, says County Agent T. A. Barfield, and though winter is the time to give the shrubbery a general pruning, several prunings may also be needed during the growing season. After shrubs bloom early in the spring they should be cut back immediately so that they may begin to form flower buds for the next spring.

Shrubs and trees neglected during the winter may be pruned until the middle of July, says Barfield. However, heavy pruning during the summer, which produces an abundance of new growth late in the year, is dangerous. Suckers on tree trunks should be cut off, and if a second crop of flowers is desired from crape myrtle, vitex and other late blooming plants, the flower tips should be removed before seeds are formed. When summer flowers such as petunias grow into unattractive forms they may be cut back. New growth will bloom before frost. Some kinds of pruning may be done any time during the year. Dead limbs, diseased limbs, limbs that rub and injure each other should be removed regardless of season.

Several rules should be kept in mind when pruning. For example: plan all large cuts before taking off any small limbs, use sharp tools, and leave no stubs as all cuts should be sharp and clean. Cut all dead, dying, diseased or injured limbs first.

Practice and study are necessary for satisfactory results in pruning, but mistakes for the beginner should not cause discouragement, as vigorous plants will soon cover them up, and the be-

Peppers are valuable in diets both for their vitamin A and vitamin C. Red peppers, especially if they ripen on the vine, have more vitamins than green. They are equally as good in salads and stuffed as green ones after one gets used to the change in flavor. Baked stuffed red peppers are especially pretty as well as very good to eat. "Tomato Salad."

Here's a salad combination we have not seen before. It sounds good and offers a good way to use left over boiled potatoes. Cut into cubes 2 cups cold boiled potatoes. The potatoes should be well done but quite firm. Cut an equal amount of ripe tomatoes in the same sized cubes. Rub salad bowl with garlic (if your family likes garlic). Mix tomatoes and potatoes, and add 1-2 cup French dressing. A little onion and some cottage cheese may be added if desired.

"Invert Sugar."

If you have not tried invert sugar as a sugar substitute, please do. Mrs. L. F. Kennedy of the McCarty Home Demonstration Club, had some on last club day. "There's no question about its being twice as sweet," was the consensus of opinion of the ladies who tasted it.

Let us did not see the first directions we believe they are worth repeating: Use 2 cups of sugar, 1-4 teaspoon tartaric acid, and 1 cup water. Mix and cook at simmering temperature for 30 minutes. When it is cool it is ready to use in drinks, in ice cream, on fruits, on cereals, etc. It is good for canning. One cup of water and 1-4 cup invert sugar makes an equivalent to the light syrup in your B-85-Canning Fruit and Vegetables.

"New Bulletin"

There's a new bulletin on our desk and it looks like a good one. The title is "Pattern Alteration," but there is more than this in it. There are directions for taking correct measurements of the figure before buying commercial patterns as well as directions for altering the pattern to the individual figure. It also tells women whose figure presents the most problems how to alter a pattern, make a model dress, rip it and cut a permanent pattern for herself. Copies have been ordered for the office. Don't forget to ask for yours if you are interested.

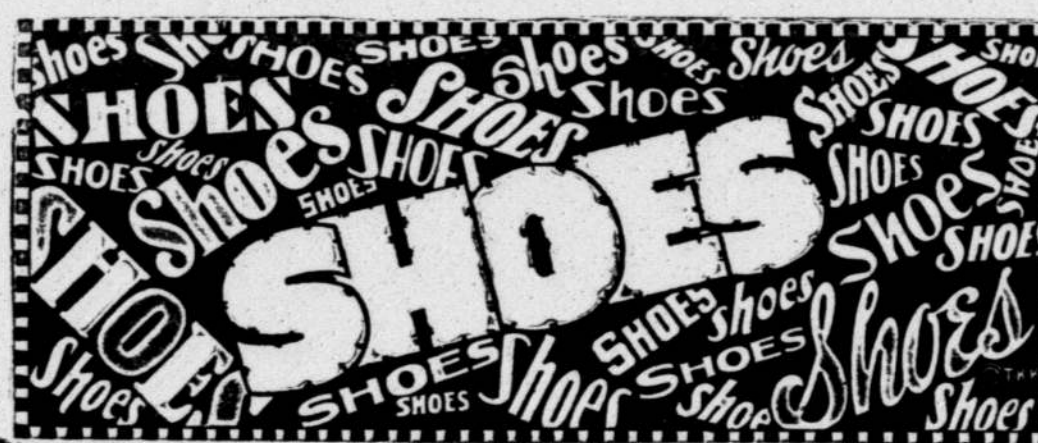

Fund To Protect Postwar Cotton Markets Sought

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (Special) — A two-million dollar "fighting fund" with which to assure protection and expansion of cotton's postwar markets is being sought in an industry-wide campaign launched by the National Cotton Council. Dawson County cotton farmers, handlers and processors are included in the drive.

Scientific research, sales promotion, improvements in production and processing, and recovery of export markets are the four primary activities to be financed under the new program.

All branches of the industry are participating in pledges which together total 20 cents on each bale of cotton produced. Through officials of their own organizations in the 17 cotton growing states, farmers have agreed to furnish one-half of the amount, and handlers and processors the other half.

Plans call for direct payments on the part of handlers and processors, and for indirect payment by the farmer through his local gin. Already, in response to requests from officials of farm organizations, approximately 2,000 gins have signed agreements to act as collecting agencies.

Recognition that cotton will soon lose today's market for tremendous quantities of military fabrics has spurred industry leaders to press the campaign to rapid completion. Such leaders point out that 70 per cent of today's cotton fabric production is now going into priority goods, and that immediate financing of cotton's postwar sales program is essential to the industry's success in maintaining maximum consumption.

Cotton's postwar competition will come from three directions, according to President Oscar Johnston of the Council. "Synthetic fibers will strike at its markets from above, paper and jute will strike from below, and foreign growths of cotton will strike from all sides," he says.

Declaring that with this campaign "the nation's largest agricultural industry is out to make its full contribution to the postwar welfare of the Cotton Belt and of the nation," Mr. Johnston predicts "a postwar program which will give to cotton the full benefits of scientific research and investigation, and which will put behind its products the tremendous and effective power of modern sales pressure."

National Farm Safety Week Has Been Announced

County Agent T. A. Barfield states that the week following July 22 has been designated by President Truman as National Farm Safety Week. He states, "Do not wait to clean out hazards around the farm which might cause injury or losses of material value. Results of a study by the National Safety Council show that one out of five disabling accidents are due to disorder."

The agent asserts, "Clean up to prevent fires is the keynote to safety. It is pointed out that with farm labor shortages and demands for increased food production, farmers can not afford to lose the services of family members or farm workers through accidents. A day spent now to eliminate farm danger spots may result in the saving of many days during the rush season later on."

Now is a good time to check through the farm shop and see that hammer and axe handles are secure and in good condition. "If there is not a definite place for every tool," Barfield urges, "room should be provided. Keeping tools in their right places saves time and reduces injury hazards. Seeing that ladders and steps are in good shape, broken places in flooring have been repaired, and stairways have been cleared of obstructions are other good safety precautions."

Barfield gives warning that loose materials, unused farm equipment and lumber, stored overhead on rafters of farm building often cause accidents. "Appearances of farm homes are often spoiled by accumulations of barbed wire, glass and other materials which increase the possibility of accidents," he concludes.

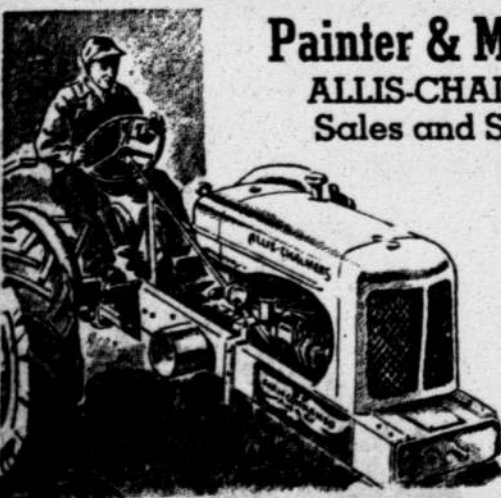

The Army ANSWERS Your Personal War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. Is there any way a soldier who has been sentenced to a year in the guardhouse can be released from the service for good without serving his one year's sentence?

A. If the soldier's sentence stated that he is to be dishonorably discharged following a year's detention, the headquarters which reviewed his case after the court passed the sentence, or a higher headquarters, may remit his detention and allow him to be discharged. His sentence may also be commuted by the Secretary of War.

Q. I am an Army veteran. I am employed in an essential industry, but have a chance to take a better job. Is it true that I can take this other job without getting a release from my present employer?

A. Yes. If you are a veteran of World War II, you are not subject to War Manpower Commission rulings and do not need a release to accept other employment.

Q. Is there any limitation as to the time a veteran has in which to apply for schooling under the G. I. Bill of Rights?

A. Yes. To obtain the educational privileges of the G. I. Bill of Rights, a veteran must go to school within two years after the end of the war. If he is discharged after the war is over, he has two years following the date of his discharge in which to apply for the educational benefits.

Q. My son had eighty discharge points to his credit last May. Will he continue to draw points each month?

A. No. There are no points given for service after May 12, 1945.

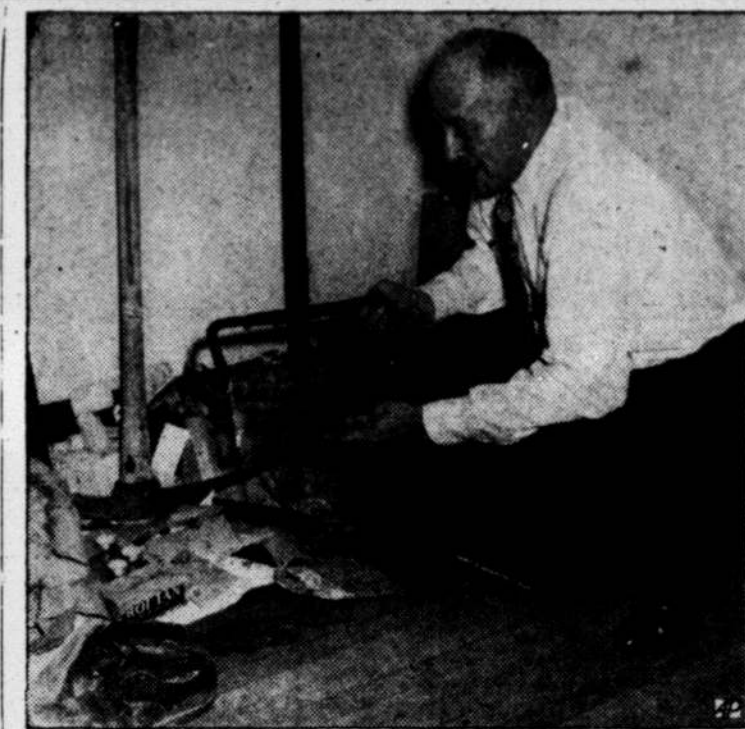

A brother, Sgt. Lester Riddle, was killed in action in Metz, France. Two other brothers, Pvt. Cleve Riddle and Pfc. Arthur Riddle, are in the service; the former with the Medical Corps in New Guinea, and the latter with the Quartermaster Corps at Camp Lee, Virginia.

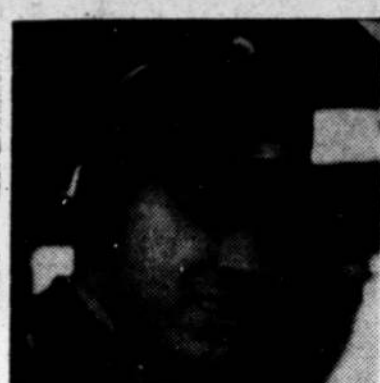
Gresham Battery & Electric Opens Here

Cattle Feeders In County Can Apply For Payments

Cattle feeders in Dawson County can now apply to the County AAA office for beef cattle production payments under the Government's new program to increase the production of meat.

Feeders are encouraged to feed more cattle, including those he purchases and those he raises, to good and choice grades under the new program. The method of payment is similar to the dairy payment program also handled through the County AAA office, according to County AAA Chairman Joe M. Peterson.

The beef cattle production payment amounts to 50 cents per hundredweight on Good or Choice cattle weighing 800 pounds or more and selling for at least the minimum stabilization price, which for sales in this county is 13 1-2 cents.

This is the first meat production payment made directly to livestock feeders. The program is designed to help hold the line against inflation by preventing sharp increases in retail prices which might lead to uncontrolled increases in wages and other economic factors.

The beef cattle production payment is available to all feeders, including slaughterers who also are feeders, provided their cattle meet the program requirements.

To be eligible a feeder must certify on his application (1) that he owned the cattle at least 30 days

before their sale, (2) that the cattle weighed at least 800 pounds when sold, (3) that the cattle brought not less than the minimum price for good grade, and (4) that the cattle were sold for slaughter to an authorized slaughterer.

An authorized slaughterer is any slaughterer who operates under Federal inspection or under an OPA permit at the time he slaughtered the feeder cattle on which the payment have been made.

A feeder-slaughterer is eligible to receive payment provided payment has not previously been made on his cattle. He may also receive payment on cattle he raises provided they are eligible under the program.

To collect payment he must substantiate the date of purchase, the price he paid, and the weight at the time of purchase. He must also certify the grade and weight of the carcass after slaughterer to further determine the eligibility of the cattle.

A feeder other than a feeder-slaughterer must present sales receipts, invoices, sales tickets, or other written evidence from the buyer to certify (1) date of sale

(2) the name of the buyer, (3) the point of sale, (4) the number of head, (5) the total liveweight, (6) the price received, and (7) the name of the legal authorized slaughterer to whom sold.

In addition the feeder, if he did not raise the cattle, must show the status of the cattle at the time he purchased them by furnishing the name of the person from whom purchased, and the date of the purchase. The feeder may also be required to furnish evidence that the payment has not been made previously on these cattle.

Payments will be made from funds of the Commodity Credit Corporation of which \$40,000,000 has been authorized.

Farmers may obtain details of the program from their local AAA office. Applications will be accepted and payments made by the County AAA office as soon as the necessary forms are received.
