JOHN ALBRITTON INJURED TODAY IN AUTO COLLISION

An accident this morning at the street crossing at 10th and Broad caused by an automobile coming in violent contact with a street car came very near having serious consequences. The car driven by a man named Rose was coming down Tenth when it was interrupted by a street car, which hit the auto in the rear end with sufficient force to throw John Albritton, who was occupying the front seat with Mr. Rose on to the windshield and cause painful but not serious injuries, which consisted in a broken nose and a few scratches and bruises. Albritton was the only occupant of the car who was hurt. The damage to the car consisted mainly in two badly crushed fenders and the rear was badly dented where the street car crashed into it. The name of the motorman operating the car at the time was not learned, but witnesses stated the street car was not damaged to any great extent. The injured man was taken to the hospital for an examination. Later removed to his home upon finding that his injuries were not serious.

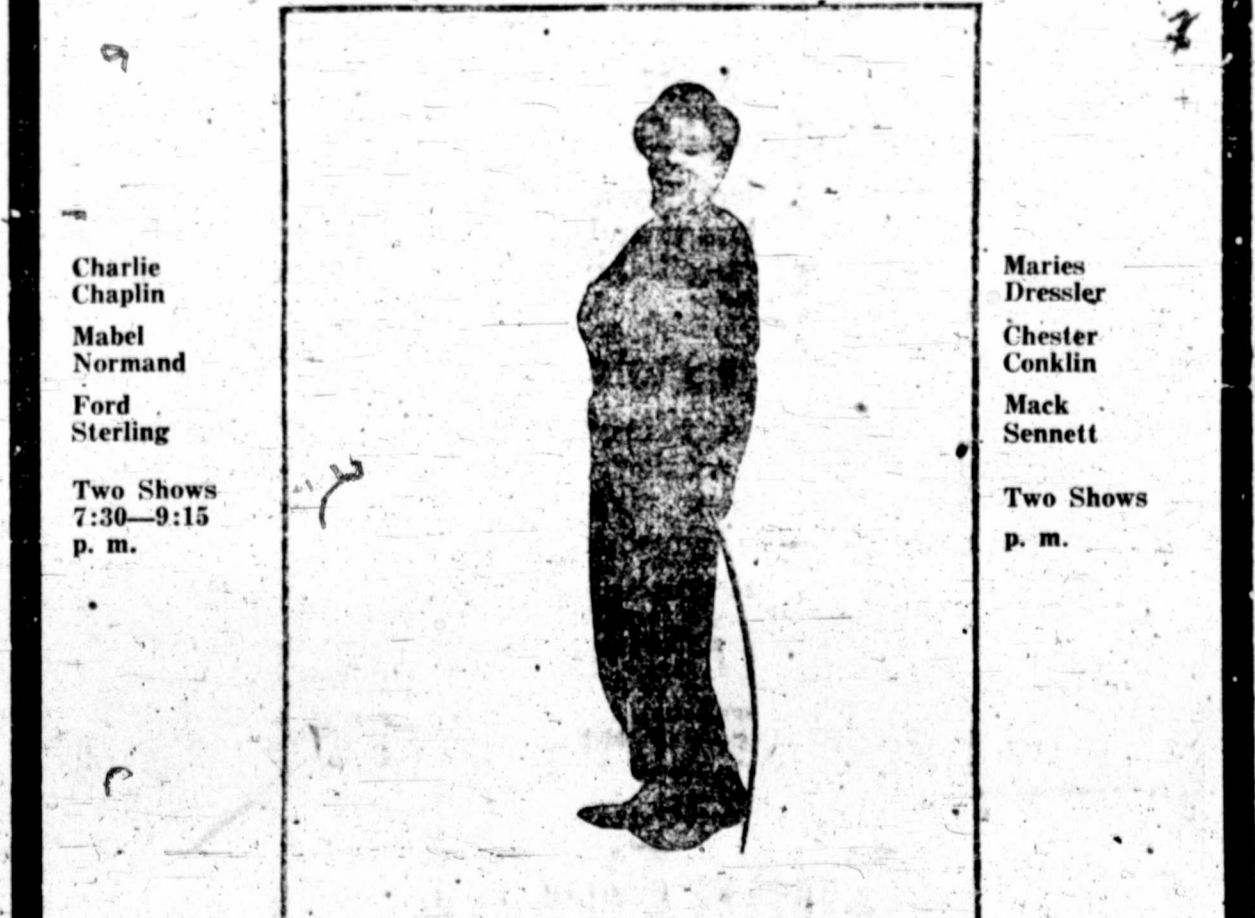

GET TOGETHER MOVE. Senator Lodge has sent out a warning to republican leaders to make no statement on the League of Nations until a conference has been held to determine the party's attitude.

Public sentiment may force the republicans to reluctantly support the League of Nations. It is certain the party will make it a partisan issue and oppose it if their leaders feel that they can get away with it.

So far as the majority party in congress is concerned, Senator Lodge and other republican leaders want to put a clamp on public discussion and prevent free expressions until the "general staff" has determined a policy. Senator Lodge has learned something from the Prussians.

COMMENDABLE ACT OF THE GOVERNOR. The Times commends Governor Hobby for his decision to call the legislature in session to consider legislation to permit soldiers to vote on the constitutional amendments to be submitted next month.

If the constitution or the statutes can be stretched to permit these men to vote, let's stretch them and do an act of justice and gratitude. It will be ingratitude to deny our soldiers the right to vote. Governor Hobby now believes that a way can be found legally to permit the soldiers to vote. He has called the legislature to convene next Monday to enact the necessary legislation.

Market Report

COTTON MARKET

By Associated Press.
 NEW YORK, April 30.—There was a sharp break in the cotton market early today. The opening was easy at an advance of two to a decline of 22 points in response to lower cables. An unfavorable weather map checked selling at the start but offerings soon increased with new style months selling 25 to 81 points net lower, or a 26.17 for July and 24.35 for October. The break was attributed to a weak technical position and reports that reduction in acreage would fall short of that advocated by Southern organizations.

Trade buying helped to absorb the early offerings and the market turned firmer late in the morning on covering. The weekly report of the weather bureau was considered about a stand off but reported slow germination in most sections and may have helped the rally which carried July up to 25.68 and October to 24.68 around mid-day. Two private reports were published, pointing to a decrease of from 12 to 15 per cent in acreage. There was a renewal of heavy general liquidation early in the afternoon, which sent prices into new low ground for the day with July at 25.17 and October at 24.27, or 80 to 88 points net lower.

Cotton closed steady.

New Orleans Cotton.

NEW ORLEANS, April 30.—Much needed in Texas and harsh expectations regarding the tone of the weekly crop and weather accounts caused heavy selling of cotton today after a rise of seven to 10 points on the morning of the opening call. At the end of the first half hour of trading prices were 9 to 64 points under the close of yesterday.

The weekly crop reports were hardly as favorable as generally expected and at a decline of 55 to 64 points the market took on a steeper tone. At noon prices were 20 to 25 points up from the bottom. The market turned soft again under renewed bear pressure and at 1 o'clock stood at a net decline of 75 to 88 points.

Cotton closed steady.

GRAIN AND PRODUCE

 CHICAGO, April 30.—Notwithstanding that yesterday witnessed the biggest setback ever known for prices of corn during a single session of the board of trade, excited liquidation by holders continued today and values underwent decided new breaks. The fresh selling was based chiefly on the statement of the federal wheat director that he would actively antagonize speculative efforts to hoist the cost of flour. On the other hand, current reports that owing to the severity of yesterday's decline, country elevators had largely stopped offerings of corn, tended at times to rally the market. Opening prices which ranged from 3/4 to 4 1/4 lower with July 31.52 to 31.55 and September 31.47 to 31.49 were followed by a reaction in some cases to the same as yesterday's close, but then by a drop to the bottom of the initial range.

Oats paralleled the fluctuations of corn. Trade in oats, however, lacked the feverish activity which characterized the dealings in the leading cereal. After opening 1/4 to 1 1/2 off with July 68 to 65 1/2, the oats market re-

covered moderately, but later sagged again.

Covering by shorts brought about sharp bulges later although just before the close a sudden transition fresh break resulted from assertions credited to Julius Barnes at St. Louis that too high prices for corn and oats would be ironed out by the government. The close was extremely nervous at 1/2 to 2 1/2 net advance with July 31.56 to 31.56 1/2 and September 31.49. Weakness of quotations on hogs and corn pulled down provisions. The steepest fall was for pork, \$1.40 a barrel, \$1.52 to \$1.53.

Subsequently buying, which was ascribed to packing interests, led to upturns but the effect failed to last.

TWENTY-FIVE MILLION DOLLARS IN BONDS IN STATE TREASURY VAULTS

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, April 30. - Filled away in the State Treasury is \$25,000,000 worth of bonds, which bear an average annual interest of 5 per cent, or \$1,250,000. In a fairly large room the walls are lined to the height of an average man's reach with steel filing cases. In the cases repose road bonds, rail bonds, courthouse bonds, school bonds, general county bonds and in fact almost all kinds of good bonds issued in Texas.

Slightly more than 4,000 accounts are maintained in connection with the handling of these bonds, and one man attends to the receiving of them, and the collecting of the interest. W. C. Clark, who is responsible for the collection of more than \$1,000,000 annually, says that clipping coupons from these bonds is a tedious task. When new bonds are received they are pressed to make them fit in the filing cases, the current coupons are clipped, cancelled and filed, and the bond is filed. NEWLY ELECTED MAYOR TAKES AIRPLANE TRIP OVER CITY OF DALLAS

By Associated Press. DALLAS, April 30. - In order to get a new point of view on the improvements needed by Dallas, Frank W. Wozencraft, the newly elected mayor, has taken a bird's eye view of the city by airplane. He spent several hours in the air with Major Albert Speed, commander of Love Field.

"The first thing I saw was the need of straightening the Trinity River," said the mayor. "I have lived here all my life but I never before realized the twists and turns that stream makes. It is so crooked, it makes a rattle snake look like a straight line."

"My observations would lead me to believe that about one third of the habitable land in and around Dallas is plowed and in cultivation. The remainder seems to be green in new crops."

"The necessity of removing the railroad tracks from Pacific avenue also impressed me. The picture is of a metropolitan city with one of its main down town streets blocked constantly with freight cars and freight sheds."

"Dallas' paved road system looks good from on high—much better, in fact than it really is when you roll over the roads in an automobile."

YOUTH CONVICTED OF STEALING GRAIN SACKS IS ORDERED RELEASED

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, April 30. - Raymond Brooks, who was adjudged delinquent at the age of 13 years and committed to the training school at Gatesville, Texas, until he was 21 for stealing 50 empty grain sacks, worth 10 cents, in Cooke county, was ordered released under habeas corpus proceedings in the court of criminal appeals today.

The court opinion, it was said, orders his release and appearance for a new trial, set forth the above statement of facts. It adds that there is no provision in the juvenile law governing appeals and that one section of the law seems to sweep away the distinction between felons and misdemeanors. The opinion says, however, that the maximum commitment to the training school authorized by the law is five years, and the excessive sentence is one of the groundings for

ordering release of the boy. Another ground is that proceedings under which the boy was committed were such that the father who was present, swears that he did not know the boy was being tried for the offense, and no attorney was present to represent him, although one had been employed.

The judgment in the case of Brooks' father, given death penalty in Walker county for rape, was reversed and the case remanded. Brooks' testimony to support the penalty being given as reason for reversal.

SAN JOSE, Calif., April 30.—An earthquake of rather severe intensity, more than 400 miles distant was recorded today at Lick Observatory, Mount Hamilton, near San Jose. The main direction of the shock was north and south.

GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY RECORDS EARTHQUAKE

WASHINGTON, April 30.—A very severe and prolonged earthquake estimated to have centered between 4,000 and 4,100 miles from Washington was recorded early today at the Georgetown university seismological observatory.

GERMAN DELEGATES REACH VERSAILLES TUESDAY EVENING

VERSAILLES, April 30.—Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, German foreign minister, Herr Sauerberg, secretary for publicity, art and literature, Dr. Theodor Meißner, general manager of the Warburg bank, Herr Leinert, president of the Prussian assembly, Herr Giesberts, minister of posts and telegraphs, and Herr Schuecking, Germany's plenipotentiary to the peace congress, reached the little station at Versailles, five miles from Versailles, at 9:45 o'clock tonight.

The German delegates, accompanied by 60 experts, assistants and journalists, traveled in two special trains from Germany. After listening to a short address and being photographed by an army of press photographers, the Germans were conveyed in automobiles to Versailles, where they are now lodged in hotels.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Nine officers and 444 men, comprising a headquarters detachment, supply and medical detachments and companies A, B and C of the 114th field signal battalion of the 39th (Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas) division, were among arrivals here today aboard the transport Regina d'Italia, from Marselles. Other troops included casualties from Oklahoma and Arkansas.

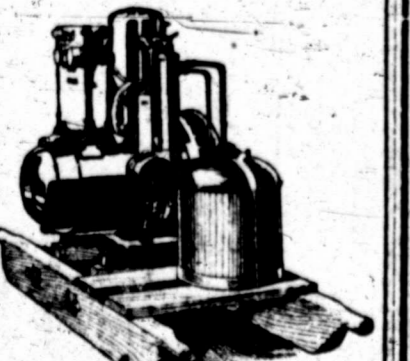

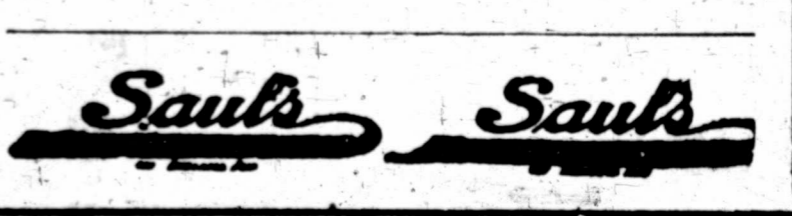

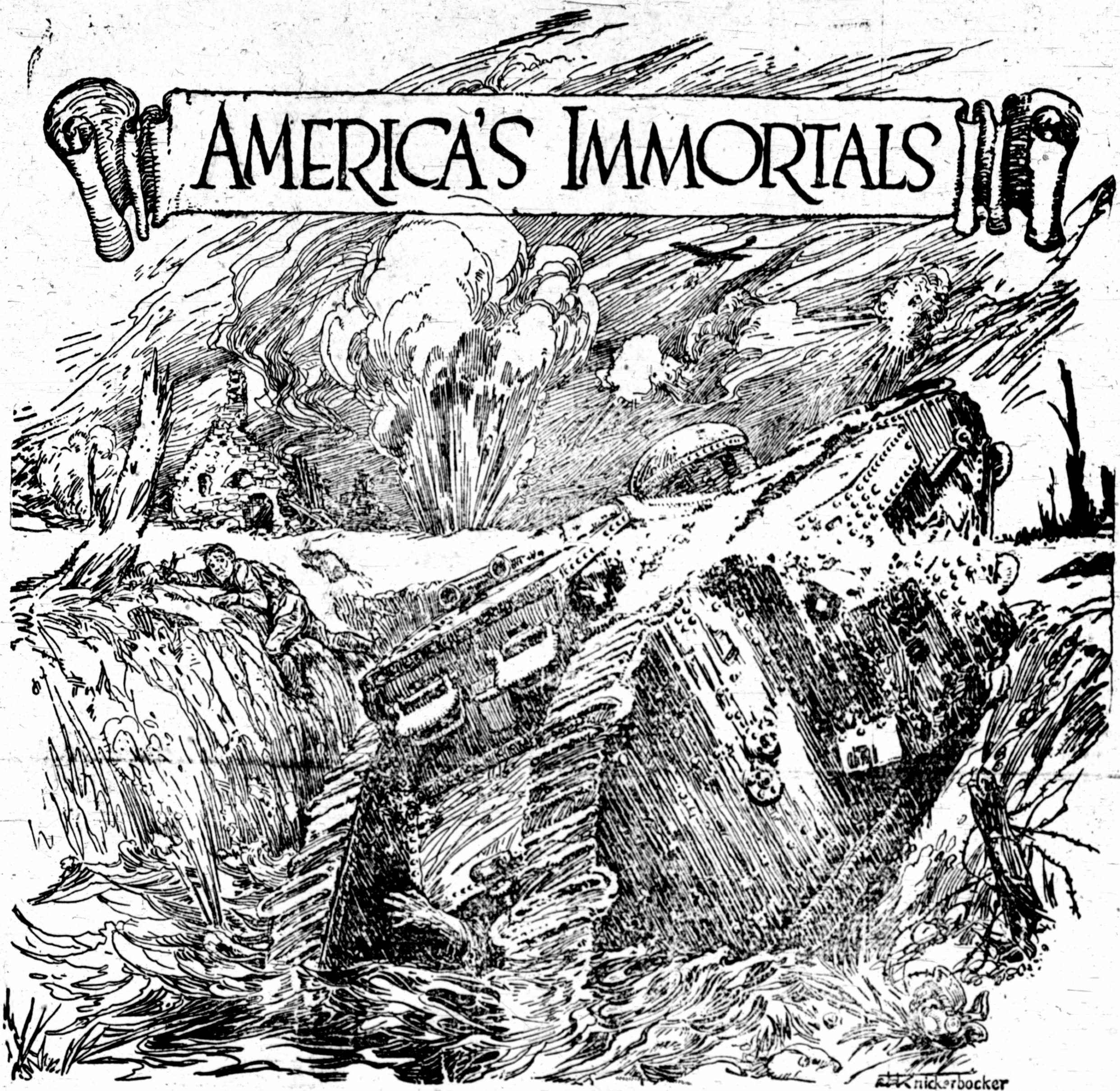

TEXT OF PRESIDENT WILSON'S NOTE TO ITALIAN DELEGATES

By Associated Press.
 PARIS, April 30.—A statement was issued last night dealing with the memorandum sent by President Wilson to the Italian delegation on April 14 with permission to make it public in Italy and when was given out today in Rome.

A complete copy of the President's statement under the heading "Memorandum concerning the question of Italian claims on the Adriatic" follows:

"There is no question to which I have given more careful or anxious thought than I have given to this, because in common with all my colleagues it is my earnest desire to see the utmost justice done to Italy.

Fourteen Principles.

"Throughout my consideration of it, however, I have felt that there was one matter in which I had no choice and could wish to have none. I felt bound to square every conclusion that I should reach as accurately as possible with the fourteen principles of peace which I set forth in my address to congress of the United States on the eighth of January, 1918, and in subsequent addresses.

"These fourteen points and the principles laid down in the subsequent addresses were formally adopted by the powers associated against Germany and will constitute the basis of peace with Germany. I do not feel at liberty to suggest one basis for peace with Germany and another for peace with Austria.

Reply to Austria.

"It will be remembered that in reply to a communication from the Austrian government offering to enter into negotiations for an armistice and peace on the basis of the fourteen points to which I have alluded, I said there was one matter to which those points no longer applied. They had demanded autonomy for the several states which had constituted parts of the Austro-Hungarian empire, and I

pointed out that it must now be left to the choice of the people of these several countries what their destinies and political relations should be.

"They have chosen with the sympathy of the whole world to be set up as independent states. Their complete separation from Austria and the complete dissolution of the Austro-Hungarian empire has given a new aspect and significance to the settlement which may be effected with regard to Italy by the eastern boundaries of Italy.

Pact No Longer Applies.

"Personally I am quite willing that the whole front of her northern frontier and wherever she comes into contact with Austrian territory, all that was accorded her in the so-called Pact of London, but I am of the clear opinion that the Pact of London can no longer apply to the settlement of her eastern boundaries.

"The line drawn in the Pact of London was conceived for the purpose of establishing an absolutely adequate frontier of safety for Italy against any possible hostility or aggression of the part of Austria-Hungary. But Austria-Hungary no longer exists. These eastern frontiers will touch countries stripped of the military and naval power of Austria, settled in interdependence of Austria and organized for their purpose of satisfying legitimate national aspirations and created states, not hostile to Italy, and in the order of the part of Austria-Hungary, but in maintenance, dependent upon the cultivation of friendship and bond to a common policy of peace and accommodation by the covenant of the League of Nations.

Question Approached.

"It is with these facts in mind that I have approached the Adriatic question. It is commonly agreed and I very heartily adhere to the agreement that the ports of Trieste and Pola and with them the greater part of the Istrian peninsula should be ceded to Italy, her eastern frontier running along the natural strategic line established by the physical conformation of the country—a line which it has been attempted to draw with some degree of accuracy on the attached map.

"Within this line on the Italian side will lie considerable bodies of non-Italian populations, but their fortunes are so naturally linked that I think their inclusion is fully justified.

"There would be no justification, in my judgment, in including Fiume or any part of the coast line to the south of Fiume within the boundaries of the Italian Kingdom. Fiume is by situation and by all the circumstances of its development not an Italian but an international port serving two countries to the east and north of the Gulf of Fiume.

International Port.

"Just because it is an international port and cannot with justice be subjected to any one society, it is my clear judgment that it should enjoy a very considerable degree of genuine autonomy and while it should be included no doubt within the customs systems of the new Jugo-Slavic state, it should nevertheless be left free in its own interest and in the interest of the states lying about it, to devote itself to the service of the commerce which naturally and inevitably seeks an outlet or inlet at its port.

"The states which it serves will be new states. They will have complete

confidence in their access to an outlet on the sea. The friendship and connections of the future will largely depend upon such an arrangement as I have suggested and friendship, cooperation and freedom of action must underlie every arrangement of peace if peace is to be lasting.

Should Have Island.

"I believe there will be common agreement that the island of Lissa should be ceded to Italy and that she should retain the port of Volpina. I believe that it will be generally agreed that the fortifications which the Austrian government established upon the islands near the eastern end of the Adriatic should be permanently dismantled and that the disarmament which is to be arranged under the League of Nations should limit the states on the eastern coast of the Adriatic to only such minor naval forces as are necessary for policing the waters of the island and the coast.

"These are conclusions which I am forced to by compulsion of the understandings which lie the whole foundation of the present peace.

"No other conclusions seem to be acceptable to being rendered concise with these understandings. They were understandings accepted by the world and bear with peculiar compulsion upon the United States because the privilege was accorded her of taking the initiative of bringing about the negotiations for peace and her plans underlie the whole difficult business.

Obtains Historic Object.

"And certain, Italy obtains under such a settlement the great historic object which her people have so long had in mind. The historical wrongs inflicted upon her by Austria-Hungary and by a long series of unjust transactions which I hope will be forever sunk out of the memory of man are completely redressed. Nothing is denied her which will complete her national unity.

"Here and there upon the islands of the Adriatic and upon the eastern coast of that sea there are settlements containing large Italian elements of population but the pledge under which the new states enter the family of nations will abundantly safeguard the liberty, the development and all the just right of national and racial minorities and back of these safeguards will always lie the watchful authority of the League of Nations. And at the very outset we shall avoid the fatal error of making Italy's nearest neighbors on her east her enemies

**St. Paul's Lutheran Church Celebrates
Twenty-Fifth Anniversary Last Sunday**

The members of St. Paul's Lutheran church of this city, celebrated the 25th anniversary of their church last Sunday, with an all-day meeting at the church, Rev. H. Studmann and G. Gaertner delivering the sermons. The music for the services was furnished by an octet and a trio, both composed of ministers of the North Texas conference. Lunch was served at noon by the Ladies' Aid.

Rev. John Schulerburg, formerly a missionary at Ft. Worth, was the first missionary here, and upon his recommendation Rev. R. L. Medtorn was called as the first permanent missionary in this field, and the congregation

was organized in 1896 with 47 members. Rev. Mehlhorn died January 24, 1896, and was succeeded by Rev. P. M. Rudi who served from Sept. 6 of that year until he accepted a call to Clara. During the absence of a pastor, Vicar Aug. Mierng served until Rev. G. A. Oehnhans was called and installed Sept. 1, 1901.

The present church was built in 1904, Rev. Hellmann and Wurthmann delivering the dedication sermons. In December, 1904, Rev. E. Deffner was installed pastor and served until he accepted a call to Olney, when the present pastor, Rev. C. M. Beyer, was called and installed Sept. 24, 1911. The church now has some 200 mem-

bers and is independent of the mission board. They have a Life Ladies' Aid, Bible class, Sunday school and parochial school. The English language is used almost entirely, the only exception being a few services in which German is used for the convenience of a few of the members who do not understand English.

The officers of the congregation are: Elders, John Thormann, John Hirschi and Paul Neese; secretary, William Bernard; treasurer, Robert Thormann. The congregation displays their loyalty and patriotism in their purchase of Liberty Bonds, and given to the Red Cross and their proportionately large number in the army.

**WIFE OF SENATOR
HARDWICK BURNED
BY AN EXPLOSION**

ATLANTA, GA., April 30.—Mrs. Thomas W. Hardwick, wife of former Senator Hardwick of Georgia, was burned about the face and a negro maid had both hands blown off by the explosion of a package received through the mails Tuesday and believed by Senator Hardwick to have been an infernal machine.

According to Mr. Hardwick, the package, which bore a New York date, was enclosed in a wrapper bearing the name of a large department store in New York City and was addressed to the former Senator at Sandersville, Ga., and forwarded to his present residence in Atlanta, where he has been practicing law since leaving the Senate.

In addition to the explosive the package contained a number of lead slugs, it was said. Mr. Hardwick expressed the belief that the explosive was nitroglycerin. There were no marks to indicate the identity of the sender.

Later it was learned that the wrapper of the package bore the inscription "Gimbel Bros., 32nd and Broadway, Samples," and was postmarked New York. Police officials recalled that a bomb bearing a similar inscription was received yesterday at the office of Mayor Ole Hansen in Seattle, Wash.

PREMIER VITTORIO ORLANDO GIVEN VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

By Associated Press
ROME, Tuesday, April 29.—Premier Vittorio Orlando's work at the peace conference in Paris received vindication in the chamber of deputies here tonight when a vote of confidence was given him 382 to 40. The ballots opposing the resolution were cast by the intransigent Socialists.

The premier laid before parliament the details of his demands for Fiume and the Dalmatian coast districts to which Italy had laid claim. He began that the international situation was grave at present, adding that it was "very grave" for Italy. He said that it was the duty of Italy to preserve an attitude of "calm and serenity" at the present moment.

An outline of the exchanges between himself and President Wilson was given by Signor Orlando, who made it clear that Fiume as an international problem was not to be treated as Italy's claim to Fiume had made it impossible either to accept or reject any proposals that might be made. He said he believed it his duty to come at once before the parliament to receive authority in carrying forward his work at the conference. Up until April 14 when he received from President Wilson the American viewpoint on Fiume, he said he thought an agreement was probable.

In the course of his address the premier spoke of the attitude taken at Paris by the British and French governments, which he said had been loyal to promises made in the treaty of London, which was framed in 1915. He admitted, however, that both France and Great Britain do not stand with Italy in her demands for the annexation of Fiume. He added that they might have agreed, in principle, to the creation of Fiume as an independent free state. In discussing the American memorandum, which was handed to him April 14, and which was distributed among the members of parliament today by the premier, Signor Orlando said:

"Inasmuch as this memorandum denied Italy's rights over the Dalmatian islands, accorded only incomplete liberty to Fiume and even went so far as to break up the unity of Istria, I told Mr. Wilson it was absolutely impossible for me to agree to peace on the conditions indicated, and that under such conditions the Italian delegation felt it could not continue to participate in the conference with any benefit for others or dignity for Italy, but said I would communicate with representatives of the Allied powers with which Italy was bound by special agreements."

"President Wilson showed great regret for such a hypothesis, adding he would do everything possible to prevent it. He said he thought it opportune and useful that France and England should undertake to find a means of conciliation while he would have the question re-examined by his experts to see if further concessions could be made to Italian aspirations."

"The Italian delegation did not maintain an obstinate attitude but co-operated during the following days in an effort to find a way to conciliation. It was anxious not to delay peace and to avoid compromising the union of the allied peoples, even by a mere appearance of disagreement. It was continuing patiently to seek a means of conciliation and was discussing the subject with the British premier when the presidential message appeared."

"This new fact seemed to the Italian delegation of anomalous gravity as it made public discussion which until then although depp, was confined with in the conference, besides making states addressed to the sentiment and will of peoples in general, and therefore to the Italian people, the full authority and therefore the prestige of the Italian delegates was doubted."

Victory of an ideal, must remain at the helm together in the tie of loyal friendship.

Spirit of Conciliation.
"Obeying the supreme command of the Italian government and realizing the solemnity of the hour, I affirm before this parliament that Italy is animated by all that spirit of conciliation which is compatible with the unavoidable exigencies of national conscience and dignity."

"With the same sincerity, I say that I cannot determine in this difficult moment in what forms or by what means we can reach that object, because in the last solemn conversation that occurred on April 24, there arose a difference, not only regarding our point of view, but also between that of allied and associated powers."

"In the present state of affairs, Italy is not facing a solution in which the allied and associated governments agreed with an insurmountable measure of agreement. Nor is there a possibility of compromise upon which we are agreed, but instead she is facing a difference of opinion which virtually denies the actual possibility that special territorial conditions reserved to Italy, can be contained in the peace treaty accepted by all the Allied and associated powers."

Submits to Verdict.
"The members of the government and of the Italian delegation, therefore, await your verdict with serene hearts."

"With serene hearts the people also await events. They who kept their faith unshakable, their nerves firm and sound, their soul firm and their spirits high, even when the appalling misfortune of war fell upon them—why should they feel or act differently now when facing difficulties which, while certainly hard, are bringing about peace? Without weakness, without over-boldness; not overcome with doubts which would be injurious, nor carried away by an exaltation unworthy of a great people, Italy, in this new trial, must show conscious and austere calm."

"The principal necessity now is that all, in common fervor and devotion to mother country, should determine with sincerity and harmony, to face the outcome of this great battle which faith might have saved us. Once again, I pledge that in this hour of immense responsibility for all, the trust may continue between men of different parties and the conflicts of parties."

"Let us wait until tomorrow to renew our struggles. They will be illuminated by the glory of a greater Italy."

SIX HUNDRED ARRESTS MADE IN HUNGARY BY SOVIET AUTHORITIES

BOARD OF HEALTH ISSUES STATEMENT REGARDING WATER

To the Public:
In Sunday's Wichita Times there appeared the advertisement of Mr. Hall, who owns the Spitz shallow surface well southeast of town, and who had, until last fall, been supplying many of the citizens of Wichita Falls with drinking water. In a survey and bacterial analysis of all the water sold this well, with many others, was found to be contaminated. In fact the Roanoke well was the only one free from contamination.

Often the cause of shallow surface wells becoming infected is this: Normally the bacteria that live in the upper strata of earth destroy the typhoid and colon bacilli but sometimes, during long droughts, these bacteria are destroyed and permit the bacilli to reach the ground water wells. This is what has happened in the case of the local wells.

As to the fact of Mr. Hall or any one else selling water in the city, the Board of Health requires is that the water is pure and non-contaminated, and the only way this can be assured is for the bacteriologist to collect samples and make the examination of it as he does the city water. The city water is examined twice each week and as a result, the city is free from any typhoid fever, even with the crowded conditions which have prevailed for the past several months.

Mr. Hall, or any one else wishing to sell water in this city will merely be wasting both time and money sending samples to the state chemist, or any other chemist, for unless chemist collect the water himself he cannot make the examination. Further, water cannot be sold until the Board of Health Bacteriologist has passed it, and any one undertaking to sell water that is known to have been contaminated at one time will be prosecuted by the city authorities to the full extent of the law.
