Library Planners
In Tuesday Meet

All citizens interested in the Mitchell County Library are invited by the library board and by Friends of the Library to attend a meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the library. It was announced here Saturday.

Scheduled for the meeting are talks about plans for the new library building. No donations will be solicited but an opportunity will be afforded non-members to join Friends of the Library at \$1.00 a year or more.

Library board members and Friends of the Library, organized here recently during National Library Week, are seeking to create a community interest in the library and are seeking donations in hope that a sizeable amount of cash may be raised.

The cash library fund, added to the funds county commissioners will expend, will be matched equally by federal funds to be administered by the State of Texas.

Completed plans for a new one-story library building are now in the hands of the library board. The building, to be erected on corner lot, owned by the county, north of City Hall and across the street east from the courthouse, will have about 7,000 sq. ft. of space. Plans call for reading rooms, a browsing area, children's department, and a multi-purpose room seating from 40 to 50 people. Plans are on display in the county library.

Construction bids, expected to be in the \$90,000 to \$95,000 bracket, are now being advertised for and are to be opened Dec. 13.

Individuals and various clubs and organizations have made impressive donations to the library fund. Donations may, if donors wish, be made as memorials.

Library board, with Mrs.

George Witten as president, Mrs. Austin McCloud as vice-president, Mrs. Harry Dockrey, secretary; Mrs. Rex T. McKenney of Westbrook, Mrs. Floyd Coffee of Loraine, Mrs. H. Jene Steakley, Mrs. J. S. Craddock, and George Womack, members, have been studying needs and costs of furnishings. Mrs. Boyd Dozier, librarian and member of the library board, and Womack are now receiving donations to the library, as treasurers. Checks may be mailed to Box 206, Colorado City. Telephone number is RA 8-3968.

Friends of the Library is headed by Gwan Strange as president. Joe Earnest is vice-president in charge of publicity and public relations. Mrs. Robert Avecock, Jr., is secretary and Mrs. Dozier is ex-officio member of the executive board. Mrs. Curtis Latimer heads the education committee (to secure speakers to appear before civic and study clubs) and Mrs. Homer Bodine is membership chairman.

Annual membership in Friends of the County Library are \$1.00 for regular membership; \$5.00 for sustaining and \$25 for supporting memberships.

Is Set

Mitchell County United Fund kicked off Friday at a noon luncheon of all civic clubs in the city.

Campaign Chairman Don Benson began the after lunch program telling the fund workers that it was a privilege to participate in the drive to aid 11 organizations.

"The United Fund deserves your best attention, money, talent and support," Benson told the audience.

In another short talk, County Judge Elmer Martin, who is president of the United Fund this year, noted that campaign expenses had been cut by \$535 from last year's effort due to the elimination of professional help.

Martin said that the fund effort offered a chance to work for the betterment of the community. "It is a chance to improve and build," the judge said.

Benson then introduced the keynote speaker for the luncheon, Rev. M. A. Smith, Jr., pastor of the First Baptist Church. He spoke on "Meeting the Challenge of Community Need."

Rev. Smith told of three motivations and challenges of the fund.

He told the group that the three motivations were the challenge by personal concern, the challenge of spirit of co-operation and the challenge of a heart of compassion.

"We must have a definite concern and conviction about meeting the goal," Smith said. "And we must approach the campaign and goal with confidence."

The campaign goal for the fund is \$18,395.

Chairmen of the various fund divisions and their goals in the current campaign include the following: Larry Kinard, advance gifts, \$8,620; Jeff Taylor, special gifts, \$1,500; Charles C. Board Puts Up
Old Barracks

School Board has voted to advertise two barracks buildings for sale with bids being opened Nov. 22.

Removal of the buildings is necessary in order to clear land for beginning work on the school expansion program.

One of the barracks is located immediately north of the administration building on the high school campus and is presently being used as a seventh and eighth grade dressing room for athletes.

The other structure is the present field house at Wolf Stadium.

At the high school the site will be the location of the new library, cafeteria

study hall. A new field house is planned for Wolf Stadium.

There was discussion in Monday night's meeting of the Board as to whether it would be feasible to move the barracks at high school to another location for use as a storage area or if it should be completely done away with. It was the feelings of some members that a new building could be eventually cheaper to the school due to the high insurance rates on barracks-type structures.

Thus, the Board will probably wait to see how bids go on the two buildings before making a final decision on the matter.

NO EXISTING COVERAGE

City Sewer Damage
Insurance Cancelled

Gulf Insurance Co. has cancelled all coverage for damages caused by the function or operation of the Colorado City sewer line system.

Dick Wistrand, representing the company locally, appeared before the City Council in its Monday night regular session to present an endorsement to the city's general comprehensive liability policy that wiped out the coverage.

Thus, the city is now without protective coverage in regard to any type of sewer damage that happens.

The city is, however, seeking coverage on sewer damage from some other company at this time.

Councilman C. G. "Sket" Harkins moved to accept the

cancellation endorsement and the motion was seconded by Lena Porter.

The vote was unanimous.

Support Given

The council also voted to join with the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce in urging the rerouting of State Highway 208 down the road by the cemetery, known as the Old Snyder Highway, for a connection with Interstate 20.

The groups were to contact J. C. Roberts, district highway engineer in Abilene, and ask him to expedite the rerouting as soon as possible.

The change in routing of the State Highway, 208 had been sought earlier in order to afford traffic on the road

a quicker connection with the divided highway.

Motion to join in the effort was made by C. C. Burt with a second from Harkins. Vote was unanimous.

Street Lighting

Council authorized the Mayor to enter into a contract with Texas Electric Service Company for street lighting in the city.

Housing Authority

Appointment of two new terms on the Housing Authority Board was discussed and delayed until next meeting.

The terms of Luke Thomas and Wayne Griffin are expiring.

Remaining members of the board are R. B. Baker, D. M. Merritt and Harry Ratliff.

Program for the evening featured an address by Miss Idalia Wood, Mitchell County Home Demonstration Agent, "Public Relations—Your 'You' Image." The guest speaker was introduced by Mrs. Dixon.

"Public relations for your organization can begin at home with you. You are a personal reflection of yourself, your employer and your place of business," said Miss Wood. "You see, the very beginning point for personal and favorable public relations is critical self-examination."

"There are many individual things that contribute to your public relations program—your mind, your appearance, your feeling, and for lack of a clearer term, your spirit," Miss Wood told B&PW members.

Important to the image created, she said, involves understanding the other person's point of view. "Your appearance and surroundings tell others what you are faster than you can say 'Elizabeth Arden,' she said of personal appearances.

"Self-discipline, organization, perseverance, objective thinking and humor come together to help you reach the serenity and grace which a good public relations image projects," she said.

Obstacles in the path of a good public relations program the speaker listed and discussed as "our own fears, indifference, guilt, hate, jealousy, prejudice, conceit, tension."

In closing, Miss Wood said "Your public relations should really portray the best part of yourself. It is important to understand that surface performance often reflect your genuine attitudes. For instance, smile, grip (a good handshake communicates itself immediately) look, speak, walk, walk with your head high and your shoulders back even if your feet hurt. . . . put your best foot forward with the emphasis you!"

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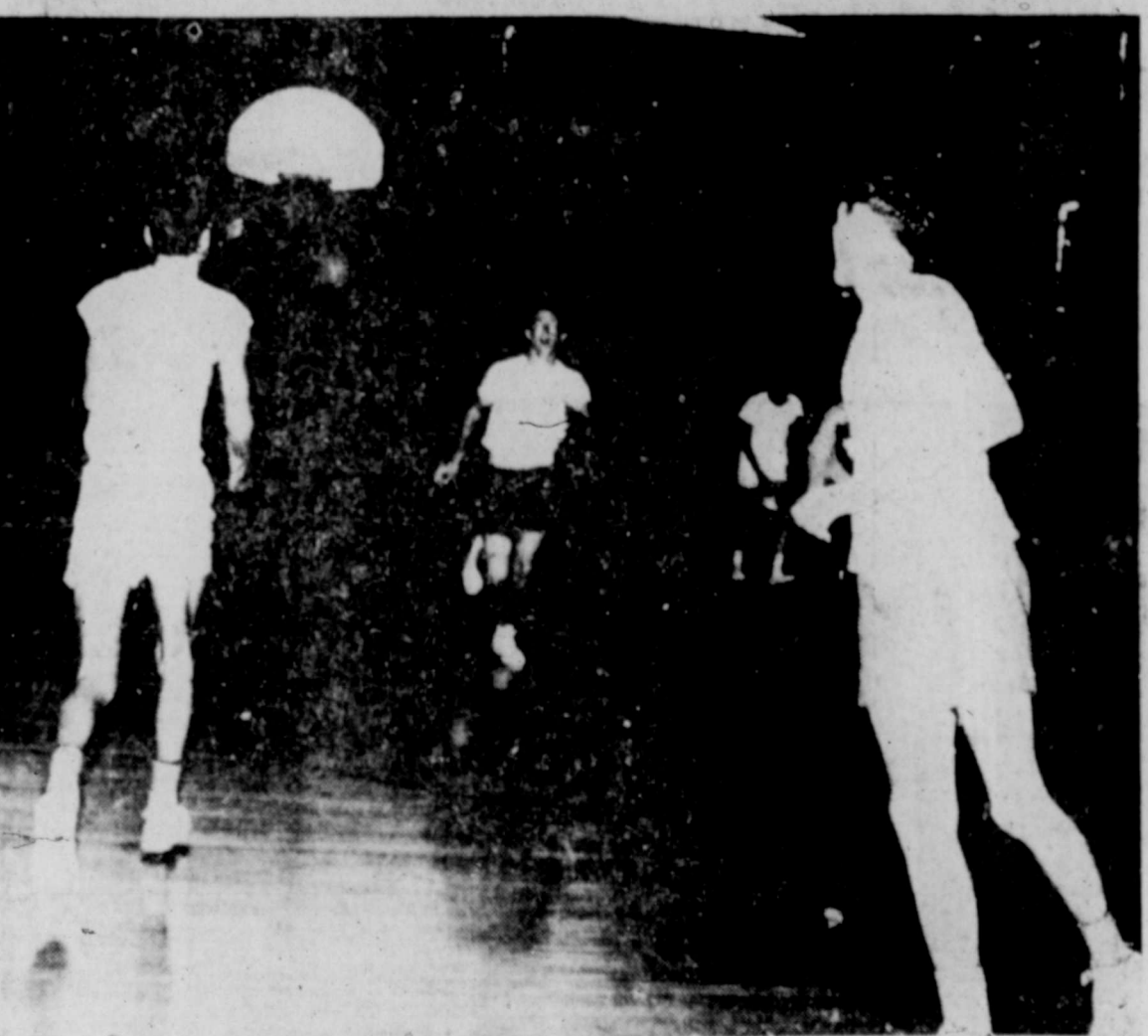
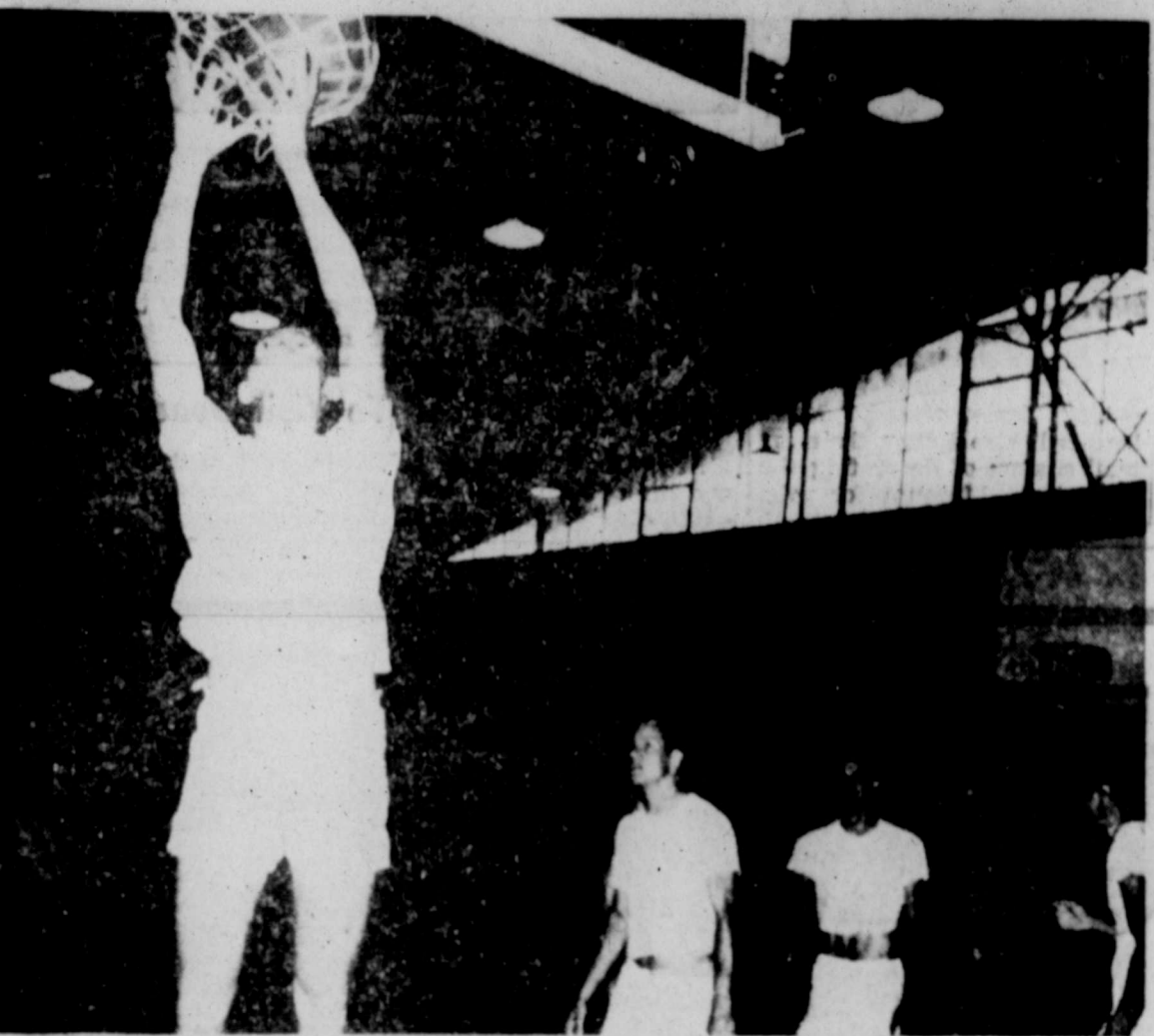
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Wolf Cagers Get Started

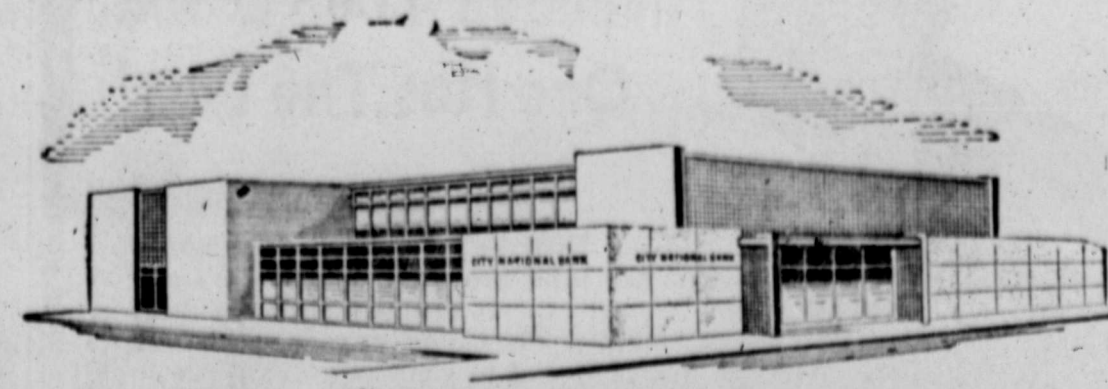
