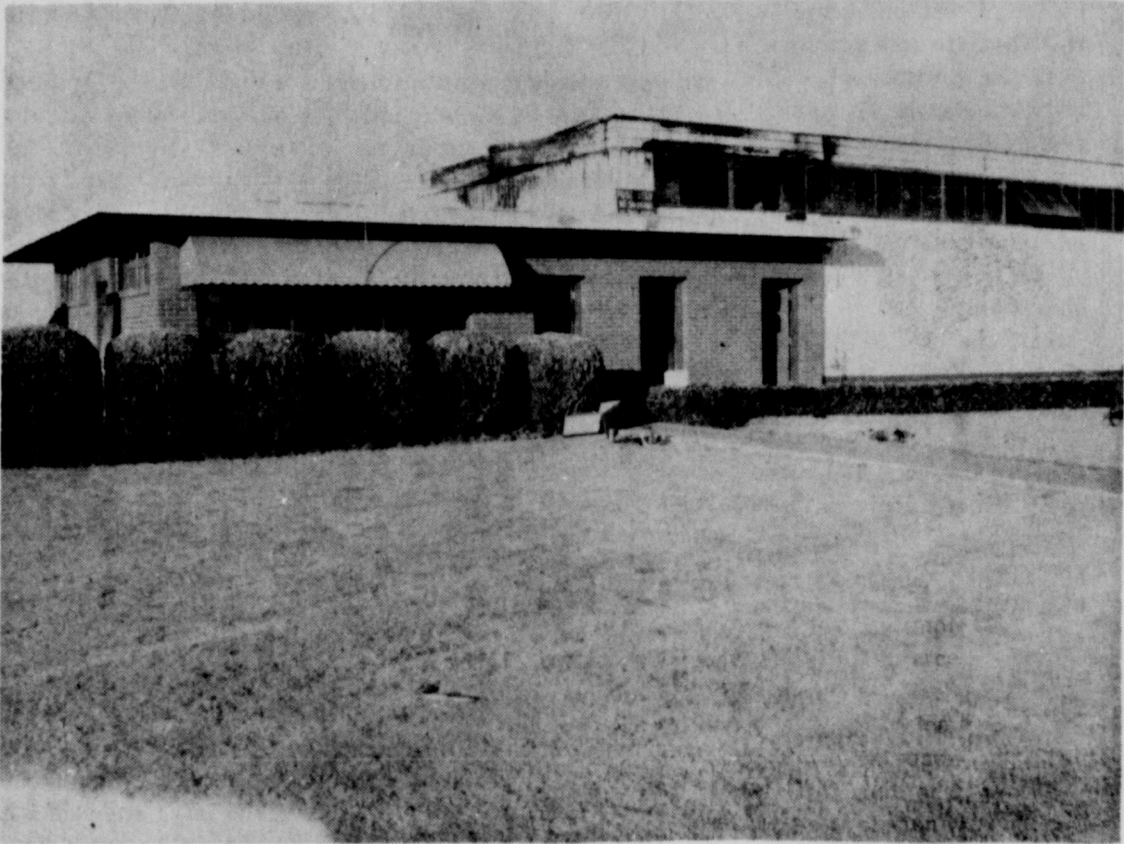

## \$20,000 Fire Damage To Shamrock Building



SHAMROCK OFFICE-WAREHOUSE DAMAGED BY FIRE

An early morning fire Nov. 21, did an estimated \$20,000 in damage to a building and contents at the Abernathy Shamrock Terminal plant three miles north of town. An explosion in a refrigerator set off the blaze that raced through the office-warehouse complex of the plant. An electric clock stopped at 4:03 a. m., indicating that the explosion occurred shortly before that time.

The refrigerator, the kind used in homes, contained plastic jugs of petroleum products received through the pipeline from the Dumas refinery. The jugs hold samples that are tested, including jet fuel samples tested by the U. S. Air Force.

Floyd Mooneyham, plant manager, said investigation of the fire indicated that vapor escaped from one or more of the jugs and that the explosion was set off by the refrigerator thermostat wiring. Heat soon melted all of the plastic jugs and the flaming fluid rapidly spread along the floor.

Dan Wright was the only employee on duty at the time. He was in the office. The point of the explosion was in the connecting area between the office, rest rooms and warehouse. Wright raced for a fire extinguisher and used it until smoke forced him out of the building. He called Mooneyham, who resides in a company house east of the plant, and the Abernathy Volunteer fire department was called.

After leaving the office, Wright went to the east end of the warehouse portion of the building and opened a large door. He and Mooneyham entered through that door and battled the blaze until firemen arrived. In the process of opening the warehouse door, Wright sustained lacerations on the back of the fingers of his right hand. He remained at the scene until the fire was brought under control an hour and one-half or two hours after it started. "I had to order him to go into town and have his fingers treated," Mooneyham said.

Eighteen stitches were required to close the wounds on Wright's fingers.

Mooneyham praised Wright for his cool-headed action in the emergency. The plant manager also was highly complimentary of Abernathy's Volunteer Firemen for their quick response and hard work.

The office-warehouse building is about 80 feet from the truck loading dock, and is about 200 feet from the nearest storage tank.

The office portion, which also contains a lab, was badly damaged and there was considerable damage to the warehouse portion. Grease, oil and other products in the warehouse escaped the fire but had some smoke damage to containers.

Records dating back two years were destroyed by the fire. They were stored above and near the refrigerator. Current records in steel filing cabinets in the office sustained some damage but still are in usable condition.

The plant here has been in operation 11 1/2 years, and this is the first major emergency experienced. It has been eight years since the plant has had a loss of time incident, and "it was just a minor thing," Mooneyham added.

### WAS LONGTIME RESIDENT HERE

Mrs. Grady Loyd, 46, Seagraves, and a former longtime resident of Abernathy, was fatally injured early Sunday morning when an automobile crashed into her frame home at the end of a one-block-long dead-end street in Seagraves. Her son, Ronnie, 18, sustained a lacerated nose in the crash accident. He was treated at a Seagraves clinic and released.

The car lacked only about four feet going completely through the house. Time of the accident was set at 2:43 a. m. Sunday. The car first hit the bedroom in which Ronnie was sleeping, knocking him into his mother's bedroom. The impact rolled Ronnie up in the mattress of his bed, preventing serious injury to him. Mrs. Loyd, who died of a broken neck, was found in her bed covered by debris. She was dead on arrival at the Seagraves Clinic at 3:00 a. m.

Grady Loyd, the husband and father, was working the graveyard shift at the Denver City Plant of Southwestern Public Service Co. when the fatal accident happened at his home.

Two young Andrews men were in the car that hit the house. One was hospitalized at Andrews and the other, more seriously hurt, was under treatment in a Lubbock hospital. They, along with a young Seagraves man, had attended the Seagraves-Sonora football game at Andrews. The two Andrews men let the Seagraves man out at his home four blocks away from the crash scene only moments before the accident.

One of the Andrews men involved had recently returned from duty in Viet Nam, reports said. The house was damaged "several thousand dollars worth," officers reported, and the car was demolished.

Mrs. Loyd, born in Forestburg, was reared in Abernathy. She graduated from Abernathy High School and from Texas Tech. She had taught school at Cotton Center, and was a fourth grade teacher in the Seagraves school at the time of her death. She was the former Mary Lucy Settle, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Settle. Her father was a farmer and an early-day rural mail carrier on route one, Abernathy.

Grady Loyd was employed at Tuco before they moved to Seagraves when he transferred to the company's Denver City Plant.

## Referendum Is Set Dec. 5-9

### COTTON QUOTA REFERENDUM IS SET DEC. 5-9

The upcoming referendum on marketing quotas for the 1967 crop of upland cotton will be conducted by mail during the period December 5 through 9, 1966, E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. This is the first time that growers have voted on marketing quotas by mail. It is hoped that this more convenient method will encourage a larger vote.

Growers eligible to cast ballots in the referendum are all those who engaged in the production of the 1966 crop of the particular kind of cotton-upland cotton. Ballots will be sent to all growers who are on record in the ASCS County office. The quotas will become effective and the broad upland cotton diversion program will be available next year if at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve the quotas. This upland program would provide price-support and diversion payments as well as loans.

If more than a third of the growers who vote disapprove quotas, price support at 50 percent of parity will be available to growers who keep their 1967-crop upland cotton acreage within their farm allotments.

The period December 5-9 has been designated for the referendum on the Cotton Research and Promotion Program. Growers will cast their ballots according to instruction.

The urgent need for this program is painfully obvious with cotton losing markets to man-made fibers at an unprecedented rate, record stocks of cotton in storage, and acreage and production reduced drastically.

Cotton, however, has already shown an amazing response to research and promotion and the kind of program a "yes" vote in the referendum will make possible would reverse the present gloomy trend.

### NOTICE TO FARMERS ON DEC. 5-9 VOTE

Farmers who want their full vote to count in the cotton research and promotion referendum were reminded today to establish their volume interest in full with local ASCS offices.

The Plains Committee for Cotton's Future explained that a cotton farmer who operates in different areas will gain by notifying his local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office of all of his production.

Through a change announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the grower has until the final day of the referendum, December 9, to establish his interest through the ASCS office.

# Poage Speaks Out On \$1 Bale Referendum

Rep. W. R. Poage (D-Texas) said at his home in Waco last weekend that attitude of Congress on cotton programs will be affected for better or worse by decision made in dollar-a-bale referendum on research and promotion.

"If farmers show by their votes that they are ready to give up on cotton, I think the Congress will be ready to give up too," he said.

"As things now stand--under the emergency four-year program in effect--the government has gone just about the last mile in making cotton competitive in price, in the domestic as well as the foreign market," ranking member of House Agriculture Committee declared.

Payments to protect cotton farmer's income, meet price competition, and reduce surplus are substantial, he reminded, noting that for typical farmer with 30-acre allotment and 35% diversion they amount to about \$72,50 per bale.

"Some Northern Congressmen are asking is it worth this much to save cotton," he warned.

"In my judgment, Congress will feel that it is very much worthwhile--if we can see genuine promise that there will be programs capable of putting cotton on its feet and making it self-sufficient within some reasonable period of time.

If there is to be such an outlook, a greatly expanded program of research and promotion must be at the heart of it."

He said he was delighted when growers came to Congress with a self-help plan--a program they would operate themselves. Accordingly, he helped bring about passage of Cotton Research and Promotion

## WHAT WILL DOLLAR DO FOR COTTON?

A dollar will pay for enough seed to plant one-third of an acre of cotton. It will pay for enough herbicide to provide weed control on one-twelfth of an acre, or pay chopping costs one time on a quarter of an acre.

A dollar will pay for enough insecticides to protect two acres of cotton from pests for approximately five days. It will pay for the hand picking of 35 pounds of seed cotton or for mechanically harvesting 60 pounds.

A dollar will provide enough defoliant for two-fifths of an acre. Or it will pay for hauling 350 pounds of seed cotton to the gin. A dollar amounts to about one-sixteenth of the ginning cost for a bale of cotton.

It takes many dollars to produce, process, and market a bale of cotton. Doesn't it seem logical that a farmer should be willing to spend at least \$1 per bale to assure that his cotton will be spun and woven into products

ton Research and Promotion Act. Program now must be approved by cotton farmers in referendum in early December.

"In this day and age," Rep. Poage emphasized, "producers of any product have to put up big money to improve it and sell it through advertising and other techniques of promotion, either they do this or go out of business. In essence, this is the decision farmers must make in the referendum on cotton research and promotion."

people will wear and use? Whether or not farmers are willing to assess themselves a dollar a bale for research and promotion to promote cotton and counter the threat of synthetics which have been grabbing its markets right and left is now up for a vote.  
We have a lot of faith in the common sense of farmers--especially cotton farmers. We predict they will vote "yes" by an overwhelming majority in the dollar-a-bale referendum.

## COST OF COTTON PRODUCTION HIGH

A cotton grower may spend as much as \$70 a bale for insect control, harvesting, and ginning, and this, by no means, represents his total

cost and productivity. Production cutbacks, however, nullify this by lowering efficiency and raising unit costs.

The answer to the cotton problem plainly is not further cuts in production. It is greater markets. The only way to achieve this is by employing the tools our competition has been using so successfully--research and promotion.

A strong "yes" vote in the upcoming dollar-a-bale referendum will mean we can really move ahead in research and promotion, thus assuring greater acreage, increased profits, and a solid future for cotton.

## production cost.

If this bale of cotton is not made into sheets or shirts or dresses or other useful items, it doesn't do anybody any good.

At the beginning of this crop year, the carryover amounted to 16.9 million bales of cotton. Acreage last season was cut a third and if cotton keeps on piling up we can expect further cuts.

Cotton is not being used because makers of man-made fibers are taking over its markets. They are spending approximately \$65 million per year in this country on advertising and promotion. Cotton is spending only \$4 million or approximately one-sixteenth as much.

Under weight of this 16-to-1 handicap in sales pressure, cotton has lost ground in 42 out of 48 of its most important and promotable markets since

1960--this despite a reduction of about one-third in the domestic price of cotton since early 1964.

We are simply going to have to sell more cotton or face the prospect of growing less and less of it. We have a chance to do this through the program of research and promotion which would be put into action with passage of the upcoming referendum.

I have enough faith in the cotton farmer's judgment as a businessman to believe he will vote overwhelmingly for this program. Considering what we have invested in land and equipment and our outlays each season for all the goods and services required to produce a bale of cotton, a dollar to get it sold and protect our investment seems like a mighty small sum.

Cotton has been piling up while consumers have been buying man-made fiber products at an unprecedented rate. The cotton carryover is at an all-time high. Acreage is the lowest in almost a hundred years. Synthetics have racked up huge gains by outresearching cotton six to one and outpromoting it

sixteen to one. Cotton growers, however, are not taking this challenge lying down. They have initiated a self-help program to assess themselves a dollar a bale to effectively put research and promotion to work for cotton.
