MAHD Buying Ambulance

As the Muleshoe Area Hospital District continues to upgrade the Muleshoe Area Medical Center and Muleshoe Area Health Care Center, they are making a number of decisions, such as those considered and approved during a regular monthly meeting Wednesday night.

Larry Anderson, CPA from Mason, Warner & Co., the accounting firm for the Hospital District on a computer system for the hospital to help keep up with patient records, financial records and other reports.

After considering several proposals, the board approved the purchase of an IBM system 36 package for \$69,406.

MAHD Secretary Bob Finney then reported that the county is currently responsible for providing ambulance service to residents of the county, and are using an ambulance center located behind the hospital. "We own that building and the land that it sits on," reminded Finney. "It is completely tied to the hospital, and the hospital even pays the utilities on it. We recommend charging a rental rate to the county on the facility. The county officials have been visited, and we have come up for a compromise.

"The county currently has an ambulance that is not currently licensed. Initially, the county had agreed to allow the hospital district to have the ambulance to provide to Lazbuddie. According to lawyers, it cannot be done.

"Our proposal is to lease the ambulance building to the county at \$500 per month for 24 months, then purchase the ambulance for \$12,000 and pay for it at \$500 per month for the next 24 months."

He said the ambulance would then be turned over to Lazbuddie Fire Department, who would equip the ambulance and get it certified for use in their community.

On questioning about what it would take to get the ambulance equipped for certification, Jim Fitzgerald, interim ambulance director, of Morton, was asked to explain some of the things which would be needed. Fitzgerald said one of the first things to be required would be radio communications with the Muleshoe Cont. Page 8, Col. 5

Muleshoe's Tax Rebate Check Continues Slow, Steady Growth

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last Friday that October's sales tax rebates to cities and counties continue to tell the story of an economy that's steadily growing.

Bullock said that October's city rebates statewide are up almost 11 percent from October 1988, and year-to-date payments to cities are up an average of 9.5 percent.

"Consumers have more money to spend and they're doing just that," Bullock said. "That means another month of increased sales tax rebates for local areas."

October also marks the first month that Metropolitan Transit Authorities will start receiving

their rebates quarterly rather than monthly. The change is the result of legislation passed during the last session, Bullock said.

The six MTAs in Texas will receive their next payment in December.

The El Paso City Transit Department will continue to receive its payments on a monthly basis.

Muleshoe in Bailey County shows an increase in year-to-date payments of 7.34 percent. At this time last year, total payments were \$178,325.61. This had increased to \$191,408.88 for the same period this year. Their monthly payment also increased over the payment received a year ago. Net payment for the current pay period was \$18,075.52, up 7.07 percent from the \$16,881.94 received at this time last year.

From Cochran County, Morton still shows a 3.20 percent decrease in total yearly payments, but the current payment is considerably increased. Their current payment was \$4,825.85, up 16.21 percent over the \$4,152.78 received for the same period a year ago. Yearly payments to date are shown to be \$49,102.12, down from the total of \$50,723.42 at this time a year ago.

Littlefield, in Lamb County showed an increase in yearly total payments to date, but a decrease in their current payment. At this time last year, Littlefield received \$17,644.35 for their current payment, this decreased by 4.30 percent to \$16,885.46 for the same period this year. Payments to date for the year are \$213,887.10, up by 3.10 percent over the \$207,453.02 total to date a year ago.

In Parmer County, Friona reported an 8.18 percent decrease in current payments. This time last year, for their current payment, Friona received a check for \$7,110.81 and this had decreased to \$6,529.44 for the same time this year. Payments to date for 1989 are shown to be

increased by 7.00 percent. To date this year, Friona has received \$87,222.30, compared to the \$81,519.29 received to date a year ago.

Houston received the largest payment in the state at \$11.7 Cont. Page 8, Col. 3

Floydada Whirlwinds Blow By Mules, 27-7

It was not a good night for the Muleshoe Mules, when they hosted the Floydada Whirlwinds, who blew into town, and then blew back out again with a 27-7 victory.

Although the Mules had the ball first, and John Orozco quickly made a first down, on a third and seven, at 10:38 of the first, the Whirlwinds intercepted a Mule pass.

Then after five plays, with 8:31 left to play in the first quarter, Whirlwind halfback Frank Suarez made it into the end zone on a five yarder. He also kicked the extra point, making it a 0-7 game for Floydada.

Ramiro Alarcon, John Orozco and Juan Perez carried in the next series for the Mules, but the tough Whirlwind defense forced the Mules to punt the ball away with 7:05 left in the first.

Floydada took over and after two first downs four plays later, had a couple of 'flubs' in passing failed on a field goal attempt at 4:31.

After the Mules took over the ball again, Orozco carried for 30 yards and a first down, then the Mule offense bogged down again.

The Whirlwinds failed to advance and the Mules got the ball back with 2:01 showing in the first quarter.

Danny Noble, CEO of the Bailey County ASCS office, has released the following information regarding 1990 crop provisions:

1990 WHEAT AND FEED GRAIN PROVISIONS

1. **Regular wheat program.** There is a five percent acreage reduction program. The ACR requirement is .0526 percent of the plantings. The 0/92 provision will be available.

2. **Modified wheat program.** Producers may exceed 95 percent of the crop acreage base, but no more than 105 percent of the crop acreage base. For each 10th of an acre of wheat planted in excess of 95 percent of the base, the wheat payment acreage will be reduced from 95 percent of the base by the same acreage amount, but not less than 85 percent of the crop acreage base.

There will be no ACR requirement for producers that sign up in the modified wheat program and intend planted acres more than 95 percent of the wheat base.

The 0/92 provision does not apply to the modified wheat program. Wheat acreage planted in excess of the wheat base, but not to exceed 105 percent of the wheat base, will be permitted to credit the excess acreage as CU for history credit to other program crops.

Limited cross compliance will apply to wheat modified contract participants and is limited to 105 percent of the wheat base.

Fruit available includes a small box of apples, 20-22 lbs., \$9; large box apples, 42-45 lbs., \$13; small box grapefruit, 19-20 lbs., \$9; large box, 38-40 lbs., \$13; half bushel apples, \$13; combination box, 12 of each, \$13.

The vo-ag instructor noted that fruit prices have not increased for the past three years.

Meats to be available will include three pound sausage patties, \$8; three pounds sausage links, \$8; hickory smoked turkey, \$16; and hickory smoked boneless pit hams, 6-8 lbs., \$20.

He said the fruit will be delivered between Dec. 1-15 and meat items will be delivered before Thanksgiving.

The executive session was to consider resignations of Joyce and Jerry Harp from the Bailey County Ambulance Service.

Following the 35 minute executive session, commissioner's court reconvened and Judge Watson asked for a motion on the Harps.

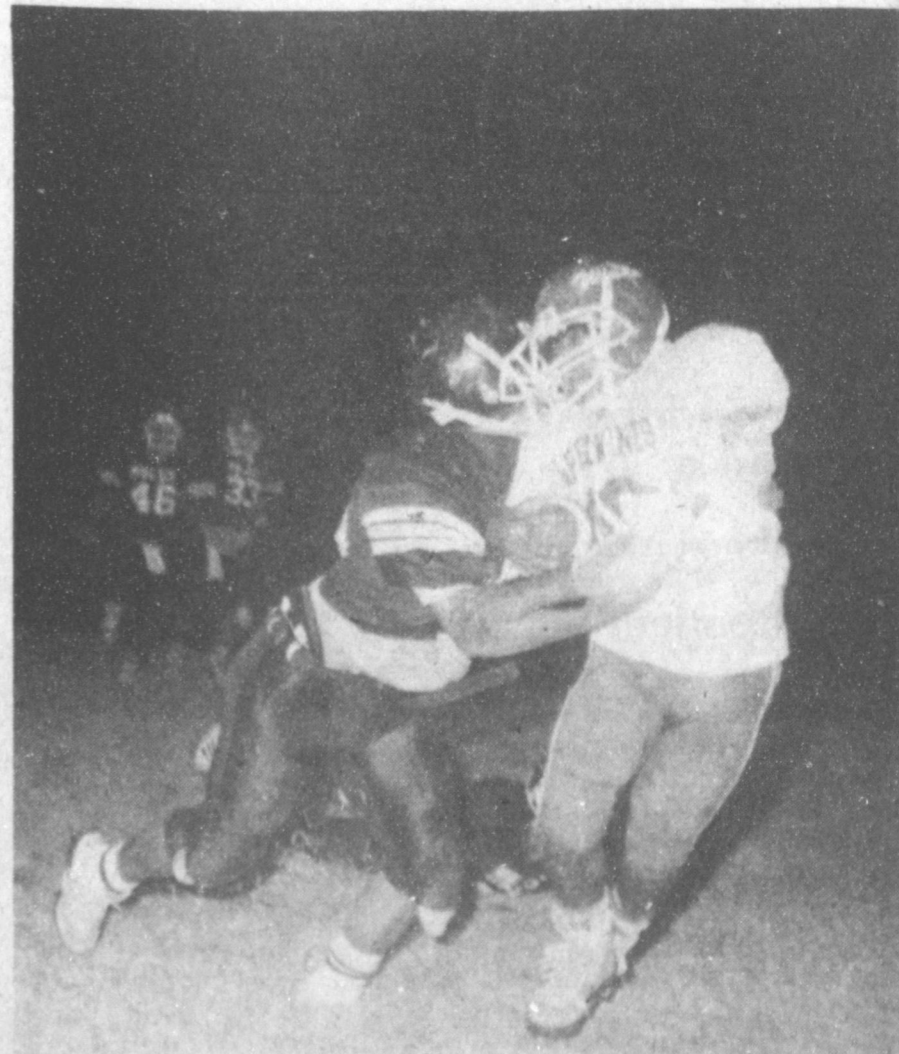

State Troopers Help Underprivileged Youth

A swimming party for sexually abused children, a pizza party for homeless kids, a trip to NASA and the Astrodome for kids with no parents...these are among many youth projects of the Texas State Troopers Association, a private support group for DPS officers. Heading up the TSTA youth program is Jerry E. Miller, a retired major with 27 years service with the Texas Department of Public Safety. At the proper moment before every outing, Miller has the youngsters repeat two sentences after him: "Police are my friends. I hate drugs."

The troopers' association will soon provide Miller with a 25-seat van, complete with restroom, for carrying youth groups all over Texas. Purpose of the program is to introduce underprivileged and other young children to police and to wholesome recreation and travel, and to inform them of the dangers of drugs. TSTA's ultimate goal is to reduce crime by helping youngsters stay out of trouble and become good citizens.

"I recently took a group of little kids from the Salvation Army to a fun center," said Miller. "Their parents were unemployed tran-

sients who weren't able to provide much fun or recreation for them. When I heard the children's squeals of laughter, it was like a melody to me. It made all our efforts worthwhile."

Texas State Troopers Association was founded in 1984 to provide back-up support and encouragement for DPS officers, most of whom work in dangerous, high-stress duties. It provides recreational and health facilities, low-cost insurance, legal and legislative help and death and disaster benefits. It also provides financial assistance to officers wounded in the line of duty, and to the widows and families of officers wounded in the line of duty, and to the widows and families of officers slain while service the people of Texas.

Operational funds for the trooper support programs and also it's youth work are provided through sale of "booster" memberships and telemarketing sale of tickets to country western shows. It's administrative offices and health/recreational facilities are at 5540 North Lamar, in Austin.

Tax Workshop Will Be Held In Lubbock

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is planning two regional workshops designed specifically for lawyers and accountants to help them better serve financially troubled farmers. Called "Agricultural Tax Problems," the workshops will be Oct. 31 in Corpus Christi, and Nov. 2 in Lubbock. Workshop sites are the Holiday Inn/Emerald Beach in Corpus Christi, and the Holiday Inn/Civic Center in Lubbock. Each workshop will be 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The purpose of these workshops is to enable accountants and attorneys to give practical advice to their farmer/rancher clients; to provide a checklist of potential tax trouble spots; and to aid in tax reporting. Many farmers make money and others lose money, so tax planning will be covered for both situations. Government payments and tax timing will be discussed also.

All workshop speakers are either attorneys or CPAs. Registration information on the workshops is available at the County Extension Office.

Cooperating with the Extension Service in the workshops are the Farmers and Ranchers Conference Committee of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, and the Agricultural Tax Problems Committee of the Section of Taxation of the State Bar of Texas.

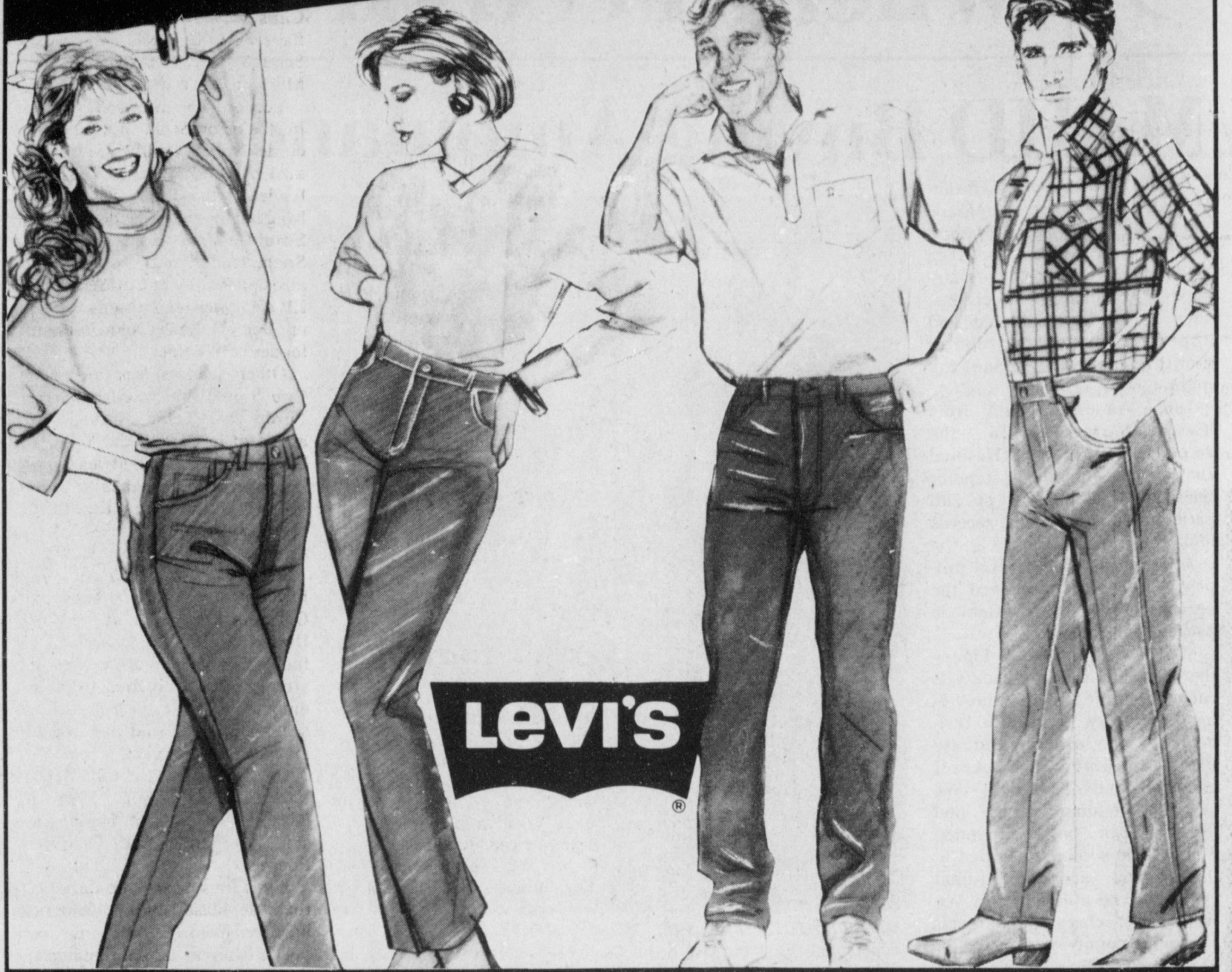

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Ferguson will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law. The other directors are Carl Bamert, Ernest Ramm, J. L. Dale and Bennie Claunch.

In Texas there are 210 soil and water conservation districts.

Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

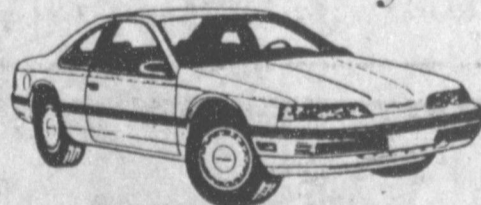

PSAT Testing Will Be Held Here Tuesday

Muleshoe High School will be administering the Preliminary Aptitude Test on Tuesday, October 24. This test is sponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

The test, given to 11th grade students on an elective basis, measures verbal and mathematical abilities. It compares a student's ability to do college level work with the ability of other college-bound students.

The PSAT also provides practice for taking the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) because the questions and scores are similar.

Taking the PSAT helps a student plan for college.

Taking the PSAT is the first step in entering the scholarship programs conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. More than 6,000 of the most outstanding participants in the PSAT will be chosen as Merit Scholars and will receive awards worth approximately \$23 million. An additional 1,000 young people will win Special Scholarships, which are administered through the Merit Program as a service to corporate and business sponsors and are valued at \$7 million.

The fee for the 1989 PSAT is

\$5.50. All 11th grade students are encouraged to register for the PSAT through the counselor's office at Muleshoe High School.

Upon registration and payment of the fee, the student will receive a bulletin which will assist them in preparing for the PSAT. Deadline for registering for the PSAT was Friday, October 20.

Representative Proposes Law On Tax Rebates

State Representative Dan Morales announced this week he will seek legislation and a constitutional amendment which would compel the state to reimburse local units of government for all costs incurred in implementing state-imposed mandates. "This proposal would give Texans a long-deserved opportunity to publicly voice their concerns regarding spiraling local property tax rates," Morales said.

"I am persuaded that such a provision in our state's constitution would:

- 1) protect local property taxpayers,
- 2) discourage shifting of state obligations
- 3) guarantee state consideration of local tax burdens, and
- 4) ensure a more responsible partnership between state and local governments."

"I feel strongly, Texas is headed straight toward a property tax referendum" Morales said. "Recent months have seen an unprecedented increase in property tax rates at the local level. Counties, cities, school districts and other local taxing jurisdictions have been forced to seek additional revenue due, in significant part, to state-imposed mandates." Morales added.

Texas property tax rates are now among the highest in the nation. Local property taxpayers are being asked to bear an unreasonably large portion of the overall tax burden.

"The working people of Texas are doing everything they can to contribute to the well-being and prosperity of our state. Texans will not stand for a tax structure which threatens the homes and property they have worked so

hard to obtain," Morales said. "State government has a moral obligation to pay for its mandates," Morales added.

Fourteen states currently have in place a general mandate reimbursement requirement. And several other states either have some variation of the requirement established or are actively considering mandate reimbursement proposals. "The voters of Texas deserve the opportunity to decide for themselves whether local property tax burdens have reached their limits. In my judgement, local property taxpayers deserve relief and they deserve it now," Morales said. Morales, D-San Antonio, is chairman of the House committee on Jurisprudence and a member of the Ways and Means Committee.

Sudan Teen Gives Report On Program

Drugs and drug prevention was the main issue in an assembly held October 4 at the high school auditorium. The assembly was part of a drug awareness program.

Floyd Price, the speaker, has been with the Lubbock Police Department for thirty-three years, five of which he has been detective. Price specializes in crime prevention.

He addressed the number one drug that plagues society today-alcohol. Price went on to describe the physical problems of alcoholism.

Since the majority of the audience was teenagers, Price made a point toward the teens.

"Teens drink to get drunk. That's why we have so many teenage alcoholics," said Price.

Many teenage boys feel as though alcohol helps them to be at ease. Price rebutted that statement by saying, "You don't need alcohol to function, to have a good time, to talk to that pretty little girl out there."

Alcohol was not the only drug abuse pointed out. Inhalants, marijuana, cocaine, and other hard drugs were also topics.

Five percent of the population use over fifty percent of illicit harddrugs. These inhalants could be things found around the house such as gasoline which when used can completely deteriorate the brain. Even corrective fluid could be used as an inhalant. Price told about one young person that put liquid paper in a Coke can and inhaled it during class. Pam®, Lysol®, and hairspray can kill a person because of the toxic chemicals

and wax bases.

Cocaine is one of the most addictive drugs in society today. Teenagers obtain the money to buy this drug by burglarly, stealing, and prostitution. They then buy it from the drug lords.

"The drug lords don't care about your life. They just care about the money," said Price.

Preventing the teens of today from taking these drugs comes from educating them. Price advised.

"You have to be continually on your guard. If you say 'no', mean 'no'. Use your good influence to influence others to be disciplined."

The assembly ended after Price showed the teachers and students what to look for when teens start to hide their drugs in school supplies and key rings.

Mrs. Barbara Lust, home economics teacher at Lazbuddie, has shown that student plays can be a very effective teaching device.

She recently conducted a unit in her "Life Management Skills" and "Comprehensive Home Economics" classes in which she allowed the students to create and act out skits over handling conflicts, developmental tasks of teenagers, emotions, family crises and communication.

A parent video-taped the plays, which took place in the home economics room. Mrs. Lust then showed the video to several of her classes, using it as an instructional tool as she pointed out realistic problem-solving skills that were shown and discussed alternative solutions to some of the conflicts presented.

Mrs. Lust said that the students really enjoyed working on their skits and then watching themselves perform. She stated that she was pleased with the student participation and interest, and she feels that it was an effective way of not only teaching the unit, but also that the video helped to instill self-confidence in the students who performed.

The home economics teacher said that one of the major goals of the state's home economics program is to work toward improving each student's self-image. She said that although home economics still teaches cooking and sewing, the program has adapted and includes many areas of home life, including managing money, resolving conflicts, preparing for marriage, child development, etc.

Mrs. Lust stresses that there is an emphasis on building self-esteem, and she makes every

effort to incorporate it into every teaching unit.

She encourages both boys and girls to take advantage of home economics courses, and indeed, she has many boys in her classes and enjoys their participation.

Using Power Tools Takes Much Care

Keep safety in mind when working around the farm or home this fall, especially when using power tools, cautioned Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To use power tools safely, one must be constantly on the alert, Tanksley said. These safety pointers should prove helpful.

*Get to know your power tools well. Read instruction booklets carefully.

*Always use the right tool for a job, never substitute.

*If an electrically-powered tool is not double-insulated, make sure it is grounded properly to reduce the shock hazard.

*Always keep guards in place because they are there to protect you.

*Make sure tools and accessories are in top working order.

*Never operate a power tool in a wet or moist area.

*Dress with safety in mind. It's wise to wear safety glasses or goggles.

*Don't clutter the work area, and discourage onlookers who may distract you.

*Store tools in a safe place and make them off-limits for children.

Accident analyst says cause of collisions now can be determined

COLLEGE STATION — A new automated process that analyzes high-accident locations on urban freeways may help to reduce urban accident rates, says an accident analyst with the Texas Transportation Institute-TTI at Texas A&M University.

In addition, the process can be used to train a new generation of highway engineers, said Barbara DeLucia, head of the TTI Accident Analysis Division.

The process, called Microcomputer Accident Analysis Program (MAAP), does an automated analysis of urban freeway or interstate segments with accident data to determine potential causes of accidents at that location, such as weather condition, road surface condition or speeding. DeLucia said. The microcomputer software suggests engineering or enforcement changes that might reduce accidents at that location.

In addition to providing valuable information on causes of accidents, MAAP can serve as a training tool for a new generation of state engineers, DeLucia said.

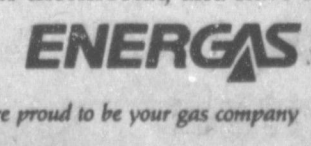

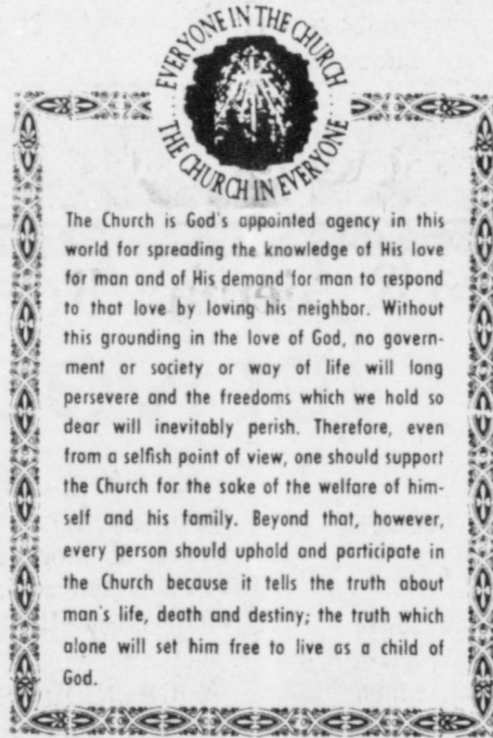

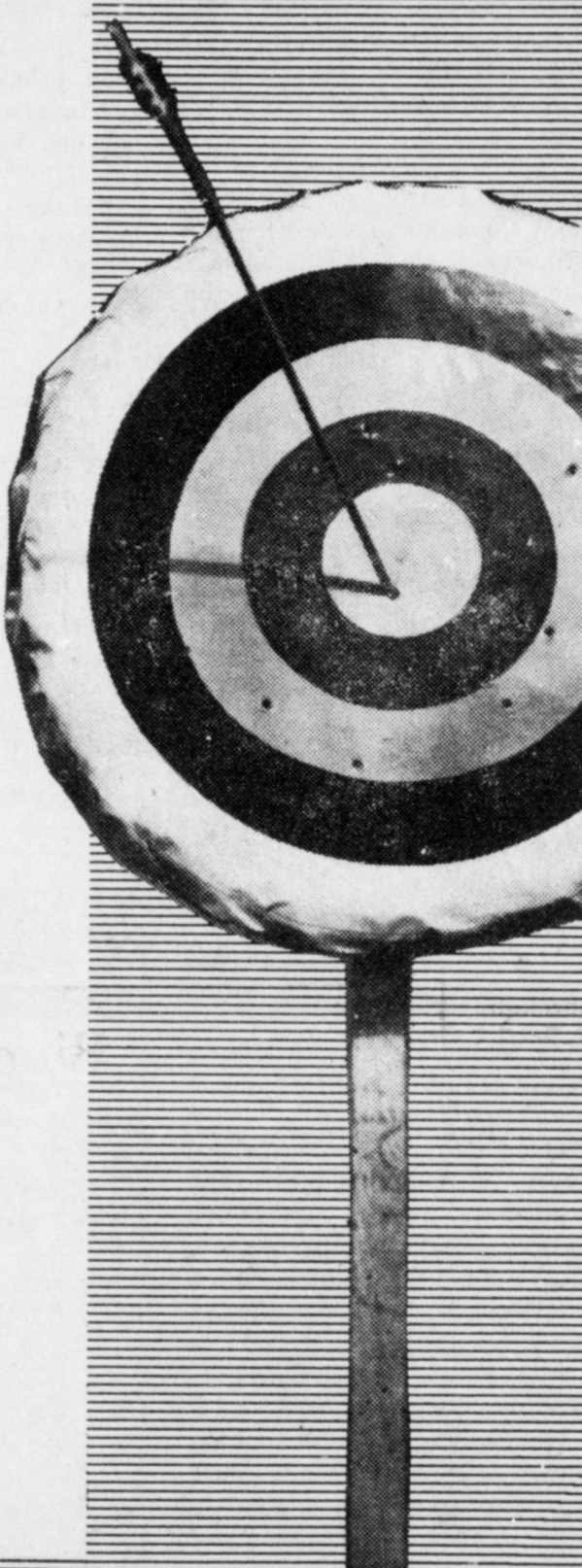
