SCHOOLS ACROSS TEXAS have now passed their first "No Pass, No Play" hurdle, with the losses in some school districts being extreme, while in others they were minimal.

At the class A school of Marathon, for example, the loss of five members of the school's football team forced the cancellation of the remainder of the school's football schedule.

We are not sure at this point if Marathon was fielding a six-man or an 11-man team, but regardless of that point, the team had to cancel its schedule. A lot of 11-man teams would have been in trouble by losing five or six players, Bovina being a prime example.

Across the state, the average loss was 16 per cent of the students in extra-curricular activities. Some schools kept their losses lower with a well-organized tutorial and/or counseling program.

Most school officials with whom we have discussed the "No Pass, No Play" rule agree on one major point: While schools must have an eligibility standard in order for academics to be upheld, the six-week "punishment" is far too severe.

"It's the death penalty," stated a spokesman for one football team that was stricken about as badly as the one mentioned earlier.

The tendency that we dread is the good possibility that several of those athletes who are ineligible for the current six-week period will drop out of school entirely.

A coach told me this past week that he had heard athletes make the remark that if they were on the failing list, they planned to drop out of school.

When this happens, these former students will be out on the streets, prime candidates for delinquency, drugs and crime of all sorts.

Is the punishment too severe?

At Plainview, where the school system lost 49 of 192 students involved in football (25.5 per cent), Superintendent Lamont Veatch says he thinks there is a strong chance that some students declared ineligible will drop out of school rather than bring up their grades.

"A person ought to be able to feel they've got a chance to come back," was Veatch's comments.

Most school officials, coaches, etc., feel that a week's ineligibility is plenty for a student involved in extra-curricular activities.

And, while athletics has received most of the publicity, from our way of thinking, the schools' marching bands stand to be hurt a lot worse than the football teams. For most of the bands, the six-week period comes just prior to the bands' UIL marching contest.

Band directors across the state find themselves having to plug holes, revamp their marching routines, etc. Whereas most football teams have substitutes they can move up where a player is lost, band directors don't usually have that luxury.

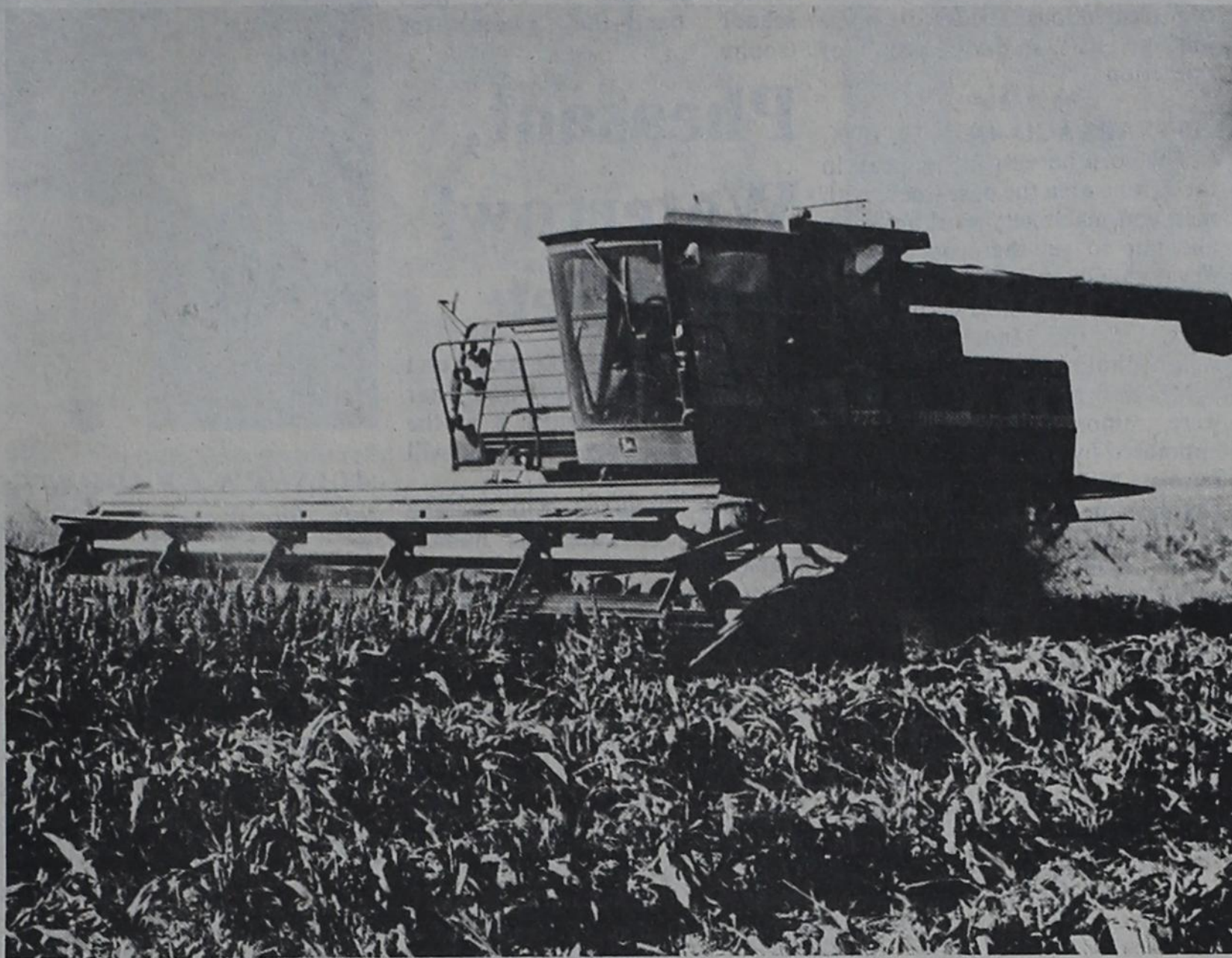
Having already seen one editorial that praised the "No Pass, No Play" system, we thought it appropriate to call attention to the pitfalls of the students who might possibly drop out of school entirely.

If this happens, then our state will find itself with more potential criminals, or welfare candidates, which adds to the cost to taxpayers. Consider this before giving Mark White and Ross Perot a pat on the back for the "success of "No Pass, No Play."

Harvest of the area's row crops, which has been delayed for the better part of the past two weeks due to rain, was resumed the latter part of the week, as the weatherman came forth with several warm, sunny days.

The remaining corn crop is being harvested, and many farmers are beginning to start combining their maize. Digging of sugar beets also was resuming as of Thursday, and at least a few farmers were beginning to strip their cotton.

The area still has not had a good killing freeze, which will be needed before a lot of the cotton and maize will be ready for harvest. But in some instances, both of

Chiefs, Tulia Seek Playoffs

A playoff spot will be on the line for the Friona Chieftains when they travel to Tulia next Friday to battle the tough Hornets.

The Hornets likewise have their eye on a post-season appearance, especially since their exciting 15-14 win over defending champion Littlefield last week.

"We could make the playoffs if we can beat Dimmitt and Tulia," said Coach Tommy Moss this week. The Chieftains hosted rival Dimmitt on Friday, and were hoping to bounce back from their first district loss at Idalou last Friday.

The team was expecting to have runningback Lonnie Phillips back in the lineup, after missing the past couple of games.

But in the meantime they lost tackle-guard Jerry McDowell, who suffered a broken tailbone while

working in the weight room, and will be out of action.

The Hornets are led by veteran quarterback Todd Lacey, who was among the most accurate passers in the area a year ago, hitting 70 of 176 passes for 1,229 yards and 13 touchdowns. Lacey will sufficiently test Friona's pass defense.

Tulia leads the all-time series, 19-6, although Coach Moss is all even against the Hornets in his four face-offs, two wins against two losses. One of the losses was a 13-12 affair here last year when Tulia rallied for the win.

Depending on the team's outcome against Dimmitt Friday, will determine how important the game is to Friona's playoff hopes. But from here, it looks to be a vital contest.

Bovina Contestant Wins Grid Event

A Bovina contestant, Daniel Hernandez, was the weekly winner in the Friona Star's football contest for the ninth week of the event.

Seventeen more contestants had the better than average score of 14 for the week. With upsets being the rule, the average score for the weekly contest was 12. One game, WTSU vs Illinois State, ended in a tie, resulting in one "automatic" missed game for all contestants.

Hernandez, who pulled a double win by also winning the Bovina Blade's weekly contest, missed Tulia-Littlefield, River Road-Boys Ranch, WTSU-Illinois State, Oklahoma-Miami, Army-Notre Dame and Purdue-Ohio State.

Teresa Shelby missed the tie game, Oklahoma-Miami, SMU-Houston, Purdue-Ohio State, Cincinnati-Houston, San Diego-Minnesota and St. Louis-Pittsburgh.

Floyd Reeve said he began cutting maize on Wednesday, after the moisture content of the grain dropped to a level which allowed it to be cut. He said that the test weight (60) was much better than average, and that the yield would be about what he expected.

Estis Bass brought a bale of cotton to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin this week, and gin manager D.L. Carmichael said that several farmers, including the Murphrees, Grimsleys and Gary Brown were beginning to strip.

The gin has not "fired up" yet, though, as Carmichael says he will wait until he gets a good number of bales on the yard, probably remembering last year's extended harvest season, which causes the gins to have more expenses.

Tommy Chapman, manager of ElGin, said he thought there was some good-looking cotton around the country. "I can't tell that the weather has hurt it any, but we sure need a bunch of dry weather. If we can get another two or three

days of dry weather, some of the farmers will be starting to strip," Chapman said.

The frosts which the area has received has helped to knock the leaves off most of the cotton, which has assisted in the maturing of the crop.

Friday dawned with fog enveloping the area, but it was expected to burn off, and forecasters are calling for several days of open weather. Rowcrop farmers would like to hold them to their word.

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 31, 1930

Farmers in the Friona territory say that their chances for a wheat crop this year look extremely good. There is plenty of moisture in the ground to bring the wheat to a good growth and with the usual amount of winter moisture they will be sure to make a good stand.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1935

Monday was "Wheat Check Day" at Friona, when County Agent, A.R. Bateman and his assistants put in one full day here in the Maurer building delivering wheat checks to the wheat farmers of this locality. The checks that were delivered at that time were the last 1934 and the first 1935 checks, and those delivered totaled an estimated amount of \$80,000.00 for this locality. The total amount of money allotted the wheat farmers of Parmer County, according to Mr. Bateman, is \$200,780.30, of which amount \$121,780.30 in checks has already been received at his office at Farwell.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1940

Parmer County 4-H Club Beef Calf demonstrators have scheduled a Progress Show in the school bus barn in Friona Saturday afternoon, October 26 at 2 o'clock. This is not a competitive show, but will give you an opportunity to see the type calves on feed now, and compare the feeding results next March at our spring show.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 26, 1945

Mayor Glenn Reeve announced Tuesday that the City Commissioners have appointed Freese and Nichols, engineers, to do the preliminary figuring on the prospective sewer system for Friona. Further announcements in regard to this project will be made as soon as possible.

Lion W.L. Edelman of Friona has been made Zone Chairman of the Lions Clubs at Friona, Hereford and Dimmitt. His appointment was made by Deputy District Governor Lon Edwards of Amarillo, and concurred in by

District Governor Charles H. Dean of Plainview.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1950

Burglars again struck Friona last Thursday night, taking property from the Friona Lumber Company and the Friona Consumers Cooperative. The same night, tools were taken from the A.L. Black farm southeast of Friona. The lumber company safe was carried from the yard, later being found near the highway west of town, minus a small amount of cash, but still containing the books of the firm.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 21, 1955

Playing "caveman" proved fatal to a six year old child Thursday afternoon and placed another in the local hospital severely cut and bruised about the head. David Casares, son of an itinerant Mexican family, lost his life when playing with a number of other children in a pit at the Mills & Fleming Gin south of Friona.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 20, 1960

A three-firm shopping center has its grand opening in Friona Saturday. White's Supermarket, LuNora's Ladies and Children's Ready To Wear and E-Z Coin Operated Laundry will all have special prizes and prices to mark the occasion. All three firms are located in the new Schueler Building. E.S. White is operator of the supermarket. His son, Edward, operates the laundry and is also employed at the supermarket. LuNora's is owned by Mrs. Nora Welch.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 21, 1965

Ross Ayers last week received notice of his advancement in rank from Brigadier-General with the National Guard, and received new orders placing him in command of SFR Brigade of the 36th Division, headquartered in San Antonio.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 22, 1970

Missouri Beef Packers was one of six Texas industries which was cited for its expansion during the 1969 calendar year at the third

annual Governor's Industrial Expansion Conference in Austin on Tuesday. The Friona-based beef packing plant was cited for the tremendous strides it made during its second year of operation.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1975

The corn harvest hit its peak in the Friona area the past week, with men and machinery working early and late to get the crop into the elevators. Observers feel the harvest will be all but finished within a few days, if the Indian Summer weather holds on.

Mr. and Mrs. P. Vaughn Ross were among 20 missionaries appointed by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board during its October meeting at First Baptist Church of Richmond, Virginia. They expect to be assigned to public health work in East Africa.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1980

The fire completely destroyed the company's shop area, ruining machinery, tools, etc. The company's offices also sustained considerable damage. A spokesman said the damage would run between \$75,000 and \$100,000, and might even top the \$100,000 mark.

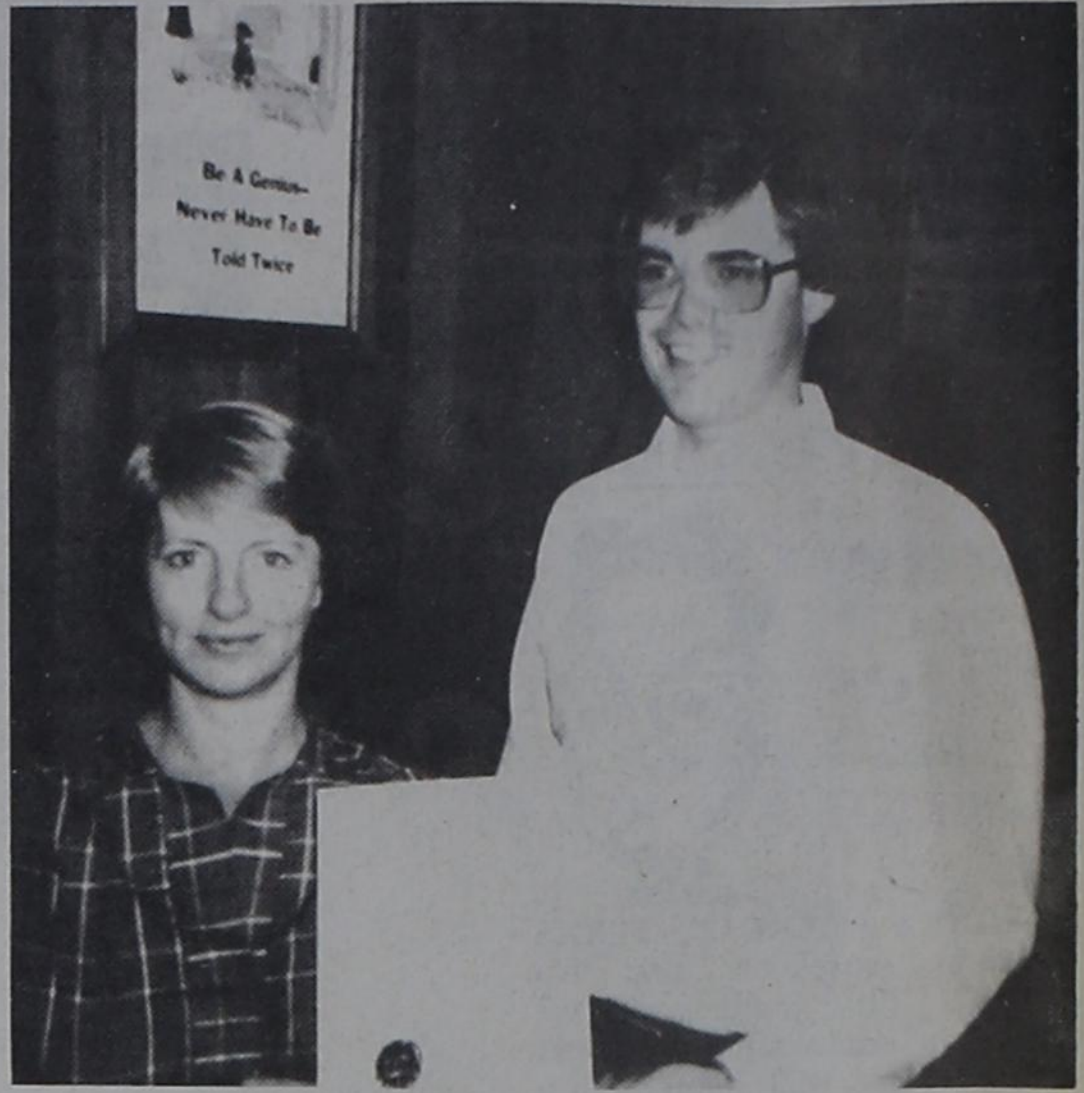
Interscholastic League's marching contests Wednesday at Texas Tech. This rating is the first step toward the goal of every high school band--the sweepstakes trophy.

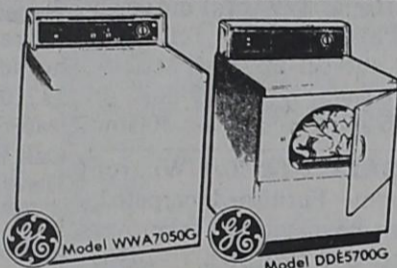

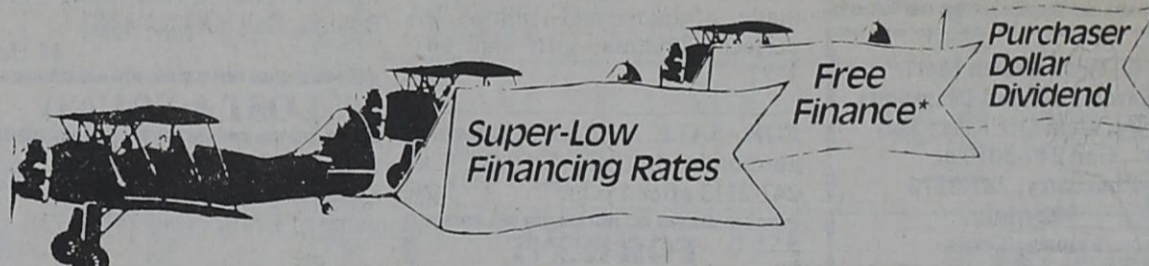

A pedestrian's chance of getting killed or injured are increased 800 per cent at night. The adult must think of the children's safety. Halloween should be a safe and enjoyable time for everyone. Major Cawthon said, "Parents should carry a flashlight to serve as a warning to the motorists. As an added traffic safety measure on poorly lit streets, children should be instructed to use sidewalks and not jay walk."

The DPS cautions against permitting youngsters to carry jack-o-lanterns with lighted candles due to the possibility of the costume catching fire. Also throwing objects such as water balloons at moving vehicles could result in disaster.

In summary, it is suggested that trick-or-treaters not do anything to anyone, even in fun, that they would not want done to them during Halloween, or any other time.

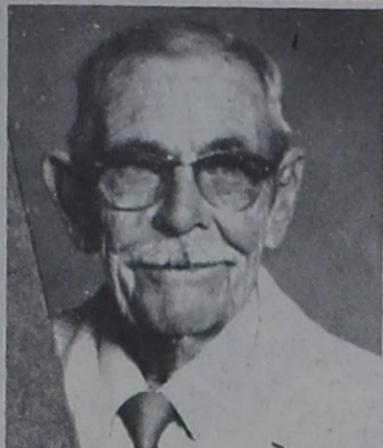
F.M. Crook Rites Held

He was born in Inadale and had been a resident of Portales since March 1968, moving there from Muleshoe. He was a radio broadcaster and television engineer.

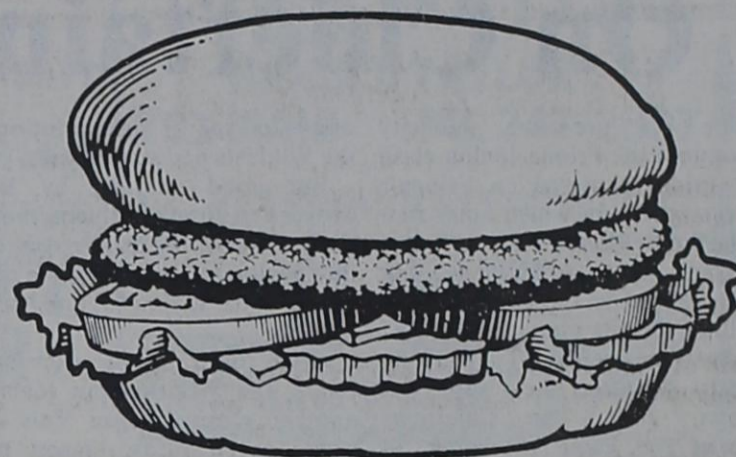

It looked as though Friona was going to answer the challenge after Brent Gatlin returned the kick to the Chieftain 35-yard line.

Gatlin gave the team a first down at the 45, and Jimmy Williams broke for a 16-yard gain to the Idalou 34. The Idalou safety saved a touchdown by tackling Williams in the open field, he being the last man between Williams and the goal-line.

Moyer gave the team a first down at the 20 with a ten-yard run, and his three-yard burst pushed the ball to the Idalou 17.

But from here the Chiefs decided to go to the air, and Jeff Brown was unable to connect on three straight passes, and Idalou took over on their 17.

A touchdown by Friona at this point would have made the score 14-7 at the half, and with the Chieftains receiving the second half kickoff, might have swung the momentum. But this scenario did not develop.

The Chieftains did take the second half kickoff, and moved the ball well once again. Leroy Mercado returned the kick out to the 32 to give Friona some breathing room.

Moyer gained 13 yards, and his seven-yard gain a few minutes later moved the ball to the Idalou 33. That first down put the team in front of Idalou in that category at that point, 9-7. However, unknown to the Friona faithful, it was to be the team's last first down of the ball game.

An illegal motion penalty against the Chiefs helped stall the drive, and after two running plays gained just two yards, Brown failed to hit Moyer on a pass and Friona elected to punt.

Moreno and Pisen hooked up to score an insurance touchdown for the Wildcats. The duo connected on a 45-yard play in which Pisen got behind the Friona defense. That moved the ball all the way from Idalou's own 24-yard line to Friona's 31.

A little later, Moreno tossed to Pisen on a fourth down to keep

the drive alive at the Friona 15, and then Moreno scored the TD himself on a quarterback draw play. The kick ran Idalou's lead to 21-0, with 1:22 left in the third quarter.

The Chieftains had done a good defensive job on Idalou's 190-pound tailback, limiting him to mostly short gains most of the night. Brent Gatlin in particular had dealt the runningback a lot of misery in the first three quarters of the game.

But on the second play of the final quarter, Jones broke through the line and raced 50 yards for the touchdown. That one run almost equalled his rushing total up to that point for the game, but it gave Idalou a commanding 28-0 lead and a little later Coach Tom Ritchey began to sprinkle the game with reserves, at least on offense.

Junior quarterback Patches Fleming came on in the latter stages of the game to attempt to revive the sagging Friona offense, but could not do it. One of his passes was picked off by Jones at the Friona 40.

Hurting Friona's offensive thrust for the second week was the injury to runningback Lonnie Phillips, who was just beginning to be a big factor in the Chieftain offense until he was injured in the Morton game.

"We made a couple of mistakes on passes, and that killed us, but overall I wasn't disappointed with the way we played. I think we hit Jones harder than he's been hit this year," said Coach Tommy Moss.

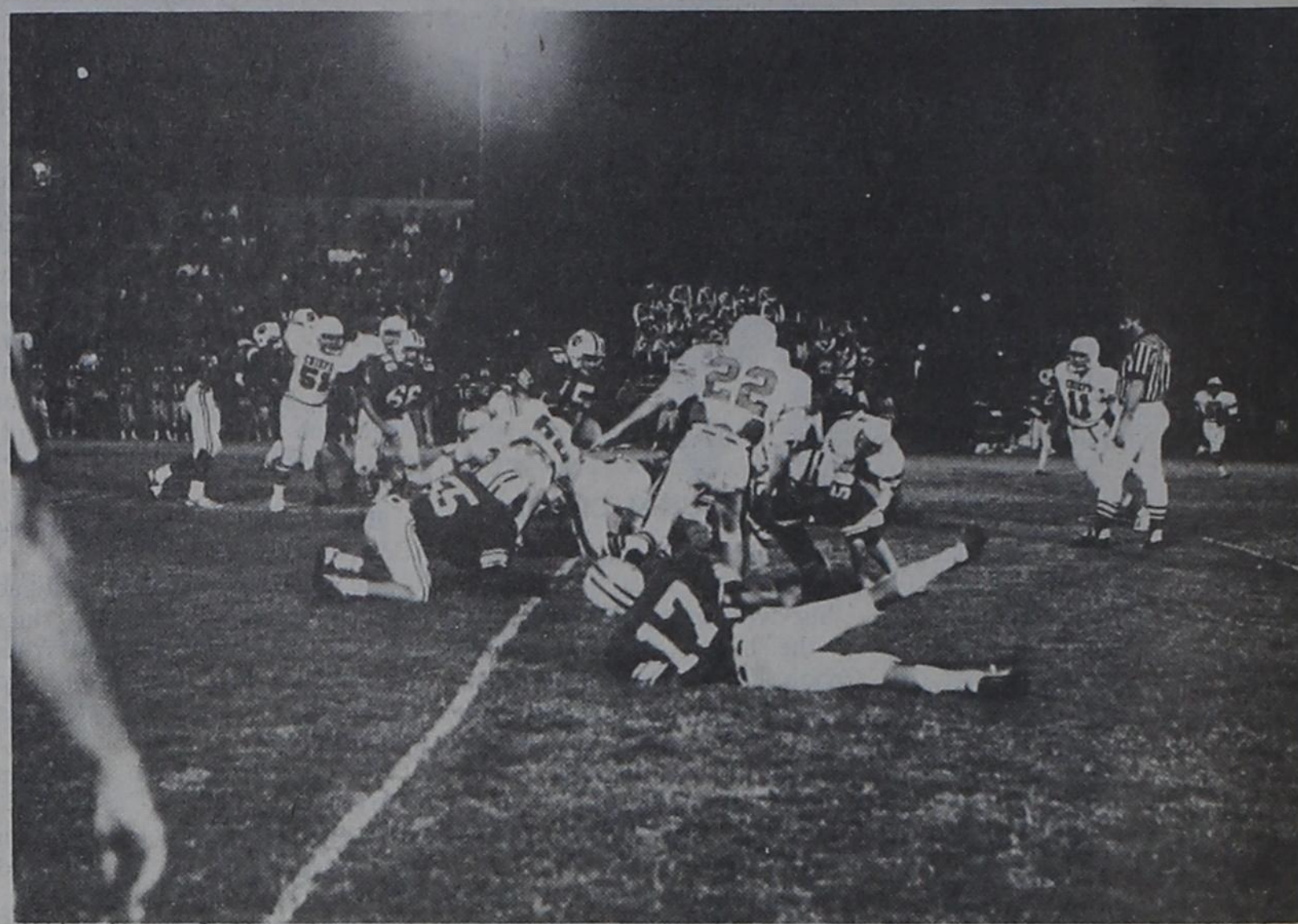

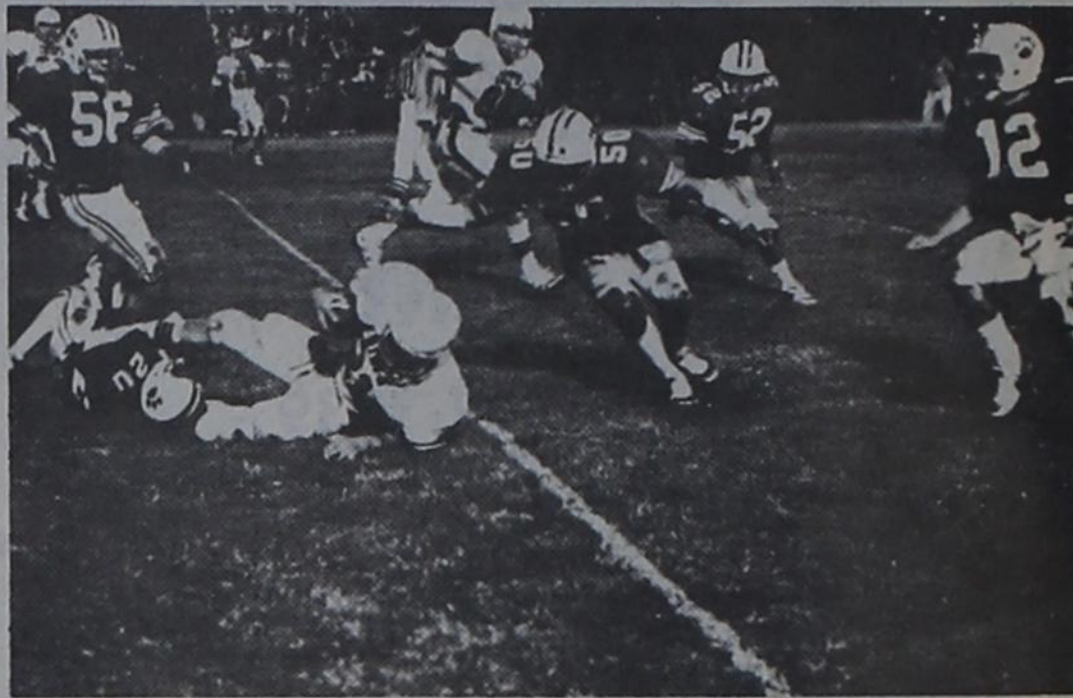
