Award Contract Sul. River Survey

Congressman Wright Patman (D-Tex) announced today that the U. S. Army Engineer District at New Orleans has awarded a contract in the amount of \$60,643 to the East Texas State University at Commerce, for that institution to conduct an environmental inventory and survey of the Sulphur River Basin in Texas and Arkansas and submit a complete report of their findings. This report will provide the necessary background data so that an environmental impact statement consistent with provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 can be promulgated regarding the Cooper Lake and Channel project.

Congressman Patman added that field work will be performed in Delta, Hopkins, Hunt, Red River, Titus, Franklin, Morris, Cass and Bowie Counties, Texas, and Miller County, Arkansas. The Congressman concluded by noting that Dr. D. Whitney Haliday, President of East Texas State University, can be relied upon to expedite the investigation and report, and insure that it is consistent with the highest professional and environmental standards.

Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas
"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

WELCOME FANNIN, HENDERSON AND SAN AUGUSTINE COUNTIES! Once again, the Texas Legislature has completed the redistricting of our state to conform with judicial mandates. So far as the First District is concerned, I consider it most fortunate that we have been able to keep all of our present 18 counties and to gain these three fine East Texas counties. They are all outstanding, with a rich share of Texas tradition, and historic ties with the present First District. Fannin County was created in 1837 by dividing Red River County, and was named for James Fannin, the hero of Goliad. Henderson County was created in 1946, later divided to form Wood County, and was named for James P. Henderson, first elected Governor of Texas. San Augustine County was among the first created by the Republic of Texas in 1836, and was named for an historic Spanish mission in the area dating back to 1716! Along with Shelby and parts of Panola, San Augustine was a part of a Republic of Mexico "municipality" which predated Texas independence.

FANNIN, HENDERSON AND SAN AUGUSTINE certainly share a common heritage, and have similar interests and problems with the First District which I have the honor to represent. Of course, our present 18-county District remains as is until January 3, 1973, when the 33rd Congress convenes. Primary elections are less than a year away, in May of 1972, and will involve all of the 21 counties. If this greeting to Fannin, Henderson and San Augustine is at all premature, it is because they are so warmly welcome as an important part of Texas' First District.

THE "YEAR" OF THE BANKER. In recent days I have called attention to the fact some bankers use a 360-day calendar in computing interest on loans. It works like this: assume a loan of \$7,300 for 1 year at 5% per annum. The interest would be \$365 using the normal calendar year basis of computing interest, but the interest would be \$370.11 when the 360-day year basis is used — \$5.11 more than the calendar year basis. While this may look like a penny-ante operation, it is estimated that the practice costs bank borrowers \$145 million a year in excess interest payments. Some justifications have been offered, but it looks like nothing more than old-fashioned greed.

AS USUAL, THE AMERICAN BANKERS ASSOCIATION (ABA) CRANKED UP ITS GIANT LOBBYING SYSTEM to deny my charge about the bankers' 360-day computation, but this organization which truly represents only a handful of Wall Street banks was caught red-handed in a blatant attempt to mislead the public by claiming that my charges were "untrue." Actually, my comments were based on information provided to the Federal Reserve by bankers themselves. The Fed's survey of 234 representative banks across the nation, undertaken at my request, showed that 82% of the banks questioned admitted using the 360-day calculation on some types of loans.

VOTING REQUIREMENT CURIOSITIES. With a proposed Constitutional Amendment now pending ratification by the required 3/4ths of the states to lower the voting age in all elections to 18 (already in effect for national elections), it is interesting to note that 40 other countries in the world now permit 18-year-olds to vote. Fourteen more nations have set their voting age at 19 or 20, and 65 countries have a minimum voting age of 21. Tiny Andorra restricts the vote to men aged 25 and over. Kuwait permits only men to cast ballots but oddly denies the franchise to all servicemen and policemen. In Nicaragua the voting age is 21, but drops to 18 for all who can read or write or are married, and is even below 18 for those with a college degree. Twelve countries have compulsory voting, and another country (Brazil) permits officers to vote, but not enlisted men! In the Dominican Republic, married individuals can vote even if under 18. Communist Cuba has set the minimum voting age at 20, but it doesn't make much difference — Cubans have no elections since the Castro takeover in 1959.

Austin. — Texas 1972 political campaigns jumped off to an early start last week amid earthquake proportioned new rumblings in the long-running Securities and Exchange Commission stock manipulation case.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes announced he will run for governor, and called "loss of faith and confidence in state government" the No. 1 political issue.

Barnes termed the shadows cast by SEC's inquiry into stock trading of state officials one of the reasons for lost confidence by the public.

"I visualize the role of the governor as a much more-aggressive role than it has been in the past," he said. Barnes, who is 33, added "a young governor with progressive ideas would be an asset" to Texas.

Barnes said he would aim to make the state Democratic party an "energetic force for sound government, not just a political tool to be used briefly every two years and then discarded. I want Texas to be strong in national affairs."

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, recovered from a March heart attack, announced he will file as a candidate for a fourth term.

"In the light of the scandals that have rocked our state government this spring — and the resulting investigation which my office has begun at the request of the Legislature — I feel it a question of duty to Texans to make the race," said Martin.

Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde reportedly retains interest in the governor's race.

Gov. Preston Smith still hints he may run again, brands federal handling of the stock case "political harassment."

OIL ALLOWABLE CUT — Statewide oil production allowable for July has been slashed 260,815 barrels a day from June.

New allowable was set by the Railroad Commission at 68.7 percent of potential or a decrease of 6.7 per cent. Reduction is the third straight.

Market demand factor for the coming month is the lowest since 62.9 per cent allowable was set during part of August, 1970. Maximum production is estimated at 3,367,115 barrels daily, but actual production will be closer to 3,273,750 barrels — slightly more than major buyers requested.

Eight of 14 major crude purchasers asked the same allowable for July, four sought less and two requested more.

Crude oil stocks were estimated at 108.4 million barrels, an increase of 1.1 million over the 1970 period.

CRIME FIGHT FUNDS APPROVED — Nearly \$4 million in grants to aid criminal justice projects received Criminal Justice Council Approval.

CJC will fund \$2.5 million from federal aid money, with local governments contributing another \$1.5 million.

COURTS SPEAK — Supreme Court upheld a Tyler court verdict awarding \$5,000 accidental death policy recovery to a widow whose husband was shot to death allegedly after committing adultery with the wife of another man.

Sanford Retires As TPA Manager

Austin. — Vernon T. Sanford, general manager of the Texas Press Association for almost 24 years, will retire on July 1.

Sanford has been general manager of TPA since December 1, 1947, when he moved to Texas from his native Oklahoma. Since that date he has been a guiding force for the 634 daily and weekly newspapers of Texas, working quietly "behind the scene" to upgrade the journalism profession and help charter the course of newspapers in the state.

Among the weekly columns produced by Sanford is State Capital News Column which is printed regularly in this newspaper.

High Court set July 14 arguments in a Dallas woman's damage suit claiming negligence by a private plane pilot in an accident which killed her husband four years ago.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the life sentence in a Beaumont rape case.

Austin Court of Civil Appeals reversed a Houston trial court and upheld State Board of Examiners of Psychologists' decision denying Houstonian Joseph D. Fariar a license to practice psychology because his master's degree was not primarily psychological but educational.

AG OPINIONS — Minors can be tried for liquor law violations without notification to parents if court is unable to locate parents or guardians. Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

- A trial judge has discretion to grant probation when satisfied the best interests of the public and the defendant will be served, and the defendant is not under burden to show eligibility for probation, though the judge may require appropriate proof.

- Board of Private Detectives, Private Investigators, Private Patrolmen, Private Guards and Managers has discretion to decide whether or not license of those within its jurisdiction will be denied because of a conviction for felony.

- Whether Parks and Wildlife Department executive can retire as a "commissioned peace officer" is a fact question to be determined by PWD on the basis of whether he was engaged primarily in criminal law enforcement activities of the department during 10 years.

LAND SALE SET — School Land Board will offer 594,132 acres of land in 869 tracts for July 6 lease sale.

For the first time, said Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, the Land Board has coordinated environmental planning with the Parks and Wildlife Department on all bays and inlets included.

PWD reviewed tracts in lease and reported any possible hazard to the environment if drilling is permitted. Proposed restrictions will be considered by the Land Board.

Other tracts included are submerged lands in the Gulf of Mexico cancelled from the May sale list due to U. S. Army Corps of Engineers' halting drilling on such tracts temporarily. Submerged land acreage is the largest offered for lease since June, 1965, when the state received more than \$17 million for sale of leases.

CONVICTION "TAX" LEVIED — Cost of moving traffic violations and other convictions will go up under a bill signed into law and designed to provide funds for projects to improve the criminal justice system.

In addition to other taxable court costs, \$2.50 will be charged in each misdemeanor conviction in justice of the peace or municipal court. County misdemeanor convictions will be charged an additional \$5 in court costs, and felony convictions, \$10.

BACKGROUND ON BUSINESS

FGOD FOR THOUGHT

While virtually all segments of the nation's economy were affected by the business recession of the past year, there were some industries which continued to post profit gains. One of these was the food processing industry where most of the large diversified companies showed earnings improvement in 1970, demonstrating once again the relative immunity of food company earnings to an economic slowdown. This is discussed in a review of the food processing industry by Value Line, a leading investment advisory service.

Value Line notes that the industry offers some promising long term investment opportunities based on the prospects of continued steady earnings growth in the years ahead. Three major trends are cited as important factors in the higher profit margins being sought and achieved by the group. One important element in the attainment of higher margins has been an upgrading of the product line from commodities such as milk and flour to more profitable convenience food products. This trend has caused many of the companies to be less affected by commodity price fluctuations since the cost of the commodity accounts for a smaller percentage of the cost of the end product. As a result, earnings growth becomes more dependable.

Value Line points out that the increasing affluence of the average American family has accelerated the demand for convenience foods. Another factor has been the growing number of working wives in our society. More money to spend and less time in the kitchen accentuate the desirability of commodities that are carried closer to the actual serving stage. This has resulted in a steadily increasing flow of convenience products such as frozen prepared foods of all

types, instant puddings, prepared baking mixes, frozen sauces, and TV dinners, to name just a few. Another important factor in the wider margins achieved by many companies in the food processing industry has been the growth of international operations. The increasing affluence of people in many foreign countries has opened up vast new markets for the introduction of convenience food products. Value Line notes that the economies of many countries are growing at a faster rate than ours, contributing to the expansion of these markets. Most large U.S. food processing companies do substantial business in foreign countries and in many cases their international divisions are among the fastest growing of their operations.

The third major factor in the development of higher margins in the industry is the growing trend of food processors to diversify. Through acquisitions, companies in the industry have diversified into allied fields such as restaurant chains and into a wide range of non-food operations including apparel, appliances, publishing, cosmetics, toys and other areas. Value Line points out that as food companies diversify out of their fields of basic know-how, added risks are incurred and strong management on the part of the acquired company is most important.

In its summary, Value Line expects profits of the food processing industry generally to continue in an uptrend over the next 3 to 5 years. It comments that as competition in convenience foods slows profit gains for individual companies in this area, these companies will seek to increase their international operations and diversification programs in their quest for higher margins and continuing earnings growth.

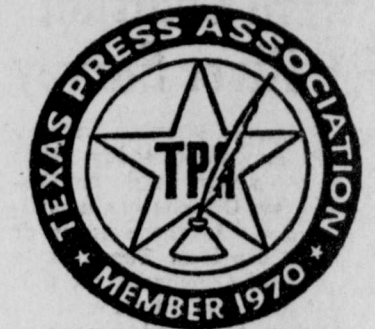

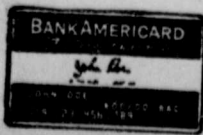
