School candidates begin filing

Two candidates have filed for election to two of five places up for election to the Colorado ISD board election May 5.

The election will be held under the new guidelines of single member districts as a result of an agreement reached between the school and the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) which had contended the district's previous at-large method of electing school board members discriminated against minorities seeking election to the board.

Places 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7 are up for election this year, with places 2 and 3 both three-year terms and places 4, 6 and 7 two-year terms. Places 1 and 5 will be up for election next year.

Incumbent Dwayne Harris, representing Place 6, has filed for election as has Place 7 incumbent Floyd Ritchey.

The other board members whose terms will be expiring are Brenda Aguillon, Ruben Alvarez and Eddie Gregory.

Kathy Bassham represents Place 1 and Billy Bruce Bridgford represents Place 5

in the newly created seven-member district and therefore have one more year to serve in their terms of office.

Deadline for filing is March 21, said CISD business manager Geneva Findley.

District lines have been agreed upon by both LULAC and the school officials, and maps showing the newly created districts have been posted at the school business office as well as the superintendent's office. The offices also have a nine-page metes and bounds description of the trustee districts which may be examined by the public.

Anyone wishing to file for any of the five positions should contact Findley at the school administration to see which district they live in.

A similar lawsuit filed by LULAC against the city of Colorado City has stalled city council elections this year. The school district did not have an election last year because of an injunction which was issued until the matter could be resolved.

Absentee vote high as deadline nears

If the number of absentee votes is any indication, election judges for next Tuesday's Democratic primary election will have plenty of votes to count.

By Tuesday afternoon, 320 persons had voted absentee in the Democratic primary and 12 had voted absentee in the Republican primary. There had been 38 ballots received by mail.

Absentee voting ends at the courthouse at 5 p.m. Friday.

Colorado City man faces felony charges

A 30-year-old Colorado City man has been arrested and charged with aggravated assault, kidnapping and injury to a child following an incident March 1.

Colorado City Police Chief Bobby Sparks said that Eldon Gregg Grisham was arrested following the incident during which Grisham is alleged to have assaulted Kerry Bradbury, 25, of Colorado City with a tire tool at a residence on 21st Street.

Sparks said Bradbury, who was struck on the head, was taken to Mitchell County hospital with

numerous cuts gashes and was treated and released.

Sparks said Grisham also is accused to taking a five-year-old boy from the same residence with permission and the child obtained some abrasions and scratches during the ordeal.

Sparks said all three charges are felony offenses.

In other recent police activity, Sparks said a 15-year-old juvenile was arrested for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. The youth was transferred to juvenile facilities in Abilene as a result of the charge.

'Oilcentennial' might be in order

TO THE EDITOR: The "Mitchell County Oil & Gas Report" in the Feb. 4 Record stated that Westbrook Oil Field "has produced a total of over 66 million barrels of oil since discovery in 1921." Yes, sir, about 27 million barrels over! The production to January 1 of 1990, according to the Railroad Commission, has been 93,329,247 barrels,

and by January 1 of 1994 the Westbrook Field should have reached the magic 100-million-barrel mark to qualify as a "major oil field". In fact, the *Oil & Gas Journal* which keeps track has already recognized Westbrook as a major field, based on known reserves of 14 million more barrels of recoverable oil, but the actual production of the 100 millionth barrel should be the cause for a major OILCENTENNIAL celebration when it occurs.

I understand some of the residents of Westbrook have complained about a billboard on the interstate which seems to give Colorado City all the credit for starting the oil boom in West Texas. I think they have a certain point. There is enough credit to go around, and I think it is Mitchell County, as a whole, that should be remembered for having the first commercially-producing well in the Permian Basin, and I hope that the county as a whole will see to it that the Westbrook Field which that Abrams well started is recognized by all of West Texas as a major, 100,000,000 barrel field. A celebrating for the lifting of the 100 millionth barrel might seem like old-fashioned boosterism to some, but it might be just what it would take to solidify Mitchell County's recognition in Permian Basin oil history.

The oil companies involved in the Westbrook Field might lend a hand, and all those involved in the oil business might like an occasion to celebrate, and to be recognized for their work and the very large contribution they make to Mitchell County's economy.

The month is designated to honor women of every race, class and ethnic background who have made historic contributions to the growth and strength of our nation in countless recorded and unrecorded ways.

This year's theme, "Courageous Voices Echoing in Our Lives," recalls the words and deeds of previous generations of women. It also symbolizes the lives of women who have sustained and passed on their families' unique cultural heritage.

The NWHPP is a non-profit educational organization located in Windsor, Calif., which serves as a clearinghouse for organizations seeking information and programming ideas in respect to women in American history.

Smoking ban hurts airlines

Experts estimate Canada's airline industry will lose \$77.3 million in annual revenue this year due to the industry's new smoking ban, effective July 1, 1990, on all international flights.

According to the Air Transport Association of Canada, 12 percent to 15 percent of Canadian airline passengers will switch to other carriers the first year the ban is in force. Airlines expect to recover only 3 percent in later years.

The ban will make Canada the first country to prohibit smoking on all overseas flights. Canada already prohibits smoking on domestic flights under two hours.

The ban, which was to have taken effect earlier this year, was pushed back until July because of complaints from smokers who bought their tickets before the new rule was announced.

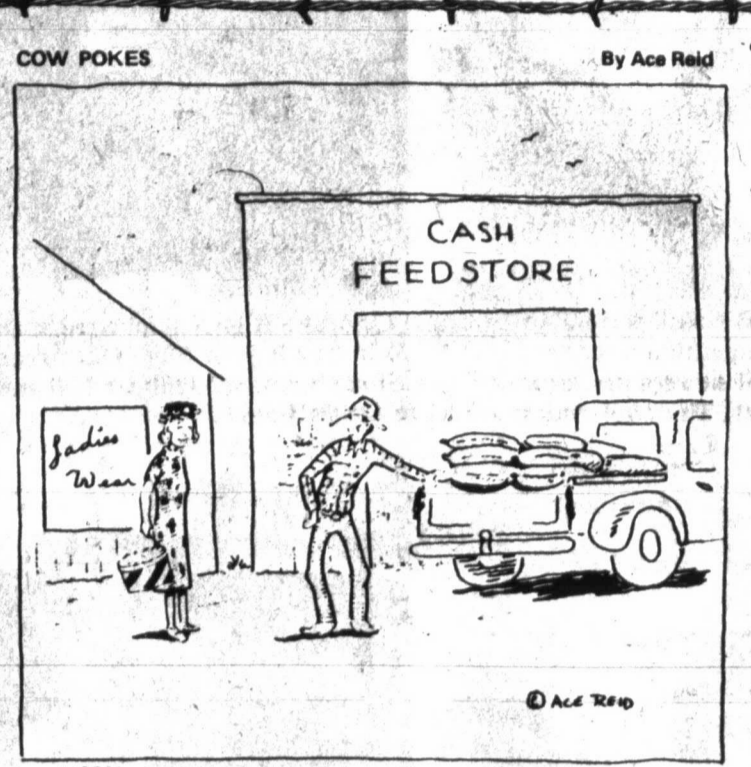
I will not tell you readers all they have accomplished at this time. I will let your read Hal's letter later on.

Texas A&M researchers study ways to address weather-related issues

COLLEGE STATION — Researchers at an uncommon institute at Texas A&M University — one of only nine like it in the country — are studying useful approaches to one of humanity's most commonly talked about subjects — the weather.

Work will center around topics ranging from better forecasting that might save lives to knotty agricultural questions such as how climate affects onion "bolting," says the center's director, Dr. James Scoggins.

The Cooperative Institute for Applied Meteorological Studies (CIAMS) is a collaboration between the National Weather Service (NWS) and the university's Meteorology Department, says Scoggins.

"We want to provide a channel for getting the knowledge we gain through research into the hands of the operational people at the National Weather Service," he said.


One problem institute scientists are already studying is how weather affects bolting, or flowering, of onions, Scoggins said. Once the onion stops growing, it "bolts," shooting a flowery stem upwards, reducing the vegetable's quality. Determining how climate influences that process will aid agriculture and onion lovers, he said.

Texas police promotions based on test scores, not leadership abilities

COLLEGE STATION — Most police supervisors in Texas are not selected or promoted based on their leadership abilities — and most receive little supervisory training, according to a Texas A&M University survey of police agencies.

Larger police departments depend on written civil service promotional examinations to upgrade supervisors while smaller agencies rely on selection by chief, says Dr. Morgan Robnett, who conducted the study for his Ph.D. degree and who heads the law enforcement and security training division of the Texas Engineering Extension Service at Texas A&M.

"No job-related criteria are used for promotion in most Texas police agencies," Robnett said. "The civil service exam is rigid and quantitative, and it's an easy way out for the administrators who do not have to justify promotions. Whoever gets the high score on the test is promoted."
