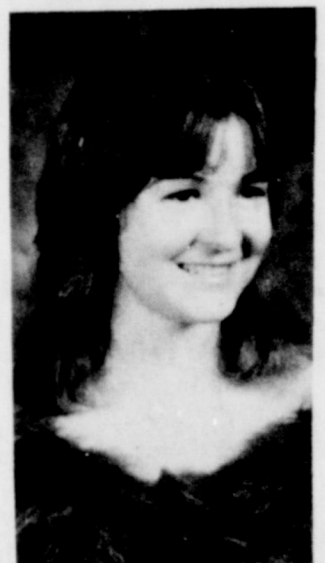
Baccalaureate scheduled For O'Donnell, Wilson And New Home Graduates

Tahoka ISD Board Meets

The Board of Education for Tahoka Independent School District met in regular session on May 13 and the following agenda items were discussed. The minutes of the April 8 meeting and the special meeting of April 26 were read and approved and the monthly bills were approved for payment. A school calendar was approved and appears elsewhere in this edition of the paper. Bus routes for the 1976-77 school year were approved, as were student transfers for the 76-77 session. Budget, financial, cafeteria, enrollment reports were heard, as well as a report on the possibility of fencing of the elementary school campus. The regular meeting for June was changed from the customary second Thursday to the third Thursday in order to avoid a conflict with another meeting.

Federal Land Bank Reduces Loan Rates

Jay Dee House, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Tahoka, announced today that the Federal Land Bank's billing rate on rural residence variable interest rate loans would be decreased from 9% to 8½%. The billing rate on farm and ranch loans will continue at 8½%. The variable interest rate plan was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969, with a billing rate on loans outstanding to follow the variations in the money market, and at this time, 79% of the Bank's portfolio is on the variable rate. Mr. House stated, "This interest rate reduction follows the recent trend on home loans."

Sherry Etheredge Says

How many of you have eaten crepes? Some interesting information pertaining to "Crepes" came to my office from Wheat Flour Institute and I would like to share it with you.

Cupery, once regarded as an art for only the most experienced cook, today shares in the home baking limelight as a hobby.

Why not add crepes to your meal planning? They add a touch of elegance to everything they surround. They cost only pennies to make. In fact, you can whip up an entire batch, about 20, for a dollar.

Another plus for crepes is their nutritive value. For an adult woman (18 to 35), one serving, 3 crepes, supplies 12% of her daily protein requirement. They also add calcium, iron, vitamin A and the B-vitamins-niacin, thiamine and riboflavin.

Yet one crepe supplies

only 63 calories. But if weight-watching is high on your priority list, substitute skim for whole milk. That brings the calorie count down to 55. Using a well seasoned pan helps hold down the line on calories. Then you don't need to add as much butter or oil to prevent sticking during cooking.

The fillings can range from chipped beef in a cream sauce, seafood, cheese, yesterday's leftovers to meat, fruits and vegetables.

The first and perhaps most important part of crepe-baking experience requires selection of the pan. A small frying pan or skillet, six to eight inches in diameter, fashioned from cast aluminum, iron or enameled iron works best. Heavy pans distribute and hold the heat more evenly-an extremely important factor in attaining the proper browning and preventing the crepes from sticking. A pan with sloping sides may be easier to use, especially for beginners.

Give your crepe pan special attention. Never wash it after using. Instead wipe out any excess oil with a dry paper towel. If a film of oil should remain it will be "burned" off when you heat the pan the next time you use it.

To season a new crepe pan, thoroughly wash, rinse and dry. Then spread a thin layer of oil or shortening over the bottom and sides of the pan. Heat slowly, until very hot; cool, wipe clean with a paper towel and repeat the entire process.

You'll almost surely find the remaining utensils for crepe making in your own

kitchen. They include bowls, measuring cups, an egg beater or wire whisk and measuring spoons. The only other special gadget you might want for baking crepes is a ladle or cup that measures out the right amount of batter for the size

crepe you want to make. One six-inch crepe generally uses about two tablespoons of batter; an eight-inch one about three.

Basic Crepe Recipe About 20 crepes

1 cup enriched flour (spoon flour into dry measuring cup; level. Do not scoop)

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 cups milk

3 eggs, beaten

2 tablespoons butter, melted

Butter

1. Sift together flour and salt, set aside.

2. Blend together milk, eggs and melted butter. You can use an electric beater, hand beater or blender.

3. Add liquid to flour mixture all at once, beat until smooth.

4. Heat pan. To make sure it is hot enough to begin, add a few drops of water. If they dance and sizzle, the pan is ready.

5. Melt 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon butter in pan. If pan is well seasoned cook 2 crepes before adding more butter.

6. Pour about 2 tablespoons batter into pan and rotate quickly so batter covers bottom of pan. The process is easier if you make a constant motion in the same direction.

7. Cook over medium to medium-high heat for about 1 minute.

8. Loosen edges of crepe and gently work spatula toward the center to free crepe from pan. Flip loosened crepe and cook on other side for about 30 seconds to a minute.

9. Stack crepes on oven proof plate or baking dish and keep in warm oven until all are baked and ready to be filled.

Variations

Whole Wheat crepes: In place of 1/2 cup of enriched flour, use 1/2 cup whole wheat flour.

Rye Caraway crepes: In place of 1/2 cup of enriched flour, use 1/2 cup rye flour and 1 teaspoon caraway seeds.

Dessert crepes: Add 1 tablespoon of sugar and 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, if desired, to the crepe batter.

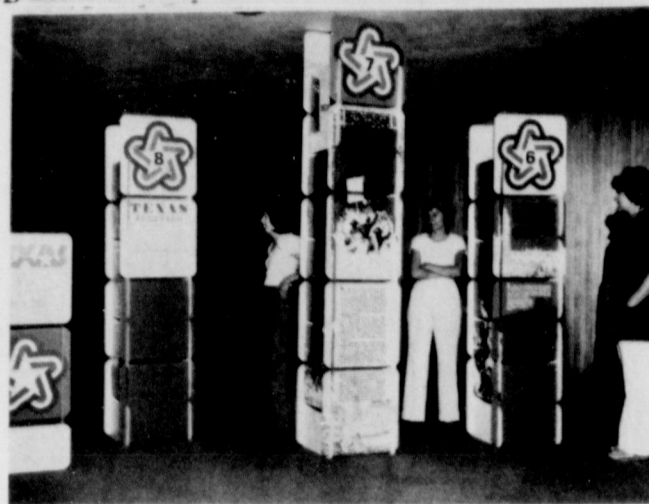
Local Student Gets Degree

BICENTENNIAL DISPLAY AT FIRST NATIONAL BANK

The Bicentennial of the American Revolution is bringing the world's attention to the time when the 13 British colonies on the Atlantic coast of North America declared their independence from England.

It would be 69 years before Texas became a state of the Union; so, one may

ask, how can Texans feel personally involved in celebrating an event so far removed by time and distance? After all, we were only a minor, sub-province of New Spain in 1776.

The Institute of Texan Cultures has produced a major traveling show that answers the question. With pictures and story pulled together by a colorful, innovative design, it shows that Texas does not have to borrow all of its Bicentennial history from the U. S. East Coast.

The exhibition will be displayed in First National Bank from May 20 to May 31.

What is called the American Revolution was but the first stage of the Revolution of the Americas. Within 50 years after 1776, the greater part of the Western hemisphere was free of European rule, and Texas had a stake in three of these revolutions.

The show is named "Texas and the American Revolution." Borrowers pay only freight charges to and from the Institute.

The exhibit consists of eight columns of silk-screened words and pictures. The tallest columns are nearly nine feet high; others are over six feet.

It was produced by the research and exhibits staff of the Institute, which is an educational research arm of The University of Texas at San Antonio. The show is a result of almost five years of planning, research, design, and fabrication.

Other traveling exhibitions available for loan from the Institute in San Antonio include "Texas and Her Constitutions," "Vaquero: Genesis of the Texas Cowboy," A Photographic Essay by William D. Wittliff, "Highlights of Our Spanish Heritage," and "Sam Houston Sampler."

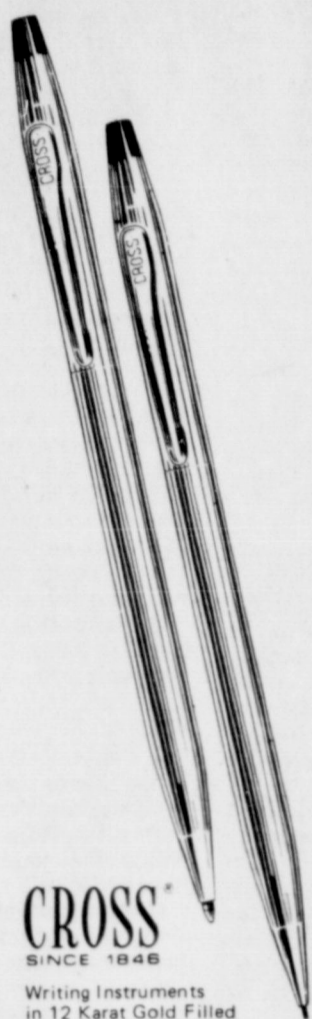

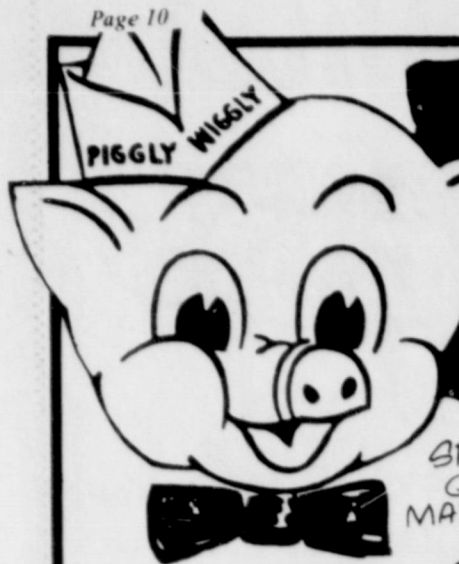

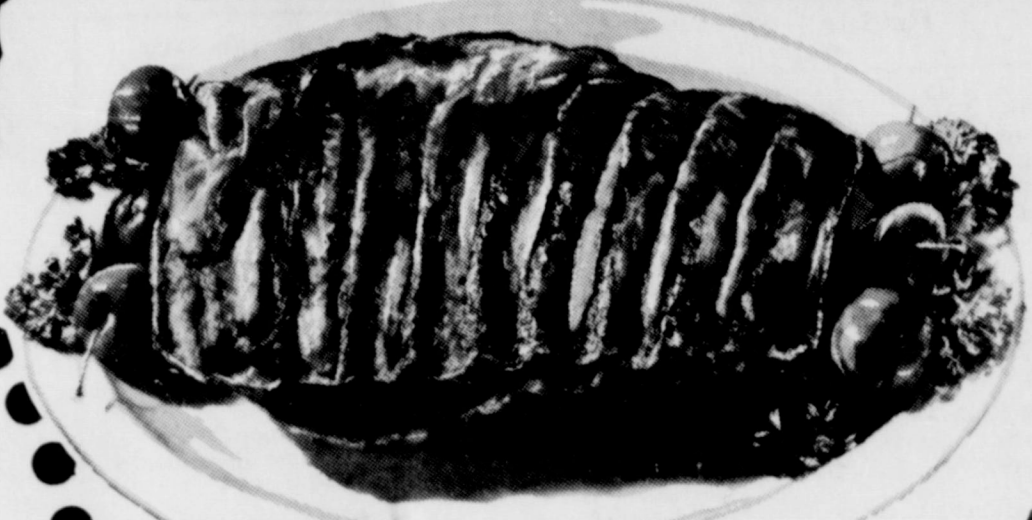
