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Study Suggests White Girls, Blacks May Equal White Boys In Mathematics

Chapel Hill -- The notion that white girls and black students of either sex can do as well as white boys in mathematics gained more support last week as an expert on testing released results of a study of almost 10,000 high school students across the United States.

White female and black high school seniors scored just as high as white male seniors on math examinations, the study showed, if they were equally skilled as sophomores and if they had taken the same number of math courses.

Dr. Lyle V. Jones of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, who conducted the study, said the research suggests that historical differences in mathematics test scores could be reduced further if not eliminated by encouraging girls and black males to study math.

"These results emphasize the importance of guiding all students in elementary and secondary schools, not just white males, to enroll in mathematics and science courses," he said.

Jones is the author of several widely publicized studies showing that black children are closing the gap between scores they make on standardized tests like the SAT and scores made by white children. At UNC, he is Alumni Distinguished professor of psychology and director of the L. L. Thurstone Psychometric Laboratory.

The new study, financed by the National Science Foundation and presented at a recent meeting of the American Educational Research Association, compared how 9,700 students who had taken achievement tests as sophomores during 1980 fared on similar tests as seniors in 1982.

The tests measured skills in computation, arithmetic reasoning, graph reading, elementary algebra and geometry and were part of High School and Beyond, a project of the National Center for Education Statistics.

As expected, Jones said, students who continued to take courses like advanced algebra and trigonometry in their final two years of high school scored significantly higher in 1982 than students who demonstrated equal ability in 1980, but stopped studying math.

Those who had taken math all the way through averaged 82 percent correct answers, while those transcripts showed no courses at the algebra I level or beyond averaged only 37 percent correct answers.

"There have been a number of

suggestions in the literature that males sonior perform better or learn more from mathematics than females do," Jones said. "Research continues to show that the average test scores of whites in math is higher than the average score for black students at the same grade level."

Whites did no better overall than blacks on the High School and Beyond tests and boys fared slightly better than girls. But

after controlling for advanced coursework and sophomore performance, the psychologist found that the score differences disappeared completely.

"The important changes in the changes in achievement appear to be the initial level of skill and the courses that the students took in high school," he said. "This suggests that by providing more equal learning opportunities from kindergarten and grade school

onward, we would approach equal performance."

Jones warned parents, teachers and guidance counselors not to prejudice any children against mathematics, regardless of what their own experiences with the subject were while growing up.

"Whether or not they choose to continue in higher education, students will find that understanding sufficient mathematics and science will

help them keep up with changes in our technological age," he said.

Philadelphia Bombing Must Be Condemned

In blasting Philadelphia Mayor Wilson Goode in last week's column for the bombing which killed eleven persons, including four children, and destroyed 61 homes in a middle-class Black neighborhood, I indicated that Black leaders had refrained from wholesale condemnation of Goode because they feared such criticism would make all Black mayors more vulnerable to racist attacks.

Certainly, we must not let our harsh criticism of Black mayors give the impression that we have not gained some benefits from their elections. First, the election of Black mayors has demonstrated that the potential for genuine unity and the desire for self-determination are alive, at least in the hearts of Blacks. Otherwise, we would not have turned out to vote in the overwhelming numbers required to elect them. Additionally, we have gained in managerial experience, contracts, jobs, self respect and respect for others. Furthermore, it is strategically true that increasing the quantity of Blacks in high office is the surest way to increase the quality of Black representation.

Nevertheless, these benefits are not sufficient for the price of silence in the face of what happened in Philadelphia. The progress we have made is endangered when any Black in high position has as his or her primary goal the intention of merely proving that he or she can run things as well as the white predecessor, because this usually means running pretty much as whites did and for the same selfish and insane purpose.

Many of you have experienced isolated regret, at one time or another, when some Black fellow workers was promoted on the job to a position previously held by a white and you were at first proud but later found yourself treated more unfairly by the Black than you had been by the white. And, in politics, surely we have often helped a Black get elected over a white, only to discover that the smooth-talking Black was a stone cold once in office.

We can no longer tolerate such betrayals, because they are so destructive of the Black revolutionary spirit and self confidence that caused the promotion or election in the first place -- a spirit and confidence that must remain alive and grow if we are to discourage even more Blacks in high positions from betraying us.

When we determine that we have been fundamentally betrayed, we must not remain silent nor simply become disgusted. We must promptly, publicly and effectively challenge the Judas goat. Otherwise, President Reagan and other powerful, reactionary whites will be tempted to appoint more Clarence Pendergasts to frustrate and dishearten us.

However, in challenging our own, let us do so with the understanding that a Black traitor is only an agent of white racism, just as the Uncle Toms during American slavery were mere servants of their white masters -- and that our main enemy is always the white principals more than their Black agents.

Finally, let us remember that the only acceptable replacement for a bad Black is not a good white but a good Black, one dedicated by philosophy and through deeds to the winning of our liberation.

Increased Supply Of DPT Vaccine Allows Return To Normal Immunization Schedule

The temporary recommendation to postpone children's final two doses of the diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DPT) vaccine has been lifted. The delayed immunization schedule was recommended earlier this year by the Texas Department of Health because of a nationwide shortage of the vaccine. Supplies of the DPT vaccine dwindled after controversy and legal disputes over the safety of the pertussis vaccine. However, Connaught Laboratories resumed full-scale distribution of the vaccine in late April. Lederle Laboratories also manufactures the DPT vaccine.

Dr. Anthony Way, Health Director of the City of Lubbock Health Department, said that supplies of DPT vaccine are now plentiful enough to vaccinate all children according to the normal immunization schedule recommended by the Committee of Infectious Diseases of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Texas Department of Health, and the Immunization Practices Advisory Committee of the U. S. Public Health Service. Normally,

the vaccine is administered in five doses at the following ages: 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, 18 months, and 4 to 6 years. Many physicians and clinics have been postponing the fourth (18 months) and fifth (4 to 6 years) booster doses. "Immunization providers should resume the complete DPT schedule," Dr. Way said. "Children who missed the fourth or fifth booster should return to their physician or clinic for these injections," he added.

Children who received their immunizations at the Lubbock Health Department whose fourth or fifth booster doses were delayed because of the shortages are being contacted by letter to their parent or guardian. These children should be brought to the Health Department during immunization clinic hours as

soon as possible. Wanda Vaughn, R. N., Immunization Clinic Charge nurse, stated that immunizations are given between 1:00 and 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, from 10:00 a.m. to 12 noon on Wednesdays only, and during an evening clinic Thursdays, from 4:00 until 6:30 p.m. "Children entering kindergarten or first grade in the fall must have their immunizations completed before being admitted," Mrs. Vaughn noted. She urged parents to take their children to their physician or the Health Department early in the summer, and not to wait just before school open in the fall. Parents or children who receive their immunizations at the Health Department who have questions about their child's immunization status may call Mrs. Vaughn at

State Rep. Givens Says He's "Satisfied"

State Representative Ron D. Givens, District 83, returned back in Lubbock last week at the end of the 69th Legislature, and said he is "satisfied" with the accomplishments of his first session in the Texas House.

"We had a big hurdle to overcome early due to my being both black and Republican," Givens said. "I am convinced, though, my colleagues on both sides of the aisle grew to respect my stand for the people of our district."

Givens, the first black Republican to serve in the Texas Legislature since the late 1880's, authored four bills and six resolutions. Additionally, Givens co-sponsored a number of other measures including a resolution supporting President Reagan's strategic defense initiative.

Among Givens' four substantive bills, two are

awaiting Governor White's signature, while two failed to win approval in the tough House public Education Committee.

"I passed two good bills that will help the citizens of West Texas directly," Givens said. "I am proud of the fact that city officials asked me to carry a bill to expand the jurisdiction of Lubbock's city courts. And, of course, we were able to get it passed," continued Givens.

Givens' other measure, H. B. 1037, will assist juvenile court officials statewide by making it less time consuming and less costly to enter enforcement orders on unacknowledged court ordered subpoenas.

There Is A Way A.O.I.P.!!!

Since we are still talking about the Assault On Illiteracy Program (A.O.I.P.), we feel it only proper to give our best wishes to all graduating high school and college seniors. Speaking of education, this writer saw two of our foremost educators recently, both principals with one retired while the other is still active, namely, Clarence Priestly and Roy Roberts. They were getting exercise in the community, and the unique thing was they reminded one of the kiddy favorites, Brother Roberts as Santa Claus while Brother Priestly, with his sweater, reminded one of Mr. Rogers from Mr. Rogers' neighborhood.

Now talking A.O.I.P.:

Local Chapter Steps:

The local level is where the real (and most fulfilling) work or action of A.O.I.P. must take place. Thus, presidents of local A.O.I.P.-participating organizations chapters play an essential role. (Local organization presidents play the same role.)

The Local President should take initial leadership by doing the following:

1. Making known to the entire local membership the details of the national affiliation; (if any) and the relationship the membership and local programs - tutorial and otherwise - have with A.O.I.P. at all levels. This importantly includes the need for their abiding fully by A.O.I.P.'s Creed For Justice And Equity which undergirds every community-building aspect of A.O.I.P.

2. Determining if any of the chapter's existing programs are involved in either tutorial-related/illiteracy-induced remediation, prevention, literacy enhancement efforts or non-tutorial, pre-literacy enablement and maintenance community-building programs. If so, they are to be maintained, expanded or broadened and included under the A.O.I.P. umbrella. They should begin as soon as possible to work interorganizationally on relevant projects with all other local A.O.I.P. (and other) community-building organizations.

3. Broadening the focus of whatever the chapter is doing in terms of illiteracy remediation. Included under the A.O.I.P. umbrella should be adults who have not been enabled by our educational system to either read or comprehend beyond the fourth (4th) grade level. Also, **The ADVANCER** is to be phased in as soon as possible for official and efficient compliance with A.O.I.P. For example, **The ADVANCER** should be phased into every tutorial program and in every Chapter I (Title I) Classroom as quickly as possible.

4. Allocating funding in each annual budget to provide adequately for effective program implementation. Also each local member should consider underwriting the cost of A.O.I.P. materials for one or more target students included in local projects. This amount to between 15¢ and 20¢ per week - approximately \$10.00 a year for each student.

Aside from a reasonable amount of administrative (non-salary) outlays, most of these monies raised by local organizations would be used for student materials. Chiefly, these are for reduced-price (or at cost) subscriptions to the local participating newspaper which:

- a. includes within its pages important ego-strengthening editorial matter needed in the remediation process by the students at all levels;
- b. carries **The ADVANCER**, the instructional tool to be used in all A.O.I.P. projects.

The "Who Am I Guide to Learning", also included in the paper periodically, should be used in working with total non-readers. Transfer and/or upgrading of the student(s) to **The ADVANCER** should be made as soon as the student(s) is ready.

5. Writing proposals and applying for grants to obtain funding which can be used to initiate and/or expand A.O.I.P. projects. Core should be taken in projects which use outside funds to develop them in a manner for ongoing maintenance and allowing for growth when these funds are no longer available.

6. Establishing A.O.I.P. Local Units in the community. This should be done by being responsive to working together with the Pan-Hellenic Council and/or any other affiliated groups (particularly block associations and the Chapter I/Title I parents) in the community-building purpose for such organizing. The focus here should be always on interorganizational networking, leadership and maximum participation. Officers, committee chairpersons and members should be involved on an interorganizationally-equitable basis.

"Program Being Eliminated"

Dear Editor:

Vocational/Technical education programs are being eliminated in Lubbock and across the state for the following reasons:

- low student enrollment
- shifts in priorities for state funding
- increased core course requirement for graduation due to House Bill 72
- lack of parental support

Although on the surface these reasons for closing programs appear to be well-founded there are many more significant reasons to retain the programs.

Historically, classes have filled in the fall, though spring enrollment seemed low. Students often do not make decisions to enroll until September. Most parents and students are unaware of the program availability.

Alternatives in education are necessary to meet the needs of both the academically gifted and the technically skilled students. Students in the 60's complained that they could graduate from High School with no marketable skills. With the elimination of these alternative programs we face these problems again.

Precisely funding of educational programs tends to be cyclical. We have spent a tremendous amount of money creating vocational/technical programs to meet the needs of our youth and communities. In five to ten years when the priorities shift again refunding of lost programs will be prohibitive.

Conscientious counseling in Junior High and High School can insure that all students will have opportunities to select vocational or other elective programs in spite of the increased core course requirements. Lubbock employers and consumers require a skilled technical work force. By eliminating technical training in High School we are removing a major source of trained technical personnel.

Many students from groups who demonstrate high drop out rates have graduated since 1950 because of the existence of vocational programs. Others have used their vocational skills to work their way through college. Greater job satisfaction, higher wages, and more responsibility characterize the secondary vocational graduate.

In Lubbock Independent School District the following programs have been closed:

Electrical Technology (Estacado High School)
Machine Shop Tech (Lubbock High)
Home Economics Coop. Ed (Dunbar) *1 Section
Industrial Coop Training (Dunbar) *1 Section
Marketing & Distributive Ed (Dunbar) *1 Section
Health Occupations (Dunbar) *1 Section
*DUNBAR-STRUGGS HIGH SCHOOL

These learning opportunities are no longer available to Lubbock youth.

Friday, May 31st, an "Administrative Council" of LISD decided to close yet another program - Building Construction Technology - at Lubbock High. This program prepares students by providing a "bread" basic background instruction in processes which will provide for future foremen and superintendents in the construction industry. Practical training and experience are provided in carpentry, cabinet-making, brick laying, painting, plumbing, electricity, heating and air conditioning.

Projects which have been completed by the various BCT classes include complete homes, room additions of 300 and 750 square feet; one of which included an above ground concrete storm shelter. Numerous concrete porches, patios, sidewalks and remodeling jobs are included in their accomplishments. Recently the class completed a playstructure at Hies Elementary School, 6 portable buildings, a bathroom addition and a master bedroom suite addition to a sixth Lubbock home.

The decision to close the BCT program has been made privately without School Board knowledge and without public knowledge of the impact of such a decision.

It is too late for the programs which have already been closed. The materials and equipment purchased at taxpayers expense have been sold or given away at much less than the replacement value. Today it is not too late to save the BCT program at Lubbock High.

No Social Security in Death

Reagan Pillages the Poor

Ella was, "warm, caring and friendly, treated everyone with the same kindness, compassion and honesty," correctly that's the way her obituary read. Pita had not written it yet; she was still on the telephone to the Social Security Administration in Chicago inquiring about any death benefits to cover the funeral expenses. I sat, silently, mumbling amidst my tears. To our horror, we learned Ella's death was too late for her to receive one dime for burial expenses because of "Ronald Reagan's social security changes," claimed the voice on the other end of the phone. Plus, since she died two weeks after her retirement, only the first monthly payment check could be kept, next month's check if received must be returned! "Don't you people blame us, it's not our doing, it's Reagan's program!" spined the speaker on the other end. They didn't want to know that Ella had worked three-fourths of her life paying social security taxes every day since she was seventeen. Since she was dead thirteen days after she stopped working under the changed President Ronald Reagan's social securities tax cut program, Ella was provided with only one month's pay. Pity the poor people who die without private life insurance depending on a cut-throat President Ronald Reagan's social security program.

Ella had family. "You are not forgotten, loved one - Nor will you ever be. As long as 'I' and memory last - We will remember thee. We miss you now, our hearts are sore - As times goes by, we'll miss you more. Your loving smile, your gentle face, No one can fill your vacant place." The trade union movement will miss Ella. She was a Union Steward, Chicago Joint Board RJSWU, Local 15, who read and practiced her favorite passage in the Bible, St. Luke, 10:25-28. "He said unto him, what is written in the law? How readest thou? And he answering said, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind; and THY NEIGHBOR AS THYSELF. And he said unto him, thou has answered right; this do and thou shalt live." The orchid still stings. Ella sings in the heart of all people she touched. She was friendly to everyone, exercising tolerance, tenderness and genuine affection.

It is possible that the President might die, but with his income of almost a half million dollars a year (\$400,000), social security death benefits are meaningless. The money, on the other hand, will be sorely missed by millions of poor people in this country. Considering the sadness of death in a family, why bring this up?

Because Ella was an honest person, and the President is not, Ronald Reagan stated very clearly if reflected he would not cut social security benefits. This is not true. To tell the truth, Ronald Reagan lies about a lot of things. It's just that I'm sensitive to the social security subject.

By now you may have guessed that Ella L. Belle was my mother. God rest her soul.

"SHAM"

Here is an interesting letter that I would like to share with you. My comments follow:
"Dear Dr. Faulkner:

My next door neighbor has been after my husband and me, for months, to get us to go to one of those meetings where people tell you about a business opportunity. A friend told me that these meetings are shams and try to use you. Should I go to the meeting? If so, what should I expect? Are they just big shams? Mrs. T, Detroit"

Dear Mrs. T:

Those "business opportunity" meetings are very popular. Many people have been invited to them at one time or another. They are based upon carefully planned and orchestrated principles of behavior manipulation. In other words, people are trained in procedures to maneuver you into attending one of the meetings. Once they get you there, the psychology of persuasion is put into effect to get you to buy or sell a product that you may not have even heard of. This is known as Programming Behavior which is defined as manipulating you into making a choice before you have the opportunity to think about it and make a decision based upon your own reasoning. Here's how it works:

1. You are invited by an acquaintance to come to dinner or a party where you will, "learn about a wonderful business opportunity in which you can make a lot of money in your spare time, and you can have your own business."

2. Because you are such a polite person, you do not want to turn down the invitation and embarrass the other person. After all, you already said that you would be free on that particular night. So, you keep your reservations to yourself.

3. When you and your spouse arrive, you notice that several other couples have also been invited to the meeting at which a superb business opportunity will be presented. After a friendly talk, you are escorted to the living room or recreation room where chairs have been arranged in rows. You are given a front row seat.

4. A well dressed stranger sets up an easel in the front of the room and begins to talk about the business opportunity. (You notice, also, that chairs have been placed in front of the exit. You can't leave. You are part of a captive audience).

5. The seminar begins and you soon become aware of the fact that you are being recruited as a salesman, or distributor of "the finest products on the market." The lecturer, a well-dressed, articulate individual has made thousands of dollars selling these same products and is offering you an opportunity to get rich.

6. The speaker draws many diagrams on the blackboard which shows you how to recruit others and have them working under your sponsorship - which you take in the bucks and all that you have to do is purchase a starter's kit for under \$100.00.

7. Others stand and testify about how selling these products have changed their lives, someone even recites a biblical passage, a loving couple tell how selling saved their marriage, a once-silly lady tells how she gained her self-confidence when she began to sell, another man tells how his retirement fund was improved as a result of selling. And the testimonials were on and on.

8. Finally, you are told the name of the product. Then, you realize that this is the company that was accused of using trickery to involve clients in a pyramid scheme that promises big bucks for those at the top, and small profits and long hours of hard work for people like yourself. As illogical as the promise of your getting rich is, you are becoming hooked into joining.

9. You have been exposed to a neat, slick brainwashing presentation called s.a.p.p.e.s. ("snapped"), better known as Solicitation And Promotional Practices in Entry level Discussion. You were not told the name of the organization because of the unfair, negative publicity directed against it. You are told that anyone who refuses to become a salesman is not a superior-quality person and is labeled a "chicken" of some other unattractive name.

Should you go to the meeting? Is it a "sham?" Only you can answer these questions, but you are more prepared to make a rational judgment now that you know what to expect. Some, few people, have made great sums of money in these organizations. Others, most people, have made little money and have nothing to show for their efforts but the starter's kit which they had to buy.

Cong. Leland Applauds Apartheid Legislation

Calling the Anti-Apartheid Act of 1985 "a significant first step towards the ultimate destruction of apartheid," Congressman Mickey Leland (D-Tx.), a co-sponsor of the legislation which was passed by the U.S. House of Representatives last week, explains that it sends a warning to the South African government. Leland, Chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus, said that "while this legislation (H. R. 1480) does not call for divestment of American interests in South Africa it is a clear message to the South African government that the American people will not stand for the continuation of apartheid."

The Anti-Apartheid Act of 1985 imposes four economic sanctions on South Africa. It prohibits all loans to the South African government and new investment in South African businesses. It also prohibits the importation into the United States of South African kruggerands and the export of U.S. computers to the

South African government. Congressman Leland warned that

the end of apartheid is inevitable and the measures such as H. R. 1480 will hasten a non-violent end to apartheid.

"It is only right, only moral, to fight racism in the world. I have fought racism here in America and I must fight racism in South

Africa," announced Leland. "South African blacks cannot even speak for their own rights; we must act for them."

Congressman Leland also supported the Dallums Substitute to H. R. 1480 which called for the total divestment of

U.S. interests in South Africa. During the debate, he passionately urged for the complete withdrawal of all U.S. assets from South Africa and prohibition of exportation of U.S. goods or technology to South Africa.

An Idea That Works

Imagine for a moment that you are a fifteen-year-old girl in your first year of high school. Many of your friends are already sexually active, and you are thinking about it, but you are confused about what to do.

There's no one for you to speak to about your problem. You are hesitant to turn to your family — you know they probably would not approve. You do not ask your friends because you are too embarrassed to admit you do not know the answers. You may have heard about birth control clinics, but they are located far from your neighborhood, and anyway you are afraid someone might see you go there.

You are right on the verge of becoming another teen pregnancy statistic.

But you luck out. In your high school is an all-purpose health clinic. One day, you happen to stop in to ask a question about nutrition, because you are on a diet to lose weight. You find a warm, receptive person who is willing to take the time to talk to you about your health. After a few visits, you work up the courage to raise your questions about sex and pregnancy. For the first time, you receive clear information about your choices, including abstinence and a range of other family planning options.

You are now on the way to becoming a sexually responsible teen. There are now school-based health clinics in about 30 schools around the country. Pioneered in 1973 by the Maternal and Infant Care Project in St. Paul, Minnesota, the results look promising.

For example, at St. Paul's Mechanic Arts High School, site of the first clinic, the teen fertility rate has dropped by 56 percent since 1976. Among those young women who do have babies, the drop-out rate declined from 45 percent in 1973 to 10 percent just three years later. The repeat pregnancy rate among mothers who stay in school is now less than two percent.

The people who run clinics like this one cite three main reasons they are so effective. First and most obvious, they are where the teenagers are — in the schools. Also, they attract a large number of students because of their wide range of health services: for example, many boys initially come in for athletic physicals, or to get treatment for acne, or other teen health problems. Finally, clinic staff are able to build trusting relationships with these youth that last throughout the high school years, and sometimes beyond.

This is an idea that deserves a far broader chance. Other organizations are now exploring the possibility of setting up some type of comprehensive clinic in more schools. Creative ideas like this deserve our support.

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NAACP To Return To Dallas June 23

New York — Once again the NAACP returns to Dallas, Texas to hold its annual convention. The convention will be held at the Dallas Convention Center at 530 Griffin Street from Sunday, June 23 through Thursday, June 27. More than 10,000 people are expected to attend this year's convention. When the NAACP first held its convention in Dallas in 1954, black Americans were celebrating the Association's landmark victory in the *Brown v. Board of Education* case in which the United States Supreme Court outlawed the "separate but equal" doctrine.

NAACP Executive Director Benjamin L. Hooks, who will deliver his address at a public mass meeting on Sunday, June 23 at 7 p.m., said that since the *Brown* decision, much has been accomplished in the area of civil rights, "but today we are faced with a concerted effort by the government to roll back those gains." Appropriately, the

I. THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION DECLARED.

A. The Freedom Of Salvation And God's Electing Grace.

Election is probably one of the most misunderstood doctrines of the Word of God. It has been misrepresented by its friends and foes. Many who fear this doctrine are afraid that it will exclude some from going to heaven and will be the cause of some going to hell. Election will cause no one to go to hell, but it will be the cause of all those who go to heaven.

Election means to choose, or pick out. It is used of (1) Christ being chosen of God; (2) of elect angels; and (3) of believing Jews and Gentiles. The word choose or chosen is sometimes translated from the same Greek word as elect or election.

All people should go to hell, and all would go if it were not for God's electing grace!!

1. The saved are called the elect. (a)-1 1 Thess. 1:4; (a)-2 Col. 3:12; (a)-4 Titus 1:1

2. God's foreknowledge and election. (a)-3 1 Pet. 1:2; (a)-5 Rom. 8:29-30. Some people have the mistaken notion that God only knows what will happen in the future, and then predestinate, or chooses to let it happen. This would destroy the meaning of election, and predestination. It should be obvious to all that God did predestinate something he foreknew, not something that He had no knowledge of at all. See Acts 2:23.

3. God's order in election seems to be foreknowledge, election (choosing), predestination, etc. Salvation is entirely of Grace and not because of something good that God saw in us. (a)-3 1 Pet. 1:2; (a)-5 Rom. 8:29-30; Eph. 1:4-14

4. God does the electing or choosing. John 15:16

B. The Freedom Of Salvation And The Invitation.

God's election does not restrict our preaching or our invitation to all sinners.

1. The heavy laden may come. (b)-1 Matt. 11:28
2. The thirsty may come. (b)-2 Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17
3. The poor, with nothing to pay may come. (b)-2 Isa. 55:1
4. Whosoever will may come. (b)-2 Rev. 22:17
5. All those who believe and call by faith, may come. Rom. 10:9-17. Read all of John 6:37.

C. The Freedom Of Salvation & The Call For Repentance And Faith.

We believe (a) in God's electing grace; (b) that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; (c) that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial, penitent and obedient faith; and (d) that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth but his own inborn depravity and voluntary rejection of the gospel; (e) which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

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BEANS AND RICE PERFECT PROTEIN

According to nutritionists, beans and rice together form a complete protein. Kidney beans, chick peas and rice make this delicious salad a healthy main dish. And with all the ingredients straight from the supermarket shelves, it is easy to make. Prepare the salad ahead, if you like, and marinate it till serving.

HERBED BEAN, CHICK PEA AND RICE SALAD

- 1 can (19 ounces) Progresso® red kidney beans, drained
- 1 can (19 ounces) Progresso® chick peas, drained
- 2 cups cooked rice, cooled
- 1 cup sliced dried roasted peppers
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
