

Talco Bank Reaches 70th Anniversary

Talco State Bank, which first opened its doors in 1912 with a capital of \$12,000 and some \$3,000 in deposits, is observing its 70th anniversary this month.

Today, the bank has some \$935,000 in capital and surpluses and more than \$9.1 million in deposits.

A history of the bank, published in the July 26, 1962 edition of the Talco Times, has been updated by bank president Jerry Jones and is republished as follows:

Talco State Bank opened for business in Goolsboro, which was about 2½ miles east of the present location on FM Road 71, on July 6, 1912 with a capital of \$12,000.

After nearly six months in that location it was moved to a frame building at the corner of Broad and Fourth Streets, in Talco in December, 1912, and to its present location in 1913. The building was remodeled and modern fixtures installed a few years ago, keeping in step with the bank's rapid growth the past decade.

Plans are now underway to build a new building on the block just east of the present site.

Lt. Governor's Son Visits Bogata Friday

Paul W. Hobby, son of Texas Lt. Governor and Mrs. Bill Hobby will visit the Bogata and Red River County area Friday on a campaign tour for his father.

Young Hobby is scheduled to visit at The Bogata News office about 2 p.m. Friday. Persons interested in meeting the lieutenant governor's son are invited to stop by The News office at that time.

Hobby, 21, says he plans to travel across this state this summer and fall, campaigning for his father's reelection bid.

A recent graduate of the University of Virginia, Hobbys says Texas will need the experience and leadership of Lt. Gov. Hobby to face the unparalleled growth that is expected to continue throughout the 1980's.

"The lieutenant governor sits at the head of the budgeting process and only his strong guidance can guarantee fiscal responsibility in state government," young Hobby says.

"That fiscal responsibility, however, has not made Bill Hobby unresponsive to the varied needs

within our state," he adds.

The younger Hobby says that education and highway reforms initiated by his father have readied Texas for the challenge of the years ahead. In addition, during his 10 years in office, Lt. Gov. Hobby has preserved and enhanced the state's capacity to attract investment that has spawned a rate of growth unparalleled in the nation, he says.

"Texas has maintained a fiscally sound state government throughout the 1970s in spite of experiencing some of the most explosive population growth in the nation," Hobby says.

With a background of experience in newspaper and broadcast media, Paul plans to explore work in other areas of communication, particularly media affairs. He will attend the University of Texas School of Law.

He was graduated from the University of Virginia in Charlottesville this spring with a Bachelor of Arts in history. He played linebacker on the university's varsity football team for three years and was president of Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity during his senior year.

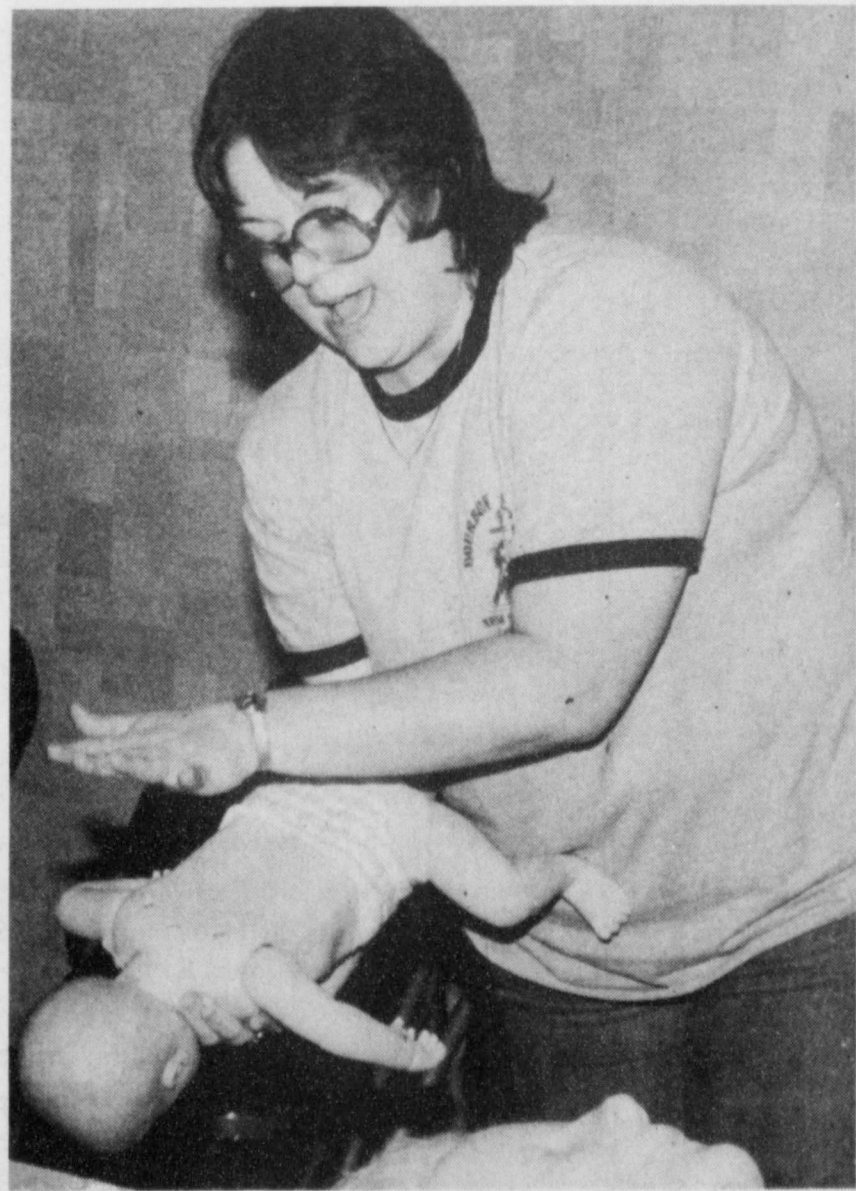
Cotton, which had not yet begun to suffer, will now hold blooms, squares and bolls.

No Hospital 'Discount' At Red River

"I don't believe
in that policy,"
says administrator

There are no rebates or discounts for hospitalized members of the Red River County Hospital Authority, the county commissioners court, or anyone else, the administrator of Red River General Hospital told The Bogata News Tuesday night.

"We do not have that policy at Red River General and we have not done that," Administrator Jonathan Godfrey said.

Godfrey was referring to a revealed policy in Franklin County where members of the Franklin County hospital board, county commissioners court, and their families have been paid more than \$13,000 in a "discount plan" since 1979.

The hospital would bill the patients' insurance company or Medicare for the normal charges, then actually charge the patients a reduced rate, as much as 50 percent below what was billed. The difference between the two charges was paid to the patients--hospital board members, county commissioners and-or their relatives.

"I don't believe in that procedure," Godfrey told The News, adding: "Nobody gets any discount or rebate at our hospital."

When contacted at his home Tuesday night, Godfrey said he was hoping someone would ask him about the Red River policy, in light of the Franklin County expose.

"I'm glad to be asked," he told The News.

Red River General Hospital is operated through a nine-member countywide Hospital Authority. Four of the Authority's board members are appointed by the county commissioners court, with the other five positions filled by the board members as a whole. Each board member is appointed for a two-year term.

The board members are chosen as representatives from nearly each area of Red River County. Dr. E.E. Brooks is the board member from the Bogata area.

The rebate or discount policy in Franklin County is now being investigated to determine if the "Kick-backs" were legal.

GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U Newspapers One Of Best Sources In Family Tree Search

How many people read a newspaper? In fact, because you are reading this, you have answered the question. Because of this wide circulation and the fact that newspapers report news, their records contain a vast source of genealogical information.

One source of this information can be found in the newspaper obituary column. Obituaries will list a lot of information on an individual. They will state their age or date of birth, their parents name (if known), their spouses name (if married), their children's name, any family members who survived the deceased and where they are buried (cemetery records). All this information will provide information that you can really use.

Another source of

genealogical information may be discovered within the newspaper itself. In the course of human events, many of our relatives were in the news. They may have been elected to a political office, became a minister, came back from the service or purchased land or a house, etc.

About the best way to locate information about relatives is also available through the newspaper. In this case you write a letter to the editor or letter to this column asking for information on a particular relative or family.

You write this letter so it can be published in the area where your relatives had lived at least 25 years. If you have been following these principals, your map should have several clusters of tacks. You are then going to

write these areas. The people who answer the queries will be very helpful in their information.

Many people who have been doing genealogical research notice there is a magical barrier about the year 1750. It becomes difficult to do research before 1750. Next week we will discuss our eighth genealogical principle-Pre-1750 research.

Sam Hall Urges Funds for Cooper Lake, Big Pine Dam

Rep. Sam B. Hall, Jr. of Marshall appeared as a witness before the House Subcommittee on Water Resources last week in support of a number of critical water projects in East Texas, including Cooper Lake in Delta County and Big Pine Dam in Red River County.

The subcommittee has authorized jurisdiction over all U.S. Army Corps of Engineers public works programs, including a number of facilities in East Texas. Former Fourth District Congressman Ray Roberts served as chairman of the House panel for a number of years. His replacement as chairman is cong. Bob Roe of New Jersey.

Congressman Hall asked Chairman Roe and other subcommittee members to

approve adequate authorized funding for existing Corps facilities such as Pat Mayse Lake, Sam Rayburn Dam, Wright Patman Dam and Ferrell's Bridge Dam-Lake O' the Pines.

In regard to the proposed Cooper Lake project, Hall reminded his colleagues that the Water Resources Subcommittee had first authorized it in 1955, but that environmental litigation had delayed construction since 1971.

Hall pointed out in his testimony that in recent weeks over 30,000 acres of prime farm land has been flooded with a loss in the millions of dollars along the Sulphur River. Adding that, according to the former Fort Worth Corps District Engineer, over 80 percent of the flood damage could have been avoided if Cooper Lake Dam had been in place.

Hall told subcommittee he was hopeful the Federal District Court environmental injunction against Cooper would soon be lifted.

"The Corps has requested \$1.5 million for construction and real estate for Cooper this year, and this amount would be sufficient for the time being and once, hopefully, the court injunction is lifted, we can ask for additional money," Hall said.

Another project that Hall asked the subcommittee to fund is Big Pine Dam, a multi-purpose lake in Red River County authorized by Congress in 1962.

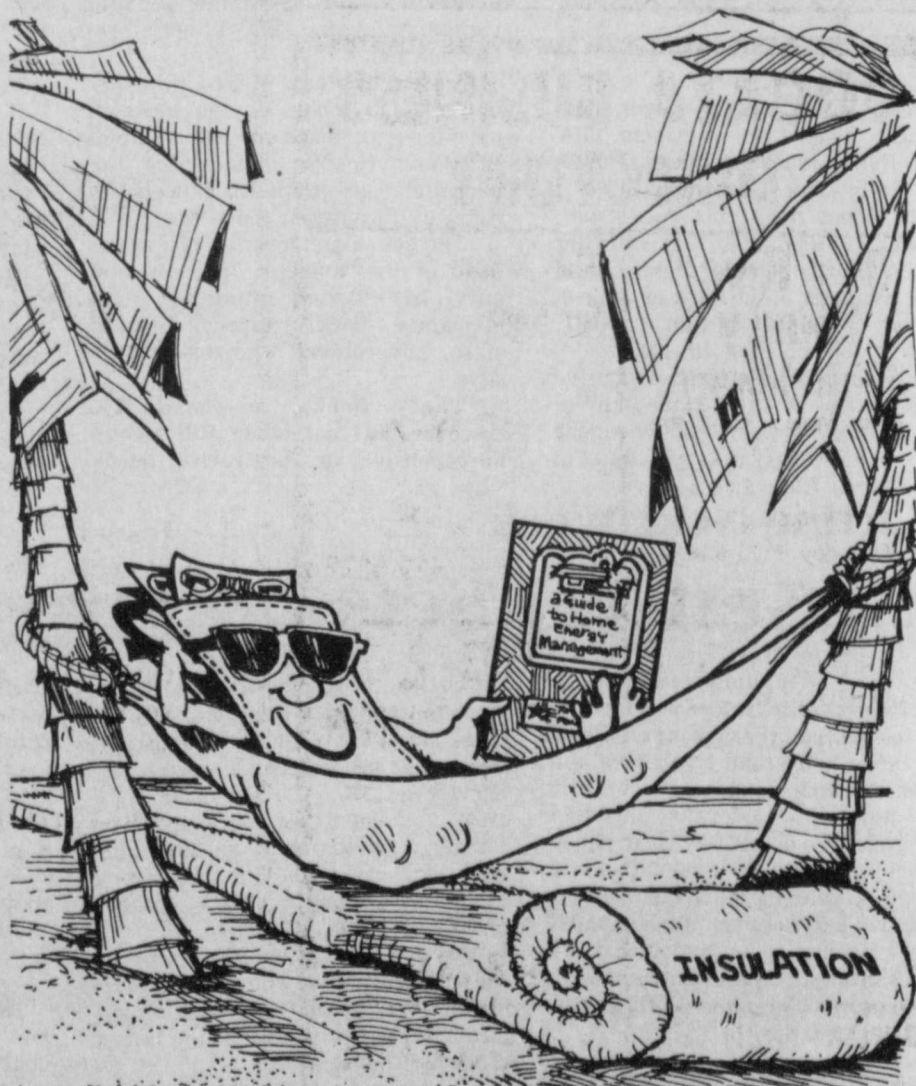
"Severe economic problems have left Big Pine without a sponsor, but about \$1.7 million has already been spent, and it would be a shame to see the project dropped after years of time, effort and money," Rep. Hall said.

Other projects receiving a boost from Hall included navigation of the Red River above Shreveport, Trinity River improvements, Arkansas-Red River Basins chloride control, Red River emergency bank protection, and the newly proposed Lake Ray Roberts.

Earlier this year, Hall

testified before the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Energy and Water Development in support of the East Texas projects. The Appropriations Subcommittee must actually fund the water programs after the authorization process.

District Foes Of The Rebs and Patriots

Last Week we reported that Texas Football Magazine, in its 1982 schoolboy football preview that is now on the newsstand, figures the Rivercrest Rebels are top favorites to repeat as champions in their Double-A district but that Prairiland could expect another season of woes in the

Patriots' Triple-A league. Here's the way Texas Football figures the other teams in each of the two districts:
DISTRICT 18-AA
MAUD's outlook is hardly muddy—not with 11 starters returning from a 7-1-2 edition. All-district RB Alex Henderson (5-10, 186, 4.6) will carry the offensive load,

aided and abetted by FB Clay Warrington and HB Eric Fannin (5-8, 188). Guard Eric Shaw is the keystone figure on the line, which also boasts tackles Vic Moss and James Sutton and center Rodney Gauntt. Transfer Scott English and converted end Mark Sanders are the major QB candidates. LB Danny Autrey, SE Randy Braley and tackle Andy Foster are others who could contribute strongly.

The new backfield at NEW DIANA may mean a better season than last year's 6-4 mark. RBs Wyclone Brown and Jerry Hakill figure to join QB Mark Helms in that backfield. Tackle Mitchell Jones is a two-way threat while center James Mullens, guard Billy Rogers and TE Richard Fields are adept linemen. FL Skipper Carnes, tackle Donald Nicholson, LB Steve Ford and safety Lee Elmore are other key performers.

Fred Long has the numbers to help BIG SANDY improve its numbers, which included a 4-6 mark last fall. Long (6-0, 175, 4.6) made 35 catches for 450 yards and six TDs at TE and made 105 tackles, recovered 5 fumbles and picked off 6 passes in the

secondary. Shayne Burgin intercepted 4 more aerials. QB Ira Boylson is a talented leader, and the middle of the line returns intact—center Lyle Kniffen and guards Donald Killian and James Eakin. Stephen Hitt is an aptly-named DT. Robert Fitzgerald and Stan Carter are other good tackle candidates.

JAMES BOWIE now has the knife pointed the other way after a stinging 3-7 season. TB Scott Granberry is the primary rushing hope while FB Choyce Bostian and WB Steve Minter also will do their part. Billy Bell is a solid tackle and Toney Ramon doubles nicely at guard and LB. Minter is also a quality DE.

An accent on experience should help REDWATER wash away the memories of a 1-9 campaign. LB David Grable (6-0, 180, 4.9) is labeled a tremendous tackler while HB Travis McRae's 4.8 speed makes him the speed merchant in the backfield. Brad Garner handles both center and DE and plays both well. FB Bobby McCarty is another two-way player, as is tackle James Bryant (230). Steve Cain and Jerry Steed fill out the offensive line while Marc Thompkin and Tony Lewis are sterling DBs. TE Robert Lorraine, QB Dan Daily, end Kevin Dean and tackle Gene Stotts are marked for key roles, too.

ORE CITY expects to strike paydirt this fall behind the strong arm of junior QB Mark Motley (6-2, 190, 4.7). As a freshman, Motley hit 109 of 179 passes for 1,565 yards, and completed 79 of 166 as a sophomore for 1,035 yards and 11 touchdowns. "I feel Mark will possibly throw for 2,000 yards as a junior," says coach Lacy Hogue, noting Motley's growth of three inches and 35 pounds in two years. TE R.L. Goen (6-3, 205) provides a big target and blocks well. Senior tackles Kelly Tanner (220) and Mike Disheroon (220) figure to set a fast pace up front. FB Bob Tyler (6-2, 185), TB Cedric Black and guard John Walters are other key offensive returnees. Linemen Charlie Garcia (210), Darryl Rockwell (210) and Chris Barnett are solid defenders, and John Parker, Mark Howard and Mike and Chris Oliver handle offensive duties well.

COMO-PICKTON expects 6 offensive veterans and 4 returnees on defense to produce a winning season after last year's 4-6 finish. QB Gene Matison returns to engineer the offense, with FB Shannon York and WR Ronnie Fikes fueling the running and passing attacks. Upfront protection comes courtesy of guards Jim Lawson and Jesse Brown and tackle Alan Screws. Lineman Shawn Coyle and back Zackery Wright also should find ways to contribute.

additional quality and weight.

Cattlemen and hay producers were particularly glad for the moisture, since pastures were already beginning to show signs of stress and overgrazing, and hay harvest for the second cutting should yield well.

The impact on insects is somewhat indecisive at present, although the rains should decrease hatching of grasshopper eggs, which are particularly susceptible to fungus during wet weather. Other insects, such as boll worms and boll weavils, may become more of a problem.

The rains were somewhat unexpected, since only scattered thunder storms had been forecast, and no wide, over-all band of rain had been predicted.

The fact that the T-storms formed and produced moisture during the early hours of the morning was a

further unexpected development, since meteorologists say that formation of such clouds are rare during July and August due to the cooling of the earth preventing their formation.

Unpredicted or not, it would be difficult to find anyone who resented the advent of the rains, which should help the area's economy by boosting agricultural yields substantially.

HOSPITAL--

hospital board established a policy in 1974 under which board members, their wives and their children were given a 50 percent discount for hospital services. The policy was restated just last year, extending the benefits to county commissioners and their families, but reducing the amount of rebate to 25 percent.

One Franklin County hospital board member spent 11 days in the hospital in 1979, resulting in a total bill of

\$1,170.30. Medicare paid \$974.30. The member ended up "making" nearly \$400 on the illness.

The hospital gave the 50 percent discount to the entire bill, reducing it to \$585.15, meaning a profit of \$389.15 once the Medicare payment arrived. A check for that amount was mailed to the board member.

At least one insurance company has indicated it may sue the Franklin County hospital in an effort to "recover" the amounts paid to public officials and their families above the discounted bills.

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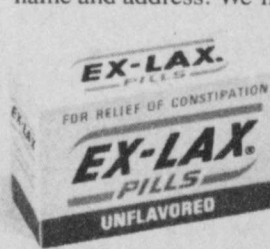
