Perot poll reflects distrust of Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) - Americans favor the line-item veto, constitutional balanced-budget amendment and restrictions on lobbying as ways of reforming government, according to a poll commissioned by Ross Perot.

The poll, whose results were released Wednesday, was ordered after Perot's 30-minute television program Sunday night. The Texas billionaire asked viewers to send in ballots responding to 17 questions relating to government ethics and budget reform. Given the way those questions were asked, there was little doubt the results would be to Perot's liking.

To respond to criticism that the questions were unfairly worded, Perot and his grassroots group, United We Stand America, commissioned a poll

from pollster Gordon Black. Black told reporters Wednesday that he restructured Perot's questions to remove any bias and make them appropriate for a scientific national public opinion survey. The poll, which has a 2.5 percent margin of error overall, was a random sample of 1,733 Americans conducted by telephone Sunday night and Monday night.

"What that poll shows is a tremendous amount of support from the public at large for these issues," said Clayton Mulford, general counsel to United We Stand America. "And we wonder why that support isn't being translated into public policy."

Black said the poll's results indicate "a growing distrust of

everything that comes out of Washington."

Perot had been expected to discuss the findings at a Washington news conference, but was delayed on Capitol Hill where he testified against the proposed free trade agreement with Mexico.

Among the poll's findings:
 -52 percent of the respondents favored spending cuts as a way of achieving deficit reduction, instead of tax increases. Only 5 percent wanted to emphasize tax increases. Thirty-nine percent said they would favor a mixture of spending cuts and

tax increases.
 -60 percent said the deficit is a very important issue, while 17 percent called it the single most important issue of all.

-71 percent favored a constitutional balanced-budget amendment.

-61 percent recommended giving the president the line-item veto.

-53 percent have little or no confidence that Congress and the White House will deliver an effective deficit reduction plan. Nine percent were "very confident" an effective package would be achieved.

-90 percent overall of respondents favor the idea of Congress taking a 10 percent pay cut until the deficit is

reduced. Eighty-nine percent favor cutting perks and special privileges for lawmakers until the deficit is eliminated.

Respondents also were questioned about Perot's television program, with 86 percent saying he should continue to sponsor programs like the one on Sunday night, which cost him some \$500,000 to air.

Mulford and Black also said 20 percent of the respondents said they plan to join United We Stand America.

Black and members of Perot's grassroots organization met with House Speaker Tom Foley and Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell to inform them of the poll's results.

Clinton budget nears OK; jobs bill is close behind

WASHINGTON (AP) - With his budget heading toward final approval, President Clinton predicts similar success for his jobs bill despite opposition from Senate Republicans and some conservative Democrats.

"We've plainly got the votes to pass it as is, or with very minor modifications," Clinton said Wednesday night in a television interview.

Although Republicans could use Senate rules to block the \$16.3 billion spending bill, he said "in the end we will pass it" because "the public would just be outraged at the thought that we have a chance here to create a half a million new jobs ... and that it would be slowed up."

Clinton made his comments on the CBS News program "48 Hours" as the Senate worked late into the night in its effort to finish Clinton's budget by midday today. The jobs bill, part of what Clinton contends is an inseparable package, was up next.

The new president's budget would steer federal fiscal policy away from the supply-side influence of a dozen years of Republican administration.

It would raise taxes, cut Pentagon spending and make select increases in domestic programs beginning in fiscal 1994, which begins Oct. 1. In both the Senate version and the one passed by the House last week, federal deficits would be reduced over the next five years by a total of about \$500 billion.

The budget emerged unscathed Wednesday from its toughest challenge, a Republican amendment which would have stripped away a proposal to raise taxes on higher-income Social Security recipients.

The Senate on Wednesday defeated 52-47 the amendment

offered by Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss., to remove the Social Security increase after Democratic leaders called on senators to rally around Clinton.

Vice President Al Gore presided over the Senate for the close vote, to add pressure and cast the deciding ballot in the event of a tie.

"This is an effort to slow down the momentum that's gathering for the president in the country," said Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine.

Currently, retirees must count half of their Social Security benefits as taxable income if they earn more than \$25,000 a year, or \$32,000 a year for couples.

Clinton has proposed making 85 percent subject to taxation, a change that would raise an estimated \$32 billion over the next five years. The

higher tax would affect a little less than a fourth of Social Security recipients, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

After Clinton's budget was protected, the Democrats voted themselves a little political protection - a non-binding resolution saying they would try to find another way besides the Social Security tax to raise the money.

The chamber also voted, 55-44, to kill an attempt by Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, at eliminating new taxes and spending boosts that Clinton wants. It then defeated, 57-42, an alternative budget-cutting plan offered by Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., and Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M. It would have eliminated Clinton's tax and spending increases and replaced them with deep reductions in social programs.

Shamrock firemen arrested for arsons

SHAMROCK, Texas (AP) - Five members of the Shamrock Volunteer Fire Department have been indicted on charges in connection with a series of grass fires in Wheeler County, authorities say.

Volunteer fireman Barry Sanders said Wednesday that the arrests that followed a yearlong investigation was a blow to the department's morale and left many of the volunteers in shock.

"It feels like somebody slapped you in the face," Sanders said of the arrests. "It still hasn't soaked in. You don't want to believe it."

Fire Chief Randy Tallant said the arrests have left the department trying to "pick up the pieces and go on as a department."

"It's a shocker," he said. "When something like this happens, it kind of hurts your feelings. I'm taking this kind of personal anyway."

Authorities arrested the volunteer firemen on Monday night.

They were volunteers Gene Kirkland, 21, Brian Kirkland, 18, Tommy Kidd, 23, Bradley Todd, 21, and Fire Marshal Harold Kidd, 30.

Two men who were not officially connected with the department also were arrested: Willie Stowe, 20, and Mike Walden, 18.

Harold Kidd, Tommy Kidd and Todd have been released from the Wheeler County jail after posting bond. The others remain in custody in lieu of \$5,000 bond, officials said Wednesday.

Authorities said they have no motive for the setting of the 65 to 80 suspicious fires they are investigating.

Monte Cornett, assistant chief of the Shamrock Police Department, said officials do not know any motive for the fires.

There may be more arrests in the case in the next few days, Cornett said.

Firefighter Sanders said firemen were aware that the grass fires involved arson.

"We knew the fires were being set," he said. "They were set to burn against the wind, and they were set where they wouldn't hurt anything. But we didn't know who or why."

Sanders said some members of the department believed "one or two" firemen might be arrested in connection with the case.

"But not five," he said. "That kind of knocks your feet out from under you. It really blows the whole department."

It will "take a while" for the department's image to recover, even if the firefighters are found innocent of the charges, Sanders said.

Showdown looms between Russian leader, parliament

MOSCOW (AP) - Boris Yeltsin's opponents in the parliament refused today to veer from a path that could lead to the president's ouster.

Pro-Yeltsin lawmakers asked their colleagues to think again, but the smaller standing legislature, the Supreme Soviet, voted down a proposal to reconsider the highly charged issue.

A presidential aide called the confrontation "very dangerous."

"The only way out is a compromise ... between the president and the parliament," said Minister of Information Mikhail Fedotov. "Not just the president and the speaker, but the president and the parliament."

But no sign of a compromise appeared today. Lawmakers also refused to discuss a message Yeltsin sent to the legislature Wednesday night, warning

that the confrontation could destabilize the country.

Some hard-line lawmakers even said they would try to invoke an article of the constitution that would allow them to oust Yeltsin on a simple majority vote instead of two-thirds.

The fierce arguments in Moscow reverberated across Russia. Cossacks pledged allegiance to Yeltsin and offered to form a presidential guard. Siberian coal miners threatened a strike in support of the president.

The power struggle between Yeltsin and the Communist-dominated Congress had been brewing for months. It erupted into all-out war after the president declared emergency rule on Saturday and called an April 25 referendum to ask Russians who they trust to govern, him or the

parliament.

The next day, the standing Supreme Soviet legislature launched the process of trying to remove Yeltsin by asking the Constitutional Court to rule whether he acted legally.

The court ruled Tuesday that Yeltsin had violated the Soviet-era constitution by assuming excessive powers and proposing a referendum on replacing the Congress with a bicameral legislature.

Jobless claims drop last week

WASHINGTON (AP) - The number of Americans filing first-time claims for jobless benefits dropped by 2,000 during the third week in March for the third straight decline, the government said today.

The Labor Department said new applications for unemployment insurance during the week ended March 20 totaled 349,000, down from 351,000 a week earlier and 361,000 during the week ended March 6.

It was the lowest level of claims since 349,000 were filed during the week ended Feb. 13.

The four-week moving average of new jobless claims, which many analysts consider a more reliable measure of employment trends because it smooths out the volatility of the weekly numbers, also fell during the latest reporting period.

It totaled 359,250 during the period ended March 20, down from 359,750 a week earlier and the lowest since 353,250 were filed during the period ended March 6.

1940s farm life depicted in movie

Members of the Bay View Study Club met in the Deaf Smith County Library Heritage Room recently to continue their study on "Discovery: Art, Artists and Artifacts."

Ruth Newsom gave a video presentation of a colored home movie taken from 1941-52 in Hereford. The movie showed life on a farm owned by Guy and Ethel Newsom and their children, Carrol, Wayne, John and Jane. It was located six miles east of Hereford.

The film began with the showing of an early irrigation well, farming as it was done in those years using a 1940 Oliver tractor equipped with steel wheels, a Graham plow (then later a Farmal tractor), and a 1943 Dodge pickup.

A bumper wheat crop was grown in Deaf Smith County in 1942 and pictured were the combine of that vintage and the trucks hauling wheat to the elevators showing scenes of Packard Milling and Pitman Grain Co. elevators. The film also showed potato crops being harvested, with the prisoners of war helping, and onion crops being harvested with the help of Braceros in sombreros.

The home movie also depicted scenes of grazing, horn-branded registered Hereford Whiteface cattle

and hogs penned in an alfalfa field.

Birthday parties for the farm children were shown with many of the guests recognizable to members of the club. Street scenes of Hereford were also viewed, as well as parades and two local weddings.

Newsom's home movie further showed an "interlude near Umbarger" exhibiting water skiing and picnic facilities at Buffalo Lake which was filled with water in 1940.

It was suggested to Newsom the possibility of editing this film for use in the community as part of the Bay View project of establishing historical videos for Deaf Smith County.

The hostess, Helen Langley, used decorations featuring a St. Patrick's Day theme. The meeting's setting included green and gold foil streamers, shamrocks, silver stars and leprechauns in silver sacks placed on sheets of purple foil.

Honesty best policy

Honesty has always been celebrated as a great virtue, but telling the unvarnished truth to your friends can sometimes be difficult.

"I know I shouldn't lie," says one anxious teen, "but what should I do when the truth will really hurt someone?"

The New Era put this question to its readers and their responses are printed in the March, 1993 issue of this magazine for teens published by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

Most respondents said it was best to tell the truth, but many advised tempering the truth with kindness and tact.

"Telling the truth is always the best thing to do," says 15-year-old Matt. "But in cases where the truth will hurt someone, use caution and be extremely sensitive to their feelings."

Melody, age 12, says, "If someone asks you if you like their shirt, but you really hate it, find a color or design that you like on it and compliment them on that. If it's something much more serious, try to think of what would be best for that person...and go with your feelings."

The world appreciates an honest

person. Employers place a great deal of confidence in their employees and value those who live up to that trust. Friends also enjoy being with someone who is always truthful and kind. Not telling the truth can ruin a friendship.

"I was in a situation where someone lied to me about something to protect my feelings," says 18-year-old Brandi. "When I finally did find out the truth, I cried and cried. I wished that I would have been told sooner. I was angry and hurt. Now I have problems trusting the person who lied to me."

Sometimes people excuse deliberate cruelty by saying, "But it's the truth." Just because something is technically true doesn't always make it right to talk about.

For instance, gossip may be accurate, but passing along details when you are not personally affected is both unkind and unnecessary. And broadcasting the particulars of someone's private business is never in good taste.

But sometimes the truth, even if it is hurtful, needs to be said so changes can take place. When your friends need to know some things in order to change their lives for the better, talk to them privately using sensitivity and consideration.

"We shouldn't lie," advises Victor, age 20, "but when telling the truth hurts someone, we should show empathy and let him understand that we care and want to help."

"...when my friends are going to be hurt by the truth, I try to cheer them up by giving them a vote of confidence," says 14-year-old Annie. "I tell them the good things about themselves, too."

After all, if you can't count on your friends to tell it like it is, who else is there?

Sixteen-year-old Ryan sums it up this way: "There is nothing better in the world than an honest friend."

All of Hereford High School's sports teams jump back into action this weekend after some took part of Spring Break off.

The varsity baseball team will go to Levelland Friday for a 4:30 p.m. game, then come back to Whiteface Field to host Palo Duro at 1 Saturday.

Everyone else leaves Hereford to find meets and tournaments: the tennis team will go to Borger for a tournament Friday and Saturday; the boys' track team will run in the San Angelo Relays Friday and Saturday; and the girls' track team will compete in the Lubbock Invitational on Saturday only.

ChiSox stick by Bo

Bo is back, Fernando is close, and Bert is getting a little shaky for Hereford.

Bo Jackson, the first All-Star in two sports, is now set to become the first pro athlete to play with an artificial hip. The Chicago White Sox exercised the option on Jackson's 1993 contract and assured him of making the 25-man roster.

Jackson, released by the Kansas City Royals when orthopedic surgeons said he would never play any sport again, attempted a comeback late in 1991 with the White Sox when he batted .225 with three home runs and 14 RBIs.

Unable to walk without a painful limp - let alone run - Jackson last spring decided on surgery and was fitted with an artificial hip of metal and plastic.

Then came the rigors of another comeback under the guidance of White Sox trainer Herm Schneider. It was climaxed by Wednesday's decision.

"I have never doubted myself, my confidence has always been there," Jackson said.

Valenzuela also appeared finished a short time ago. It doesn't look that way anymore.

The left-hander extended his scoreless innings streak to 12, facing the minimum six Cincinnati batters in two innings in the Baltimore Orioles' 4-2 victory Wednesday.

Valenzuela, trying to be the Orioles' fifth starter, has allowed five

hits, four walks and no runs in four appearances this spring. He is scheduled to pitch again Saturday.

Valenzuela, 32, signed by the Orioles to a minor-league contract in February, last pitched in the majors in 1991 with the California Angels.

"I think this is great for me," he said. "I never had a good spring training; I've always been hit pretty good. But I'm surprised that I'm doing pretty good."

Valenzuela is battling Mark Williams and Anthony Telford for the job as the Orioles' fifth starter. That would mean he would also be expected to be used in relief, a prospect that does not alarm him.

"I just want to help the team win. I don't care what I do," Valenzuela said. "I just want to pitch in the major leagues again."

Blyleven, trying to make a comeback with the Minnesota Twins, had his third straight rough outing on Wednesday.

The 41-year-old right-hander allowed seven hits and five runs in 5 2-3 innings against the White Sox. Blyleven, who has a 6.27 ERA, walked three and struck out six.

Jackson was hitting .372 with nine RBIs in 14 spring-training games. He leads the team in hits, RBIs and total bases.

"I have never doubted myself," Jackson said. "I didn't expect the kind of spring I've had. I didn't think I'd be running balls down, starting and stopping and getting from home to first in 4.3 seconds."

Vikings ink McMahon; Raiders sign Hostetler

PALM DESERT, Calif. (AP) - The quarterbacks are starting to fall in place in the free agent sweepstakes - Jim McMahon to Minnesota and Jeff Hostetler to the Raiders.

The hunt for the big prize, Reggie White, is getting more complicated.

McMahon moved from the backup spot in Philadelphia to a tentative starting job in Minnesota on Thursday - depending, of course, on his often undependable health. Soon afterward, Hostetler signed with the Raiders after being bid farewell by the New York Giants, who elected to end their quarterback duel by staying with Phil Simms.

But as the NFL meetings ended, a new entry surfaced in the chase for White: the San Francisco 49ers, who were freed from the restrictions placed on them as one of last year's final four when they declined to match an offer by Atlanta for defensive end Pierce Holt.

"We're prepared to offer the maximum for him," 49ers president Carmen Policy said after meeting with White's agent, Jimmy Sexton.

That maximum is \$14.4 million over four years - about \$1.6 million

less than what the New York Jets, Green Bay Packers and Cleveland Browns are prepared to offer.

That's because under the rules set down in the complicated new system, the Niners can pay White only Holt's first-year salary of \$2.7 million, adding on \$600,000 raises in each of the next three seasons.

All this was part of the dealing that turned the normally staid football meetings into something akin to baseball as the first year of free agency made player deals transcendent and pushed minor rules changes and housekeeping into the background.

The other big name who jumped into the equation was Rocket Ismail, who has spent the last two years with the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League. Bob Woolf, his agent, met with Al Davis of the Raiders, who own his rights, about coming back to the NFL and described the talks as "productive."

"Reggie White is the domino that's screening the rest of the player dealings throughout the league," said Leigh Steinberg.

NCAA: Indiana takes on Louisville

Week 2 of the NCAA tournament gets underway with two favorites, two longshots, two perennials and two ACC teams battling for two spots in the Final Four.

The teams playing in the other two regions can be grouped almost the same way - just replace the ACC duo with a pair from the SEC.

With 48 of the original 64 teams back at school worrying about midterms, the remaining 16 can be slotted pretty easily.

The No. 1 seeds - Kentucky, Indiana, Michigan and North Carolina - all are trying to maintain the regular-season level that showed them to be the class of college basketball.

The longshots - Western Kentucky, California, George Washington and Temple - are talent-laden and have shown themselves capable of beating better teams. Questions remain whether they can play their best in prime time with the whole country watching.

The perennials - Louisville, Kansas, Cincinnati and Virginia - all have been to the Final Four in the past 10 years.

MIDWEST

St. Louis

Indiana vs. Louisville

Indiana (30-3) is coming off a scare against Xavier in the second round, while Louisville (22-8) beat Oklahoma State by 15 points after a slow start.

The compelling angle in this game is the matchup between two coaches who are among the top 10 in victories or winning percentage among active coaches. Strangely enough, Bobby Knight and Denny Crum have never coached against each other in an NCAA tournament game.

Injuries are still a key question for Indiana. Pat Graham broke his foot in the preseason NIT and came back for only the last eight games. Alan Henderson sprained his knee in practice and played a total of 15 minutes in the top-seeded Hoosiers' first two tournament games.

The Cardinals, after starting the year 2-4, are now on an eight-game winning streak that includes the Metro Conference tournament championship.

California vs. Kansas

Anyone who didn't get a chance to see Jason Kidd's heroics against Duke and LSU should consider themselves fortunate to get another opportunity to see the most exciting

freshman in the country.

The Cal point guard matches up tonight against Adonis Jordan, who was a sophomore when Kansas (27-6) made it to the championship game and lost to Duke two years ago. That experience should be a factor, since Cal (21-8) hasn't reached the final 16 since 1960.

The Golden Bears have won 11 of 12 games since 29-year-old Todd Bozeman took over as coach. He has spent this week telling his players they can't get too nervous or excited about the game.

SOUTHEAST

Charlotte, N.C.

Florida State vs. Western Kentucky

These teams match up almost perfectly, except for experience against tough competition. Florida State (24-9) plays in the Atlantic Coast Conference; Western Kentucky toils in the Sun Belt Conference.

Both teams are loaded with talent and get balanced scoring from their starters.

"With the other teams we have played, there has been one player which we could key on to try and stop the opponent's attack," WKU coach Ralph Willard said. "But Florida

State is very well balanced and has a potent offense. We must play good team defense."

The Seminoles also know that defense will be the key, so coach Pat Kennedy put the offense through five-on-seven drills this week to get ready for the pressure the Hilltoppers will exert.

Kentucky vs. Wake Forest

It's hard to find a team playing better than Kentucky (28-3). The Wildcats won their first two tournament games by 44 and 21 points and won their three Southeastern Conference tournament games by 61, 11 and 17.

Still, coach Rick Pitino is worried about the bump-and-bruise, in-your-face style of the Demon Deacons (21-8).

"If you want to cut, they don't let you cut. They hold you off with their forearms - and their forearms are very big," he said. "They body you quite a bit. They're very aggressive inside."

The marquee matchup is at power forward, where two future high draft choices - Jamal Mashburn and Rodney Rogers - will square off. The 6-foot-8, 240-pound Mashburn was the player of the year in the SEC, and the 6-7, 235-pound Rogers won the same award in the ACC.

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Lakers don't even put up fight against Suns

In 24 hours, the Phoenix Suns went from the roughest night of the season to one of the easiest.

Just ask Los Angeles Lakers coach Randy Pfund.

"We don't have the toughness night after night to beat any of the top teams in the league," Pfund said after the Suns beat his team 120-105 Wednesday night. "We're much too soft."

Charles Barkley, who had 33 points and 12 rebounds for Phoenix, almost sounded embarrassed that he wasn't among the 21 players fined for their part in Tuesday night's brawl with the New York Knicks.

"I don't look at myself as a peacemaker," he said. "I look at myself as an intimidator. Intimidation is important in this sport and I can intimidate as well as anybody else in this league."

The Suns were playing without Kevin Johnson, who was suspended

for two games for starting the brawl by ramming into the Knicks' Doc Rivers.

The Lakers, despite being in solid position to get in the playoffs again, continue to struggle. They set a franchise record, including their years in Minneapolis, with their fifth straight loss at home.

The Suns are 4-0 against the Lakers this season, including two victories at the Forum, where the Suns previously lost 17 straight.

James Worthy and Sedale Threatt led Los Angeles with 16 points each.

Danny Ainge, ejected and fined \$7,500 for the fight, came off the bench with 27 points for Phoenix.

"Once the game started, we didn't think about last night," Ainge said. "It didn't seem like it bothered anybody."

Phoenix coach Paul Westphal said the team didn't dedicate the game to Johnson, but his presence was felt.

"We think Kevin was an unjustly persecuted brother. He had to take the fall for some reason," Westphal said. "We'd like to play with him, but we can win without him."

Phoenix broke the game open in the third quarter, with Chambers and Oliver Miller scoring five points each in a 17-10 run that gave the Suns an 87-75 lead going into the final period.

Clippers 116, Bucks 105

Los Angeles handed Milwaukee its 17th consecutive road loss against Pacific Division teams behind 27 points from Danny Manning and 22 by Ken Norman.

Eric Murdock scored 20 points for the Bucks, who have dropped four straight on the road and seven of nine altogether.

Mavericks 101, Bullets 98

Dallas won for the second time in 33 road games this season as Jim Jackson scored nine of his

season-high 27 points during a 14-2 third-quarter spurt against Washington.

The Mavericks improved their overall record 7-59 with their third victory in five games - two on the road - greatly improving their chances of avoiding the NBA's worst record, 9-73 by Philadelphia in 1972-73.

Celtics 115, Heat 109

Boston returned home from a perfect four-game road trip with a victory over Miami as Reggie Lewis had 22 points and 12 assists.

The Celtics fell behind by five points early in the fourth quarter before Dee Brown's jumper with 6:32 remaining put Boston ahead for good

at 97-96, the 26th lead change of the game.

Bulls 113, 76ers 100

Chicago won at Philadelphia for its fifth consecutive victory as Michael Jordan scored 19 of his 43 points on 9-for-10 shooting in the third period.

Scottie Pippen had 18 points, 10 rebounds and eight assists as the Bulls won for the ninth time in 11 road games despite losing coach Phil Jackson with two technical fouls 27 seconds into the game.

Nets 118, Hornets 116

New Jersey won for the sixth straight time at home, holding Charlotte

scoreless in the final 2:13.

Derrick Coleman had 35 points and 14 rebounds and Rumeal Robinson 28 points and 12 assists for the Nets, playing without their leading scorer, Drazen Petrovic, out with a knee injury.

Spurs 105, Timberwolves 92

David Robinson had 29 points, 11 rebounds and seven assists in San Antonio's win at Minnesota, which spoiled Sidney Lowe's official debut as head coach.

Lowe, who took over for the fired Jimmy Rodgers on Jan. 11, was awarded a three-year contract Wednesday, although the Timberwolves now have lost five straight games and 10 of 11.

NBA levies record fines

NEW YORK (AP) - New York and Phoenix paid for their fight during Tuesday night's game when the NBA fined a record 21 players and the teams a total of \$160,500.

Knicks guard Greg Anthony, who came off the bench in street clothes and punched Phoenix's Kevin Johnson, was fined \$20,500 and suspended without pay for at least five games. Johnson was fined \$15,000 and suspended for two games without pay and Knicks guard Doc Rivers was fined \$10,000 and suspended for two games without pay. The Knicks were fined \$50,000 and the Suns \$25,000.

Injured Jerrod Mustaf of Phoenix was fined \$10,500, while Danny Ainge of the Suns and John Starks and Anthony Mason of the Knicks were fined \$7,500 each. Fourteen players were fined \$500 each for leaving the bench area.

Providence redeems Big East

BOSTON (AP) - Pittsburgh is long gone from the NCAA tournament. So are Seton Hall and St. John's. Providence, left out of the big postseason event, is two wins away from the consolation prize - an NIT championship.

In an off-year in the Big East, the Friars and Georgetown, the only conference teams still playing, both are still alive in the NIT.

Providence stayed that way by outbounding and outshooting Boston College. Wednesday night's 73-58 win proved that three strikes and you're out, even in basketball.

Boston College was 0-3 this season against the Friars (20-11) and ended its season at 18-13. Providence is 3-0 in the NIT and faces Minnesota in the semifinals Monday night in New York.

The Gophers beat Southern Cal 76-58 Wednesday night. Also, it was Alabama-Birmingham 61, Southwest Missouri State 52. Tonight, Miami, Ohio is at Georgetown.

"The feeling is to go there and to finish up the job we've started," said Dickey Simpkins, who led Providence with 23 points, matching his career high.

They worked hard on the boards and capitalized on their size advantage for a 45-23 rebounding advantage. Their 21 offensive rebounds were just two more than the Eagles' total.

That's to be expected if you have

four starters 6-foot-7 or taller, like Providence does, and your opponent has three starters 6-4 or shorter, like Boston College.

"Their strength, combined with our weakness, makes for a lopsided game," Eagles coach Jim O'Brien said.

Michael Smith's 18 rebounds led Providence, and the 6-8 Simpkins added nine. Bill Curley, Boston College's 6-9 center, had just five rebounds and 12 points, four below his team leading average.

The Friars scored the first eight points, four each by Simpkins and Franklin Western, and the last eight of the first half to take a 31-22 lead.

They led by at least nine the rest of the way. Gerrod Abram's 3-pointer closed the gap to 56-45 with 6:31 remaining. But Simpkins and Smith sank two free throws each for a 15-point lead.

Boston College never threatened again.

The Eagles sank just 39.6 percent of their shots after making 59.7 percent in a 101-68 second-round win Monday night over Rice.

Boston's three-guard offense of Abram, Malcolm Huckaby and Howard Easley made 11 of 35 shots after hitting 15 of 27 against Rice.

Abram and Huckaby led Boston College with 14 points each. Tony Turner added 14 for Providence, which had five scorers in double figures.

Minnesota 75, Southern Cal 58

A stingy defense and a surly home crowd got Minnesota past Southern Cal (18-12). The Gophers held Southern Cal to 32 percent shooting from the floor, including 25.9 percent in the second half, before a raucous crowd of 15,393.

The game was tight until the last minute of the first half, when Voshon Lenard, who finished with 25 points, ignited a decisive 18-7 run.

Alabama-Birmingham 61, SW Missouri State 52

Robert Shannon led the Blazers (20-13) with 18 points despite the lingering effects of the flu. Southwest Missouri State (20-11) started off quickly in the second half, going up 35-30 with an 8-2 run. The Blazers responded with four straight baskets and went ahead for good on Clarence Thrash's layup with 8:12 remaining.

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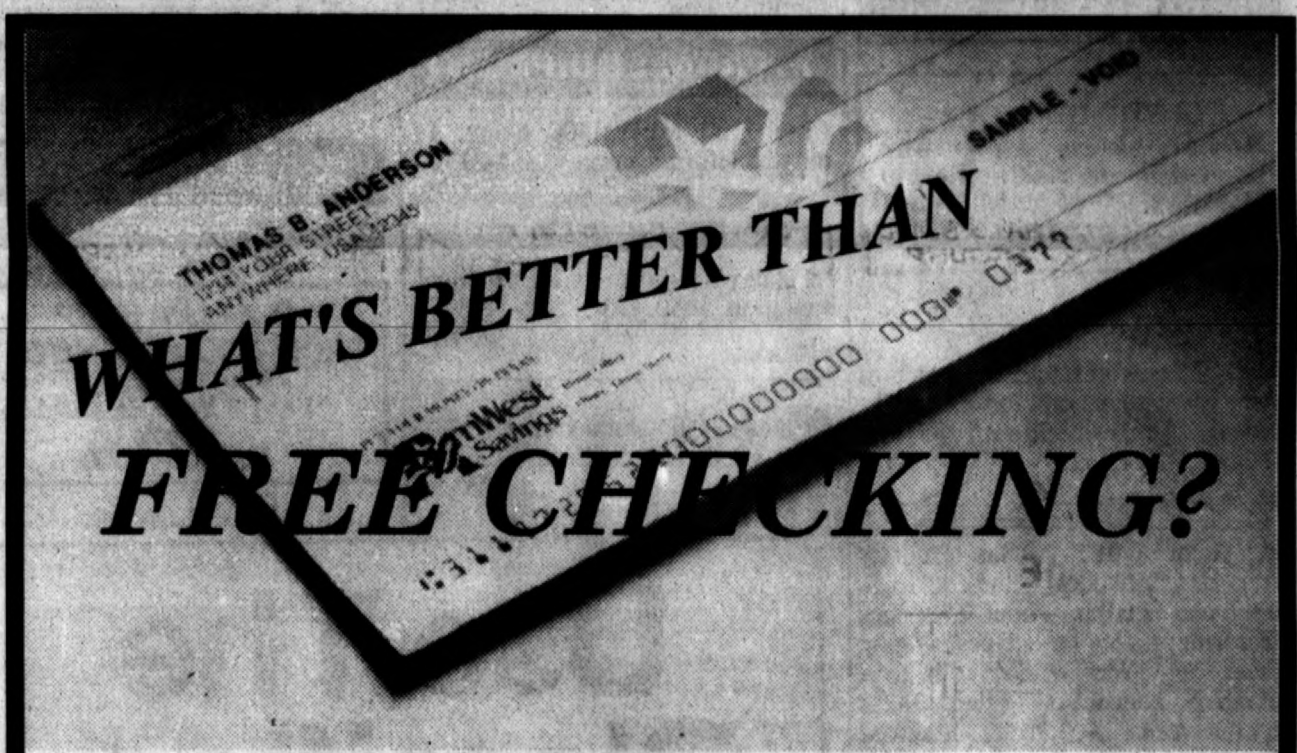
Children's program this weekend

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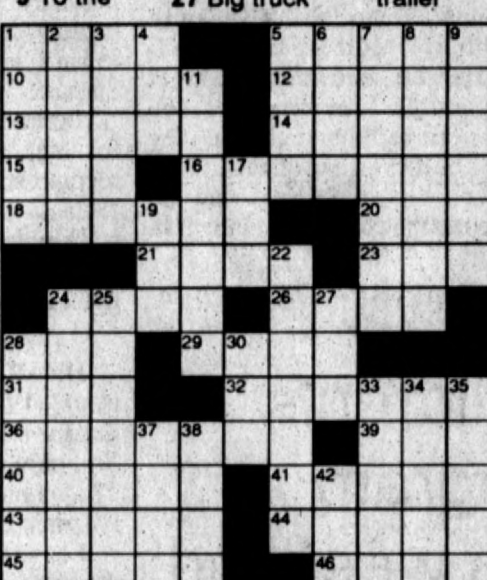

MONEY TALK

Q. We moved recently and misplaced the W-2 tax statements we need to prepare our 1992 federal tax forms. I know I won't be able to get everything together to file by the April 15 deadline. What should we do?

A. If you believe you will not meet the deadline you should obtain Form 4868, which allows you to file for an automatic extension. This form is available in all IRS walk-in offices or you may contact the Internal Revenue Service at 1-800-829-1040 and request that an extension form be mailed to you.

Everyone filing Form 4868 is granted a four month extension to complete their tax forms. However, IRS rules state that these completed tax documents must be received by their office no later than August 16. If your envelope arrives after that date, even if it is postmarked August

16, it will be considered late.

In the event that you cannot find your W-2 statements call your employer(s) and ask that a duplicate form be sent to you. The IRS suggests that you enclose a stamped, self-addressed envelope to expedite the process. If, for any reason, you are experiencing difficulties receiving your W-2 statements the IRS will send a letter to your employer on your behalf requesting this information. Sometimes a letter from the IRS can substantially speed-up the process.

Filing an extension form, however, does not excuse you from paying any money you may owe by the April 15 deadline. If you believe you will owe the government money, you must pay the amount you expect to owe by the April 15 deadline. When you prepare Form 4868 you must complete the work sheet detailing the amount of money you earned and taxes paid.

Send your check or money order, made payable to the IRS, with the extension form. If you fail to remit the amount you owe, regardless of whether you have filed an extension form, you will be assessed penalties and interest. These penalties increase substantially with each subse-

quent month and are applied to the total amount for which you are liable.

Q. We received a refund on our adjustable-rate-mortgage last year after finding that we had been over-charged for several years. Our lender tells us that we will owe taxes on this refund. Is this true?

A. Your lender is correct. If you deducted this mortgage interest in the year in which you paid it, then the refund of this excess interest is considered taxable income. Regardless of whether you take this refund in cash or apply it to your existing mortgage, you must report it on this year's federal income tax return.

In order to document this refund, you will need to complete and attach Schedule B to your federal income tax return. This interest income should also be included on line 22 of your 1040 form.

However, if you did not claim a mortgage interest deduction in prior years, you don't need to do anything. If you have any questions or need additional information contact the Internal Revenue Service directly at 1-800-629-1040.

Millions spent keeping callers on hold with SS toll-free line

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government spends \$11.5 million a year putting callers to its Social Security toll-free hot line on hold, an internal audit found.

But people who dial their local Social Security offices may not even get through. A separate study by the congressional General Accounting Office says nearly 56 percent of callers get a busy signal or no answer at all.

The Democratic staff of the House Ways and Means Committee suggested today that the troubles callers face when they ring the Social Security Administration are a consequence of deep cuts in the agency's work force under Republican Presidents Reagan and Bush.

Applicants for disability benefits are now waiting three months instead of two for a decision on their claims, a staff report said, while the agency is reviewing far fewer disability recipients to determine whether they have recovered enough to leave the rolls.

The Social Security Administration estimates that the Social Security trust funds will lose \$1.4 billion by the end of 1997 through unnecessary payments to beneficiaries who may have recovered, the report said.

Advocates say other Americans have suffered ill health or even died waiting for the agency to grant them disability benefits. At the end of 1992, more than 725,000 claims were waiting to be processed.

"Justice delayed is quite literally justice denied when a taxpayer dies before his or her disability claim is so much as looked at," said Rep. Andy Jacobs, D-Ind., chairman of the Ways and Means subcommittee on Social Security.

Jacobs' panel scheduled a hearing today on the cutbacks and President Clinton's plans to spend \$302 million this year to reduce the backlog of disability claims and to buy basic computers for Social Security field offices.

Social Security's work force was trimmed from 80,000 to 63,000 between 1984 and 1990. The agency also sought to economize by disconnecting local phone lines and installing a toll-free, nationwide hot

line on Oct. 1, 1989.

But complaints about busy signals and inaccurate information prompted Congress to pass legislation the following year requiring the agency to restore public telephone access to its 1,300 local offices.

"SSA responded by relisting local office telephone numbers in local directories but did not reinstall the incoming telephone lines that would have enabled the public to reach these offices readily," the Ways and Means staff report said.

As a consequence, callers are still not connecting with their local Social Security office. The GAO reported last year that 55.7 percent of calls to local Social Security offices did not get through.

The Ways and Means report said an internal audit by the Social Security Administration found that the cost of putting callers to the toll-free number on hold was \$11.5 million for time charges in 1991 - a full 30 percent of the agency's 800-number costs.

Fifth suspect arrested in Trade Center blast

NEW YORK (AP) - The FBI arrested a fifth suspect in the World Trade Center bombing today, hours after a former cab driver investigators say was the guiding hand in the attack was flown back from Egypt to stand trial.

Bilal Alkai, 27, of New York City turned himself in at the FBI's Newark, N.J., office Wednesday night, FBI spokesman Jim Lamb said. Lamb said Alkai would probably be charged with aiding and abetting the Feb. 26 bombing.

Earlier Wednesday, 33-year-old Mahmood Abouhalima was jailed in New York after being whisked into town from a suburban airport in a 12-car motorcade under the protection of federal agents with machine guns.

The former New York cabbie had been arrested by Egyptian authorities in a sweep of Muslim extremists and turned over to U.S. agents.

The Egyptian-born Abouhalima was "someone on the style of a consultant," an investigator speaking on condition of anonymity said.

Treat homes now to prevent fleas later

If you think applying flea powders or dips to your pet will be enough to control fleas at your home, experts say think again.

"One of the things that people need to understand is that to control fleas on the pet, you can't do it just by controlling the fleas on the pet," said Dr. David Chester, a Texas A&M veterinarian.

"You need total environmental control, which includes treating the pet, the indoor environment if an animal is indoors, and the outdoor environment."

Flea season is almost upon us. The tiny insects will begin popping up by early April, so exterminators and veterinarians say early to mid-March is the best time to apply insecticides to your yard and home to prevent a flea problem from developing.

"It's so critical to apply insecticides in anticipation of flea problems rather than wait until you have adult fleas emerging from cocoons in your home or in your yard, because by then, there's not much you can do about them," said Dr. Roger Meola, a Texas Agricultural Experiment Station urban entomologist and flea expert.

Although it's the biting adult flea that's probably the biggest nuisance, it's the cocoon stage, where the larva transforms into an adult, that causes the most flea control problems. Meola said few insecticides can penetrate are effective against these fleas.

Veterinarians and pest control operators usually suggest applying insect growth-regulating chemicals that

prevent larvae from transforming into adults through cocooning, in combination with an insecticide that kills the adult fleas.

"The trick is to use these insect growth regulators early enough in the season that you prevent fleas from getting a foothold in the home," Meola said, "and once you stop reproduction of the fleas, then you no longer have the potential of a flea problem developing in your home during the summer months."

Ideal homes for fleas in the yard that should be treated with chemicals are moist, shaded areas, such as under shrubs or porches. Flea larvae do not drink water, but take it directly from the air. Therefore, they need a humid climate to absorb water from the air.

Inside, fleas primarily reside where your pet rests. A female flea can produce 20 to 30 eggs a day and feeds on her host almost continuously.

"You've got to have flea eggs falling from your pet onto the carpet for your home to become infested with fleas," Meola said. "As long as you have flea-infested pets in the house, you're going to have flea problems develop. There's very little you can do about it, especially here in Texas where the humidity is so high and conditions are so conducive for flea development."

Chester said flea collars, powders and dips are effective for controlling fleas, but only for a limited period.

"Almost all the products sold do kill some fleas," he said, "but people believe the residual activity of the insecticide is much longer than it really is. A four-month flea collar does kill fleas for four months, but probably not adequately. A dip that says it has a residual for two weeks may kill fleas for two weeks, but not adequately."

Chester and Meola suggest, in addition to the growth regulators and adult flea-killing insecticides, to bathe your pet frequently and vacuum carpeting regularly to help control fleas.

Fleas, besides being a nuisance, can transmit several diseases and parasites, such as tapeworms, while feeding on their hosts' blood. Also, some pets and humans suffer allergic reactions from flea bites.

Chester adds that controlling flea populations cannot be a one-time endeavor; it has to be an ongoing process through the flea season, which stretches into fall.

"It's easy to kill fleas, but it's very difficult to get totally rid of them," he said. "It takes an intense effort on a regular basis. It's not something you do just once a year."

Exterminators can treat your home for fleas, but you can do it yourself with insecticides purchased from veterinarians, some pet stores or pest control operators.

But exercise care whenever chemicals are applied. The combination of certain insecticides could be harmful to humans or pets. Consult a professional pest control operator or your veterinarian for advice.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: You described my thyroid condition perfectly: weight loss and a big appetite. Then I drank the radioactive iodine when I was 18. I am 34 years old and have had three children. I'm 5 feet 7 inches, and my weight has fluctuated between 115 and 125 pounds for the past 15 years, except during my pregnancies. Since I have never gained weight after treatment, does this mean I have bypassed this problem? Or can I suddenly gain weight after 16 years? This means a lot to me because I could not stand it if I suddenly became obese.

I seem to be a very high-energy person and feel normal in all respects.

DEAR READER: I would never want to tell someone they would not gain weight because a person's body does program what you are supposed to weigh at different phases in your life. But I would think that if you do, it is not likely to be because of a low thyroid condition after all these years. And if that should happen, your doctor could give you thyroid hormone replacement to correct that problem.

Radioactive iodine therapy for an overactive thyroid gland is very effective. You may recall that is how former President Bush was treated when it was discovered that his atrial fibrillation was caused by an overactive thyroid.

Whether or not you will have a low thyroid condition afterward depends on how much of the thyroid gland is destroyed. In the course of time, usually within a few years, if too much thyroid gland was destroyed, a person may be hypothyroid. But that does not happen in all cases. The fact that you have not gained weight and that you are a high-energy person suggests that you still have normal thyroid function. There is the other possibility, too, that the amount of radioactive iodine does not destroy enough of the thyroid gland, possibly making a second treatment necessary.

Incidentally, radioactive iodine cannot be given during pregnancy because it may cross the placenta and destroy the baby's thyroid gland.

DEAR DR. LAMB: Your column on refrigerating foods related to a discussion we have had several times. I discovered at Christmas when I put a lot of very warm food in the refrigerator that I had soft ice cream and very warm milk. Remembering that water cools food faster than air, I chill my dishes in cold water, change the water a few times and add several ice cubes. You can cool food to refrigerator temperature this way in less than 20 minutes. With glass dishes, you have to start with warm water to avoid breaking them.

I triple-bag a turkey and submerge it with similar results. Now I can store food right away without getting the food in the refrigerator too warm.

DEAR READER: You are a genius. The reason it is recommended to refrigerate food right away rather than letting it cool is that the long cooling period allows food to be in a state when bacteria can multiply for too long a time. But if the food already in the refrigerator gets too warm, you defeat your purpose. I like your idea because it avoids allowing any of the food to be at a temperature to enhance bacterial growth and cause food poisoning.

DEAR DR. LAMB: Several years ago, you wrote a column about cluster headaches. I kept it a long time waiting for my husband's next round of these to begin. Now that the attacks have recurred, I have lost the article.

You mentioned some type of nasal spray that could be used. Our local physicians have not had much experience with this type of migraine and are relying on the old standby Cafergot. Most of these attacks begin during the night, and nothing will help them. He also has been on Calan, which seems to be something they are having good luck with for headaches, but not on the type my husband has.

Could you provide some information on this? As with most people who have this disorder, the continual violence of the attacks are taking a tremendous toll.

DEAR READER: Cluster headaches do occur in clusters — a series

of headaches that cause severe pain, often like an ice pick stuck behind the eye. Most of the attacks occur at night, but can occur in the day. They usually recur at the same time, either in the night or in the day. They are one of the most severe forms of headaches a person can have. At one time, they were thought to be a type of migraine, but no one knows for certain what causes them.

The spray you asked about was drops of a 4 percent solution of Xylometazoline, a topical anesthetic, instilled with a dropper well back into the nose, with the head tilted backward so the drops will reach high into the nasal passages. It has helped in some cases, but is not the answer in others. I am sending you Special Report 85, Headache and Facial Pain, for more details on this method of treatment. Sumatriptan (Imitrex), a new drug, has been reported to provide great success in Europe in treating migraine headaches and in the treatment of acute attacks of cluster headaches. It is claimed that about half of the patients who received an injection were pain-free within 15 minutes.

Ergotamine (Cafergot) is useful in preventing attacks. The medicine is given regularly on a daily basis until no more headaches have occurred for at least two weeks. Calan and other calcium channel blocker medications are useful.
