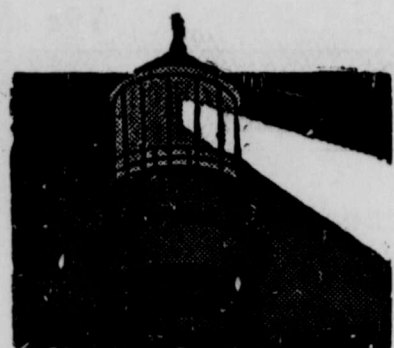

## USDA Announces Additional Details of 1970 Cotton Program

The U. S. Department of Agriculture, on Oct. 31, announced 1970-crop upland cotton price-support loan and payment rates.

The national average price-support loan rate or Middling 1-inch cotton at average location has been set at 20.25 cents per pound for the 1970 crop. Price-support loans available to program cooperators for different individual qualities will be based on the Middling 1-inch rate. This is the same rate as that applicable to the 1969 crop.

The price-support payment rate to program cooperators has been established at 16.80 cents per pound. This payment is in addition to the price-support loan. It is the amount necessary in addition to the loan to provide producers at least 65 percent of the total farm allotment. The 1970 rate compares to a 1969 program price-support rate of 14.73 cents per pound.

Today's announcement, along with the previous determinations, gives cotton producers basic information on next year's program prior to a mail referendum Dec. 1-5, on 1970 crop cotton marketing quotas. In the referendum, at least two-thirds of the upland cotton growers voting must approve marketing quotas before the essential features of the program can go into effect. If more than one-third of the growers vote "no," the only cotton program will be price support at 50 percent of parity for growers who do not exceed their acreage allotment.

The 1970 loan rate was established under legal provisions calling for a level which will reflect - for Middling 1-inch upland cotton at average location in the United States - not in excess of 90 percent of the estimated average world price for the 1970-71 marketing year. The loan rate announced, Oct. 31 will continue "one-price" cotton, making it possible for U. S. cotton to move in either domestic or export channels without an export payment.

The carryover of upland cotton as of August 1, 1970, is expected to fall to the lowest level since 1953. In view of the small carryover, payments will not be offered in 1970 for diverting acreage from cotton. Special provisions for small farmers, however, will be continued.

Small farms, that is farms with allotments of 10 acres or less or with projected production from the allotment of 3,600 pounds or less, may plant the entire farm allotment and, in addition to the price-support payment on the domestic allotment, receive payment of 11.95 cents per pound on the projected yield of 35 percent of the farm allotment.

## TWO NEW BOOKS ADDED TO BAPTIST CHURCH LIBRARY

Two new books were added to the library at the First Baptist Church last week. "Marcia Schuyler," by Grave Livingston Hill, and "Keepers of the Faith" by Emilie Loring.

Setting of Marcia Schuyler is in the days of full skirts and poke bonnets, and one of Mrs. Hill's most delightful and beloved romances.

It did not seem to Marcia, only 17 though she was, that her beautiful sister Kate was acting quite as a young woman should who was going to be married in just few days. But then Kate had always been headlong and thoughtless, and how could she help but really love David, who was quiet and steady and strong? And all of a sudden the world turned upside down, for on her wedding eve, Kate eloped with a young lieutenant -- but read this fascinating book and find out the story of how Marcia, David and others in the story react to Kate's impulsive act.

In "Keeping of the Faith", Emilie Loring tells of the meeting of red-headed Nancy Barton and Captain Francois Bouvoir in the office of her boss in the Pentagon Building in Washington and at that meeting how sure she was that she had met him years before, but he denies ever having met her.

Major Bill Jerrold, famous Marine flying ace, is convinced that the Captain will bear

watching, and is detailed to investigate Bouvoir's activities, and what he learns and how it came about is disclosed in this story, told in the exciting way as only Miss Loring could tell.

"13th Apostle," by Richard A. Johns, is the fictionalized autobiography of the rabbi Saul of Tarsus, who becomes Paul, servant of Jesus Christ.

As Paul tells his own story, many experiences about which the scriptures are silent, come to life. The reader sees Saul at the trial and stoning of Stephen, his conversion on the road to Damascus, and his anguish when he realizes he had tortured the guiltless. Here is more than the inspiring story of Paul's Christian witness. It is an enriching background material to those who study the book of Acts.

In Norman Vincent Peale's story, "The Healing of Sorrow", Mr. Peale tells how to face the sorrow of bereavement. In the course of his ministry, Dr. Peale has helped thousands of people through the shattering experience of losing someone close. He has "walked the way of sorrow" personally and has written countless letters of sympathy and comfort. His booklets, articles and sermons have brought solace to men and women all over the world.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN —Prospects of whop-ping new tax bills may face Texans in 1971, 1973 and 1975 and a critical housing shortage within the next decade is like-ly.

Texas Research League heard the bad news at its 17th an-nual meeting here.

James W. McGrew, new Exe-cutive Director of the League and one of the state's top fiscal authorities, warned of the com-ing "decade of tax crisis" like that of 1960's.

McGrew sized up the 1971 tax bill as at least \$270 million and maybe as much as \$400 million. Furthermore, he predicted, a

bigger one will be in store two years later and one not quite so big in 1975.

Standby sales tax (now at four and a quarter per cent in many areas) may be near its "political limitation." Implica-tion was clear that new tax trails will have to be blazed.

Gov. Preston Smith said half of the state's 2,803,000 housing units are "inadequate or sub-standard." He requested the League to study the problem and come up with recommenda-tions as to the state's role in the housing field.

Housing shortage may reach "crisis proportions" in two

years, Smith told League mem-bers. Needs over the next de-cade, he forecast, will demand \$1.5 billion worth of construc-tion a year in Texas. Within the same period, he said, hous-ing will have to be found for 875,000 new Texas families, and slums and overcrowding must be eliminated.

Greatest prospect for solving problems of slums, contended the governor, lies in "effective programs of governments to as-sist slum residents in becom-ing home owners." Public hous-ing and rent supplements, he maintained, "tend to isolate, se-gregate and spotlight the poor, while providing no long-range changes in their situations."

Smith suggested a statewide building code may be needed and State Housing Authority may be helpful to coordinate efforts of the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Develop-ment with local governmental units.

BALLOT SPOTS PICKED — Proposed constitutional amend-ment to legalize the sale of liquor by the drink will be in the second spot on the Nov. 3, 1970, general election ballot.

Here's how drawings for other ballot places by Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. came out last week:

No. 1 - Provision of removal, censure or retirement of appel-late court judges and justices of the peace by a new Judicial Qualifications Commission.

No. 3 - Uniform methods for assessing farm, ranch and for-est lands on a capability to pro-duce basis.

No. 4 - Making the State Building Commission a three-member appointive agency.

No. 5 - Authorizing counties to issue road bonds up to a fourth of assessed valuation on vote of taxpayers.

No. 6 - Increasing value of homesteads exempt from forced sale.

No. 7 - Providing for consoli-dation of local government functions and interagency con-tracts for performance of gov-ernmental services.

DISAPPOINTING LEASE SALE — School Land Board got dis-appointing results from its seal-ed bid oil and gas lease sale on public school lands. High bids averaged only \$36 an acre, low-ered by the \$15.52 per acre aver-age of over 16,000 acres leased in El Paso County where there is no oil or gas production.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said the indications from Congress that the 27.5 per cent depletion allowance will be cut undoubtedly hampered bidding. Also, sales scheduled for Louis-iana and heavy spending on Alaskan leases cut the bids.

Of 770 tracts offered, only 184 drew bids. Total high bids were \$4,113,468.60.

COURTS SPEAK — Supreme Court split six to three in up-holding the constitutionality of the controversial Saturday-Sun-day closing laws. Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert wrote the dissenting opinion, contending that the statute prohibiting the sale of 46 items on consecutive days of weekends should be knocked out.

High Court granted a writ of error and agreed to hear oral arguments on December 10 on Hounton landowner's com-plaints that the YMCA should not be allowed to erect a build-ing in Houston's Post Oak Es-tates subdivision where lots are a minimum of three acres in size.

Supreme Court rejected the appeal of a Dallas man who claimed part interest in vast holdings of oil-businessman J. D. Wrather Jr.

Reversing an intermediate court and affirming a trial court, the state's top civil court held that neither party in a Gregg County accident case was entitled to damages.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed a 30-year sentence of black militant Lee Otis John-son of Houston, convicted of possession of marijuana after he gave a "cigarette" to an un-dercover police agent.

U. S. District Court in Tyler ruled that a teacher cannot be dismissed from a job because of political activity.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor Smith received a \$500,000 check representing the federal government's share of the purchase of a 1,950-acre Galveston State Park (formerly the Maco Stewart Ranch) with matching funds to come out of the \$75 million state park bond issue.

Dr. B. B. Vial Jr., veterinar-ian in charge of the screwworm eradication program in Texas, told the Animal Health Commis-sion that this year may set a record low in screwworm cases - 159 reported this year, against 9,268 reported last year.

Mrs. Lyndon Johnson has es-tablished a cash award of \$1,500 to go to the Texas Highway De-partment foreman who has con-tributed most to the aesthetic pleasure and recreational op-portunities for the motoring public; awards will be made in September, 1970, at the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park.

State Treasurer Jesse James reports that October cigarette stamp sales reached \$14,016,-948.76, partly due to the higher tax rate which went into effect October 1.

November 1 saw 324 private clubs and 964 taverns in 17 counties and 22 city govern-ments holding special late hours (2 a. m.) permits under the new law.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has urged the Federal Power Commission to establish "just" gas prices for wells in the Tex-as Gulf Coast and Hugoton-Anadarko Field in the Panhan-dle.

Governor's Criminal Justice Council has recommended ana- allocation of \$213,349 in federal funds (to be matched by state and local money) in Texas' con-tinued crime fight.

Texas Ranger Capt. Clint Peoples of Waco has been nam-ed first senior captain of Ran-gers, top post in that select law enforcement organization.

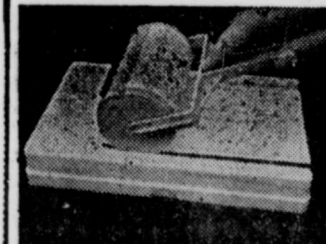

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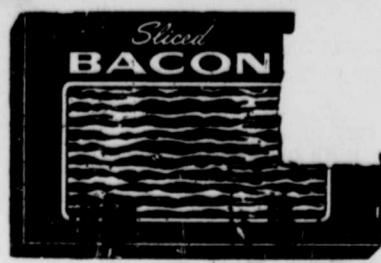
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
