## FLIERS WITHIN 20 HOURS OF RECORD

JACKSON AND O'BRIEN TO CONTINUE FOR SEVERAL DAYS

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 12.—The monoplane "Greater St. Louis," piloted by Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien, today soared nearer and nearer to a new record for endurance refueling flying.

As they approached the present record of nearly 554 hours, held by the Hunter, even their plane continued to function well—so well, in fact, that John Hunter, a visitor at Lambert-St. Louis field, said "it looks as though they have got it in the bag."

Up 532 Hours Today  
At 1:11 a. m. today (C.S.T.) Jackson and O'Brien had been circling over the field for 532 hours and had slightly less than 21 hours to go to equal the Hunter's record. Under endurance flying regulations, they must remain up an additional hour to break the record.

Although within sight of the record which they formerly held, Jackson and O'Brien had no intention of an early landing. They planned to remain in the air at least eight days beyond the present record. Jackson, speaking over the plane's radio transmitter, even talked of staying up three weeks more.

Receive Same Benefits  
The fliers received the first assurance of a financial return from their flight yesterday when an oil company announced it would give them \$100 for each hour they remain aloft over the old record. The offer will continue for 70 hours or until the fuel reaches \$700.

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## SEA OF MUD DESCENDS UPON HOMES, FARM LANDS, HIGHWAYS AND TOWNS IN UTAH AFTER HEAVY CLOUDBURSTS

(By Staff Correspondent.)  
SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Aug. 12.—Homes, farm lands and highways were beneath a sea of mud today, washed upon them when cloudbursts sent floods roaring out of canyons into sections of the Salt Lake valley yesterday.

At Bingham, site of the Utah Copper company mine, the flood swept down the town's long single street demolishing twenty homes, damaging many more and filling business houses with rocks and mud.

Centerville and Farmington, too, felt the full fury of the storm. Nearly a hundred farm residents were driven from their homes by torrents which rushed out of four canyons killing livestock, tearing down buildings and endangering the lives of fleeing farmers.

The disturbance started with cloudbursts at Phil, east of here, traveled to Bingham, and crossed the Great Salt Lake to Centerville and Farmington.

Additional damage was caused to highways and railroads in the Centerville-Farmington area. The Salt Lake-Ogden highway was buried under piles of huge rocks and big trees in places.

Orchards, truck garden acreage and nursery lands were ruined by boulders and mud.

Repair work was started today by railroads and communication lines. Those made homeless were being cared for in the small towns in the affected area.

# Illinois Aviator Is Arrested For Bombing

## PLANE SAID TO BE ONE SEEN OVER MINES

PAUL MONTGOMERY IS TO FACE CHARGES IN KENTUCKY

(By Associated Press)  
MURPHYSBORO, Ill., Aug. 12.—Paul Montgomery, local aviator, was arrested here today by Sheriff William Flanagan for investigation in connection with the airplane bombing of mining properties in the vicinity of Providence, Ky., yesterday.

Montgomery's arrest followed receipt of a telephone call from Sheriff Oversee of Dixon, Ky., that a "want" for the aviator in connection with the bombing outrage had been issued there.

Claim Evidence  
Three men who came here from the Kentucky coal field conferred with county authorities, advising they had some evidence of Montgomery. The nature of the evidence was not revealed.

The aviator, who had talked of a Rome to Dallas nonstop flight this summer, declined to make any statement other than to deny he had flown in the vicinity of Providence yesterday or that he had any connection with the air raid. Immediately after his arrest he asked for permission to engage counsel.

Answers Description  
Montgomery's orange and black monoplane answers the general description of the ship that dropped nine bombs in the vicinity of Providence yesterday. He admitted having had the plane up early yesterday when he was first questioned, but said he was merely went up for a brief flight to "sober up" after having been intoxicated Sunday night.

He reported having seen a "strange plane" answering the description of the bombing plane near Pinckneyville while he was flying, but said it was too far away for him to identify.

BOTH STERLING AND FERGUSONS WILL VISIT SECTION

## LEADERS FACE VOTES TEST

NATIONAL POLITICIANS UP BEFORE PEOPLE ONCE AGAIN

(By Associated Press)  
The political fate of national figures hung in the balance today as voters of five states chose party nominees for state and federal offices.

The veteran Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska faced two opponents for the Republican senatorial nomination in a primary intensified in interest by his defection from the Republican ranks in 1928 to support Alfred E. Smith, the Democratic presidential nominee.

In Arkansas, Senator Joe T. Robinson, Democratic leader, and 1928 vice-presidential candidate, faced primary opposition for the first time in twelve years.

The colorful J. Thomas Hefflin, Senator from Alabama, was forced to step aside at today's primary by state leaders, leaving the party's senatorial contest in Alabama between John H. Bankhead of Jasper and Frederick L. Thompson, Mobile publisher. Hefflin, however, was urging the voters to stay away from the polls today. He will run against the Democratic winner in the November elections.

In Oklahoma and Ohio, the Democratic selected candidates to oppose the Republican senatorial incumbents—W. B. Pine and Roscoe C. McCulloch, neither of whom had opposition within their party.

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## PROBE IS MADE OF DEATH

DUNCAN PHYSICIAN IS BELIEVED VICTIM OF MURDER

(By Associated Press)  
DUNCAN, Okla., Aug. 12.—Jim Brown, Stephens county deputy sheriff and former operative of the state bureau of criminal investigation, expressed belief today that Dr. Arthur Mullins, Marlow physician, whose charred body was found in his burned motor car yesterday, had been killed before the car was fired.

Authorities previously had advanced the theory that the physician had been the victim of an accident. Brown had no theory as to motives for Mullins' death.

The car burned in Grady county, immediately north of Stephens, and official investigation was in the hands of authorities of that county.

The physician's body, burned beyond recognition, was found in his flaming coupe on a country road near Marlow yesterday. Attracted by the sound of the horn, a farmer ran to the vehicle, but before he reached it the gasoline tank exploded.

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# Fort Worth Detective Threatened With "Death" In Mysterious Note

FORT WORTH, Aug. 12.—Detective Chief Jackson is at a loss to know the origin of a "death threat" note found on his desk at Central station today.

"Warning—you will be killed before midnight," read the note. Across the bottom in red was the printed inscription "death" and a crudely drawn skull and cross bones.

While inclined to treat the matter lightly, Chief Jackson does not know whether the note was intended for him or for Chief of Police Lee, whose office is on the floor above. All mail addressed to the police department comes through Chief Lee's office and the chief personally delivers the mail intended for Jackson. Chief Lee said the note may have come through the mail but that he may have overlooked it in sorting the mail this morning.

# COOK COUNTY REPUBLICANS PETITION FOR REFERENDUM ON PROHIBITION LAW

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 12.—The Cook county Republican committee petitioned the secretary of state today for a dry law referendum.

Three petitions, bearing the names of approximately 400,000 voters and sent from Chicago last night under guard, called for the inclusion on the ballot of three questions: Shall the Eighteenth Amendment be repealed? Shall congress modify the Volstead act? Shall the Illinois search and seizure act be repealed?

Under the Illinois law, the names of 100,000 voters must be filed before a public policy question will be voted upon at the November general election.

GREATEST IN HISTORY OF STATE CAST IN PRIMARY

DALLAS, Aug. 12.—Official canvass by the state Democratic executive committee revealed that 832,442 votes were cast in the July 26 Democratic primary, the greatest number in the history of the state. ## Morones Is Charged In Obregon's Death

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 12 (AP)—

Luis Morones, Mexican labor leader and former minister, was charged with a share of responsibility for the assassination of General Alvaro Obregon by former President Emilio Portes Gil in a political broadside published in today's papers.

The former president spoke to a large crowd outside his home, using the opportunity to answer accusations of Morones that he had plotted to have Pascual Ortiz Rubio, the present president of Mexico, assassinated during his tour of the United States prior to his inauguration.

## EVEN FISH ON VACATION

### BROWNSVILLE PORT IS VISITED BY RARE SPECIMENS

BROWNSVILLE, Aug. 12 (AP)—The American habit of spending the summer vacation away from home has evidently been adopted by fish in the Atlantic ocean, and many of them have picked the waters of the Gulf around here.

Many kinds of fish are on hand which have never been in this section before, or which have been encountered only at rare intervals.

### Led To New Sport

The presence of these fish has led to new sports, some of which have almost cost the lives of fishermen who have let their enthusiasm overcome their better judgment.

The latest and most daring is harpooning of giant rays, which have shown up suddenly in large numbers and for the first time in years.

**Huge Rays Found**  
The huge rays, running as large as 18 feet in width, and weighing

a ton, are found near the mouth of the Rio Grande in schools. Valley men go after them in small boats, attempting to harpoon them, and then shoot them and pull them in.

Recently a group of five men were dragged five miles out into the Gulf and their boat almost overturned when the ray which they had harpooned maneuvered until the rope became tangled in the propeller, and could not be cut loose.

So far only one of these giant fish has been landed. A 16-foot ray was landed by the Parker brothers, and created a sensation.

Other strange fish turning up here include the dolphin, a sport fish usually found far south of here, and the blue fish, usually found far to the north.

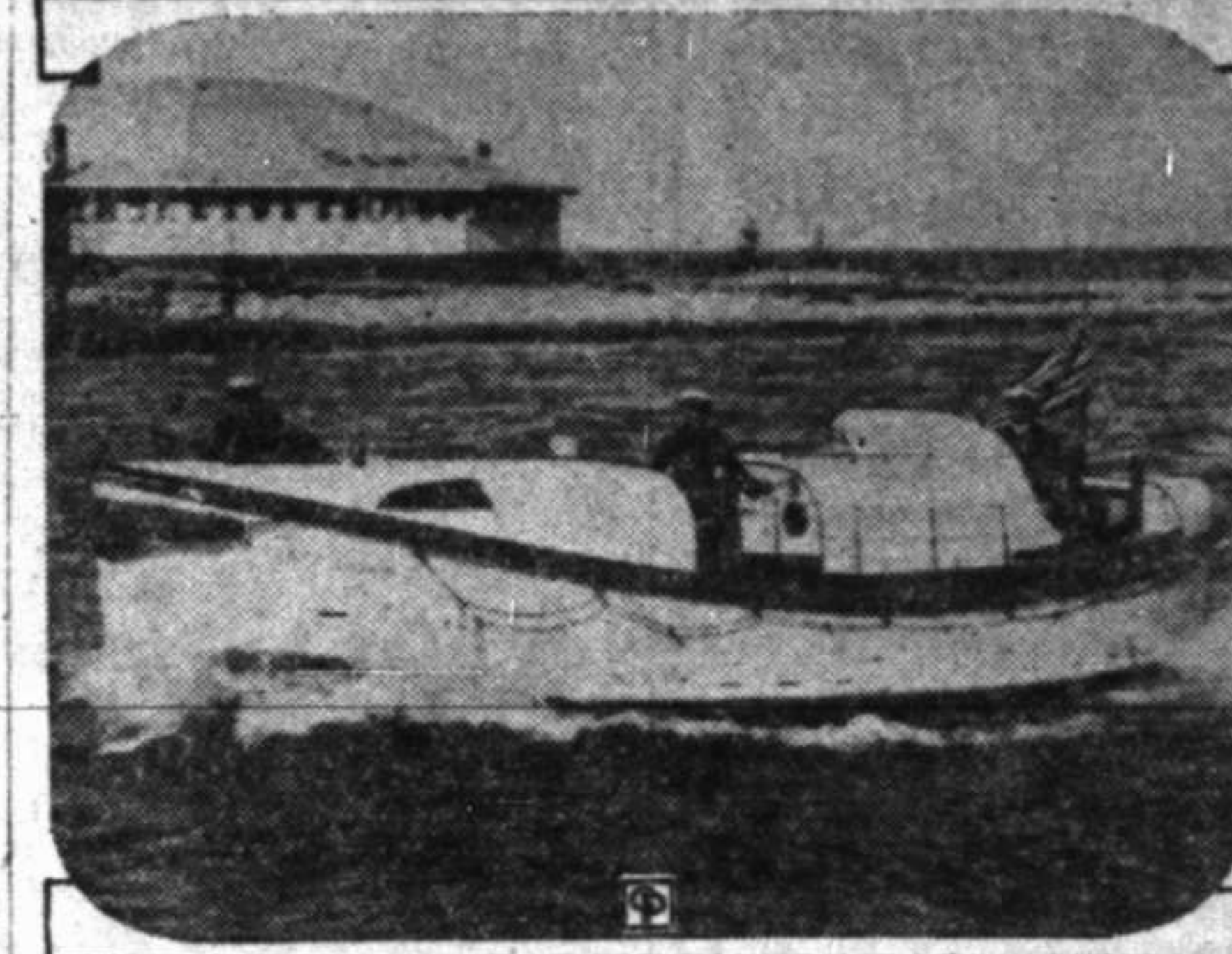
The harpooning habit, started on the rays, has spread to porpoise and other large fish.

## Latest Model In Life Boats



This is the first of the new type power life boats being built at Curtis Bay, Md., for coast guard stations along the Great Lakes. 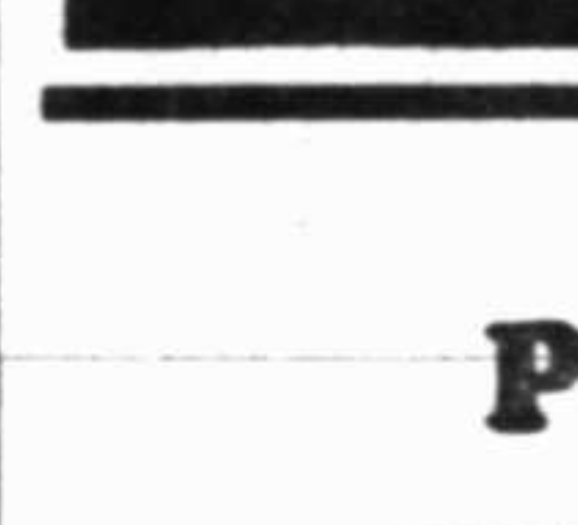

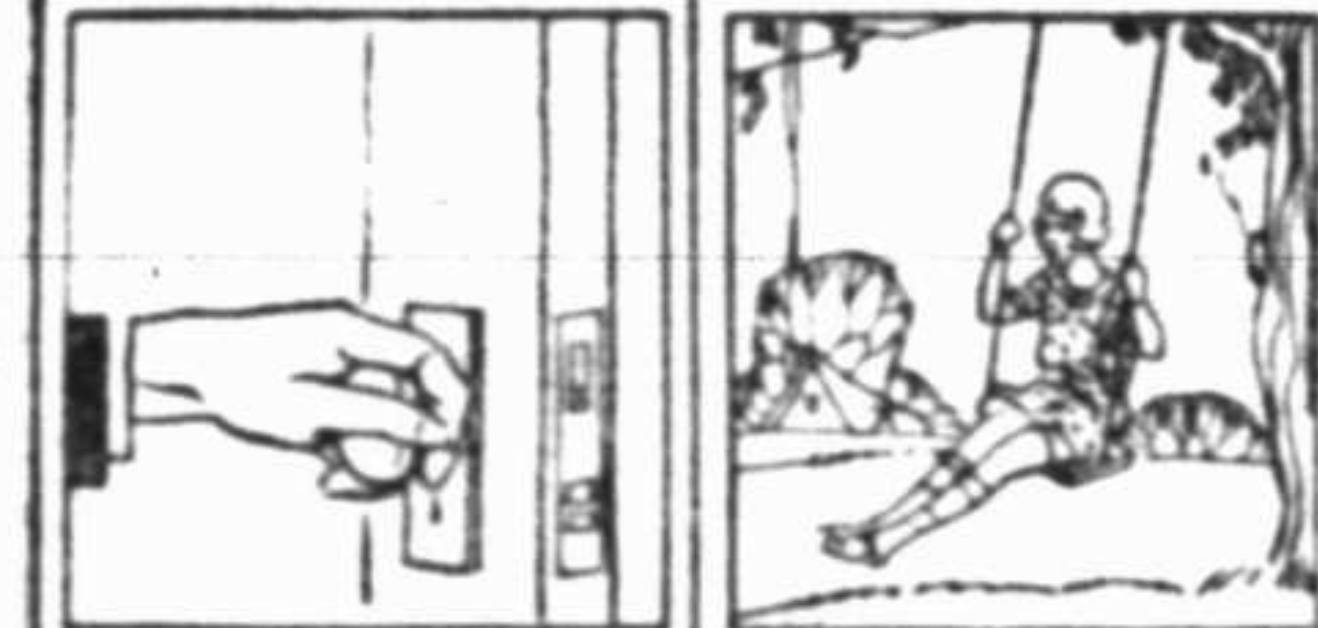

## PLAINVIEW IS INTERESTED IN ROADS

MUCH INTEREST BEING TAKEN IN HIGHWAY 70 ROUTE

(Special To The Journal)  
PLAINVIEW, Aug. 12.—The importance of U. S. Highway 70, which passes through Plainview and Hale county, east to west, as a transcontinental route connecting the Pacific ocean at Los Angeles, California, with the Atlantic at Beaufort, North Carolina, with the most direct routing possible, and the least distance is being recognized by citizens of Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, and California, since the holding of the highway meeting in Florida on June 20th.

Mauri Hopkins, chairman of the U. S. Highway 70 Association of Texas, is in receipt of a letter from T. Mahneke, president of the Palo Verde Valley Chamber of Commerce at Blythe, California, enclosing a page from the Los Angeles Examiner of July 27th, which carried a half page map of the United States showing Highway 70, and the cities through which it passes. At present Highway 70 ends at Holbrook, Arizona, but J. W. Becker of Springville, Arizona, working with the commercial organizations at Blythe, Mecca, and Los Angeles, California, has been successful in getting the United States Bureau of Good Roads to recommend that the number be extended to cover the route from Springville to Blythe, via Mecca, to Los Angeles. It is about this piece of work that Mahneke writes the local chamber of commerce.

**Kinder Takes Lead**  
Judge L. S. Kinder of Plainview, chairman of the highway committee of the Board of City Development, who took the lead in exciting interest in Highway 70 as a transcontinental route of importance to the people of Texas, was elated when advised of the routing through Blythe and Mecca, saying that no prettier, more scenic route existed to California than that. It is also the most direct, Kinder pointed out. Kinder believes that steps should be taken to follow up the tremendous amount of publicity given the route by the Los Angeles Examiner. In an article accompanying the map in the Los Angeles paper, Ben Snow, field secretary of the National Automobile club, points out the importance of the route, showing it to be the only transcontinental highway that has its western terminus in the city of Los Angeles. He also points out that it is the shortest route by which the tourist can come from the Atlantic seaboard to California.

Not only is Los Angeles becoming interested in U. S. Highway 70, but Oklahoma is rearing its importance and last week Geo. C. Gibbons, secretary-manager of the

chamber of commerce at Ardmore, Oklahoma, made a trip over the route through his state, through Texas, and on into New Mexico. While in Plainview he conferred with Mauri Hopkins and said that he was finding great interest in the route in all sections visited and that he was going to perfect the Oklahoma organization as soon as possible. He pointed out the importance of the route from Oklahoma over Highway 70 to Clovis, and then from Clovis to the Carlsbad Cavern, saying that the Carlsbad highway connection with Highway 70 offered the best route possible to the Carlsbad Caverns. He is interested in getting the Oklahoma segment of the route paved as soon as possible.

In New Mexico the people of Roswell are very anxious to have the Clovis-Carlsbad road, which connects with Highway 70, advertised as a branch of U. S. Highway

70 in order to attract tourist to the cavern who may be living along Highway 70. President J. S. B. Woolford of the chamber of commerce at Roswell, has written Mauri Hopkins pledging co-operation in every way possible to popularize the route for cavern travel.

Suits asking damages of \$20,000 each have been filed by three Littlefield residents against the Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber company because of the alleged moving off the college property of houses the lumber company had built. Plaintiffs are, E. K. Kitchen, W. H. Bell and Mac Weatherford.

The lumber company had built for the college some frame buildings. These were being rented and when the bankruptcy proceedings began, the lumber company is said to have made an effort to recover some of its property by the removal of some buildings to its own locations.

It is reported here that at least one family was occupying one of the houses at the time it was moved off the college location.

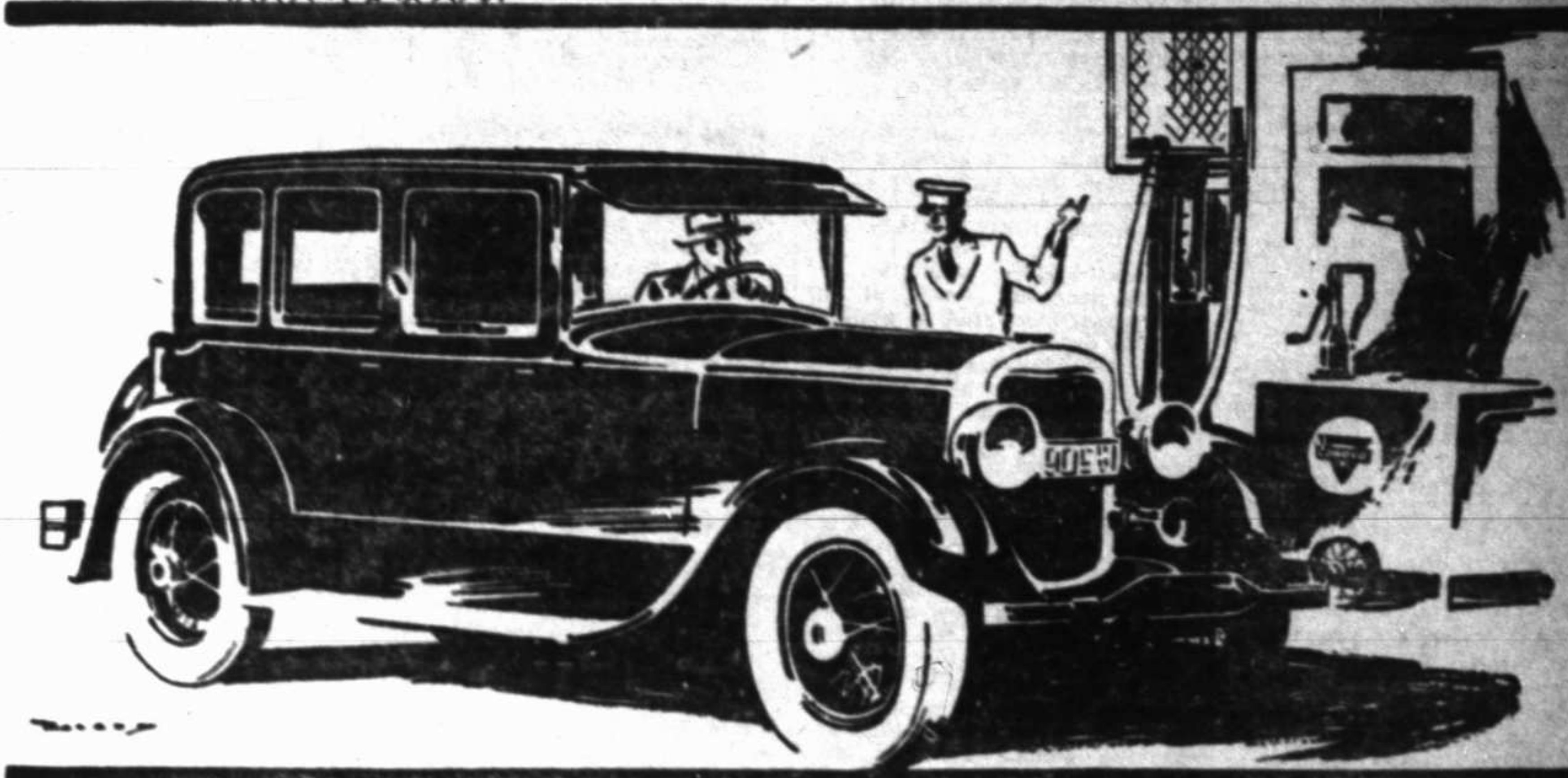

## Martha Used Forty Eggs In 'Great Cake'

MT. VERNON, Va., (AP)—Here is Martha Washington's recipe for "great cake," the manuscript for which has been presented to the George Washington museum at Mt. Vernon.

"Take 40 eggs and divide the whites from the yolks. Beat them to a froth, then work four pounds of butter to a cream and put the whites of eggs to it a spoonful at a time till it is well worked, then put four pounds of sugar finely powdered to it in the same manner, then put in the yolks of eggs and five pounds of flour and five pounds of fruit. Two hours will bake it, add to it half an ounce of mace and nutmeg, half a pint of wine and some French brandy."

The recipe is in the original manuscript written by Martha Parke Custis for her grandmother, Martha Washington.

## Veteran Of Cattle Trails Dies Sunday

PORT WORTH, Aug. 11 (AP)—Andrew Jackson Long, 81, retired capitalist and cattleman of Port Worth, died Sunday at a hotel in Galveston, while on a vacation.

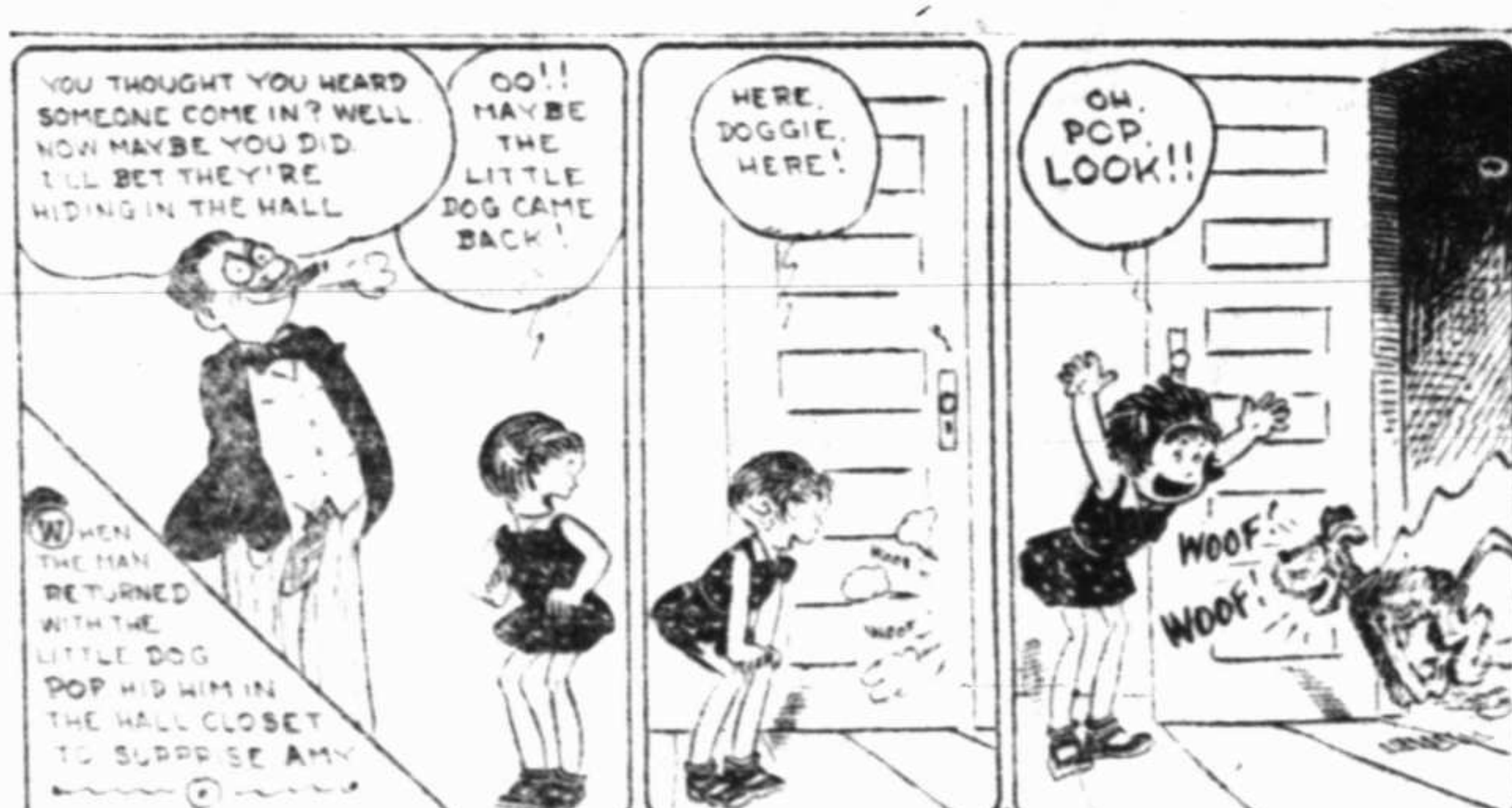

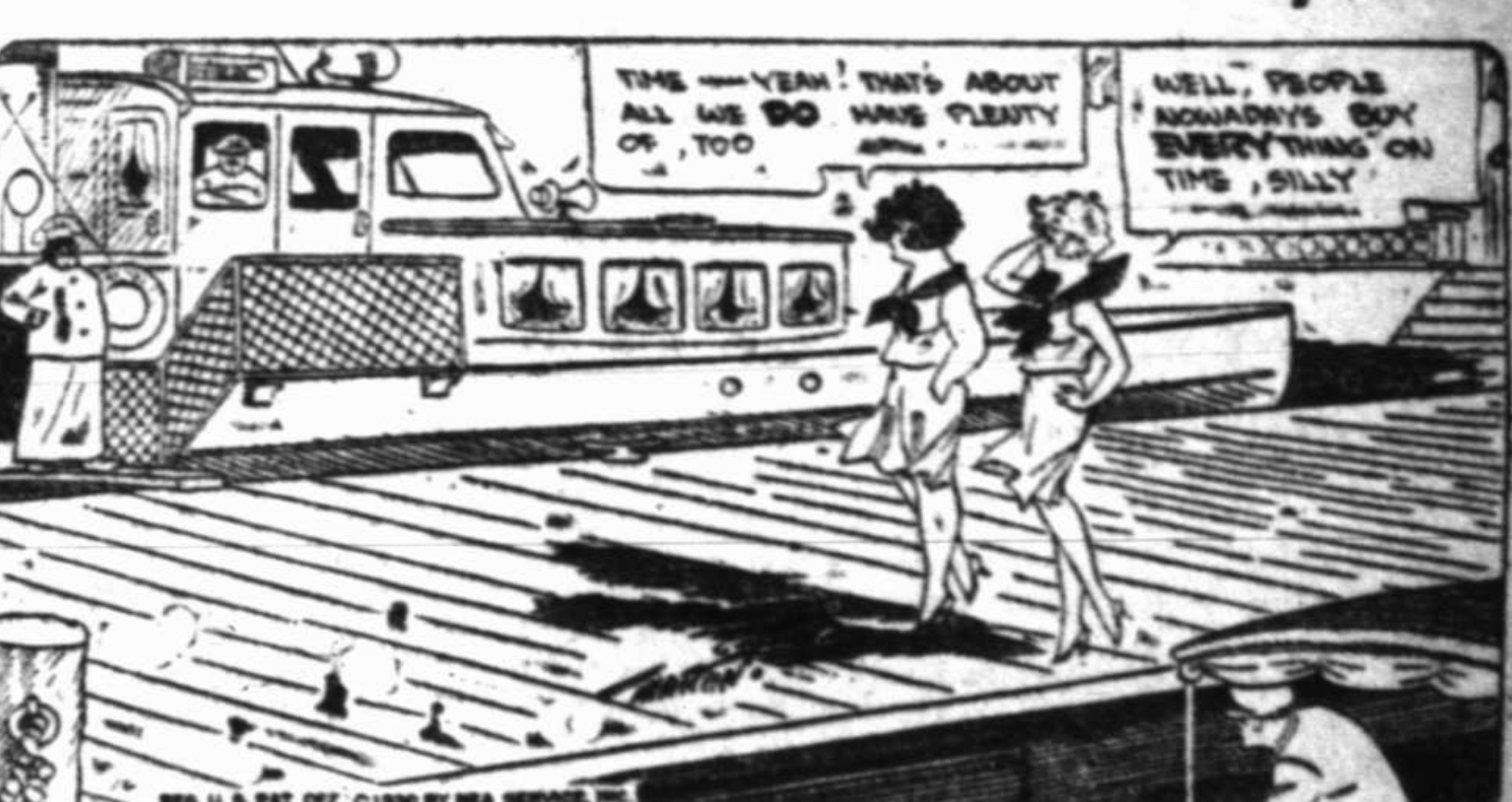

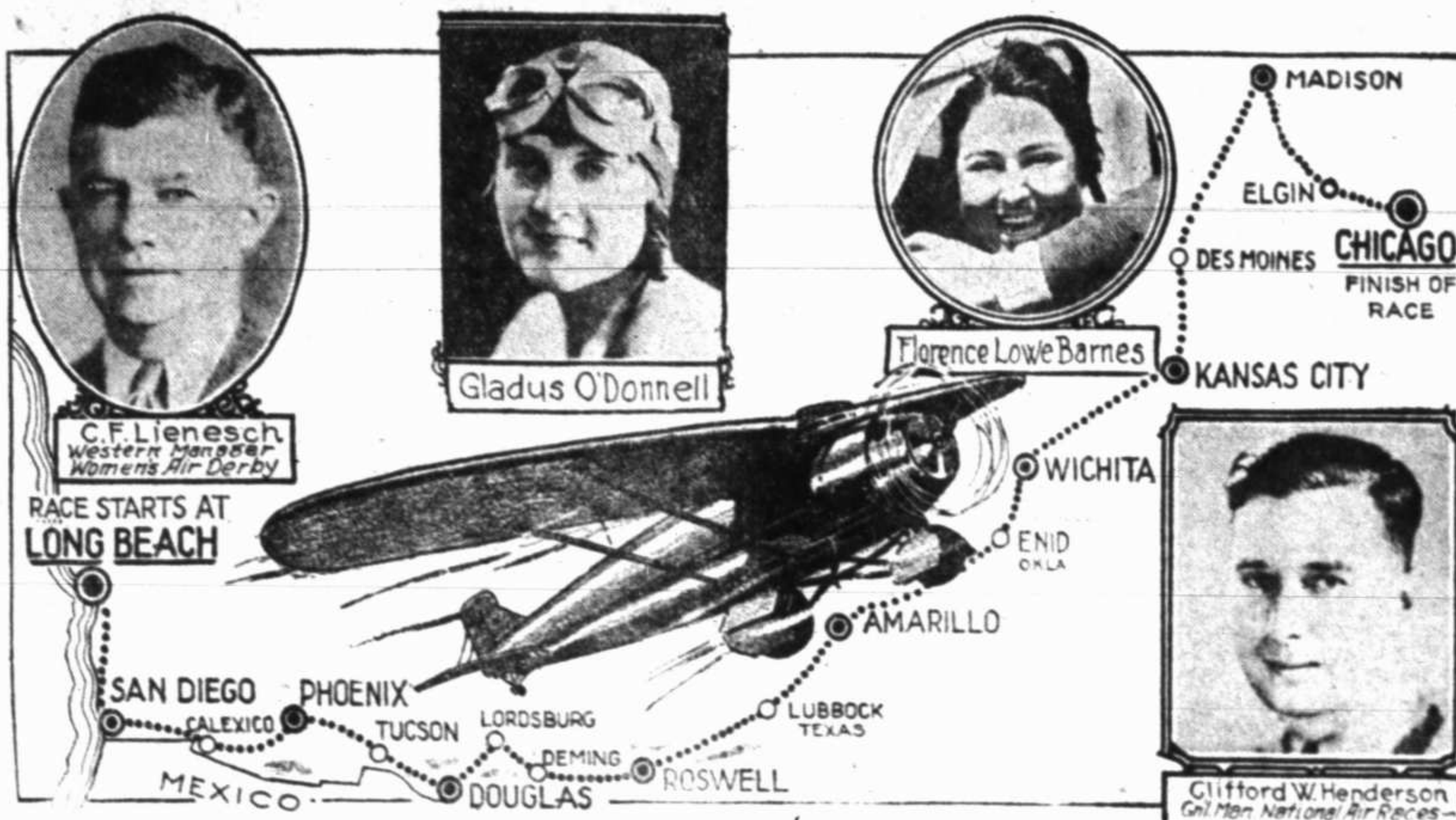

Official route of the Women's National Air derby, Long Beach to Chicago starting from the western terminus next Sunday has been received here today with pictures of two noted feminine entrants and two officials of the nine-day cross country flight.

Route of the derby covers 2,365 miles. Beginning at Long Beach, California, the route will pass through San Diego, Phoenix, Tucson, Lordsburg, Douglas, Roswell, Lubbock, Amarillo, Wichita, Kansas City, Elgin, and Madison, Illinois, where it will end.

The derby is being held in honor of the 100th anniversary of the founding of the United States. It is the first time that a women's air derby has been held in the United States.

She set a record of 196.19 miles an hour in her new ship, thus snatching championship honors from Max Amelia Earhart, whose mark, made last year at Los Angeles, was 145 miles per hour.

The western derby is a feature of the national air races at Chicago, August 23 to September 1, and is under direction of Clifford Henderson.
