Chevrolet Co. To Have Formal Opening Aug. 10

On Saturday, August 10th, the doors of a new institution for Junction will be formally opened to the people of Kimble County. The Highland Chevrolet Company has invited everyone to attend the opening of their new \$20,000 home, situated just across from the post office on Holecamp street.

According to Mr. J. S. Farmer, manager of the new company, nothing has been left undone to entertain the crowds which will attend the opening. Souvenirs have been provided to give to those visiting the new plant on Saturday. During Saturday afternoon, ice cream will be served free to the guests.

This new plant, which consists of a filling station, parts department, show rooms for the new Chevrolet, repair shop, storage building, bus station, and used car department, is complete in every detail.

One of the features of the filling station is a new Bowser pump which contains six different grades of oil. Pneumatic air pressure is used on this pump. There are three gasoline storage tanks, with a capacity of 1,035 gallons each. There are eight oil tanks, with a 55 gallon capacity each.

The private managerial offices of Mr. Farmer are situated on the second floor.

A fifty-foot addition to the main building will be constructed before the year is over, according to Mr. Farmer. The new storage house, 40 by 68 feet, and constructed of sheet iron and steel, has just been completed and placed in use.

An interesting item in the plans of the new building is a large perpendicular electric sign, 17 feet long. This sign will bear the Chevrolet trade mark and the name of the dealer here. This sign will be installed soon. A beautiful waiting room, which will serve as the station for the Kerrville Bus Company, is one of the outstanding features of the plant.

Everyone is invited to attend the grand formal opening of the Highland Chevrolet Company in its new home. Twenty useful presents will be given away at the opening Saturday.

Program is Opened With Inspection of Grounds 2,000 PRESENT

Prosperity is keynote of Addresses of Speakers

Economists, veterinarians, ranchers, scientists and market specialists gathered together at the Ranch Experiment Station 30 miles south of Sonora Tuesday and Wednesday for the Fifth Annual Ranchmen's Round-up.

It is estimated that approximately 2,000 people were present on the opening day of the two-day affair.

Campers were dotted here and there around the experiment station, and the aroma of steaming coffee drifting through the live oak mists bespoke the famed western hospitality.

The cream of the ranchers of the great Edwards Plateau together for a friendly informal visit. Several blooded rams and bucks were on display in the pens near the meeting grounds.

On Tuesday morning the program opened with a general inspection of the Ranch Experiment Station livestock and equipment. At 10 a. m. the resonant gong at the assembly building called the crowds together for the morning session.

W. H. Dameron, superintendent of the Experiment Station, presided. A. B. Connor, Director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, made the address of welcome. Following this address, Capt. H. W. Rieck of Roosevelt made the response to this welcome address. Capt. Rieck stated in his speech that the most valuable adjunct we have in the sheep and goat business is the laboratory for ranchmen.

Mr. Connor, in his speech, explained the purpose of the annual meeting, pointing out that 84 per cent of the Mohair crop of the United States was produced in the Edwards Plateau region.

Congressman C. B. Hudspeth of El Paso, while addressing the audience, told of his part in retaining the appropriation for the station.

After the morning program was closed, everyone went to the lunch grounds, where a free chevon barbecue was served by the Station. Beans, pickles, meat, tea and coffee were served to approximately two thousand people.

Speakers for the afternoon program were Hon. Penrose Metcalfe of San Angelo, J. A. Whitten of Eldorado, W. L. Aldwell of Sonora, A. K. Mitchell, New Mexico, and E. W. Sheets, Washington, D. C.

Little Billie Cardwell of Junction won third place in the boys' sheep judging contest. Besides being an expert rider, Billie can tell a good buck when he sees it. Jimmie McManus, who was also in the judging contest, made a creditable showing.

At 8 p. m. free motion pictures were shown at the Station. A dance was held at 9 p. m.

Speakers on the program for women were Mrs. Maggie W. Barry, Helen Swift, Myrtle Murry, Kate Hall, Extension Services; Dr. Whiteacre and Mamie Grimes, Experiment Station.

Several of the speakers had good words for the Hon. Coke R. Stevenson of Junction. The

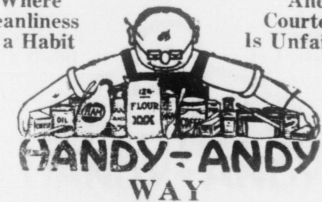

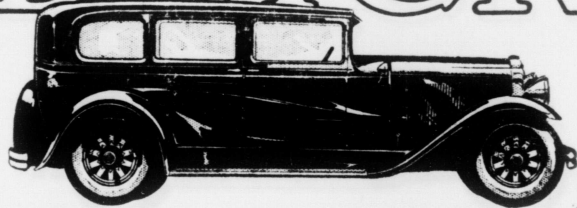

If the town had anything that no other town had, I'd see that these people had all the details.

In other words, I'd start right now to place in the hands of those who come in contact with the potential customers of the town, sales ammunition to SELL the town.

These people are the logical people to start with and through them thousands of dollars can be made for every merchant. Every day there is a constant flow of gold dollars going through your city, but no town can expect to get an even break unless they ask for it.

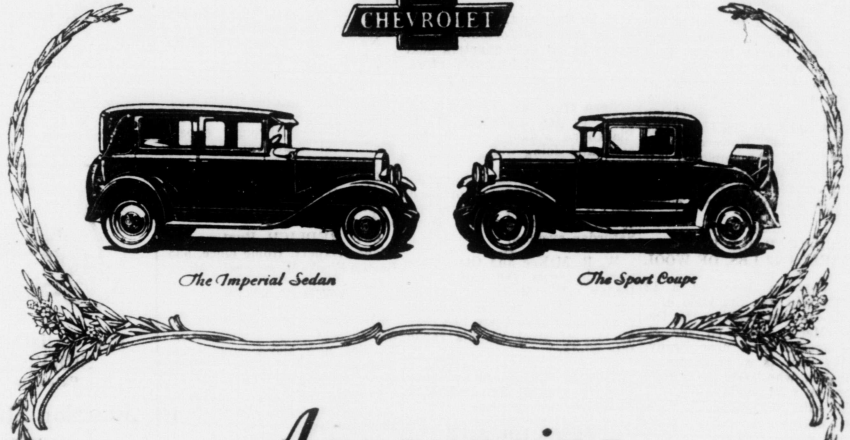

WILL EMPLOY LARGE NUMBER FOR CENSUS

Washington, D. C.—The taking of the fifteenth decennial census will furnish employment for about 100,000 throughout the country as enumerators, it has been announced by the Director of the Census, William M. Steuart. In employing these, war veterans, their wives and widows will be given preference. The applicants will be subject to an examination but not to civil service requirements. The Census Bureau now is engaged in organizing the force of supervisors who will be required, a task which will be well advanced by the coming autumn. It is then the intention of the Bureau, Mr. Steuart said, to take up the selection of the big army of enumerators for the nation-wide task of canvassing the population, agricultural and other statistics. At least one enumerator will be required in every political subdivision. The examination will consist of the answering of a number of inquiries to enable the Bureau to decide upon the qualifications of the applicant.

ANTS KEEP "COWS"

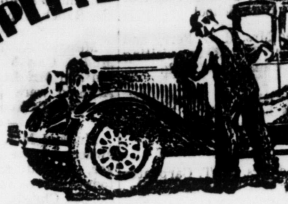
