Jealous Youth Is Sentenced To Death In Slaying Public Utility Magnates Voice Optimism Of Business

Berwick Is Found Guilty By Jurors In Beaumont Case

Defendant Admits Killing Sweetheart When Seeing Her With Another Man In Front of Home

Files for Appeal

Verdict Returned by Jury After Deliberation Of Three Hours: Youth Is Unmoved by Sentence

(By Associated Press)

BEAUMONT, Nov. 27.—Taking the life of William Byrd, 21-year-old Port Arthur youth, must be paid for by Luther Berwick with his own life. The jury convicted him here today in less than three hours of deliberation.

Berwick was indicted on a charge of murdering Byrd the night of October 20 in Port Arthur. Another indictment against him charged Berwick with killing his own sweetheart, Belle Crow, age 18, who was with Byrd at the time of the double tragedy. Both victims were found on the sidewalk in front of the girl's home. Byrd dead and the girl dying, a few minutes after a car had been heard to drive up and several shots had been fired. Berwick was arrested about an hour later in his room. There were no eye-witnesses, but Berwick admitted the killing and on the witness stand described the tragedy. He said he was beside himself with jealousy at seeing Miss Crow, whom he had hoped to marry, out with another man. He declared, however, that he fired the gun at Byrd when he thought Byrd was about to attack him, and that the girl was hit by accident.

Defendant Stole

Berwick did not move when the verdict was read. He was as stoic as death.

Banks Fail With Official's Death

Twelve Institutions Fail To Open Doors Wednesday: President Succumbs Of Apoplexy In Oklahoma

(By Associated Press)

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 27.—Defeated in his desperate struggle to keep alive a dozen banks crippled by the deflation of 1929, H. A. McCauley, 58, former mayor of Sapulpa, and board member of 13 Oklahoma banks died of apoplexy last night on the eve of their failure. The 13 banks did not open their doors today.

Graves Shull, Oklahoma bank commissioner, who placed the banks in charge of examiners, attributed their failure to "frozen assets." Their total deposits as of October 4 were \$2,529,976 and their capital stock aggregated \$310,000.

Banks Listed.
They are the Sapulpa State bank, the Bank of Mounds, Henryetta State bank, Bank of Commerce, Weleetka, First State Bank, Vian; Citizens State bank, Webber Falls; Davenport State bank; Clinton State bank; First State bank, Tipton; Avant State bank; Keystone State bank, and the Bank of Kellyville.

C. J. Alexander, assistant state bank commissioner in charge of the Sapulpa State bank, said he understood McCauley was in Tulsa yesterday attempting to float a loan with which to carry the bank over the crisis and that he was unsuccessful.

Hope destroyed, McCauley returned to his home. He collapsed as he started to retire, and died, his wife said, less than an hour later.

'Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow'

(An Editorial On Thanksgiving Day.)

"BLOW, blow thou winter wind! Thou art not so unkind the snow of New England to offering thanks to their God, for his benevolent poets and philosophers were branding the ingrate and exalting the grateful. An ungrateful man is a tub full of holes," says an old Latin proverb. Ausonius believed that the earth produces nothing worse than an ungrateful man. In Juvenal's opinion, "if you call a man ungrateful you say everything against him," while Ballou wrote that "gratitude is the fairest blossom which springs from the soul."

But these are the sentiments of men in relation to other men. Not until the old New Englanders knelt devoutly, offering prayers of thanksgiving, did it seem to occur to mankind to set apart a special time for gratitude to God for His bounty. Thus the modern Thanksgiving is essentially a religious holiday as divine in purpose as any of the red-letter days in the church calendar.

Nothing is more appropriate by way of observance than a religious service. Nothing is more inexhaustible by way of the true believer than to omit a period of devotion to and recognition of the Great Provider.

The hideous to say that in this life or that life, this country or that country there is little or no cause for thanksgiving. True as is the sentiment, things are never so bad that they might not be worse. But when all is said and done, everybody is relatively well off. Things for them could be much worse. A scant meal might be scarier. A serious illness might be more serious. Troubles in business or elsewhere could be considerably greater. No person is without cause for gratitude.

Only the possessor of a low-caste soul, a callous heart, will fail then today to be mindful of the Great Benefactor. America is the better nation for having established its Thanksgiving. Its duty today is to preserve it in spirit and in the reverence its hallowed origin deserves.

Largest Plane Ever Built In United States Crashes

Two Airmen Injured When Huge Plane Catapults

(By Associated Press)

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Nov. 27.—The largest airplane ever built in this country, the P-30, crashed today, catapulting out of the runway and landing in a field, some 50 feet away. The plane was not found until 10 minutes later. It was taken to Nassau hospital at Mineola with deep cuts on its head, both ankles sprained and serious internal injuries.

Chinese Warring Efforts Centered Against Revolts

National Government Is Attempting to Put Down Rebellion In Provinces: Widespread Revolt Seen

"Silver" Victory

Payment of Twenty Million Dollars to Rebel Heads Not Expected to Stand As Permanent Treaty

(By Associated Press)

CHINA'S nationalist government appeared Wednesday to be concentrating its war efforts upon putting down the rebellion in Kwangtung province, of which Canton is the capital. Apparently believing that the alliance of the "Ironside Division" former government troops with the Kwangtung province rebels in a campaign against the Ching government might be the nucleus of a widespread revolt, President Chiang Kai-shek ordered heavy reinforcements or troops and war vessels to the South China war area.

Fighting in the Central China provinces of Honan and Hupeh dispatches stated, had practically ceased as a result of a "silver bullet" victory of the nationalists over the Koumintsun rebels, who were said to be withdrawing to the west as the result of a payment of 20,000,000 Mexican dollars to their leaders. Foreign and neutral Chinese observers were skeptical of the permanent success of this "victory" believing that the Koumintsun would again attack the government when anti-nationalist forces in other areas gained ascendancy.

Indicted Senator Posts \$500 Bail

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—After posting \$500 bail on liquor charges, representative Edward E. Denton of Illinois said today he did not know when he would be brought to trial. The district attorney's office said the case would come up "in the natural course of events."

Denton had requested an early trial when informed at his home in Marion, Ill., of the indictment, growing out of the report of prohibition agents that a leaking informant and a trunk addressed to John Layne, his former secretary, in his care at 411 House office building, had been found to contain liquor.

He arrived in Washington today and issued a formal statement which said he "had nothing to say with reference to the case, and that he had recently been charged in connection with the prohibition act."

FIRE BREAKS OUT

Slight Damage Caused To Texas Utilities Plant

Only slight damage was sustained last night when fire broke out at the Texas Utilities power plant in east Lubbock about 9 o'clock. The blaze was said to have started from operations while heating asphalt for repair of a vault. It was confined to a small space and the only damage was to a door facing.

The flames were quickly extinguished upon arrival of the Lubbock fire department.

Expected Thanksgiving Pleasures Are Changed To Sorrow When Entire Family Of Four Is Found Dead

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The expected pleasures of a Thanksgiving visit were changed to sorrow today when relatives of Mrs. Oren May Henley arrived at the Henley farm near Newalla to find that the entire family, comprising Mrs. Henley, her husband, T. M. Henley, and their two children had been shot to death.

A coroner's verdict held that Mrs. Henley and the two children had been killed by Henley who then shot himself. Henley's body was found lying on a shot

gun. The bodies, which had lain in the Henley kitchen for more than two weeks, were found there by O. J. Ballard and Miss Annie Ballard, Mrs. Henley's brother and sister, and Mrs. Henley's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Ballard.

Typical of the splendid specimens of manhood who braved the hardships of the Pilgrim days, the chief actors in today's gridiron programs will be tried by an admiring public which has come to look upon football gladiators of today as true examples of American industry and progress.

Practically the entire populace of this city will have some part today in the grid programs in which the two major football teams of Lubbock appear. Endurance Flight Begins Secretly

Bobbie Trout, Elinor Smith Make Second Attempt At Record After They Are Forced to Land Once

(By Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 27.—Secretly taking off at 9:40 a. m. today Miss Bobbie Trout, Los Angeles, and Miss Elinor Smith, New York, began another attempt to break the world's endurance refueling record in their Sunbeam biplane. Word of the flight was not announced until late today.

Previous announcements at Metropolitan airport, where the flight started, had said no attempt would be made until Thanksgiving day or Friday. However, favorable weather conditions induced the young women to start the grid today.

Early yesterday they were forced down when a refueling contact was missed after they had been up about 18 hours.

At 3 p. m. today a successful refueling contact was made over the ocean at San Pedro. Another contact was set for about 5 o'clock to carry the fliers sufficient gasoline to give them through the night.

All that is claimed for the new pin by its inventor, Dr. Woodward Colby, St. Paul, baby specialist, who said he worked it out after reading an article on the high death rate among babies from swallowing foreign substances, particularly safety pins.

The new device is simple in design and almost automatic in operation. It is similar in shape to the present safety pin except that instead of opening outward the wire sides form a closed frame for the pin inside. The point is guarded even when the pin is open.

Managers Report 1930 Outlook To President Hoover

Confidence In Immediate Future Shown In Budget For Two Billion Dollars In Extensions Over U. S.

President Pleased

Proposed Expenditures For Next Year Exceed Total Of 1929 By One Hundred Million Dollars

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Publicity utility managers have such confidence in the immediate future that they are going ahead with a 1930 budget for extensions, betterments and maintenance approaching the two billion dollar mark and exceeding that for this year by more than one hundred million dollars.

They came to Washington 30 strong today to lay this information before President Hoover and to report the outlook. Among them were Owen D. Young, chairman of the board of the General Electric company; Samuel Insull, of Chicago, of Omaha speaking for Paul Shoup, president of the Electric Railway association.

Hoover Pleased.
Since perhaps no other industry is in a position to keep its finger quite as close upon the public pulse as the utilities, the president was represented as being particularly pleased with reports on conditions which the light and power, gas and electric railway managers gave.

Recommendation Given Gulf And West Texas Line

Proposed Line From Brady
To Fredericksburg Gets
Approval of Examiner To
L. C. C. At Washington

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. — The Gulf and West Texas railway would be permitted a new line from Fredericksburg to Brady in Gillespie, Mason and McCulloch counties, Tex., under recommendations presented to the Interstate Commerce Commission today by Examiner J. S. Prichard.

The second proposed unit, that from Eden to San Angelo in Concho and Tom Green counties, would not be approved if the examiner's recommendations are accepted, but action would be deferred until certain trackage agreements had been reached. Prichard also proposed approval of the railroad's application to retain excess earnings from the new construction.

Held By Davis
Hearings on the Gulf and West Texas application were held by Examiner Davis, but evidence taken by him was turned over to Prichard to write the report. Davis having conducted a number of hearings on his way into the southwest.

Further briefs filed by parties to the application is the next routine step and then the commission probably will hear oral arguments and render its decision.

Only One Opponent
The Abilene and Southern railway was only the opponent of the application. Its objections were set forth in a brief filed with the commission pointing out that it now has an application pending for authority to extend its line from Ballinger to San Angelo and that the extension of Gulf and West Texas would closely parallel this proposed line for five or six miles. The Abilene and Southern presented no direct testimony at the hearing but counsel cross-examined several of the applicant's witnesses.

The Gulf and West Texas' application to construct a line between Eden and San Angelo would be held up by examiner until it has completed negotiations with the Colorado and Santa Fe for trackage rights of 32 miles from Brady to Eden. Examiner Prichard pointed out that no assurances that the Colorado and Santa Fe will permit these trackage rights have been given and that the Gulf and West Texas has indicated if this permission were not forthcoming it would seek to construct its own line between these points.

Need Claimed
Prichard holds that the matters of record clearly indicate public need for the proposed line and adds that "if it is possible to make advantageous use of existing line between Brady and Eden, construction of another line would probably result in unnecessary duplication of rail facilities which

Condemned Man Is Granted New Trial

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 27.—Maurio Guajardo, given death in Williamson county for the murder of Arthur Bunnell, well-known farmer of that community, was awarded a new trial by the court of criminal appeals today.

The appellate court had previously affirmed the judgment of the court but today's decision to reverse and remand the case was taken on appellant's motion for a rehearing.

The homicide occurred on May 28, 1928. Guajardo, 21 at the time of the killing, had worked for Bunnell for five years. They had difficulties immediately preceding the

alleged murder. Guajardo was working on a cultivator when Bunnell approached him just before the killing.

With the death recently of Miss C. Armstrong, of Drumkeen, Ireland, the last of three sisters passed away within a few weeks.

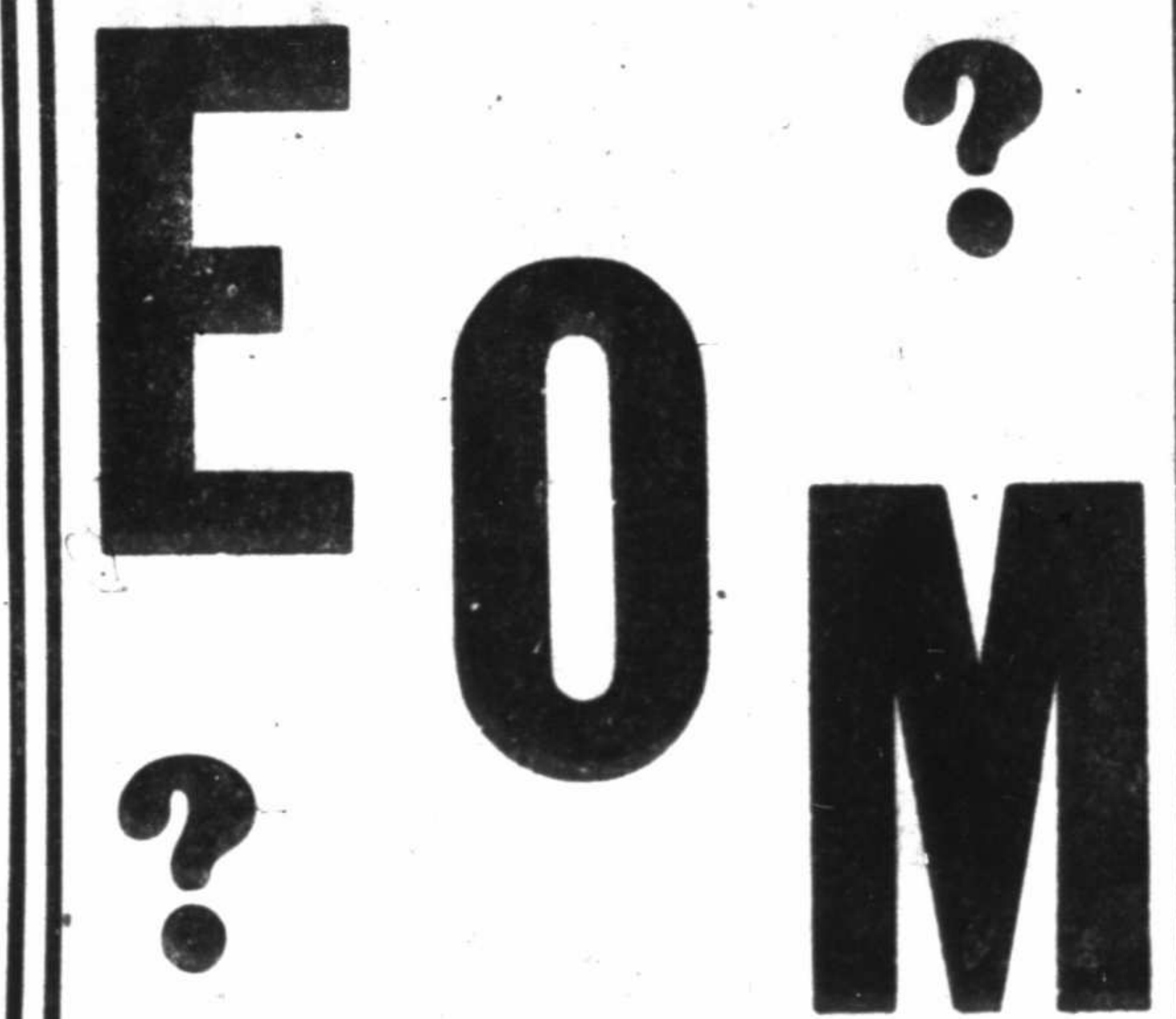

In talking with Mrs. Winifred Hathaway, who assisted in the first course for sight saving given at Columbia University in 1921, and who has given similar courses in various other parts of the country, I was amazed at the fine results that are being achieved in this field.

There are, she told me, now more than 4000 partially sighted students enrolled in sight saving classes in the various states.

HELPING DEFECTIVES
"In these classes," she explained, "special large type books, movable type, and desks that raise the angle are used. The best lighting arrangements are made and special methods used to adapt the regular grade curriculum to the needs of the children."

"Educators have found that many children who had been accounted stupid, sullen, morose, mentally subnormal and even criminal, displayed excellent intelligence and pleasing dispositions as soon as their defective vision was recognized and they were placed in sight saving classes."

GIVING COURAGE
She mentioned two specified instances of happy results from training, that seemed to me very much worth while. One was the case of the son of a famous surgeon, who had set his heart on going to the father's footsteps, but naturally could not do the amount of close study and application for a medical degree.

His teacher did not discourage him, but she interested him in forestry. Little by little, so that he is now happily engaged in being a tree surgeon—a pursuit quite possible with his handicap, and yet at the same time not so remote from his ideal as to be too obvious a substitution.

There was a girl, too, who was artistic and had the feeling and the impulses of an artist, but not the eyesight. Landscape gardening became her salvation, and she now has a large staff of helpers and is prosperous and happy in her work.

For the other than merely casual observer there is a terrible insinuation that the Queen is not unlike Queen Marie of Romania.

This thought gains evidence when it is revealed that she is quite desirous that her daughter marry a neighboring emperor, played by Lemmie Baker, whom the princess has never seen and knows only by a unsavory reputation. The Queen insists that the princess owes a duty to her country.

ENROUTE TO THE NORTH
POLE, Nov. 27.—We are making
splendid progress and Mrs. Klein-
schmidt and I are delighted with
the trip so far. After taking off we
flew almost directly North and have
kept steadily at it.

As Mrs. Kleinschmidt is an ex-
perienced pilot she has taken her
turns at the controls and thus we
have gotten on well. The cabin of
our plane which we have decided to
call "The Santa Claus Special" is
so roomy and comfortable that we
have been getting along in great
shape.

Living Over Canada
As I am sending this message we
are flying about 6,000 feet above
Canada. Already the air is very
cold and we are fortunate in having
our Eskimo Parkas, made of rein-
deer skins, with us.

Last night we got into a snow
storm and had to climb to about
10,000 feet in order to get above it.
The plane is functioning perfectly
and we are confident we will get
through the long flight in first
class shape.

We have the sky practically to
ourselves. Before leaving the United
States we did see a couple of
small planes. They waggled their
wings in greeting to us and we way-
ed back. Since then we have not
seen any airplanes. There isn't any
traffic problem up here where we
are.

Plans Are Laid

As I told the reporters when we
took off, we intend to fly to the
southern tip of Hudson Bay to
Moose Factory, a Hudson Bay Post.
We will land there to take on addi-
tional supplies of fuel. Then we
will follow the western shore of
Hudson Bay to Cape Churchill,
where the last outpost of the Hud-
son Bay company is located. From
here we will take a N. N. W.
course for Bathurst Inlet on Cor-
onation Gulf, and if conditions are
favorable, not stop but cross Cor-
onation Gulf and land at the
Southern Shore of Victoria Land.
This is the home of the Blonde Es-
kimos of which you have heard, and
I have many friends there who
will be waiting for me and I will
be quite at home.

We will leave the airplane here
in the hands of two capable me-
chanics ready for the return jour-
ney, and secure dogteams and
reindeer and with Eskimo drivers
will proceed north in search of
Santa's home.

Has Camera Ready

While my wife has been at the
controls I have gotten my camera
in shape for action so I will be
able to get some good pictures when
the subjects present themselves.
There is a motion picture camera
to the equipment and it is possible
I will have an opportunity to take
some interesting scenes with it. At
any rate there will be some good
snapshots which I will wireless
back to the Avalanche-Journal
within the next few days.

You will remember that when
Mrs. Kleinschmidt was coaxing me
to bring her, just before the start,
she said something about wanting
to cook my meals. That is funny,
as we look at it now.

Hot Food Forgotten

Neither of us has eaten any hot
food since we had breakfast on the
day we left. We have had hot cof-
fee, of course, which we brought in
thermos bottles. But the only
food we have had or cared for is
a few sandwiches. There are too
many things to watch, about the
plane and about the country we
are flying over, to give us time to
think about food.

We just crossed a river which is
frozen over. That gives some idea
of how cold it is. Men were cut-
ting ice out of it and hauling the
ice away with horses. It must be
at least 20 below zero. And the air
up here where we are is colder
than that. But fortunately our
cabin is tightly closed and heated
by the exhaust of the engine.

The snow storm has been the
most serious difficulty we have en-
countered, but it wasn't nearly as
bad as it would have been. Any-
way of course it is too cold for sleep.

The Orange of Texas University and the Maroon of Texas A. & M., long emblematic of all that is spectacular and colorful on the gridiron, will clash before some 30,000 fans, including Governor Dan Moody.

The state's chief executive, an alumnus of Texas University, will participate in ceremonies dedicating the Aggie's new concrete stadium. After that part of the program is finished, the rank and file will settle back to see the structure dedicated right. The Longhorns and Aggies are capable of doing just that.

Longhorns Favorites
No matter that both have been eliminated from the Southwest conference championship race, either will account the season a success if it is victorious tomorrow. Texas, defeated only once in one of the most difficult schedules ever undertaken by a conference school, will enter the game favored by a majority. The Aggies, however, are extremely stubborn about losing on Kyle Field, and the very fact makes the game a toss-up.

Thanks to the forethought of the schedule committee, many thousands of those who witness the Thanksgiving bout will be able to flock back up to Port Worth for the championship tilt Saturday between Southern Methodist and Texas Christian. Up to this year it was the custom for all conference schools to shut down on Thanksgiving Day in self protection. T. C. U., S. M. U., Rice and Baylor got together and decided to play their final game on the Saturday after Thanksgiving. They had grown tired of seeing the Steers and Aggies grab the day's big crowd and leave them to eat at the second table.

Change Best For All

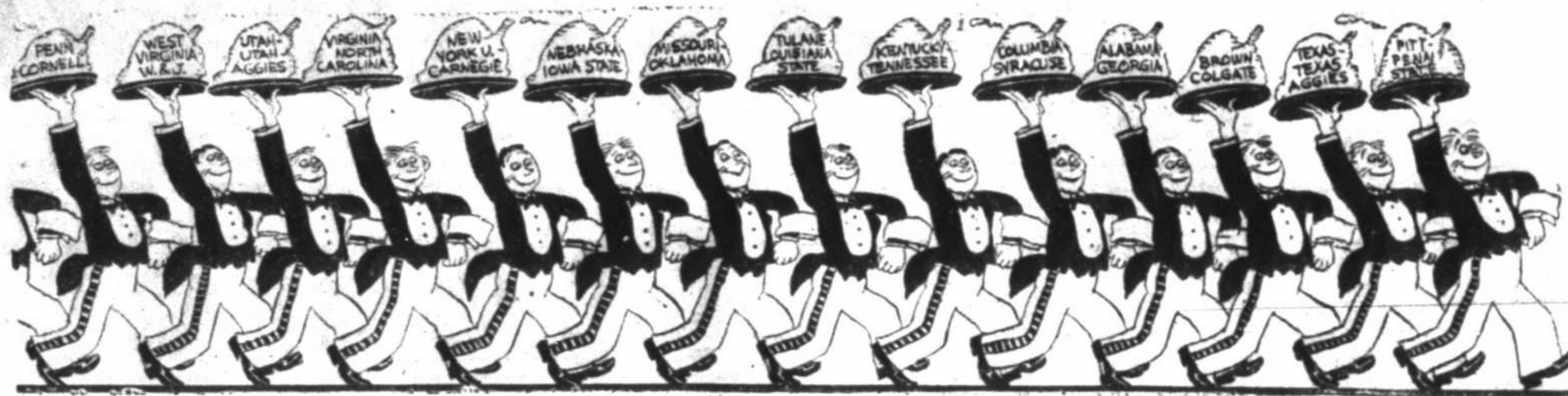

NEW YORK, Nov. 27. (AP)—Five of the foremost unbeaten college football teams hope to have their appetites for the Thanksgiving feast stimulated by victories tomorrow. All the facts and figures, so far as they can be relied upon, point to decisive triumphs by Pittsburgh over Penn State, Tulane over Louisiana State and Utah over the Utah Aggies.

Tennessee is a strong favorite to beat Kentucky and keep around the top of the Southern conference heap, but the memory of a scoreless tie with the Wildcats last year may haunt the Volunteers when they clash on the gridiron at Lexington.

Coast Has Attraction
St. Mary's, the fifth unbeaten outfit, entertains the strong University of Oregon eleven at San Francisco, in the outstanding holiday battle on the Pacific coast. St. Mary's has not even been scored on so far, being checked only by California in a scoreless tie, but figures to be pressed to gain any decided edge over the Webfoots from the north.

These two games are the high spot of a eastern holiday slate, also including Colgate-Brown, at Providence in the morning; Columbia-Syracuse at New York; New York University-Syracuse at the Yankee stadium; and West Virginia-Washington at Jefferson at Morgantown, W. Va.

Penn beat Cornell 49 to 0 last Thanksgiving Day, but the Quakers may be fortunate to have any kind of a margin this year, so marked has been the improvement of the Huskies. Colgate-Syracuse, West Virginia-Washington and Jefferson at Morgantown, W. Va.

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Business Conditions Good, Bankers Report

Diversification Given As Reason For Status Here

Increase Shown In Lubbock Deposits Over Same Date Of Last Year; Collections Here Are Improving

Business and economic conditions over the Lubbock area are in the best of shape as the year 1929 draws to a close, according to interviews Wednesday with two local bankers. A third bank executive refused any statement.

Satisfactory liquidation of loans and a seasonal response to increasing diversification have been largely responsible for this condition, it was pointed out.

"The financial condition of the South Plains is better than it has been for three years," said C. E. Madgen, president of the Lubbock National bank. "Bank deposits have soared to unprecedented figures and collections have been improved substantially during the harvest season."

Reasonably Secure

"The business personnel of the area will enter 1930 in the face of reasonable security. Hallmarks and other misfortunes which spotted the section several months ago have not been felt widespreadly. Present indications point to a cotton crop which will exceed that of last year and on the other hand the recent bountiful offering of moisture has placed a good season in the ground for the start of a new year."

"Lubbock is fortunate in that the spirited building activities of 1929 have assured adequate housing periodically at least, for early 1930 expansion."

Staten Views Development

O. L. Staten, president of the First National bank, views the present encouraging business condition as the result of revenue from more diverse interests, much of which have been established during this year. "While cotton is still the major crop, we have also realized considerable returns from poultry and dairy development," he said. "Our bank's business is greater than at any time in history. We believe that 1930 will experience heartening business development."

"It is likely that the low money rate which prevails in the east will react favorably for this section. In my opinion eastern interests will get an outlet and the South Plains should share beneficially in investment which will come to the Southwest."

Deposits Increased

Deposits in Lubbock's three banks at the close of business November 10, aggregated \$5,559,031.55, as compared with a total of \$4,772,160.47 for the same date last year.

Francis Baker, president of the Citizens National bank, refused to entertain questions of newspapermen when approached on the subject, stating that he was too busy.

A building program in the county for 1930 of \$5,796,573 was announced yesterday by city and county officials.

Estimate Made

Responding to a request from Governor Moody, Mayor Harley D. Woods announced that Lubbock contemplates an approximate \$650,000 expenditure for municipal improvements in 1930 and estimated that the building permits for the year will probably reach \$2,100,000.

"While the estimated building valuations for 1930 are much lower than this year's figures, we believe that construction will be substantial enough to assure employment," said Mayor Woods. "We do not contemplate that 1930 will be the peer of 1929 in building permits, because many needs and major projects, such as the Hotel Lubbock and the new Hilton Hotel have been included in this year's valuations."

Subway Included

"Included in the \$650,000 municipal improvements are the new Avenue H subway, now under construction, paving and sewer and water extensions."

Judge Robert H. Bean has outlined a program for 1930 which would necessitate an expenditure of \$2,046,077, including state and federal aid. Announcement was made yesterday that construction of a new federal building in Lubbock now seems certain. The government has accepted the site for the structure. The new federal building will house the Lubbock division of federal court and the postoffice.

Aspermont Doctor Dies Of Injuries In Auto Accident

Physician Found Forty Feet Away From Wrecked Auto by Passing Motorist; Wife Collapses

STAMFORD, Nov. 27.—As the result of injuries received in an automobile accident near Aspermont late last night, Dr. F. V. McKnight, 58, a practicing physician at Aspermont, died about midnight.

The doctor's wrecked automobile was found about 11 o'clock last night by R. W. Newman, about six miles east of Aspermont. The physician was found about forty feet away in a pasture, in an unconscious condition with numerous bruises on the body and several teeth knocked out.

He was carried to Aspermont

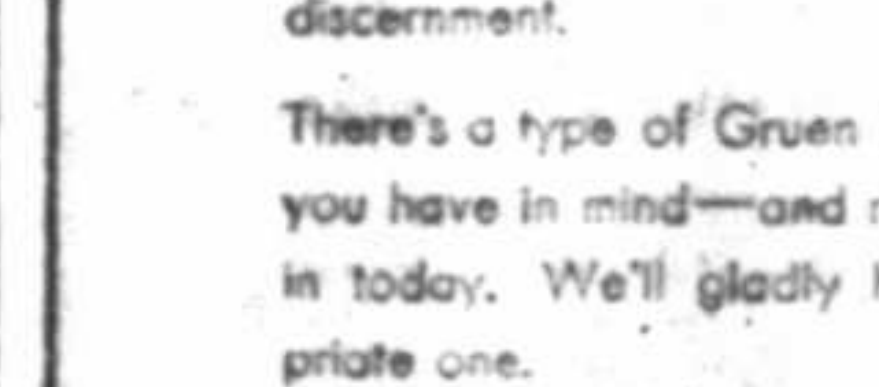

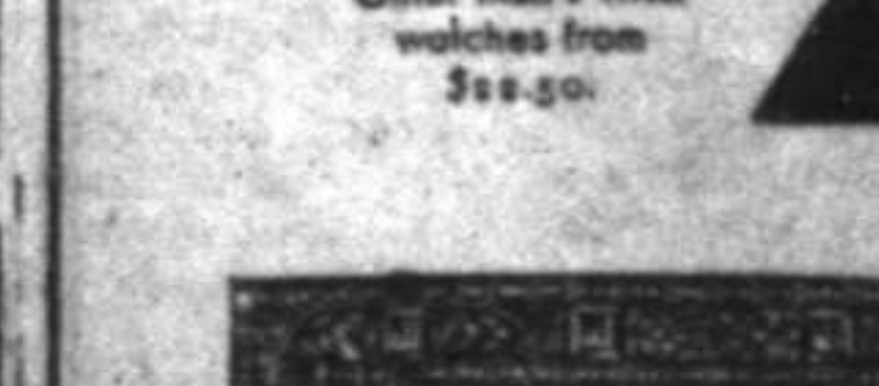

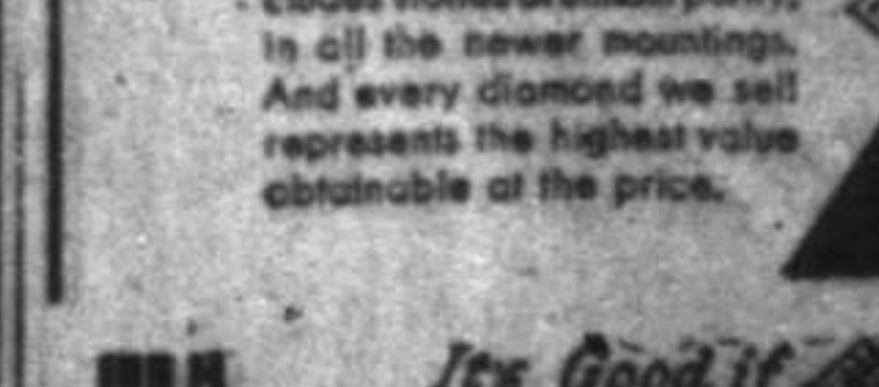

FAITH IN YOUR CITY

THERE are some people in Lubbock who make it a practice to deride the city and to howl hard times. In most instances those people were once in moderate financial circumstances. It seems to us that they should at least be grateful to the city that has not only provided them with a livelihood but has also made them financially independent, so far as their ever being in want is concerned.

If these people are unable to sense the feeling of gratefulness for what Lubbock has done for them, they should realize that it is unbecoming for them to malign the town whenever they get an opportunity, or when opportunities don't present themselves fast enough, to go out of their way to make them. But instead of stowing away their hammers, which would rebound to their own benefit as well as that of the city, strut around in high feather, banging, banging hammers. The result has been that the public—the same public that has helped to increase the average man's bank accounts—is pretty well wearied of hearing the tat-tat-tat of the hammers.

The wise man never knocks, regardless of how bad business may be. He realizes that if he knocks, the hammer will rebound and strike him. Instead of crying about hard times, the only result of which is to make the public tighten its purse strings, he exhales optimism with every breath, so to speak, because he is aware that an optimistic public is a good buying public.

We have faith in Lubbock. Faith is what makes any town grow and we are pleased to say that residents generally have faith in Lubbock. If the knockers don't entertain the same faith, then they should either put up their hammers or get out of town. Lubbock does not want any knockers, regardless of how big their money bags may be.

NOW FOR THE SIDE ROADS
The whole subject of highway construction, is being forced to the fore by the advocates of more low-cost roads. It is a fact that the bulk of highway construction, not naturally, has gone into the so-called high-cost permanent highways of most service to the long distance motorist, or into important radial roads centering in important and densely populated communities.

That is easy to understand. It is also true that highways are built from motor vehicle revenue, and that little less than four-fifths of that revenue (according to the ownership of cars) comes from urban populations.

The reason for the high-cost road on a heavily traveled route is to protect the taxpayers against excessive upkeep. The goal of a low-cost road usually is to become, with widening and better paving, a high-cost road. But it seems that the time has come for the more liberal development of the subsidiary highways, which act in a manner of branch line to the great trunk roads. For one thing, the motorist usually stays on the good paving when, in the case of the tourist, it would be far better for him and for his comprehension of the country in which he lives if he could be diverted through less sophisticated neighborhoods. As everyone knows, the main highway soon loses its individuality and becomes a panorama of unsightly, advertising signs, quick-lunch establishments, fuel stations and other accessories of the tourist business.

It is likely that the problem will work out its own solution. But it is always a mistake to assume that the subsidiary roads can be ignored. The trunk lines are speedways, the branch and subsidiary roads are journeys of experience.

The one great criticism of American politics lately has been that there is little basic difference between the two major parties. Any development that would bring a more clear-cut differentiation would be a thing to be welcomed. Some of the western Republicans are, at present, infinitely farther removed from the administration viewpoint than some eastern Democrats.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

BRITTON SEES NO FREEDOM OF SEAS
FOR FOOD SHIPS OR ANY OTHER TYPE
UNTIL ALL NAVIES ARE SCALED DOWNBy CHARLES P. STEWART
Central Press Staff Writer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—"Freedom of the seas for food ships is just like freedom of the seas for any other ship, no matter what they may happen to be carrying."

"How can freedom of the seas be guaranteed against violation by any sea power with sufficient strength to violate it?"

"Only by treaty."

"And, oh!" said Chairman Fred A. Britton of the House of Representatives' committee on naval affairs, "I'm so skeptical of treaties!"

A treaty's signatories intend to stick to their bargain all right," continued the Chicago congressman, "at the time they agreed to it."

"But when one of them finds itself involved in a life and death struggle, maybe several years later—then what? Perhaps its existence depends on its resort to a policy forbidden by that compact. Is it going down to defeat and national extinction rather than resort to it?—treaty or no treaty."

"It's a blank fool if it does," opined the matter-of-fact naval chairman.

"Preservation is the first law of nature," observed the Illinois representative, "as much for nations as for individuals."

"It supercedes even treaties—consistency—everything."

"Didn't we always stand for freedom of the seas as one of our cardinal principles? You know we did. We fought for it. How we howled when the World War broke out, and the British began to interfere with neutral shipping!"

"Then we went in—and, who more anxious for an airtight blockade of Germany than we were? No navy in the world ever showed less regard for freedom of the seas than ours did. We were not particularly hard pressed, either. It was not a last ditch warfare for us, as it was with Europe. We simply changed our views over night because it suited our convenience."

"Only one thing, in my judgment," said the Chicagoan, "can be relied on to prevent a belligerent country from shutting off its enemy's essential supplies—food supplies or any other sort of supplies—and that is sheer inability to shut them off."

"Freedom of the seas will be attained when no nation on earth has an adequate fleet of armed vessels to dominate the oceans."

"A treaty which is followed directly by a scaling down of navies will mean business. Whether or not the sea powers can agree on one remains to be seen next January—but if they do, and the limits are low enough, it will prove effective."

"If war were to be declared, with the belligerents' signatures still damp on a compact binding them to respect the sanctity of one another's food ships," conceded the naval chairman, "they might feel hesitant to break it so promptly."

"This hesitancy would be pretty sure to wear off, however, in a decade or so."

"A reduction or limitation bargain must put the belligerents' sincerity to an immediate test. Moreover, it would be the kind of a test which it would do them no good to repent of later, their fighting machinery would be definitely sacrificed."

"Yes, I know, navies can be rebuilt," nodded the congressman, "but it takes quite a while to rebuild them—eighteen months to a couple of years, at the least, according to the latest estimates."

"War excitement will not keep that long—while two or three or more countries are getting ready to begin fighting."

"Merchant navigation would be perfectly free in the meantime, because it would not be dependent on any nation's mere promise not to interfere with it. It would have a far better assurance of safety—the prospective belligerents' absolute inability to interfere with it."

Your Health

CHILD OF RICH PARENTS IS APT TO HAVE
A POOR APPETITE

As it has become increasingly apparent that nutrition of the child is probably among the most significant of its characteristics in its relation to health, psychologists, physicians and dietitians are giving more and more attention to the eating habits of the child.

In the first place, studies were made of children from the cities from the farms, from well-to-do homes to the poor.

It was found that 35 per cent of 100 well-to-do children were hungry and well-to-do children had to be urged or coaxed during the entire meal to eat their food. In the country, 63 children out of 100 were found to be hungry at every meal and only 38 had to be urged to eat their food. Among the poorest city children, 86 were found to have a good appetite at every meal and only 14 had to be urged to eat their food.

When a child refuses to eat, the first step, according to Dr. L. J. Roberts, should be an inquiry into his physical condition. The onset of a cold, sore throat or an inflammation of the tonsils or adenoids, constipation or indigestion may cause promptly a lack of desire for food.

Too much eating, too much eating particularly between meals of candy, a diet that contains too much fat or too little vitamin B or other deficiencies and irregularities of the diet may be responsible. Too little time spent outdoors, fatigue, too little sleep or overstimulation by too many dancing lessons, piano lessons and outside activities beyond the school curriculum may be associated with a loss of appetite.

Whenever loss of appetite occurs, there is dawdling over the food, playing around and malnutrition. In most instances psychological factors are far more responsible than physical factors for failure to eat.

The children of the well-to-do in the city had more regular meals with better food, more sleep and outdoor play and better educated mothers than did the children who live in the country or the poor children in the city. Nevertheless, the latter ate with hungry parents and hungry brothers and sisters rather than alone.

They were given little or no attention or distraction while at the table, since their parents were primarily concerned with feeding themselves. They were not urged to eat; the food was put on their plates as a matter of course and they ate it. The child understood that the food was something special and something obtained with considerable difficulty and therefore to be prized rather than merely a method of passing the time.

These less well-favored children were eager for food, while children of well-to-do families considered it something to be avoided.

Anniversary Notes

THANKSGIVING DAY

Today is the 398th anniversary of the celebration of the first plentiful harvest by New England colonists in 1621 near the end of November. This year the holiday falls on November 28.

The first Thanksgiving Day was set aside by Governor Bradford as a day of Thanksgiving and prayer. In 1623, a day of fasting and prayer in the midst of drought was changed into Thanksgiving by the coming of rain during the prayers.

Gradually the custom prevailed of appointing Thanksgiving annually after harvest, on the last Thursday in November. During the Revolution, a day of national Thanksgiving was annually recommended by Congress.

In 1864, President Lincoln appointed a day of Thanksgiving and since then the presidents have issued a Thanksgiving proclamation, designating the last Thursday of the month.

The memory of Thanksgiving Day's origin as a state appointment survives in the proclamations of the governors of the states, which follows that of the president each year.

ELECTION INVESTIGATED

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 27.—The chamber of deputies, engaged in tabulating the presidential vote, today considered a communication sent in by the anti-re-election party claiming that Pascual Ortiz Rubio was not constitutionally qualified to run for president. The anti-re-electionists, whose candidate Dr. Jose Vasconcelos, was defeated, contend Ortiz Rubio had not resided in Mexico for the full year prior to election day in accordance with the law.

Britain Will Aid Russo-China Peace

LONDON, Nov. 27. (P)—Great Britain is prepared to participate with other powers in joint action to bring the Russo-Chinese dispute in Manchuria to a peaceful termination, if such action proves possible.

Foreign Secretary Arthur Henderson made this reply to a question in the House of Commons today. He said he would consider whether Great Britain should take the initiative with the other powers.

Mr. Henderson told Sir Austen Chamberlain, his conservative predecessor at the foreign office, that communications had passed between the American and British governments with reference to the possibility of joint action in Manchuria. The question had been discussed in the early days of November.

"I think that since then no further communication has been received, but I think a communication has come through a telegram from another government, and if joint action can be taken we are prepared to participate."
