## Lorraine Girls Win Bi-District

Lorraine's varsity girls basketball team won over Jayton in Rotan Tuesday night to take the bi-district crown and advance to the regional tournament this weekend in Levelland in the Dome at South Plains College.

Coach Gene Rankin said his team will play Anthony at 4 p.m. Friday to start the regional tourney. Other teams participating will be Nazareth, Garden City, Groom, Fort Davis, Follett and Klondike.

It is a single elimination tourney. Should Lorraine win its game with Anthony, they will play the winner of the game between Nazareth and Garden City at 9:30 a.m. Saturday. The winner of that game will play in the championship game at 6:30 p.m. Saturday against the winner among the other four teams in the tourney.

In the bi-district contest against Jayton, it was a thrilling defensive battle all the way with a capacity crowd cheering every move made by the teams. Lorraine won by a final score of 53-47.

Lorraine moved out to a quick 3-0 lead and it was nip and tuck most of the way in the first quarter with Lorraine leading most of the way. However, as the first quarter came to an end, the ball just wouldn't go through the basket for Lorraine and Jayton caught up and held a

one point lead at the end of the first quarter 13-12.

The Lorraine Bulldogs looked like they were in real trouble in the first part of the second quarter as Jayton opened a five point lead and again, as in the last part of the first quarter, the ball just wouldn't go in the bucket for the Bulldogs. Time after time, the ball rolled around the rim and out.

However, midway through the second quarter, Lorraine started hitting again and following several steals, they caught up with Jayton and as the half ended Susan Mahon sank a 12-foot shot to give Lorraine a two point lead at the half, 25-23.

However, Lorraine fans, drained by the fast action and excitement, were fretting because all three of Lorraine's forwards were in foul trouble.

By the end of the first half, Jackie Rose had three fouls, Susan Mahon and Terrisa Brewer each had two. However, one Jayton

player also had three fouls and almost every other Jayton player had two fouls each.

When the second half started, Lorraine quickly extended their lead to seven points before Jayton could even get a shot off. From that point on, Lorraine held off, stalling, stealing the ball from Jayton and only going to the basket when it looked like Jayton was about to catch up.

However, as the fourth quarter ended, with three Jayton girls fouled out, the Lady Jays closed to within one point of Lorraine before Jackie Rose, Terrisa Brewer and Susan Mahon each sank four shots to put the game out of reach for Jayton with only seconds to go.

Play in the second half for Lorraine seemed to be the secret to success as it was in the district play-off game against Roby. The Lorraine girls avoided foul trouble and they seemed to loosen up as they assumed complete control of the game.

The Lorraine guards, Brenda Oliver, Sandra Rose and Dora Garcia, played an exceptional game as they forced mistakes by the Jay-

ton girls, stole the ball a number of times and out rebounded Jayton.

Top scorer for Lorraine was Jackie Rose with 24 points of which 10 were on free throws. Terrisa Brewer had 14 and Susan Mahon, 15.

The winner in the regional tourney will play in the state finals next weekend in Austin.

## Producer Finaled

The Beal's Creek (Wichita-Albany) Field in southern Mitchell County gained its second well and a location southwest extension with completion of Dorchester Exploration Inc. of Midland's No. 4-A Spade.

It finaled to pump 10 barrels of 29.2 gravity oil and nine barrels of water per day.

Production was through perforations at 3,602-12 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons.

Slated as a wildcat, it was drilled to 4,060 feet and plugged back to 3,644 feet with 4 1/2 inch casing set at 4,046 feet.

Location is 2,200 feet from north and 1,700 feet from east lines of Section 11, Block 18, S&P Survey, 25 miles southwest of Colorado City.

## County, City Get Tax Checks

The city and county have both received checks from the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office for their share of the mixed drink tax for the October-December quarter of 1975.

Of \$1,960.12 collected as total county tax revenue, the county's 15 per cent remittance was \$294.02.

The city total tax revenue was \$1,642.22 and the city's 15 per cent remittance amounted to \$246.33.

## EMT School To Be Here

Arrangements are still being completed but it looks like Colorado City's Wallace Center will be the site for an Emergency Medical Technician training school beginning April 1 or before.

Mitchell County Judge Bill Carter has been contacted by Homer K. Taylor, manager of instruction at Texas State Technical Institute (TSTI) in Sweetwater, that the Sweetwater school will conduct the courses required for certifying ambulance drivers and the course will be held in Colorado City.

Tuition for the 80-hour course will be about \$40, Carter said, and there are other groups interested in taking the course besides the ambulance drivers.

"The ambulance drivers, Colorado City Volunteer Firemen and Lorraine Volunteer Firemen, as well as a group from Robert Lee and maybe some others" are the groups of people Carter outlined as interested in taking the EMT course.

"The Snyder and Scurry County groups originally interested in such a course have now withdrawn from the EMSS and so they won't be interested in taking the course. We had hoped earlier in the planning that Western Texas College at Snyder might conduct the course either here on the Wallace extension campus or in Snyder but when the Snyder-Scurry County people decided not to take part in the program, then we looked elsewhere for the course and TSTI was just delighted to help us out. Cisco Junior College also has held the courses in the past and we talked some with their representatives, but when we found out that the Sweetwater technical school would come here so that our people won't have much driving to do, we made the decision to get TSTI behind the program here," Carter said.

Mitchell County Ambulance Service was set up by the city, county and hospital district, each entity contributing money and personnel to drive the ambulance.

Then, in order to be approved for a state-federal grant which would pay half the cost of a new van type ambulance and new equipment for both the ambulances, the local ambulance service had to meet the requirement that personnel be trained through the EMT

An Odessa man was injured in a jet boat accident at Lake Colorado City Sunday afternoon when he fell out of the boat and it ran over him.

A phone call from the State Park informed the Colorado City Police Department of the accident and he was taken to Root Memorial Hospital for treatment by Mitchell County Ambulance Service.

Injured was Bill B. Hudgins of 1811 W. 1st in Odessa. His wife told law enforcement officers that he was also a heart patient. He was treated and released at the hospital.

The accident occurred in the vicinity of the beach and boat ramp area at the State Park.

Garcia is being held in Mitchell County Jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond.

Hernandez was shot about 10 p.m. and the arrest was made at 10:41.

Services were held Monday afternoon at First United Methodist Church, the Rev. Bob Ford, pastor, officiating.

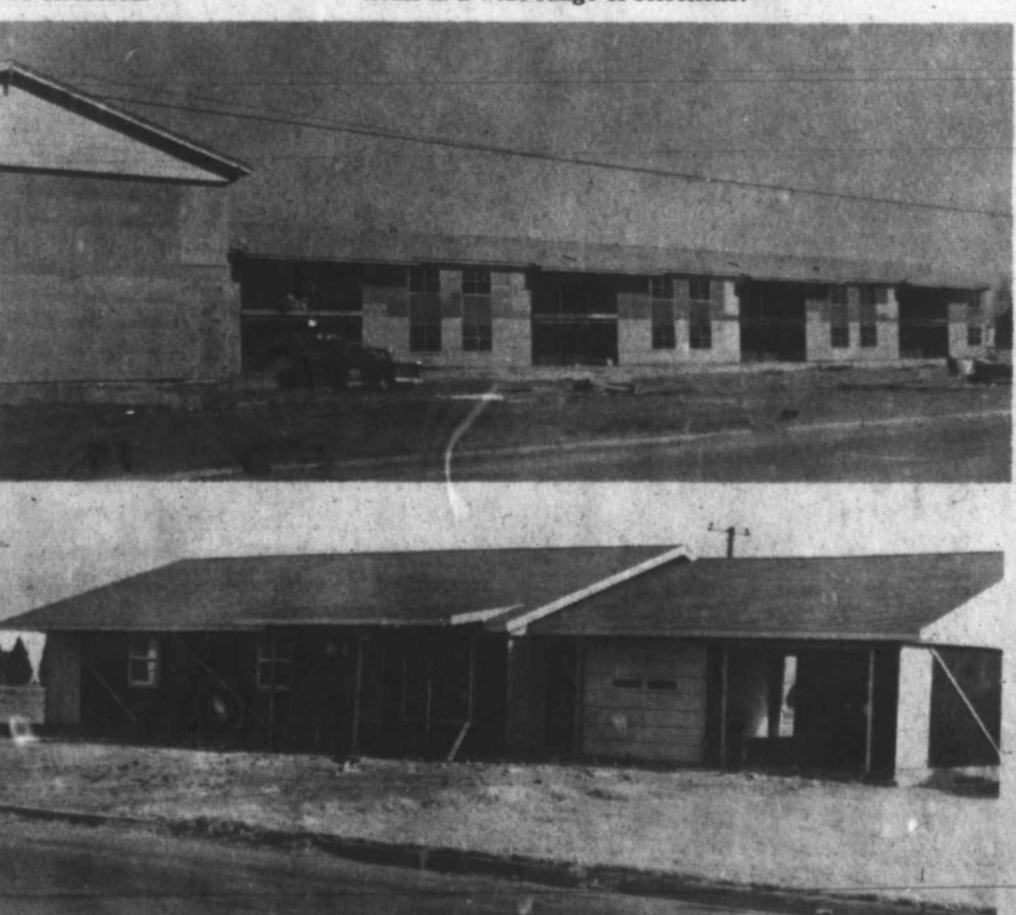
Burial was in Foster Cemetery near Sterling City under the direction of Kiker-Seale Funeral Home.

## Suit Filed In District Court

Suit has been filed in 32nd District Court in Mitchell County by Mildred Rose of Lorraine against David P. Marion and Farmers Home Administration and request filed for issuing a temporary restraining order prohibiting the sale of Mrs. Rose's land.

Information in the petition states that Mildred Rose is temporary administratrix of the estate of her deceased husband Morgan Rose and that Marion, acting as trustee, did not post public notices in three public places in the county 21 days prior to the date of a designated sale of the property.

According to the petition, a Deed of Trust sale had been proposed for Feb. 3 of the 160 acres Mrs. Rose states is her homestead in Mitchell County.

The petition was filed Jan. 30 by Mrs. Rose's attorney, Dell Barber, and also claims that the sale of her property would cause her "irreparable injury and damage for which there is no adequate remedy at law in view of the fact that the defendant is an arm of the Federal Government and cannot be sued for damages."

Plaintiff also claims that Marion was not legally appointed substitute trustee of the property.

History of the case states that Morgan Rose and wife Mildred were farm workers by the day without any land of their own and later became tenant farmers, from 1949 until 1963 farming on a one-third and one-fourth basis on various farms located in Mitchell County.

In 1963, they were parents of 10 children and were unable to borrow money from any other agency or individual other than the Farmers Home Administration, from which administration they had been procuring the money to tenant farm for approximately 25 years, but in view of the large family and the drought from 1950 to 1967 in Mitchell County, they had not been able to obtain sufficient funds so they could borrow money from banks or individuals and in 1963 the defendant loaned Morgan Rose and wife Mildred sufficient money to purchase the 160

acres of land upon which they moved and began farming until the latter part of 1974 at which time Mildred Rose and family continued to live on such farm but leased it out to various parties and delivered the money to the defendant for such lease, but Mildred Rose along with the children still at home occupy the same property as their homestead.

Petition further states that after her husband's death she has been unable to keep the payments upon the farm, but that \$4,585 was paid Jan. 31, 1974, \$560.75 paid Feb. 12, 1974 and \$1,800 was paid to her for the cash lease of 1974 on the place, making a total of \$6,945.75 which was paid in 1974.

"The place was rented on a 1/4ths basis for 1975 and the rent was promised to defendant but the cotton has not been sold and delivered as yet," case history states.

The children of Morgan and Mildred Rose are listed as follows:

-Clint Rose, 31, graduated from Wallace High School in 1962. He then joined the Air Force and served four years. Was then employed by General Dynamics in Fort Worth. He is now married and has one child. He lives in Fort Worth and owns his own home. He is currently working as a manager at J. C. Penney's in Dallas. He attended Bradley Droughn College in Fort Worth.

-Sidney Rose, 30, graduated from Wallace High School in 1962. He joined the Air Force and was in the service for four years. He worked at various jobs and is now employed as a mail carrier in Arlington. He is married, has one child and lives in Fort Worth.

-Shirley Rose Jossell, 25, graduated in 1968 from Lorraine High School. She attended Commercial College in Fort Worth and is now married and has one child, working for the manager at Sears in Chicago.

-Sherry Rose, 23, graduated in 1969 from Lorraine High School. She attended Bradley Droughn College in Fort Worth and is now

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program and certified as EMTs.

Judge Carter said that it is probably just a matter of time until all the ambulance services will have to comply with the regulation and in the meantime, the TSTI training course will certify local personnel.

Ambulance driving is now handled by the off-duty policemen with the county and hospital district contributing more money to help with salaries through the ambulance service itself.

The local ambulance service began operating in May, 1974, and the new system of centralizing drivers and phone calls to the police department began the first of this year. Police Dispatcher Gloria Erwin has been the book-keeper for the service since it began operations.

Members of Mitchell County Ambulance Service board of directors are Paul Hunter, representing the county; Dr. Elton Berkman now the city's representative succeeding Eddie P.iland, and hospital district representative Wayne Shawn.

The county-city hospital district set-up has drawn attention from throughout the state as an ideal cooperative effort and inquiries continue to come to Judge Carter about the way it was done.

Judge Carter was set to speak about the service and serve on a panel during the recent state convention of county commissioners courts at A&M but ill health kept him from attending and Hunter presented the talk.

Since then, the Knox County judge has made inquiries and expressed an interest in making a tour of the local set-up.

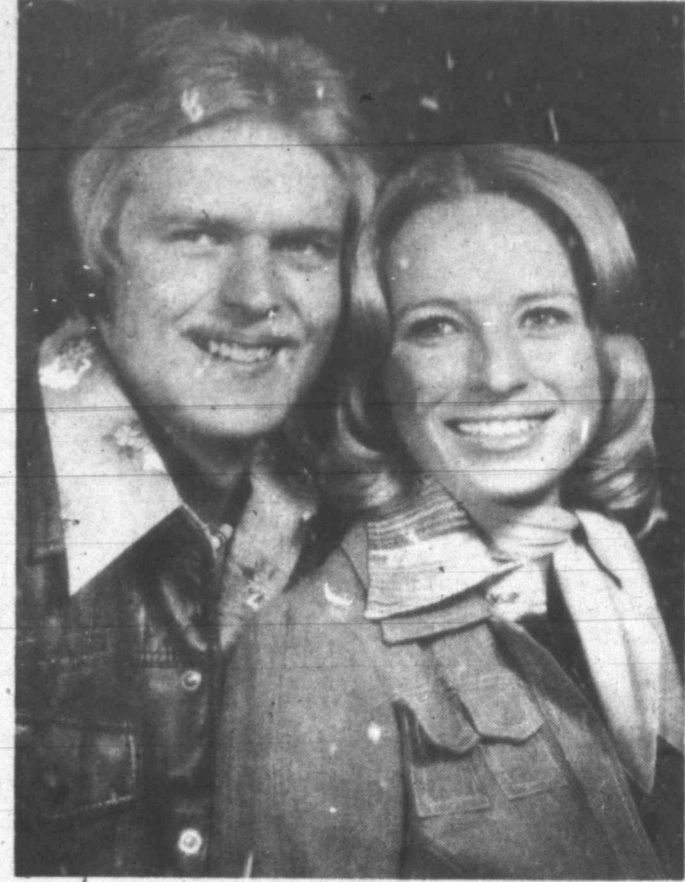

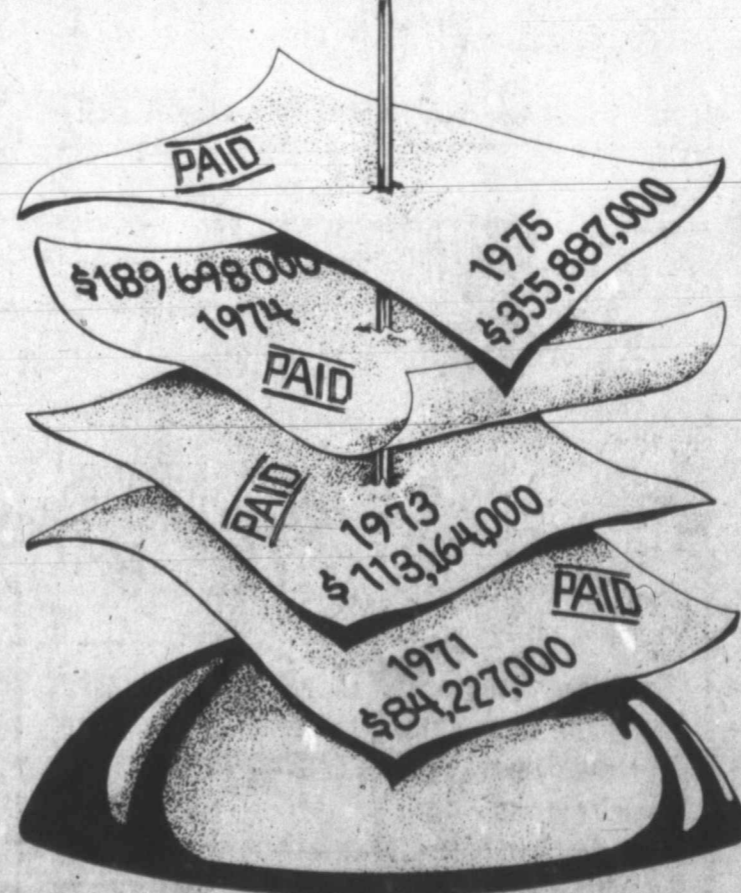

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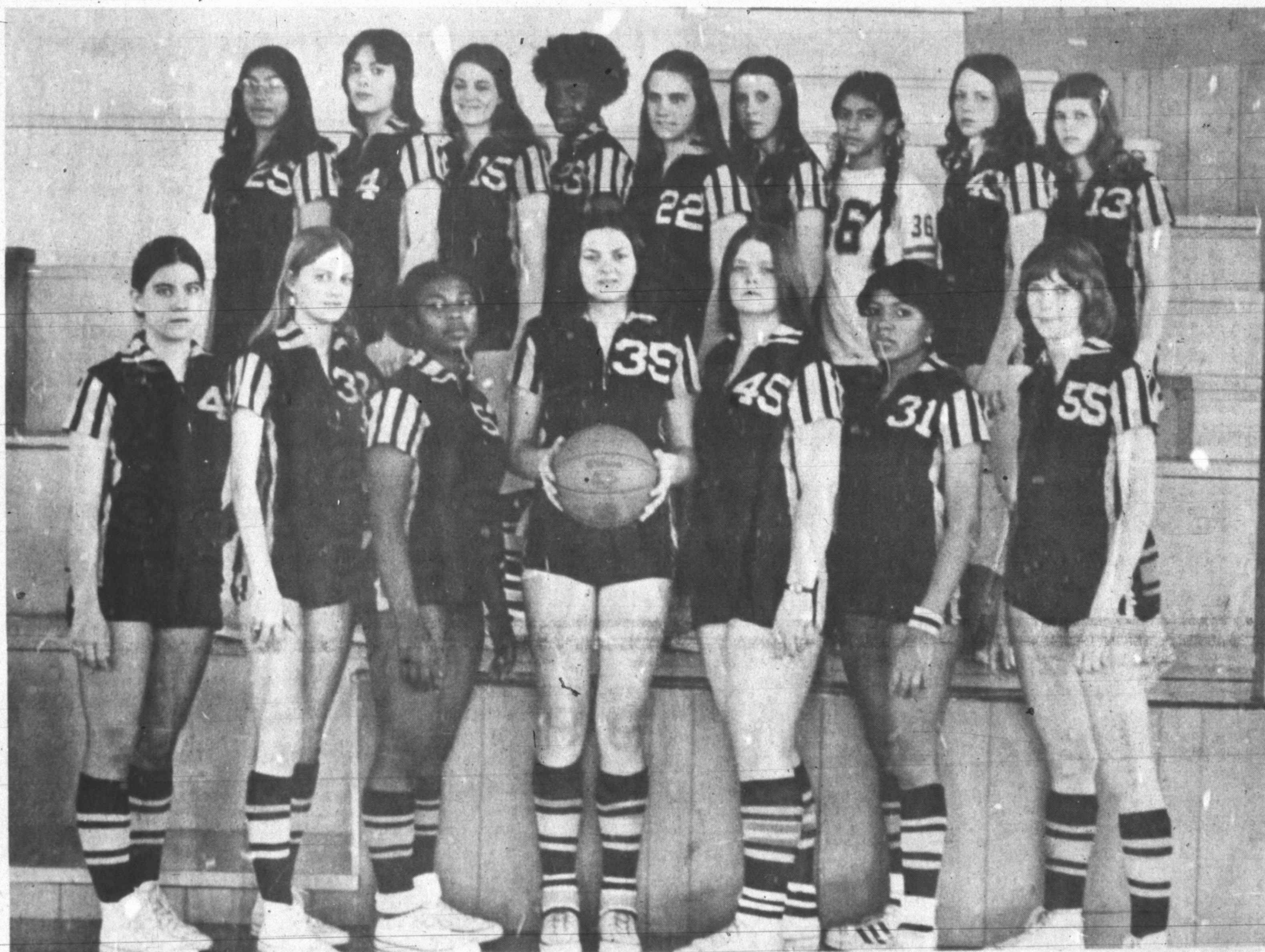

## Garden Club Sponsors Ecology Poster Contest

The topic of the poster must be "Trees Today-For Life Tomorrow." Although the poster may be painted (water color, crayolas, map pencil, or poster paint), collage, cutout pictures of construction paper, newspaper, magazine, or bulletin. A

single cutout picture is not acceptable. The size of the poster must be 14"x22". Four classifications determine eligibility: Class 1-grades 1 and 2, Class 2-grades 3 and 4, Class 3-grades 5 and 6, and Class 4-grades 7 and 8.

Posters must be the work of the contestant. Name, address, school grade, name of school, Colorado City Garden Club, president, Mrs. Robert Chambers, 716 E. 11th, Colorado City must be on the reverse side of the poster.

Three judges from the fields of art, conservation

and youth activities will judge the posters on the following criteria: Story told by poster-60 points; originality-20 points; quality of craftsmanship-10 points; neatness-10 points; total 100 points.

Posters will be picked for judging February 26. A prize of \$5 will be given for first place winner in each of the four classes. Cash awards will be determined by District for 1st, 2nd and 3rd in each classification. State cash awards are as follows: \$10 for 1st; \$5 for 2nd; and \$3 for 3rd.

The deadline for the posters is Feb. 26.

## Kite Flying Safety Rules

Kite flying season is here again, and Texas Electric Service Co. urges young kite flyers to follow a few simple rules for their own safety. B. B. Hardee, TESCO manager, warns of the danger of flying kites in the vicinity of electric power lines.

"If your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Co.," Hardee says, "and someone will be sent to get it down for you."

He also recommends the following safety rules for kite flying:

- Always use dry string, not wire, anything metallic or any string with metallic threads.
- Always use kites made of wood and paper, not wire or metal.

-Don't fly your kite on rainy days.

-Always avoid busy streets and highways while flying your kite.

-Don't pull on the string or climb a power pole to loosen a kite snagged in electric wires.

-Always fly your kite far from electric or power lines.

-Always fly your kite away from TV and radio antennas.

"Posters containing these safety rules have been distributed by the company to all schools," Hardee said. "Young people following these rules will get more fun out of flying kites and at the same time will keep from getting hurt or losing their kites."

## February Is Heart Fund Month In Colorado City

There are over a million reasons to give to the Heart Fund: More than a million of us will die from some form of heart or blood vessel disease this year.

-Only 25 years ago, a heart attack victim's chances for survival were poor. Today, coronary care units with round-the-clock monitoring systems have demonstrated that in-hospital deaths from heart attack can be reduced by 30 per cent.

-Certain abnormal heart rhythms now can be corrected by implanting electronic pacemakers.

-Some types of strokes can be anticipated and prevented. Along with special diagnostic techniques, surgeons can either clean out blocked arteries or replace them with synthetic substitutes.

Research must continue to move ahead and provide more answers and cures for heart disease. Beyond the immediate goal of curing those now suffering from heart and blood vessel diseases, the long-range goal of the American Heart Association is prevention.

With prevention as the keynote of research efforts, scientists can look to preventive cardiology as a means of protecting our hearts in the future. You can help make this goal a reality for you and your loved ones by generously supporting your local Heart Fund.

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
