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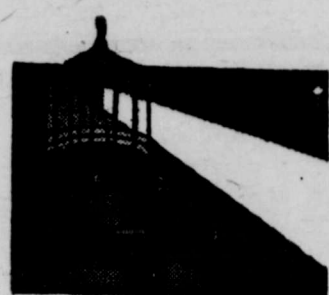
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On The BEAM

F.F.A. Junior Farm Skill Team Won First Place In Area 2 Contest

The Junior Farm Skill team of the Loraine F. F. A. chapter placed first in the Area 2 F. F. A. leadership contest held at Big Spring High School Saturday, December 7.

This qualified the team to participate in the State F. F. A. Invitational Leadership Contest December 14, at Sam Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville.

This is the first time that the local chapter has qualified for the state contest although they have placed second, or third each year in the Area contest.

Only the first place winners are eligible to participate in the state contest.

The Loraine team, using a demonstration on testing plants for nutrient deficiency by the tissue method, won over a field of strong contenders. The team, composed of Stanley Martin, A. D. Simon and Joe Edwards, scored a total of 967 points out of a possible 1000. Second was Brownfield with 962; Anson was third with 954, and Big Lake fourth with 950.

The Loraine Senior Farm Skill team also participated in the Area contest and placed third. Brownfield placed first and Anson second. Members of the Loraine team were Darrell Owen, Ronald Haley, and Don Templeton.

The teams in the contest at Big Spring had previously qualified by winning similar contests on a district level.

Members of the Junior Farm Skill team will be accompanied to Huntsville by Raymond Holt, F. F. A. Advisor and coach of the team. They will stop at Texas A&M College on the way to Huntsville to study some of the agriculture practices at the college. The team will be competing for state honors at the statewide meet in Huntsville on Saturday, December 14.

1958 ACREAGE RESERVE

The County ASC office announced recently that a limit of \$3,000 per person per farm will be applicable to all 1958 acreage reserve agreements (wheat and cotton). For a farmer to participate in the 1958 AR program, a Soil Bank Base must be established for each farm.

Those farmers who are not in the Conservation Reserve (feedland or 5 year program) and plan on placing cotton in the Soil Bank next year, are asked to give the information to the ASC office so that a base may be established.

Cotton Growers Receive Acreage Allotments For 1958 Crop Year

Mitchell County growers will receive official notice of their 1958 farm acreage allotments for cotton in the next few days. The notices are now being mailed by the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, it was announced last week.

Cotton acreage allotments for Mitchell County farms have been determined by the County ASC Committee in accordance with the law and the regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. They are based upon the national total of 17,554,528 acres available for establishing upland cotton farm allotments for 1958.

The national total is first apportioned among states and the State allotments among counties. The county allotments are then distributed among farms on which cotton was planted in any of the past 3 years, with a small acreage reserved for specified uses.

Farmers who do not intend to operate a farm for which a 1958 cotton allotment is established should immediately return the official notice to the County ASC office so that it can be sent to the person who will operate the farm next year. Cotton allotments are established for specific farms and may not be transferred by the operator or other producer from one farm to another.

Any changes in the land to be included in the farm for which the allotment is made should be reported to the County ASC Committee. Farm operators likewise are asked to check with the County ASC office regarding any other question about the farm on which the allotment is established.

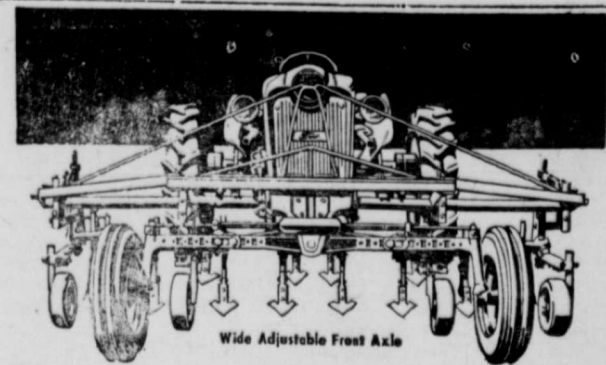

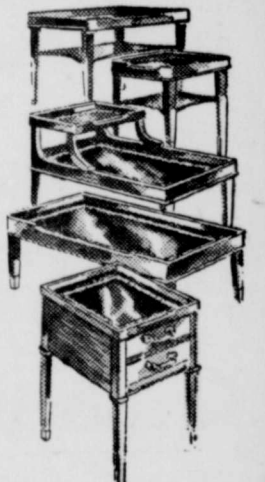

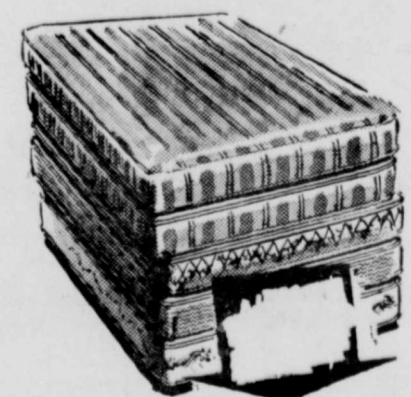
