SANTA FE LINE TO PANHANDLE

ALSO TALK OF DENVER ROAD FROM CHILDRESS THROUGH PAMPA THROUGH WHEELER TO SPEARMAN

The following articles concerning railroad development in the Panhandle that are of much interest to this county appeared in recent issues of the Amarillo News. Either one of these proposed routes would give Ochiltree County a Texas outlet for our big grain shipments and would have our farmers thousands of dollars every year, which they now pay out in interstate freight shipments.

"A Santa Fe line from Panhandle through the oil fields to Spearman, serving that vast territory with rail facilities looms as a possibility. Surveyors and engineers are now locating a proposed route from the two cities. One of the routes surveyors have selected is down Dixon creek crossing the Canadian river near the mouth of the creek.

Santa Fe officials are non-committal but they will not deny that engineers and surveyors are in the field and their survey is being made in the greatest possible haste.

"PAMPA, Feb. 6.—The Fort Worth and Denver railroads surveying crew is at work on a line from Childress, through Wheeler, and Pampa to Spearman, according to reports here today.

The crew is said to be at work seven miles north of this city and is running a line northwest to the Canadian river, with the reported intent of crossing that stream on the west side of Tallehone creek.

This line is said to run from Mobeetie and will go to Spearman, and if built will connect with the Denver's main line at Childress, passing thru Collingsworth, Wheeler, Gray and Roberts counties.

The first preliminary survey made by the Denver was out of Childress through Wheeler county and Hemphill and on to Booker on the Santa Fe Spearman branch. While it is yet only in prospect, little doubt is held by people of this part of the country that Denver road intends to apply for a permit to build a road from Childress or some point on their line across Wheeler and other counties adjacent which are not adequately served with rail lines."

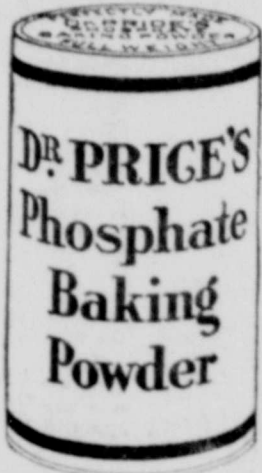

PRIZES OFFERED FOR BEST FARM RADIO LETTERS

"What Radio Means in Our Farm Home" is the subject of a contest among farm radio listeners which has just been announced by the Sears Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, Dallas. Ten prizes totaling \$100 are offered for the best farm radio letters, to be divided as follows: first, \$25; second, \$15; third, fourth, fifth and sixth, \$10 each; and seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth, \$5 each. The letters are limited to 500 words.

Judges who will select the winning letters in the competition are: Frank Briggs, editor of Farm and Ranch; Eugene Butler, Editor of Progressive Farmer; and O. M. Lowry, editor of the Texas Farm Bureau News. All letters must be post-marked not later than midnight, February 14, the closing date of the contest. They may be addressed to Contest Editor, R. F. D. Club, Station WFAA, Dallas.

"Letters submitted in the contest should give concise reasons, based on personal experience, on what radio means in the farm home," stated A. K. Short, chief of the foundation, in announcing the contest. "What is wanted are plain statements of facts on the farm radio that anyone on the farm knows who has had experience with the invention."

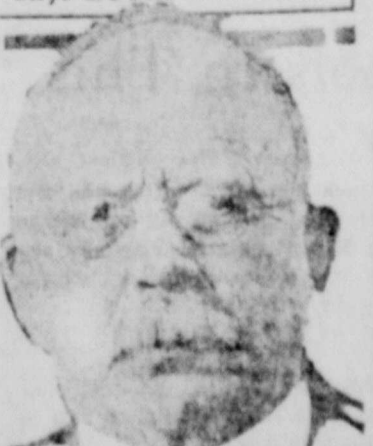

CHEVROLET MOTOR CO. TRIPLES PRODUCTION

Detroit, Mich. Feb. 10, 1926—An unprecedented winter demand for Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks necessitated a production last month nearly three times that of January 1925. It is announced by W. S. Knudsen, president and general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company.

The January production was more than 44,000, which eclipses any previous January production in Chevrolet history. Under the tentative February production schedule, the company will build more than 51,000 units or nearly twice the number produced in the corresponding month of last year.

The heavy winter production is the result of demand which Chevrolet buyers have made upon the company dealers since the announcement by President Knudsen of reduced prices and numerous improvements on the entire Chevrolet line.

Instead of storing reserve stocks against the requirements of spring business, the dealers report that they are delivering immediately their shipment of cars to waiting buyers.

Last year the Chevrolet Motor Company led all manufacturers of three-speed sliding-transmission cars by building more than 500,000 units. According to present plans, President Knudsen expects to exceed the 1925 record by a comfortable margin.

COW GIVES BIRTH TO FOUR LIVING CALVES

On July 2, 1925, a purebred Holstein cow, owned by W. E. Lawson of Hayfield, Manitoba, Canada, gave birth to four normal living calves three of whom were heifers and the fourth a bull calf. The bull calf weighed 72½ lbs. and the heifer calves 60½, 63 and 59½ lbs., or a total weight of 255½ lbs. At the present time, the mother and calves are all in good health. On March 19, 1924 this same cow gave birth to a bull calf and for a period of 353 days, which was her location period from March 1924, she gave 19,215 lbs. of milk testing 3.47%. Her record was made under the supervision of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

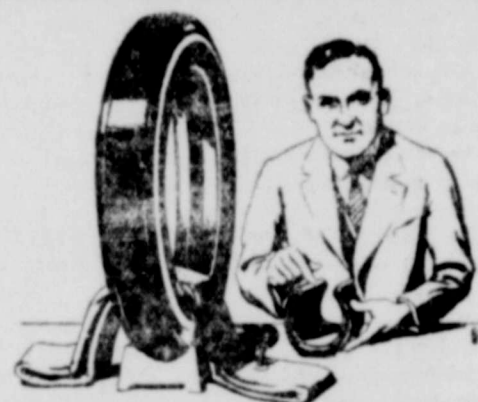

SLEEP

Physiologists know that reptiles go on only during sleep, that is, the transformation of inert matter (food) into living, active tissue. Physicians know that if sleep is interfered with in an inopportune manner, the human machine will run down in exact proportion to the violation indulged.

But, man is by nature, has ever been, will ever be—a rebel. He does not like to bow the knee, even though longer and healthier life is the reward for so doing. He eats his heaviest meal at the onset of evening, when digestion is retreating for the day. He works his brain, after one manner or another until midnight or even later. There are clubs, lodges, meetings of the "board", smokers, theatres. After these he is "dead to the world" until barely time to rush into his garments and hurry breakfastless, to the office. After a season, he finds that he awakens less readily—he buys an alarm-clock. This raucous device literally jerks him out of bed, more tired than when he went to sleep. He becomes stupid in the office, gets "dizzy spells" and finally consults the doctor. Yes, he has high blood-pressure, far above normal! The diagnosis, overwork! The warning that an out-door vacation is imperative, else the crash will come. Reluctantly the ten-day country life is undertaken—the simpler life. Relief is prompt as a rule—he gets better, and goes directly back to the violations of right living that made him sick! Too often he pays the penalty with his life, before the age of sixty!

Then we say he died of overwork. The facts are, that work intelligently followed out, is tonic, healthful, and never harmful. The perversion of night into day is a violation of the law of right living, that is sure to draw its penalty with unerring exactness.

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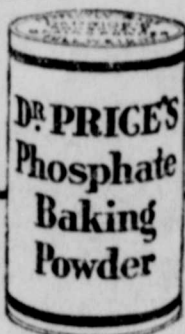

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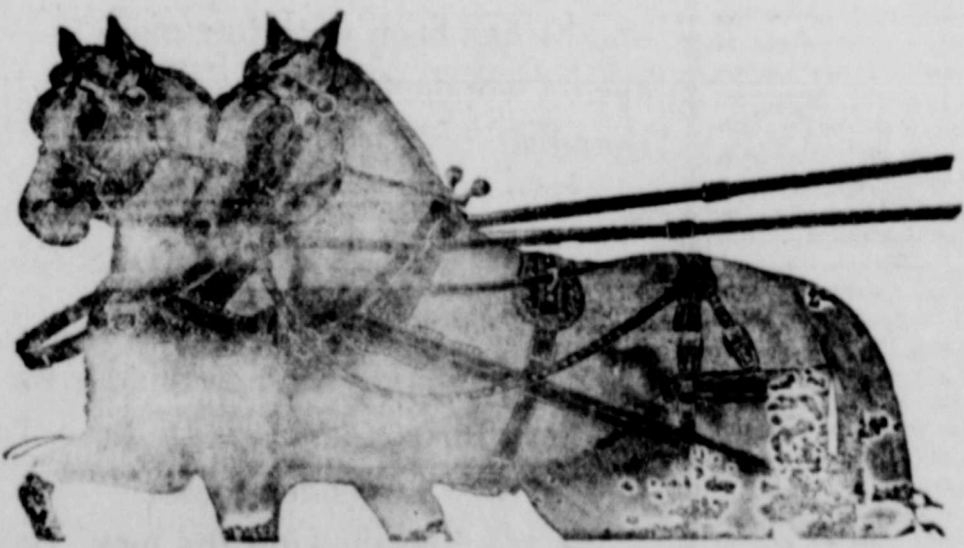

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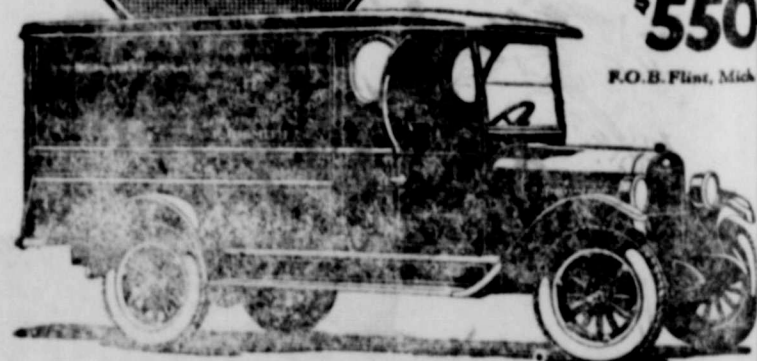
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
