Supplemental irrigation is proving its worth this year and we believe it will continue to do so in the future. It is an expensive proposition and will have to be handled with care in order to show a profit from it. We believe that after farmers learn how and what to irrigate for the most profit in this section there will be a lot more irrigation. It proves profitable to irrigate cotton then we will be assured a fair cotton crop every year. If it proves unprofitable to grow cotton under irrigation then we will have to experiment with other crops to find what is profitable.

County People Get \$7000 Monthly S. S.

Mothers and children in Mitchell County were getting 29% of the \$7,538 monthly total in social security insurance benefits being paid in the county at the end of 1953. Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of the Abilene social security office, announced today. Total payments to children in this county were \$1,585 for the month of December. In the nation as a whole, over one million children were getting a total of about \$32½ million in monthly payments at the end of 1953. Nationwide, over a quarter of a million widowed mothers were paid a total of over \$9½ million in December.

The largest group of beneficiaries under the social security insurance program, however, continues to be retired workers, Fisher said. In December 112 such beneficiaries in Mitchell County were paid a total of \$4,134. This was an increase of \$1,155 over December, 1952. Nation-wide, the increase in retired worker beneficiaries was \$78,416, and the monthly payments to them increased from \$130,217,439 to \$164,659,061 in the same period.

Fisher said that many of us are inclined to think of old-age and survivors insurance under the social security system as a program for retired workers and their dependents exclusively. As the figures relating to mothers and children indicate, however, survivors benefits are an important part of the program, too.

Other beneficiaries on the rolls in Mitchell County are wives and aged dependent husbands if retired insured workers, aged widows and dependent widowers of deceased workers, and dependent parents who are receiving survivors benefits. The total of all beneficiaries in Mitchell County receiving monthly benefit payments at the end of 1953 was 227, Fisher said. The total amount being paid in the county as of December, 1953, was 25% more than a year before, and 72% more than two years before.

For the sixteen-county area served by the Abilene Social Security office, the increase was 40% over two years before. Payments of \$249,107 were sent out in December 1953 to 7,055 persons in the 16 counties. This represents an annual total of about three million dollars in the 16 county-area.

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Home Ec. Girls Make Educational Trip

The homemaking girls who have been taking summer work week to Lubbock Monday for an educational tour of the city, Misses Homsey, Templeton, Thompson, Williams and Orbery Ray Linder accompanied them.

The group left Lorraine at 5:30 and arrived at Texas Tech about 8 o'clock. They went directly to the Tech Student Union building to refresh themselves after the long ride. The girls were quite impressed with the interior of this building which is strictly modern in furnishings and architecture. Leaving the Student Union building the group went to view the girls' dormitories, home management house, Casa Linda and the home economics building. The girls were greeted by the Dean of Home Economics and their Area Supervisor, Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, in the foyer of the home economics building. They visited all the areas of the division, clothing labs (both the textile testing lab and construction lab), food and nutrition units, home nursing, family relations, home furnishings, home management, child development, interior design, hand weaving and arts and crafts. They were invited into one of the crafts classes where students were working with metal plastics, leather, glove construction, silk screen painting, furniture and accessory construction. They were highly impressed with the furniture and accessories that were made from wire and wrought iron. From the home economics building they went to the museum. The museum has collections on three floor levels. In the basement the girls viewed and went into an actual log cabin which was built and furnished just as the early pioneers lived in. There were collections of early wagons, buggies, plows, the first McCormick reaper, 4 rooms furnished as they were in our early Southern Plantations, doll collections, early costumes, Indian collections and displays of all the Southern tribes.

On the first floor displays, maps, charts were seen on farm life, ranch life, town, urban and city life. A rather large and interesting section was viewed on oil, showing charts and displays of the various oil fields in Texas and their depth, source and area. The second floor was chiefly arts and science. The main display for the week was bridges. The science section was very interesting to the third year girls because they found displays of many things they had covered in their work in the classroom. The girls left this building to view the girls' dormitories and Engineering buildings on down to the Textile building. In the textile building they saw the steps in constructing materials from the carding of the cotton to the weaving of thread into materials. They saw how plain twill, basket and jacquard weaving is done. From the textile building they went to view the chemistry, agriculture, administration and the library buildings. They saw how books were used that were on reserve and how to find books in the card files.

Noon took them to Underwoods restaurant for a barbecue lunch. After they had eaten, they went to the Avalanche Journal where the students were able to see the very latest in news collection and publication. They actually viewed the type setting and publication of the evening paper. Tired, aching feet and weary faces were then turned to the park for a swim and other relaxation before returning home. Time didn't permit visiting of the bakery, Coca-Cola plant and packing house as they had planned to do.

Lions Hear About Irrigation Practices

The local Lions Club heard a very interesting discussion of irrigation, soil building and fertilizing at its meeting Tuesday when H. E. Mitchell, soil specialist with the Soil Conservation Service spoke of the benefits of irrigation, and also the harm it can do the land if it is not properly taken care of.

Mr. Mitchell discussed nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium and their importance relating to land. He pointed out that phosphorus should be added to the land before the crop is established and nitrogen after the crops are established.

His talk would be beneficial to all who are practicing irrigation in this area as the practice is new here and there are many things to be learned about it.

P. C. Wylie, who has been with the Soil Conservation Service in Mitchell County for several years, introduced the speaker and also introduced Harold Stevens, who is replacing Wylie here. Wylie is being sent to Henrietta.

Irrigation is rapidly becoming a big thing in this territory and the Lions Club wants to do all it can to help with the practice for after all it is the farming and ranching here that feeds our town.

Hints From Home Ec. Dept.

Rub butter over scratches in your furniture and it will bring the color back like magic.

Sew old jar rubbers on the bottom side of scattering rugs to keep them from slipping on polished floors.

Scratches on walnut furniture may be removed by rubbing with iodine. To remove the iodine stains from your fingers, mix a tablespoon of lemon juice in a cup of hot water and the solution will take the stain off.

To prevent pictures that hang on the wall from leaving unsightly marks, place rubber-headed tacks on the back of the frame, one on each side at the bottom.

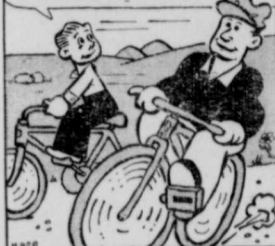

FLOODS AND DROUGHT

Two natural disasters loomed over Texas in the closing days of June; one struck with dramatic swiftness, the second was paying a return visit.

It is a fantastic "joke" that Texas can be plagued with floods and drought at the same time—and often within a few miles of each other. That is what happened last month.

The devastating floods at La Mesa, Ozona and along the Rio Grande, resulting in tragic loss of lives and property, captured the newspaper headlines. But at the same time, farmers and ranchers in many parts of Central and West Texas began to feel the now familiar effects of a lack of water. The aftermath of both disasters will linger for a long time.

Despite recent rains in many areas of Texas, drought conditions are approaching the critical stage in a number of Central and Southern counties. Feed crops and pastures are deteriorating as strong winds and a blazing sun delete the soil moisture.

Typical of these drought-ridden areas in McCulloch County is located in the geographic center of the state. A farm and ranch center, its county seat is Brady. Rural residents make up about 50 per cent of the total population and most of its economy is based on agriculture.

The moisture situation is grave. Less than five inches of rain has fallen in McCulloch so far this year, and only a total of seven inches has been received since last October. This in a county whose normal rainfall is 24.94 annually.

The fields of cotton, grain sorghums, oats, corn, and forage crops along the Colorado River valley, Brady Creek and San Saba valley are suffering. Pastureland which makes up most of the remainder of the county is also in poor shape. As a result an appeal has been made to Austin and the Federal Government urging that immediate

steps be taken to have the government feed program reinstated before more of the county's seriously depleted livestock has to be sacrificed.

Aid has been requested from federal authorities and Texas agricultural leaders are forming plans of action. From all indications, the drought can be a real problem in the state again this year.

Questions and Answers

Q. I still am in school under the World War 2 GI Bill. I want to know whether I will be allowed to change my course, even though my cut-off date has passed. I've been doing well in my studies, but I feel I am in the wrong field.

A. Under law, it is possible to change your course if the new course would be more in keeping with your aptitudes, previous training and experience. You will need VA's approval before you make the change.

Q. I am the widow of a World War 1 veteran and I am supporting a child under 18 years of age. My salary has just been raised to the point where I no longer will be eligible for a VA pension. Could a pension be paid in behalf of my child?

A. Yes. So long as your child's annual income does not exceed the legal maximum, he will be eligible for pension payments in his own right. The payments will begin as of the day following the date of your last payment.

Q. Is there any time limit on filing a claim for reimbursement of burial expenses of a veteran?

A. Yes. The claim must be filed within two years after the date the veteran was buried.
