City adopts water conservation plan

A water conservation plan for Colorado City was formally adopted by the City Council Thursday night that would go into effect when there is any disruption of the normal availability of water to the city's public water system. City Attorney Tom Rees said the plan would simply give the city the power to curtail water usage when it became necessary.

Factors which would trigger the Drought/Emergency Contingency Plan include drought, or a number of other uncontrollable circumstances such as floods, vandalism or equipment failure.

There will be three different categories or conditions and they will be defined as mild, moderate or severe.

A mild condition is described as the water demand reaching 85% of the capacity of the treatment plant for seven consecutive days or if there is a disruption in either the raw water supply, the treatment plant or the distribution system. In this condition, the public will be asked to look for ways to voluntarily reduce water usage. The city would reduce the watering of public parks to a minimum level to avoid any loss of shrubs and vegetation and a voluntary lawn watering schedule would be introduced.

Moderate conditions would be when water demand reaches 92% of the capacity of the treatment plant for seven consecutive days, disruption of either the raw water supply, the treatment plant or the distribution system and if the storage capacity remains below 75% for forty-eight consecutive hours and/or the water pressure drops below 20 psi in the distribution system.

If this occurs, the citizens would be asked to follow all previous actions and the city would institute a mandatory lawn watering schedule with alternate watering by even/odd number street addresses. Also, watering would be allowed only between the hours of 5:00 and 9:00 a.m. and from 8:00 until 10:00 p.m. Public water uses not essential to the health or safety of the community would be prohibited.

Severe conditions would exist when water demand reaches 100% of the capacity of the treatment plant for three consecutive days, disruptions within the system or the storage capacity remains below 50% for twenty-four consecutive hours and/or water pressure below 20 psi occurs in the system.

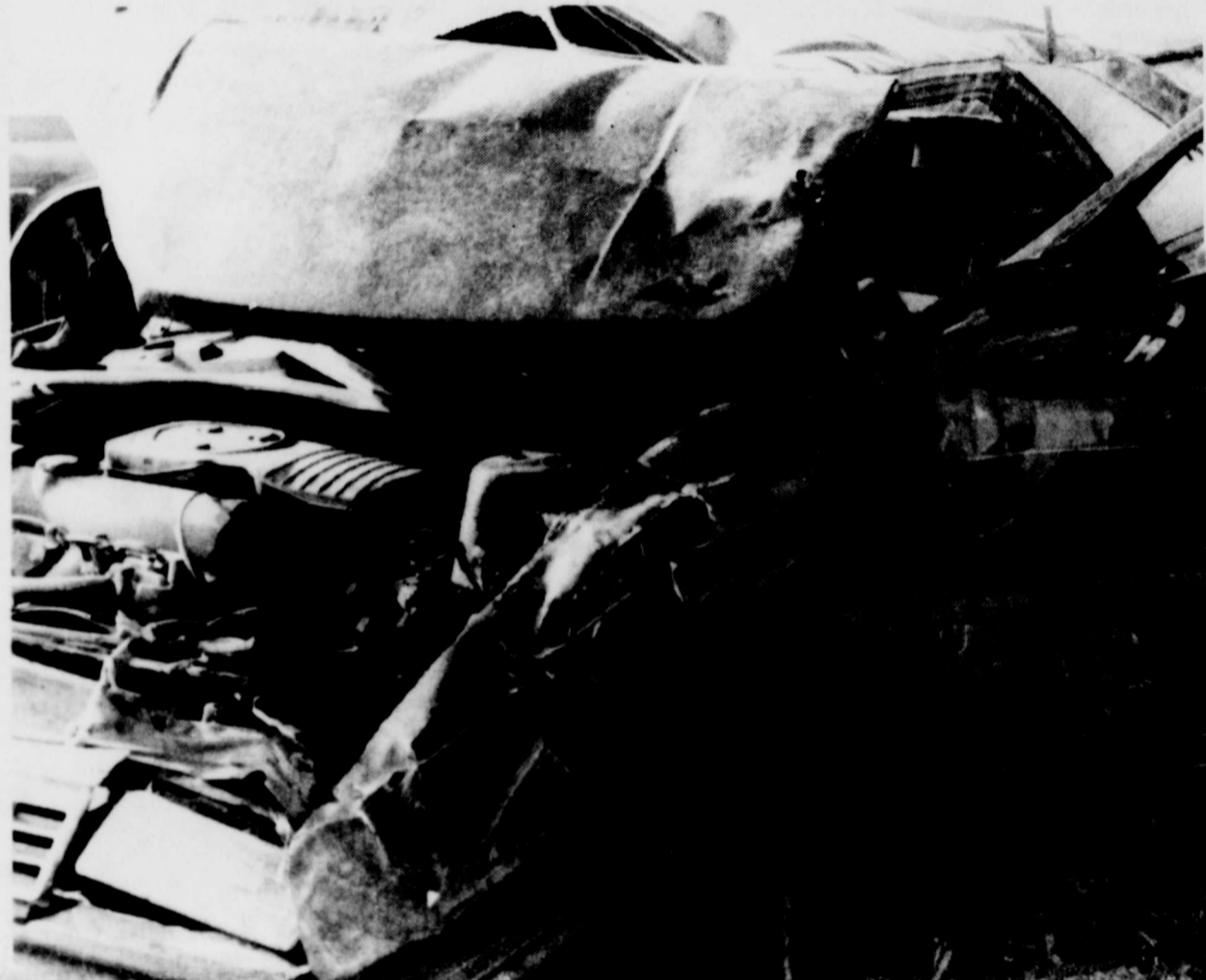
If severe conditions occur, all previous curtailments would be in effect and all outdoor water use

would be prohibited. This includes lawn watering, car washing, etc.

Critical conditions are defined as a failure in the system or any

catastrophic events occurring that has the potential for interfering with potable water to the city. Then, the city manager or the

authorized representative is to take all reasonable measures as deemed necessary to provide for the public's safety and health.

Westbrook residents urged to call 9-1-1 to report fires

Steve Rollins, Westbrook Fire Chief, has announced that the phone number to report a fire in the Westbrook exchange will no longer be used.

Rollins said any person residing in the Westbrook area will need to dial 9-1-1 in case of a fire and callers are asked to give as

detailed information as possible to the dispatcher.

If a controlled burn is scheduled, Rollins asks that citizens contact - in advance - the Colorado City Police Department (728-5294) or the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office (728-5261).

Council approves field name

Besides approving a water conservation plan Thursday night, the council also approved the naming of a softball field in Ruddick Park in memory of Sonja Lawson, approved a water sales agreement with Mitchell County Utilities and tabled discussion on the tax abatement request by Parks Fuels until a later meeting.

The council, following this called meeting, interviewed a candidate for the vacant city manager's job. Another candidate was scheduled to interview also but he did not show up.

Only two more candidates remain to be interviewed and that will take place Monday.

Law enforcement agencies locate 8 sticks of dynamite

A joint effort by the Mitchell and Scurry County Sheriff's Departments, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, Abilene Police Dept. and Dyess Air Force base personnel resulted in the location of eight sticks of dynamite buried northwest of Colorado City.

Sheriff Patrick Toombs said the dynamite had apparently been buried in the area some 8 years. It had been stolen from a seismograph unit in Scurry County where other of the five-pound sticks had been found earlier.

Toombs said Abilene PD sent two representatives of their hazardous device unit while Dyess AFB sent their explosive-sniffing dog to aid in the search.

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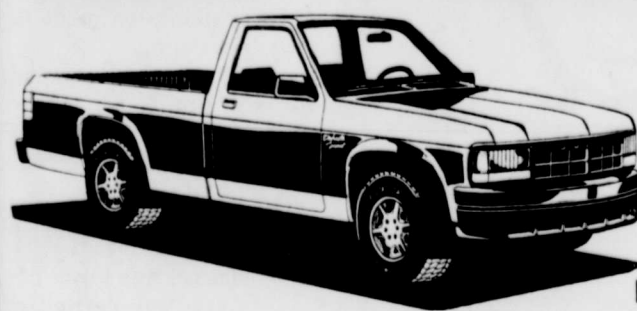

Increase in funding needed by USDA for successful eradication program

National Cotton Council President Bruce Brumfield told a House Appropriations Committee panel that a sizeable increase in fiscal 1995 funding is needed by USDA to accelerate the successful boll weevil eradication program.

"The cotton industry believes elimination of the boll weevil is a key component of effective cotton production in the future," the Inverness, MS, cotton producer told the Agriculture, Rural Development and Related Agencies subcommittee this week.

"As a result of the success of the program, 1.5 million acres in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Arizona, Georgia, Florida and South Alabama are weevil-free. Independent economic analysis shows that every \$1 spent for eradication generates approximately \$12 in economic benefits."

Brumfield said the U.S. cotton industry is asking that \$36.2 million be allocated to USDA's Animal & Plant Health Inspection Service to cover the government's 30 percent share of 1995 program costs. Growers would continue to pay 70 percent of the program costs.

The funding is needed, Brumfield said, to continue post-eradication efforts, continue active eradication of the weevil in Alabama, Tennessee and East Mississippi and initiate simultaneous eradication programs in two areas of West Texas and one in the Mississippi Delta.

"This schedule would place 1.5 million acres under active eradication programs in fiscal 1995," Brumfield said. "According to the plan, 2.3 million acres in Mississippi, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas would be added in fiscal 1996."

Brumfield emphasized that regions where the boll weevil has been eradicated have reduced insecticide use by 40-80 percent and that cotton producers are demonstrating a strong desire for expanding the program.

"Several referenda authorizing self-assessments have recently been overwhelmingly approved by producers," he said. "The margin of approval demonstrates grower support and ensures producer funding will be available to meet the 70 percent cost share...."

Brumfield also relayed the industry's desire for continued support of the whitefly action plan and the pink bollworm sterile moth

The local WIC operation, under the auspices of Mitchell County Health Department, has been in operation since May 1984. At this time the program is serving 230 clients and is still growing.

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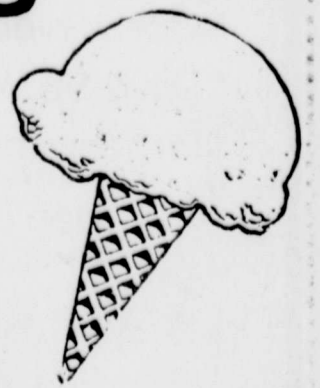

Raff warns of moth dangers

The pine tip moth can be a serious pest of young pine trees planted by homeowners on the South Plains. And right now is one of the few times homeowners can effectively fight back, says Joe Raff, County Extension Agent for Agriculture.

The larvae of this moth bore into the growing tips of pine trees, causing them to turn brown. Severely infested trees develop a bushy appearance over time.

The tip moth passes the winter as a pupa within the injured terminals and twigs of the tree. Moths emerge in March and April and begin the first of several generations which will occur during the summer.

Female moths lay eggs on the needles and stems. After hatching, the young larvae bore into the tip and begin feeding. After several weeks of feeding and constructing a tunnel in the tip of the stem, the larvae pupate, the adult moths emerge from the pupal cases and a new cycle or generation begins.

Properly timed application of an insecticide is the best way to reduce pine tip moth populations and damage, the Extension agent said. "Since this pest spends most of its life cycle protected inside the pine tip, foliar sprays are most effective when the young larvae are just hatching from the egg," he said.

To properly time these applications, pheromone traps are used to detect the presence of adult moths and determine when eggs are being laid by the first cycle of moths. Traps being monitored on the South Plains this spring indicate that now is the time to spray trees for this pest.

Foliar-applied insecticides recommended for homeowners include Orthene Dursban and Dimethoate. Adding a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve a control because it helps the insecticide adhere to the treated trees, the Extension Agent said.

"Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides," he stressed.

The contest's purpose was to generate beef appetizer ideas from Texas CattleWomen for use by Texas food service operators.

The event was open only to Texas CattleWomen members and was not associated with the National Beef Cook-Off, a bi-annual event sponsored by American National CattleWomen.

Sterling's winning entry was "Beefy Tortilla Rounds." It features one pound of deli-style corned beef as its main ingredient.

Other winners include "Barbecue in a Cup" by Anita Brown, Wheeler; "Beef and Veggie Sticks" by Dolores Horwood of Sterling City; "Mushroom Beef Bites" by LeAnn Myers of Olney and "Beef & Cucumber Wheels" by Sharon Spenrath of Comfort.

"Some of beef's best recipes come from ranch homes," says Anne Anderson, TBC executive vice president. "Our goal is to bring these favorite recipes out of the ranch kitchen and get them onto the restaurant menu."

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Clear water lakes and streams are some of the most beautiful places to fish. Many times these rocky, shore-lined impoundments have a very large fish population. You can actually see fish in shallow water or next to cover, but getting them to bite can be very difficult.

In order to be successful catching fish in clear water, it is sometimes helpful to downsize your tackle. By that I mean you need to go to a light action rod with light line, usually 10 lb. test or less. Also, downsize your lure selection. Seldom do I use a lure that weighs more than 1/4 ounce in clear water. Many times I'll go to a 1/8 ounce or even a 1/16 ounce lure with good results.

A good rule is that the clearer the water, the lighter the equipment. There is a drawback to this light equipment; when you get a big fish on small tackle, it's often difficult to land. The small hooks don't penetrate deep enough into the mouth of a good-sized fish.

Color selection is critical in clear water. I prefer to use smoke or gray colored lures that resemble baitfish. These colors have produced the best results for me on clear sunny days. However, if you have a cloudy, rainy, dark day with little light penetration, it's best to go to darker lures such as brown or black.

Lure selection is really pretty simple. All kinds of small jigs,

grubs and soft plastic worms no longer than 4 inches will work. Topwater lures are good choices any time the water temperature exceeds 60 degrees. In off-colored water, the water temperature needs to be close to 70 degrees for fish to really want to strike a topwater bait. My best advice is to use a popper-type lure with a back tail. Again, try to match color selection with weather conditions and the baitfish.

Generally, clear water lakes are best when the water level is high and new cover is in the lake. This new cover provides excellent habitat

for the food chain. Also, when the lake rises it will turn the water a little off-color. This gives the fisherman a tremendous advantage. Change to heavier tackle because your chances of catching a real big fish are best when the water is high.

Also, my advice is to fish slowly in clear water; even when the water is warm the fish seem to strike slow-moving lures better. There are times that fast-moving lures will trigger strikes, but more often than not, slow-moving lures work best in clear water.

Cotton receipt rules issued

Final regulations regarding electronic cotton warehouse receipts have been issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
 The regulations, issued by USDA's Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service (ASCS), include many changes from the initial USDA proposal, changes consistent with several National Cotton Council recommendations filed during the rules' comment period last year.
 "The regulations will enable the U.S. cotton industry to begin to use electronic cotton warehouse receipts instead of paper receipts," said Joe Wyrick, Council director of Finance/Computer Services. "The regulations define the rules that will govern the operation of an electronic system, but do not mandate that everyone begin to use electronic warehouse receipts right away."
 "In fact, the entire electronic warehouse system set out in these regulations is voluntary. The regulations allow individuals or entities

electronic systems, provided that the receipt, whether paper or electronic, is issued by the warehouseman;
 • warehousemen will control which provider retains their electronic receipts;
 • warehousemen will be allowed to change providers at will with 60-day advance notification to USDA, and
 • name(s) of bale owner(s) will not be required on electronic receipts.
 A provision in the proposed rule

requiring access to electronic system by "interested parties" was eliminated. The final regulation leaves most access issues to be determined between the system provider and users.
 In order to be a system provider, an individual or entity must apply to ASCS on forms provided by ASCS. Although the rule does not specify how to obtain forms, the rules state that interested parties may contact Steve Mikkelsen at ASCS, Washington, (202) 720-2121, for more information.

CISD electronic students qualify for state

Saturday, April 16 was a "Blue Ribbon Day" for nine CHS Electronics students. Of nine projects that qualified for state competition, CHS brought home nine first-place state awards. These students are Danny Gossett, Monica Mendoza, Steeley Upshaw, Melanie Bell, William Hickson, Tina Compton, Jody Beavers, Kristi Miller and Daniel Bastardo.

The projects, *Electronic Robot Vehicles*, were built from scratch. The students were furnished with all components and the bare printed

circuit boards only. Working on their own time, they studied, sorted, built, measured and tested. Through soldering burns, lost components, desoldering and resoldering, they trudged. There were about 25 students who started the project and 16 didn't finish, but these 9 did. The average time spent on each project was 12 hours.

The final result was a motorized vehicle that responds to sound. It travels forward until it "hears" a noise, which it changes to electrical energy. It uses that energy

to change direction, backing up and turning 90 degrees, stopping, then moving forward again. If it hits a wall or another object, it reacts the same way, since the impact generates a sound.

CHS is a small school from a small town, competing against 5A schools from all over the state. The bottom line for judging was "quality." The official first place rating was "superior quality." That speaks not only for the nine projects that won, but more so for the nine students who built them.
