Hamner, Berkman Head New Council

*\$804,165 Budget Approved

The election of Larry Hamner, 29, as mayor of Colorado City highlighted a 2 1/2 hour monthly meeting of the city council Monday.

During that 2 1/2 hours, the council considered and voted on a lengthy list of proposals as well as swear in new members of the council and elect officers.

To start off the meeting, last year's council considered a budget for 1975-1976 fiscal year beginning May 1 and adopted a budget that is \$100,000 higher than last year's spending but with taxes to remain the same.

Councilman Hank Bryant noted that "it doesn't seem right" for the outgoing council to devise a budget and pass it and then give it to a new council who has to live with the budget.

Included in the budget for the first time is a merit pay plan for city employees as well as provisions for city employee health insurance.

The total amount of the budget is \$804,165, compared to \$709,324 for last year.

After approving the budget, the council canvassed the results of the April 1 city council election and found that Dr. Elton Berkman received 96 votes; J. C. Dockrey, 89; Rick Perkin, 74 and Jody Neff, 68. Perkin and Mrs. Neff are incumbents while Dockrey and Dr. Berkman were seeking seats being vacated by Hank Bryant and C. C. (Mike) Burt.

After canvassing the election returns, Burt adjourned the old council so the new council could convene. Between the adjourning and convening, City Manager James Campbell presented plaques to Bryant and Burt to show the city's appreciation for their service.

As soon as the new council convened, Campbell presided for the election of a mayor with Rick Perkin nominating Hamner as mayor. Dr. Berkman seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous. Dr. Berkman was then nominated by Mrs. Neff for mayor pro-tem, a motion seconded by Perkin and he was elected by acclamation.

Other items of business included the appointing of James Gregg of Big Spring as city attorney, appointing West Central Texas Council of Governments as the city's regional manpower contractor, renewed a contract with an Austin law firm to collect delinquent taxes and purchased \$761.75 in paint from Dugger Chemical of Dallas to

Mobile Home Ordinance Discussed

The City Council of Colorado City Monday night discussed once again a proposed ordinance that would restrict the placement of mobile homes in neighborhoods with permanent residences.

The possibility of having such an ordinance has been discussed several times previously but nothing has been done.

The ordinance was one of many items on the agenda at the council meeting Monday night. Also on the agenda was information from Dale Mathis, manager of the Frontier TV Cable, about a rate increase the firm is planning to implement May 1.

City Manager James Campbell provided members of the council with a proposed ordinance governing mobile homes. However, several members of the council said they wanted to see clauses in the ordinance about existing mobile homes and about the parking of travel trailers.

Under the proposed ordinance, which will be presented to the council for their approval at the May meeting, a mobile home could not be set on a lot outside of a mobile home lot without a permit from the city council. Such a permit would only be good for six months but could be extended for a year.

Two Districts Get Same Tests

Colorado High School students who were disqualified from participation in the Regional Literary Meet.

The Executive Committee of District 5-AA has ruled in favor of a protest made by a Class B Shorthand Teacher from another county that Colorado High's Shorthand Teacher, Mrs. Hontas Hines and her students had access to the official copy before Class AA's District Meet.

Mrs. Hines was asked by the Class B District which was hosted by Westbrook, to act as dictator for their Class B Meet. The State Office of UIL has sufficient copies to provide different tests for each geographic district as the two-week test schedule progresses.

Operating under the assumption that two schools hosting their Districts' Meets eight miles apart would not possibly receive the same copy, Mrs. Hines dictated the copy for the Westbrook Meet. By quirk of fate, District 5-AA did receive the same test. The State Office of UIL did not explain why this occurred, only that the two districts should not have received the same test.

The State Office then, through UIL procedure, required the Executive Committee of District 5-AA to make the decision on interpretation of procedure. The District Committee ruled against local students competing in the Regional Meet.

Colorado City school's superintendent, principal and teacher involved acted in defense of local students but lost their bid to keep them eligible.

The two students won first and second in the District Meet and had won all practice meets this year in which they participated.

The disqualification applies only to shorthand students.

Teacher Contracts Renewed

Board Officers Unanimously Re-Elected

Colorado ISD school board reviewed and renewed all teachers' contracts following executive session discussion in their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Four additional teachers were officially hired: Susan Anderson for Physical Education at Hutchinson Elementary and Colorado High School; Glenn Dunn for Auto Mechanics; A. G. Furrow Jr. for Building Trades and Ronnie Blair for Industrial Arts.

Resignations approved included those submitted by Mrs. Connie Hargrove, fourth grade teacher at Hutchinson; Jimmie Wilson, physical education teacher at Hutchinson and Steve Poitevin, Journalism and English teacher at high school.

First item of business on the agenda was opening bids for library furnishings for the new high school, but the board delayed taking action on accepting the bids until a further study could be completed with the help of Architect Tommie Huckabee. Bids were:

- Indeco Sales of Lubbock, base bid, \$13,811.42; alternate bid, \$14,567.67.
- Barnhill Office Supply of Abilene, \$16,494.90.
- Hoover Brothers of Temple, \$17,682.

Band Boosters Raise \$530

Even on a rainy Saturday, the Band Boosters Garage Sale was a lucrative operation, raising \$530 for the band to use on their trip to the Amarillo Festival.

The band will go to the massed band and choir festival April 22. Last year, they won Sweepstakes honors at the festival.

All companies bidding on the furnishings gave an estimated time of completion of from 90 to 120 days.

A bid by Feldman Engine Service Inc. of \$7,108 for a new tractor, rotary cutter and flail mower was approved, the lowest bid. Lubbock Ford Tractor Inc. submitted a bid of \$7,520.

Assistant Architect Ken Taft met with the board and gave a partial progress report on the high school construction, stating that high winds in the past two to three weeks had done some damage at the site and had delayed some of the brick work, as workers on high scaffolds were not safe in high winds.

"They're about six to eight weeks behind schedule," Taft estimated.

The board approved specifications for taking bids for new classroom furniture, setting the bid opening date for June 9. Publications will be made and the proper notification given prior to the opening date.

Results of the recent school board election were made official as canvassing revealed the following votes cast:

- Willis Taylor, 46.
- Tom Rees, 127.
- S. L. Morris, 140.

School business manager J. S. Craddock Jr. administered the oath of office to Rees and Morris, and Rees was re-elected president of the board; Morris, vice president and Drew Ballard, secretary. All were re-elected unanimously by acclamation.

Craddock reviewed for the board figures of delinquent tax collection by McCreary and Huey, stating that \$190.91 was collected for the past month and \$104.64 paid to them. For the past year, the firm has collected

over \$13,000 in delinquent tax accounts for the school district, Craddock said.

The Board of Equalization will meet Wed., June 11 in morning and afternoon sessions and Drew Ballard is chairman of the equalization board, with Tom Rees and Mac Morris as members.

paint the swimming pool. Campbell noted that applications are now being taken for workers at the city pool this summer.

The council also accepted the low bid of \$21,000 from Plains Machinery of Abilene for a 1967 model Gallion road grader. Other bids were \$24,500 for a 1972 Huber from Patton Equipment in Abilene and \$25,000 for a 1965 Caterpillar from Hudson & Sparks Contractors of Colorado City.

The city will keep a 1957 model Gallion as it would have brought very little trade-in and it can serve as a back-up grader, Campbell said.

Bennett Reeves of Lubbock gave an engineering report on how to replace a water line at the west river bridge. After his report, the council authorized Campbell to advertise for bids for pipe that will be placed in the river bed at a cost of some \$25,000. The city will be the contractor in the job, hiring a local firm to help and advise.

The council also heard a request for funds from the little league to help complete a concessions building at the little league field at Ruddick Park. The council asked League President Buddy Marcom to provide figures on how much is needed for the council's workshop meeting next week.

Trimmier, Hudson Plan May Wedding

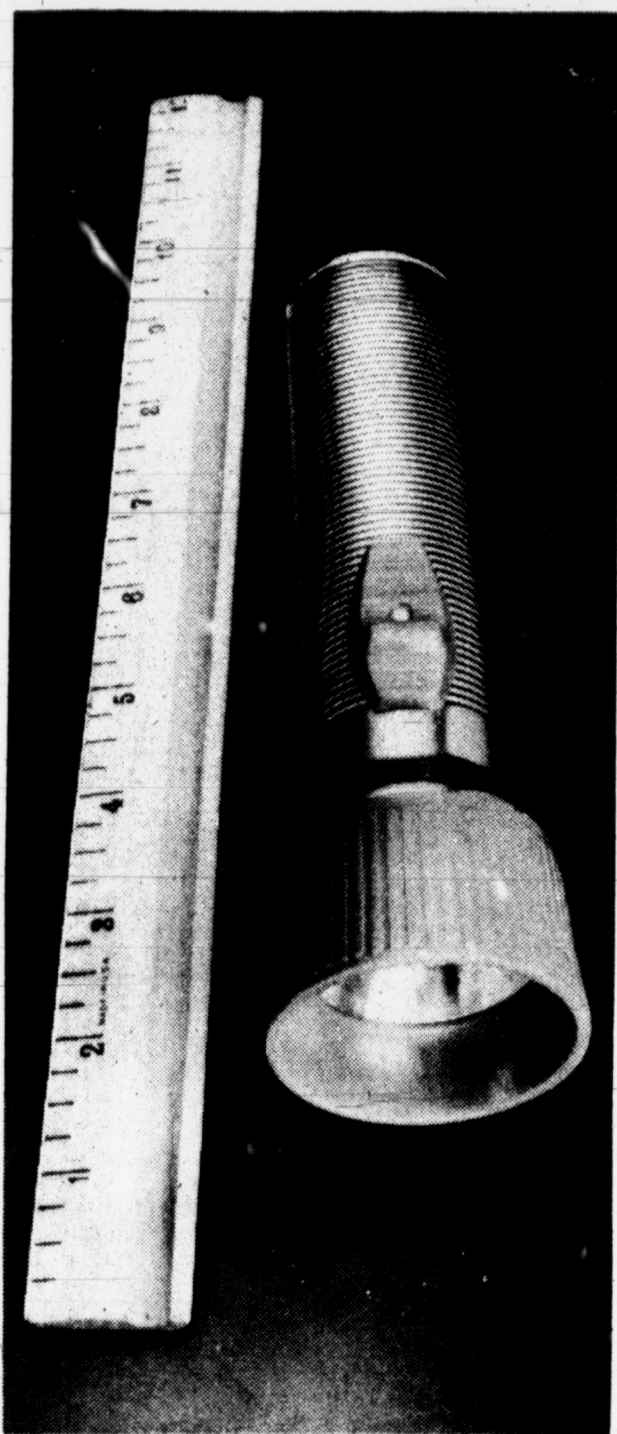

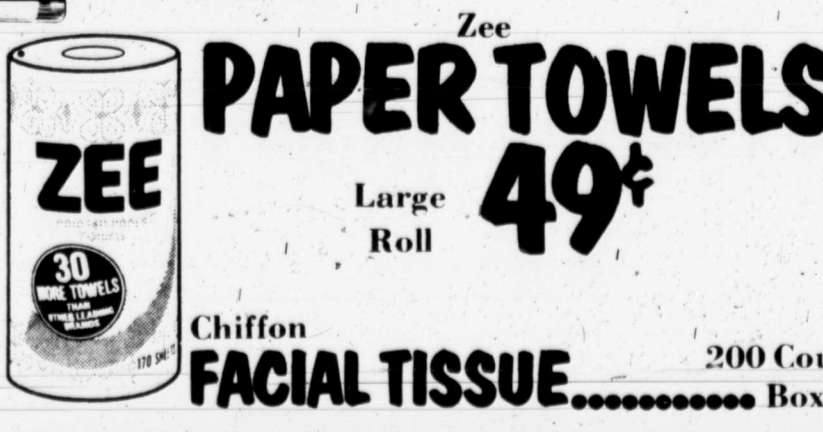

Today we are rediscovering the highly personal man-to-man quality of the training which Jesus gave the Twelve. This kind of training is time consuming and costly, but it produces fruit that remains.

Discipleship is based on conversion. Conversion is the door; discipleship is the house. You must enter the door before you can enjoy the house. Some have tried to reverse that proper order and a religion of legalism has been the result. All true discipleship in the past and in the present has spiritual rebirth as its God-given beginning.

This next week during the Christian Discipleship Seminar being held in Colorado City, scripture will be pointed out telling how to appropriate God's resources for living the victorious life of a disciple.

I sincerely believe this week of inspiration, study and practical training will change the lives of those who want to become more usable Christians. Join me in claiming the promise that God's word will not return unto Him void during this important week in our lives.

to the ordinance that existing mobile homes would not be affected by the ordinance and that travel trailers cannot be parked on the street or in alleys for a period longer than 72 hours, prohibiting residents from storing their travel trailers on the street or in the alley.

The ordinance would also govern future mobile home parks. Under the rate hike to be implemented by Frontier TV Cable, monthly base rates would be increased from \$6.75 a month to \$7.50 for everyone with one television. For each additional cable outlet including FM outlets, the charge will be \$1.25. Under the existing rate structure, \$1.50 is charged for the second outlet and 75¢ is charged for the third and there is no charge for FM outlets. The monthly charge when paid on a six month basis will be increased from \$6 a month to \$7.10. Under the new rates

the charge for a new installation for a house not wired for cable will be increased from \$10 to \$15. To move outlet or reconnect installation, the charge will be increased from \$5 to \$7.50.

Council approval on the rate increase was not necessary as the new rates are still less than was provided for in the original

charter granted Frontier TV in 1962. The rate increase has already been approved by the Loraine City Council.

On presenting the rate increase, Mathis said this is the first increase since Frontier TV began operations here in 1962. He noted that the rate increase was made necessary because of increasing costs of operation.
