P-36's For Defense Of Hawaii "Robbed"

Marshall Claims He Did Not Know Of Commitments

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—General George C. Marshall testified today that early in 1941 he decided "to rob practically all combat pursuit squadrons in the United States of most of their P-36 planes" for the defense of Hawaii.

Marshall, then Chief of Staff of the Army, also told a Congressional committee investigating the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor four years ago that he knew of no commitment by President Roosevelt for the United States to go to war before it was attacked.

The matter of sending additional pursuit planes to Hawaii was brought up by Committee Counsel William D. Mitchell.

Mitchell recalled a War-Navy Department agreement in early 1941 that attack from the air was Pearl Harbor's No. 1 danger.

As a result of that, Marshall said, he sought "to see what radical measures might be taken to meet to a degree the needs of the Pacific outpost.

Thirty-one P-36's were rounded up, he recalled, leaving most fighter squadrons in the United States with three P-36's each.

Marshall said the 31, with the pursuit planes already in Hawaii, brought the total there to 50.

In all his planning, Marshall asserted, he had in mind "planes and guns for defense against an air attack on Hawaii."

As far back as Feb. 6, 1941, the committee learned, Marshall stated at a conference with General H. H. Arnold, Air Force chief, Maj. Gen. Sherman Miles, Intelligence head, and Lt. Gen. Leonard T. Gerow, War Plans Chief, that:

1—The Navy had too few anti-submarine nets at Pearl Harbor and there was a possibility of a Japanese attack.

2—The planes available in Honolulu were out of date.

3—There were two active defense areas — Panama and Honolulu.

Marshall was questioned at length concerning the pre-war conferences, presumably with reference to contentions that there was a US commitment to go to war before the Japanese raid on Pearl Harbor.

Mitchell asked whether Marshall knew of any commitment made at the historic Roosevelt-Churchill conference in August, 1941, when the Atlantic Charter was proclaimed.

"I was not involved in the political discussions," was the General's terse reply.

He said he also did not know of parallel British-American protests to Japan until he returned to the United States and general discussions with the State Department were started. Then he said, he learned of the message President Roosevelt had sent "after he sent it."

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Acheson Defeats Policy In Iran, Hurley Shouts

Former Ambassador Does Not Explain In Stormy Session

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley shouted in a stormy session of the senate foreign relations committee today that Dean Acheson had "destroyed" and "defeated" American policy in Iran.

Acheson now is Undersecretary of State, No. 1 man under Secretary Byrnes. He formerly was an assistant secretary.

Hurley, who resigned last week as Ambassador to China, did not explain immediately the basis for his contention that Acheson had defeated American policies in the Near Eastern country.

He and Chairman Connally (D-Tex) shouted back and forth at each other before the testimony went into the record.

Senator Bridges (R-NH) demanded answers today to three questions arising out of the committee hearing on Hurley's resignation as ambassador.

Bridges said the debonair diplomat's opening testimony yesterday convinced him Hurley had been "sabotaged" by his subordinates. He added that while President Truman and Secretary of State Byrnes apparently had backed Hurley up privately, they had failed to do so publicly.

Bridges said he wants the answers to these questions:

1. "Why did the subordinates try to undermine his work?"

2. "Why are they still holding responsible posts in the diplomatic service?"

3. "Why did the President and the State Department refuse publicly to support General Hurley?"

Action Expected To Be Approved Before Holidays

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6

(AP)—Strike-prevention legislation that has caused a deep rift between the Truman administration and organized labor began its precarious journey through Congress today.

Introduced formally in the house under the name of Chairman Norton (D-NJ), it was sped to the labor committee, which called a meeting for tomorrow to decide what to do about it.

Acting Chairman Ramspeck (D-Ga) said he expected the committee to order brief public hearings next week and to approve the bill in substantially its present form.

His goal, Ramspeck told reporters, is to have the bill enacted before Christmas.

Ramspeck called the 1,000-word measure "the administration's bill" and said it embodies everything the president asked in an effort to prevent strikes in major industries.

The measure would give the president authority to set up fact-finding commissions to study the issues involved in labor controversies when the secretary of labor certifies that a strike of serious magnitude "impends and can't be settled voluntarily."

Strikes, work stoppages or lockouts would be barred for 30 days. But the bill specifically prohibits "require an individual employee to render labor or service without his consent, nor make the quitting of his labor or service by an individual employee an illegal act."

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, reiterated his opposition to the measure. He told reporters he could not agree with the 30-day "cooling off" period because he feared it would promote rather than discourage labor unrest.

Army Using Dredges To Clean Channels

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—Army engineers informed Rep. West (D-Tex) today that dredges are being dispatched to clean the silt from the Brownsville and Port Isabel ship channels and restore them to their authorized depth of 32 feet.

Three or four dredges, now located in other sections of the Gulf of Mexico, should reach the lower Rio Grande area within a few days to begin the work. Silt has accumulated in some sections so as to prevent the loading of oil tankers to more than half their capacity, said West.

Magnolia Refinery Workers On 40 Hours

BEAUMONT, Dec. 6 (AP)—The Magnolia Refinery announced that 300 members of the American Federation of Labor Machinists union will go on a 40-hour week next Monday.

The company said that the employees will be raised 15 per cent in base pay. The Navy approved the agreement.

Members of the electrical union accepted similar contract, effective last Monday. On October 1, office workers went on the 40-hour week with the 15 per cent increase.

US Loan To Britain World Trade Boon

LONDON, Dec. 6 (AP)—A United States loan of \$4,400,000,000 to Britain, subject to approval by Congress and parliament, was announced today in the British press and was hailed as a boon to world trade.

Official announcement of the agreement, following 12 weeks of negotiations between the two countries in Washington, was expected to be made tonight simultaneously in the two capitals.

The London Press said the agreement called for repayment over a 50-year period starting from 1946, and declared no interest would be payable for the first five years. Thereafter, the accounts said, the rate of interest would be 2 per cent.

The ultra-conservative Daily Sketch termed the loan a "magna carta for world trade," and it would "ease Britain's winter." The Laborite Daily Herald said failure of the negotiations would have meant "further tightening of belts, general imposition of restrictions to avoid a call for dollars, and a period of intensive trade rivalry."

London newspapers said the agreement provided that of the total amount of the loan, \$850,000,000 would be used in payment for goods in process of delivery to Britain when lend-lease was ended.

The Daily Herald said acceptance by the British of the Bretton Woods monetary plan was a condition of the loan, and that "the United States congress will be kept in session to ratify the loan simultaneously with the passage of the Bretton Woods bill by parliament."

The Daily Mail said the detailed document listing the terms included a provision that Britain work toward a reduction of the sterling debt and dissolution of the dollar pool. The Mail said also that one condition was that Britain join with the United States in a long-range plan to reduce tariffs and eliminate quotas and restrictions on world trade.

Services Pending For Wreck Victims

AMARILLO, Dec. 6 (AP)—Funeral services were pending here today for J. M. Durham and his sister-in-law, Mrs. H. C. Durham, farmers in Castro county, who were killed near Canyon, Texas, yesterday afternoon in a truck-train collision.

Mrs. Durham's son, Clinton, 3, is in a critical condition in a local hospital as a result of the accident.

Telephone Galan, Jr., Second Trial To Open

Teleforo Galan, Jr., will be afforded a new chance to clear himself of the accusation that he wielded the murder knife in the slaying of Edward Deanda in district court next Tuesday.

Deanda, 24, was convicted of the Dec. 24, 1944 death of the Latin American last September and sentenced to 20 years imprisonment but his counsel was successful in its motion for a new trial.

The accused has been confined to the county jail pending action on the plea.

Christmas Holidays For School Decided

Christmas holidays for the Big Spring schools will begin Dec. 18 until Jan. 2, the Board of Trustees announced today following a session Wednesday.

The holidays were previously scheduled for Dec. 14 until Dec. 31. The board also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Miller Harris as an elementary teacher.

British Pledge To Aid Poland Delayed War's Start For Seven Days, Goering Says At Nuernberg Trial

NUERNBERG, Dec. 6 (AP)—Britain's pledge to aid Poland in the event of hostilities delayed start of World War II seven days as Hitler unsuccessfully tried to keep the British neutral, according to a statement by Hermann Goering filed at the war-crimes trial today.

Allied prosecutors filed the statement with the international military tribunal. Goering, one of the 20 Nazi leaders on trial, said Hitler originally had planned to invade Poland on Aug. 25, 1939, but held up his attack until Sept. 1 while his diplomats sparred to try to "eliminate British intervention."

Describing Hitler's last-minute efforts to keep Britain out of the war, Col. Merwyn Griffith-Jones, assistant British prosecutor, described the diplomatic maneuver-

ing as "a bogus offer of negotiation intended simply to bribe or otherwise keep England from assisting Poland."

After seven days of behind-the-scenes activity, the records introduced as evidence revealed, Hitler unleashed his war machine and invaded Poland on Sept. 1. On Sept. 3, Britain and France declared war in support of Poland.

The prosecution submitted the texts of pleas from President Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, French Premier Eduard Daladier and Pope Pius XII to the Fuehrer, rejected.

Hitler's decision to strike in the fall of 1939 was made five months earlier when he ordered the army to be ready to strike by Sept. 1, 1939. (The Goering statement indicated that Hitler had advanced

GM, UAW To Smooth Out Differences At Meeting

DETROIT, Dec. 6 (AP)—Hopes for settlement of the General Motors strikes were raised today as the corporation and the UAW-United Auto Workers headed toward their first wage negotiations in the 16 days of the walkout.

Neither side in the wage fight, which has idled 213,000 workers offered a formal statement, but definite signs of optimism were appearing for the first time. One report said there might be peace within ten days.

Today's bargaining session, called for 1 p. m. (CST), was arranged at yesterday's meeting of union and General Motors officials at

Pittsburgh, attended by CIO President Philip Murray.

A citizens committee invited by the UAW-CIO to study the dispute said in its report today that the "full possibilities" of collective bargaining had not been exhausted.

President Murray of the CIO said "all points in dispute" would be considered at today's UAW-GM meeting and Walter P. Reuther, auto workers vice president, declared that "all had agreed there would be 'no strings attached' this time."

General Motors previously had refused to negotiate other issues until what it termed "illegal picketing" had been stopped.

A new government policy, announced by Stabilization Administrator John C. Collet, permits manufacturers to seek price increases to offset wage boosts up January, 1941. It does not guarantee, however, that the OPA would grant such increases.

This figure is three per cent higher than the previous one, and if added to an offer General Motors made the union before the strike was called would boost it to an average of about 13 per cent—still less than half the union demand.

Nothing Definite Reported On Well

No definite information was reported Thursday on the Bruce Clardy No. 1 Well, the wildest test eight miles north and west of Big Spring giving promise of being another discovery well.

Rods parted Wednesday before the well could be tested and the operator considered a swabbing test through 5 1/2-inch tubing set at 3,063 feet.

The well, plugged back from 3,560 to 3,160 to shut off water, was treated first with 2,000 and then 5,000 gallons of acid. Following the second treatment, it reacted with free oil. Some estimated it up to 10 barrels hourly through swab, but there was no basis for accurate gauging.

Location is 660 feet out of the southwest corner of section 4-33-1N, T&P, seven miles north of nearest production in the Northern Ordinance No. 1 Gusher estate.

Split In 1946?

SIGNIFICANT STRIFE ALREADY FORMING AMONG STATE DEMOS

By DALE CHEAVENS

AUSTIN, Dec. 6 (AP) — Strife within the ranks of the Texas Young Democrats club, shaping up generally along the same lines taken in the inter-party conflict two years ago, gives Texans some idea

of what to expect in 1946 politics.

The president of the Young Democrat state organization and the majority of the program committee for next week's convention at Fort Worth are at odds over whether or not to invite Lieut. Gov. John Lee Smith to speak at the session. This is just symptomatic of what may be described as a right-left division in the thinking of the organization's membership, and this extends to Democrats who are not so young. The Young Democrat's program committee voted not to invite Smith.

Another significant development, many months ahead of the start of the real political shooting, is the announcement of the regional CIO political action committee that it plans to enter four Texas congressional campaigns next summer.

The Capital was alive with political talk and rumors, most of them bearing principally on the Governor's race, but one new one having to do with the Attorney General's race. Some of these were:

That leaders of the Democratic organization now in power (the pro-Roosevelt group that took over the September convention a year ago) are still on the make for a candidate with liberal leanings, an outstanding World War I or II record, platform and radio appeal, and preferably not an old party war horse.

That a trial balloon will soon be sent up for Bob Calvert of Hillsboro, former speaker of the House and a leader at the pro-Roosevelt convention, by one faction within this group.

That Attorney General Grover Sellers is more interested in running for Governor than for reelection as Attorney General, and that leaders of both the liberal and conservative wings of the party have been giving this serious thought.

That if Sellers does not run, friends of Capt. Price Daniel, former speaker of the House now with the Army of Occupation in Japan, would like to enter him in the Attorney General's race whether he is back home by filing time or not.

One thing is certain. The Young Democrat convention at Fort Worth Thursday and Friday will furnish an interesting preview of the 1946 political picture. Watch for plain talk on both sides by World War II veterans, who are signing up as Young Democrat club members in increasing numbers.

November Weather Ideal For Crops

In checking a harvest with generally better results than anticipated, Howard county farmers can give thanks for a November with ideal autumn weather.

Records by Vernon W. Schaad, meteorologist in charge of the US Weather Bureau at the airport, show only .02 of an inch of precipitation for the entire month—which was as near to being dry as possible. Further insuring dry weather—the things most needed for cotton production—was a persistence of rather high winds.

Still helping crops was a mean temperature of 55.8, 2.8 degrees above normal, a factor which helped late feed make greater maturity.

Highest temperature for the month was 88, only two degrees under the record of 90 in 1903. Lowest was 25, far above the record minimum of seven degrees for 1903.

Only three Novembers on record have had less precipitation than this year. Normal for the month is 1.03 inches. Date of the killing frost was listed as Nov. 21.

US Coasts Battered By Winds, Cold Rain

Assurance that the United States has an ample supply of petroleum is given in the article, "We Will Have Plenty of Oil," written for the January issue of American magazine by Eugene Hofman, president of Standard Oil company (New Jersey).

(Hofman is a brother to Mrs. Theo Andrews of Big Spring and is well known in West Texas.)

According to the author, America's petroleum supply is good for a hundred years. He writes that geologists generally agree that more than 150 billion barrels of oil will be found in the Western Hemisphere and they place about 50 billion of these in the United States alone. Many of the new petroleum reservoirs have been discovered under lake and sea areas.

Contrary to the belief of many who regard the US reserve as 20 billion barrels—a conservative estimate of the American Petroleum Institute—"there will be plenty of oil," declares Hofman, a world-traveled geologist who has been associated with his company's producing activities for more than 23 years.

"The largest and most significant underwater oil project," explains Hofman, "which presages what may come eventually on the Atlantic, Gulf and California coasts, is at

What It Means

UNESCO Constitution

By FLORA LEWIS

LONDON—Uprooting the seeds of war is the goal set in the constitution of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, signed recently in London.

Forty-four nations, with the Soviet Union the only important absentee, have banded together for the first time in history in an organization of this kind. Its constitution provides for the free flow of information and ideas among nations, urges the interchange of professors, scientists, artists and others who can stimulate striving for higher moral and intellectual standards throughout the world.

When 20 countries have ratified the charter, the organization will be established permanently in Paris. Delegates who attended the conference hope that Russia, which declined to participate without explaining why, will soon add its name to the list of signatories.

MacLeish Preamble

The constitution of the new or-

ganization, which will work in conjunction with the United Nations peace agency, has a preamble written by US delegate Archibald MacLeish.

"Since wars begin in the minds of men," it reads, "it is in the minds of men that defenses of peace must be constructed. Peace must be founded, if it is not to fail, upon intellectual and moral solidarity of mankind" and adds "that peace based exclusively on arrangements between governments could not last."

The constitution gives the UNESCO the right to submit international conventions to its members, which would bind them to certain standards of freedom and outlaw discrimination in world exchange of ideas. However, it expressly forbids interference in strictly domestic affairs of its members, in order to preserve "independence, integrity and the fruitful diversity of cultures and educational systems."

Aims at Equality

It also aims at advancing the "ideal of equality of educational opportunity without regard to race, sex or any distinctions, economic or social."

The organization will have a general conference, comparable to the general assembly of the United Nations, with an 18-member executive board, directors-general and secretariat. Any member of the United Nations is automatically eligible to participate.

Consequently, most Chinese patrons drink tea and eat oranges.

Booming Crime Overpowering Italian Police

ROME — A crime wave is sweeping Italy. Bands as large as 300 men prey on the war-torn railroads from Sicily to the Swiss border, dramatically robbing trains in the Wild West style.

Murders, armed robberies, kidnapping, extortion, burglary — all are on the uptake, filling back pages of Italy's one-sheet newspapers with lurid details.

Political violence also is rising, reminding observers of the bloody clashes preceding Mussolini's march on Rome 23 years ago.

Avowed monarchists have grown particularly violent in recent weeks, raiding Communist and Socialist headquarters and burn-

ing their insignia and furniture. Italy's tremendous black market is behind many of the crimes. Entire freight trains have been looted by bandits who shot it out with the carabinieri escort, and the booty channeled into the black market.

Officials Helpless

Authorities throw up their hands at the crime menace. They point to the ill-equipped Italian police, woefully lacking in transport, and to the mass of unemployed and disillusioned left in the wake of the disastrous war.

Even now that the lights are burning again in Rome few people walk the streets after midnight when shots can be heard in many parts of the city.

Ramie, Wonder Crop, May Bring Boom To Textiles

CLEWISTON, Fla.—Ramie, ancient fiber plant whose silklime floss was made into Roman togas, is being boomed as a wonder crop that promises a revolution in textiles.

Two thousand acres in the Florida Everglades have been planted and several thousand additional acres are to be given over to ramie culture. In addition, a \$250,000 processing plant is expected to be ready by next spring.

The sudden boom for the plant that was old when the first cotton and flax was planted in America results from development of successful mechanical processes which do away with the slow, expensive beating and scraping by hand used by the Chinese, before the time of Confucius.

Ramie's fibers have a silky sheen and when woven into cloth are stronger than cotton or hemp. They gain strength when wet, retain colors, won't shrink, are warm in winter and cool in summer.

The reason a good percentage of people aren't wearing ramie clothes today is because the tall, shrubby plant encloses its fibers in a gummy, sticky stalk. Removing the fibers from the gum has for centuries been a slow, expensive process.

The biggest ramie-growing project currently is the joint venture of the United States Sugar Corp., of Clewiston, and Newport Industries, Inc., of Pensacola, with 1,500 acres nearing harvest at Canal Point. The state of Florida has planted 400 acres experimentally, and there are several independent growers and several large prospective plantings, among them the plans of the Sea Island Cotton Mills of New York.

Even with the slow hand processing during the war, the British used ramie for parachute cordage and harness, fire hose, flexible water mains and it was generally used for marine packing. It also is used to make high grade banknote paper.

'Full Employment' Bill Sidetracked From Truman's Original Suggestion

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6. (AP)—The so-called "full employment" plan got hit by a truck in Congress. It's a long way from being a full employment plan now.

President Roosevelt was the plan in principle when Senator Murray (D-Mont.) offered it in the Senate 11 months ago. President Truman endorsed it, too.

Rep. Patman (D-Tex.), shortly after the Murray bill went into the Senate, introduced an identical

measure in the House. Each declared:

"All Americans able to work and seeking work have the right to useful, remunerative, regular and fulltime employment and it is the policy of the United States to assure the existence at all times of sufficient employment opportunities to enable all Americans who have finished school and who do not have fulltime housekeeping responsibilities freely to exercise this right."

There it was. It said people who wanted jobs had a "right" to jobs. And it said the government would "assure" full employment. This bill finally was passed. But it was a watered down version.

It had this change right at the beginning:

"All Americans able to work and seeking work are entitled to an opportunity for useful, remunerative, regular and fulltime employment, including self-employment in agriculture, commerce, industry or the professions."

Gone was the phrase: "right" to full employment.

Even though the watered version which came out of the Senate called the measure a "full employment act," the House Expenditures committee toned this down and called it the "Employment—Production Act."

There's nothing in the House bill about full employment. It speaks of a "high level" of employment. Which means: the government wouldn't promise jobs to everyone nor say it was obligated to find jobs for everyone.

WINTER CLOAKS FATE OF NORWAY PROVINCE

TROMSO, Norway. — The answer to how inhabitants of war-ravaged Finnmark in northern Norway will survive the winter now is "hidden" indefinitely behind clouds of Arctic snow.

The few military planes that traveled between Tromso and the more northerly points of Alta, Hamnbuch, Hammerfest and Kirkenes are weathered in and boats, which are in disrepair and lack fuel, move only sporadically.

But still every local steamer into Tromso brings a new group of people, evacuated from Finnmark at the time of the German destruction and now trying to return on the change of finding their homes intact.

Some of these sneak off north in fishing boats. Others remain in Tromso, where they wander aimlessly up and down the streets until the settlement has the constant appearance of a Middle Western boom town on a Saturday night.

Retreating Germans destroyed all except four buildings—three churches and the North Cape Tea House in Finnmark, which once housed 30,000 Norwegians and 20,000 Laps or Mongolian Nomads.

Before German prisoners were evacuated from Finnmark this fall they cleared out most of the mines and built a few barracks. But still stray mines float around in the fjords, and barracks and igloos with makeshift insulation of peat offer little shelter from Arctic winds.

Whole settlements are completely isolated and the food problem is acute. One old man built himself a log tepee covered with cardboard about 30 miles south of Hamnbuch, refused to move and asked only a blanket or two so he could survive the winter.

Last spring the bodies of Russian prisoners were dug out of Finnmark's snow. Whether the hardy Norwegians can survive a similar winter only the spring thaw will tell.

Smitham Appointed Dallas City Manager.

DALLAS, Dec. 6. (AP)—The Dallas City Council appointed V. R. Smitham City Manager yesterday after he had served nearly five years as acting City Manager.

Col. James W. Aston's resignation as City Manager was accepted by the council yesterday. Aston has been on military leave from that position.

Plan Memorial

AUSTIN, Dec. 6. (AP)—The capital city post of the American Legion has approved plans for a campaign to erect a \$5,000,000 30-story memorial hall and hotel building here to be dedicated to Texas veterans of all wars.

Little Chance Seen For Sugar Ration End

GALVESTON, Dec. 6. (AP)—Sugar probably will be controlled by the OPA during most of 1946, I. H. Kempner of Galveston, president of the Imperial Sugar Company of Sugarland, Texas, said.

Until harvesting begins March 1, there will be little chance of improvement of incoming sugar supplies from Cuba and Puerto Rico, Kempner said.

Konoye, Kido Put On Lists Of War Criminals Arrested By MacArthur

TOKYO, Dec. 6. (AP)—Two powerful political figures whom many Japanese themselves consider among their top war criminals—Prince Fumimaro Konoye and Marquis Koichi Kido—were ordered arrested as war crimes suspects by General MacArthur today.

Seven other men also were listed as wanted.

Konoye, the dashing prince who served as one of Japan's most prized "front men," had been premier three times. Kido, a small, shrewd wirepuller, served as Emperor Hirohito's right hand man throughout the war.

Jittery Tokyo received another shock before it had recovered from MacArthur's announcement. Japanese communists announced they would release Saturday a list of 1,000 asserted Japanese war criminals, including the emperor and empress.

In the diet, Premier Kijuro Shidehara declared that his government was in no position to criticize the Allied lists. He said he had no information on how many persons the occupation authorities intended to indict.

Reaching into the highest circles, the supreme allied commander named as the other seven wanted: Vice Adm. Takuo Goto, who was unofficial envoy to Germany to present Japan's side of the China incident, also former cabinet member.

Shigeo Odake, long time politico-economist.

Taketora Ogata, vice-president of the Tokyo newspaper Asahi and a foremost Japanese journalist.

Viscount Masatoshi Okochi, industrialist.

Lt. Gen. Hiroshi Oshima who had been Japanese ambassador to Berlin.

AUSTIN, Dec. 6. (AP)—"Women have made good in pharmacy in indisputable fashion," says W. F. Gidley of the College of Pharmacy at the University of Texas, "and today are welcomed instead of tolerated."

Points in favor of women pharmacists listed by Dean Gidley are: "They raise the moral tone, know sickroom supplies and baby needs; uphold the standards of the profession, kick less about their work and are painstaking and conscientious by nature."

This year at UT the ratio of girls to male graduates was one to two and one-half, while for some 40 years it has been one to ten.

Old Age Assistance Rolls Show Increase

AUSTIN, Dec. 6. (AP)—The Old Age Assistance rolls showed a net increase of 1,008 during November, which lifted the present rolls to 174,449, reports the State Department of Public Welfare.

The net increase in expenditure for old age assistance was \$61,852 and the average grant was \$24.44.

The aid to dependent children rolls showed a net decrease of 490 families, with a net decrease in money of \$5,451 for an average grant of \$21.27. The number of families on the November aid to dependent children rolls was 10,587.

The aid to blind rolls increased 222 cases, with a monetary increase of \$8,357 and an average grant of \$25.14.

The department said figures are not yet available on the total number of grants which were increased above \$30 by the new constitutional amendment permitting a \$40 maximum payment.

The increasing number of applications is attributed by the department to: cessation of wartime

Over 1,000 Contact Employment Service

During November 1,348 persons contacted the United States Employment Service at 105 1-2 E. 2nd Street, including 1,104 men, 468 of whom were World War II veterans.

Of the group contacted, 479 were referred to job openings and 333 were hired. Twenty-five were physically handicapped. Of 192 complete applications for work, 113 were veterans. There were 287 veterans seeking assistance and information concerning conversion of insurance, apprentice training, serviceman's allowances, "G. I." Bill of Rights, job opportunities and job openings. The office referred 174 and 103 were hired.

Nineteen were directed to the Veterans Administration and 24 to other agencies. Employers contacted during the month numbered 171.

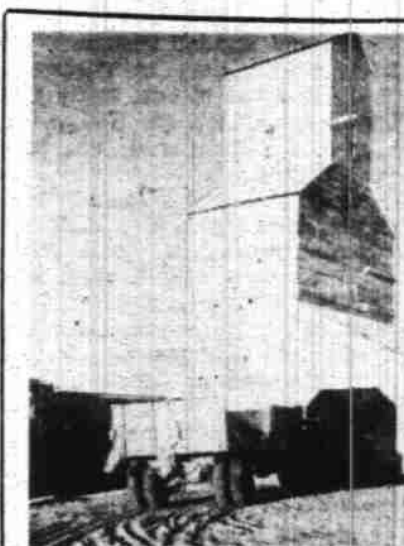

Republicans Ready 1946 Platform

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6. (AP) — Top-republicans in congress headed today for a national committee meeting in Chicago bearing a general platform for the 1946 congressional elections.

The 1,000-word document carries the approval of party members in both house and senate.

Its main provisions:

1. Foreign affairs—full support of the United Nations Organization and relief measures abroad.

2. National defense—support a well trained and fully equipped army, navy and air force.

3. Domestic economy — lighten taxes and reduce the national debt, bring government outlay in line with income, economize in government spending, and remove wartime restrictions as soon as possible.

4. Labor policy—reaffirm labor's right to organize and bargain collectively, contracts to be mutually binding.

The platform will be presented to the republican national committee at its Chicago sessions tomorrow and Saturday.

Democrats in congress greeted the document with derision.

"They've promised everything but a million dollars apiece for the citizens," a senator told a reporter.

Veteran Copyreader Dies In Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 6. (AP) — Seth Maxwell, 62, one-time sports editor, financial editor and copy desk chief for the Philadelphia Record, died yesterday after a long illness.

Maxwell, regarded as one of the Quaker City's most colorful newspapermen, disliked being an executive. With the Record 21 years he was working as a copy reader—the job he liked best—at the time of his death. He was a native of Thrift, Tex.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6. (AP)—When California converted its own backfield into an 85-yard touchdown run that knocked UCLA out of the Rose Bowl, coaches and fans participating in the Associated Press season-end poll said they had found the oddity of the football year.

It was the matter of an anaconda touchdown being called because of interference by a man boxer dog and the strange play at Princeton when Yale led only once in an entire afternoon for a total yardage of 20, the California incident was the queerest.

California had the ball on its 33. Left End Jack LeRond had called back to punt but the very ball flattered off the side is foot and went back over head, bouncing to his own 15. Blocking back, Quarterback Welch, scooped up the ball and ran 45 yards to the UCLA 40. Lateralled to Lerond who the rest of the way for the score of a 6-0 game.

Allan Dekdebrun of Cornell startled the crowd in the Colgate tilt by dashing forward five yards as though off on a run and then calmly punting over the head of the Raiders' safety man.

After sitting on the bench for seven games, Hobey Thomas, a Kentucky back, got the sign to enter the contest with West Virginia. As he reached for his helmet his shoulder snapped out of place. A teammate helped jerk the shoulder back in place and Thomas dashed onto the field to play.

Ben Hogan, who stroked his way to victory in the Orlando open Sunday, was a heavy favorite to take top prize money, with Slammmin' Sammy Snead rated next.

"Jug" MacSpaden, a former Miami open winner, was regarded as a serious threat, as were Sam Byrd, former baseball star, Johnny Revolta, Vic Ghezzi, and Dutch Harrison who won the open last year.

Opening guns of the battle for the Texas schoolboy football championship will be fired this week-end as the 16 district champions swing in to action in the first round of the state play-off with 142,500 fans expected to see eight games.

Paris and Lufkin will be the scenes of contests tomorrow afternoon, with games at Fort Worth and San Antonio tomorrow night and at Wichita Falls, El Paso, Waco and Houston Saturday.

Tight favorites appeared all along the line, meaning there were few of the big point boys hanging around.

Wichita Falls was picked to trim Amarillo, Odessa to beat El Paso High, Highland Park (Dallas) to topple Paris, Crozier Tech (Dallas) to beat North Side (Fort Worth), Waco to down Breckenridge, Lufkin to defeat Marshall, Goose Creek to win over Milby (Houston) and Thomas Jefferson (San Antonio) to edge out Brownsville.

Only seven of the sixteen teams are undefeated. With perfect records are Odessa, Paris, Lufkin, Milby and Brownsville. Wichita Falls and Highland Park each has been tied.

Strangely two of the most beaten teams—Jefferson, with three losses, and Goose Creek, with two—were expected to defeat a couple of eleventh that haven't lost a game or been tied this season.

Top game of the list is that at Paris which matches undefeated teams—the only one in which the participants haven't dropped a title this season. But the biggest crowd is expected at Houston where 22,000 are due to tax the capacity of the stadium to see Milby battle Goose Creek. San Antonio forecast 20,000 for its game.

Significant Contribution

With The News

LONDON, Dec. 6 (AP)—The great political, social and economic changes through which this heart of the British empire is passing are a source of constant wonder to the visitor who is returning after a considerable absence.

Indeed, the average Englishman himself has small realization of the real significance of this metamorphosis. He is too close to it.

Old traditions are being shattered like glass balls in a shooting gallery. Glass distinctions are drawing closer together, and the old school tie has lost much of its magic. The landed gentry is fast disappearing, and there has been such a leveling off of incomes that the time is past when great fortunes can be accumulated.

We got a vivid flash of all this in the fierce clash at arms which began yesterday in the house of commons and is continuing today—a battle royal between the new labor government and its conservative opponents led by Churchill, son of a long line of nobility representing the bluest blood in England.

Yesterday's debate began quietly enough as Oliver Lyttelton, minister of production in the late conservative cabinet, made a motion of censure against the government.

Lyttelton attacked vigorously. He charged that the government's program meant regimentation of the individual if the socialist schemes were to succeed. He accused the party in power of creating inflation.

The laborites met this first attack with easy self-assurance in their big majority of about 200. Lyttelton's bitterest shots were met with deep belly laughs as the members leaned back against the red morocco benches.

US And The Chinese Dilemma

By WALTER LIPPMANN

Since a result of Mr. Hurley's resignation there is an inquiry into our China policy, we shall need to have a clear account of the military situation in China. There is no secret about the situation, and the main facts are not in dispute. Only in the light of the military facts can any one begin to understand the controversy between Mr. Hurley and our China experts, or the problems which General Wedemeyer has been struggling with, or the decisions which President Truman and Secretary Byrnes will have to make on the basis of what General Marshall reports and recommends.

We have to remember that when Japan capitulated, General MacArthur, acting as supreme Allied commander, assigned to Chiang Kai-shek's national government the task of receiving the surrender of the Japanese armies in China. In Manchuria, the Japanese were to surrender to the Soviet Army.

The second thing is that in north China there were not

enough national Chinese troops to receive the surrender, and to disarm the Japanese forces.

The third is that there were Chinese Communist troops in North China. They were not authorized to receive the surrender of the Japanese, and they were not strong enough to compel the Japanese to surrender. Thus three and a half months after V-J Day, there is still a Japanese Army of some 325,000 men in North China. The major part of them have not surrendered and are not disarming.

The immediate American problem in China is what to do about this Japanese Army. It is supposed to surrender to Chiang Kai-shek, and it would surrender if Chiang's troops could get to the area where the Japanese are. But even with the help which we have been giving Chiang, he has not been able to get there with his troops. For, contrary to our expectations, he diverted to Manchuria two of the armies which we transported to North China; and what he had left in North

There can be little doubt that cotton no longer can be our one-crop hope. Coming of the combine type grain has confronted this region with the necessity of utilizing vast amounts of grain. One of the best and most profitable ways is to feed it to livestock.

It follows as night and day that best results will be obtained by feeding put better grade stock. That's where the breeder comes in, and everytime this truth is proven over and over in sales, it will be dollars added to the pockets of more and more people.

With The AEF: Manchuria Not Home To Nationalists

CHINHSIEN, Manchuria (AP)—It was two degrees above zero the morning we accompanied Gen. Tu Yu-Ming, commander of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's North China armies, on an inspection tour of this railroad center, recently taken from Chinese communists.

His bodyguard looked like walking quilts in their cotton-padded yellow green uniforms and wrap around leggings. Many had only light gloves and thin canvas slippers. Some troops have frozen to death.

These nationalist troops were brought up in American ships from South China. They feel as out of place in Manchuria as a Florida cracker on guard duty in Montana during a blizzard. They are well drilled and disciplined, however, and they know how to handle their American tommy guns and old Springfield rifles.

Chief guest on the inspection trip was Vice Adm. Daniel E. Barbey, commander of the US Seventh Fleet. Tu personally drove him about the city in his new Buick with the remainder of the party following in three of the Chinese army's four jeeps in Manchuria.

Tu is a close friend of Chiang Kai-shek and formerly studied military science under him. He is youthful looking, shrewd and friendly, and American observers have a high opinion of his military ability. His secretary-general and advisor, on political and eco-

nomic problems is Professor Yu Hsin-Chung, 45-year-old Harvard trained history teacher.

Winding through the narrow oriental streets in a native quarter thronged with fur-capped, mustached Manchurian traders looking like grandchildren of Genghis Khan, we reached the great eastern cotton-spinning mill after driving for blocks past barbed-wire fences enclosing red brick Japanese homes. Some 30,000 of Chinhsien's 200,000 population are Japanese.

Shigemitsu Suzuki, Japanese manager of the cotton mill said both Russian and Chinese communist troops had been destructive, and Professor Yu looked pleased. The professor became angry, however, when in response to his query "and how are we treating you?" Suzuki said:

"Very well. Only, if you could keep your soldiers from coming at night and taking away our girls."

"You have no right to say this!" shouted Yu. Apparently he meant by this that Japanese troops had done far worse to Chinese women.

"I know I have no right," said the little Japanese manager, bowing and grinning as all orientals do when nervous, "but I beg of you—let beg of you."

But Professor Yu still was displeased. He is unhappy unless he can convince you that all Chinese nationalist soldiers wear halos and all Chinese communists carry pitchforks and walk on cloven hooves.

Russia Boycotts Far Eastern Council

By DREW PEARSON

WASHINGTON — Shortly before he left Washington, Australia's astute foreign minister, Dr. Herbert Evatt, held a press conference at the state department to announce that the ten members of the Far Eastern advisory committee had reached complete agreement on the control of Japan — though Russia was still absenting.

As he was about to open the conference, Evatt looked around and asked for Laurence Todd, correspondent of the Russian Tass News Agency. Just at that moment Todd entered the room.

"Mr. Todd, you will be interested to note," Evatt said, "that we had ten nations sitting here on the Far Eastern advisory committee and we all got along well, although the Soviet Union was not represented. It takes 11 men to play football. Do you think your people will join the team?"

Todd laughed but made no reply.

Note—Despite Russia's absence all ten members of the committee agreed on a considerably tougher directive for Japan's control than that originally worked out by the state department and General MacArthur.

"Red" Dean Acheson Under Secretary of State Dean Acheson made a speech on friendship with Russia at a recent meeting in New York's Madison Square Garden. The Dean of Canterbury, sometimes described as the "Red Dean," also talked on the same program. Next day one newspaper carried the headline: "Red Dean calls for friendship with Russia." Underneath was a picture of Dean Acheson.

The paper came to the attention of Henry Wallace, who sometimes is accused of being radical. He tore out the page and sent it to Dean Acheson, onetime attorney for the big power companies, with a note saying:

"Thank goodness they haven't gotten around to calling me 'Red Henry' yet."

Management Battles Itself Few people know it, but the labor-management conference came within a hair's breath of making some progress before it broke up. The big fight took place at a secret management caucus which lasted until 2 a. m.

Eric Johnson of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, David Sarnoff of the Radio Corporation of America, and Herman A. Steinkraus, president of Bridgeport Brass, pleaded with their management colleagues to soften a bitterly anti-labor resolution of collective bargaining. The resolution not only required performance bonds from labor for violation of contracts, but also went so far as to demand anti-trust laws for unions, abrogation of the Wagner Act, and repeal of the Norris-LaGuardia Act which prevents injunctions against strikes.

WASHINGTON—Very little has been said about it yet but the Army is undergoing an upper-bracket rejuvenation that eventually will see practically all of the "over-age" generals returned to private life or retired.

In mid-September, the War Department announced that 136 generals of retirement age called back into service for the duration would be re-retired. That, however, is only the beginning. Even before Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower was named chief of staff, plans were complete to replace all the "tired old men" with generals in the upper forties and lower fifties. Official notice already has been given high-ranking officers either to retire or make plans for return to permanent rank.

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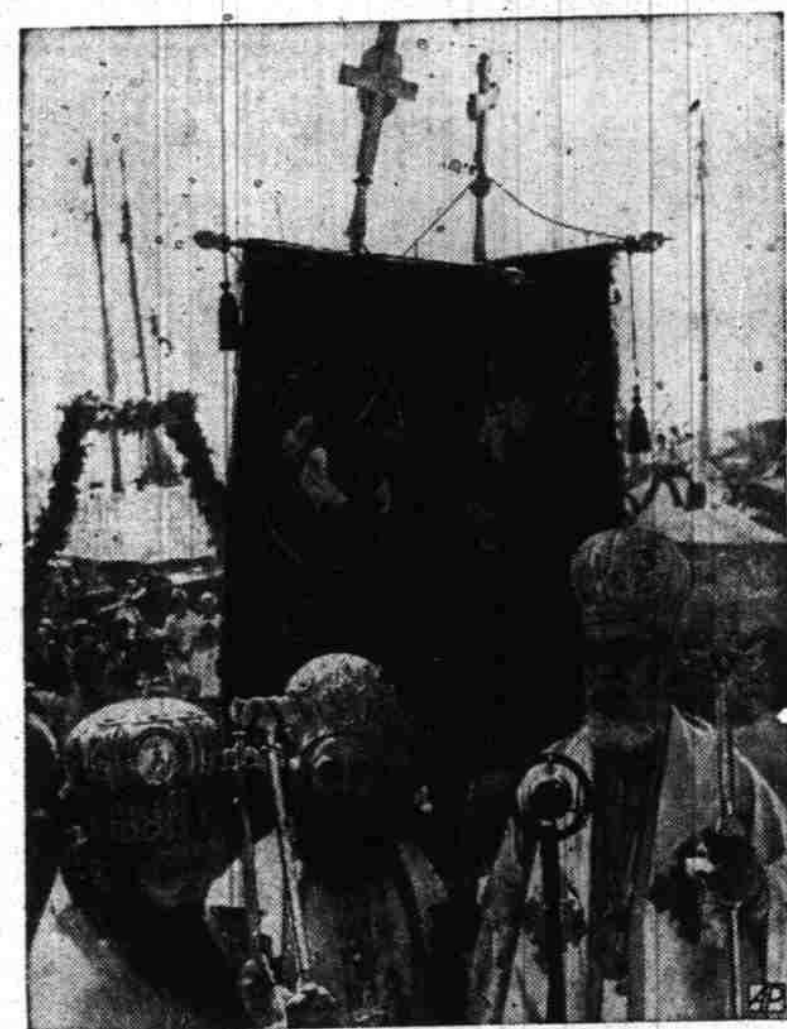
