Many Applications For Tenant Farm Loans Are Taken In This County

With mounting enthusiasm, a large number of applications have been received on the Tenant Farm Loan proposition, recently announced by Seaborn Collins, Farm Security Administration County Supervisor.

"Although a large number of applications have been received, we urge those who intend to do so, to get their applications in as early as possible, as the county quota will be filled only after all applications have been thoroughly checked. Even though there may be several ahead of yours, that does not necessarily mean that you will not receive your loan. However, with all other things equal, the first applications received, will naturally receive first consideration. So we advise you to get yours in at the earliest possible moment," said Mr. Collins Monday.

Through this loan, which has only recently been granted to Dawson County, a tenant farmer, or one who has had farming experience and who is a resident of this county, is eligible for application. When granted, these loans provide all money necessary to purchase and improve a farm, with payments covering a wide span of years and a low rate of interest.

Complete details and application blanks may be secured at Mr. Collins' office in the basement of the courthouse in Lamesa. Applications will be received until September 1.

Change In Motor Fuel Refund Be Effective Soon

Dealers and Farmers Warned Of Change

An important change in the Motor Fuel Refund Law, goes into effect September 1st, according to Guion Clayton, representative of the State Comptrollers Office in this district.

"This change affects all farmers who use motor fuel in the operation of their farm, as well as wholesale and retail oil and gasoline dealers," said Mr. Clayton this week. "Farmers, as well as gasoline dealers, are urged to get the details of this change as quickly as possible to avoid embarrassment, as well as possible penalties. I will be glad to furnish this information to anyone interested, or they may write to the office of the State Comptroller, at Austin, for complete details on the change." Mr. Clayton may be addressed at Box 502, Lamesa.

This is a new law which was enacted by the State Legislature in their last session, details of which were not available at this time to the Courier.

Circulating Library For Schools To Be Available To Students Next Month

The remodeling of the County Superintendent's office is under way this week in preparation of the addition of the County School Circulating Library.

One thousand books will be placed in the library at this time, according to J. Henry Norris, superintendent. These will be available to every student in the county, he said.

An additional girl in the office will take care of this phase of the work and she will assume her duties on the fifteenth of this month.

Part of the County Judge's office will be incorporated in the Superintendent's office to give the necessary room needed. In this space Mr. Norris will have his office, while the entire space formerly occupied will be turned over to the library and the text books which are ordinarily carried. The same entrance to the office as formerly will be used.

This is the realization of a goal which Mr. Norris has sought ever since he took office. It should prove a great help to the students of the county who heretofore have not had these facilities available.

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Enrollment To Be Far Ahead of Former Sessions

Enrollment Data To Be Given Later

The opening dates for the Lamesa Schools were set Tuesday night for September 11th, 1939.

This is a departure from the practice of opening on the first Monday in September and is made advisable this year because of the new construction and alterations program which is not yet completed. There has been some delay in receiving shipment of new lockers, doors and stairway nosings. These items have been shipped according to reports, and are expected this week. The work then remaining will be that of installation and the replacement of furniture. Everything will be in readiness for the opening date.

Announcements will be made later concerning enrollment dates for pupils in both the elementary and high schools and when they will be expected to meet the principals of the respective schools for preliminary conferences.

Plans have been made for receiving more pupils this next session than have ever been enrolled in any previous year. Indications are that there will be a growth in all divisions of the school including the colored school to which another teacher will be added in the person of J. O. Penderper, a graduate of Butler University.

The health regulations that all pupils and faculty members be vaccinated against small pox is still effective and those new to the system are attending to this now and others will before the opening and their admission into the schools.

Legislation and regulations are very rigid about the admission of children younger than six years of age into the public schools now and parents are urged to have birth certificates as verification of the ages of children beginning their school careers.

Dawson County
To Save \$8,430
On Annual Tax

Ablene, August 9.—Organization of permanent local expenditure and taxation committees in every city and town in West Texas is urged by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in a report issued today by its Public Expenditure and Taxation Committee. James D. Hamlin of Farwell is chairman of the committee and signed the report.

For several years the regional organization has advocated abolition of the ad valorem tax for state purposes. This long advocacy bore fruit with the recent approval of S. B. 224 by the Governor, officials pointed out.

The new law will, beginning in 1941, remit to the counties half of the ad valorem taxes collected for state revenue purposes.

In the 132 counties of West Texas this will amount to a saving of more than \$2,000,000 annually.

For Dawson county it will amount to approximately \$8,430.

The tax remission law, together with the new road bond assumption law which allots back to the counties one cent of the gasoline tax, and which will mean several million dollars more to the counties, offers a real opportunity for reduction in local taxes, Mr. Hamlin declares.

Principal function of local committees will be to work cooperatively with local public officials in an effort to bring about economies in government and in passing on the savings of the taxpayers. The report points out that 87 per cent of all public expenditures falling upon property taxes is for local government.

Services of WTCC committeemen and staff is offered to local WTCC directors in organizing their local committees.

Suggested activities for the local committees include:

Request each group of local public officials to prepare budget in accordance with state uniform budget law; ask that tentative copies of proposed budget be submitted to committee for independent study and research; formulate from this study constructive recommendations as to curtailment or expansion of the proposed budget and recommendations as to use of tax remission funds and bond assumption funds.

Submit these recommendations to officials and work cooperatively to have them include in the proposed budget; offer public officials any necessary clerical aid in preparation of the budget; help public officials conduct public budget hearing and organize attendance of taxpayers; after budget is adopted, secure reports from time to time on how budget is being administered and cooperate with public officials in administering it.

Copies of the report are being mailed to the 200 local WTCC directors.

New Game Laws
For This Area

Activities of hunters and fishermen in Northwest Texas and the Panhandle will be affected by 18 of the record breaking total of 94 new game and fish laws passed at the recent regular session of the Legislature, the Game Department announced today. The 18 laws apply to 40 counties in that area.

Of the 94 new laws passed, only seven are general in nature, that is applicable to the State as a whole, the Department announced. The others are local laws, applying to individual counties or groups of counties. Many of them are simple reenactments or extensions of laws already existing, but in other cases they lay down regulations that will cause the outdoorsman to change his plans. The Game Department does not make hunting and fishing rules and regulations, but is charged with the duty of enforcing laws the Legislature passes, it was pointed out.

One of the general laws placed the Starling on the unprotected list. Another general law forbids, in the interest of safety, fishing from bridges maintained by the State Highway Department. Another provides that out-of-State trappers must purchase licenses costing \$200 each before operating in Texas.

Counties in this area affected by some of the local laws are as follows:

Gaines County: Quail, unlawful to take or kill for five years.

Jones County: Fishing. Closed season changed from February, March and April on all fish to March and April on bass and crappie only. Lawful to use seines or nets at any time other than March and April. Use of minnow seine not more than 20 feet long permitted at any time. Unlawful to take any fish for commercial purposes.

Terry County: Quail, unlawful to kill for five years.

Yoakum County: Quail, unlawful to take or kill for five years.

Should Use Care
In Removing Any
Fabric Stains

Summer stains from fruits and beverages, automobile grease, rust or mildew require immediate attention if they are to be satisfactorily removed. Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, Texas A. and M. College Extension Service specialist in clothing advises.

It's best to begin work on removing spots immediately she says, for old stains which have been "set" by improper treatment are frequently hard to remove. "Before using anything else," she suggests, try the simple, universal remedy—cold water. It does no harm and may do wonders, for it sets no stains, endangers no dyes. "Any water spot remaining may be steam

ed out easily.

In removing a fruit stain, coffee, or tea, stretch the stained part over a pan and then pour boiling water on it from a height so that the water will strike the stain with force," Mrs. Barnes says. She adds that Javelle water is also good for removing these stains.

"Weeping Jelly"
Has Ample Cause

If jelly "weeps," it probably has sufficient reason, says Grace I. Neely, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, in diagnosing some of the common types of jelly failures.

"Weeping," she says, is due to too high a concentration of acid, and it may be prevented by mixing the juice with another juice low in acid content or by adding more pectin and sugar. The most common cause of failure to jelly is the presence of too much sugar.

The jelly may be rebolled with unsweetened fruit juice, and usually one-half as much juice as syrup will be sufficient, Miss Neely explains. Pectin may be added instead of the juice.

Lack of acidity may also prevent a jelly from forming, and when this is the cause the mixture may be made to jelly by adding a sour juice such as lemon, and rebolled the mixture to the jelling point. Proportions on the average are one teaspoon of acid to two quarts of juice, the specialist says.

"To prevent crystallization of grape jelly caused by too high a proportion of sugar, dilute the grape juice with sour apple or plum juice," Miss Neely advises. Canned grape juice never crystallizes in jelly, she says.

Other causes of jelly failures listed include toughness, caused by too little sugar or too concentrated juice; gumminess caused by overcooking; cloudiness caused by poor straining or skimming; mold formation caused by too low a concentration of sugar, storing in a damp place, incomplete seal, or incomplete sterilization; and fermentation caused by souring. The same factors which bring about mold formation result in fermentation, Miss Neely concludes.

FARM NOTES

By B. J. Baskin
County Agent

Much interest is being shown by Dawson County farmers in the possibility of storing surplus feed of the 1939 crop in trench silos. Feed thus stored would be "insurance" in future years when short feed crops are made. Too, feed thus stored is safe from weather damage, weevil damage, rat damage and fire. Others are planning on using this silage to step up their milk production, especially during the cold winter months.

The average dairy cow will consume approximately 6 tons of silage per year.

Whole bundles stored in a trench silo will weigh approximately 25 pounds per cubic foot when the silage has completed its settling. Chopped silage will weigh approximately 40 pounds per cubic foot under the same conditions.

The number of head of livestock to be fed per day determines the size of the cross-section of a trench silo, and farmers should be certain that this cross-sectional area has been accurately determined before digging a trench silo. Failure to do so will cause the loss of much valuable feed once the silo is opened.

The 1940 Range Building Program has had two additional practices added or amended to react to the benefit of Texas ranchers. The practice of mowing pastures to rid them of obnoxious weeds, the increase in the payment for contouring grassland and the increase in the allowable for Deferred Grazing are outstanding changes.

Declining prices for cottonseed of the 1939 crop may be due to two things—one, the heavy marketing of hogs (over 83,000,000 head in 1939—producing one billion eight hundred million pounds of lard) and the heavy increase in soybean production in the north and mid-west (soybean meal has increased approximately 20 times in the past ten years—over 400,000 tons in 1938).

A ton of cottonseed will produce 69 pounds of lint, 579 pounds hulls, 915 pounds cottonseed meal, 299 pounds cottonseed oil and 138 pounds loss (waste, dirt, etc.).

Stanley Applegate, Dawson County 4-H Club Boy, left Lamesa for San Francisco with X. B. Cox, County Agent of Scurry County, 4-H Club boys of Scurry, Borden, and Gaines Counties. The trip is a reward to Stanley for outstanding 4-H Club work he has performed in the past.

The hereford calves being fed by Delbert and Elbert Harvick, of the Hancock community, 4-H Club boys, are making good progress. These calves, on a ration of whole oats, bran, cracked corn, cottonseed meal and milk are making good gains.

Lewis Glenn Clark, 4-H Club Boy of the OK Community, has three Hereford Calves on feed at this time. Other 4-H Club Boys feeding calves know that this boy is going to be hard to catch at the spring shows.

Interest in the Tenant Purchase Program in Dawson County is rather pronounced. Many farmers that are now tenants and wish to buy farms are calling at the offices of the FSA and the County Agent making inquiries regarding this program and filing their applications. Applications must be filed with the FSA.

There will be a meeting of the County Land Use Planning Committee at 2 p. m., Friday, August 11. This Committee, which is appointive in 1939 but elective thereafter, is one of the most important committees to ever function in the history of Dawson County agriculture.

Thirty-five Dawson County 4-H Club Boys will soon put 75 dry-lot calves on feed for the Spring Shows in 1940. The ranchers of the county are cooperating with the county agent in furnishing choice calves to these boys.

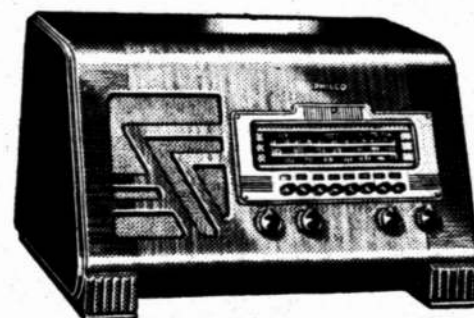

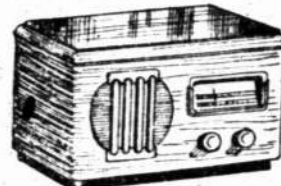
