

Mail Fraud Could Cheat The Unwary

Whether you're eight years old or 80, you're never too young or too old to become a victim of mail fraud.

There are phony offers aimed at a variety of age groups and interests, ranging from coin collecting to vacations and miracle cures.

Even though most mail order firms are honest, providing the buyer with exactly what was ordered and on time, the tiny percentage of promoters offering something worthless, or almost worthless, is still ripping off millions of dollars from thousands of Americans each year.

Offers for "free" vacations continue to ruin holidays for tens of

thousands of people each year. Hyman Weiss, now vacationing in jail, sent out 300,000 postcards at a time nationwide, requiring those who responded to pay between \$20 and \$30 for handling, postage and processing, plus another \$15 to make reservations. He was the operator of Continental Vacations, American International Travel, World Class Travel and Trans Global Travel. Weiss admitted during his trial in Phoenix, AZ that no more than four to six people out of the thousands who sent money actually received a free vacation.

Countering the effects of aging has kept promoters of fraudulent pro-

ducts in the money, and postal inspectors in pursuit, for many years. Just recently, they stopped the promoter of a pill, called Blue Green Manna, from selling the fake cure. He claimed it would heal, correct or prevent arthritis, leukemia, Alzheimer's disease, high blood pressure, blindness, obesity and leprosy, but all it did was make the swindler richer.

Assistant Chief Postal Inspector Jack E. Swagerty told a Washington, DC conference on aging earlier this month that the public is often frustrated because medical science is unable to provide a complete, inexpensive solution to their particular

problem, and they are taken in by slick advertising. The best advice the Postal Service can offer is to not believe the claims of a secret cure or miracle drug and, more importantly, don't trust your health to a salesman.

One particularly vicious scheme took postal inspectors down a new trail recently, but it is the kind of swindle likely to be copied by those who prey on the unwary. By placing fraudulent advertisements in local newspapers and on several radio stations, the operator claimed he could respond from a communications center staffed 24 hours a day to requests for emergency assistance from

heart patients, senior citizens, the handicapped and others living alone. An investigation showed he took money from victims as an equipment leasing fee, plus a quarterly monitoring fee, but in fact there was no transmitting system and no actual monitoring service of any kind.

The postal service offers the following check list on how to avoid mail order swindles:

Beware of exaggerated claims or unusually low prices.

Don't be rushed. Avoid offers that claim to be your "last chance" to get a bargain.

Keep a copy of the advertisement from which you ordered, a record of the date of your order and the number of your check if you pay by check, and retain the cancelled check when it is returned to you.

Never send cash. Use a check, money order or credit card because they can be traced.

If you have doubts about a company, check with the Postal Inspection Service, the Better Business Bureau or a local consumer protection agency to see if there are any complaints on record against the company. And do the checking before ordering.

World War I Veteran Recalls Those Times

Our United States of America has just celebrated her 210th birthday. The founders of the new nation considered Independence Day an important occasion for rejoicing. John Adams said, "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward for evermore."

John Adams was right in his prediction and although people of the United States have celebrated the 4th of July in all the ways that he thought it ought to be, many of us cannot really know the full extent of joy felt by the early founders. All of us appreciate our freedom, but for those who were a part of the wars that were fought for the freedom of this great nation, Ju-

ly 4 has an extra special meaning.

One of those who joined the military ranks during World War I to do his part for our country was Milburn Hinson, a Bogata resident. He will be 90 years old in September, yet he recalls his days in France during that war with clarity.

Mr. Hinson joined the armed forces at the age of 19. Although the age limit to join was 21, his uncle who was on the board in Clarksville at that time allowed him to join. He was sent to France shortly after his training where he was a member of the Quarter Master Corp. Motor Truck Co. No. 1. He was a 1st class private and received \$21 per month salary. His job was to haul supplies to the front line. This was done at night with no lights except a man with a lighted cigarette walking in front of the truck. He was in constant danger of being spotted and shot by the enemy. Mr. Hinson recalls that life at this time for those living in France was very hard. Food was scarce. People would come to the units to collect the scraps from

the military men to take home and feed their families.

At one time, Mr. Hinson, as driver of the truck, and one guard took 50 prisoners to do road work. A rag was stuffed in the end of the guard's gun to keep it dry. During the time spent there, a rabbit appeared and the guard, forgetting the rag, shot at it, thus causing the gun barrel to burst. The prisoners all ran and hid behind trees and laughed at the guard. "They weren't about to run far, though, because they were being fed too good in our prisons," explained Mr. Hinson, smiling.

The war finally came to an end and Mr. Hinson recalls that he was preparing to return home by ship somewhere around July 4, 1920 when he received news from the states that Jack Dempsey had won the heavyweight boxing championship title.

"The Statue of Liberty was a warm welcome for our eyes as we pulled into New York harbor. It was good to be home at last," said Hinson.

When asked about the dangers he had been through, Mr. Hinson was quick to reply, "It was well worth the risk for freedom."

Milburn Hinson resides in Bogata with his wife, Lee Parker Hinson. They will be married 65 years in October of this year.

Red River County Seeking Reservoir Provision

Red River County Commissioners are asking Gov. Mark White to add a provision for creating the Dimple Reservoir when he calls the Texas Legislature into special session in August.

White's press secretary sees no problem in getting the issue added to the call, but said that until the state officials agree on how the legislature will confront the budget issue, no other things will be considered.

The bill would call an election to create a county wide water control

and improvement district. This district would have the authority to create a water reservoir.

Voters would decide whether the district would be headed by a board, and it would in turn decide how the improvement would be paid for.

A number of people in Red River County are hopeful that the water district can be created, and that the Dimple reservoir can become reality, providing much needed water supplies for the future of the county.

The six week institute, sponsored by the Charles Edison Memorial Youth Fund, begins Friday and ends with graduation ceremonies July 19 at Georgetown.

Wilkinson, 20, business editor of the Tyler newspapers since August, has worked as a reporter at T.B. Butler Publishing Co. Inc., since February 1984. He is a 1984 graduate of Robert E. Lee High School and currently attends Tyler Junior College where he is a business major.

At Lee, the native Tylerite was two-

time editor of the school newspaper Southern Accent. In 1984 he was awarded by the Interscholastic League Press Conference for the top editorial in Texas, and second place in high school division 5A for feature writing.

In 1986, Wilkinson was a co-recipient of Best Spot News Story by the North and East Texas Press Association for a story written in 1985 on the McDonald's murders on Gentry Parkway.

The 52 students selected for the Institute on Political Journalism also will serve as interns for various news organizations, political organizations or congressmen.

Wilkinson is scheduled to intern with U.S. Rep. Thomas Taulke, R-La.

In addition to the internship, Wilkinson will attend daily classes on economic and political theory, and attend site briefings at the White House, the Pentagon, NBC News and Voice of America.

The Institute also includes weekly seminars with members of the print and electronic media, including the Washington Post, New York Times, Wall Street Journal, NBC News, U.S. News and World Report and Cable News Network, among others.

Graduation ceremonies are July 19 with columnist Robert Novak the scheduled commencement speaker.

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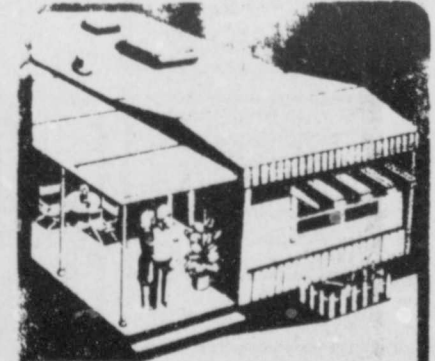
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
