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Citizens show concern over chief's dismissal

Council approves Rice's appointment as interim chief

A big crowd of citizens packed into the meeting room in the Bob Reily Early Learning Center to hear decisions of the city council on the topic of the dismissal of former police chief Luis Aguilar and Charles Rice's assignment within the city. Rice's resignation from the council was accepted and his appointment to the position of interim police chief was ratified.

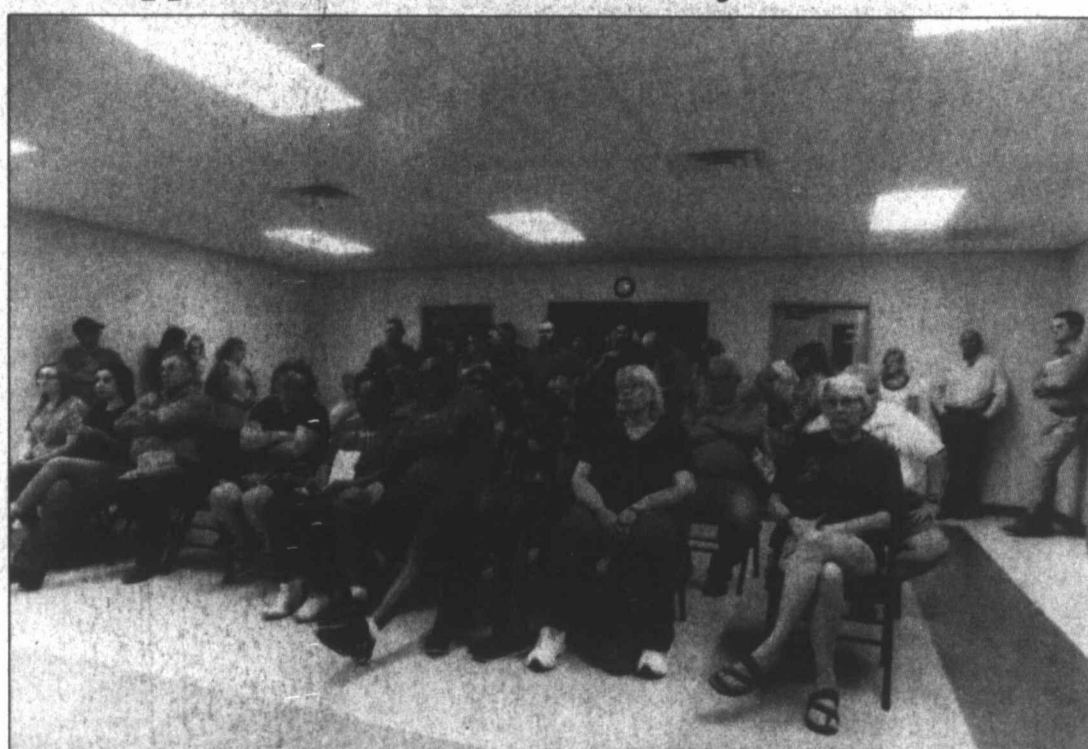

At 6 p.m., it was unsure if the council was going to have a quorum. The subject of councilmen who are routinely absent from meetings resurfaced again and opinions were expressed at the end of the meeting. Councilmen Boyd, Travis Lynch and Sammy Contreras were present for the meeting, along with Mayor Jim Baum for the quorum. Councilmen Marcelo Alvarez and Andrew Fuller were absent.

Timothy Boyd moved to accept the resignation of Rice as representative of District 2. The council was also to consider appointing someone to fill the vacancy. They had an application but Boyd moved to table the decision until more applications from other volunteers could be gathered.

The last item on the agenda was where the conflict arose. The council was to consider and possibly act on ratifying the appointment of Rice as the interim police chief.

Boyd gave City Manager David Hoover a chance to provide information. See MEETING, page 5

Burrows visits C-City

Rep. Dustin Burrows, Republican member of the Texas House of Representatives from District 83, stopped by the Record office to talk about the upcoming Special Legislative Session set to begin in July. The lawmaker said the 30-day session will be a busy one, as Gov. Greg Abbott has identified 19 items which will be the focus of the session.

Burrows said he expects to see a sunset bill passed to make sure doctors in Texas get to keep their medical licenses. It's an item that fell by the wayside during the regular session. The Texas Medical Board was among a few agencies that was never reauthorized. Without the property authority, the agencies would have to cease operations as of September.

Another hot topic will be school funding. Some have suggested that school funding got hung up in regular session due to disagreements over the "bathroom bill". The voucher bill didn't pass the house, and most smaller school districts were glad to see its demise.

Senator Charles Perry voted for the voucher bill during regular session, only after adding an amendment to the bill exempting school districts smaller than one the size of Lubbock ISD. Burrows said the bill he's seen penalizes smaller schools by providing incentives for consolidating districts.

Burrows said he wants to protect even the smallest districts in his area. "Smaller schools are the lifeblood of rural Texas," he said Tuesday.

Another hot button issue on tap for the special session will be property taxes. Burrows said he supports the governor's call to

Local graduate makes film to be shown in Abilene theatre

A recent Colorado High graduate has accomplished one of his major goals, and he's hoping to share it with Mitchell County citizens. In return, citizens get a great evening of entertainment for free.

Rankin Dean Bullard, son of Randy and Julie Bullard, has spent the last six months writing and directing a feature-length movie titled *This Is You*. He described it as a romantic drama coming-of-age film, and it will be showing at the Paramount in Abilene on Friday, June 30th.

The public is welcome and encouraged to attend the movie, and admission is free. It is set to begin at 8 p.m. that night.

Bullard, whose stage name is Rankin Dean, said the movie is family-friendly and features actors from the Abilene area. *This Is You* was self-financed and was produced on a \$2,000 budget.

He said the actors are mostly from Abilene Christian University, and the movie shows how we affect others by not being ourselves.

JP position elimination topic of public hearing

A public hearing was held at 10 a.m. Monday morning to give citizens the opportunity to express their opinion about the possible consolidation of existing Justice of the Peace precincts and offices. It's a move commissioners are considering, as they face tighter budgets.

Robert Bass, an attorney out of Austin, was present for the meeting. Commissioners hired the firm to provide data and information about the feasibility of a consolidation. The lawyer began telling court members and citizens in attendance that with a population of less than 18,000, Texas law says the county can operate with as few as one JP.

However, there are other factors to look at before a determination can be made. Bass said

his firm first looks at the physical layout of the county. Mitchell County has heavier traffic than some counties, mostly due to Interstate 20 running through it. Because of the increased traffic, local JPs handle a broad caseload.

Another factor studied by the firm was the effect of redistricting on the minority population. Data showed that minority voters would not be adversely affected by being served by only one Justice of the Peace. This means, Mitchell County can legally consolidate the precincts.

The next step was to compare the JP courts with others close to the same size. The firm found the local JPs have a slightly above average caseload. In 2015, Mitchell County JPs had 114 more cases

Commissioner's hear good audit report

Those in attendance at Monday's meeting of the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court got to hear the county's outside audit report. Cara Hilbrich of Davis Kinard & Co, PC told the court the county received an unmodified, or clean, audit.

Before beginning her report, Hilbrich said County Auditor Heidi Harris was a pleasure to work with, because she knows her stuff and has everything the auditors need.

An unmodified audit basically means that the county's financial statements are presented fairly in all respects. There were no deficiencies nor disagreements with management. No adjustments had to be made either.

The 2016 audit showed the county's total assets at \$23.2 million, which includes all property, equipment, buildings, etc. Hilbrich said the county ended the year with \$75 million in cash

and investments. Fortunately, revenues exceeded budget expectations for the county in 2016 by about \$276,000 and expenses came in around \$655,000 under budget, resulting in a positive variance of \$932,000.

Because of grant funds received by the county in 2016, a single audit was needed just for those funds. In single audits, the funds are tracked and proper compliance and reporting is checked. The county received an unmodified opinion on that audit as well.

After the audit report was approved by the court, members considered hiring Davis Kinard & Co, LP for the county's 2017 audit.

The firm submitted a quote to provide audit services, stating a cost not to exceed \$15,000. If a single audit is needed, each one

Guitarist Barlow to perform at library

"In concert, Jerry brings traditional Celtic tunes alive by sharing the history, humor and legends behind the music. Jerry Barlow... a performer who is skilled, funny and riveting. Out of the many musicians performing today, the vast majority are skilled in either performing on their instrument or in entertaining an audience. Barlow's last CD, *Voyage of Hope*, was released in early September of last year. It features songs about the Irish immigration to America in the mid-1800s. His 2011 recording, *Fields and Fences*, was one of

five nominees for Instrumental Album of the Year by the Independent Music Awards. The Indie Acoustic Project selected the title song from Jerry's CD, *Bring Down the Storm*, as "one of the best songs of 2006."

Music from all of Barlow's recordings can be heard regularly on National Public Radio stations. He has been featured in *Fingerstyle Guitar* magazine and was profiled in *Celtic Connection*. He has performed in the Gates

Auditorium for the University of Denver's Lamont School of Music, the Arvada Center for the Performing Arts, and is a favorite of High Plains Public Radio's Living Room Concert Series in Amarillo.

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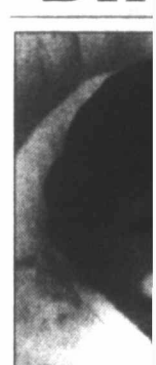

TUMBLEWEED SMITH Memories of Hoss Cartwright

Joe Harris of Brownwood grew up in O'Donnell and was a classmate of Dan Blocker, best known as Hoss Cartwright on the Bonanza TV series. The two stayed friends until Dan died in 1972. Joe was a pall bearer at Dan's funeral and burial in DeKalb, Texas where he was born.

"Dan was always fun and easy going," says Joe. "He was full of mischief and was always playing pranks. He wasn't a comedian but was the most comical person I've ever seen. That was his nature. Wherever he was, there was always a lot of laughter."

Dan earned a master's degree in theater from Sul Ross State University in Alpine where he worked part time as a rodeo performer and bouncer in a bar. His education was interrupted while he was a soldier in Korea. He was a highly decorated sergeant and was awarded a Purple Heart and several medals for bravery. After graduation he got a job teaching high school English and drama in Sonora. He taught there in the mid fifties, then went to Los Angeles where teachers were paid more.

"He took a group of his students to a television studio where they were filming Gunsmoke," says Joe. "James Arness, one of the stars of the show, noticed Dan with his easy-going manner and big size and asked him if he would consider doing some bit parts that he could do on Saturday mornings. Dan jumped on it in a minute."

His first role was wiping off a bar. He was on just a few seconds. Joe says everybody in O'Donnell was watching TV that Saturday night when Gunsmoke came on the air. Because the part was so tiny, Joe told Dan that he could have played the part himself.

"Dan brought a lot of attention to O'Donnell that had never been there before. Dan's dad had a store and it's now a museum with a Dan Blocker room."

The second time Dan was on the show he had a speaking part. He had 5 words: "which way did they go?" Joe says Dan was paid \$10,000 for that scene. Dan kept getting offers to act and quit teaching.

Once while Bonanza was at its peak in popularity Dan went to visit Joe in Denver City, where Joe was setting up a cable TV service. "He drew such a large crowd I had to take him to a gas plant that had a gate and security guards. He visited with everybody at the plant."

Although Dan was best known for Bonanza, he also played with some big movie stars like Frank Sinatra in Come Blow Your Horn and other stars in other movies.

"I never saw Dan act," says Joe. He was always just being himself."

Dan died in 1972 at age 43. The Bonanza series ended the following year.

actively pending than the average of four other counties of similar size.

Bass said the load was not so much that one court couldn't handle the job.

In terms of workload, the office of JP Pct. 1 handles about 2/3 of the total workload, while the JP Pct. 2 office handles about 1/3. Those numbers vary at different times, this is the average split. For instance, on August 31, 2016, the Precinct 1 office had 2,440 active cases pending, while Precinct 2 had 1,129.

If the decision is made to consolidate the precincts, the change would occur in conjunction with the 2018 election. The newly-elected JP would take office in January of 2019. Until that time, both JPs will continue to serve.

Bass said his firm does not advise clients on whether or not to consolidate. He only provides

data, but public interest has to be considered.

No one spoke during the public hearing.

Mitchell County Sheriff Patrick Toombs shared some information with the court concerning law enforcement. He said he thinks there may be an increase in the number of tickets that will be issued in the future, because DPS officers from this area are going to be coming back from the border. Also, he's heard this area may get one to five more troopers to work here.

Pct. 1 JP Rick Grissam urged the court to consider increasing the budget for the one office if the consolidation is approved. He said at least one part-time clerk would have to be hired to help the existing full-time clerk in order to handle the workload.

How much money would be saved through consolidation?

County Auditor Heidi Harris estimated about \$100,000 could be saved by consolidating the offices, depending on how much commissioners want to pay a new part-time employee.

Pct. 2 JP James Williams told the court that the salary of the one judge would need to be raised due to the increased workload. He also reminded court members that his office is one of the few that bring revenue to the county.

Muñoz asked if both offices in the courthouse were open full-time, eight hours per day, five days per week. Grissam answered yes.

Commissioner Jeremy Strain said he'd like some time to consider the data provided by Bass. He moved to table the item. The court has time for the consideration, as a decision is not necessary until November.

prevent excessive growth of property tax rates. The legislator said he's also in support of a big push toward greater transparency.

"It's not clear where the money goes," Burrows said of how taxes are spent. "The taxpayers deserve to know how their money is being used."

Burrows said he supports a bill that gives citizens enough information about where their local tax dollars are being used, so they are able to ask appropriate questions of the right people.

When informed that sometimes valuations are where citizens have difficulties, Burrows said the state has tried to implement uniform and standard appraisal values. The lawmaker brought about another interesting point when he stated that entities can always cut costs and tax rates to give citizens relief when

values rise.

In mentioning the bathroom bill, Burrows said there are several social issues up for review in July. He believes a policy needs to be in place to prevent big cities from taxing the people who don't want to see up to 30 genders recognized.

According to the representative, in other states citizens using the wrong pronoun when referring to someone else can actually be fined. For instance, if a waiter is addressed as a 'sir' but identifies as a 'ma'am', the person who called the waiter sir can be fined.

Burrows said that's the last thing we need in Texas. "I took high school biology, so I know there are only two genders. You can't fight science," the lawmaker said.

Burrows aligns himself with the governor when it comes

to the fight against financing Planned Parenthood. He said he supports a bill to stop funneling money to the agency.

Though no specific organizations were named, Burrows said he realizes a need to replace some of the services provided by Planned Parenthood, including birth control, women's services and more. He said more funding was secured for alternatives during the regular session. He said he hopes the alternatives will continue to grow and expand.

According to the legislator, there's a huge fight ongoing right now for the culture of Texas. He describes that culture as traditional with conservative values. These are things that describe Burrows and he plans to fight for their preservation.

mation about the dismissal of Luis Aguilar from his position as police chief last week. Aguilar was relieved of his duties on Wednesday, June 14th, and the only reason provided has been that he "was not a good fit" for the small department.

Boyd asked if Hoover could give the crowd any information to help them understand his decision. He added that the city charter says it is the prerogative of the city manager to hire and fire city employees. Hoover did not offer any information on the subject.

Boyd moved to ratify the appointment of Rice to the position of Colorado City Police Chief. Councilman Travis Lynch then had something to say.

Lynch stated that he would be voting no on the ratification. He said he is not against Rice, but he feels like the city manager dismissed Aguilar and put Rice in place behind the backs of the council. Lynch said he understands it is the city manager's right to hire and fire, but the citizens have a right to know what's going on within the city government. He also said recent measures have caused him to question Hoover's integrity.

The statement was met with rousing applause from the audience.

Sammy Contreras then seconded Boyd's motion, and the measure passed 3-1. Boyd, Contreras, and Baum voted to ratify the appointment. Lynch voted against.

Mayor Baum gave citizens a chance to make a public comment. Janet McCollum said she

thinks the person who serves as city manager should be changed every four years or so. She told the council she has served as an officer of the Lions Club with Aguilar, and she gave a gleaming character reference for him. She defended Aguilar by saying she thinks Hoover has wrecked his career.

McCollum also told two stories where her mother-in-law Charlie McCollum and mother, Marge Crawford, were both helped by Aguilar. Both received care above and beyond what a typical police officer would do.

She said she's lived all over the place and she's never felt she couldn't trust someone, but now she does, inferring that someone is Hoover.

Field Representative of Texas Municipal Police Association John Wilkerson was the next person to make a public statement. The law enforcement officer said four years ago the Colorado City police force was just a stepping stone for more officers, and Aguilar has turned that around.

Wilkerson spoke to Aguilar's professional behavior, no matter the size of the city. He said Aguilar had transparent standards treating everyone the same. Wilkerson said, if you drive around drunk, have drugs found on you or beat your wife, you'll be arrested when Aguilar is the chief. "No matter who you know," Wilkerson said.

The TMPA rep told the crowd that a petition and referendum could change the current circumstances.

Jill Lynch, wife of Council-

man Travis Lynch, spoke next. She said she's been disappointed by the actions of city officials the last few days. She recounted her past of being forced to move from her hometown of Abilene due to gangs and drugs.

She told the council that Aguilar provided overwhelming support when she and other citizens started the Colorado City Crime-Watch group. In the past three years of his service as chief, she's seen crime lessen.

Becky Seibold described Aguilar as a wonderful person who went out of his way to help. She also questioned the whereabouts of the absent city councilmen. She asked why they weren't there when such an important decision was under consideration.

Marianne Stevenson said she's seen greatness and honesty in Aguilar. She said she needs to hear a very good reason why he was fired, and she hasn't heard one yet.

Mayor Baum thanked the citizens for attending the meeting. He expressed his hope more would attend regular council meetings. "It all starts with you," he said.

Rice was contacted by the *Record* but decided to wait a week before making any comment about his new position.

would cost an additional \$2,800. Harris recommended approving the company for another year, saying the firm sends her a different group of people every year and they are all very professional.

In other action, County Treasurer Jennifer Rivera brought a proposal before the court. The county is required to provide tracking of health insurance benefits, as part of the Affordable Care Act. The Texas Association of Counties (TAC) provides the tracking service for free.

Forms are required to be submitted to the IRS, and county employees receive a copy as well. Rivera said that TAC will print

the forms, submit them to the IRS and mail employees a copy for \$1.47 per employee. She said she doesn't think her office could do that for less than that cost, when you take into consideration the cost of paper, ink, envelopes, and postage.

Commissioner Bill Preston moved to approve the service, and Jesse Muñoz seconded. The motion passed unanimously. The money to pay TAC comes out of the treasurer's office supply budget.

Payroll in the amount of \$79,027.47 was approved as presented by Rivera.

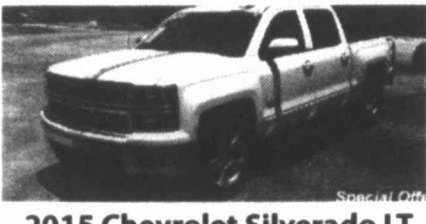

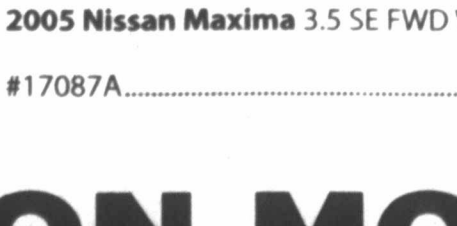

McCollum's story could help others

Lions Club Vice President Janet McCollum presented the program during the weekly meeting Friday. What began as her own personal story, ended up providing help for anyone wanting some support while trying to lose weight.

McCollum began by telling club members that her dad died from complications of diabetes, and three months later, McCollum herself fell very ill. She said she was so fatigued she could barely drag herself out of bed most days.

The Lion VP said her greatest fear was she might be dying of cancer, but that wasn't the case. McCollum worked for the FAA at the time, and it was difficult to miss work, but she made a doctor's appointment.

After undergoing many tests, it was time to find out what was making her so tired.

"I was shaking," McCollum said of her nerves the day of her test results.

The doctor had ordered an A1C, a test which shows blood sugar levels over the last three months, along with a whole litany of other tests. The A1C told the tale, and McCollum was diagnosed with diabetes.

As is typical when beginning treatment of diabetes, the doctor prescribed Metformin for McCollum. The medicine fights high glucose levels in the blood in several different ways. By the second week of taking it, she had lost 22 pounds because the high dosage was making her sick.

When she went back to the physician, he cut the dosage in half, and it became much more tolerable for McCollum. There were other steps she took to get her blood sugar levels under control as well.

She said she took a nutritional class and took it to heart. McCollum said that she remembered her dad's life and the complications he suffered from not dealing with his diabetes properly.

McCollum said that she weighed 219 pounds when she started treating her diabetes. Through exercise and a healthy diet she was able to

reduce her weight to 148 within six months.

"It is doable," she said of the steps she took.

After the birth of McCollum's fourth child, she weighed 159 pounds and began "eating her emotions". The heavier weight halted many of the physical activities she had once enjoyed. She said she had always enjoyed snow skiing and swimming.

"I couldn't swim, and I lived in Hawaii!" she said. "The extra weight robbed my kids of a beautiful mom."

As McCollum progressed through her weight loss plan, she dropped from a size 16 to a size 8. She stopped eating processed foods and weighed and measured everything she ate. She also cooked from scratch to ensure she knew what she was eating.

"That blood test was a reality check," she said.

When she moved to Colorado City a couple of years ago, McCollum met Lilly Funderburg who took her to a TOPS meeting. TOPS stands for Taking Off Pounds Sensibly.

Since that time, McCollum's A1C has gone down to a 5. It is supposed to be in a normal range of 4 to 7. She was able to reduce the Metformin to every other day and eventually stop taking it all together.

McCollum described TOPS members as real people with real weight loss. Every year a king and queen are named. Last year's queen lost 182 pounds through changing her diet and exercise.

TOPS meets every second and fourth Thursdays of the month at the Mitchell County Hospital Conference Room. The hospital provides the room free of charge in an effort to help the community get healthier. It costs \$32 per year to join TOPS, and those attending give another \$5 per month for food for a party.

McCollum urged her fellow Lions attempting to lose weight to join TOPS. "It's a life-changing program," she said.

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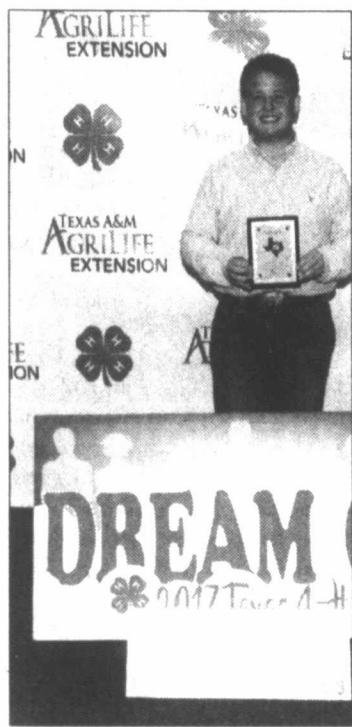

CES taking registrations for Pre-K, kindergarten

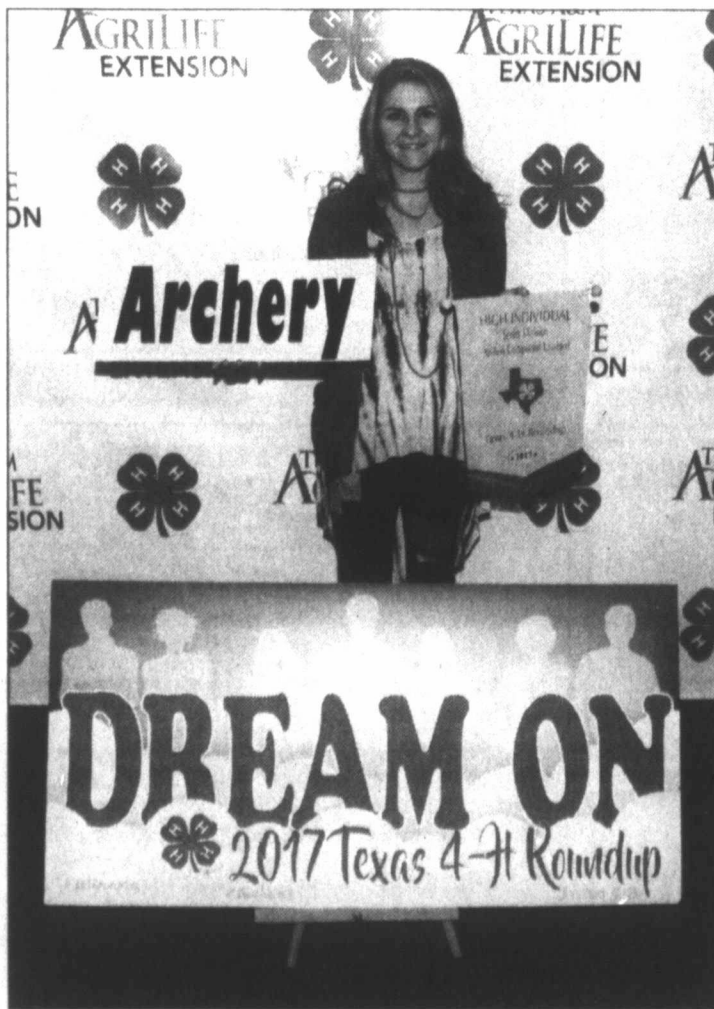

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS ESTABLISHING LOCAL REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS FOR THE OPERATION OF GAME ROOMS AND USE OF GAMING MACHINES WITHIN THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY; AMENDING CHAPTER 4, BUSINESS REGULATIONS, OF THE COLORADO CITY, TEXAS CODE OF ORDINANCES BY ADDING ARTICLE 4.10, GAME ROOMS AND GAMING MACHINES; REQUIRING PERMITS FOR GAME ROOMS AND REGISTRATION FOR INDIVIDUAL GAMING MACHINES; RESTRICTING LOCATIONS IN WHICH GAME ROOMS MAY BE ESTABLISHED WITHIN THE CITY; ESTABLISHING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Sec. 4.10.010 Violation; Penalty

(a) The City shall have the authority to seal any Gaming Machine for which a Registration Fee has not been paid or which is located in a Game Room for which a Permit Fee has not been paid. A \$5.00 fee will be charged for the release of any Gaming Machine sealed for non-payment of said Registration Fee or Permit Fee.

(b) The violation of any provision of this Ordinance will subject the violator to prosecution for a Class C misdemeanor and a fine of up to \$500.00. Each day the violation continues shall be a separate offense.

EFFECTIVE DATE

IV. Publication and Effective Date. The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to publish the caption of this Ordinance in the manner and for the length of time prescribed by law and this Ordinance shall become effective after publication of same as provided by charter and/or State law.

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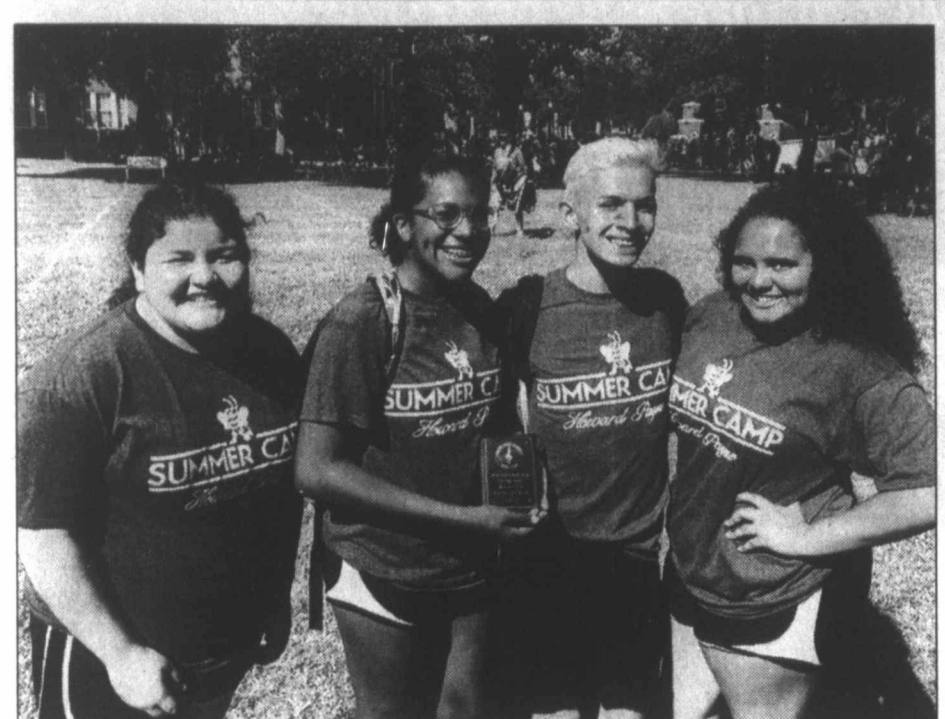
